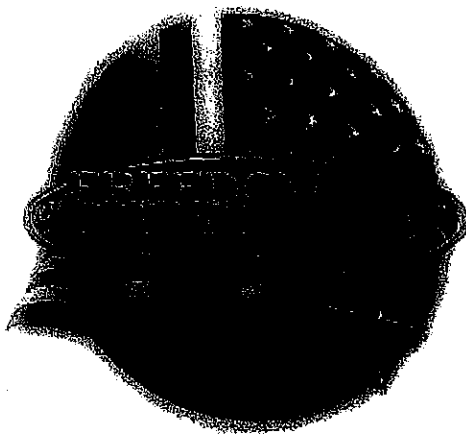

"THE PURPOSE OF THIS MEETING WAS TO STUDY AND BRING ABOUT A "WORK PLAN" FOR THE MORTON SOBELL CAMPAIGN AND ALSO TO HEAR THE REPORT FROM VARIOUS DELEGATIONS AND ESPECCALLY FROM THE SAN FRANCISCO AND LOS ANGELES DELEGATES WHO ATTENDED THE NEW YOR CONFERENCE OF THE NATIONAL COMMITTEE OF MORTON SOBELL.

"THE AGENDA PREPARED FOR THE MEETING WAS MORE OR LESS LIKE THIS:

"SEATTLE DELEGATE, FEMALE, AMERICAN, WHITE, DARK COMPLEXION, JEWISH AMERICAN, WEARING GLASSES, BLACK HAIR, BLACK EYES, 26 YRS. 135 LBS. 5'6".

"ALSO IN ATTENDANCE FOR A FEW MINUTES, THE MORTON SOBELL ATTORNEY MR. _____ DREYFUS, WHO MADE A BRIEF REPORT ABOUT THE CASE AND ITS FUTURE PLANS OF DEFENSE.

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"THE OTHERS ATTENDANTS I DO NOT KNOW THEIR NAMES, AND ONLY A VERY FEW MORE.

"COLLECTING THE REGISTRATION MONEY WAS ETHEL _____ (?) AND YOUR NAME WAS TO BE SIGNED. AND THE SUM OF \$.50¢ PAID.

"OPERATING THE T V FILM WAS THE WOMAN NAMED PEARL _____ (?) I DO NOT RECALL FOR SURE HER LAST NAME SOUNDED PHONETICALLY LIKE HEILEY, THERE WERE NO INTRODUCTION BY COMPLETE NAMES ONLY FIRST NAMES GIVEN.

"THE MEETING WAS OPENED ABOUT 11.30 a.m. BY THE CHAIRMAN OF THE DAY AREA COUNCIL OF SOBELL COMMITTEES, MR. WARREN LILLINGS WHO SAID THAT THE MEETING WAS A VERY IMPORTANT ONE, TO DISCUSS THE FUTURE PLANS FOR THE MORTON SOBELL CAMPAIGN FREEDOM FROM ALCAZAR. HE SAID THAT THE PEOPLE HAVE TO FIGHT HARD AGAINST THE "ARSENAL OF THE F.B.I." AND THE ENTIRE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE" WITH REGARDS TO THE SOBELL CASE WHO WAS FRAMED AND ALL THE EVIDENCE PRESENTED BY THE FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION FABRICATED" AND THE F.B.I. WITNESS PRESENTED BY THE PROSECUTION VERY WELL INSTRUCTED AND TRAINED SO THEY COULD ONLY DECLARE AGAINST SOBELL WHAT WAS PUT INTO THEIR MOUTHS BY THE ATTORNEY FOR THE PROSECUTION AND THE F.B.I. WHO UNTIL NOW STILL WAITING FOR MORTON SOBELL TO PLEAD GUILTY AND TALK ABOUT HIS SPY ACTIVITIES AGAINST THE U.S.A. IN FAVOR OF SOVIET RUSSIA, WHICH OF COURSE ARE ONLY F.B.I. LIES.

"HE ALSO SAID THAT HE KNOWS VERY WELL WHAT IT IS TO BE PERSECUTED AND QUESTIONED DAY AND NIGHT, HE SUFFERED THAT EXPERIENCE WHEN HE WAS IN JAIL. HE ALSO WAS ASKED BY THE DISTRICT ATTORNEY AT THAT TIME DURING HISTORICAL CASE YEARS TO ACCUSE AND TO TURN AGAINST HIS WIFE IN THE CASE TOM MOONEY. HE SAID HE COULDN'T NEVER SAID ANYTHING HIMSELF OR TOM MOONEY BECAUSE THEY BOTH WERE INNOCENTS OF THE CRIME FOR WHICH THEY SUFFERED IMPRISONMENT FOR MANY YEARS, BUT IT WAS THE MANDATE OF THE PEOPLE WHO DELIBERATED THEM FROM PRISON. AND THE SAME THING WILL ACCUR NOW WITH MORTON SOBELL, BECAUSE THE PEOPLE OF THE U.S.A. WILL DEMAND HIS

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FREEDOM, AND THAT IS WHY THE MEMBERS AND FRIENDS OF MORTON SOBELL HAVE TO WORK HARD TO OBTAIN HIS FREEDOM FROM ALCATRAZ ISLAND.

"AFTER HIS SPEECH MR. WARREN BILLINGS INTRODUCED THE MAN WHOSE PHONE NUMBER I REPORTED IN MY LAST REPORT OF THE SOBELL COMMITTEE MEETING AT 35 FRANKLYN ST., I COULD NOT UNDERSTAND THE NAME VERY WELL. HE ONLY SAID A FEW WORDS AND TALKED IN VERY LOW VOICE COULD HARDLY HEARD HIM.

"NEXT: VIRGINIA JENKINS AS THE SECRETARY OF THE DAY AREA COUNCIL OF SOBELL COMMITTEES, SAN FRANCISCO BRANCH, 345 FRANKLYN ST.

