

Ernst is obviously referring to Ethel Rosenberg, nee Greenglass, convicted spy, who was employed by this company from 1932 to 1935, and according to information developed by your office, actively participated in employees' strike against this company. For your information.

Judge IRVING KAUFHAN telephoned me, 12/29/52, to advise that he had, earlier on that date, talked with Assistant to the Director D. M. LADD relative to his mental alarm because of the terrific influx of mail and telephone calls in the ROSENBERG matter. MAUFMAN stated that he, personally, had no fear and marveled at the composure of his wife but did think that it might possibly be derirable for the next several days to have increased alerthess on the part of the New York Police Department in the proximity to his home, which he described as Apartment 5-A, 1185 Park Avenue. I discussed with Judge KAUFMAN the type of protection he felt he desired and indicated that of course Commissioner MONAGHAN would probably want to call him or have one of his officials call him relative to the type of protection to be afforded and might desire to even see the children so that the protecting police would recognize the youngsters when they saw them on the streets. Judge KAUFMAN stated he knew Commissioner MONAGHAN and would be very happy to talk to Commissioner MONAGHAN. We both agreed it was very essential that the entire matter be handled discreetly.

I telephonically contacted Mr. LADD and told Mr. LADD I could see no reason why I should not extend courtesy to the Judge and call Commissioner MONAGHAN. Mr. LADD agreed this was satisfactory.

I thereafter called Commissioner MONAGHAN and presented the situation to Commissioner MONAGHAN, emphasizing the necessity for the entire matter being handled discreetly. Commissioner MONAGHAN stated he would be more than happy to afford the Judge as much assistance as was desired. Commissioner MONAGHAN stated he would either personally get in touch with Judge KAUFMAN or have one of his officers get in touch with Judge KAUFMAN in the immediate future.

The conference adopted a program of activities which included the visiting of all kind of organizations in Canada and asking them to join in the movement to save the lives of the ROSENBERGS; to mobilize public opinion for the ROSENBERG case; individuals and organizations from all over Canada will be urged to send telegrams to the U.S. Supreme Court and to President TRUMAN demanding a new trial for the ROSENBERGS and to set aside the death penalty.

The October 28th conference also decided to organize a large delegation of representatives of different organizations for the purpose of visiting the American Consul in Toronto demanding presidential elemency for the ROSENBERGS.

EDITH ROSENBERG that the movement to save the ROSENBERGS "is now world-wide. This movement is now sweeping every country in the world. The Communist parties, the Pederation of the World Trade Unions and many peace and cultural organizations throughout the world are responsible for the world-wide movement to save the ROSENBERGS."

Mr Russo, reporter for the Sunday Herald, main office Priogeport, Cohn., called 1/7/53 to advise that he is the reporter for the arrestioned paper stationed at Stamford, Conn., telephone no: 455720. He stated that he was desirous of knowing the date and place of the arrest of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg. He then inquired as to whicther or not the landlord had been interviewed. I asked him what landlord he had in mind and without answering my question he then said, it is that I compar who owns a studio in Stamford, Conn., and has been a carp carrying Communist for years was telephoned by me recently in connection with the Rosenberg matter and as soon as I started talking to him about the Rosenbergs Cooper 'blew his stack' and didn't want to answer any questions or have any connection with the Rosenberg situation." I told Nr. Russo that I would see that he was called in response to his inquiry.

I thereafter talked with Mr. wick in Mr. Nichols' office, apprised him of the above conversation, and suggested that inasmuch as the date and place of the arrest of the Rosenbergs was information which had previously been publicized I saw no reason why I should not answer Russo's inquiry. I told Kr. Wick however that inasmuch as the newspaper was located in the New Haven area I should advise New Haven first to see what they knew about the paper and more particularly Russo, second to ascertain if there was anything of any significance in the Rosenberg case that might be of interest to us and third, see that they watched this particular paper to see what articles might be appearing in the newspaper in the next several days that might be of interest to us. Fr. Wick concurred, stating that he thought in any event I should be the one to call Russo back and then suggested that I talk to Mr. Eelmont. I talked with Assistant Director Belmont, apprised him of the above, and he concurred.

