

SAC John Malone, Los Angeles, called concerning Los Angeles teletype of 5/25/56 reporting allegation against Special Agent [Redacted] and advised that 3 of the 4 officials involved are presently on a fishing trip, are out of contact and will not return until late Sunday night. He continued that they had identified the one individual in the office as FNU [Redacted] a temporary employee, whose whereabouts are not known at this time. Malone also advised they had identified the bookkeeper as [Redacted], but have not as yet located her.

Malone stated he was personally directing the inquiry in connection with the allegations against SA [Redacted] and it was his plan to conduct simultaneous interviews, if possible, Sunday night shortly after the three officials of the company return from the fishing trip.

Malone advised that he had [Redacted] statement emphatically denying the allegations and this would be forwarded to the Bureau.

ACTION TAKEN:

Malone was advised to pursue this matter vigorously and to follow his telephonic advice with a teletype summarizing exactly what he was doing and what his plans were in regard to bringing this to an early conclusion. 10 JUN 4 1956

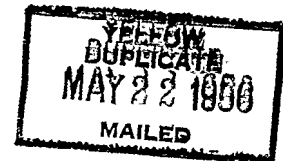

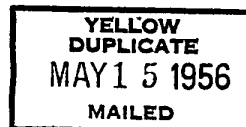

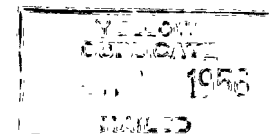

U. S. v. Standard Oil Company of California

I wish to express to you my congratulations and thanks for the excellent work performed by the Bureau in response to requests for assistance in the preparation for trial of the case of United States v. Standard Oil Company of California et al.

Due to the great assistance of the Bureau in the analysis and tabulation of a vast amount of statistical and other evidentiary data, in form which can be introduced as evidence at trial, the time by which the Government can be ready for trial has been advanced by at least two years.

I doubt that the Antitrust Division ever previously made a request of the Bureau for aid in trial preparation involving as great a demand upon the time and effort of FBI Agents as has been made in this case. The results, in my opinion, fully justify the expenditure of the time and effort involved.

I particularly wish to commend in the highest terms, and to express my appreciation for, the cooperation of Special Agent in Charge John F. Malone, and the excellent work performed by Special Agents Albert J. Roberts, Jr., James E. Daley, [redacted], and [redacted], all of your Los Angeles field office. Mr. Malone assigned special agents having exceptional qualifications for the work to be done, and he was somehow able to give to our requests sufficient priority to permit the job to be done within the time limits suggested by the attorney in charge of the preparation of this case for trial. His friendly and efficient cooperation has been of great value.

Special Agent Albert J. Roberts, Jr. coordinated and directly supervised the work of other agents on this project, in addition to performing several important segments of the work himself. His quick recognition of difficulties, deficiencies or weaknesses in proposed undertakings, his good judgment in suggesting improvements in the form and content of tabulations, his suggestions for elimination of unnecessary work and for better methods of attaining the results sought, and his interest, intelligence, and cooperation in the entire program have been invaluable.

Special Agents Daley, [redacted] and [redacted] have all done exceptionally fine work and have produced excellent results. Their intelligence, interest, hard work, and consistently friendly cooperation with attorneys in the Antitrust Division have resulted in admiration and respect for the Bureau and its fine personnel.

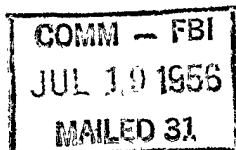

Bureau letter dated March 2, 1956, instructed the field to immediately intensify the investigation regarding CP financial operations. The field was instructed to submit monthly letters reflecting the achievements attained in connection with this investigation. The letters received from the Los Angeles Office over the past several months have reflected that Los Angeles has been able to obtain complete and detailed information regarding income and expenditures of the Los Angeles County CP. Due to the excellence of the work being performed by this office and the information being obtained, the Bureau directed a letter to Los Angeles dated June 14, 1956, requesting to be advised whether consideration has been given to commending personnel of that office.

This robbery which occurred on 7/10/56 in Los Angeles was completely solved within a matter of hours culminating in the shooting of Subject [redacted] his capture and the capture of [redacted] and later a female accomplice after the fact. Before being shot Subject [redacted] threatened to kill SAC Malone and Agent Edward A. Plevack with a loaded gun he had in his possession at the time. Courage and fast thinking on part of SAC Malone and Plevack averted injury or possible death to both. Plevack shot [redacted] while SAC Malone was endeavoring to wrestle a loaded gun from [redacted] hand.

SAC Malone was contacted late on the afternoon of 7/11/56 and regarding commendation aspects of this case he felt Plevack was deserving of an incentive award for his courage and alertness and that a letter to the office commending the other agents who participated in the case would suffice. He also recommended letter of commendation to Detective [redacted] Los Angeles Police Department. SAC Malone and Agent Plevack are being recommended by separate memorandum, under today's date for \$200 incentive awards. Commendation is being recommended for the Los Angeles Office and Detective Murphy. *Being sent here today*

SAC Malone called particular attention to the fact that all of the local publicity was highly favorable as far as the Bureau was concerned. He made no reference to himself but placed particular emphasis on the favorable reaction of the press as far as the Bureau was concerned.

According to Malone Subject [redacted] who was shot by Agent Plevack is still in a critical condition with a punctured kidney, and if they cannot stop the bleeding he probably will not survive. He mentioned that Subjects [redacted] and [redacted] who have admitted a series of robberies in Los Angeles and Philadelphia are now suspected of committing several homicides in Philadelphia.

Malone advised he has on his desk a bouquet of beautiful roses from a leading local undertaker which were sent to him in a jocular spirit in view of Malone's narrow escape from death.

I think Malone should be commended.

Instant bank was robbed this date by two armed bandits who obtained approximately \$1,200 in coins. Robbers escaped in 1956 Ford after exchange of shots with Deputy Sheriff who was in the bank but off duty.

Getaway car failed to negotiate turn short distance from bank and crashed into house. Bandits then commandeered car of [Redacted] and took her as driver and hostage. They left hostage with her car some distance from bank and proceeded on foot.

Among number of leads was address found in billfold left in wrecked getaway car. I, along with two Special Agents and three LAPD officers, proceeded to this address. SA EDWARD A. PLEVACK and Officer [Redacted] and I began searching house for subjects while Agent and two LAPD officers guarded exits. In one room closet was located. I instructed SA PLEVACK to cover me while I searched same. Subject [Redacted] was hiding behind the clothes in closet and as I exposed him and noted drawn gun, he said, "I am going to kill you--you B [Redacted] s". I immediately seized [Redacted] hand and gun and during brief scuffle pulled him from closet. At this point SA PLEVACK shot [Redacted] through the left arm and chest.

This timely action of SA PLEVACK undoubtedly saved possible serious injury to Officer MURPHY, SA PLEVACK or myself. [Redacted] gun was a .32 cal. automatic, fully loaded, with a bullet in the chamber and the safety off. [Redacted] is presently at the General Police Hospital. His condition is listed as critical, but he is expected to recover.

Subject [Redacted] was subsequently located hiding under a bed in the same house.

SUBJECT: POLICE TRAINING
LOS ANGELES OFFICE

By letter 6/29/56 our Los Angeles Office advises of the police training program planned and presented for approval to the Chiefs of Police (40 Chiefs and 7 Sheriffs) in the San Joaquin Valley early in June, 1956. This program scheduled for the rural areas in the San Joaquin Valley consists of having a one-day police school each month on a continuous, year-round in-service training basis for each department. Thus each department has available one day a month a police school either at their own department or at a police department so close there is no hardship of transportation. Topics scheduled are those which the department or those participating in zone school indicate are needed topics. This plan was unanimously approved by the Chiefs of Police in the rural areas of the San Joaquin Valley and has been enthusiastically received. Similar schools have been planned for the law enforcement agencies in the Ventura, Santa Barbara and San Luis Obispo Counties and have met with very favorable response.

It is to be noted that early in June, 1956, the Los Angeles Office learned that [redacted] Supervisor, Peace Officers' Training, State Department of Education, Sacramento, California, planned a survey in the San Joaquin Valley to ascertain training needs of the many rural smaller police departments of the area. In the event his plan received a favorable reaction, Peper planned to seek an appropriation from the State Legislature to defray expenses of 4 police instructors to be added to his staff; these instructors to hold police schools daily for the smaller police departments throughout the San Joaquin Valley. On June 7, 1956, [redacted] [redacted]'s Special Supervisor and Representative, having made the survey, addressed a meeting of Zone 4 of all Chiefs in the San Joaquin Valley; graciously accepted the decision of the Chiefs to use the FBI program and commented that he saw no reason for the State of California to duplicate the FBI's fine program and that he also recommended that the FBI program be accepted as scheduled.

[redacted] has been employed since immediately after World War II by the California State Department of Education to conduct schools for law enforcement officers and to train teachers.

He has been informed that the Bureau cannot cooperate with him in his schools since we have consistently followed the policy of not participating in schools operated by persons other than law enforcement officers. [] has indicated he clearly understands this. In January, 1956, San Francisco advised that [] program appears to be "dying on its feet" and his schools have not been requested as much as formerly.

It appears that the program planned by the Los Angeles Office meets the training needs of law enforcement agencies in the rural areas, is enthusiastically received and there should be no need for []-sponsored schools. Inasmuch as information regarding this program has been made available to the San Francisco and San Diego Offices, no further action is necessary.