"SHE REPORTED THAT THERE ARE ABOUT 500 NAMES ON THE LIST, THAT IS NAMES OF PEOPLE WHO ALWAYS LIKE TO RECEIVE LITERATURE AND ALSO ALWAYS DONATES MONEY TO THE MORTON SOBELL CAUSE. SHE SAID THAT THINGS ARE VERY GOOD, AND THERE ARE NOT MANY LETTERS REQUESTING THAT THEIR NAMES SHOULD BE TAKING OUT OF THE LIST. SHE SAID THAT MANY MEETINGS WERE ATTENDED REGULARLY BY MANY PERSONS AND A VERY GOOD WORKING STAFF OF MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE AND VOLUNTEERS WERE ON HAND. SHE SAID THAT CASH ON HAND WAS \$668.95 CENTS. AND FEW EXPENSES WILL BE DEDUCTED FROM THIS SUM.

"NEXT: DEN LEGERE, CHAIRMAN OF THE EAST DAY COMMITTEE, WHO GAVE A PESSIMISTIC REPORT, ONLY 200 NAMES ON THEIR LIST, NAMES THAT RECEIVED LITERATURE ETC. AND FRIENDS OF MORTON SOBELL CAUSE. HE SAID THAT HE ALREADY RESIGNED FROM THE CHAIRMANSHIP, BECAUSE OF BAD HEALTH, THAT THE DOCTOR TOLD HIM TO TAKE IT EASY SO HE COULD LIVE A FEW MORE YEARS, SINCE HIS YEARS ARE COUNTED. HE DID NOT MENTIONED THE CAUSE OF HIS ILLNESS OR THE SICKNESS HE AFFECTED WITH. BUT HE INTRODUCED THE NEW CHAIRMAN OF THE EAST DAY AREA WHO WILL REPLACE HIM IN THE ACTIVITIES, HER NAME IS: MARY PAIRNAU, A TALL WOMAN, AMERICAN WHITE, BRUNETE, BROWN OR HAZEL EYES, WEARING IRON RIMMED GLASSES, FAIR SKIN, WELL ATTIRED, NEAT, WELL SPOKEN DEEP VOICE, ABOUT 32 - 34 YRS., 120 LBS., GOOD FIGURE, SHE IS VERY WELL VERSED ON THIS KIND OF CAMPAIGN, BECAUSE THE WAY SHE SPOKE AND PROMINENTLY VERY WELL EXPERIENCED IN THIS KIND OF WORK. SHE SAID THAT SHE WAS TO TALK MORE OPTIMISTICALLY THAN DEN LEGERE WHO HAS SERVED THE COMMITTEE

OF THE BAY AREA VERY WELL, SHE SAID THAT THE OUTLOOK FOR THE FUTURE WAS VERY GOOD, SHE IS PLANNING TO WORK HARD AND TO BRING MORE SIGNATURES AND NAMES WILL BE ADDED TO THE EAST BAY AREA COMMITTEE. SHE SAID THAT FINANCLY THE EAST BAY AREA IS NOT BAD AT ALL, PEOPLE ARE ALWAYS SENDING MONEY BUT INSISTING AT THE SAME TIME TO REMAIN ANONYMOUS. SHE SAID THAT THEY WILL HAVE FUTURE AFFAIR IN PRIVATE HOMES AND THAT WILL HELP TO BRING THE MONEY INTO THE MORTON SOBELL CAUSE.

"NEXT: TIM KELLY CHAIRMAN OF THE MARIN COUNTY COMMITTEE OF MORTON SOBELL. HE INTRODUCED HIS CO-OWNERS: HELEN MORRIS, A CRIPPLED WOMAN, AMERICAN, WHITE, BRUNETE, BLUE EYES, ABOUT 25 YRS., CRIPPLED LEGS, I DO NOT OF WHAT NATURE, MIGHT BE POLIO, USED CRUSHES, 114 LBS. 5'5". SHE DID NOT TALKED. PEGGY GERGLANA, WHO I HAVE ALREADY MENTIONED IN MEETINGS AT 345 FRANKLYN ST. SOBELL COMMITTEE MEETINGS AS PEGGY _____) THE NAME GEORGLANA OR JIOGLANA PHONETICALLY).

"TIM KELLY MENTIONED THAT THE COMMITTEE IN THE MARIN COUNTY IS DOING A VERY GOOD JOB AND THANKS TO PEGGY GEORGLANA (PHONETICALLY) AND HELEN MORRIS, HE SAID THAT THERE HAS BEEN MANY AFFAIRS IN PRO MORTON SOBELL MOVEMENT AT THE MORRIS HOME, MEANING HELEN MORRIS HOME, HE DID NOT MENTIONED IF HELEN MORRIS WAS MARRIED WHEN HE SAID ".AT THE MORRIS" THEY HAVE ALSO HAD IN THESE AFFAIRS ENTERTAINERS, HE ALSO DID NOT MENTIONED WHO ENTERTAINED AT THOSE AFFAIRS.

"HE ALSO STATED THAT HE JUST RETURNED FROM A VISIT TO MEXICO CITY WHERE HE MET WITH MANY GOOD PEOPLE WHO ARE VERY INTERESTED IN THE MORTON SOBELL CAUSE AND CASE, AND AT PRESENT ARE WORKING OUT A PLAN OF ACTION ON MORTON SOBELL BEHALF, AND ALREADY HAVE COLLECTED \$7,000.00 DOLLARS FROM THE MEXICAN PEOPLE. HE DID NOT MENTIONED NAMES AT ALL, BUT HE SAID THEY ARE ALREADY IN ACTION. WITH REGARD TO THE MORTON SOBELL AND ALREADY HAVE STIR UP THE MEXICAN PEOPLE AND ALSO WILL WORK IN OTHER LATIN AMERICAN COUNTRIES THROU PROPAGANDA.

"HE DID NOT MENTIONED THE NAME OF WHOM HE MEET IN MEXICO CITY, HES REPORT IN THAT PARTICULAR WAS KIND OF BRIEF, TIGHT.