I then talked with SA Jack Powell, acting at the New Haven office. SA Powell recalled that the Sunday Herald, Bridgeport, Conn., is the scandar sheet of the State of Connecticut; that the office knows something of husso and knows that they are always digging into sensational news. I asked Fowell what he knew about Charles Cooper and he stated that he has a vague recollection concerning Charles Cooper so I suggested that he check their files and see if there is contained therein anything of significance concerning Cooper and that he should call me by 2:30 if there was anything of significance in their files in inasmuch as I contemplated calling Russo by 2:30. 65-15348 -2/32A

While talking with Powell, Mr. Wick called to advise that the Bureau's records reflected that in 1940 the Sunday Herald was considered to be the Daily Worker paper in Connecticut; that I should therefore be most circumspect in my conversation with Russo at the time I called him and he again wanted to be sure that I was the one to call Russo. I told Mr. Wick that I would furnish him only the date and place of arrest but that if any opportunity offered I would endeavor to find out what his interest was. Mr. Wick agreed that this would be satisfactory.

Shortly thereafter Mr. Powell again called from New Haven and stated that they have a few as does New York 169486) on Cooper, indicating that Cooper was a land admitted having been a member back in 1937; that he is a Security Index subject; that he owns the Peter Gale Studio, Stamford, Conn. In the interimant SA Jack O'Brien, Section D. NYO, advised that the Rosenbergs had lived at the Knickerbocker Village from 1942 to the time of the arrest.

I thereafter telephoned Mr. Russo, advising that Julius Rosenberg was arrested 7/17/50 at 40 Monroe St., Apartment GE 11, Knickerbocker Village, that Ethel was arrested in front of the US Court House 8/11/50. As soonsas I had furnished the above information Mr. Russo said thanks, very much, that he appreciated the information; he said "Oh, in case you're interested and have a couple of minutes I would like to tell you that during the time the Rosenbergs were endeavoring to gain sympathy and also during the time that there was a lot of propaganda concerning the Rosenberg sentence of death, our newspaper received some letters to the editor from persons who obviously were sympathetic to the Rosenbergs, so I went out and interviewed some of these people, asking them how they could reconcile the detailed careful treatment being afforded the Rosenbergs in the US with the manner in which the persons being tried by the Communists in Czechoslovakia had been treated." Russo salo that "some of the answers I got were quite interesting, one of them saying that there was no particular connection between the two cases." Russo then said " In any event the information I got from these interviews was sufficiently good for me to write a couple of articles which resulted in these people moving from where they lived." He said "of course we know where they moved to so it didn't make any difference anyhow." I thanked Mr. Russo for the information without comment.

I suggested to SA Powell while talking to him that the Sunday Herald be followed for the next several days for the purpose of determining whether any articles of interest to the NY office or the Bureau in the Rosenberg case might appear in said paper and to keep us properly advised.

These unforgettable words from H.N. HIALIK's "The City of Destruction" came to mind when I joined the big march demonstration, last "onday, a few hundred yards from the White House.

The march began, at 9:00 h.M., with a few hundred people, and by 12 noon had grown to a people's march of fifteen hundred. The crowd became bigger and thicker from hour to hour. Marching were young and old and of all nationalities and colors.

The author of these lines recognized steel workers and coal miners from Pennsylvania, Ohio and Illinois, and automobile workers from Michigan. Farching were hundreds of Jowish workers from the needle-trades in New York, Chicago, Los Angeles and other cities. Marching with them were Jemish intellectuals, poets, writers and artists.

From her sick bed, in Cleveland, the beloved Negro leader Margaret Thorny Joined the marchers, and malled back and forth, without storning, for 4 hours; and later she made a heart-rending appeal to the Congressmen from Ohio for the lives of the Rosenbergs.

Quietly and with bound head the people murched back and forth from 9:00 A.M. until 4:00 P.M. No one spoke. The hundreds of shields and slopping spoice for themselves ...

The author of these lines joined delegations which held conferences with the Congressmen from Ohio, Hichigan and Pennsylvania.

With the exception of a few Congressmen, the greater rajority listened to the delegations with sympathy and provided they would help influence the Fremident to change the sentence. Finnegan, of Ohio, was the only Congressmen who tried to engage in red-baiting.

The delegations from New York, Illinois, and other states had the same experience with their Congressmen.

