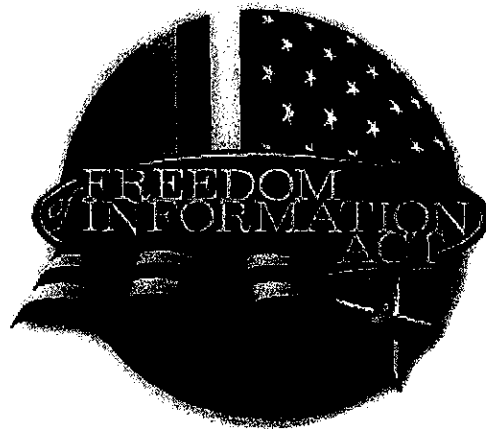

DAVID GREENGLASS advised SAS JOHN W. LEWIS and LEO H. FRUTKIN that JULIUS ROSENBERG had a close friend many years ago named ABE. GREENGLASS said he had not heard anything concerning ABE for many years, but understood that ABE lost a leg while fighting in the Loyalist Army during the Spanish Civil War.

GREENGLASS also recalled that ABE'S fiancée at one time was RUTH MARKOWITZ, who at that time lived on the southwest corner of Willett and Rivington Streets, New York City.

Mrs. EMANUEL GREENBAUM, nee Ruth Markowitz, 73 Willett Street, New York City, telephone Al. 4-6318, advised SAS JOHN W. LEWIS and FREDERICK C. BAUCKHAM that while she was a member of the Young Communist League during the period from 1936 to 1938, that her fiancé had been ABE OSHER from Brooklyn and he had resided with his parents at 468 Chester Street, Brooklyn, New York, in about 1945. She advised that OSHER had been a member of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade during the Spanish Civil War. She said that although she is acquainted with JULIUS ROSENBERG, she had not been aware that ABE OSHER was acquainted with ROSENBERG, although OSHER may have become acquainted with ROSENBERG while both were attending College of the City of New York.

G-2 advised that the records of Selective Service Board No. 209, 1718 Pitkin Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, reflect that ABRAHAM OSHEROFF, Army Serial No. 32295751, filed a Selective Service questionnaire February 5, 1941, which revealed that he has also used the names ABE OSHER and ABE OSHEROW, and at that time resided at 721 Hopkinson Avenue, Brooklyn, New York. His physical defects included a broken left knee.

He stated in his questionnaire that he was employed as Secretary of the State Committee of the Young Communist League, 50 East 13 Street, New York City, at a salary of \$21 per week and had been so employed for the past four months.

According to an article in the "Daily Worker", an East Coast Communist daily newspaper, dated March 10, 1943, OSHEROFF represented City College at a boxing tournament during the week of March 1, 1943, which was under the auspices of the Communist Party.

The records of the New York City Board of Elections, 400 Broome Street, New York City, reflected that OSHEROFF was a Communist Party candidate for assemblyman from the 23rd Assembly District of Kings County, New York, in the fall of 1940 and at that time resided at 1811 St. Johns Place, Brooklyn, New York. The "Daily Worker" for November 3, 1940, page 5, column 6, stated that this candidate graduated from City College of New York with a Bachelor of Science degree in June, 1936 and had been active in the American Student Union while in college and was in the Abraham Lincoln Brigade during the Spanish Civil War.

The records of the Bureau of Special Services and Investigation, New York City Police Department, reflect that OSHEROFF was a delegate to the Special Convention of the Young Communist League held in New York City in December, 1940.

G-2 advised that OSHEROFF, while in the Army during World War II, admitted that he had been a member of the Communist Party prior to entering the Army and that he intended to return to Communist activities upon his discharge.

On April 9, 1943, G-2 obtained a newspaper clipping from the Charlotte, North Carolina "News", reflecting that OSHEROFF had been wounded in the knee while fighting in the Loyalist Army during the Spanish Civil War and that his Spanish record had been marked, "Permanently Disabled". For this reason, he had difficulty in persuading the U. S. Army medical authorities to pass him for Army service.

Confidential Informants [REDACTED] advised that OSHEROFF was a delegate and alternate from Brooklyn at the

New York State Convention of the Communist Political Association which was held at Manhattan Center, New York City, July 21 and 22, 1945, and August 10, 12, 1945.

Confidential Informant [redacted] advised that OSHEROFF attended a meeting of the New York State Committee of the Communist Party at Hotel Albert, 65 University Place, New York City, July 20 and 21, 1946. The statement of OSHEROFF appearing in the October 1, 1946 issue of the "Daily Worker" reflected that OSHEROFF was one of the owners or stockholders of the "Daily Worker". His name appeared on a similar statement in the "Daily Worker" for October 3, 1947.

An announcement in the February 24, 1947 issue of the "Daily Worker" referred to OSHEROFF as Chairman of the Brownsville Communist Party.

Confidential Informant [redacted] advised that on May 7, 1947, OSHEROFF was acting in the capacity of a recruiting speaker for the Communist Party.

Confidential Informant [redacted] advised that OSHEROFF was an instructor for the Kings County Communist Party Section Evening Training School May 4 to 25, 1947.

Confidential Informant [redacted] stated that on November 17, 1947, OSHEROFF re-registered as a member of the Communist Party for the year 1948.

Confidential Informant [redacted] advised that as of January, 1948, OSHEROFF was an organizer for the Boro Hall Section of the Communist Party.

Confidential Informant [redacted] stated on July 7, 1948, OSHEROFF transferred from the Boro Hall Section to the Boro Park Section of the Kings County Communist Party.

Confidential Informant [redacted] advised on February 28, 1948, that OSHEROFF was a paid employe of the Kings County Committee of the Communist Party during 1947 and for at least a portion of 1948.

Confidential Informant [REDACTED] advised on June 12, 1950, that OSHEROFF was employed as Regional Director of the Boro Park Section of the Kings County Communist Party, 363 Fulton Street, Brooklyn, New York.

Through a pretext telephone call by SA ROBERT G. MOORFIELD, it was ascertained that OSHEROFF was residing at 697 Monroe Street, Brooklyn, on September 13, 1950.

In view of OSHEROFF'S continued activities in the Communist Party, he is not being interviewed in connection with his acquaintance with ROSENBERG.

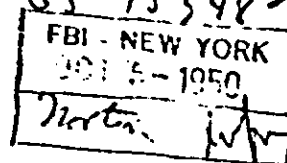
Reference is made to the memorandum of SA J. GARTH GRAY dated September 28, 1950.

Inasmuch as the telephone call made from the subject's home telephone to Long Beach 1510 occurred on July 11, 1948, COHEN could have no knowledge of this call.

SA J. GARTH GRAY determined that HERMAN W. TACKEL, who resided at 261 Coynsum Street, Merrick, Long Island, was employed in New York City, place unknown. He also learned that TACKEL'S wife is CAIDA LINK, and that the family formerly resided at Sunnyside, Long Island, New York.

On September 18, 1950, SE RALPH G. MURDY checked the records of the Credit Bureau of Greater New York, where he learned that HERMAN W. TACKEL is employed at the Munston Manufacturing and Service Company, Inc., 43 Vesey Street, New York City, that he is Secretary-Treasurer, and Production Manager of this firm, earning an income in excess of ten thousand dollars per annum.

With regard to the Munston Manufacturing Company, a check of the indices reveals that ARTHUR M. WORMSER, 60 East 42nd Street, New York City, advised on July 27, 1950, that JULIUS ROSENBERG had been recommended to him by the Munston Manufacturing Company, 43 Vesey Street, New York City, during the latter part of 1949, and that he requested a quotation from ROSENBERG on bids and braces, which the subject at that time was manufacturing.

WORMSER also advised that he had never placed the order with the subject, but stated that he saw ROSENBERG occasionally at the Munston firm's office.

NORMAN WEISER, former President of the Eggomat Company, 4 East 41st Street, New York City, advised that he did not know ROSENBERG and advised he saw him at the Munston Manufacturing Company, 43 Vesey Street, New York City, during the war.

With regard to TACKEL, it is noted that a HERMAN WILLIAM TACKEL was an unsuccessful applicant for student fingerprint classifier with this Bureau in 1940.

HERMAN W. TACKEL was interviewed on October 2, 1950. He advised that he first became acquainted with JULIUS ROSENBERG approximately two or two and

a half years ago, when ROSENBERG came to the offices of the Munston Manufacturing and Service Company at 43 Vesey Street, soliciting business. TACKEL stated that his firm manufactures various items of a classified nature for the Army, Navy and Civil Aeronautics Administration. He stated that thereafter ROSENBERG frequently came to his office in efforts to obtain sub-contracts on work being performed by the Munston Company, and that he submitted his bids for the various sub-contracts on a competitive basis.

TACKEL advised that during the course of his association with ROSENBERG, ROSENBERG had never given him any cause to think that he was engaged in any espionage activities; that he made few inquiries regarding the type of work that the Munston Manufacturing Company was performing, and that at no time had he access to any secret or classified documents in the possession of the Munston firm.

TACKEL further advised that the only association he had with ROSENBERG which might be termed as social in nature was on one occasion when ROSENBERG, who had been talking of buying a home on Long Island, came to TACKEL'S house, accompanied by his son, in order that he might inspect same with the view of purchasing one similar thereto. He stated that ROSENBERG from time to time used to call him at his home, but that these conversations related to efforts of ROSENBERG to obtain materials which he needed in the operation of his business, Pitt Machine Products, Inc.

TACKEL further stated that his company awarded ROSENBERG a number of sub-contracts for small parts and that he has complete records of this which reflect the nature of these parts.

TACKEL also stated that on the various occasions when ROSENBERG would come to the Munston offices, he always came alone and that he had no acquaintanceship with ROSENBERG'S various contacts.