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"NEXT REPORT. SYLVIA STEINGART, WHO SAID THAT THE PEOPLE HAS TO WORK HARD, THAT SHE HAS ALREADY CONTACTED MANY PEOPLE FROM THE I.L.W.U. WARE HOUSEMEN'S UNION, AND THE SHOP STEWARD OF THAT UNION, I.L.W.U. AND ALREADY THEY HAVE MET TOGETHER IN STOCKTON AND SACRAMENTO, ALSO IN SAN JOSE. SYLVIA STEINGART IS CHAIRMAN OF THE PENINSULA AREA OF MORTON SOBELL COMMITTEE. THE PURPOSE OF MEETING WITH OFFICIALS AND MEMBERS OF THE I.L.W.U. UNION IN STOCKTON AND SACRAMENTO WAS TO GET A CLOSER COOPERATION ON THE PART OF THE WORKING PEOPLE SO THEY ARE WILLING TO HELP WITH FUNDS, AND ALSO SIGNATURES ON PETITIONS FOR MORTON SOBELL PARDON, AND HELP IN THE CAUSE OF MORTON SOBELL. SHE ALSO DISCUSSED THAT SENATOR KNOWLAND OF CALIFORNIA WAS REPORTED TO HAVE MADE A STATEMENT OF THE SOBELL CASE, AS REPORTED VERY ANGRILY PREVIOUSLY IN THE MEETING BY ESTHER SKLOR, SYLVIA STEINGART SAID THAT SENATOR KNOWLAND SAID THAT STEMENT AND ALSO HE NAMED THE SECURITY COMMITTEE WHEN MAKING THE STATEMENT TO THE AMERICAN PRESS, WAS NOT OF MORTON SOBELL BUT OF THE OTHER SOBELL, CONVICTED ALSO AS RUSSIAN SPY IN THE EAST. SHE SAID THAT THE MAGAZINES AND NEWS PAPERS DO NOT SAID IT WAS NOT MORTON SOBELL. AND SHE LIKE MANY OTHERS OF THE MORTON SOBELL COMMITTEE RESENTED THOSE STATEMENTS BY SENATOR KNOWLAND, AND THAT MORTON SOBELL MIGHT VERY WELL BE MISTAKING BY THE PEOPLE THAT READS THE NEWS PAPERS WITH THIS OTHER (SOBELL). SHE TALKED FOR MORE THAN 20 MINUTES AND EVERYONE WAS GETTING TIRED OF IT. THAT IS HER ATTITUDE AS I HAVE OBSERVED. MANY WOMEN MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE RESENTED HER FOR HER ATTITUDE.

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ARMENIAN, OR ARAB PROBABLE . (OR ITALIAN , BLACK HAIR, SHORT CURLY, DEEP BLACK EYES, LONG NOSE AND SHARP, 138 - 142 LBS. 50 - 54 YRS. STOUT BUILT AND STRONG. HE SAID THAT THE DELEGATION FROM FRESNO WOULD LIKE TO BE PERMITTED TO TAKE LIVE BEFORE 4 p.m. SINCE THEY ALL WERE RIDING A FRENCH CAR, AND WOULD HAVE A HARD AND LONG RIDE BACK TO FRESNO.

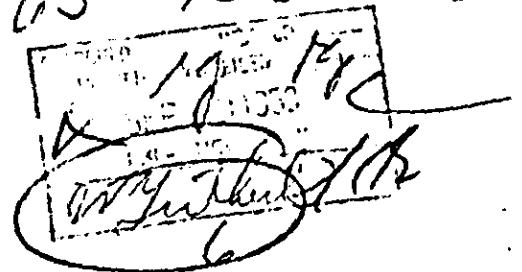

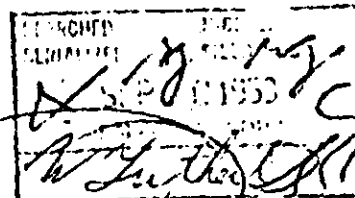

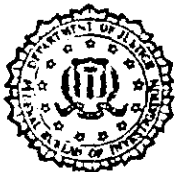

WOMEN AGAINST THE LAW

Ethel Rosenberg Died

for Beliefs

Here is an unprecedented story of one of the most successful woman spies of all time, Ethel Rosenberg. She gave her life, not for money or for the love of a man—but because of a dedication to a cause. This is the third of a series on women who lived outside the law.

By MARY PADDOCK

She did not look like a spy. There was nothing glamorous about five-foot, 100-pound Ethel Rosenberg. Mata Hari, who addled men with her beauty, might have scorned this tiny housewife and mother from New York's tenement-ridden lower East Side.

And yet Federal Judge Irving R. Kaufman, in sentencing Ethel Rosenberg to death, said: "By your betrayal, you have undoubtedly altered the course of history to the disadvantage of your country."

And in refusing to commute the death sentences for Ethel and her husband, despite Communist-inspired pressures on him to do so, President Eisenhower noted:

"...I can only say that, by immeasurably increasing the chances of atomic war, the Rosenbergs may have condemned to death tens of millions of people all over the world."

Even in death this woman won a kind of obscene victory over her native land. There were protests about her execution in the capitals of the world. Leaders in the war against communism, including Pope Pius XII, found themselves involved in a cleverly plotted attack against the American ideal of justice.

RAISED ON EAST SIDE

The ugly charge of anti-Semitism, brought up by Julius Rosenberg, was pivotal in the global tension engendered by the case, although the trial judge, the prosecuting attorney and the chief prosecution witnesses were Jewish.

Mata Hari never dreamed of such a triumph as that which led Ethel Rosenberg to the headlines.

For the housewife, first woman to be condemned to death by the Federal government since the execution of Mrs. Mary Surratt for her part in the assassination of Abraham Lincoln, was part of a spy ring which, according to testimony, gave Soviet Russia the atomic bomb and, according to further testimony, since her death, informed the U.S.S.R. of American guided missile discoveries.

With Ethel Rosenberg, the road took an early turn. As a young girl on the East Side, she was interested in the piano, singing and dramatics. Brilliant, she was graduated from Seward Park High School at 15.

