SUBJECT:

Ben Mandel of the House Committee on Un-American Activities called Mr. Holloman on December 9, 1950, and stated that there was an individual who had on his own free time prepared a very comprehensive index of all Senate and House hearings. This index is in typewritten form and is about 5.000 pages in length. This individual is suffering from a severe heart condition and is expected to die at almost any moment. He is willing to make this index available if we are agreeable to photostating it. Mandel wondered if we wanted this index and if so he could make it available to us if we would give him, Mandel, a photostatic copy.

Mandel went on to state that this individual had not asked any compensation for this index but that he, Mandel, thought this individual was in financial stress and would appreciate anything that could be paid to him for it.

Mr. Holloman advised Mr. Mandel that we normally did not have appropriations available for such expenditures. stated that such payment, of course, was not necessary.

While talking to Ben Mandel on other matters he informed me that 7, had this index; that he was certain if we asked he would be glad to loan us a copy to be photostated. He stated that the index was exceedingly good as it not only indexed the Congressional Record but indexed numerous Congressional hearings and the like.

BACKGROUND:

Morris furnished the following information concerni

himself before the Federal Grand Jury in New York City in the Amerasia case.

It is noted that on March 21, 1950, Senator Hickenlooper wrote the Director requesting any pertinent information on Morris who was being considered at that time for appointment as Co-Counsel to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. At that time Assistant Special Agent in Charge Whelan of the New York Office, advised the Bureau that Morris was a New York secretary of Congressman Coudert. and was formerly his secretary when Coudert was a State Senator engaged in Communist investigations. He also stated that Morris was at that time (March 1950) a member of the law firm of Hochwald, Morris and Richmond, at 40 Exchange Place, New York City. that Morris had been a Lieutenant Commander assigned to the third Naval District ONI during World War II. He characterized Morris

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

as a member of the "anti-Communist Intelligencia" of New York.

He advised that Morris is personally known to Special Agent

who considers that Morris has always been

most cooperative with the Bureau and holds the FBI in highest

been investigated by the FBI nor had he been officially
associated with the Bureau.

In a conversation with Congressman Fred E. Busbey I inquired regarding the statement attributed to him to the effect there are 65 potential "Remingtons" now in Government The Congressman stated he has a list of names which he would be glad to furnish us on a strictly personal and confidential basis. I told him we would be glad to receive the list of names. He will send them to us in the next day or two.

Busbey also told me he received a three page letter from John Stewart Service as a result of his statement to the press, and that this three-page letter in his opinion "hangs" Service. He stated he is now in the process of formulating a reply and will send us copies of Service's letter and of his reply.

He stated the other day he attended a staff conference of the Civil Service Loyalty Review Board. He is very much impressed with the attitude of former Senator Bingham and stated he was asked to say a few words to the staff. stated in the course of his remarks he told the staff that any member of the Loyalty Review Board or of the staff who opposed Senator Bingham's recent amendment had no right to remain on the Loyalty Review Board, and he has called on Senator Bingham formally to furnish a list of names of persons who have opposed his amendment. Senator Bingham will furnish Busbey with this information.

Therefore, in order to obtain information as to the progress of these programs in the Department of State, I would appreciate the answers to the following questions at your earliest opportunity:

- 1. Are you familiar with the provisions of the President's Executive Order #9835 dated March 21, 1947?
- 2. Has the Department of State set up its Loyalty Board as provided in this executive order and the rules and regulations promulgated by the Civil Service Commission Loyalty Board under the order?
- 3. What is the correct name of this board as used in the Department of State and the names of its members?
- 4. When did this Loyalty Board begin to function?
- 5. How many full field investigations by the F.B.I. of the State Department employees have been referred to your Loyalty Board?
- 6. How many of the full field investigation cases have been referred to the Loyalty Review Board?
- 7. How many of these cases have been adjudicated?
- 8. What was the average number of days per case necessary for adjudication counting from the time you received it from the F.B.I. until you reached a decision within the agency?
- 9. How many employees were found to be ineligible by your Loyalty Board under the provisions of Executive Order #9835?

- 10. How many of these employees that were found to be ineligible by your Loyalty Board have been removed?
- 11. How many of your ineligible determinations made by your Loyalty Board were appealed to the Loyalty Review Board of the Civil Service Commission?
- 12. What was the average number of days per appeal to the Loyalty Review Board counting in the time the Loyalty Review Board was advised of an appeal up to and including the time you received a decision by the Loyalty Review Board?
- 13. How many of the ineligible cases processed by your Loyalty loard were reversed by the Loyalty Review Board?
- The Has your Board taken any further action on the cases in which the Department of State Loyalty Board arrived at an ineligible rating which were reversed by the Levalty Neview Board?
- 15. Have you over had occasion to request the F.R.I. to make a further investigation of any Department of State employee who had been previously cleared either by a Loyalty Bourd or by the Loyalty Review Sound?
- 16. In how many cases of your employees did you issue an interrogatory?