During the course of the conversation with TACKEL, he was asked whether or not ROSENBERG had ever expressed any interest in photographs. TACKEL stated that he had never heard any expression of interest in this subject on the part of ROSENBERG, although he, himself, was engaged in photography as a hobby and had mentioned his interest in this subject to ROSENBERG.

JOSEPH E. EDDLETON, President of the Munston Manufacturing and Service Company, advised that he had become acquainted with ROSENBERG

at approximately the same time as HERMAN W. TACKEL, and confirmed the information furnished by TACKEL regarding their business dealings with ROSENBERG.

In addition, he supplied information to the effect that during his conversations with ROSENBERG, the latter had indicated that he had been engaged in performing some work for the Navy Special Devices Center, Sands Point, Long Island, New York. NY

Both TACKEL and EDDLTON advised that ROSENBERG appeared to be experiencing considerable difficulty in making Pitt Machine Products Company a financial success; that he had mentioned that he had been having difficulty with a silent partner in the business; that he wanted to purchase the interest of this partner and others associated with him in the business, and that, thereafter, he felt that he would be able to do work at somewhat lower prices for the Kunston Company.

They both advised that since ROSENBERG was a comparatively small operator and they felt that he needed the business, they had been rather glad to assist him by giving him contracts in order that his business might be a success.

On October 2, 1950, the writer interviewed ^AJOSEPH WEINIG at the Capital Jewelers Exchange, 32 West 47th Street, New York City. He advised that he had occupied a cottage at Amenia, New York, during a period which included June 27, 1949. However, he stated that this cottage had a telephone installed in it and that, therefore, there would be no occasion when anybody, who was trying to contact him, should call the number of the Beekman Realty Company to get in touch with him.

He was shown a photograph of JULIUS ROSENBERG and stated that he had no knowledge of this individual.

In view of this information and in view of the fact that WALTER BECKMAN, owner of the Beekman Realty Company, has advised that he advertised cottages which he had for rent in the "New York Post", it is considered likely that the telephone call made by ROSENBERG to the Beekman Realty Company number was made for the purpose of inquiries regarding the cottages.

On July 22, 1950 SAs William Yates and Daniel B. Fleming interviewed Mr. and Mrs. Frank Tusky 115 Ave., A., NYC., in connection with the above named person. Mr. & Mrs. Tusky advised that they were superintendents of the buildings at 183 & 131 E 7 St., NYC., and when exhibited Rosenberg's picture advised that they believed that he had resided in one of the apartments they managed for a time in 1944 and 1945. It was determined at this time that the apartment in question was apartment 4A presently occupied by Vivian Glassman described by the Tusky's as a "Red Cross Worker". Due to difficulty in understanding the Tusky's arrangements were made to reinterview them with an interpreter.

The Tusky's were re-interviewed by the above agent and SA J. Grabowski who determined that the Tusky's still believed the picture of Rosenberg to be a picture of a man who resided in the apartment for a time in 1944 and 1945. They described the man as short with a slim mustache but were unable to give any other details about his physical appearance. The Tusky's said that some time in 1944 the apartment was rented to a girl who was employed by the Red Cross and shortly after she moved in she married the man Tusky's said resembled Rosenberg. The girl and the man resided in the apartment until just before she was to have a baby and then moved out as the apartment was too high for her to climb to in her condition. Mrs. Tusky said that the following occupant told her that the previous tenant moved to Brooklyn, NY. Mrs. Tusky believed that occupants moved out in July 1945. The apartment was then occupied by a friend or relative of the previous occupant. It is to be noted that neither of the Tusky's were able to remember the names of the previous tenants and both advised that they had no record of them.

According to the Tusky's this occupant resided in the apartment for a short time and then left very suddenly one morning without returning the keys to Mrs. Tusky. Mrs. Tusky said that this person, whom she thought to be a brother of the previous occupant, left the furniture in the apartment which consisted of a table, 3 chairs and a small kitchen table. She said that the keys were mailed back to her but she did not remember from where they were mailed. Mrs. Tusky said that she or her husband had never visited the apartment tenants and knew nothing about them.

Mrs. Tusky said that she was told by other occupants of the building that the occupant left the building about 5 am. in the morning. When W. S. Tusky investigated she found that ~~the~~ the present occupant of the apartment had moved in unknown to her and although Mrs. Tusky didn't want to let her stay, she did permit her to stay after she glibly pleaded with her. Mrs. Tusky said that later on she was given a lease and has resided there since. Mrs. Tusky said that she believes the present tenant to be unmarried but she has on occasion seen men enter and leave the apartment. Mrs. Tusky also stated that the present tenant is a "Red Cross Worker" as was the first man of the three apartment dwellers in question. Mrs. Tusky said that she was told by the second tenant that the people who preceded him no longer lived in Brooklyn but had gone to Canada to live. Mrs. Tusky said that all three tenants of the apartment had reported burglaries in the apartment but she did not know what if any had been stolen.

Mrs. Tusky said that the agent for the building was a Leonard Greenspan, lawyer, 736 Broadway, NYC., but doubted that he would know much about the occupants as she handles most of the tenants problems.

Mr. Leonard Greenspan, Grenlo Products, 736 Broadway, NYC., advised that he handles most of the legal details of the building for his father who owned the building. Mr. Greenspan said that he did not know the building tenants as most contacts with the tenants were handled by the Tusky's or his father. Greenspan said also that he had been in the army during the period in question and not in New York City. He provided a copy of the lease for the present apartment occupant, Vivian Glassman, which showed that she was given a lease 8/14/47 for the apartment at 131 E 7th St. Information on lease also indicated that she was a social worker employed by the National Maritime Union, 545 W 17 St., NYC. Mr. Greenspan said ~~that~~ he believed that Miss Glassman had resided at 313 E 8 St., before living at his address. Mr. Greenspan said that his father might be able to give additional details about the former tenants but he would be away until some time in August, 1950. Mr. Greenspan added that an uncle of his Abraham Greenspan, who died in 1947, had probably handled more of the details of the building than his father.

Mr. Benjamin Greenspan, 1718 Grand Ave., Bronx, NI., apt 5A., advised that he could provide no additional details than those already given by the Tusky's as no lease existed for the years in question. All the rentals had been handled by the Tusky's and he had little contact with the tenants. Mr. Greenspan said that the only record he could find for Apt 5A was an old lease for a Mr. Lech or Tasky who was an employee of a funeral parlor in the same block. This person had occupied the apartment from some time in late 1957 to early in 1961 when he left. Until the present occupant received lease, Mr. Greenspan doubted if there had been any leases or records kept.

At the time of the interviews with the two Greenspans, they were each shown pictures of subjects in this case but neither recognized Rosenberg or the others as tenants of their building.

A check of the indices revealed no listing for Mr. & Mrs. Frank Tasky or for Leonard Greenspan.

At 2 P.M. on October 6, 1950, a telephone call was received from JOHN PHELAN, Attendance Officer, New York City Board of Education, 250 West Houston Street. He said that he was inquiring as to the absence of IRENE LUNCAN, a student at the George Washington High School, and contacted the superintendent at the apartment house at 105 Pinehurst Avenue, Manhattan.

The superintendent, whose name PHELAN did not obtain, advised him that LUNCAN, who resided in apartment 21 with his wife and daughter, had ostensibly been employed by the Associated Press of Rumania, and that he had left hurriedly for Mexico in July, 1950, at approximately the same time the papers reported that other subjects in the GOLD-FUCHS Atomic Energy Espionage Case had fled to Mexico. PHELAN indicated that the superintendent had considerably more information regarding the activities of LUNCAN but that he did not interview him at length.

File [redacted] indicates that ALEXANDER LUNCAN [redacted]

File [redacted] contains information from the Association of Foreign Press Correspondents which indicates that an identification photograph of LUNCAN was submitted, and is retained in this file, by Confidential Informant [redacted]. This Association exposed LUNCAN as not actually being a correspondent or a person acting in good faith as a newspaperman.

On August 14, 1950, Mrs. BUCHWALL and her husband, MARCUS BUCHWALL, were interviewed by special agents of the Baltimore Office regarding Mr. BUCHWALL'S past acquaintance with JULIUS ROSENBERG. At the time of the interview Mr. BUCHWALL advised that BARNEY WEINSTEIN and AARON SMITH, also known as ARTHUR, were associates of ROSENBERG and that these individuals were employed by the United States Government.

The files of the New York Office reflect that BARNEY WEINSTEIN was [REDACTED] in New York in May, 1949. This investigation revealed that [REDACTED], in his application for employment with the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance, dated in November, 1939, stated he was a member of the National Lawyers Guild.

The following information concerning the National Lawyers Guild appeared in a report dated May 29, 1946, of the Committee on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives, 79th Congress, entitled, "Investigation of the Un-American Propaganda Activities in the United States:

"1. The late FRANK P. WELSH; Comptroller, JOSEPH D. MC GOLDRICK; Judge FERDINAND PECORA; Honorable ADOLF BENKE, Assistant Secretary of State; NATHAN MARGOLD, Solicitor to the Department of the Interior, and others have resigned from the organization on the grounds that it is Communist dominated."

(New York City Council Committee investigating the Municipal Civil Service Commission, Part II, Page 55.)

"2. Cited as a Communist Front (California Committee on Un-American Activities, Report 1943, Page 98.)

"ADOLF BERLE, JR., Assistant Secretary of State, in his letter of resignation, dated June 5, 1940, stated that the leadership is not prepared to take any stand which conflicts with the Communist Party line.

"3. Cited as a Communist front by the Special Committee on Un-American Activities, March 29, 1944 (Page 147 and 149)."