She had met there a tall, thin youth named Julius Rosenberg, whose parents hoped he would be a rabbi. She herself had become the youngest member of the Schola Cantorum after intensive voice study.

They became Communist party members, in those depression days, before they were out of their teens. It wasn't as if Julius led Ethel into it—she was two years older—but he was so active in Red activities that he flunked out of the City College of New York in 1937. He returned and, in February, 1939, received his electrical engineering degree.

He worked for various firms. She was a stenographer and

typist, had worked briefly with the Census Bureau in Washington in 1940, a year after they were married.

Their belief in communism led them into spying as marijuana can lead an addict into heroin.

And in June, 1944, Ethel's recently drafted brother, David Greenglass, was transferred as an army machinist to Los Alamos, N. M., where top secret work was being done on the weapon which would end World War II and open to man a new heaven and hell.

OBTAIN SKETCHES

In November of that year, the Rosenbergs asked David's wife, Ruth, to dinner. They explained to her their belief that the United States should share all information with Russia. To this end, they asked her to have David pass them information.

When she visited David at Los Alamos, he agreed. He gave the Rosenbergs general infor-

mation on the base. In January, 1945, he came home on furlough and gave them something more—rough sketches of the high explosive lens used to detonate the atomic bomb.

Working under the Soviet consul in New York, the Rosenbergs were now in business. A courier, identifying himself with a torn half of a jello box which matched the half held by David, picked up further sketches of the lens, a crude cross-section and 12 pages describing the A-bomb.

Then, in the autumn of 1949, German-born Dr. Klaus Fuchs, a British scientist with the highest security rating, confessed to spying for Russia while at Los Alamos.

He implicated Harry Gold as his courier and Gold, acknowledging this, said he also had been the "Jello box" courier for David Greenglass and the Rosenbergs. Greenglass confessed.

Two months later, in September, 1950, the Rosenbergs were arrested.

There followed, in two areas, one of the strange battles of our time. One aspect involved the law: found guilty by a jury of 11 men and one woman, the Rosenbergs were sentenced to death, but the case went through various courts to the Supreme Court twice, the execution was three times stayed to permit appeal hearings and

it was two years, two months and 14 days before Judge Kaufman's death sentence was carried out.

'FRAUD AND DECEIT'

Meanwhile, the propaganda battle raged.

And what the House Committee on Un-American Activities later called a Communist "worldwide undertaking of monumental fraud and deceit" necessarily concentrated on Ethel Rosenberg.

For only the Rosenbergs protested their innocence. Without question of their guilt, many figures enlisted in the strange crusade on their behalf only to commute the death sentences. It was Ethel Rosenberg, the little mother of two young sons, whose image was conjured up for the world. To this cause, she lent herself freely.

World tension mounted and, on the night of the execution, June 19, 1953, as the Rosenbergs, stoic to the end, went to the electric chair, anti-American demonstrations broke out in London and Paris and Rome.

In Toronto, a mob outside the U. S. consulate called, "Murderers! Shame!" Police here broke up a demonstration of 5,000 persons in Union Square. A guard was posted around Judge Kaufman's home.

On 1/6/60, CARL MARZANI spoke at the Faculty of Social Science, 80 East 11th St., NYC. He compared two novels: "The Survivor" written by himself and "Advice and Consent" by DRURY. This forum started about 8:45 PM and ended about 10:30 PM. There were 17 persons present.

MARZANI said that his own book was factual, but that DRURY's book was based on what DRURY wished things were. He stated that DRURY knew the facts, but had so written his book that it was propaganda. He called DRURY a political writer who knew what was going on but would not write of it.

MARZANI stated that he himself is pro-Communist.

MARZANI noted that DRURY wrote that the President of General Motors Corp. telephoned a Senator ordering the Senator to make decisions pleasing to General Motors and in the same manner issued orders to the UAW. MARZANI then said that DRURY knows that the President of General Motors would not use a phone in such instances because he, the President, knows the phones are tapped. He said that DRURY knows how things are really done, but he would not write the real facts.

MARZANI noted that in his own book he had written of gangsters being in power behind the scenes, but said he did not know personally of this situation, but figured that is what happens because everybody knows it is so.

MARZANI said that DRURY wrote that after a Cardinal of the Catholic Church contacts a Senator, the Senator agrees with the Cardinal, but later does nothing. MARZANI said that in his own book he pointed out that the Bishop influences the 25 million Catholics and so makes policy.

MARZANI stated that in his book he indicated through one of the characters that the Senators have almost ruined the United States.

MARZANI referred to THOMAS WATSON stating WATSON used shrewd methods to gain political power and used the negro problem for political purpose. He described WATSON as a southern radical. At this point MARZANI mentioned THOMAS JEFFERSON to state JEFFERSON had an illegitimate negro daughter.

MARZANI said that DRURY makes President EISENHOWER look like a liberal.

MARZANI said that 10 years of Senator MC CARTHY almost undid America. MARZANI said that he feels that there is still hope for America, but that the ruling class is stagnating. He said that 10 years ago there were 16 doctors for some thousand people while now there are only 15 doctors for the same number of people.

MARZANI said that in 1920 there were less communists than there are today. He remarked that the smallness of the audience was not a true indication because there were plenty of others. He said America is becoming more pro-Communist. He said today it is easier for the communists to get along because of the peace issue. MARZANI said that now most of the doors are open to him. He said that for the first time the Herald-Tribune reviewed one of his books.

Literature of the Liberty Prometheus Paperback Book Club, 700 West 23rd St., NYC, was distributed. MARZANI said that he needed to get 1000 members for his book club by June, 1960, or he would have to close the doors.

MARZANI said that Americans have been given the image of themselves as crusaders for a free and better world, but actually in the eyes of Europeans and Asians, the American is a money-maker who does not care about anything except business and money.

MARZANI said that Governor ROCKEFELLER had withdrawn from the Presidential race because after touring the country he realized that the people want peace and not what ROCKEFELLER stands for. He said this conclusion had appeared in the Herald-Tribune.