OBSERVATIONS:

This was an extremely fast-moving case where the bank was robbed and was completely solved within a matter of hours. Split-second decisions had to be made and SAC Malone apparently took complete personal, on-the-scene command of the case, exercised the highest degree of courage and quick thinking, personally searching the closet in which [redacted] was located and although under threat of being killed, grabbed [redacted] hand and gun and pulled him from the closet. His courage and alertness and that of SA Plevack in shooting the armed subject probably averted serious injury or possible death to the SAC and the agent.

Woman Kidnaped in Holdup

Illustrated on Page 3, Part 1

John F. Malone, special agent in charge of the FBI office in Los Angeles, came within an instant of death yesterday as he grappled with one of two suspects cornered in a house shortly after the holdup of a bank and the kidnaping of a woman.

The suspect, waving a fully loaded 32-caliber automatic, screamed "I'll kill all you. . .!" as Malone pulled him from a closet. But before he could pull the trigger, another FBI agent, Ed Plevack, fired one shot. The man fell, seriously wounded in the left arm and chest.

Traced Through Wallet

The holdup and kidnaping, described by investigators as an almost comical fiasco of errors from the start, reached its dramatic climax in a duplex house at 9722 Parmalee St.

The suspects were traced there through a wallet and an eyeglasses prescription which the bandits left near the Security-First National Bank, 4450 W Adams Blvd. where they fled with \$1674, including three heavy metal cases.

Hiding in Closet

Malone said he and other agents and police went to the Parmalee St. house to ask for a Mrs. Barbara Webster, whose name was in the wallet. A woman in one section of the house told them Mrs. Webster lived next door.

"The door was open and we walked in," Malone said. "I found one man hiding in a closet and I reached in to pull him out. He came, but he had the gun in his hand and was yelling that he'd kill us all."

Found Under Bed

The second suspect, listed as Maxie C. Brown, 21, surrendered meekly from his hiding place under a bed, Malone related.

Events leading to the shooting and capture started when two armed men entered the Security-First National Bank branch on W Adams Blvd. One of them leaped up on a bench near the door and, waving a pistol, warned the employees and about a dozen customers that a holdup was taking place.

The second man vaulted over the counter and forced Mrs. Audrey Spanggaard, the safe deposit attendant, and George Firmin, escrow clerk, into the vault. There he demanded that they open the cash drawer, but they could not do it because of its dual mechanism requiring two keys.

Threatens to Shoot

Meanwhile, the bandit standing on the bench became impatient. Bruce W. McKay, the assistant manager, told police this man pulled a paper sack from his pocket, placed it over the counter and began talking

to various times threatening all the employees, including Miss Renee Jenson, the bookkeeper, and Mrs. Carmen Ortiz, Bill Williams and Miss Adeline Tomera, teller.

Finally the men fled with their heavy bags of silver. An interested bystander and bank customer was an off-duty deputy sheriff, John Riley, of 2936 Farmdale Ave. Riley ran out the door after the men, firing four shots at them as they got into their car on nearby Victoria Ave.

Car Crashes House

They returned his fire, he said, then drove west into an alley behind the bank, sidestepping a parked car and tearing down a section of fence. At the corner of Somerset Drive and 28th St. the driver lost control and the car crashed into a house on the corner.

The gunmen jumped out, leaving the sacks of coins and the wallet and two guns, and ran down Somerset Drive until they saw Mrs. Della Harris, of 2704 Palm Grove Ave., getting out of her automobile at the curb. They forced her at gunpoint to drive them away.

Woman Unharmed

Mrs. Harris and her car were located later at Long Beach Blvd. and 24th St., unharmed.

The wounded Evans was taken to Georgia Street Receiving Hospital for treatment, then transferred to the prison ward of General Hospital.

His companion Brown,

questioned by robbery detail detectives, reportedly admitted he and Evans took part in three recent liquor store holdups. There were listed as 10466 S Vermont Ave., when bandits fired several shots and took \$39 last June 26; 2631 W Adams Blvd., \$60 on July 3, and 4763 W Adams Blvd., two blocks from the bank which was robbed yesterday, \$50 on June 29.

Came From Pennsylvania

The suspects, police said, came to Los Angeles from Philadelphia several weeks ago, and had been living at the Parmalee St. address. The car which they crashed into bore Pennsylvania license plates.

Bullet Hits Suspect in Gun Arm

A quick-trigger shot by one of his aides saved the life of John F. Malone, local FBI chief, yesterday when the G-men closed in on two bank robbery suspects in Watts.

Less than three hours after the bank holdup, the FBI traced the two suspects to a house at 9722 Parmalee street, Watts.

One of the men was flushed from under a bed. Malone found the other man hiding behind clothes in a closet and dragged him out.

But as the man came out, he leveled a revolver at Malone's head. Before he could shoot, Agent Ed Plevack fired.

Plevack's bullet ripped through the bandit suspect's gun arm and into his chest. The wounded man, who was taken to Georgia Street Receiving Hospital, identified himself as James G. Evans, 22. His companion gave the name of Maxie Brown, 21.

Police said the pair admitted they are holdup men from Philadelphia and that they have robbed three liquor stores here since their arrival from the eastern city less than a month ago.

The gunplay in Watts climaxed the \$1600 robbery of a Security-First National Bank branch at 4450 West Adams boulevard and the kidnaping and release of a woman hos-

armed men entered were 12 customers and 17 employees.

"Don't do anything," one of the bandits shouted.

Three tellers pressed their buzzers and an alarm sounded. However, the bank bandits kept to their task. One of the men jumped over a counter, grabbed a bank money bag and stuffed it with currency.

The gunmen ran from the bank and drove off in a car that had been parked in an alley behind the bank.

Several shots were fired at the car by John Riley, an off-duty deputy sheriff, who was among the bank customers during the holdup. The bullets hit the car but not the bandits.

At Somerset drive and 28th street, the getaway car skidded out of control and crashed into the front porch of a house at 2800 Somerset drive.

ABANDON AUTO—

The holdup men abandoned their car, ran about half a block and then saw Mrs. Della Harris, 42, of 2704 Palm Grove avenue, getting out of her auto.

They forced their way into the car with the terse command:

"Lady, get back in your car and get going."

The men kept Mrs. Harris covered with their guns and gave the directions.

"I guess you think we're goofy," said one.

"What everybody does is his own business," replied the frightened woman.

She said later, "I was praying every minute I

would come out all right."

FLEE ON FOOT—

The bandits got out of Mrs. Harris' car at 23rd street and Long Beach boulevard and fled on foot.

FBI agents and police, searching through the car abandoned by the men after the crash, found the \$1600 stolen from the bank, several loaded revolvers and a tell-tale clew, a receipt from a local optometrist.

A check with the optometrist gave officers the address in Watts.

Police said the two men

Upon dismissal by the U. S. Attorney, Fargo, North Dakota, of the complaint against [redacted] fugitive subject of an Interstate Transportation of Stolen Motor Vehicle case, ASAC Lynum, Minneapolis prepared a discontinue airtel dated 6/4/56 to all auxiliary offices including Los Angeles. Inadvertently ASAC Lynum neglected to advise Bureau [redacted] was no longer a fugitive; however, he did instruct investigating agent to submit report promptly. This was done under date of 6/7/56 and the Bureau was thus notified.

The Minneapolis discontinue airtel of 6/4/56 was stamped into the Los Angeles Office on 6/5/56 but it was not received by SA Newton until 6/27/56. Meanwhile SA Newton conducted investigation unnecessarily on 6/14/56 and 6/15/56 and submitted a report dated 6/21/56 which was forwarded to the Bureau.

SAC Malone, Los Angeles advised on 7/23/56 that he was unable to account for the whereabouts of the Minneapolis discontinue airtel from approximately 6/5/56, the date it was received at Los Angeles until 6/27/56, the date it was received by SA Newton. According to SAC Malone clerical notations on the airtel reflect the case file was not available when it was received and the airtel was sent to a supervisor without the file. The supervisor observed that it was a discontinue airtel and directed that it be immediately called to the attention of SA Newton to whom the case was being reassigned. On 7/19/56 SA Newton explained that instant case was reassigned to him on 6/7/56 but that he did not receive the discontinue airtel from Minneapolis until 6/27/56. He pointed out that a notation '6/27/56' was made by him on the airtel to indicate that he received it on that date. In addition, SA Newton explained that if he had received the discontinue airtel before 6/14/56, the investigation that was made by him on that date would not have been conducted.

An examination of the discontinued airtel from Minneapolis by SAC Malone revealed that it had become folded and crumpled along one side as though it had been jammed underneath something. According to SAC Malone none of the personnel in the Chief Clerk's Office who would normally have handled the airtel recall it. SAC Malone stated that it appears that the airtel became lost either through being attached to the bottom of another file or in some other manner. SAC Malone also advised that the procedure utilized by the Los Angeles Office in handling teletypes and airtels has been carefully examined and no weakness which would cause such a delay could be found.

SA Newton was advised by SAC Malone that he should have promptly informed his supervisor that he did not receive the discontinued airtel from Minneapolis until 6/27/56 so that direct responsibility for mishandling the airtel could be fixed. SA Newton was also advised that affixing the date "6/27/56" to the airtel did not relieve him of the foregoing obligation.

RECOMMENDATION OF SAC, MINNEAPOLIS

SAC Howard, Minneapolis recommended that ASAC Lynum be charged with an error of form for the delay from 6/4/56 to 6/7/56 in advising Bureau process against [] had been dismissed and that [] was no longer a fugitive.