No derogatory information regarding ██████████ BARNEY WEINSTEIN was developed during the ██████████ investigation in 1949.

On October 10, 1950, the writer and SA STUART J. CAMERON, interviewed BARNEY WEINSTEIN, the results of which are set forth:

Mr. WEINSTEIN advised that he is presently employed as an Adjudication Reviewer, Social Security Administration, Federal Security Agency, 72 Powell Street, Brooklyn, New York. Mr. WEINSTEIN advised that he knew ROSENBERG in the mid 1930's and that it was generally understood by members of the community that ROSENBERG was either a Communist or a Communist sympathizer. WEINSTEIN said that ROSENBERG on several occasions asked to have petitions signed. He could not recall what these petitions pertained to; however, on one instance he recalled that ROSENBERG requested members of the community to sign a petition to free the Scottsboro Boys. WEINSTEIN said that he, himself, in all probability, signed this petition.

WEINSTEIN advised that he was not closely acquainted with ROSENBERG during the mid 1930's inasmuch as ROSENBERG was more of a scholarly type and he did not fit in too well with the young men in the community. WEINSTEIN said that ROSENBERG was always looked up to by the young men in the community inasmuch as ROSENBERG was attending CCNY and he, for one, felt that ROSENBERG was more or less his intellectual superior.

WEINSTEIN said he could not recall any of ROSENBERG'S intimate friends with the exception of MARK FOGARSKY. WEINSTEIN advised that FOGARSKY was also a college student in the mid 1930's and he was also looked up to as an intellectual type of person. He advised that ROSENBERG and FOGARSKY were generally believed to be Communists or Communist sympathizers and that both FOGARSKY and ROSENBERG requested people to sign petitions which he believed were petitions for the CP.

WEINSTEIN advised that he last saw ROSENBERG in 1936 before he, WEINSTEIN, went to Washington, D.C. He advised that in 1946 he saw ROSENBERG in the subway and really passed the time of day with him. WEINSTEIN could furnish no further information regarding any subversive activities on the part of ROSENBERG.

On October 11, 1950, Mr. AARON SMITH, also known as ARTHUR, 161 West 4th Street, New York City, was interviewed by the writer. Mr. SMITH advised that he is presently employed with the Trans-World Airlines as a radio operator, International Division, LaGuardia Airport, New York City. Mr. SMITH advised that he recalled JULIUS ROSENBERG in the early 1930's and it was generally believed by members of the community that ROSENBERG was either a member of the Young Communist League or that he was a strong Communist sympathizer. Mr. SMITH said that although ROSENBERG was considered a radical by members of the community, he was quite amazed to read in the newspapers that ROSENBERG was connected with any espionage activities. He advised that ROSENBERG in his mind was never particularly brilliant and he considered him more or less of a plugger type of person.

Mr. SMITH said that he has not seen ROSENBERG since the early 1930's except for one occasion in 1949 when he saw ROSENBERG in front of a candy store at Clinton and Houston Streets, New York City, and at the time of that meeting they had a short discussion concerning ROSENBERG'S business. ROSENBERG at the time stated that his business was very poor and that he was not making any money at the time.

SMITH advised that up to the time that ROSENBERG was about sixteen years old, ROSENBERG was considered an orthodox Jew and that he was extremely religious, almost to the point of being fanatical. Later ROSENBERG became just the opposite and became extremely radical. Mr. SMITH could furnish no further information concerning ROSENBERG'S subversive activities.

The files of the New York Office failed to reflect any identifying data on AARON or ARTHUR SMITH.

Re memo of SA JOHN A. HARRINGTON dated 9/25/50 in case, "JULIUS ROSENBERG, ESPIONAGE - R", which stated that GREENGLASS has stated that ROSENBERG said he had furnished quite a sum of money to one of his "boys" whose wife was sick in early 1948.

The following investigation was conducted in an effort to ascertain if HELEN SOBELL was ill in early 1948.

Mrs. GEORGE E. DARR, 164-19 73rd Ave. and Mrs. HERMAN SCHWARTZ, 164-15 73rd Ave, both Flushing, NY, and both former neighbors of the subject, advised that they have known HELEN SOBELL since February and May, 1948 respectively. They had no knowledge of any sickness of HELEN during early 1948. They pointed out, however, that HELEN became pregnant in the latter part of 1948 and had been quite sick during her pregnancy.

Mr. HARRY AGELOFF, 70-11 108th St, Forest Hills, NY, advised that he has been the family physician for the SOBELL family for the past 2 years. Mrs. SOBELL first visited him in November, 1948 at which time she was found to be pregnant. Her history of past illnesses as furnished to Dr. AGELOFF reflect only that she had been pregnant eleven years ago and that as a child she had suffered from infantile paralysis which left her with a weakness in her left foot. Dr. AGELOFF noted that Mrs. SOBELL had called him recently and intended to bring her baby in within the next two weeks. At that time, Dr. AGELOFF stated he would try, if possible to do so discreetly, to question Mrs. SOBELL more closely concerning past illnesses with particular respect to early 1948. If he learns any further information he advised he would notify the writer.

A review of instant file fails to reveal any information indicating that HELEN SOBELL was ill in early 1948. It is noted that in 1948, according to the records of Columbia University, NYC, HELEN SOBELL did graduate work in Physics at Columbia University from 1948 to 1950.

It is suggested that, if deemed necessary, Mrs. HELENE ELITCHER might be asked if she knows of any illness of HELEN SOBELL during the early part of 1948.

He stated that Mr. HUGHES is now on vacation and will return to New York 8/21/50.

Miss ROSE APRIL, Secretary of the Bright Steel Corp, 532 West 22nd St., NYC, stated that the president of the corporation is on a business trip and is not available at this time. She stated that the Bright Steel Corp. has done no business with the firm since June, 1950. She stated that the transactions were entirely made up of sales of steel by the Bright Steel Corporation to the Pitt Machine Products Inc. Firm. Miss APRIL stated that there was nothing but a buyer and seller business relationship between the two firms.

A check of references in the NY Office reflected nothing derogatory pertaining to Bright Steel Corp.

Reference memo of SA JOHN A. HARRINGTON, September 22, 1950, in the case entitled "JULIUS ROSENBERG, ESPIONAGE - R," wherein a lead was set forth to determine if Mrs. RUSSELL MC NUTT was ill in early 1948, it being noted that DAVID GREENGLASS had furnished information to the effect that JULIUS ROSENBERG had furnished quite a sum of money to one of his "boys" whose wife was sick in early 1948.

It will be noted that Mrs. RUSSELL A. MC NUTT, accompanied by her daughter RONDA, left New York City on March 25, 1947 for Caracas, Venezuela. According to Mr. J. J. COLLINS, Vice President of the Raymond Concrete Pile Company, New York City, Mrs. MC NUTT resided at Caracas, Venezuela, until April 13, 1949, at which time the MC NUTT family returned to New York City. Inasmuch as Mrs. MC NUTT was out of the United States during the pertinent period, it could not be determined if she was ill during the early part of 1948.

The firm was incorporated at 1450 Broadway, NYC. [REDACTED] stated that the firm has a good record with the bank and is considered reliable.

Investigation at 1450 Broadway, reflected that the firm is not located at that address. It is suggested that that address might be an attorney's office where the papers were signed and not an operational office of the firm.

Mr. MAX SPILLMAN, Treasurer and shop manager, Maramac Screw Machine Products, Inc., 2395 Pacific St, Brooklyn, NY, stated that his firm did a partial job for Pitt Machine Products, Inc. on May 4, 1950. His firm did not complete the job because the material furnished by PITT was faulty. The transaction was finally settled by Maramac paying Pitt \$18.54 by check through Maramac's Attorneys, DEMOV, CALLAHAN and MORRIS. SPILLMAN stated that members of his firm were not personally acquainted with members of Pitt Machine Products, Inc.

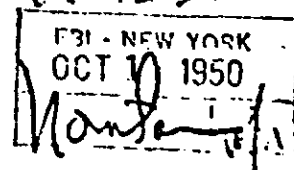
I pointed out that SOBELL and ROSENBERG had applied for reduction in bail which would be heard the afternoon of 10/16/50.

Awad 325 East Walnut St., Long Beach, N.Y. was recontacted and advised that in the summer of 1948 she rented her home to STEVE KOVAT who owned the Maxwell Liquor Corp. 1657 1st Ave. at 86th Street, New York City. His business phone was Atwater 9-9575 and his unlisted residence phone was Belicott 2-3541. Mrs Awad recalled that the KOVATs moved into her home about 6/27/48. She stated they were good tenants, that Mr KOVAT only came to Long Beach on weekends and that his wife's name was HELEN KOVAT and they had a son JOHN KOVAT who was about 6 or 7 years.

Mrs Awad stated the KOVATs were the only people residing in her home. Mrs Awad stated she had never heard of subject or his wife and was shown pictures of subject and his wife with negative results.

Reference was made that HELEN KOVAT should be interviewed in regard subject. On 7/11/50 a call was made from subject's home in Mineola to Long Beach 1519 in the home of Mrs Awad.

Reference is made to the memorandum of SA JAMES P. LEE, 7/31/50, which requested that the indices on Mrs. HINDA ROSENBERG, 103 Avenue A, New York City, be reviewed and consideration be given to the possibility of interviewing her.

Referenced memorandum stated that on July 25, 1950, Mrs. CYNTHIA UMBDENSTOCK, Secretary to the Rental Manager, Knickerbocker Village, 10 Monroe Street, New York City, advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG had resided in Apartment GE 11, 10 Monroe Street, New York City, from April 15, 1942 to date. Mrs. UMBDENSTOCK advised ROSENBERG moved to 10 Monroe Street from 142 Baruch Place, New York City and at the time of moving had furnished the name Mrs. HINDA ROSENBERG, 103 Avenue A, New York City, as a reference.