MARZANI stated that he had employed ETHEL ROSENBERG as his secretary. He said that he admired her courage and heroism, but that she was actually a neurotic, unsteady person. He said that there was no point in telling the truth about her personality.

MARZANI said that 20 years ago Professor VAN DORN, the father of CHARLES VAN DORN, told MARZANI that he should stop writing because he was not capable of good writing. MARZANI said that the VAN DORNS are a distinguished, cultured, American family. MARZANI said that if the elder VAN DORN had been asked, before his son's TV trouble, what he thought of the American government, he would have praised it in glowing terms, but now since his son's trouble, the elder VAN DORN would say that it is rotten. MARZANI said that CHARLES VAN DORN loves culture and teaching, and did not care for the money, and still wants to teach, but his career is probably ruined. MARZANI said that CHARLES VAN DORN has a weak character and should have told that the TV management was rotten and made him deceive the public, and that he was sorry.

MARZANI said that "PEARL" had asked him to write the political part of a book she was writing. He did not identify PEARL.

The circular of the Liberty Book Club is filed as an exhibit in NY 100-91185 -156 (6).

The PEARL referred to by MARZANI is not known to the source. It could possibly be PEARL BUCK.

Dear Mr. Morgenthau:

My wife and I have been working for some time on a book which deals, in part, with some of the atomic espionage cases of the early Fifties--including, of course, the Rosenberg case. One of the defendants at that trial, David Greenglass, drew four replicas of sketches that he had transmitted to an agent of the Soviet Union some years earlier. These replicas were introduced as trial exhibits by the prosecution.

For purposes of research and also as possible illustrations for our book, we have been interested in obtaining photostatic copies of these replicas, which are identified as exhibits 2, 6, 7 and 8. Last year, we requested copies of 2, 6 and 7 from Mr. Edward Cunniffe--who has charge of the Rosenberg case exhibits--and after checking with the Department of Justice he was able to provide us with these.

We are writing to you now to request a copy of exhibit 8 and also of certain sealed testimony connected with it. This exhibit, which was impounded by the Court, is--according to the docket--presently kept in the vault in room 602. However, we would like to emphasize that this exhibit 8 was not impounded as a result of any action initiated by the then United States Attorney or by the Court; it was impounded as a result of a request by the defense.

On page 702 of the Rosenberg trial record, we see that the prosecution introduced for identification exhibit 8--a cross-section sketch of the atomic bomb drawn by Greenglass. On page 703, Mr. Roy Cohn offers exhibit 8 in evidence and defense attorney Emanuel Bloch--apparently as some sort of a defense tactic--objects and asks that exhibit 8 be impounded. The exhibit was received in evidence with the agreement that it would be sealed after being shown to the jury. As Greenglass starts to testify about the components of the sketch (page 705), Bloch asks that the testimony be kept secret. After some discussion and some disagreement among defense counsel, the court spectators are excluded while Greenglass testifies but the press is admitted (719). Thereupon, with the press present, Greenglass testifies briefly about the sketch he has drawn and his testimony is widely reported, along with artists' versions of the sketch. See Times, 3/13/51; Times 3/26 (with illustration); Life 3/26 (with illustration); AP, Howard Blakeslee, 3/13; Scientific

American, 4/51 and so on.

Later, a witness, Mr. John A. Derry, testified regarding the Greenglass sketch and testimony and some of this material was ordered impounded by the Judge--Irving R. Kaufman (page 1319).

Our request, then, is for permission to see, read, and have copied both exhibit 8 and any related testimony that is presently impounded. Any expenses for transcribing the impounded stenographic notes will, of course, be met by us.

Regarding any question you may have as to the possible "secret" character of this material, we would remind you that it was clearly the intention of the United States Attorney in 1951 to introduce exhibit 8 in normal fashion and to present the Greenglass and Derry testimony in the same way. Furthermore, we make this request with the firm belief that the Department of Justice would not have the slightest reason, or basis, for objecting to it.

We look forward to hearing from you.

Informant's Comments Concerning
Soviet Illegal Agent

Informant stated that at one point during his talk with KGB officials in Moscow, the question of illegal agents arose. Informant said the question arose as to what would happen now that it was evident that the FBI in the US had been successful in penetrating GRU illegals. Informant stated that the answer to this was that any segments of the GRU illegal operation which the FBI has penetrated or which it is felt may have been penetrated will be completely "destroyed."

Informant stated that it was also stated that some of the "ROSENBERG illegals" had never been detected by the FBI in the US and are at the present time working very well. Informant commented that he had heard that at one time Colonel BARKOVSKY worked with the ROSENBERG couple. Informant stated he could not recall specifically who made the remarks set out above. He stated that he had heard nothing, while in Moscow, about the ABEL illegals whom he has previously identified by the code names "MLADOVITOV" and STAROVITCH."

In connection with this informant stated that as far as he knows SHERMAN LEVANOV and ANATOLI SHUVALOV are the only KGB Illegal Department support agents in NY. Informant stated he has no knowledge of any illegal agent activities handled out of the Washington KGB Residency.

Information Concerning "BURGESS" and "MAC LEAN"

Informant stated that BURGESS and MAC LEAN, who defected to the Soviet Union from Great Britain, served in England furnishing atomic data for a long time before defecting, perhaps as long as eight or ten years. He advised that they were connected with Soviet Military Intelligence (GRU).

Information Concerning "MARTIN and MITCHELL"

Informant advised that he saw the Americans, MARTIN and MITCHELL, CIA employees who defected to the Soviet Union, at a press conference shortly after they arrived in Moscow. He said that he knew nothing about them except that they went to the Soviet Union from the United States via Cuba, and then by steamer to Russia.

Information Concerning Anti-Missile Missiles

Informant advised that in October, 1961, he attended a conference of Rocket Society Specialists in Russia, at which time a scientist named KISUNKOV stated that the problem of intercepting missiles had been solved. Informant stated that KISUNKOV told him that the warheads of the Anti-Missile Missiles were filled with clean material so that there would be no dangerous radio-active fallout over the Soviet Union.