RECOMMENDATION OF SAC, LOS ANGELES

SAC Malone, Los Angeles recommended that no administrative action be taken against personnel of the Los Angeles Office inasmuch as it is not possible to fix direct responsibility for mishandling the discontinued airtel from Minneapolis.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE INVESTIGATIVE DIVISION

The Investigative Division recommended that ASAC Lynum and SAC Malone be censured.

Enclosed are two copies of a memorandum of explanation dated 7/19/56 of SA CLARENCE E. NEWTON, JR.

A review of the Los Angeles file in this case reflects that the Los Angeles copy of Minneapolis airtel dated 6/4/56 was block-stamped into this office on 6/5/56. Clerical notations on the serial reflect that the file was not in and that the airtel was called to the attention of the Supervisor without the file. Noting that it was a discontinued airtel, the Supervisor directed that appropriate notations be made and that the serial be immediately called to the attention of SA NEWTON to whom the case was being reassigned.

An examination of the airtel in question reflects it had become folded and crumpled along one side as though it had been jammed underneath something. The serial also contains a notation placed thereon by SA NEWTON reading as follows: "6/27/56". As SA NEWTON explained in his memorandum, he put this notation on the serial in view of the delay in receiving it.

None of the personnel in the Chief Clerk's Office who would have handled this serial recall same. It appears that the serial became lost either through being attached to the bottom of another file or in some other manner.

The procedure utilized in handling teletypes and airtels has been carefully gone into and no weakness which would cause such a delay could be found.

I have carefully emphasized to all personnel involved the fact that loss or misrouting of serials must be avoided and I have emphasized to them the added cost to the Government for such an error. SA NEWTON was advised that he should have called this delay to the attention of his Supervisor so that the opportunity of fixing responsibility could have been possible. He was advised that affixing the notation to the serial did not relieve him of this responsibility.

Inasmuch as it does not appear possible to fix the responsibility for the delay in this case, no administrative action is recommended.

ERRORS:

1. Minneapolis - Minneapolis was advised of dismissal of process against fugitive [] on 6/4/56 and while auxiliary offices were notified of same by Minneapolis 6/4/56 airtel, the Bureau was not immediately advised. Minneapolis subsequently advised the Bureau of the dismissal by a 6/7/56 report.

2. Los Angeles - Despite receipt by Los Angeles of Minneapolis 6/4/56 discontinue airtel, Los Angeles by 6/21/56 report of Clarence E. Newton, Jr., reported results of fugitive investigation conducted on June 14 and 15, 1956.

EXPLANATION OF PERSONNEL:

1. Minneapolis - ASAC Curtis O. Lynum admits error in not promptly informing Bureau of dismissal of process, error being caused through inadvertence.

2. Los Angeles - SA Clarence E. Newton, Jr., who prepared Los Angeles 6/21/56 report, advised that Minneapolis discontinue airtel of 6/4/56 was not received by him until 6/27/56.

RECOMMENDATION OF SACS:

Minneapolis - SAC Howard recommends no administrative action as ASAC Lynum notified all auxiliary offices to discontinue and as no unnecessary investigation attributable to error in Minneapolis Office was conducted in this case. SAC has scored error in folder of ASAC Lynum.

Los Angeles - SAC Malone recommends no administrative action as it has not been possible to affix the responsibility for the temporary loss or delay in routing Minneapolis 6/4/56 airtel to SA Newton. SAC Malone has questioned all personnel in the Chief Clerk's Office who handled serial and none can recall same. He has reviewed procedures in handling teletype and airtels and has discovered no weakness which would cause delay in routing of such material. SAC points out that airtel in question was folded and crumpled along one side giving the appearance it had been jammed underneath something. He states it appears the serial became attached to the bottom of another file.

Attached is a letter to Los Angeles emphasizing necessity of proper handling of Bureau mail and instructing that proper precautions be immediately taken to prevent recurrences of situations of this type.

National convention held September 3-6, 1956, Los Angeles. Estimated 100,000 Legionnaires attended. Meetings of Americanism Commission and Countersubversive Activities Committee began 8-31-56.

RESOLUTIONS AFFECTING FBI:

Four resolutions commending FBI presented to convention. These emanated from District of Columbia, Maryland, Tennessee, and the National Americanism Commission of the Legion. These resolutions coordinated into one which passed unanimously before full convention. Director's telegram to National Commander thanking Legion for commendation of FBI read before convention 9-6-56 and received with ovation. Press releases issued to wire services and newspapers regarding commendation of Director and FBI personnel. These releases carried by all Los Angeles papers (example attached).

MISCELLANEOUS RESOLUTIONS:

Total of 91 resolutions considered by convention committees and brought before full convention. Seven resolutions condemned UNESCO. Four resolutions criticized the Fund for the Republic and called for speedy removal of tax-exempt status. Two resolutions called for congressional investigation into activities of American Civil Liberties Union and Emergency Civil Liberties Union. One resolution reflected that many charges had been made regarding communist infiltration into National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and that these charges should be investigated to determine whether true or false. Four resolutions called for restoration of states rights legislation regarding subversion, sedition, and communist control statutes. These resolutions specifically set forth that states rights were being usurped by Supreme Court. All foregoing resolutions mentioned were coordinated and passed successfully on floor of convention.

NEW NATIONAL COMMANDER:

As Director had been previously advised, W. C. "Dan" Daniels was selected as the 1956-1957 National Commander. Daniels paid courtesy call upon Director in May, 1956. He is 42 years of age, makes good appearance, is excellent speaker, and very security-minded. Cooperation with Daniels should be excellent. A call was made on him during convention, at which time the Director's congratulations were expressed. A letter has been prepared also extending congratulations.

MISCELLANEOUS:

(1) Our book, "The FBI Story," is to be placed on the "must reading list" for all Legionnaires. This is a list maintained by national headquarters of the Legion and concerns all top-notch books recommended for reading by Legion members.

(2) Two thousand (2,000) copies of Director's article, "The Communist New Look - A Study in Duplicity," were disseminated by Legion staff members to delegates attending convention. Many favorable remarks were overheard regarding this article.

(3) FBI received a great deal of acclaim during convention as result of Weinberger and Riesel cases.

(4) Gordon W. Roselip, national executive committeeman from the State of Wisconsin, spoke extemporaneously before the Americanism Commission for approximately 15 minutes lauding the FBI and its work in the internal security field. He called upon the Legionnaires to offer constant support to the Bureau. Roselip has been very friendly for the past several years. DeLoach rose and thanked him for his commendatory remarks and included the fact that all members of the Americanism Commission had been of service to the FBI. Roselip's remarks were strictly voluntary and it is being recommended that the attached letter be forwarded to him thanking him for his remarks.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

(1) A letter has already been forwarded to the new National Commander, "Dan" Daniels; consequently, no recommendation is being made concerning a letter to him in this memorandum.

(2) There is attached a suggested letter from the Director to outgoing National Commander J. Addington Wagner who was most cooperative during his term of office and who it is felt will continue to be a good friend in the future.

(3) There is attached a suggested letter to Gordon W. Roselip, national executive committeeman from Wisconsin, in accordance with the foregoing information.

(4) There is attached a suggested letter to William Hauck, Assistant National Adjutant of the American Legion, who made many commendatory remarks about the FBI during the convention and who introduced Messrs. Hanning and DeLoach to numerous influential members of the Legion.

(5) SAC John F. Malone was most helpful during the convention and spent numerous hours of overtime in meeting Legionnaires. He made a most favorable showing for the Bureau at the national commanders banquet. There is attached a suggested letter to Malone.

[redacted] escaped from a Georgia Prison Camp where he was serving a two year concurrent sentence for ITSMV in conjunction with a five year State sentence for forgery. Subject had previously escaped from confinement. He was known to be armed and had made statements he would not be taken alive. He was considered extremely dangerous.

Information was received that the subject was residing at [redacted], Los Angeles. There is no such address and survey disclosed the area is semi-industrial. A survey of the area disclosed no one by the name of [redacted] resided in the area; however, one [redacted] residing in a large apartment house was described as closely resembling the subject. It was also ascertained he had recently arrived in Los Angeles with his wife and two small children. Subject [redacted] was believed to be with his wife and two small children and further discreet investigation resulted in a positive identification of [redacted] as the subject.

As soon as this information was determined, Supervisor [redacted] and other agents proceeded to the scene. SA's [redacted] and [redacted] were the investigating agents. On the basis of their survey and plans, the subject was apprehended after he left his apartment and at a time when he was alone and away from his wife and two children. At the time of his apprehension, he advised he was taken by surprise by arresting officers. He stated that had he been armed, he would have "shot it out" and he would rather be killed than taken alive.

I was also at the apprehension scene and personally checked the results of the surveys and plans and personally observed the manner in which Supervisor [redacted] functioned.

I have carefully considered the facts you have submitted in explanation of your handling of the investigation of the reported kidnaping of [redacted] and the conclusion is inescapable that this situation was handled very badly by you. It is apparent that a more aggressive domination of the investigation on your part was called for in view of its nature and obvious importance. In this respect you failed to adequately carry out the Bureau's responsibilities and protect its best interests.

In addition, you were most derelict in failing to keep the Bureau promptly and currently advised of all pertinent developments as they occurred. Your explanation for this failure most certainly is not adequate.

The way in which you functioned in this investigation was most disappointing. I shall certainly expect a much higher calibre performance from you in any future investigative matters of such importance.

The above-captioned meeting was called to order at 10:00 A.M. by President ELMER JANSEN, Chief of Police at San Diego. There were approximately two hundred law enforcement officers from California in attendance. SAC's HARVEY FOSTER, HARRY MAYNER, and JOHN F. MALONE were present. The meeting started with a general assembly, after which it would be broken up into smaller groups representing the various committees.