The spirit of the Washington demonstration should now be spread to every corner of the land. Save the lives of these innocent victims of wor hypterial

Va., furnished this office with a mimeographed letter which he had received from Sponsoring Clergymen, Box 136, Madison Square Station, New York 10, N. Y. Said letter also contained an enclosure identified as an open letter to the President which the recipient of the letter was to sign and forward to President TRUMAN. The Sponsoring Clergymen are apparently 11 in number and their names appear on the mimeographed letter received by Dr. HOLLISTER. Both of the above pieces of mail are enclosed herewith for the information of the New York Office.

On January 10, 1953, this office was in receipt of a note from WILLIAM VERNER NELSON, Fastor, First Christian Church, Arch and - Montgomery Streets, Pittsburgh 12, Pa., which enclosed duplicate copies of the above-mentioned letters from the Sponsoring Clergymen.

Reverend NELSON advised in his note that the Sponsoring Clergymen were apparently duped into using their names for what appeared to them as a worthy cause. He stated that one of the Clergymen, ROBERT M. HOPKINS, was very well known to him and that he considered HOPKINS 100% American. The material furnished this office by Reverend NELSON is being retained in the Pittsburgh files since it is identical with the material furnished by Dr. HOLLISTER.

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

The last figures which were given to me by HOLLY, bookkeeper for the N.Y. fiste and Mational Civil Rights Congress, show that 763 people participated in the Casiming, R.Y. demonstration for the ROSLIBERGS.





her Mass meeting to greet the "clemency train" delegation to the horanbergs.

The N. Y. State Civil Rights Congress held a mass meeting to greet the delegation to the Rosenbergs of Dec. 21st, 1952, at the Manhattan Towers Hotel in N.Y.C. on Dec. 23rd, 1952.

The chairman of the meeting was Elaine Ross, head of the N. Y. State C.R.C. She opened the meeting with a short report on the Rosenberg delegation of Dec. 21, 1952. She said that the people of the world "took notice" about the visit of 800 people to the Rosenbergs and that "we brought the Rosenbergs case to the people of America: through the press which was compelled to tell the readers that 800 Americans came to great the Rosenbergs with banners and with flowers." She said that "the Rosenbergs are lonely but they are not alone. Millions of people in this country and the world over are with them." She stated that "the Rosenbergs are innocent victims of the cold war" and that "the fight to save their lives will go on until the Rosenbergs will emerge from the prison as free people."

Leon Straus spoke of the war Korea "as an attempt by the well Street imperialists to control or to destroy Korea."
He said that "while Russia, China and the Eastern democracies are marching to freedom the reactionaries of this country are leading the march towards Fascism and war." He stated that "the same forces that killed Sacco and Vangetti are now trying to kill the Rosenbergs. These reactionaries are also trying to destroy the labor movement in this country." Straus declared that "the Rosenbergs are innoc ent victims of the Truman cold war" and he called upon the labor movement to "put all it's energy during the next few wee's to save the lives of the Rosenbergs." He urged everyone to go to the shops, neighborhoods, etc., to talk about the Rosenberg case and make the people demand that the President should extend executive clemency to the Rosenbergs. "The people must be made conscious of the fact that the Rosenbergs are innocent and that the Jewish question has played a big part in the conviction of the Rosenbergs."

Emily Alman said that at this moment "we are interested only in the saving of the lives of the Rosenbergs. The question at the present moment is not their guilt or innocence. Their

lives are at stake and we must save their lives."

She outlined a program of immediate action which included: organization of mass meetings by all groups working to secure clemency for the Rosenbergs; advertising in newspaper; securing the cooperation of mass organizations and influential individuals in the fight for clemency for the Rosenbergs; to secure the participation of labor, religious and professional groups in the national clemency delegation . to Washington on Jan. 5th, 1953; to secure the participation of people from every city and town in the 24 hour visit at the white House starting on Dec. 27, 1952 until Twe win clemency for the Rosenbergs"; to send delegations to every Congreseman and Senator, to Governors, Kayors, Doctors, laywers, etc; to organize large scale distribution of material on the Rosenberg case; door to door visits of all the neighborhoods and the solicitation of letters and telegrams to the President. She appealed to everyone to participate in all of these actions. "We still could save the lives of the Rosenbergs if we will put all our energy into this fight."

Chairman: calls upon everyone present at this meeting to go to the prison to sing Christmas carols to Elizabeth Flynn on Dec. 24th, between 4:45 and 6 p.m.