KGB School Near Moscow

Informant advised that there is a special KGB School located approximately 25 kilometers east of Moscow on the road to Gorki. He stated that he had been to this school approximately five times as a lecturer to KGB agents in training. He advised that the lectures consisted of the latest developments in various types of atomic weapons. Informant advised that these lectures were given solely for indoctrination and information. Informant stated that he himself had never gone through this training school.

Soviet Sources Among American Employees
in United States Embassy in Moscow - 1961

Informant advised that in September, 1961, he was told by N. I. WATKIN at KGB Headquarters in Moscow, that three agents of the KGB had received money awards for developing sources among American employees in the United States Embassy in Moscow in 1961. The informant said that one of the American employees at the United States Embassy helped KGB agents open the Ambassador's safe in the Embassy in order that the KGB agents could photograph the documents therein. Informant stated that he could not identify the exact location of the safe within the Embassy.

Soviets Interest in United
States Computers

Informant advised that the Soviets have obtained plans for the "lightning" computer which is being developed in California. He stated that they have already obtained these plans, although it is still in the development stages. He said this computer is capable of making ten million calculations per second.

Informant stated that the Soviets have also obtained complete plans for two computers which were developed at the University of Illinois, each of which is capable of three million calculations per second. He named these computers as the "Illiac" and the "Silliac". He stated that he saw the plans for these computers in Moscow, but that he has no information concerning the method by which the Soviets acquired these plans.

Atomic Information Relative to
Red China

Informant advised that in 1959, he reviewed certain documents in Moscow relating to the development of an atomic

device by the Chinese Communists. He stated that based upon his review of these documents, he is of the opinion that the Chinese Communists will be able to explode an atomic device of their own design by the end of 1963.

Development of a Nuclear Engine
For Rockets and Soviet Space Effort

The informant advised that at the present time the Soviet Union is carrying out research and development re a nuclear engine to be used in rockets in connection with the Soviet space effort. The informant stated that the main work is being carried out at the Central Aero Hydrodynamic Institute in Moscow headed by Academician MJASISICHIV. Informant stated work on this project is also being done in Odinsk and at the Military Institute at Kiev. Informant said that the main problem in working on the development of the above nuclear engine is to create a small powerful reactor. He said that

Specifically the work on a suitable nuclear reactor is being done at Oblinsk.

The informant said that at the Military Institute at Kiev, research is also going on regarding the problem of plasma propulsion. He said that once a small powerful reactor is produced, then it is felt that the problem of plasma propulsion will be easily solved. The informant stated that Mr. EUGENIE PISKOREV of the Institute of Atomic Energy in Moscow stated that the above research projects are not secret and that the information is widely known. PISKOREV also stated to the informant that the US is well ahead of the Soviet Union in the above field.

Intercontinental Ballistic Missiles

The informant said that it was his understanding that the production of Intercontinental Ballistic Missiles (ICBM) was begun in the Soviet Union in approximately 1954. He stated that it is his opinion as of 1960, the average production of military missiles in the Soviet Union was approximately 300 a year. The informant stated that the first satellite successfully launched by the Soviet Union in 1957 used a military type rocket. Informant stated that the first stage in the ICBMs is in every case powered by liquid fuel. The informant stated that Soviet ICBMs are of two general sizes. He stated that one size is approximately 30 meters in length and has a range of from 12,000 to 13,000 kilometers. He stated that the other size measures approximately 24-25 meters and has a range of about 10,000 kilometers. The informant stated that the fuels for all Soviet ICBMs contain "hydride of metals".

The informant stated that two very large ICBM production plants are located at Novokuzalinsk (ph) in Siberia.

The informant stated that he knows very little about the guidance systems of ICBMs and that this is completely out of his field.

Informant stated, however, that Colonel KVASNIKOV, the head of the 10th Department of the First Directorate of the KGB in Moscow stated before a group of 10th Department employees that the Soviet Union is approximately ten years behind the US in the electronics field. In this regard, KVASNIKOV stated that the US has better, more compact and more dependable electronic guidance systems for missiles. The informant stated that Minister of Electronics SCHOKIN also made a statement to this effect. The informant stated that all ICBMs carry nuclear warheads and that at the present time efforts are directed towards building smaller and more compact warheads. Informant said size of a warhead would therefore not necessarily be indicative of its power. Informant was asked to estimate the weight of a typical hydrogen warhead and he stated that such a warhead would weigh approximately 3-4 tons. The informant stated that the size of the warhead would depend largely on the individual construction of it, and that size would vary depending upon the particular type of ICBM. Informant stated that ICBMs are stored underground for maximum protection in many parts of the Soviet Union.

Informant stated that the above statements are very general. Due to a time factor at this particular meeting with the informant, it was not possible to go into these matters any further. It is anticipated that during the course of a subsequent meeting with the informant these matters will be more fully discussed.

Information Regarding Academician
VADIM A. TRAPEZNIKOV and the
Delegation On Automatic Controls

The informant stated that after the meeting of the Scientific and Technical Branch of the NYO Residency on 6/15/52, he went to a lower floor at the Soviet Mission and met Academician VADIM A. TRAPEZNIKOV of the Academy of Science in Moscow. The informant stated that TRAPEZNIKOV is in the US with a delegation visiting various research centers and laboratories doing work on automatic controls of various types. The informant stated that another member of the delegation is a Professor LETOV. The informant stated he does not know the name of the third man in the delegation, but believes him to be a GRU agent, because (1) each such delegation is required to have either a KGB agent or a GRU agent with it (2) the man with TRAPEZNIKOV and LETOV did not visit the KGB space at the Soviet Mission, so the informant believes he must be a GRU agent in the light of number (1) above (3) this individual was warmly greeted on the first floor at the Soviet Mission by PETER M. MASLENNIKOV, whom the informant has identified as a GRU agent and Assistant to Colonel VNUKOVSKI. The informant further stated that he believes the type of research in which TRAPEZNIKOV is engaged would be of more interest to the GRU and the military in general than to the KGB.