Annals Records of the Board of Elections, 76th Assembly District, 6th Election District, New York County, New York, were checked by SE CLINTON E. POLLOCK on September 11, 1950. These records for the year 1942 reflected that one ANNA ROSENBERG, 103 Avenue A, had resided in the state and county for 30 years and 1 1/2 years in the Election District. According to the records ANNA ROSENBERG in 1942 was 47 years old; was born in Russia; was naturalized on May 12, 1941 (place not shown) and was employed by the CASTLE DRESS COMPANY, 245 West 27th Street, New York City. This record indicates that ANNA ROSENBERG was registered under the emblem of the American Labor Party.

Records of the above Board of Elections failed to reflect any registration for a HINDA ROSENBERG from 103 Avenue A in 1942 or 1943; however, the current Manhattan telephone directory reflects a listing for one HINDA A. ROSENBERG, 16 Monroe Street, telephone Beckman 3-2599.

Records of the Board of Elections, Manhattan, New York, were further checked on October 5, 1950 by SE POLLOCK. These records reflected for the year 1943 that ANNA ROSENBERG, 16 Monroe Street, Apartment JH-8, has

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resided in the Election District for eight months and that she last registered in 1942 from 103 Avenue A, New York City. This record reflected that ANNA ROSENBERG was born in Russia; that she was naturalized on May 12, 1941 in the U. S. District Court, Southern District of New York; that she was divorced; that she was employed as a draper at 245 West 27th Street, New York City; and that she registered under the emblem of the American Labor Party.

Records of I & NS, 70 Columbus Avenue, New York City, reflected that ANNA ROSENBERG, 31 Mount Hope Place, Bronx, New York, was born on August 14, 1894 at Kamenetz, Podolsk, Russia and that she came to the U. S. from Rotterdam, Holland on December 4, 1912, aboard the SS NIEUW AMSTERDAM. According to these records, ANNA ROSENBERG came to the U. S. under the name HINDA NUDEL'AH and married LOUIS ROSENBERG on May 22, 1917 at New York City. This record further reflects that ANNA ROSENBERG'S last foreign address was Kamenetz, Podolsk, Russia; that she was naturalized on May 12, 1941 in the U. S. District Court, Southern District of New York and issued naturalization certificate #4964570.

This record further reflected that ANNA ROSENBERG'S husband, LOUIS ROSENBERG was born in Podolsk, Russia on May 22, 1890; that he became a naturalized citizen of the U.S. on May 24, 1924 in the U. S. District Court, Southern District of New York, and was issued naturalization certificate #2052508. According to these records, ANNA and LOUIS ROSENBERG have two children, BRUCE ROSENBERG, born January 27, 1919, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; and MIRIAM, born March 13, 1936, New York City.

On October 4, 1950, Mr. ROBERT PACKARD, Assistant Manager, Knickerbocker Village, 10 Monroe Street, New York City, advised that ANNA ROSENBERG presently resides at 16 Monroe Street, Apartment JH 8 and that she has resided there since April 1, 1943. Mr. PACKARD stated that prior to April 1, 1943, ANNA ROSENBERG resided at 103 Avenue A and 31 Mount Hope Place, Bronx, New York. According to Mr. PACKARD, ANNA ROSENBERG in 1943 was employed at the CASTLE DRESS SHOP COMPANY, 245 West 27th Street, New York City. Mr. PACKARD stated that according to his records, ANNA ROSENBERG is presently married to JOSEPH SCHUPAK and that ANNA ROSENBERG is presently employed by the MARCIA HAD COMPANY, 721 Broadway, New York City.

Records of the Board of Elections, Manhattan, New York, for the year 1949, reflect that ANNA H. SCHUPAK, 16 Monroe Street, Apartment JH 8, has resided in the state and county for thirty five years and seven years in the Election District. This record reflects that ANNA ROSENBERG was born in Russia; that she was naturalized in May, 1941; that she is now married; and that she last registered in 1948 as ANNA H. ROSENBERG. The record further reflected that ANNA SCHUPAK registered under the emblem of the American Labor Party.

Records of the above Board of Elections further reflected

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that JOSEPH SCHUPAK, 16 Monroe Street, New York City, Apartment JH 8, has resided in the state and county for over twenty-one years and one year in the Election District. This record showed that JOSEPH SCHUPAK was born in Poland; that he was naturalized in the Supreme Court, New York City, July, 1916; that he last registered in 1946 from 1085 Walton Avenue, Bronx, New York, under the name, JOSEPH ROSENTHAL; that his name has been legally changed from ROSENTHAL to SCHUPAK; and that he is presently employed at the MARCIA HAT COMPANY, 721 Broadway, New York City.

In the report of SA THOMAS J. HURLEY, 9/15/49, New York City, JOSEPH SCHUPAK, WAS.; [REDACTED], the following pertinent information is set forth.

Confidential Informant [REDACTED] advised in December, 1944 that JOSEPH SCHUPACK, 1085 Walton Avenue, Bronx, New York, was a member of the West Concourse Club, 2nd Assmeby District of the Bronx County Communist Party.

In July, 1944, an anonymous source advised that JOSEPH SCHUPACK, 1085 Walton Avenue, Bronx, was a delegate to the 6th National IWO Convention, held in New York City on July 2-7, 1944. According to this informant, SCHUPACK joined the IWO in 1935.

On August 10, 1949, JOSEPH SCHUPAK was interviewed under suitable pretext by SA THOMAS J. HURLEY at his place of employment, the MARCIA HAT COMPANY, 721 Broadway, New York City. SCHUPAK stated that he was born in Bodky, Poland on August 25, 1895; that he arrived in the U. S. aboard the SS BLUCHER on August 31, 1910; and that he was naturalized in the Supreme Court, New York City on July 20, 1916. SCHUPAK further stated that he was married on March 31, 1924 in Chicago, Illinois; that on July 16, 1948, he obtained a divorce at Laraine, Wyoming; and that he married his second wife, ANNA ROSENBERG, on September 16, 1948 at Patterson, New Jersey. According to SCHUPAK, he and his wife presently reside at 16 Monroe Street, New York City.

The files of the New York Office reflect the following information concerning ANNA ROSENBERG.

On September 19, 1945, Confidential Informant [REDACTED] made available five pages of names and addresses of persons residing in the Lower East Side of Manhattan, New York. This list was obtained at the East Side Club, Communist Party, 5 Rutgers Street, New York City and was captioned "Worked Last Year". It is believed that this list contained the names of those

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persons of the East Side Club, who were active as CP canvassers during the local New York City elections of 1944. On this list appeared the name of ANNA and LITA ROSENBERG, 16 Monroe Street, Apartment JH 8.

On June 5, 1949, Miss E. GORLAN, Secretary to Judge HAROLD MEDINA, advised that the name ANNA ROSENBERG appeared on a communication sent to Judge MEDINA dated June 4, 1949, protesting the jailing of three members of the National Board of the CP, USA. (It is not known whether the ANNA ROSENBERG mentioned above is identical with the ANNA ROSENBERG residing at 16 Monroe Street.)

The Albany Office by letter dated 4/16/47, captioned "CP, USA, District #2, Albany Field Division; INTERNAL SECURITY - C", made available a photostatic copy of a CP independent nominating petition for the year 1946. This petition reflects that ANNA ROSENBERG, 16 Monroe Street, New York City, signed the above petition on August 27, 1946, on page 859.

On October 28, 1943, a highly confidential source, having access to the headquarters of the New York County Committee of the CP, 147 4th Avenue, New York City, made available to SAS A. ROBERT SWANSON, STEPHEN A. McGARR and JEROME M. GARLAND, information which reflected that ANNA ROSENBERG, 16 Monroe Street, New York City, signed a petition endorsing the nomination of BENJAMIN DAVIS for the office of New York City Councilman, Manhattan in 1943.

In view of the fact that the ANNA ROSENBERG mentioned above is undoubtedly identical with HINDA ROSENBERG, who in 1942 resided at 103 Avenue A, New York City and since she and her husband have been in Communist Party affairs and as recently as 1949 both were registered under the emblem of the American Labor Party, HINDA ROSENBERG will not be interviewed concerning her knowledge of JULIUS ROSENBERG.

On October 5, 1950, BERNARD GREENGLASS, the brother of ETHEL ROSENBERG, was interviewed at the New York Office by SAS JOHN W. LEWIS and EDWIN R. TULLY, at which time GREENGLASS furnished the following information:

He resides at 65 Cannon Street, New York City, telephone Spring 7-3765, and is employed by Fabric Prints, 1441 Broadway, New York City. He stated that he has known JULIUS ROSENBERG since the early 1930's when he started going with ETHEL GREENGLASS. He said that he knew that both JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG were sympathetic to the Communists because they read such literature as the "Daily Worker" and "Soviet Russia Today". He said, however, that neither had ever told him they were members of the Communist Party.

GREENGLASS advised that he had no information to indicate that JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG or DAVID GREENGLASS were engaged in espionage. He advised that he had been associated with JULIUS ROSENBERG in business from 1946 until about September 1949, first in the G & R Company and then the Pitt Machine Products Company, Inc., and that he had lost about \$1,500 because Pitt Machine Products Company, Inc. had failed financially. He said that JULIUS ROSENBERG had agreed to pay him \$1,000 for the shares in Pitt Machine Products Company, which were turned over to ROSENBERG by BERNARD GREENGLASS in the event ROSENBERG should make a financial success of this venture.

