Re: JULIUS ROSENBERG ESPIONAGE - R

At approximately 5:15 P. M., 7/19/50, I advised Inspector A. H. Belmont, Bureau, that we had just heard from Cleveland on the interview of PERL. Cleveland agents feel as we do that he is not coming clean. He first denied he knew BARR and, later on, when they showed him a letter they found in the house from his brother, SAM, to PERL, wherein SAM PERL mentioned he had seen BARR in Paris early this year, he admitted he did meet BARR in 1946 in New York. He said he only saw him once or twice and BARR introduced him to SARANT. He did not see SARANT too often, only a few times, but SARANT gave him the key to apartment at 65 Morton Street, MYC.

I told Mr. Belmont we had given Cleveland agents a couple of suggestions as to what to go into detail on when they reinterview PERL. He denied knowing ROSENBERG, denied knowing MIKE. We feel and Cleveland agents feel that he and MIKE know each other because the superintendent at 65 Morton Street has definitely identified from photographs PERL, SARANT, and MIKE as having been over at that apartment, Although not al some time.

Cleveland agents have identified MIKE from photos sent by NYO as the individual they have had under surveillance.

Up at Chappaqua on 7/19/50, NY agents determined that MIKE's wife, ANNE, worked at a dress shop in NYC, possibly Bergdorf Goodman. (In messages, she was referred to as a dressmaker.) We know also that MIKE was a member of the ABRAHAM LINCOLN BRIGADE.

I advised Mr. Belmont that, with developments so far, we felt ANNE and MIKE should be interviewed, possibly tonight (7/19/50) before they could be contacted by PERL. At least then we would have their stories independently. I also said I thought it would be helpful if we sent NY agents familiar with the case to Cleveland to conduct interviews with ANNE and MIKE.

Mr. Belmont called back at about 6:50 P. M., 7/19/50 and said that, at the Bureau, it was thought that ANNE and MIKE should not be interviewed hastily, that the agents who interview them should be thoroughly prepared, and that interviews should be held in abeyance for the time being. 15.15348-1131

Walsh and the writer on July 13, 1950:

Commissioner of the Board of Assessors, Torktown Heights, New York, advised that their record showed that this property is owned by the York-town Levelopment Corporation. The property was acquired by this corporation on September 19, 1945.

It is noted that the northwest corner lot on the above blueprint is marked "Sold". The records reflected that this particular lot
which is Lot 27 on the blueprint, was sold by the Yorktown Development
Corporation to HIT any MALLIE BURIETT, 116 East 30 Street, New York
City, on September 19, 1947. It was reported September 27, 1947. FROST
and GILBERT advised that the BURIETTS owned adjacent property and they
bought the above lot to gain access to Taconic Parkway.

The records reflected that none of the rest of the property has been sold and no building permits have been issued for property in the area. GILBERT and FROST advised that their records reflected that JULIUS ROSEIBERG does not own any property in Yorktown Heights, New York.

Investigation at 65 Morton Street, Greenwich Village, New York City

On July 19, 1950, SA ROBERT F. ROYAL and the writer interviewed Mr. FLOYD ELMYN Sr., Superintendent of a large apartment building at 85 Barrow Street, Greenwich Village, New York City, which apartment building adjoins and is connect to the apartment building at 65 Forton Street. Mr. ELEYN stated that he was supertindent at 65 Morton Street from approximately the middle of March, 1926 until October, 1948, and that he had other men working for him as assistant superintendents at various times. He advised that two of these men who might have information pertinent to this investigation and would probably know ALFRED SAPANT, former tenant of apartment 6-I, at 65 Norton Street, from 1943 to January, 1950, were Mr. ELWYN'S grandson, FRED TICE, Star Route, Stanford, New York, and HENRY GEORGE HAYNOOD, colored, who now resides at 76 Charles Street, Greenwich Village, New York City, telephone OR 5-5582. Mr. ELWYN said that his grandson, TICE, assisted him at 65 Norton Street for fifteen or eighteen months from 1944 to 1945, and that HAY: 000 had assisted him at various times or whenever he was needed.

Mr. ELMYN advised that he recalls his first contact with SARANT was in the winter of 19hh, and that he remembered that there was snow and ice on the streets and buildings. Mr. ELMYN was checking at 65 Morton Street to determine the reason why fuses were being continuously blown on the AC current supply in the building's basement. He stated that during his check he noted that there was a wire leading from the window of apartment 5-I, which apartment had an AC outlet supplied by the building, to a window of the living room of apartment 6-I. Mr. ELMYN said that he decided that this wire must be the place where shortages were occurring as it was not the proper kind of wire for cutside use. He advised that he disconnected it. He stated that the wire may live been put in for SARANT by a former assistant superintendent, WILLIAM HARRISON, now deceased, or put in by the tenant himself.