Dear Mr. Snows

Thank you for your reply to my letter of inquiry of April 17, 1951.

Inassuch as you have combined your statistics on both the loyalty and security issues, it is necessary that I request clarification of the information and answers to further questions.

It was intended that the questions in my letter would be directed only to cases of applicants and employees coming within the operation of Executive Order No. 9835 and, therefore, your answers to the 5th and 6th questions require further discussion.

How many full field investigations of State Department employees by the FBI under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9835 were referred to the Loyalty Board? There are no security provisions in Executive Order No. 9835, but if the FBI made investigations on a question of loyalty and these cases were cleared by your Loyalty Board but converted into security cases, please say so, but do not confuse security investigations made by the FBI with loyalty investigations under the executive order.

This will undoubtedly call for a review of your answer to No. 6,

From your answer to questions 6 and 7 it appears that 66 cases cleared by your board are pending before the Loyalty Review Board on post audit.

Am I correct in this assumption?

Out of the 323 cases cleared by your board and referred to the Loyalty Review Board for clearance on post audit, how many were denied clearance by the Loyalty Review Board and referred back for your further consideration?

In your response to question 9 you mention one case found ineligible under Executive Order No. 9835 and also found to be a security risk. Was this employee removed, and, if so, was the removal made under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9835 or as a security risk?

Further, you mention that 11 employees left the State Department after charges were preferred but before a hearing. Were these 11 employees charged under the provisions of Executive Order No. 98357 Are they included among the 418 full field investigations reported by the FEI?

Also, you say 16 employees were found to be security risks. Are these 16 cases separate and apart from the 418 full field investigations reported by the FRI? You mention that one employee was separated by administration action on grounds of suitability. Was this case separate and apart from the 418 full field investigations? Was the separation effected under the provisions of the Lloyd-LaFollette Act (title 5, sec. 652, U.S.Code)?

Mave you any explanation of the ineligible finding of the board in but one case out of 418 full field investigations?

Reference is made to your letter of April 17, 1951, expressing an interest in the loyalty and security programs of all of the acencies of the Government and directing certain questions to me as to the progress of these programs in the Department of State. I am glad to be in a position to answer your questions. Your questions and my answers are set out below.

Le Are you familiar with the provisions of the President's Executive Order #9835 dated March 21, 19477

2. Has the Department of State set up its Loyalty Board as provided in this executive order and the rules and regulations promulgated by the Civil Service Courdseion Loyalty Found under the order?

Tes. Secretary of State Marshall established a Personnel Security Board on July 9, 1947, five months prior to the organisation of the Loyalty Review Board, Gorrad S. Snow was appointed Chairman and Maynard Barnes and Parrell St. Clairs, Mombers of this original Board. On September 17, 1947, procedures were issued governing the operation of the Board. These procedures were revised and expanded on June 8, 1948, to take into account the regulations of the Loyalty Review Board which had been issued subsequent to the Department's initial promulgation of its regulations. A further revision was made on March 11, 1949, in the process of an overall modernisation of the Department's Regulations and Procedures, Lastly the Loyalty and Feourity Regulations and Procedures were revised on April 16, 1951 (copy enclosed) to conform

the Board's operations with certain amondments by the Loyalty Review Board of its Regulations and with the requirements of Public Law 733, Slet Congress.

3. What is the correct name of this board as used in the Department of State and the names of its members?

Loyalty Security Board of the Department of State. The Board's name was changed from Personnel Security Board to Loyalty Security Board by the revision of the Roard's Regulations dated June 8, 1919. The names of the Members of the Loyalty Security Board are as follows:

to Then did this Loyalty Board begin to function?

The Personnel Security Board, now known as the Loyalty Security Board, becan to function on July 9, 1947. The first case was adjudicated by the Board on Septembor 29, 1947.

5. How many full field investigations by the Fallat. of the State Department employees have been referred to your Loyalty Board?

As of April 1, 1951, the Loyalty Security Board had received 151 full field investigations by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Of this number 118 were

received

received by the Board for adjudication both as to loyalty and security. The remaining 33 investigative reports were referred to the Board for a determination as to security only, the question of loyalty having been resolved by a Regional Loyalty Board or not being in issue.