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GREENGLASS stated that he has heard that a man named ROSENBERG from New Jersey is now buying the Pitt Machine Products Company, Inc. for \$10,000.00. GREENGLASS said that he is of the opinion that this ROSENBERG is buying the corporation in behalf of HARRY PIETNAK who operates a factory which makes whipped-cream machines. *PIETNAK*

BERNARD GREENGLASS said that he got out of Pitt Machine Products Company, Inc. because it was losing money and also because he was not fond of that business. He said that the business end of that corporation had been handled by JULIUS ROSENBERG, and that DAVID GREENGLASS was in charge of the shop. BERNARD GREENGLASS said that inasmuch as he himself had never been a machinist, his work there was ardently attempting to learn the trade, and that he had found that he was not adapted to this kind of business.

BERNARD GREENGLASS advised that a few weeks before DAVID GREENGLASS was arrested, JULIUS ROSENBERG had told him that he was having some lung trouble and wanted to get away from the city for a few weeks vacation. JULIUS ROSENBERG asked BERNARD GREENGLASS to pay the bills for Pitt Machine Products Company, Inc. during this proposed vacation, and said that it would be necessary to make BERNARD GREENGLASS a Vice President of the corporation so that he could sign the checks. BERNARD said that he signed some papers making him a Vice President, but that JULIUS ROSENBERG had not gone on a vacation, so nothing had developed in this regard.

GREENGLASS said that during his association in business with ROSENBERG, that the latter had been on the job in New York City almost every day when he was able to work. GREENGLASS advised that about twice a year ROSENBERG would be ill with a cold or hay fever which would necessitate his staying away from work for two or three weeks at a time, but that during these periods ROSENBERG would call the plant everyday. GREENGLASS was unable to recall any time that ROSENBERG had left New York City, except for one business trip to Philadelphia during the spring of 1949, and another business trip to Connecticut, probably in 1947. Both of these trips were made by ROSENBERG for the purpose of getting business for Pitt Machine Products Company, Inc.

BERNARD GREENGLASS recognized a photograph of VIVIAN GLASSMAN as a girl named VIVIAN whom he had seen at ETHEL ROSENBERG'S home several times. He also recalled that VIVIAN was at one time the girlfriend of JOEL BARR.

BERNARD GREENGLASS recognized the photograph of MARK PAGE as an individual named MARK who was married to STELLA MARKOWITZ, and recalled that MARK went to some school with JULIUS ROSENBERG. He also recalled that MARK lives in Orange, New Jersey, where he is employed as an engineer of some sort, and that MARK is very arrogant.

BERNARD GREENGLASS advised that he recognized the photograph of JOEL BARR as a man whom he had met a few years ago through JULIUS ROSENBERG. He said that he understood that JOEL BARR is an electrical engineer who once did secret work for Sperry Gyroscope. He said he does not know how JULIUS ROSENBERG met JOEL BARR.

He said that BARR at one time about two years ago brought some of his tools, including some radio testing equipment, to Pitt Machine Products and left them there. He said that BARR came to Pitt occasionally for about two months, where he did some work with these tools and at one time fixed BERNARD'S radio without charge. BERNARD GREENGLASS said he thought that JOEL BARR went to Holland about two years ago for advanced study. He said that he believes BARR'S tools may still be at Pitt Machine Products.

BERNARD GREENGLASS was unable to recognize a photograph of RUSSELL MC NUDD, but believed that JULIUS ROSENBERG had at one time mentioned that he could not borrow any money from an individual named MC NUDD who went to South America.

It will be recalled that DAVID GREENGLASS has previously advised that he borrowed the Oldsmobile of his father-in-law MAX J. PRINTZ, to meet JULIUS ROSENBERG and an unknown Soviet agent in January, 1950-1945.

On October 11, 1950, Mr. MAX J. PRINTZ, 254 Rivington Street, New York City, advised SAS JOHN W. LEWIS and CHARLES P. SILVERTHORN that he was unable to recall that his son-in-law, DAVID GREENGLASS had had a furlough from the Army in January, 1945. He said, however, that he had owned a 1935 Oldsmobile which he sold about 1946 or 1947.

Mr. PRINTZ also advised that during all of DAVID GREENGLASS' furloughs from the Army, he, GREENGLASS, had had a key to this car and was free to use the car at any time he desired, and that DAVID never asked specific permission to use the car on any occasion.

On October 17, 1950, DAVID GREENGLASS furnished the following information to SA JOHN W. LEWIS. While GREENGLASS was connected with Pitt Machine Products Company, Inc:

OSCAR STETNER asked DAVID GREENGLASS to make some sewing machine parts for him. STETNER lived with a family on 3rd or 4th Street between Avenue A and Avenue B in New York City, and had a little space in the office of a printer near his home where he had a lathe. STETNER was a good machinist and had been an engineer in Austria. He served in the Austrian army during the First World War, and was employed by the E. W. Bliss Company doing defense work during World War II. Subsequent to World War II, STETNER spent all of his money trying to perfect a sewing machine, but was unsuccessful in this inasmuch as he died of bleeding ulcers, probably at Mt. Sinai Hospital about 1948.

According to GREENGLASS, STETNER was definitely anti-Communist, but that JULIUS ROSENBERG had agreed to let DAVID GREENGLASS do some work for STETNER although there was no money in it because ROSENBERG considered STETNER to be a nice fellow. STETNER had been a past grand master of the Knights of Pythias, and was probably about 55 years of age when he died.

DAVID GREENGLASS met STEPHEN JAVNA in late 1946 when JULIUS ROSENBERG brought JAVNA to the G and R Engineering Company. ROSENBERG told GREENGLASS that he had known JAVNA in college and had met him again recently at the home of a mutual friend whose identity is unknown to GREENGLASS. GREENGLASS said that JAVNA had been previously employed by the Wright Aeronautical Corporation where he had designed a solenoid pump for feathering the propellers of the XB 36. Subsequent to designing this pump, JAVNA had resigned from the Wright Aeronautical Corporation and started his own firm which he called Magnetic Devices Corporation, which was located in New Jersey over the George Washington Bridge. He said that JAVNA had obtained a contract to produce the above-mentioned solenoid pump and gave the G and R Engineering Company a sub-contract to produce the solenoid core and cap. GREENGLASS said

that JAVNA furnished the G and R Engineering Company with plans for the two parts produced by that company, but never made available the complete plans for the solenoid pump. He said, however, that if JULIUS ROSENBERG had desired to have the complete plans, GREENGLASS feels that he could have obtained them from JAVNA due to their friendship. The original sub-contract which JAVNA gave the G and R Engineering Company called for a payment of \$3,000; however, this was revised and re-revised by JULIUS ROSENBERG until the ultimate payment by JAVNA to the G and R Engineering Company amounted to about \$10,000. GREENGLASS said, however, that his firm did not make enough of a profit on this contract inasmuch as it did not have enough equipment to handle all of the work, and that much of the work was done by the Sturtevant Company in the Bronx.

GREENGLASS said that JULIUS ROSENBERG handled this sub sub-contract with Sturtevant Company, and that his contact man there was unknown to GREENGLASS. GREENGLASS advised that JAVNA gave him the general impression through conversation that JAVNA has radical views although he does not know if JAVNA is a Communist. He recalled that at one time JAVNA stated to GREENGLASS, "I am a Marxist". GREENGLASS said, however, that he did not know whether this remark meant that he was a practical or theoretical Marxist. GREENGLASS recalled that JAVNA said that he at one time had lived in the Washington Heights Section of New York City, and that he was married and had one child although GREENGLASS never met JAVNA'S wife.

DAVID GREENGLASS advised that BEN YELSEY had legally changed his name from BEN YELSKY and that he is the owner of Coil Winders, Inc. in Brooklyn, which is a big firm for a lot of coil winding machines. GREENGLASS said that both the G and R Engineering Company and Pitt Machine Products Company, Inc. did work for YELSEY'S firm, and he considered this firm to be one of Pitt's better sources of business. GREENGLASS said that Pitt had produced coil forms as well as a radar aerial for Coil Winders, Inc.

DAVID GREENGLASS met BEN YELSEY through JULIUS ROSENBERG around 1946 or early 1947. ROSENBERG said that he had gone to school with YELSEY, and that YELSEY is a nice fellow but not political. GREENGLASS said that he interpreted this remark to mean that YELSEY is not a Communist. GREENGLASS said that he also believed that YELSEY may have been JULIUS ROSENBERG'S supervisor in the Signal Corps.

GREENGLASS stated that the business obtained from Coil Winders, Inc. amounted to about \$500 a month at various times, and that Pitt had been able to make a profit from this business. GREENGLASS advised that he regards YELSEY as being a fine man and feels that he would not withhold any information in his possession concerning ROSENBERG.

GREENGLASS stated that the Gordon Sewing Machine Company referred to in referenced memorandum, refers to the Unity Sewing Machine Company which is now out of business. He advised that the Unity Sewing Machine Company was headed by a man named GORDON who is also the owner of the King Sewing Machine at 25 and Broadway, New York City, and that STEINBERG was the salesman for the Unity Sewing Machine Company. GREENGLASS said that he did not know the first names of either GORDON or STEINBERG. He said that the Unity Sewing Machine Company supplied parts to the King Sewing Machine Company, and that the G and R Engineering Company made some plate knives for the Unity Sewing Machine Company, but lost money on this business because Unity did not want to pay a reasonable price for these parts, and also did not want to make the payments until the ultimate sale of the completed product. GREENGLASS said that STEINBERG is the head of the Sewing Machine Dealers Association in New York City, and is also a Republican district captain. He said that STEINBERG is reputed to be a close friend of the racketeer WAXEY GORDON. GREENGLASS is of the opinion that there is no relation between WAXEY GORDON and the GORDON who operates the King Sewing Machine Company.