Chairman asked that all those that participated in the "clemency train" delegation should rise. About 50 people rose. They were greeted by handclaps. The same happened when she asked the Rosalee Ingram delegation of "12 women" to rise. (One of the Ingram delegates was Bell Sondin. She was the same person who chaired the C.R.C. conference on the Rosenbergs which was held at 23 % 26 St., N.Y.C.).

Karen Morley read the speech to the jury on "Evils of War" made by Stoco during the trial of Secto and Vangetti. She told the meeting that this speech of Marteers will always be timely." She told the meeting: It's too late to be afraid. We must fight reaction on every front."

house Union) said that "as long as the Rosenbergs are in jail none of us is free." She spoke about the war in Korea where "negro and white boys are dying for Wall Street" and "should the Rosenbergs be executed the next step will be the seashing of the labor movement and the 3rd World War will follow. This is the pattern of Fascism. For our own safety and for the

safety of the people of the world we must fight to free the Rosenbergs."

Carl Marzani said that "the fight for the Rosenbergs is a test of the power of the progressive movement in the United States. The world is watching us. We must not fail in this supreme struggle against Fascism in this country. He called for donations "to fight to save the lives of the Rosenbergs." The collection was \$511.25. (The money went to C.R.C. for paying of wages and some bills).

She spoke about the trial of the N.Y. Communist leaders and she said: "Our trial will core to an end in the middle of Jan. 1953. We have no illustions about the outcome of the trial, but at the present moment we consider the Rosenberg case is of greater importance. Lets fight to save the lives of the Rosenbergs. Lets fight for peace. Lets fight against the Smith Set."



The Fosenbergs symbolize the nature of the struggle we are in... 



While on the march the marchers gave out to the public leaflets headlined by: "The court of appeals admits Rosenberg trial unfair". (Sample enclosed). I saw that most of the leaflets given to the people were thrown away by them without even glancing on them. Very few people retained these leaflets. I noticed Bernard Bender. (of Qucens). He was shouting the slogan "Clemency for the Rosenbergs and the marchers kept on repeating this slogan.

At Broadway and 45th St. a policeman pulled out one of the marchers from the line and pushed him into the side (45th)

I asked him what he thinks of the demonstration. He said: "It's a fine demonstration. We figure that about 250 people participated in the demonstration.

I talked about this demonstration to the told me that the C.R.C. "as an organization" was not notified about this demonstration. He said it was "a strictly party affair" he said. He himself was notified about the demonstration in the office (on 26 St.) during the day of January the 10th. He told that he also participated in the demonstration. So did Edith Rosenberg who got a phone call on Saturday (10 th) at her home.

said that he thinks that the demonstration a success. "We carried the message of the innocence of the posenbergs to tens of thousands of people. This is of great amportance at the present stage in the Rosenberg case."

I don't think the demonstration was a real success. The marchers were only a few; the public wasn't much interested; very few stopped to look over the marchers; some people who stoped for a minute or so just smiled and walked away. The police force was just watching. I consider that the only effective thing at the demonstration was the voice that came through the loud speaker.

This voice was heard for blocks away and people turned their heads towards the sounds that came through the loud speakers and I noticed many people stoped to listen. In each case the loud speakers (East and West on Broadway) came to an abrupt stop. The demonstration ended at about 8:50 p.m.

The following incident came to my attention on 4 February. A sense of humor warns me to classify it as the "Great Balloon Hoax". Since I have no means of checking on the veracity of the story I pass it on to you for what it may be worth.