6. How many of the full field investigation cases have been referred to the Loyalty Review Board?

As of April 1, 1951, 323 full field investigation cases had been adjudicated by the Loyalty Security Board and referred to the Loyalty Review Board. This figure is a head count only and does not include his cases which have been reconsidered and forwarded to the Loyalty Review Board. Also the figure of 323 does not include the security cases which had been adjudicated because they are not subject to a post-audit review by the Loyalty Review Board and consequently are not referred to that Board.

7. How many of these cases have been adjudicated?

As of April 1, 1951, the Levelty Review Found had postaudited (adjudicated) 257 of these cases. The figure of 257 likewise is a head count and does not include the post-audit of 5 reconsiderations.

6. What was the average number of days per case necessary for adjudication counting from the time you received it from the F.B.I. until you reached a decision within the agency?

The everage time required for the Board to reach a decision, ecoputed from the date of receipt of the case by the Board until a formal decision is reached by the Board is 55-175 days. This computation does not include the additional time that may be required for the reconsideration of a case due to the receipt of supplemental investigative reports subsequent to the

initial

initial adjudication of such case.

9. How many employees were found to be ineligible by your Loyalty Board under the provisions of Executive Order #9835?

One employee has been found incligible by the Loyalty Security heard under the provisions of Executive Order 9835. This dotermination was reached on April 19. 1951. Howavor, the Layalty Security Board has found 16 emloyees to be security risks to the Department and has reconsended their removal from employment. The figure of 15 does not include the one case found ineligible under Executive Order 9835 although this individual was also found to be a security risk to the Department of State. Of the 15 security risk cases In have been sengrated from employment in the Department. Two of the cases determined to be security risks are presently on appeal to the Secretary of States Moreover, it should be pointed out that Il additional individuals left the Department subsequent to the Board's decision to prefer charges against them and prior to the helding of a hearing. In addition, one employee was separated by administrative action on grounds of suitability on the recommendation of the Boards

10. How many of these employees that were found to be inclinible by your Loyalty Board have been renoved?

See ensuer to Question No. 9. Of the 16 cases found to be security risks and therefore ineligible, 14 have been separated from employment in the Department and 2 are on appeal to the Secretary of State. These two employees are presently suspended. The one employee who has been found ineligible on loyalty and security grounds has not as yet exhausted the appeal privileges and therefore has not been separated. However, this employee is presently suspended.

lle How many of your ineligible determinations made by your Loyalty Board were appealed to the Loyalty Review Board of the Civil Service Commission?



16. In how many cases of your employees did you issue an interrogatory?



Allegations by former State Department Employee

A former employee of the Department called on me and offered assistance relative to exposing the undesirables still on the Department's payroll.

It was indicated that when Hiss took over the Special Political Dask for United Nations Affairs in 1945 or 1946 he put on one as one of his principal assistants. PURPOSE: In accordance with the Director's request to be advised of the number of the 570 persons in the State Depart-ment on whom we have conducted full field loyalty investigations in which there has been some evidence of Communist Party affilia, tions, sympathy or association are still employed in the State Department or some other Government agency, there is attached hereto a blind memorandum listing 142 of these cases to assist our liaison representative with the State Department in determining the present employment status of these individuals.

BACKGROUND: By memorandum dated March 16, 1951, captioned "Communist Infiltration into the Armed Forces, Industrial Plants, and the State Department," the Director was advised that as of March 13, 1951, there had been a total of 570 loyalty cases conducted on applicant and employees of the State Department in which there had been some evidence of Communist Party affiliation, sympathy or association with individuals alleged to be Communist sympathizers at some time. Director noted, "Just how many are still employed in State or some other Government agency. H."

To determine the present employment status of these 570 individuals, files have been reviewed and a list prepared with necessary identifying data on 142 of these cases. This list, in blind memorandum form, is attached for the assistance of our liaison representative with the State Department to determine present employment status. If the individual is not employed by the State Department and State Department files show transfer to another Government agency, this information should be obtained.

The remainder of the 570 cases are being reviewed and similar identifying data will be furnished to Liaison when additional lists are prepared.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that our liaison representative with the State Department contact that Department to determine the employment status of the individuals identified on the attached list.



PURFOSE:

To advise you of the identity of the 29 individuals Senator McCarthy claims are "security risks" in the State Department.