GREENGLASS said that the G and R Engineering Company about 1947 had a contract with the Universal Luggage Company on 13th Street, New York City, to produce some dies for a machine to punch holes in plastic luggage handles. He said that G and R was defrauded on this contract and got only \$300 for it although it cost G and R much more than that to buy the machinery to make the dies. GREENGLASS said that the president of the Universal Luggage Company was an old man named EICHELHEIMER, and that the foreman of Universal Luggage described in referenced memorandum was a relative of EICHELHEIMER'S whose name is unknown to GREENGLASS. GREENGLASS said that this contract was obtained by JULIUS ROSENBERG, but that he does not know how ROSENBERG happened to make the contact with the firm, and believes it was possibly made through a canvass of the neighborhood. GREENGLASS said that he knows nothing significant concerning the ideological views of members of the Universal Luggage Company.

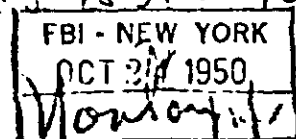

On 10/23/50, I called Inspector Carl Henrich, Bureau, and advised him that USA Irving Saypol, SDNY, had just advised SAAG Thomas J. Donegan, AUSA Roy Cohn, and myself that, in considering the BROTHMAN, MOSKOWITZ, and ROSENBERG cases, it is essential for HARRY GOLD to be brought to New York in order that he may be interviewed to prepare him for trial. Mr. Saypol said he was having AUSA Cohn prepare appropriate papers to have GOLD served and brought to New York, where Mr. Saypol would have him lodge in the Tombs in special quarters provided for government witnesses. Mr. Saypol seemed perturbed that U. S. District Judge McGranery, Philadelphia, has indicated he intends to sentence GOLD 12/7/50.

Mr. Saypol advised that ELIZABETH BENTLEY would be a witness in the BROTHMAN case and in the REMINGTON case and the only matter that gives him concern now is the fact that it might be brought out in trial that BENTLEY received assistance from the foreman of the Grand Jury John G. Brunini in the matter of having her book published. He also stated he had just learned from Mr. Thomas J. Donegan that BENTLEY had retained Mr. Donegan on a matter which might be brought out by the defense. Mr. Donegan pointed out that he had been retained by Miss BENTLEY for three or four months in a civil action but that the public record shows that he (DONEGAN) withdrew from that case prior to the impaneling of the Special Grand Jury and Donegan's appearance before the same in connection with BENTLEY's original testimony to the Grand Jury. Mr. Saypol agreed with Mr. Donegan that this fact could be brought out in an attempt to embarrass the government whether or not Mr. Donegan were present at the council table. Mr. Saypol seemed to be determined that Mr. Donegan take part in the trial of the REMINGTON case.

I further advised Mr. Hennrich that it would now appear that the BROTHMAN case will be called for trial first and the trial date will be set on 10/30/50 for some date early in November, 1950. The government expects this trial to last approximately one week. Mr. Saypol advised that the REMINGTON case will be called on 11/3/50 and, on that date, he is going to attempt to set the REMINGTON case down for trial immediately following the BROTHMAN, sometime in November. The ROSENBERG case is to be called on 12/4/50, at which time Mr. Saypol intends to try and have it set for trial early in January, 1951 inasmuch as he does not wish to try this case before a Christmas Jury.

DORMAN advised that he is not acquainted with the subject or subject's company and related that during August, 1950 Majestic Factors Corp. was conducting an advertising campaign and mailed literature to various firms for soliciting business and that the names of these firms were obtained from the classified Telephone directory which he stated was undoubtedly the reason for this correspondence with Pitt Machine Products.

Mr. C. E. FRANK, Vice-President, N.Y. Office, Reuben H. Donnelly Corp, 305 E. 45th St, NYC, advised that their records reflected that Pitt Machine Products was a subscriber to the classified phone directory which is published by the Reuben H. Donnelly Corp.

Miss A. N. POLCHINSKY, Assistant Manager, Publication Detail Dept., Reuben H. Donnelly Corp., advised that her records indicate that Pitt Machine Products was a former subscriber to the following classified directories published by above company: Brooklyn, Manhattan, Rockaway, Terrytown, Staten Island, Peekskill, Mt. Kisco, Suffolk, Bronx and Yonkers, all in NY. She advised that Pitt Machine Products accounts was on a monthly basis and that is the reason for correspondence with that company.

No contact with the Gibraltar Printing and Publishing Co. was made inasmuch, as the indices of N.Y. Office reflect that this company is Communist although it has not been corroborated.

DAVID and RUTH WEENGLASS reported that JULIUS ROSENBERG had an apartment located in the vicinity of 12th Street and Avenue A, NYC, which ROSENBERG used for espionage purposes. Superintendents of 151 East Seventh Street, NYC, identified photographs of JULIUS ROSENBERG as tenant who occupied apartment 4A, 151 East Seventh Street, NYC, 6-8 months in 1946. Confidential Informant T-1 reported that Miss CARLA SMALL, later Mrs. S. L. JAVIA, occupied apartment 4A, 151 East Seventh Street, NYC, from November, 1948 to February, 1949. Among business cards found at JULIUS ROSENBERG'S residence, 10 Monroe Street, NYC, at time of his arrest on 7/17/50, was one for "Magnetic Devices Corporation, 7514 Woodside Avenue, Elmhurst, NY, telephone Weston 9 - (illegible), S. L. JAVIA". One page of address book found in home of HERBIE BLANT contained name "CARLA".

DETAILS: At New York City, New York

DAVID and RUTH GREENGLASS have advised that through conversations which they had with JULIUS ROSENBERG they ascertained that JULIUS ROSENBERG had an apartment located in the vicinity of 12th Street and Avenue A, New York City, which ROSENBERG had used for possible microfilm work and as a place for interviewing and contacting individuals who were connected with JULIUS ROSENBERG'S espionage parallel.

JULIUS ROSENBERG was arrested by Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation in New York City, on July 17, 1950. He is incarcerated at the Federal House of Detention, New York City, awaiting trial on espionage conspiracy charges.

In 1944, ROSENBERG and his wife ETHEL persuaded RUTH GREENGLASS to go to Albuquerque, New Mexico, and recruit DAVID GREENGLASS as an agent for the USSR by furnishing information concerning the atom bomb project at Los Alamos, New Mexico.

DAVID GREENGLASS is the brother-in-law of JULIUS ROSENBERG, and was formerly a non-commissioned officer in the United States Army. DAVID GREENGLASS was employed as a machinist at Los Alamos, New Mexico, on the atom bomb project from September, 1944 to February, 1946. According to his own admissions, DAVID GREENGLASS had previously been a member of the Young Communist League in New York City, and was sympathetic to the Communist point of view. At the request of JULIUS ROSENBERG, DAVID GREENGLASS furnished atom bomb information to his wife, RUTH GREENGLASS, and HARRY GOLD, Russian espionage agent.

On July 22, 1950, the entire vicinity of 12th Street and Avenue A, New York City, was canvassed by Agents of the New York Office in an attempt to ascertain the location of this apartment which DAVID and RUTH GREENGLASS alleged that ROSENBERG had used in connection with his espionage endeavors.

Mr. and Mrs. FRANK TUSKY, Superintendents for 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, and who reside at 113 Avenue A, New York City, were interviewed by Special Agents WILLIAM R. YATES and DANIEL B. FLEMING on July 22, 1950. Both Mr. and Mrs. FRANK TUSKY positively identified pictures of JULIUS ROSENBERG as a tenant who occupied Apartment 4A, 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, for approximately six to eight months in 1946. Mr. and Mrs. TUSKY advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG and his wife moved out of the apartment because his wife was pregnant, which resulted in her legs being swollen and consequently she could not negotiate the stairs.

Mrs. TUSKY was re-contacted by Special Agent STANLEY J. GRABOWSKI on July 24, 1950, at which time she advised that in approximately July of 1945, a single girl, whose name she could not recall, moved into Apartment 4A at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City. She stated that this girl was employed by the Red Cross. According to Mrs. TUSKY, this girl resided there for a short period and married a man who took occupancy at the 131 East Seventh Street apartment.

Mrs. TUSKY again identified a photograph of JULIUS ROSENBERG as the man who married this aforementioned girl and stated that approximately nine months later, when this girl was scheduled to give birth to a child, both she and the man identified as JULIUS ROSENBERG, moved to Brooklyn, New York. According to Mrs. TUSKY, this couple claimed that the doctor had stated that the girl could not climb four flights of stairs in her condition and therefore they had to get another apartment.

Mrs. TUSKY stated that Apartment 4A was then taken over by a married couple, the man allegedly being ROSENBERG'S brother and his wife being a friend of the girl alleged to be ROSENBERG'S wife, who also was a Red Cross employee. Mrs. TUSKY

stated that she inquired of the new tenants concerning the previous tenant's new baby and she was told that the baby was fine and that the previous couple was moving from Brooklyn to another city unknown to Mrs. TUSKY. Mrs. TUSKY stated that the second couple resided in this apartment for only a couple of months.

Mrs. TUSKY advised that one day tenants in the building told her that the second couple had moved out at approximately 6:00 a.m. that day, and that two girls were now residing in the apartment. Mrs. TUSKY had not known nor had she been advised of the change in tenants. Mrs. TUSKY believes that the apartment and key have been turned over to the girls by the previous tenants. Mrs. TUSKY stated that one of the girls, a Red Cross worker, was named GLASS or GLASSMAN and continues to reside in the apartment. Mrs. TUSKY stated that when the landlord learned of the change, he at first was inclined to refuse to give the girls the apartment, but upon the pleas of one of them that she had already given up her previous residence at Ninth or Tenth Street and Avenue 4, the landlord relented but made her sign a lease for over a year.