Last evening I met my first class of the new Spring Semester in American Literature at Fordham University, School of Education, 302 Broadway, N. Y. C. Although I am attached here at the Academy I have been a visiting lecturer at Fordham for the past several years. One of my students, a Frederic J. Schaefer, who lives in Douglaston, Queens, asked if I would mind dropping him off at Douglaston since he knew from a previous course that I drove to Great Neck in my car. In the course of a conversation while driving he told me of a"funny thing" that happened to him in the course of his day-time job at "the Continental Casualty Company in New York". It seems that there had passed over his desk on that day the renewal of a policy for his. Rosenberg". When I asked him who that was he identified her as "the Communist in Sing Sing". Upon my remarking that that was certainly strange, he said it was an accidental policy in the amount of \$100,000 for loss of life or mutilation on a "scheduled commercial airplane", beneficiary "husband Julius", \$120.00 annual premium. I need not emphasize how fantastic this sounded to me. Since ir. Schaefer seems both young and voluble and was trying to impress me with the inportance of lis job, it may have usen that to prove his importance he gratuitously identified a Rosenberg with the Rosenborgs. This is not at all impossible since he said he was an underwriter", when it is obvious that his youth and inexperience would not qualify him as such. On the morning of 2/16/53 Assistant Director A. H. Belmont telephonically contacted me to advise that Judge Irving Kaufman nad called him to indicate that because of developments in instants weak case Judge Kaufman was again being subjected to telephone vilif cation and a certain amount of office bother which causes Judge Phopelin Raufman to again inquire of the Bureau as to its belief as to whether he should request police protection. I pointed out to Hr. Belmont that of course in connection with the Civil Rights discussion we were having with the NYC PD, as reported in the /illiam J. Brennan case, the World Telegram, 2/16/53 issue, carried a headline reflecting disagreement and that as a consequence Commissioner Monaghan and Colef Inspector Rothengast were in Washington. I pointed out to Mr. Belmont that in view of that development it might be desirable to have SI. Gus Micek make contact with the NYC PD in the event Judge Kaufman decides he desires police protection. Mr. Belmont stated that the matter would be presented to the Director and he would subsequently contact me.

it 3:35 PM Mr. Belmont called and requested that I contact Judge kaufman and explain to him that while the FEI knows of no premeditated action of the Party to cause him or his family any harm it is entirely possible that some crank or crackpot may take the matter into his own hands and such a situation cannot be intelligently anticipated. I should point out to Judge Kaufman that Mr. Hoover states that after Judge Kaufman has carefully weighed the advantages and disadvantages of having police protection, if there is any doubt in Judge Kaufman's mind thereafter he should resolve in fevor of requesting protection. Mr. Belmont said that in the event Judge Kaufman does so resolve that we should indicate that we will be more than pleased to make appropriate contact with the police to insure that he does receive adequate protection. Mr. Belmont stated that in his conversation with Judge Kaufman the latter indicated he had talked with CCA Judge Medina who had indicated that during the trial of the CP leaders Judge Medins had had police protection. Mr. Belmont said that I should specifically point out to Judge Kaufman the fact that Judge hedina did have FBI protection while Judge Medina was outside of the NYC limits; that should Judge Kaufman take a trip out of NYC and desire Agent protection we would be more than pleased to afford him the necessary protection. I indicated to Mr. Belmont · that we would immediately make contact with Judge Kaufman. Belmont stated that the New York office should closely follow

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this situation and in the event there was any indication that the Commun sts were threatening any of the prominent persons involved in instant matter we should immediately inform the Bureau concerning the full details.

Immediately upon the conclusion of my telephone call with Mr. Belmont I telephonically contacted Judge Irving Kaufman and apprised him that I had just finished talking with Mr. Belmont and that Mr. Belmint in turn had been talking with Mr. Hoover relative to Judge Kaufman's earlier conversation with Mr. Belmont. I apprised Judge Kaufman along the lines indicated above. Judge Kaufman stated that he sincerely appreciated the very careful consideration afforded his request and that he has decided that he will telephonically contact his wife this afternoon and if he decides he desires police protection he will thereafter contact me. It was decided between Judge Kaufman and myself that if Judge Kaufman desires protection that this office will make the necessary contact with the police authorities who in turn will then contact Judge Kaufman and arrange with Judge Kaufman for such protection as Judge Kaufman desires. I carefully pointed out to Judge Kaufman that should he leave the city and desire any protection he should telephonically inform me and the necessary arrangements to afford him protection will be consummated.

Pending the receipt of a telephone call from Judge Kaufman, no further action is being taken.

ADDENDUM:

Judge Kaufman called later on to advise that he had talked the matter over with his wife and they both desired police protection. I thereafter telephonically contacted 1st Deputy Commissioner Fristensky, advised him of the situation, and specifically requested that the fact that the police department is affording Judge Kaufman police protection should be kept entirely confidential so as to avoid newspaper publicity. Commissioner Fristensky stated that he was certain that publicity could be avoided and that he would personally telephonically contact Judge Kaufman as soon as we completed our conversation.

at 5 PM I telephonically contacted Judge kaufman's chambers and inasmuch as Judge Kaufman was then on the telephone I inquired of Judge Kaufman's secretary whether he had as yet been contacted by the police department. She stated that he had already received a telephone call from the police. I told her to tell Judge Kaufman that if he had any difficulty whatsoever in making satisfactory arrangements to contact me further so that I could iron the whole thing out for him.