The informant pointed out that TRAPEZNIKOV is a very important man in the Soviet Union and this is only the second time he has been permitted to leave the Soviet Union.

A review of the Mosnat cards of the NYO reflects that VADIM A. TRAPEZNIKOV, ALEKSANDR M. LETOV and BORIS N. NAUMOV are presently in the US to attend a conference on automatic controls. The Mosnat cards reflect that these three individuals arrived in the US on 6/16/52. The Mosnat cards reflect that TRAPEZNIKOV is Director of the Institute of Automatic and Telemechanics, Academy of Science, USSR. The Mosnat cards show LETOV is a Senior Research Worker. The third man in the group, BORIS N. NAUMOV, is also described on the Mosnat cards as a Senior Research Worker.

The informant said that GABELKO designed IGOR ANDREEV and GLEB PAVLOV to accompany TRAPEZNIKOV and his two associates to the NY International Airport to see them to their plane which was to take off at 7:30 p.m. on 5/25/62. Informant stated that he (informant) went along to the airport with these individuals and that after TRAPEZNIKOV and his associates went aboard the plane the informant, ANDREEV and GLEB PAVLOV went to a bar at NY International Airport.

VLADIMIR B. BARKOVSKY
and His Connection with
the ROSENBERG Case

The informant stated that while he was at the bar at NY International Airport, with GLEB PAVLOV and IGOR ANDREEV, the name of BORIS S. IVANOV came up, but informant stated that ANDREEV is not fond of IVANOV and that generally IVANOV is not a very popular figure among Soviets in NY. The informant stated that ANDREEV compared IVANOV unfavorably with VLADIMIR V. BARKOVSKY who was IVANOV's predecessor as head of the KGB NY Agency. The informant stated ANDREEV said that BORIS IVANOV was nothing compared with BARKOVSKY. ANDREEV went on to say according to the informant, that BARKOVSKY was much closer to KGB operations than IVANOV. As an example of this ANDREEV stated that Soviet intelligence determined that the ROSENBERGS (JULIUS and ETHEL) were about to be arrested. Three days before the ROSENBERGS were actually arrested, BARKOVSKY went to them and ordered them to deny everything in the event they were arrested. Informant said ANDREEV stated that BARKOVSKY had received much important information from the ROSENBERGS over a long period of time and had received a decoration (an order) for his work with the ROSENBERGS. ANDREEV also said that BARKOVSKY was connected with a man who killed LEON TROTSKY in Mexico in 1938. The informant stated ANDREEV did not say whether BARKOVSKY had actually had any part in the development of JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG. Informant stated he could furnish no further information regarding the above matters and that ANDREEV stopped talking when a uniform policeman walked into the bar and sat down near them. The informant stated, in fact, that all conversation stopped between the Soviets and they soon got up and left.

The Mosnat cards reflect that VLADIMIR A. BARKOVSKY first arrived in the US on February 17, 1949, and departed on August 25, 1950. It is noted that the ROSS BERGS were arrested in June, 1950, in NYC by Bureau agents for espionage, were convicted and later executed in Sing Sing Prison.

Information Regarding GLEB PAVLOV

The informant stated that after they left the bar he and PAVLOV separated from IGOR ANDREEV and the informant returned to Manhattan in PAVLOV's car. He pointed out that PAVLOV lives in Manhattan, while ANDREEV lives in Queens. Informant stated that en route to Manhattan in PAVLOV's car he attempted to engage PAVLOV in conversation, however, PAVLOV cautioned him to be quiet because he, PAVLOV, believes that his car may contain an electronic device which will enable the FBI to overhear any conversation in this car.

The informant stated PAVLOV said he makes it a rule to never carry on any serious conversation in his automobile. Informant stated that he did not know GLEB PAVLOV in Moscow and has been acquainted with him only since he has been in the US.

Information Regarding IGOR ANDREEV

Informant stated that he has known IGOR ANDREEV since 1957 in Moscow, at which time ANDREEV worked in the Operational Section of the Radio and Electronics Branch of the 10th Department, First Directorate of the KGB under MICHAEL LOFUKHIN.

The informant stated he could furnish no further information regarding other Soviet intelligence activities regarding which he has furnished some information during past interviews.