It is believed that the two girls mentioned by Mrs. TUSKY are VIVIAN and ELEANOR GLASSMAN.

VIVIAN GLASSMAN, 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, Apartment 4A, is a Social Service Worker employed at the United Service for New Americans, 15 Park Row, New York City. She is the former fiancée of JOEL BARR, who has been identified as a Soviet espionage agent. VIVIAN GLASSMAN, upon interview, acknowledged that she was very friendly with JULIUS ROSENBERG and his wife ETHEL, but denied any knowledge of espionage activities. VIVIAN GLASSMAN admitted that on July 21, 1950, an unknown man visited her at her apartment and identified himself as a friend of JOEL BARR. This man asked VIVIAN GLASSMAN if she would make a trip to Cleveland, Ohio, to see her friend, an aeronautical engineer who is interested in her sister ELEANOR, and ask him to go to Mexico. The stranger provided VIVIAN GLASSMAN with \$2,000.00 in cash to give to the aeronautical engineer.

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VIVIAN GLASSMAN, under the alias of S. GOLDBERG, made the requested trip and called upon WILLIAM PERL and informed PERL of the stranger's visit and his request that PERL leave for Mexico. PERL refused to accept the money and VIVIAN GLASSMAN returned to New York the following day. A week later, the unknown man again appeared at her apartment to inquire as to whether or not she had made the trip to Cleveland, Ohio. VIVIAN GLASSMAN informed him that PERL refused the money. VIVIAN GLASSMAN stated that she returned the \$2,000.00 to the unknown man and has not seen him since. VIVIAN GLASSMAN claims that the identity of the individual who furnished the \$2,000.00 is unknown to her. VIVIAN GLASSMAN has refused any further interview.

Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, reported that the utilities for Apartment 4A, 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, were connected on November 27, 1945, for Miss CARLA SMALL. This account was changed from Miss CARLA SMALL to Mrs. S. L. JAVIA, on June 20, 1946. On February 2, 1948, the responsibility for the utilities of this apartment was changed from Mrs. STEVE L. JAVIA to Miss VIVIAN GLASSMAN. Confidential Informant T-1 reported that Miss GLASSMAN was employed by the United Service for New Americans, 15 Park Row, New York City, as an Immigration Consultant, and resided at Apartment 4A, 131 East Seventh Street, New York City. Confidential Informant T-1 reported that VIVIAN GLASSMAN had previously been employed as an Assistant National Director, Personnel Service Department, National Maritime Union, for one and one-half years.

Confidential Informant T-1 exhibited a communication which reflected that the account of CARLA SMALL JAVIA at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, was closed as of April 1, 1949, and was to be reopened at that time in the name of VIVIAN GLASSMAN.

Confidential Informant T-1 reported that by letter dated March 3, 1948, Miss CARLA SMALL, Magnetic Devices Corporation, P. O. Box 112, Palisades Park, New Jersey, requested that the gas and electric service at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, be discontinued effective April 1, 1949. It was further requested that the bill be forwarded in care of Miss VIVIAN GLASSMAN, 131 East Seventh Street, New York City. Miss CARLA SMALL

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requested that her \$10.00 deposit be refunded to her at Box 112, Palisades Park, New Jersey.

Confidential Informant T-1 reported that by letter dated March 10, 1948, Miss CARLA SMALL, P. O. Box 112, Palisades Park, New Jersey, was advised that she discontinued service at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, on June 3, 1946, and that a check and refund of deposit was mailed to her on December 17, 1947, but was returned by the Post Office Department. According to Confidential Informant T-1, Miss CARLA SMALL received her refund with the communication of March 10, 1948.

Confidential Informant T-1 reported that on November 16, 1946, STEVE JAVIA, Apartment 4A, 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, telephone number GR 3-6216, complained that all lights were out in his apartment.

Among the business cards which were found at JULIUS ROSENBERG'S residence, 10 Lenox Street, New York City, by Agents of the New York Office who searched his apartment in connection with ROSENBERG'S arrest on July 17, 1950, was one for the "Magnetic Device Corporation, 7614 Woodside Avenue, Elmhurst, New York, telephone number Newton 9 - (illegible), S. L. JAVIA".

Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, reported that in 1946, CARLA JAVIA, born in 1922, was a member of the International Workers Order's Lodge #500, which met at 77 Fifth Avenue, New York City.

The current Queens Telephone Directory failed to reflect a listing for the Magnetic Devices Corporation. The Bergen-Passaic County, New Jersey Telephone Directory reflects that the Magnetic Devices Corporation is located at 103 South Van Brunt Street, Englewood, New Jersey, telephone number Englewood 3-4699. The Bergen-Passaic Telephone Directory also reflects a listing for S. L. JAVIA at 234 Jefferson Avenue, Tenafly, New Jersey, telephone number Englewood 3-7633A.

One page of ALFRED SARANT'S address book contained the name "JAVIA". Beneath this name appears the telephone number LO 3-3459. Below that is 292 8th.

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ALFRED SARANT and his wife LOUISE have advised that they were members of the Communist Political Association during 1943 and 1944. ALFRED SARANT denied that he ever engaged in any espionage for the Russian Government or worked as an agent for JULIUS ROSENBERG. SARANT admitted acquaintanceship with ROSENBERG while SARANT was a resident of New York City from 1942 to 1946. SARANT advised that ROSENBERG once propositioned him but that he (SARANT) did not "bite".

ALFRED SARANT was interviewed by Special Agents HERMAN C. LITTLEJOHN and ROBERT F. ROYAL on July 28, 1950. SARANT stated that he recalled STEVE JAVNA and that he possibly may have contacted him at some time pertaining to employment or for some other purpose. SARANT stated that he believes that STEVE JAVNA was connected with the Magnetic Devices Corporation.

Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, reported that a deposit of \$1,000.85 was made in the bank account of G and R Engineering Company at the Manufacturers Trust Company, 370 Grand Street, New York City, on March 14, 1947. This deposit consisted of a check of the Magnetic Devices Corporation. JULIUS ROSENBERG and DAVID GREENGLASS were principals in the firm of G and R Engineering Company.

Miss VIVIAN GLASSMAN advised Special Agent RICHARD T. HRADSKY that she moved into her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, in July of 1947, but anticipating trouble in getting utilities service, arranged with the previous tenant, Mrs. STEPHEN JAVNA (CARLA SWALL), to keep the utilities service in her name and she would pay Mrs. JAVNA the utilities cost by money order. Miss GLASSMAN stated that the JAVNAS paid the telephone and electric bill and retained the service at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, in the name of JAVNA, until sometime in 1948, when VIVIAN GLASSMAN had the change made over to her name.

VIVIAN GLASSMAN claims that a brother-in-law of CARLA JAVNA, name unknown, occupied the 131 East Seventh Street, New York City apartment from about January to July, 1947, before she took over the apartment. Miss GLASSMAN believes that the

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brother-in-law went to Texas.

VIVIAN GLASSMAN stated that she knew CARLA SMALL before her marriage to STEVE JAVNA. She said that CARLA SMALL was a social worker, as was VIVIAN GLASSMAN in 1945, and that they may have met at the Brooklyn State Hospital, where VIVIAN GLASSMAN was employed evenings as an Apprentice Psychologist while attending Columbia University, where she was studying for her Masters Degree.

STEPHEN L. JAVNA was reinterviewed on August 16, 1950, at Englewood, New Jersey, and the following signed statement was obtained from him:

"In the Spring of 1946, I believe that VIVIAN GLASSMAN visited my apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, in the company of JULIUS ROSENBERG. To the best of my recollection, she introduced him as a 'friend of the family'. On this occasion, I recognized his face as having attended C.C.N.Y. at approximately the same time I did. To the best of my recollection, we had no business dealings at this meeting, nor did we discuss any future dealings. This meeting was purely accidental. I had not seen him at all since college days and the meeting was not of my contrivance. I am fairly certain that the man with VIVIAN GLASSMAN was JULIUS ROSENBERG, but since I had no reason at the time to remember the incident, I cannot be positive. I do not recall ever seeing VIVIAN GLASSMAN in the company of JULIUS ROSENBERG after this occasion. To the best of my knowledge, this was the only time JULIUS ROSENBERG was over at my apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, or at any other residence of mine."

STEPHEN L. JAVNA further advised that he met VIVIAN GLASSMAN in early 1945, on a blind date. STEPHEN JAVNA stated that this blind date with VIVIAN GLASSMAN was at a house party at the home of an individual he cannot recall at this time. JAVNA stated that this was his one and only date with VIVIAN GLASSMAN, and that he was not very well acquainted with her since that time. JAVNA said that he does not remember seeing VIVIAN GLASSMAN and ROSENBERG together on any occasion, except that mentioned in the previous statement. JAVNA advised that he never saw VIVIAN GLASSMAN

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after he and his wife moved from their apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, in August of 1946. JAVNA advised that VIVIAN GLASSMAN was not present when he talked with DAVID GREENGLASS. He said that he knew of no association between VIVIAN GLASSMAN and DAVID GREENGLASS. JAVNA stated that he believes that the incident whereby GLASSMAN brought JULIUS ROSENBERG to JAVNA'S apartment in the Spring of 1946, was not any planned action of GLASSMAN'S, but he believes that she was probably in the neighborhood and thought she would drop in for a visit.

Miss CATHERINE COLLINS, Secretary to Dr. CLARENCE R. BELLINGER, Superintendent, Procklyn State Hospital, 681 Clarkson Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, made available to Special Agent RAYMOND J. RUCKEL, a file concerning CARLA SMALL, which reflected the following information:

CARLA SMALL was employed by the Brooklyn State Hospital from September 9, 1943 to November 30, 1944. CARLA SMALL commenced her employment as an Attendant Social Worker and was promoted to a Social Worker (psychiatric) on August 26, 1944. Her services were noted as satisfactory.