Kr. ELWIN advised that when he decided to disconnect the wire that he had disconnected the wire first in apartment 5-I and then went to apartment 6-I at a time when SAPANT happened to be out. He stated that he noted at the time he disconnected the wire in SARANT'S apartment that there was no furniture to speak of and he recalled that the bedroom contained three single iron cots. Wr. ELWIN stated that he noticed in the living room a small, handmade workbench with plenty of tools of the type an electrician would use. He said that on the bench were two or three clocks, apparently three inches in diameter, two transformers, and a couple of meters and other objects. He noticed that one of these clocks was hooked up to the AC electricy supply and Mr. ELWYN said that in curiosity that he turned the hands of this clock and immediately a bright arc flashed across to wire set up on another small table against the wall. He said he twirled the hands two or three times and the same arc occurred. Mr. ELWYN advised that he also snooped around the apartment, looked in the closet and noticed several small black metal tool boxes and the chassis of what appeared to be two radios. He said that wires were strung in confusion around the room.

Mr. ELWYN said that SARANT, who at this time was single, came to him that same night or the next night and complained, asking that the AC electricity supply be put back into his apartment. He said that SARANT claimed that he wanted this for his radio and that the supply was put in through the apartment properly through the dumb-waiter shaft on orders of the building management. Mr. ELWYN related that before this incident and afterwards he had many complaints from other tenants of interference with their radios. He stated that one cause of this interference was a "heat lamp" outfit being used by a Mrs. DeLUCA, apartment h-G, at 67 Morton Street, who was investigated by the FRI on the complaint of another tenant, but Mr. ELWYN made the statement that he believes that some or most of the interference complained of could have come from SARANT'S apartment.

Fr. ELMYN continued that he believed that at one time the name HOSS was added to the records or registry for apartment 6-I because packages or mail was being delivered to the apartment house in the name of ROSS and was actually intended for someone in SARANT'S apartment. He also said that when SARANT left the apartment to go to upstate New York in the latter part of 1946, a fellow named PERL moved in. Mr. ELMYN said he could not recall whether or not PERL had a wife, but that all during the time that SARANT and PERL were in the apartment they had many visitors both men and women. Mr. ELMYN also recalled that before SARANT was married that he and the

daughter of an individual named GOLDNER, who lived in apartment 6-5, at 85 Barrow Street, were very friendly and they visited back and forth in each other's apartments.

Mr. ELWYN stated that he could not recall how long PERL lived there or when he moved out, but he stated that he remembered that after PERL left the apartment that from that time on the apartment was only used infrequently. He said that it would be empty one day and the next night it would be lighted up with numerous occupants. Mr. ELWYN also advised that the man in charge of rentals of 65 Forton Street was an official and part owner of the owning corporation named ROBERT GARLOCK, 310 East 55th Street, New York City. He stated that GARLOCK was "pink and that he put a lot of the same type of individuals in as tenants."

Photographs of the following individuals were displayed to kr. ELWYN Sr. with the results as noted. Kr. ELWYN did not recognize the following:

Mr. and Mrs. MAX ELITCHER and MICHAEL SIDOROVICH

Mr. ELWYN did not recognize the photograph of RUTH and DAVID GREENGLASS, although he advised that DAVID GREENGLASS looked familiar and could have been a visitor to some tenant at either 65 Morton Street or 85 Barrow Street. Mr. ELWYN stated that the photograph of JOEL BARR displayed to him could be the photograph of a man or his twin who is named FELDMAN. He said that this FELDMAN visited two single girls who resided at apartment 6-C at 85 Barrow Street in 1933 to 1912. He could not recall the names of these girls, but advised that they moved to Aberdeen, Maryland. Mr. ELWYN also said that FELDMAN had mail come to that address either in care of the two girls mentioned above, or to ARTHUR GRAVES, apartment 1-O, 85 Barrow Street. ELWYN said that GRAVES admitted personally to Mr. ELWYN that he was "red" in 1938. He continued that GRAVES moved about 1940 to Baldwin, Long Island, New York.

Mr. ELMYN also advised when shown a photograph of subject ROSENBERG that if RUSENBERG had no moustache he could be identical with a former tenant by the name of ROSENBERG, first name unknown, who lived with a tenant, name unknown, in apartment 5-II, at 87 parrow Street, inabout 1938. He stated that this ROSENBERG as he recalled, was a single man approximately twenty years of age.