Attorney General EDMUND "PAT" BROWN referred to the "clearing house" for the movement of criminals in the California area that was set up by Chief of Police FRANCIS J. AHERN, San Francisco, in conjunction with Chief of Police WILLIAM H. PARKER, Los Angeles, and Captain [redacted] head of PARKER's Intelligence Unit.

BROWN stated that, as a result of this program, the Criminal Identification and Investigations office is being flooded with requests for records. He stated that these requests will be handled eventually, but there will be a delay because of shortage of personnel.

BROWN then advised the group that during 1957 he will attempt to bring the California laws of Searches and Seizures up to date. The attempt is the first made along these lines since 1872, according to BROWN. He stated that the proposed legislation will set forth the conditions under which officers may safely make searches and seizures.

Chief of Police WILLIAM H. PARKER then asked for the floor. He had a long-distance call awaiting him. He had in his hand a pamphlet containing the address delivered by CARROL W. SHANKS, President of the Prudential Insurance Company of America, to the graduates of the 58th Session of the FBI National Academy. PARKER was most complimentary of the address and recommended that all law enforcement officers make it a point to read it.

PARKER concluded by stating that he was attempting to obtain pay raises for the members of the Los Angeles Police Department. He then left to answer his telephone call. However, before the general assembly had broken up into smaller groups, PARKER had completed the telephone call and was back in the assembly, calling for additional time before the microphone.

PARKER stated that he had just received a telephone call from one ED SCHEIDT from the East Coast. He stated that, according to SCHEIDT, the Sellers Committee was reviewing additional Civil Rights legislation which, if passed, would place additional burden on law enforcement officers in regard to Civil Rights. He stated that, as far as he understood the proposed legislation, it called for a revision of section 241 of Title 18, making it possible to violate this section of the Statute without a conspiracy angle being present.

PARKER then stated that the Peace Officers Association of California should go on record as opposing such Civil Rights legislation. He then went into a tirade about the "MICKEY COHEN case" in Los Angeles. He stated that his comments in regard to the MICKEY COHEN case were not intended in any way to reflect upon the FBI. He stated that he realized that the FBI had a job to do.

PARKER then went into the details of the COHEN case, pointing out that COHEN first went to the United States Attorney and stated that his civil rights had been violated by Officer WOOPERS of the Intelligence Division of the Los Angeles Police Department. According to PARKER, COHEN was advised by the United States Attorney to take his complaint to the FBI. The FBI took COHEN's complaint and referred the matter to the Department of Justice. The Department of Justice instructed that an investigation should be made concerning COHEN's allegation. PARKER pointed out that he was appropriately advised by the Special Agent in Charge of the Los Angeles Office of the FBI that such investigation was under way.

PARKER further pointed out that, when the Agents of the FBI contacted Captain [redacted] of the Intelligence Squad, they were presented with two points which had to be clarified before Captain [redacted] would cooperate with the Agents in regard to the instant investigation. These two points he stated were:

1. Whether the United States Attorney would prosecute COHEN if it were found during the course of the investigation that he gave false information to the FBI as a basis of his allegation to the effect that his civil rights were violated.
2. Whether or not there was a Federal statute that would cover such prosecution if COHEN gave false testimony.

PARKER indicated that the matter had been referred to the Department of Justice at Washington and no answer had been received as yet.

PARKER then made a statement to the effect that the Civil Rights program of the Democrats or Republicans, as administered by Attorney General HERBERT BROWNELL, would put the Police out of business. PARKER stated that he is opposed to the establishment of a Federal Commission to investigate alleged Civil Rights violations by local law enforcement agencies. He added that such a commission has been proposed by Attorney General BROWNELL.

PARKER stated that the extreme Civil Rights program is developing rifts between law enforcement agencies, which is what the Communist Party wants. Then PARKER again referred to SHANKS' address to the National Academy and quoted the following paragraph:

"Then there is another factor which you know about: The laws that handicap law enforcement agencies everywhere in apprehending criminals. It is commendable that we in this country have a tradition for protecting civil rights. It is the very essence of the freedom we enjoy. It is unfortunate, however, that nearly every additional legal protection which goes on State or Federal law books may or may not help protect the innocent, but is likely to provide a loophole which can be misused by criminals. You are already experiencing many crippling regulations. In the coming era in which civil rights are likely to receive a great play for political advantage, you can certainly expect more."

PARKER indicated that the statement of SHANKS summed up his feelings completely in regard to the Civil Rights program. He then made a motion that the Peace Officers Association should refer the Sellers Committee to the comments of Mr. SHANKS before acting upon the legislation which will be considered by them on Tuesday, February 5. He added that he thought the Peace Officers Association should oppose any changes which would adversely affect law enforcement in the field of Civil Rights.

Before PARKER's motion could be carried, Attorney General PAT BROWN and SAC HARVEY FOSTER asked for the floor. The floor was given to PAT BROWN, who stated the Peace Officers Association should not go on record as being for or against any legislation, especially on a national level, such as Civil Rights, especially without having the full facts concerning the proposed changes in legislation.

The floor was then given to SAC FOSTER, who identified himself and stated that he had intended to make the same observation which was already made by Attorney General BROWN.

PARKER stated that his motion was made solely for the purpose of commending SHANKS on his address, particularly the paragraph quoted above that referred to Civil Rights.

PARKER's motion was then carried. President JANSEN stated that the matter would be referred to the Executive Committee, where the motion would be properly phrased.

After the general session had ended and the members were proceeding to the respective committee meetings, Chief PARKER came over to SAC MALONE and stated that he wanted it fully understood that he was not quarreling with the FBI.

I advised PARKER that I was beginning to doubt the sincerity of this statement, which I had heard him make many times before, keeping in mind that the FBI is a part of the Department of Justice. It was pointed out to PARKER that his comments constitute an apology for the FBI investigating Civil Rights cases, and this is not at all necessary, especially in view of the fact that the FBI has no apologies to offer for any investigations made.

PARKER became belligerent and stated that he was not apologizing for the FBI. PARKER then commented that all it broke loose back in the Department of Justice when his comments

In regard to the MICKEY COHEN case had been received. PARKER would not disclose the source of his information but indicated that he had been on the telephone with someone in the Department of Justice. He stated that it was the feeling of the Department in Washington that United States Attorney LAUGHLIN E. WATERS should have made a decision on a local level in regard to the questions raised by Captain HAMILTON.

I had no comment to offer to PARKER, but he gave the definite impression that he had been in contact with someone in the Department of Justice with whom he had discussed the COHEN situation.

PARKER then discussed the rise of crime throughout the country and indicated that in his opinion it was due to the Civil Rights investigations authorized by the Department of Justice.

I asked PARKER if he were stating in effect that the only way crime can be reduced is to eliminate the laws pertaining to Civil Rights and allow law enforcement officers to use brutality at will. He stated that this was not his intention at all.

SAs HARVEY FOSTER and HARRY MAYNER attended the Executive Committee meeting. At this meeting the President was directed by the Executive Committee to send an appropriate message to the Chairman of the Judiciary Committee at Washington, D.C., calling his attention to CARROL SHANKS' remarks concerning Civil Rights, as contained in his address to the 58th Session of the National ^{Association} Committee at Washington, D.C. on November 16, 1956. The Executive Committee also asked that Director J. EDGAR HOOVER be requested to address the convention of the Peace Officers Association to be held at San Francisco on March 26, 27, and 28, 1957. The committee indicated that, realizing full well how difficult it is for Mr. HOOVER to come all the way from Washington to give such an address, he might consider the possibility of sending a representative.

SAC JOHN F. MALONE attended the meeting of the Training Committee. The main topic of discussion was the Peace Officers Institute which is to be held at Los Angeles on March 5, 6, and 7, 1957. The program, as previously submitted, was confirmed with a few minor changes.

In regard to the proposed "Survey of Police Training in the State of California," O. A. WILSON, Dean of the School of Criminology and Professor of Police Administration, University of California at Berkeley, stated that he has not been successful

in obtaining funds for the purpose of financing the survey. He stated that he had been turned down by the Carnegie Corporation of New York, the Haynes Company, and the Rockefeller Foundation. He added, however, that the reply he received from the William Volkner Fund was not a flat refusal and he suggested that the President of the organization, together with JOHN HOLSTROG, Chief of Police of Berkeley, California, contact a [redacted] at Burlingame, California, for the purpose of discussing the matter further.

The matter of JOHN JENSEN's resignation was then discussed. It will be recalled that JOHN PEPER has submitted his resignation as a member of the Training and Education Committee to President JANSEN.

Upon motion of JACK BENNETT, Chief of Police at Riverside, California, it was felt that Chairman SOUTH should suggest to President JANSEN that the resignation of PEPER not be accepted until after the General Committee Meeting scheduled for February 1 at Fresno, especially in view of the fact that PEPER's reasons for resigning appeared to be ambiguous.

Chairman SOUTH pointed out that President JANSEN had contacted JOHN PEPER and asked him to appear before the Training and Education Committee on this date to explain his resignation. PEPER refused to do so, stating that his letter was final and that his reasons as given, namely, the press of other work and the fact that he did not feel that he should be on a committee acting in the capacity of advisor to the State Department of Education, should suffice.

O. W. NILSON stated that he felt there was more behind PEPER's resignation than this and, in view of the fact that PEPER was present at the General Session, he should be required to come before this committee and explain the true reasons for his resignation.