BACKGROUND:

Recent "ashington, D. C., newspapers have contained articles concerning 29 persons whom Senator McCarthy has claimed are "security risks" in the State Department. Senator McCarthy has been quoted in the newspapers as saying that he had made a "reasonable" request that he be assured that the 29 persons be barred from "secret materials" while their "loyalty" cases were pending before the State Department's Loyalty-Security Board. The State Department, according to these articles, refused to tell Senator McCarthy what it has done about these 29 individuals. McCarthy was said in these articles to have sent a letter to Dean Acheson listing these 29 persons and demanding immediate "assurances" from Acheson that all have been barred from secret information and said unless he got such assurances he would make the names public

Undersecretary of State Carlisle H. Humelsine wrote the Senator that his allegation that the 29 persons he named are involved in pending loyalty cases "is incorrect." Humelsine said that some of these individuals are not State Department employees, some already have been cleared and some are "in process through the Loyalty Program."

The Liaison Section has secured the list of 29 persons furnished by Senator McCarthy to Dean Acheson.






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LOYALTY IN GOVERNMENT

A little over eighteen months ago the junior Senator from Wisconsin announced to a woman's club in Wheeling, W. Va., that he had in his hand a list of more than two hundred persons who "were known to the Secretary of State as being members of the Communist party and who nevertheless are still working and shaping the policy of the State Department." The Senator was, of course, Joseph R. McCarthy, and the speech was the first of a series that, unfortunately, has not yet ended. The number of alleged Communists Mr. McCarthy has detected in and out of the State Department has been almost as variable as the weather, but his theme has been consistent. He has not, however, uncovered a single proven spy.

In our view, this McCarthy ruckus has been not only tremendously harmful but also tragically unnecessary. It is often forgotten, but none the less true, that years before McCarthy had made any impact on the national scene a thoroughgoing loyalty and security program had been instituted for Government employes under a Presidential order of March 21, 1947. Under this program the records of all employes or prospective employes of the Federal Government are checked against F. B. L. files. If any derogatory data turn up, a "full field investigation" by the F. B. I. follows. The results are considered by a loyalty board within the governmental agency concerned, at hearings to which the accused person has right of counsel but, in order to protect confidential informants, no right to cross-examine or to be confronted by his accusers. Appeals may be taken to the head of the agency and finally to the central Loyalty Review Board. This program has been subject to criticism on the ground that the rights of the employe (or applicant) are not adequately protected.

In the case of "security" as distinct from "loyalty" risks, procedure in the various governmental agencies is far less uniform, and in some respects much more peremptory. The President has lately asked the National Security. Council to investigate this phase of the problem with a view to establishing more consistent standards, and perhaps setting up a central board of review similar to that which afready exists for loyalty cases.

In fact, the terms under which the loyalty and security inquiries are now conducted are so broad that some critics feel they are infringing on traditional American liberties. Every Government employe has by this time been subjected to loyalty screening at least once and in some cases more than once, and some 330 have been dismissed as of June 30. The inquiries have been thorough and painstaking. The F. B. L has proved its worth too many times for anyone to doubt that. The various loyalty boards (headed in the State Department, for instance, by a New Hampshire Republican) and the Loyalty Review Board (headed by a former Republican Senator from Connecticut) are conscientious and non-political.

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
The fact is that the Government is and has been as well protected against disloyalty or subversion among its own employes as any Government could possibly hope to be. To save it from its internal enemies it has not needed the reckless irresponsibility of a Senator McCarthy or what President Truman decried this week as "the growing practice of character assassination. Excursions into this politically tempting field have been unnecessary, unproductive and unconscionable. It is long past the time for demagogues and their political backers to recognize that such tactics themselves constitute danger to the strength and the stability of the Republic.

This will acknowledge your letter of September 6, 1951, in which you refer to a letter addressed by me to Senator Tydings, dated June 16, 1950, in reference to material appearing in loyalty files of certain employees of the State Department.

In response to your inquiry I wish to advise that my letter of June 16, 1950, was written to Senator Tydings following the furnishing to me by the Federal Bureau of Investigation of a record of the material which had been furnished to the State Department in these cases and the checking by my office staff to make certain that all of the recorded material was actually in the State Department files.

Thereafter, under date of June 27, 1950, Senator EcCarthy wrote to the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation inquiring whether that Bureau had checked to make certain that the files were complete and that nothing had been removed therefrom. The Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, under date of July 10, 1950, advised Senator EcCarthy that the Federal Bureau of Investigation had made no such examination and was, therefore, not in a position to make any statement concerning the completeness or incompleteness of the State Department files. He added a paragraph, however, explaining that the Bureau had furnished me at my request a record of all loyalty material furnished the State Department referred to, and he transmitted to Senator EcCarthy a copy of my letter of June 16, 1950.