On July 18 and 19, 1950, SA ROBERT F. ROYAL and the writer interviewed Mr. and Mrs. FLOYD ELWYN Jr. of 65 Morton Street, New York City.

They advised that FLOYD ELWYN Jr. has been superintendent at 65 Norton Street since October, 1948, succeeding his father in this position. They advised that the records in their possession concerning 65 Norton Street reflected that apartment 6—I at that address was rented to ALFRED SARANT in 1933, probably October, and that SARANT vacated the apartment in January, 1950. The records also indicated that the name ROSS was added to the register along with SARANT in 1945, and in 1946, the name PERL was noted as a tenant in apartment 6—I. At the time PERL'S name was added to the records it was indicated that "SARANT sends in check."

Wr. ELWYN recalled that his father told him that when SARANT was living in the apartment that SARANT had run an AC electric wire from apartment 5-I to his apartment through an outside window. ELWYN said that the apartment house was wired with DC current, but that some apartments were supplied with AC outlet, including the apartment 5-I, which was rented to HOWARD MULLANEY. ELWYN said that HOWARD MULLANEY, who resided in the apartment 5-I at the time SARANT was there, still resides there.

Mr. ELMYN continued that when he assumed his superintendent's responsibilities, he was told that SARANT lived in Rochester or someplace in upstate New York and that he only visited and used the apartment occasionally paying the rent to the main office by mail. ELWYN continued that approximately three months later, (December, 1948 or January, 1949) the tenants below apartment 6-I complained of a leak which was showing on the ceiling of their apartment. ELWYN said that he entered SARANT'S apartment at that time to fix or locate this leak. He said that he observed the following articles in the apartment at that time, pointing out that the apartment was rented unfurnished with only a stove and refrigerator. ELWYN said that as no one was in the apartment at the time he had occasion to observe the whole apartment which consists of a living room, bedroom, kitchen and bath. In the living room there was a small kitchen table with a white metal top and a reflector type photo-flood bulb or similar type bulb was screwed into a socket on the wall and the bulb was arranged so as to cast its light or beam on the table. ELWYN also recalled that there were at least a dozen fountain pens and a few colored pencils on the table. ELWYN further stated that the room contained a three piece glass front sectional bookcase, two old kitchen chairs and a couple of empty wooden boxes which were apparently being used as chairs. Mr. ELWYN said that the only thing in the bedroom was the bottom half of a dark blue studio couch and that the kitchen held a few dishes and silverware, but no pots and pans,

ELWYN stated that there was nothing else in the apartment except a few small odds and ends which he could not recall.

Mr. ELWYN advised that at this time he had never seen anyone at SARANT'S apartment and that it was not until June or July, 1949 that a man who claimed to be SARANT came to him and asked for a key to 6-I, stating that he had left his key in another suit in the apartment. ELYYN said that he went to the apartment with this man, unlocked the door and let him in. He continued that this man who claimed to be SARANT stayed around the apartment for a week and then left without notice.

Mr. and Mrs. ELEYN described this man as follows:

Lr. and krs. FLWYN were shown a photograph of MICHAEL SITOROVICH and they immediately identified the photograph of MICHAEL SIDOROVICH as the man who had identified himself as ALFHED SARANT in June or July, 1919, as mentioned immediately above.

The ELWYNS continued that they did not see much activity at the apartment after the above mentioned incident, but that other tenants of the building had told them from time to time that they had heard someone come in or leave the apartment.

The ELWYNS said that two or three months after June or July, 1949, a colored woman had come to the superintendent's apartment and asked for

a key to apartment 6-I, stating that Mrs. SARANT had called her and asked her to clean the apartment. KLWYN said he refused this woman the key and he described her as an old lady, in her 60's, stout, 5' lin, and poorly dressed. They continued that a little while later a telephone repairman came and told Mrs. ELWYN that a woman in apartment 6-I wanted the phone changed into her name and he requested a key to the apartment which was refused. The ELWYNS both stated that they had never seen or heard of a woman being in SARAMT'S apartment during the time they had been there. Mr. ELWYN stated that a while after the first telephone man came, another one came and wanted the key, stating that he had instructions to take the phone out of the apartment. ELWYN stated that he refused this man the key also, but that the phone was taken out (in November he thought) at a time when someone was at the apartment.

