

GOREN BRIDGE

What action do you take?

A.—Two spades. While partner might not have spade support and we could be better off doubling two diamonds for penalties, we are swayed by the fact that the texture of our own suit is good and the opponents are not vulnerable. These two features suggest that it might be more profitable to try for game than to settle for what might be an inadequate penalty.

Q.5—Neither vulnerable, as South you hold:

♠AJ10762 ♥AKJ7 ♦A ♣83
The bidding has proceeded: North East South West Pass Pass 1 ♣ Pass 3 ♣ Pass ?

What do you bid now?

A.—There could be a slam if partner has the right cards. Blackwood won't help us—even if partner has no ace, we might have no more than one club loser. Our aim should be to cue-bid both red aces even if partner does not show first-round club control. That way, he'll know we're worried about the club suit.

Q.6—East-West vulnerable with 70 on score, as South you hold:

♠A82 ♥8752 ♦985 ♣Q96
The bidding has proceeded: North East South 1 ♣ 2 ♣ ?

What action do you take?

A.—Pass. There is no reason for you to assume the role of the great defender. Partner is aware of the score, and won't sell out if he has a sound opening bid.

Q.7—As South, vulnerable, you hold:

♠A76 ♥95 ♦Q108762 ♣95
Partner opens the bidding with two no trump. What do you respond?

A.—Three no trump. If partner has a maximum and a diamond fit, there could be a slam, but there is no safe way to investigate the possibilities.