Following further charges that these files were not complete, the Attorney General on July 12, 1950, requested the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation to examine these files. This examination was made by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and based upon a memorandum from the Director,

PURPOSE:

To furnish, pursuant to your request, a summary of the background concerning Senator William Benton's (D., Conn.)

charge that Senator Joseph R. McCarthys(R., Wisc.) tactics are in

part demonstrated by his use of what he claimed was "an FBI chart" of 1947 listing 124 subversives or suspects in the State Department. Senator Benton pointed out that you had denied such a chart was sent to the State Department or evaluated by the FBI.

BACKGROUND:

On June 6, 1950, Senator McCarthy in a speech before the Senate stated in substance that around May 15, 1946 or 1947, the FBI supplied the State Department charts and diagrams showing Soviet Agents. Communists and fellow travelers in the State Department. This chart, according to Senator McCarthy, contained 124 names broken down as follows: 20 Communist Agents, 12 other Communists, 14 Communist sympathizers. 77 suspects.

Inquiry at the State Department disclosed that the material used by Senator McCarthy originated from a State Department report prepared by Samuel Klaus on August 3, 1946. This report was in the form of a survey made by Klaus for Joseph Panuch, a former Deputy to the Assistant Secretary for Administration. Klaus in this report referred to an FBI prepared chart. Mr. Samuel Boykin of the State Department informed the Bureau that this was a misstatement of facts by Klaus.

The chart in question, which was actually prepared by the State Department, carried the title, "Top Secret, U. S. Department of State, Preliminary Survey of the Communist Infiltration, Prepared May 15, 1946," The employees were generally divided into two groups: Soviet Underground Intelligence Connections and (2) Amerasia. Actually there were four charts in all, none of which appeared to be a finished product. The employees were also broken down into the following categories: Agents (20), Communists (13) and pointed out that the computation of sympathizers (14) and suspects (77) had not been completed. (121-23278-178X2)

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The State Department in a formal press release dated June 9, 1950, stated:

"As previously stated by the Department, neither the chart itself nor the report of August 3, 1946 in which Senator McCarthy has cited a reference to the chart, was prepared by, or sent to the State Department by, the FBI, and this has been verified to the Department of State both by the Department of Justice and by the FBI. On the contrary, the chart and the report were prepared within the Department of State itself. The chart was prepared on May 15, 1946 and the report on August 3, 1946.

"The Department of State itself, after consultation with the writer of the report, with the former Security Officer under whose direction and in whose office the chart was prepared, with certain of his then subordinates familiar with the chart, and with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and after reviewing working papers which are still in our file, has conclusively determined that the chart was not prepared or furnished by the FBI, but was prepared as an investigator's working document in the Department of State in 1946 and by employees of the Department of State. Interview with the writer of the report, who is still in the Department, and the Security Officer with whom he had a conversation about the chart established that the writer of the report drew from his conversation with the Security Officer the unintentionally erroneous conclusion that the chart was prepared in the FBI."

The Bureau in a letter to the Honorable James E. Webb, Undersecretary of State, Department of State, Washington, D. C., dated June 14, 1950, pointed out the following: "The comments made by Mr. Klaus in his report concerning this alleged 'FBI Chart,' as they appeared in the newspapers, were completely erroneous. This Bureau did not send any such chart to the State Department, and, of course, made no evaluation of information as was indicated in the report."

BACKGROUND: By memorandum dated March 16, 1951, captioned "Communist Infiltration into the Armed Forces, Industrial Plants and the State Department," the Director was advised that as of March 13, 1951, there had been a total of 570 loyalty cases conducted on applicants and employees of the State Department in which there had been some evidence of Communist Party affiliation, sympathy or association with individuals alleged to be Communist sympathizers at some time. The Director noted "Just how many are still employed in State or some other Government agency. H."

To determine the present employment status of the 570 persons mentioned above, the files were reviewed and a list prepared containing the necessary identifying data. The list was made available to the State Department by our liaison representative. It has now been returned with appropriate notations indicating that many of these people are still employed by the State Department and that others are not so employed and their places of present employment are unknown.

A copy of the list of names checked by the State Department is attached. In each instance where the person was employed by the State Department, an "X" has been drawn through his name. In other words, it is now necessary to check CSC records to determine whether those persons whose names have not been I'd on the attached list are presently employed in the Government.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that our liaison representative furnish the attached list of names to the CSC with the request that each name not I'd be checked against CSC files to determine whether that person is presently employed by the Federal Government.