ELWYN related that near the Christmas holidays of 1949, tenants were complaining of water continuously running somewhere in the building and on checking this complaint, he traced it to the toilet in apartment 6-I. He said he went to the apartment and gained entrance and that there were about seven men lying awake talking, each in a separate thaki sleeping bag. He said that he had to step over these men, who were in the living room, to reach the bathroom and that while he was there he heard other men talking in the bedroom, but did not see them as the door was closed. He stated that while he was in the bathroom, one man came in and asked how long he would be and that this man seemed in a hurry to have him leave. He said that the man who had previously identified himself as Mr. SARANT was not among the seven men he noted in the living room, but he did say that the fellow who came into the bathroom was the man later identified by another occupant as Mr. PERL.

Hr. and Mrs. ELWYN described this unknown man B as follows:

Mr. ELWYN stated that one time a letter came for PERL and that the mailman had given it to the superintendent. ELWYN said that he saw a man opening the mailbox for apartment 6-I and he asked him about PERL. ELWYN said the man told him PERL was up in the apartment, so he gave the letter to this man.

Mr. ELWYN described this unknown man C as follows:

Hair looked dyed or bleached but was darker
than that of the fellow they called PERL.

Er. ELWYN stated that in January, 1950, the management told him that SARANT had written releasing the apartment and that he went up to see if this apartment had been vacated. He said he knocked and there was no answer so he let himself in. ELNYN stated there was the man he saw previously at the mailbox (Unknown Man C). This man was at the kitchen table eating crackers and jelly and had only a glass of water to go with. them. ELWYN said no one else was in the apartment and when he told this man that the apartment was supposed to be vacant, he replied, "SARANT is letting us keep it until the rent runs out. Kr. ELWYN said that two days later he went up to the apartment again and that both men were there (Unknown Fen B and C) and he told them they must get out as the apartment had been rerented. ELWYN related that the men did vacate this time. moving their furnishings to the basement, where they stayed for about five days. He stated that these furnishings were the same as he described at the time that he first entered the apartment, but he noted that he never saw the reflector type photo-flood bulb except on that one occasion and he said that he specifically looked for it after the men brought the furnishings down, as he would liked to have had it himself.

Mr. and Mrs. ELWYN stated that the furnishings were taken away while both the superintendent and his wife were out and that they did not see them move anything except the bottom half of the studio couch.

Ers. FLWIN said that she noticed that when the men moved the stuff out of the apartment that Unknown Kan R only came down to the basement on one occasion and at other times only carried stuff to the head of the stairs

where it was picked up by Unknown Man " and another fellow and carried to the basement. Mr. and Mrs. EL. YN stated that Unknown Man B seemed to want to avoid them. They described the other man, mentioned as Unknown Man D, as follows:

Mr. and Mrs. ELWYN stated that the only other thing they recalled was that when Mr. ELWYN saw Unknown Men B and D carrying the bottom of the studio couch out of the apartment building, they were going out the Morton Street entrance. He said that he told them that it would be closer to the street by another way, but that they ignored him. He said that later another tenant, whom he could not recall, told him that he saw these men carrying the couch towards Seventh Avenue. Mr. ELWYN said that this seemed to him to be an indication that they had no car and were only moving close by.

Mr. and Mrs. ELWYN said that they have had no other contact with any of the men they have described and Mr. ELWYN said that nothing was left in the apartment at the time it was vacated. Both Mr. and Mrs. ELWYN said that it appeared to them that the apartment was only being used as meeting place. Mr. ELWYN was questioned concerning the apartment house lock and keys at the time SARANT was the lessee. He advised that the lock of this apartment had been taken out by him, the tumblers changed and placed in another apartment. He stated that he knows where the lock is and is positive he can locate the keys to the apartment. Mr. ELWYN recalled that only one set of keys was returned to him and that he is sure that at least another set was furnished to the tenant.



Shop, 110 Lest 32nd Street, New York City, advised that a record is maintained of all camera transactions involving \$25.00 or more, both in the new and used trade.

The record book of all Leics camera sales involving new cameras was reviewed by the writer for the period March 24, 1939 to JALY 17, 1950, and no transaction in the name of JULIUS or ATELL ROSENBERG CAS. ROSENBLUM was located. Likewise, no record was located involving a sale to any individual showing the address, 10 Monroe Street, New York City, or an address in the vicinity of 12th Street and Avenue B, or 12th Street, and Avenue C, New York City.

Considering the possibility that subject purchased a used Leica camera, inquiry revealed that one record book is maintained covering the sale of all used cameras, valued at \$25.00 or more, but that they are not segregated by make of camera. The entries are made chronologically as the sales are made.