BILL SOUTH said he was absolutely opposed to such action and he could see no reason why the Training and Education Committee should insist on PEPER doing something he did not desire to do.

PEPER indicated in his letter of resignation that he would like to have a committee separate from the Training and Education Committee set up to act as advisor to the State Department of Education, and especially to his (PEPER's) program.

The Training and Education Committee passed a resolution indicating that the present committee was entirely capable of acting in an advisory capacity to PEPER or the State Department of Education and that no additional committees were necessary.

Chairman SOUTH asked that the FBI prepare statistics concerning the number of FBI schools conducted in the State of California during the calendar year 1955-56 in order that same may be presented at the convention to be held in San Francisco on the dates specified above. Chairman SOUTH was advised that the statistics were already compiled and that I have the information available as follows:

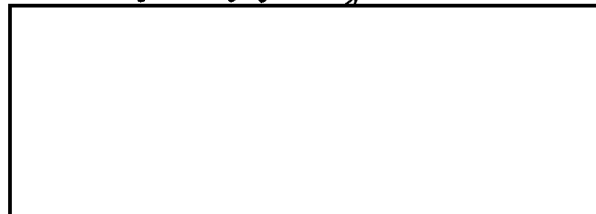
Dear Mr. Hoover:

Resident Agents in your office should make irregular checks to insure that Bureau cars in contract garages are periodically accounted for. You should insure this is being done during inspection of these resident agencies.

I was pleased to learn that stenographic and clerical operations were in a current condition. The Inspector eliminated the unnecessary preparation of index cards concerning correlation memoranda. You should insure that administrative functions are under constant scrutiny to eliminate any similar time-consuming operations deemed inadvisable.

The 11 substantive errors found in files reviewed reflected a need for more thorough file reviews by the supervisory staff and the need for more detailed attention on the part of the individual agents. Although the delinquency of pending work has been maintained at a low level, instances were found wherein reporting had been delayed. Files must receive closer attention not only to eliminate errors of substance but to materially reduce the number of form errors found during the course of the inspection.

Such form errors were found in 120 or 8.56 per cent of the 1,402 files reviewed. Responsibility for these errors was divided: 36 per cent clerical and 64 per cent agents.

The informant and investigative coverage of your office in the security field generally continues to be very good. You should persist in pursuing this vital phase of our operations with imagination and enthusiasm to insure that our responsibilities will be successfully discharged.

It is gratifying to note the excellent coverage achieved, as well as the increased accomplishments of criminal informants in your division. There is a need for improvement in criminal informant coverage regarding bank robbery matters in ten of the areas covered by your office. This matter should receive immediate attention in view of the high incidence of bank robbery in your division.

Statistical accomplishments are, of course, a basic factor in determining the effectiveness of your operations and I recognize that your office has improved in three out of four categories; however, I am concerned with the recent decline in the case load in your office and the resulting effect a continuing downward trend may have upon your accomplishments. This matter should be closely followed.

I noted with interest that economy in operations had been accomplished regarding communications and travel costs. It is further encouraging to note that agent time in the office had been materially reduced to a point well below the 15 per cent standard set by the Bureau.

It should not have been necessary for the Inspector to point out that the number of agents assigned to Los Angeles could be reduced by eight. Two agents resigned during the course of the inspection and they will not be replaced. Six agents will be transferred. The matter of personnel needs must receive your constant, critical attention. When the case load drops, consideration should be given promptly to the matter of excess personnel assigned to your office. The same principle applies to the matter of clerical needs. In view of the decrease in the case load and the decrease in the number of your agents, before any existing clerical vacancies are filled full justification must be furnished to the Bureau.

I was pleased to note that all personnel passed the examinations and that stenographic production was above average. The Inspector reported that stenographic operations were considered to be excellent. The increase in cases closed per agent per month is heartening and I am pleased to see that personnel in your office have shared in the Incentive Awards Program. Morale of employees was considered very good.

The results of the inspection have been brought to the attention of your office by the Inspector. As soon as the delinquencies noted have been corrected, you should advise the Bureau.

On 11/21/56 [redacted] escaped California State Prison, Folsom, California where he was serving several sentences for Armed Robbery. UFAP process was obtained and he was apprehended in Kansas City, Missouri, on 1/3/57 after committing several armed robberies, stealing three automobiles and allegedly killing a special policeman in Jefferson County, Colorado.

On 2/11/57 [redacted] again escaped custody, this time from a Los Angeles County Superior Court where he was being tried on the robberies committed following his previous escape.

On 2/19/57, federal process was again filed on [redacted] this time under the Federal Firearms Act, since during his prior escape [redacted] had stolen a .45 caliber automatic and a 12 gauge shotgun and transported them interstate. In view of his past record, his statement that he would not be taken alive and the fact that he was known to be armed, he was considered extremely dangerous.

On February 21st, at approximately 10:00 p.m., an ex-convict acquaintance of [redacted] advised the Los Angeles Office that [redacted] accompanied by one [redacted] a man named "[redacted]", both ex-cons, and [redacted]'s wife, appeared at his home and requested his assistance in obtaining a .45 caliber automatic. Informant advised he told [redacted] he would attempt to obtain such a weapon and would contact him through [redacted] the next day.

SA [] and SA [] were immediately dispatched and contacted informant at his place of employment and made arrangements to get him off the job so he could be brought to the Los Angeles Office for further interview. By 4 a.m., a stake-out was established at the informant's residence in the event [] should re-appear and at [] residence since [] was in [] company and possibly either knew where to contact [] would be contacted by [] or might be hiding [] in his home.

At about 7:10 a.m., the time informant would ordinarily get off work, informant was instructed to call [] residence and through conversation attempt to discreetly determine if [] and [] were in [] home, or if [] was in contact with them. During this call with informant, [] seemed to be nervous and at times consulted with another male individual in the background. It was, therefore, believed that [] was probably in [] home and plans were made to effect his apprehension.

At approximately 8:30 a.m., [] was observed driving away from the house alone. He was stopped by SAC MALONE and surveilling agents and, upon interview, admitted that [] was in his house. It was then decided to make a call into [] home and advise [] that the house was surrounded and instruct him to come out of the front door with his hands up. [] agreed to come out, but after hanging up the phone apparently decided to try and make a run for it as he appeared at the back door and looked toward his car which was standing in the driveway with the motor running. The house was completely surrounded, however, by Agents and LASO Deputies under the direction of ASAC BACHMAN. [] upon seeing all avenues of escape blocked, went back into the house and returned to the front door where he surrendered to SAC MALONE and LAPD Detective []

Reference is made to your letter dated 1-5-52 regarding the General Investigative Intelligence File wherein it was set forth on page 210 that former Deputy Sheriff [redacted] Merced County Sheriff's Office, advised Agents prior to the time he resigned that they should be extremely cautious in the information furnished to Undersheriff John Latorraca, in view of the fact that he was alleged to be close to C. Ray Robinson, who was alleged to be controlling vice in the Merced area.

Your attention is also called to your letter of 4-15-49 regarding the Los Angeles Crime Survey wherein it was stated that Los Angeles [redacted] advised that the only reason Undersheriff John Latorraca did not accept payoffs was that he realized that it would mean his job as sheriff in that Lucius Cornell would immediately fire him, and that Sheriff Cornell had advised that Latorraca was a distant relative of [redacted] a known gambler.

In the Crime Survey for the Los Angeles Division enclosed with your letter of 7-13-50 on page 113 it was pointed out that an informant had stated that Undersheriff John Latorraca was a very close friend and associate of [redacted] and that Latorraca furnished considerable information to [redacted]. It was also pointed out that Sheriff Cornell had indicated extreme concern over the relationship between Latorraca and [redacted] although the sheriff did not believe that Latorraca would deliberately sabotage the efforts of the sheriff's office or any other law enforcement agency, but due to his friendship with [redacted] Latorraca inadvertently released confidential information which proved damaging to law enforcement efforts. According to this report, informants also advised that the reason Cornell retained Latorraca as undersheriff was that Latorraca comes from the West side of Merced County and was capable of drawing a great many votes for the sheriff from that area.

It was also pointed out that the character of these individuals was definitely questionable in view of the fact that the Board of Supervisors had received information involving these men with girls of ill repute.

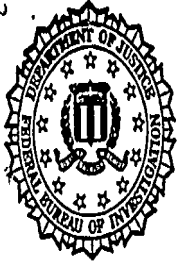

Payment will be made for death by self-destruction after the Agent has been a member of the fund for a continuous period of two years. It is understood and agreed that the sum tendered herewith is a voluntary, gratuitous contribution to said fund which I understand is to be administered in the following manner.

The Director of the FBI will appoint a committee which shall consider all matters pertaining to the acquisition, safe keeping and expending of said fund, which committee will recommend appropriate action to the Director in pertinent matters. The Assistant Director of the Administrative Division of the FBI shall receive all contributions and account for same to the Director. Upon the death of any Special Agent who is a member of said fund the appointed committee will consider the case and submit a recommendation to the Director as to its conclusions. Appropriate instructions will then be issued to the Assistant Director of the Administrative Division, directing him to pay to the designated beneficiary the sum of \$10,000. The liability of the fund shall not under any circumstances exceed the amount of monies in the fund at the time any liability shall occur. The purpose of this memorandum is to recommend a letter of censure for SAC John F. Malone, Los Angeles Division, for the manner in which he handled captioned matter. *b-1*

Los Angeles radiogram June 11, 1957, set forth information received by telephone from [redacted] alleged that Justice Black had been in Los Angeles approximately June 1, 1957, and was "rolled" for \$2,800 in cash and a diamond ring valued at approximately \$9,000. Los Angeles radiogram June 11, 1957, concluded with the statement that no investigation is being conducted and the Bureau will be furnished further information when received.