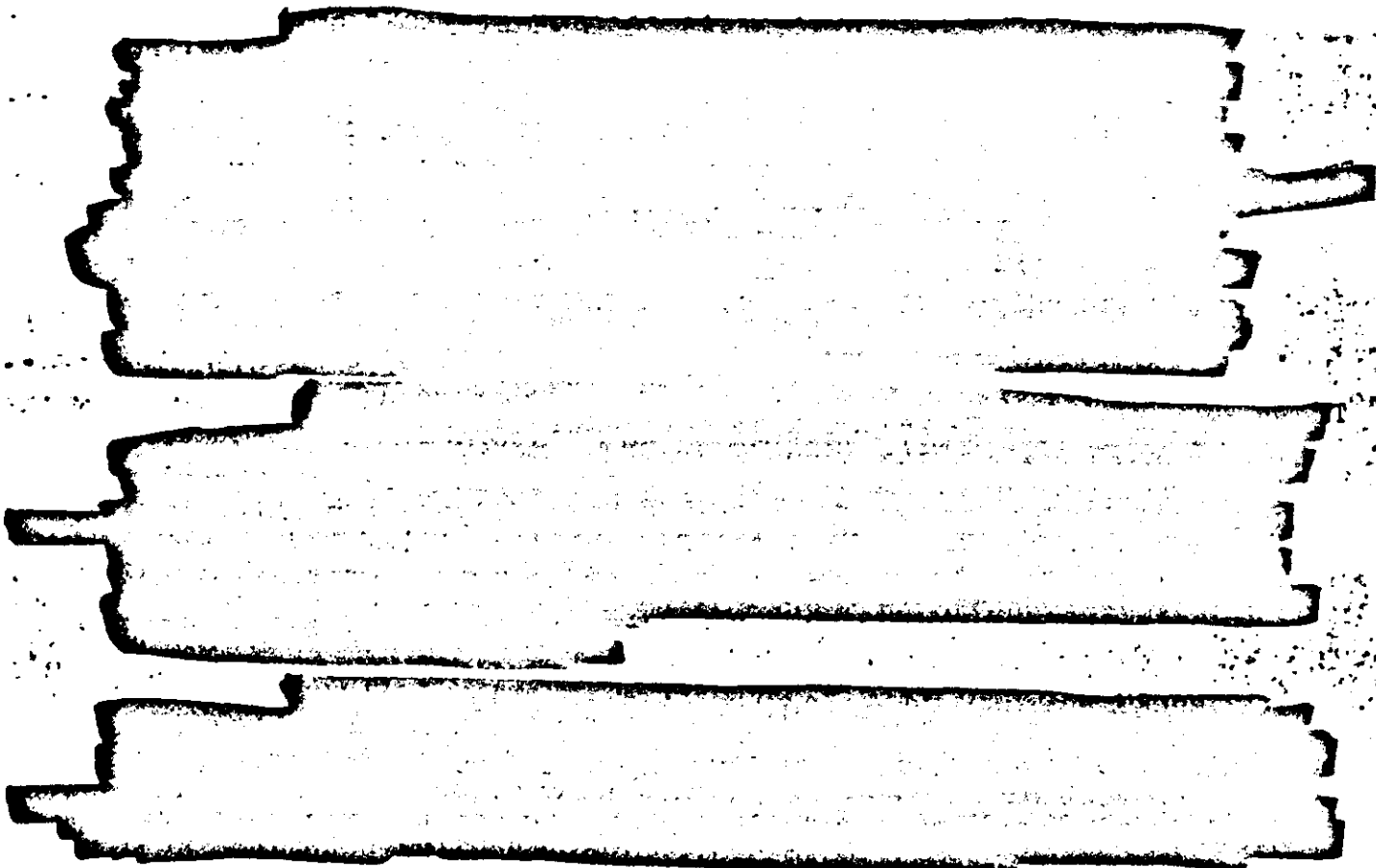

The Rosenberg Case

THE BETRAYERS: The Rosenberg Case—A Reappraisal of an American Crisis. By Jonathan Root. 305 pp. New York: Coward-McConn. \$5.

"COURTS try cases, but cases also try courts," wrote the late Justice Robert Jackson shortly before the first Nuremberg trial. No observation could be a more apt summary of the subject of this book, which traces the lives of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg and the judicial proceedings that culminated in their execution at Sing Sing just ten years ago, following their conviction as spies for the Soviet Union.

Mr. Root writes, with skill, and the narrative elements of his work are vivid and well paced. Especially absorbing are the early chapters, describing the pinched circumstances and dreary associations from which both of the Rosenbergs emerged with warped personalities and clouded perceptions. They were small people—intelligent and energetic enough to extricate themselves from the grinding poverty of the lower East Side, but quite unable to gain a secure middle-class footing. Thus, their ambitions led to frustrations rather than satisfaction, and their resentments and yearning for fulfillment drove them ever deeper into the shoddy political extremism that eventually brought them to the electric chair.

But two case histories out of many thousands not much different would not make a book. Today this dismal story is significant only as a backdrop for the trial and sentence that catapulted the Rosenbergs from obscurity to global notoriety. And while the later and more important chapters of Mr. Root's book are by no means lacking in interest, they fall short of providing a comprehensive or penetrating analysis of the legal and moral issues that the Rosenberg case presented.

berg-Greenglass conspiracy was ~~said to~~ have been formed in 1944, and Judge Kaufman found no mitigation in the circumstance that the atomic information was to be furnished to the Soviet Union, then our ally.

In ten years' retrospect, as Mr. Root observes, Judge Kaufman's diatribe and dire forebodings "tend to sound ridiculous, palatable as they may have appeared to the popular mind at the time they were uttered." Denying clemency, President Eisenhower also spoke of "the millions of dead whose death may be directly attributable to what these spies have done." But time and scientific opinion have shaken Greenglass' testimony about the value of the information he gave the Rosenbergs, and it seems highly improbable that he (unlike Klaus Fuchs) had sufficient training to transmit scientific intelligence of such scope and complexity. President Eisenhower appears to have supposed that Judge Kaufman's death sentence had been approved by the higher Federal courts, but as the late Judge Jerome Frank's opinion on appeal made clear, neither the Circuit Court nor the Supreme Court had authority to review the trial judge's sentence.

Not only the wisdom but also the legal validity of the death sentence is open to question. A few days before the date scheduled for the execution, Justice Douglas granted a stay after hearing argument, presented for the first time, that the provisions of the Espionage Act of 1917 had been superseded, with respect to atomic information, by the Atomic Energy Act of 1946, which authorized capital punish-

ment only if the accused had the "intent to injure the United States," and the jury recommended a death sentence. Summoned back to extraordinary session on the Attorney General's petition, the Supreme Court heard argument on June 18th, and on the following day it dissolved Justice Douglas' stay order. The Rosenbergs were executed that night.

Three of the Justices (Black, Douglas and Frankfurter) thought the question of the Atomic Energy Act's applicability to be substantial, and deprecated the Court's hasty decision. "To be writing an opinion in a case affecting two lives after the curtain has been rung down upon them," Justice Frankfurter subsequently wrote, "has the appearance of pathetic futility. But history also has its claims. This case is an incident in the long and unending effort to develop and enforce justice according to law. . . . Only by sturdy self-criticism can the necessary habits for detached and wise judgment be established and fortified so as to become effective when the judicial process is again subjected to stress and strain."

In the Rosenbergs' case, the judicial process was strained to the breaking point. Guilty they probably were, but, as Mr. Root remarks, their actions were not those of credible spies, but of psychopaths wandering in a world of fantasy. If indeed they intended to injure the United States, today it appears probable that they came closest to success not as spies, but as the victims of a capital sentence which reflected the fears and confusions of those times rather than an objective measure of their guilt.