The file contained a handwritten application dated September 9, 1943, which contained the following information:

The file contained a typewritten letter from
CARLA SKILL to the Brooklyn State Hospital, dated August 24, 1943,
in which CARLA SKILL is seeking a job at the Brooklyn State Hospital.

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In this letter CARLA SMALL states that she is especially interested in psychiatric testing and claims that she just completed several graduate courses at Columbia University in Intelligence Testing, Tests and Test Construction, and Psychometrics, and that she eventually expected to do Psychiatric Social work.

The file also contained a letter to the Brooklyn State Hospital from MORDECAI KESSLER of the Educational Alliance, East Broadway and Jefferson Streets, New York City, dated February 1, 1946, requesting information concerning Mrs. CARLA SMALL JAVNA, who applied to the Educational Alliance for a position in their kindergarten school. The seal stamped on the letter indicated that the Educational Alliance was affiliated with the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies of New York.

On September 14, 1950, DAVID GREENGLASS advised Special Agent JOHN A. HARRINGTON that in about September, 1946, JULIUS ROSENBERG told him that he had been to a friend's house and had met an old schoolmate, STEVE JAVNA, a Hungarian. JULIUS ROSENBERG told DAVID GREENGLASS that STEVE JAVNA was working for the Wright Aviation Company on the design and development of a solenoid pump, which was to be used to feather propeller blades hydraulically for the XB36 Airplane. ROSENBERG told GREENGLASS that JAVNA informed him that he had quit his job with the Wright Aviation Company and had opened his own company called the Magnetic Devices Company, in Long Island City, New York, and had later moved his business and residence to New Jersey. JAVNA told ROSENBERG that he had obtained a contract for the manufacture of this solenoid pump. JULIUS ROSENBERG told DAVID GREENGLASS that he had been able to persuade JAVNA to let the G and R Engineering Company have a sub-contract for the manufacture of certain parts of the pump. DAVID GREENGLASS stated that JAVNA gave the contract to the G and R Engineering Company, which company made about thirteen hundred pairs of parts for the pump.

DAVID GREENGLASS stated that he met JAVNA in the shop very often and that on one occasion he went out with JAVNA to buy a certain machine part (a comparison block to check micro-inch finish). GREENGLASS stated that during the time that he was out with JAVNA, JAVNA spoke politically and indicated that he was a

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Marxist. DAVID GREENGLASS stated that he had no other information concerning JAVIA, except that JULIUS ROSENBERG stated that he knew JAVIA from college.

Mrs. ROSE TUSKY, 113 Avenue A, New York City, Superintendent for the apartment house located at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, was recontacted on August 14, 1950. Mrs. TUSKY identified photographs of CARLA SMALL JAVIA, STEVE JAVIA, and JULIUS ROSENBERG as former tenants of Apartment 4A at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City. Mrs. TUSKY could not identify the photograph of ROSENBERG'S wife and stated that she had never seen her before. Mrs. TUSKY stated that a brother of STEVE JAVIA also resided in Apartment 4A for a time, but that she does not recall even the approximate dates. Mrs. TUSKY advised that she does not have any record reflecting the identity of the former tenants in Apartment 4A. She added that the tenancy of this particular apartment was "a very mixed up affair". Mrs. TUSKY advised that the present occupant, VIVIAN GLASSMAN, has resided in Apartment 4A for about four years.

Mrs. EDWARD STRESS, 113 Avenue A, New York City, daughter of Mrs. ROSE TUSKY, identified photographs of CARLA and STEVE JAVIA as former tenants of Apartment 4A, 131 East Seventh Street, New York City. Mrs. STRESS recognized a photograph of JULIUS ROSENBERG, stating that she has seen him before, but did not know him to be a tenant at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City.

Miss M. VAN WYCK, Personnel Department, American Red Cross, New York Chapter, 315 Lexington Avenue, New York City, located a record which reflected that CARLA SMALL, 27 Darwood Place, Mount Vernon, New York, Social Security #075-13-4260, was employed as a Junior Social Worker at the New York Chapter of the American Red Cross, from May 2, 1945, to November 24, 1945, at which time CARLA SMALL left to be married.

The Manhattan Marriage Records reflected the following information on Records #33713-1945: STEPHEN LEWIS JAVIA and CARLA SMALL obtained a marriage license on December 13, 1945, and were married on December 23, 1945, at New York City. The

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witnesses to the marriage were HAROLD ROSENBLUM and IRVING OLSHEVER. The address of both STEPHEN JAVNA and CARLA SMALL was noted as 131 East Seventh Street, New York City. STEPHEN LEWIS JAVNA was born on September 1, 1918, at the Bronx, New York. His occupation was listed as an Engineer. His father, SAMUEL, was listed as having been born in Russia, and his mother, CELIA MOSKOWITZ, was also listed as having been born in Russia. CARLA SMALL was born on October 15, 1922, at New York City. Her occupation was listed as a Social Worker. Her father, HARVIN, was born in the United States, and her mother, BLANCHE ABRAMS, was also born in the United States. This was the first marriage for both of them.

Confidential Informant T-5, of known reliability, advised that Blue Cross Contract #2758488 was issued to STEPHEN LEWIS JAVNA and reflected the following information:

The records of the Consolidated Edison Company, New York City, reflect that Apartment 4A at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, was occupied by Miss LENA PALMER or BOLNER, from May 26, 1941 until June 20, 1943, at which time she moved from Apartment 4A to Apartment 4B, at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City. Miss PALMER had formerly resided at 627 East Eleventh Street, Second Floor, New York City.

On August 12, 1943, the utilities were connected in Apartment 4A, 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, for Mrs. SOFI MELNYK, who resided there until November 17, 1943. Mrs. MELNYK previously resided at 1451 Madison Avenue, Apartment 15, New York City. Upon leaving 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, Mrs. MELNYK furnished her forwarding address as 5201 Second Avenue, Brooklyn, New York (a restaurant).

Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, reported that one Mrs. C. SMALL, 4011 Vernon Boulevard, was a subscriber to the "Worker" and that her subscription would expire on July 25, 1946.

No identical references concerning Mrs. SOFI MELNYK were located in the New York Files. There is a reference to one S. MELNYK, 319 Second Avenue, New York City, whose name appeared on a subscription list to the "Ukraine".

It was noted that the records of the Consolidated Edison Company reflected that one LOUIS BARK resided in Apartment 3A, 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, from April 19, 1940, until July 6, 1945.

By teletype dated August 31, 1950, the Newark Office pointed out that the registration cards at the Stotler Hotel, Buffalo, New York, indicated that Miss C. A. SMALL, 1562 Valencia Road, Schenectady, New York, was registered in Room 241, on August 2, and 9, 1950. The Albany Office was requested to identify this Miss C. A. SMALL.

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Special Agent JOSEPH C. WALSH searched the records for the months of June, July, and August, 1946, maintained at the Mexican Consul General's Office, 70 Pine Street, New York City, and at the Mexican Government Travel Service, Room 801, International Building, Rockefeller Center, New York City, for applications for a visitor's card to enter Mexico. No record of such an application by CARLA SMALL JAVIA or STEPHEN JAVIA was noted.

Special Employee GERALD LEVINE reported that he checked the records of the Selective Service, New York City, against the name of STEPHEN JAVIA, 590 Fort Washington Avenue, New York City, but that no record for him could be located. The Selective Service records reflected that JONAS JAVIA, 520 Fort Washington Avenue, New York City, who was born on June 24, 1921, served in the United States Army from February 26, 1945, to October 3, 1943, and had Army Serial W32916332. His mother was listed as CELLA JAVIA, 590 Fort Washington Avenue, New York City, and he has a brother, STEPHEN JAVIA, 590 Fort Washington Avenue, New York City. These records reflected that JONAS JAVIA was a student at Brooklyn College, Brooklyn, New York.

DAVID GREENGLASS reported that JULIUS ROSENBERG stated that he had furnished quite a sum of money to one of his "boys" whose wife was sick early in 1945. There is no information in the New York files that CARLA SMALL JAVIA was ill early in 1945. Referenced report reflects that in the latter part of 1947, CARLA SMALL JAVIA and her husband moved to Englewood, New Jersey.

Mr. BENJAMIN GREENSPAN, Apartment 3a, 1718 Grand Avenue, Bronx, New York, owner of the apartment house located at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, advised Special Agent DANIEL B. FLEMING that he could provide no additional information other than that already given by Mr. and Mrs. BUSKY, as no leases were executed for the years in question.

Mr. GREENSPAN stated that all the rentals had been handled by the TRSKYS and that he had had little contact with the tenants. Mr. GREENSPAN said that the only record that he could find for Apartment 4A was an old lease for a Mr. LECH or LISKY who was an employee of a funeral parlor on the same block. Mr. GREENSPAN stated that this person had occupied the apartment from some time in late 1937 to early 1941, when he left. Mr. GREENSPAN stated that until the present occupant received a lease, he doubted that there had ever been any lease or record kept. Photographs of JULIUS ROSENBERG and other individuals involved in the ROSENBERG parallel were exhibited to Mr. BENJAMIN GREENSPAN but he did not recognize any of them.

Mr. ALFRED SAPANT was questioned by Agents of the Albany Office concerning the name of JAVNA, which was in SARANT'S address book, but she stated that she was unable to furnish any information concerning JAVNA.

The information concerning the re-interview of STEPHEN L. JAVNA on August 16, 1950, at Englewood, New Jersey, was obtained from Newark teletype to New York dated August 17, 1950, regarding VIVIAN GLASSMAN.