On receipt of the radiogram in the Investigative Division it was necessary to telephone SAC Malone and instruct him to immediately take steps to determine the background of [redacted] interview him, get a signed statement, and pin him down because the story furnished by [redacted] appeared improbable. It was pointed out to Malone that he must check the story fully to determine if any violation in the Bureau's jurisdiction was present.

Los Angeles radiograms June 11 and 12, 1957, advised that [redacted] was unreliable and had an arrest record for drunkenness. Further, that [redacted] furnished a signed statement admitting all information concerning Justice Black was false, but alleged the information applied to "a Federal judge from Miami Beach" whom [redacted] refused to identify. Los Angeles radiogram stated that due to the numerous false statements of [redacted] no further investigation was being conducted.

It was necessary on June 12, 1957, to send a teletype to Los Angeles instructing that they pin Davis down as to the Federal judge in Miami and consider possible prosecution for furnishing false information to the FBI. *87*

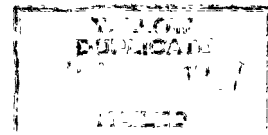

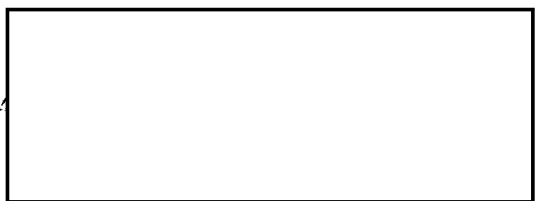

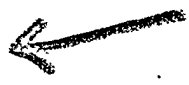

In what is described as a "routine administrative transfer," Malone will depart for Washington and his new duties Sept. 5. He will be succeeded by D. K. Brown, chief of the FBI in Baltimore and a veteran of some 20 years with the law enforcement organization.

Malone, who came here from Chicago, joined the FBI in 1942 and served in Buffalo, Cleveland, San Diego and Louisville. He gained nationwide fame here when, while searching a house for a bank robber he opened a closet and came face-to-face with the gun-wielding holdup man. Only a quick shot by another agent saved Malone from being killed.

During his tenure here he successfully guided the search for L. Ewing Scott, who was finally captured in Canada, and led his agents in finding holdupman Albert Kostal. Under Malone, the local FBI force has racked up an impressive total of solved cases and a near-perfect mark in the apprehension of bank robbers.

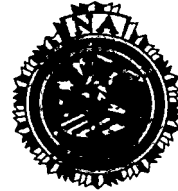

ADDENDUM OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE DIVISION CRD:jcl/ 9/26/57

The outstanding work of employees of the Los Angeles Office in the development of anonymous sources in security-type cases, certainly appears to be due to the extraordinary efforts of the employees assigned to this type of work. SAC, Los Angeles, has pointed out that SA Donovan has been the coordinator and SA Frei the outside leader in connection with these contacts. In addition, he pointed out the identity of the agents who have participated in a number of contacts and operated on surveillance teams as well as the part played by SE [] who handled vital photographic aspects of the contact at the scene. In all he mentioned that the special group to which these agents are assigned have made 131 contacts with anonymous sources during the past 20 months and have procured valuable information not otherwise obtainable.

In view of the active and prominent part played by these agents in these dangerous yet successful operations, it is felt that they should be recognized with incentive awards; however, it appears that the success realized is a result of a team operation. Awards in equal amounts would appear to be more appropriate since the employees recommended for the greater amounts are in higher grades and are expected to assume greater responsibilities. According to the approved table utilized in determining the amount of awards to be given in cases of this nature, it is felt that the performances of these men have been of moderate value and broad application thus entitling them to awards of between \$150 and \$300.

BUREAU RECORDS OF EMPLOYEES RECOMMENDED FOR INCENTIVE AWARDS:

SA Donovan entered on duty 11/17/47, GS 13, \$8990. During last three years he has been commended on one occasion by the Director and once through his SAC. Received \$225 cash award on 5/26/55 in recognition of outstanding work done in development of confidential sources. On 9/6/55 he was censured and placed on probation for failure to disseminate information procured from a confidential source. Removed from probation 12/19/55. Received rating of Excellent on 1957 annual performance rating.

SA Frei entered on duty 6/30/41 as clerk and 7/6/42 as SA. GS 13, \$9850. During last three years, has been commended once through SAC. Rated Excellent on 1957 annual performance rating.

SA Barry entered on duty 3/26/51, GS 12, \$7570. Has been commended once by the Director and once through his SAC. No censures. 1957 annual performance rating was Excellent.

SA [] entered on duty 1/15/51, GS 12, \$7570. Commended twice by the Director and twice through his SAC. On 9/13/55 was censured and placed on probation for inadequate handling of information received from two confidential sources. Removed from probation on 12/21/55. 1957 annual performance rating was Excellent.

SA [] entered on duty 3/29/54, GS 11, \$6390. Has been commended on two occasions by the Director and once through his SAC. Censured once. 1957 annual performance rating was Excellent.

SE [] entered on duty 10/15/47 as clerk and 6/10/51 as Special Employee. GS 10, \$6050. Over-all record quite satisfactory. Has been commended twice by the Director and once through his SAC. 1957 annual performance rating was Excellent. Considered outstanding in use of photographic and sound equipment and has functioned in a calm, cool fashion and has used sound judgment.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. That cash awards in the amount of \$150 each be approved for all agents and the Special Employee recommended for such awards since their performances were all a part of a team operation which culminated in outstanding results. (The awards in this instance are consistent with awards approved for similar performances in the past.)

DETAILS:

Attached memoranda from SAC, Los Angeles, recommend incentive awards for five Agents and one Special Employee and letter of commendation for one Agent in connection with investigation of Communist Party, USA (CPUSA). Personnel involved assigned to special squad devoted to penetration of SCDCP through development of anonymous sources. During past 20 months, group made 131 contacts which resulted in obtaining 24,666 photographs. Detailed and highly valuable information not otherwise obtainable secured concerning membership, finances, organization and programs of SCDCP. Contacts were highly delicate, extremely dangerous to personnel involved, called for teamwork, judgment and planning in highest degree.

There follows the identities of personnel involved, the SAC's recommendations and summary of their participation in development of anonymous sources.

SA Timothy L. Donovan (\$500)

Coordinator of group; responsible for security, planning and analysis of various programs in operation. Periodically, acts as on-the-scene leader, displays outstanding judgment in over-all planning, participated in contacts with anonymous sources ten occasions from 12-14-56 through 7-11-57. Contacts delicate in nature, physically dangerous and produced excellent information concerning membership, finances and general organization SCDCP. Assigned group since 8-51.

SA Allen F. Frei (\$500)

Acts as on-the-scene leader on day-to-day basis. Possesses outstanding knowledge of locks, photography and mechanical devices. Coordinates activity of contact team, responsible for selection of proper equipment and largely responsible for outstanding success of these operations. Acted as contact man with anonymous sources on 21 occasions during period 1-11-56 through 4-5-57. When not on actual contact, operates as outside leader in guard car and directs the surveillance team. Information developed during his contacts concerns finances, membership and organization of SCDCP. Assigned to group since 8-51.

SA Robert J. Barry (\$250)

Member of team contacting anonymous sources on five occasions 9-11-56 through 3-21-57. Assigned to group since 7-55. Handled preparatory work in developing [redacted] and made original contact. Source furnished breakdown of four sections of 24th C. D. Division, Los Angeles County Communist Party (LACCP) including analysis of membership, national minority groups and mass organizations of affiliated members. When not assigned on contact team, operates on surveillance team averaging five surveillances per week. Surveillances are delicate, discreet operations and largely responsible for success of contacts.

SA [redacted] (\$250)

Member of team contacting anonymous sources on five occasions 12-6-56 through 8-5-57. On group since 8-55. Handled preparatory work and original contact with [redacted]. This source outstanding in furnishing complete information concerning transfers of CP members within Los Angeles County and to other areas. Is member of surveillance team when not making actual contacts.

SA [redacted] (\$250)

Member of team contacting anonymous sources on five occasions from 12-5-56 through 9-3-57. On group since 9-55. Operates as assistant to SA Donovan in analysis, dissemination and general administration of squad and as inside coordinator in Donovan's absence. Determines reliability and identities of neighbors and family members associated with sources.

SE [redacted] (\$250)

Assigned to group since 2-56, primarily for photographic and fixed surveillance work. Developed two photorecords used exclusively in highly confidential assignments. Use of equipment developed by [redacted] has provided additional security in contacting confidential sources in that it has appearance of a normal door-to-door salesman-type luggage and does not normally require reloading at scene of contact. It allows a larger field to be photographed and is extremely simple in its operation. Through ingenuity and knowledge of cameras, [redacted] on two occasions during the past 20 months repaired camera equipment in immediate area of contact without which valuable information would not have been acquired.

SAC emphasizes that operation is that of a team and each phase must be handled with proper planning and ingenuity.

The following is a brief and concise summary of Mr. Malone's personnel file for the Director's use.

Mr. Malone was ordered under transfer to the Training and Inspection Division as #1 Man on 8-16-57. By letter dated 8-19-57 he expressed appreciation for this transfer to Washington, D. C. He hoped that he would be able to carry out the assignment in the efficient manner the Director desired and that he would be able to merit the trust and confidence the Director had placed in him. Mr. Malone reported to the Seat of Government on 9-30-57. He served as a Special Agent in Charge since 2-28-51 and was the head of the Los Angeles Office since 3-29-53.