Judge Irving Kaufman telephonically contacted me at 1:30 PM and advised that in view of the decision of the Circuit Court of Appeals that the date set for the Rosenberg execution should be withheld until March 30th to permit the Supreme Court ample time for review, Judge Kaufman was of the opinion that he would not need the police protection being afforded him by the MYC PD. With that thought in mind Judge Kaufman had talked with Deputy Chief Neilson of the NYC PD and had remarked that he probably would not need the protection. Neilson, according to Judge Kaufman, stated that he felt Judge Kaufman should continue to receive the protection until the termination of the affair. Judge Kaufman stated that he had told Neilson that he would talk the matter over with Lee Boardman of the FBI before arriving at a final conclusion. Judge Kaufman then asked me what my views were. I told Judge Kaufman that of course in view of the Neilson observations it was very difficult for me to make a statement. I then discussed with Judge Kaufman various possibilities, pointing out that since the case had been delayed the pressure in the minds of the Communists was alleviated to a degree and it could be concluded that there was still hope for the Rosenbergs. I pointed out that persons thinking the matter out intelligently might therefore decide it would be disadvantageous to the Rosenberg cause to make any threats against the presiding Judge. I then pointed out to Judge Kaufman that of course the primary concern insofar as he was concerned would be on the part of cracknots or cranks who might not be prone to think things out in a logical manner. Judge Kaufman concurred and we both arrived at the conclusion that Judge Kaufman should take no precipitous action in the matter but should think it over for the next several days and thereafter decide whether he considered the personal inconvenience of being continuously accompanied by bodyguards outweighed the possible threat of injury to himself or members of his family. I told Judge Kaufman that in the final analysis the decision would have to be made by himself.

I thereafter telephonically contacted Assistant Director Al Belmont and apprised him of the above conversation. Mr. Belmont concurred with me that the Pureau should not place itself in a position of recommending that Judge Kaufman did not need police

Judge IRVING KAUFMAN telephoned me 9:55 AM, 2/19/53 to ad-mine vise that he would appreciate my contacting the New York City Police CLER Department and advising them that leaving a uniformed policemen win woll iront of his apartment building is sufficient protection for the HEF CLERK time being and that he desired that the detectives assigned to SERRERY UNIT him be relieved of their assignment.

Judge KAUFMAN asked me if I did not think this was a sound Jecision. I hesitated, at which time Judge KAUFMAN commented "OK, I won't put you on the spot, but that is my decision." I then informed Judge KAUFMAN that I would be more than pleased to telephonically apprise Commissioner MONAGHAN of Judge KAUFMAN'S request.

Judge KAUFMAN then asked whether I had had an opportunity to-reflect upon the Circuit Court of Appeals decision in instant case. I tolayim of course, was cognizant of it, at which time Judge KAUFMAN stated he felt that the court had acted without the full facts, saying "Of course, I mean LEARNED and GUS", apparently having reference to CCA Judges LEARNED HAND and AUGUSTUS HAND. Judge KAUF-MAN then went on to say "I would like to see the Department of Justice take a firm stand on this matter and appeal directly to the Supreme Court for an immediate decision." He stated the Department has already taken a very strong position with the President and that the President had already declined Presidential pardon. Judge KAUFMAN then commented he can foresee that this case can go over until fall. He then reviewed briefly that the defense counsel has until March 30 to submit new briefs; that the Supreme Court sits only for two weeks in April; that if the Supreme Court does rule adversely, the defense counsel then has 25 additional days for reargument, which would probably bring the case up into the early part of June, and inasmuch as the Supreme Court recesses in June, they probably would not have reached a decision prior to recessing, meaning, therefore, that final decision would not be reached in instant matter until possibly the fall of 1953. Judge KAUFMAN then observed that of course in the intervening period of time, the propagandists would have an excellent opportunity to completely air the entire matter.

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I asked Judge KAUFMAN whether he had made these facts known to U. S. Attorney MYLES LANE. Judge KAUFMAN stated he had discussed it with MYLES LANE but that in his opinion, MYLES LANE was not affirmatively interested in view of his probable lack of tenure of effice at this time. I asked Judge KAUFMAN if he desired that I bring his comments to the attention of the officials in Washington. He stated he didn't think it would be desirable for there to be any indication that he was taking an affirmative position in instant what I will do is go to Assistant U. S. Attorney KILSHEIMER and suggest the possibility to him that the U. S. Attorney's Office nove aggressively in this matter."