During the year 1957, Mr. Malone has received two letters of CENSURE. On 1-8-57 he was censured for the manner in which he handled the investigation of the reported kidnaping of [redacted]. On 6-14-57 he was censured in connection with the information received from [redacted] and furnished to the Bureau by his radiogram of 6-11-57. He should have recognized the necessity of securing all pertinent facts and personally directed the supervision of the case until it was brought to a logical conclusion. On 5-9-57 his attention was directed to his failure to furnish the Bureau all pertinent data in the files of the Los Angeles Office relating to John Latorraca, Undersheriff, Merced County Sheriff's Office, Merced, California, who had requested a photograph of the Director. He was instructed to exercise greater caution in such matters in the future. He received letters of COMMENDATION on 2-8-57, 3-8-57, and 4-29-57. On 7-25-57 and 9-3-57 the Director expressed APPRECIATION for arrangements made by him in connection with the Director's recent visit to California, and on 5-14-57 APPRECIATION was expressed to him for the glowing accounts which Judge James R. Duncan had brought back to Washington on the manner in which he dealt with a "political scalawag" who was rather uncomplimentary in observations pertaining to the Bureau and particularly to the Director's administration of it.

His daily average overtime for March, 1957, was 3 hours 54 minutes; April, 4 hours 2 minutes; May, 4 hours 11 minutes; June, 4 hours 3 minutes; July, 5 hours 6 minutes; and August, 4 hours 35 minutes.

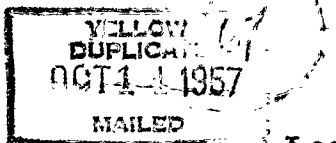



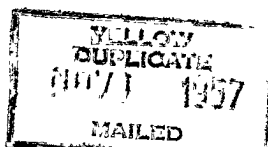

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TOLSON

Yesterday Inspector John F. Malone, of the Training and Inspection Division, asked to see me, stating that he had been in the Training Division for a period of approximately four months and was about ready to leave to be in charge of the inspection of the New York Field Division and wanted to see me to see whether I had any observations to make on the inspection work.

I told Mr. Malone that very frankly I had little confidence in the inspection work of the Training and Inspection Division. I stated that this was a deplorable situation but I could only reach my conclusions from specific instances which clearly indicate that the inspection work of the Bureau is being carried on in an entirely superficial and nonproductive manner.

I told him that the instance in which I had asked for a check to be made of certain conditions in the Identification Division, as a result of a petition that had been circulated by employees in that division, was proof positive that I could not depend upon the Training and Inspection Division to properly handle such an assignment. I pointed out that Assistant Director Tamm and Inspector Shanklin had forwarded to me a report practically whitewashing the entire situation in the Identification Division and had not interviewed nor checked many of the very vital items that even a cursory inquiry should have covered. I stated it was necessary for me then to call upon the Administrative Division of the Bureau and assign Inspector Edwards, of that division, to make a recheck of these complaints which I had received and that his report was diametrically opposed to the report submitted by Messrs. Tamm and Shanklin. I stated that the Training and Inspection Division was one of the most vital divisions of the Bureau and was practically the eyes and ears of the Director, and when I could not depend upon that division to make a thorough and complete report upon a matter into which it was ordered to make inquiry, the Bureau's operations were in a very sorry state.

Edwards to make the over-all inspection of the Identification Division because I just could not depend upon getting a true picture of what the operations of that division were.

I stated that my conclusions concerning the Training and Inspection Division were not limited to the Identification Division incident but were also predicated on the conditions which have come to the surface in the field.

I cited the fact that when the New York Office was last inspected, there was not discovered through the inspection the routine manner in which the security patrol performed its duties, namely, making its check at the same specific time each day and night. I stated that as a result of this there had been two showings of obscene film by employees of that office who, to use the vernacular, had "cased" the operations of the security patrol and felt secure in the showing of these pictures between the times of the patrol check.

I likewise called attention to the recent situation which had developed in the Kansas City Field Division wherein two Resident Agents, at different Resident Agencies and both of whom had been selected by the present Special Agent in Charge at Kansas City, had been reported both by the Special Agent in Charge and the Inspectors as being entirely satisfactory and capable of their duties, whereas within the last thirty days the Special Agent in Charge reported that both were unsatisfactory in many vital elements. I said it was inconceivable to me that two men could degenerate so completely in thirty days and that in my estimation the truth of the matter was that by reason of the pressure from headquarters the Special Agent in Charge was giving more attention to the Resident Agents than he had in the past and had then discovered these shortcomings. I stated that these shortcomings, however, had not been noted in any past inspections.

I then cited the two incidents which have arisen recently at Jackson, Mississippi, and at Cheyenne, Wyoming, wherein the United States Attorneys at each of these places had written letters to the Department complaining about the failure of the FBI in handling its work. I stated that in these two instances neither the Resident Agent nor the Special Agent in Charge knew about the writing of these letters until I had received the letters from the Department and made inquiry as to the facts. I stated it had been determined that the United States Attorneys in both instances have lied but that the fact remained that in the Jackson, Mississippi situation the Resident Agents at Jackson, of whom there are five, had not been on top

of the problem for if they had, they would have established sufficient contact with the United States Attorney so that before he wrote any such letter as he had, he, the United States Attorney, would at least have mentioned something to the Resident Agents or to the Special Agent in Charge at New Orleans. I stated that as regards the Cheyenne situation, the United States Attorney, for a period of nearly two years, had discussed with the Senior Resident Agent at Cheyenne the case which was in question and that the Resident Agent had not reduced to writing or memorandum of any kind the matter, nor reported it orally to the Special Agent in Charge at Denver; that the United States Attorney has now claimed that a misunderstanding had arisen between his office and the Resident Agent at Cheyenne, in that the United States Attorney or his assistant thought he had referred it to the Resident Agent and the Resident Agent claimed that it was not referred.

I pointed out that in both these instances certainly the Inspectors, in the inspection of these two offices on the last occasion and on previous occasions, should have ascertained exactly what the situation was in the various Resident Agencies in these divisions and should have been penetrative in determining how well these Resident Agencies were functioning. I told Mr. Malone that it was my personal opinion that if a Resident Agent was really on his job, and the Special Agent in Charge as well was on his job, they would be able to tactfully maintain contacts with a United States Attorney so that he, the United States Attorney, would not dare to address such a communication to the Department until he had discussed with the local representatives of the Bureau the problem about which he was going to complain.

I also/cited to Mr. Malone the condition prevalent in the Washington Field Division wherein the Prather case had been grossly improperly supervised and wherein the robbery of the Government Services, Incorporated, truck, the murder of John Samuel Johnson, Jr., whose body was found in a parked car at the Pentagon, and the robbery of the Washington Wholesale Grocery Company had not been solved.) I stated it has appeared to me for sometime, and I have so expressed myself to the Training and Inspection Division and to the Washington Field Division, that the Washington Field Division has been suffering from extreme lethargy with lack of pressure, lack of initiative and lack of imagination. I stated it was strange that adjacent offices, such as Baltimore and Richmond, could solve major crimes when they arose in their divisions, whereas the Washington Field Division seemed to be completely impotent. I observed that there had been numerous inspections of the Washington Field Division with nothing really constructive ever

recommended to improve the condition which has existed in that field division for a long period of time. I stated that I recognized that the Training and Inspection Division had done some good work, particularly in the training field, but that the executives of this Bureau should be almost fanatical in ascertaining the weaknesses of the Bureau, rather than in basking in good accomplishments. I told Mr. Malone that the public very quickly forgets the outstanding accomplishments of the Bureau when it fails to meet a new responsibility and that likewise within the Bureau we are not judged by our good intentions nor even by the efforts we apply, but we are judged by the results obtained, and from the instances which I have cited above, and which are not the only ones, the Training and Inspection Division was certainly soft and nonproductive in major respects.

I told Mr. Malone, as regards the forthcoming New York inspection, that I likewise was not satisfied relative to the present operation of that office. I pointed out to Mr. Malone that Special Agent in Charge Powers had been there five months and has not yet moved his family from Boston to New York for the reason that he claims to have been unable to dispose of his home in Boston and until he does that, he cannot bring his family to New York. I stated that this has resulted in Mr. Powers making a number of week-end trips to Boston which causes his absence from New York from approximately noon Friday until sometime Monday morning and that this was most undesirable and was not conducive to efficient and effective administration of a field division. I told Mr. Malone that Mr. Powers has now been informed by Associate Director Tolson that no one is to approve his leaving his district except Mr. Tolson in order to curtail this commuting to Boston.

I told Mr. Malone that when Mr. Powers went in charge of New York, the office was not in satisfactory shape, and for that reason, I had removed Mr. Kelly as the Special Agent in Charge and transferred him to Baltimore. I stated this had been predicated upon a number of matters and had been culminated in the two showings of the obscene film in the New York Office which never had been known to Mr. Kelly or to any of his assistants until I made a replacement of an Assistant Special Agent in Charge and he had discovered it within a short period of time, though it had happened some months before. I told Mr. Malone I recognized that the New York Office was a very difficult office to administer in view of its size and in view of the local problems and living conditions, but that I felt that the supervisory staff of the New York Office was not close enough to the rank and file in that office and that I hoped on this forthcoming inspection he would look into this problem

and see that the inspection was conducted in a very penetrative manner so we can tighten up our administration of the New York Office. |

Mr. Malone's attitude was excellent. I think he was somewhat stunned by the statements which I made and he indicated that he certainly intended to do everything within his power to try to change my feeling concerning the work of the Training and Inspection Division. I told him I hoped he would be able to bring about a material change because I would like to have my confidence restored, but I would be less than frank if I did not state to him that as of today, whenever there was some very critical or delicate problem to be looked into within the Bureau, I did not feel like turning to the Training and Inspection Division to have it done, but selected someone from some other division of the Bureau in whom I had more confidence.





The Director has instructed that hereafter when anyone is raised to GS 16 or above the letter should indicate it is to be held only as long as he continues to perform the specific duties of the job to which he is being assigned.

I have checked and in the past we have placed such a limitation on a number of promotions which were made to grades of GS 16 and 17. The following is a tabulation of those officials who were advised at the time they received the promotion to the grade listed that it would remain in effect only for the duration of the assignment to the position they were then occupying:

It is true that we have advised the above-mentioned officials in the past that their promotion would only be effective for the duration of their assignment to a Specific position. Actually, however, in the case of a veteran this stipulation has no effect whatever. The Veterans Preference Act specifically states that a veteran cannot be reduced in grade or salary without being given advance written notice and the necessary charges being brought to justify such demotion. In other words, he cannot be reduced in grade or salary except for cause based upon some failure on his part to properly discharge his responsibilities. The fact that he is advised at the time

of his promotion that the promotion will remain in effect only during the assignment to the particular position does not vitiate the requirements of the Veterans Preference Act in this regard.

It will be noted that although the assignments of all but two of the above-listed officials (Mr. H. L. Edwards and Mr. W. G. Simon) have since changed, these reassignments were to positions of equal or greater importance than those they held at the time they were promoted to grade GS 16 or above. It is felt, therefore, that no change should be made in the grades of these officials, but in compliance with the Director's instructions we will, in the future, stipulate in each instance where anyone is raised to grade GS 16 or above that the grade is to be held only as long as the individual continues to perform the specific duties of the job to which he is being assigned.

RECOMMENDATION:

That no change in grade be made with respect to the above-listed officials but that in future promotions to grade GS 16 or above such individuals be advised that the promotion will be effective only as long as he continues in the specific job to which he is being assigned.

ATTITUDE

The purpose of this memorandum is to report that the captioned employee reported for work on 2-18-58, notwithstanding the extremely hazardous travel conditions. In accordance with the Director's instructions this is to be made a matter of record in the employee's personnel file and considered as a COMMENDATION.

On Saturday, 2-15-58, the Washington, D. C., area was blanketed by fourteen inches of snow as a result of a storm which the Weather Bureau termed the worst that has struck this area in twenty-two years. Thereafter, high winds and near zero temperatures set in for several days making travel conditions extremely hazardous.

On Monday, 2-17-58, in recognition of the hardships and hazards that Federal Government employees would face in coming to work, a White House announcement was made encouraging such employees to stay home and take a day of annual leave. During the late afternoon of 2-17-58, a further official announcement emanated from the White House instructing that all Government employees who were not considered essential would be excused from work on 2-18-58 on Administrative Leave.

The captioned employee considered his work and his services to the FBI so essential that in spite of the foregoing announcement he took it upon himself to come to work and perform his regularly assigned duties. This is considered a highly exemplary attitude on the part of this employee and his actions in this instance certainly demonstrate his devotion to duty and the fact that he places his employment with the FBI above his personal convenience.

RECOMMENDATION:

4/ That this memorandum be placed in the employee's personnel file.

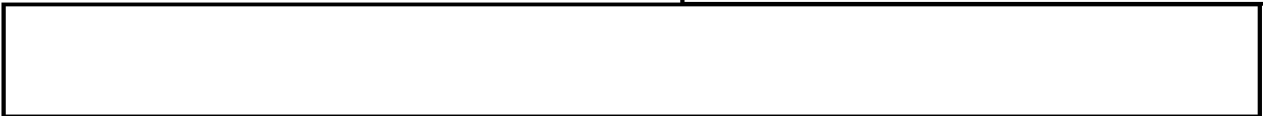

This is a brief and concise summary of Mr. Malone's record for the Director's use.

A review of his file reflects that ^{he} was transferred to the Training and Inspection Division on 9-30-57 and at which time he was designated as #1 Man. He has been commended on three occasions since his transfer to the Seat of Government, the last being on 2-19-58, for his highly exemplary attitude in reporting for work on 2-18-58 notwithstanding the extremely hazardous travel conditions resulting from a snow storm. He has received no letters of censure since reporting to the Seat of Government.

On 3-31-58 Mr. Tamm rated him EXCELLENT and added that he had an outstanding attitude toward his assignments and was outstandingly loyal and completely devoted to a Bureau career. He was completely available and suitable for further administrative advancement.

On 2-6-58 the Director saw him prior to Mr. Malone's departure to be in charge of the inspection of the New York Office. ^{whether} Mr. Malone wanted to see the Director had any observations to make on the inspection work. The Director mentioned, among other things, that he had little confidence in the inspection work of the Training and Inspection Division. The Director stated that that was a deplorable situation but that he could only reach his conclusions from specific instances which clearly indicate that the inspection work of the Bureau was being carried on in an entirely superficial and nonproductive manner. The Director mentioned the Identification Division inspection, the last New York inspection, the situation which developed in the Kansas City Office regarding two Resident Agents, at different Resident Agencies, and the two incidents which had arisen at Jackson, Mississippi and at Cheyenne, Wyoming, wherein, the U. S. Attorneys at each of those places had written letters to the Department complaining about the failure of the FBI in handling its work. Regarding the forthcoming New York inspection, the Director told Mr. Malone that he recognized that the New York Office was a very difficult office to administer in view of its size and in view of the local problems and living conditions, but the Director felt that the supervisory staff of the New York Office was not close enough to the rank and file in that office. The Director hoped that on the forthcoming inspection he would look into that problem and

See that the inspection was conducted in a very penetrative manner so we can tighten up our administration of the New York Office.

Mr. Malone indicated that he certainly intended to do everything within his power to try to change the Director's feeling concerning the work of the Training and Inspection Division.

His daily average overtime for December, 1957, 3 hours 52 minutes; January, 1958, 2 hours 42 minutes; February, 5 hours 7 minutes; March, 5 hours 12 minutes; April, 3 hours 3 minutes and May, 3 hours 35 minutes.

He lists no office of preference.

By letter dated 6-11-58 the Director thanked him for his note of 6-9-58, advising of his visit with Judge Kaufman and his plans to call on the Director around the middle of June, The Director appreciated his interest in bringing that information to the Director's attention.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TOLSON

On July 21, 1958, I saw Inspectors J. F. Malone and H. L. Edwards, who had been ordered to make inspections of certain divisions at the Seat of Government.

I told Messrs. Malone and Edwards I wanted them to approach these inspections with complete objectivity and to exercise extreme penetrativeness in conducting them. I related some of the problems which have arisen in the Investigative Division, the Domestic Intelligence Division, and the Training and Inspection Division and stated I wanted now to get the real run down on the actual functioning of the divisions at the Seat of Government similar to what a thorough physical examination would be of an individual.

Dear Mr. Hoover:

You may recall that during the past several years I have had the pleasure of having an exchange of correspondence with you. I worked for five years with other public law officers throughout the United States in the organization and building of the National Association of County and Prosecuting attorneys and had the privilege of serving as its President during the year 1955.

You may recall also that in cooperation with your very loyal and capable assistant, Mr. John Malone, I had the opportunity to improve the relationships between district attorneys and public prosecutors and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. This came about through the creation of a special "FBI Liaison Committee" in the National Association of County and Prosecuting Attorneys and the good will generated by your directing Mr. Malone to attend several national conferences of NACPA. D. K. Brown, who then was your Special Agent in charge of the Baltimore office, was also very helpful in this regard at NACPA's Baltimore Conference.

This letter relates to a subject about which you spoke publicly after the disturbing decisions of the United States Supreme Court in the Watkins, Sweezy, Yates, Schneiderman, Richmond and Jencks decisions handed down a year ago.

As County Counsel, I am the attorney of record in the two recent loyalty oath tax exemption cases (United States Supreme Court Nos. 382 and 385, October term, 1957) wherein the high court struck down the loyalty oath requirement for a tax exemption which had been strongly endorsed by the people through a Constitutional amendment adopted in 1952.

Believing that any level of government as an employer, as a condition of employment, has the right to exact an oath of loyalty from its public employees, in 1949, as attorney for Los Angeles County, I took Steiner vs. Darby (1948, Cal App 2d 481, 199 P. 2d 429, 338 U.S. 327, 70 S.Ct. 161, 94 L.Ed. 144) to the Supreme Court of the United States, which I believe was the first loyalty oath test case of its kind to reach the Supreme Court. I genuinely believed then and believe now that one who works for the people, is paid by the people, does not have the right to advocate the overthrow of government by force and violence.


As these two loyalty oath tax exemption cases originated in our County, there is wide-spread interest in California and considerable editorial comment indicating concern over the pattern that has been established.

I would like to place in your hands a copy of the "open letter" that I have written to United States Senator Allen J. Ellender of Louisiana, together with reprints of newspaper and editorial comment appearing here in Los Angeles County.

My basic concern relates to the warning which you have courageously and consistently given to the entire nation during the past 25 years that America is in a position of "clear and present danger" from the world-wide Communism movement.

I will appreciate having from you any recent material such as reports or bulletins issued by the Federal Bureau of Investigation which would be available to me on this subject.