Judge KAUFMAN then said actually, he had just been talking to me as a sounding board for his views and he then indicated that really, the purpose of his call was to ask me to contact the New York Police Department relative to protection.

I informed Judge KAUFMAN I would be more than pleased to contact Commissioner MONAGHAN.

Commissioner MONAGHAN stated he would be more than pleased to comply with the Judge's wishes in instant matter:

On Saturday, 1/10/53, night, I attended a mass demonstration to ask elemency for JULIUS and ET EN HOSEMIERC, at Froadway and 4 St., Times Sc.



Lt about 8:40 a whirring so und was heard coming from above the Camel sign we all locked up as smoke kept pouring out of the man's wouth and soon there was a blaring sound from an amplifier on the third or fourth floor of the Hotel Claridge telling us about a man and woman at this moment in the death house in Sing Sing, JULIUS and ETHEL HOSENPING who were going to die this Thursday for alledge to ssing the secret of the atom bomb to Russia, the voice continued and pleaded for all to write or wire President Truman to commute their death sentence.

The voice continued time and time again to repeat the same words but still no sign from the demonstrators, we looked up.in astroishment and pleasure at the hidden voice, coming out of the Eotel and then continued to walk on.

The people walking also looked up and the Police seemed taken by this rush, they did not expect such a thing.

At the first sign of the voice leaflets noured out of a window in the hotel and fluttered down into the street where the people gathered them up, some to read them and pocket them others to tear them in disgust.

A few people carried signs, "Clemency for the ROSENEERCS", and other distributed leaflets and we marched back and forth mingling with the crowd and this added to the confusion of the cops who when they were not tearing signs from the pickets, were trying to break up the demonstration which was not there when they turned around.

. A few policemen were erregent and fresh but they were handical ped because they could not distinguish between the ordinary passerby and

the demonstration.

We walked back and forth for a few minutes, the loud-speaker in the meantime had ceased to issue its plea and all was quiet except for the passing crowd, and then suddenly as lefore a whirring sound this time from the Hotel Astor on the top floor and then the same voice uttering the same plea and everyone again taken by surprise and we who knew feeling happy inward because of the ingenuity displayed by the Party to gain the attention of the people.

The voice repeated its plea several times and then in the midst of its plea was shut off and the window was closed.





ACTIVITIES COMPENS

A meeting of the Finance Committee of the Civil Righte Commess was held on January 15, 1953 at the Library at 23 West 26th Street, New York.

ID (ELFURD ROYCE) was chairman of the meeting. He opened the meeting with a few remarks in which he stated that this meeting was called for the purpose of "Edopting a program of action to improve the finances of the C.R.C.".

WILLIAM PATTITION came to this moeting as the representative of the Estional Countities of the Civil Hights Compass. He said that "the country is at present going through a dangerous stage - economically and politically. His capital is taking over the government and this means all and things wall birret will do its outpoot to get hisser profits. This will mean the lowering of the living Ethilard of the approach people; it means the breaking up of the approach trade union movement. Having the full force of the government on its side monopoly capital will do everything possible to do sany with all the economic mains labor and the people make during the last twenty years". He said that "we must be on quard against this attempt of Hall Street".

As far as the "political life of the nation", PATRESON said,
"the outlook is just as dark". He stated that "the Bisenhower government
will not end the war in Korea without the strong voice of the people to
do so. The cold war will continue because it brings untold profits
to Vall Street. Risenhower will not stop the witchhunt nor the Smith
Act trials. The way I soo the situation the new administration will
strenghten the political and economic terroristic acts against the
people. Terror because the pattern of the american government. Truman
invented it and Eisenhower will try to improve upon it.". He underlined
that "there is only one way to stop the advance of reaction, which is
trying to destroy, through acts of terror, any opposition in the drive
towards war, it's the organization of the people and especially of the
labor novement to resist these attempts of reaction". He emphasized that

"the C.D.C. will have an important part in this political program - of organizing the people against terror, war or fascism".

He spoke on the Toscoberg case which he characterised "as a terroristic act of government to science the people." He said that the C. R. C. "played and is playing an important role in this case". He said that the "clumency train" to Ossining helped to "dramatise the combary case" more than any other action to save the Resembergs and that this was done by the C.R.C.
