1-16-51:

Until today I have been making small, individual notes, but they are cumbersome and easily misplaced. The following represents a summation of what I have learned, of what I have been able to obtain, and my impressions of all that we have discussed. This does not include the notations I have already forwarded. In order to explain them in greater detail I will have to read them again on the 18th.

He has been "warned" by Bloch not to engage in any unnecessary conversations, and to avoid being associated constantly with Vago. Possibly for this reason he has been unusually reticent these past few weeks - more so than usual - but in no way giving me the impression that he suspects me or anyone of working against him.

On January 11th he returned from downtown a chastened and uncharacteristically silent person, thwarting all attempts at conversation. The following day he explained that his wife is disturbed - with her predicament, from reports received (specifically from her mother, whom he considers as being influenced by the government) of the children's behavior, and of the possibility that the death penalty may be imposed. She is - at his and Bloch's insistence - preparing to bar her mother from further visits, but at this point does not have sufficient fortitude. I urged him to consider my former advice, to concentrate on a means by which he might negotiate with the government for his wife's freedom, but he rejects this completely. Discussions regarding "negotiations" are for a later, much later date. Nevertheless, should his wife receive a lengthy sentence, possibly any sentence at all, since he feels that she - if not he - will be freed, it will be a severe blow.

I have, naturally, encountered many ardent supporters of socialism, in the past ten years, but I have never been associated with two men whose hatred for our government is so profound. Every statement contains the threat of "destruction", of violence, to America. In a recent discussion I casually mentioned that men under similar indictment in the Soviet Union would receive similar, if not worse, treatment, and my words invoked a storm that didn't subside for two days. These men are not merely communists; what is more important is that they are revolutionists - and that, even in the communist organization itself, is a horse of a different color.

I have become friendlier with Vago, out of necessity, for what I am unable to learn from my friend can be counted on to supply. Vago is presently making plans to return to Budapest immediately following this trial, should he be freed. Certainly after any sentence he receives. He confided in me that he was all ready to leave shortly before his arrest, and, in fact, his mother-in-law's cellar contains many household items ready for shipment. He was concerned with this damaging situation and expressed relief that the government was as yet unaware that he been making such plans. He has made arrangements - surprisingly through a prisoner here - for a letter to come from France offering him employment, a home, etc. This week he instructed his wife to place his brother's Budapest address in an envelope and mail it to my sister in New York with instructions that only I am to open the envelope. He asked me to write to his brother as soon as I am released. I don't know anything about his brother except that he is sympathetic with Vago's ideologies. I will not know until Friday - when my sister visits - whether or not the letter arrived.

The fact that he has extended this address to me is very interesting and, to me, a surprising indication that he has finally "accepted" me. Formerly, he was more than a little wary.

I am enclosing a copy of photostats I made - without permission - for the trip last week. I managed to retain a copy although Vago watched the operation. It may be exactly what he contends it is but I want to be certain. The story is that Friedus is sponsoring several of Brothman's inventions, including the enclosed. Friedus has the factory and the money, and has made arrangements for his attorney to bring him copies of a "partnership" agreement which all three will sign. Brothman is to receive 50 per cent of the total sales value; Vago will be given 5 per cent of what Brothman accrues. Brothman is presently completing the electrical set-up for this invention and I'm going to persuade Vago to allow me to make copies of that also. Unless you think all of this unimportant.

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He received another offer of assistance from his "friends" through Blocu. They insist upon doing something, and have urged Blocu to think of a method by which they may contribute funds. This marks the second such visit and is again a great source of consolation to him. I repeat that Blocu as an attorney is more than meets the eye.

I continue to manuever the conversation to Mexico, to Caracas. On one hand I hope that he will eventually commit himself, make some statement that will enable me to construct the location of his "traveling" associate. But his only commitment is that Mexico City is the springboard, that from there they obtain passage to a pre-decided destination. I intend to discuss with Vago the fact that should it become necessary he, too, could utilize this means of exodus. But from my friend I get the same story, the same account of "organization", "secrecy", and that "when it becomes advisable" for him to do so he'll impart what information I need to make contact.

Last night (Monday) we had the most interesting discussion yet. Unfortunately today he went downtown, because his parting words were that we would continue our conversation. I pressed him again for instructions for the future: New York and the Worker (Dennis' offer); Arizona and Granam (C. P. organizer in Phoenix); or, immediately, active participation underground - his type of work. He contends that I completely underestimate the work he - for example - has been doing. I must not get the impression that one is able to proceed immediately with underground activities, or that all people are capable. One doesn't just acquire something of value to the Soviet Union and pass it on - as easily as that. It takes training (which he's had); it takes months and months of patient waiting. (Was I aware that when the Canadian ring was destroyed he lost contact for almost two years?) I asked why it hasn't been possible for them to penetrate the F. B. I., and he replied that the thought was an old one, that he, personally, had seriously considered such a proposal years ago. Along these lines - to give me an illustration of the patience required - he advanced the money to a young couple (a school companion who later joined the Abraham Lincoln Brigade) to open a business "somewhere in the West". For years they operated this business, building a "front" in the city, and during difficult times he had to supply them with the money to continue. But - during his recent operations - this man acted as go-between for - "for example, men who had micro-film to send to me for further conveyance". (In short, this man is the drop for East to West connections). Do I think that it has been a simple matter to maintain this man? Do I <sup>realize</sup> what a serious blow it is to all their operations that this man is now left standing? (Apparently only he is aware of the location of this person). What do I think this man is thinking as he reads about the present trial, etc., etc. His exact words were: "I'm worried that this man will now be lost to us as a result of what a rotten bastard like Dave did".

He explained how he would meet the Russian, the various signals they had pre-arranged: circle with a cross in the center on a store window somewhere on 14th Street; his standing in front of three different theaters on Sundays stuffing tobacco in a pipe. How he had discovered a hole in the cement floor of a theater and that subsequently it was used as a conveyance, how they had a signal to verify that the Russian found what he had left, otherwise he had to return and retrieve the package. Gum on a subway window: red for danger, white for all-clear.

The Russian invited him to his home but he declined because "in the next five years my most important contribution will be made".

Why didn't he escape? "I might have tried, but I decided - after receiving a message from my contact - that it would be better to wait." "Right under the nose of the F.B.I. I met my friend and told him that we must stop meeting each other."



1-16-51:

Until today I have been making small, individual notes, but they are cumbersome and easily misplaced. The following represents a summation of what I have learned, of what I have been able to obtain, and my impressions of all that we have discussed. This does not include the notations I have already forwarded. In order to explain them in greater detail I will have to read them again on the 18th.

He has been "warned" by Bloch not to engage in any unnecessary conversations, and to avoid being associated constantly with Vago. Possibly for this reason he has been unusually reticent these past few weeks - more so than usual - but in no way giving me the impression that he suspects me or anyone of working against him.

On January 14th he returned from downtown a chastened and uncharacteristically silent person, thwarting all attempts at conversation. The following day he explained that his wife is disturbed - with her predicament, from reports received (specifically from her mother, whom he considers as being influenced by the government) of the children's behavior, and of the possibility that the death penalty may be imposed. She is - at his and Bloch's insistence - preparing to bar her mother from further visits, but at this point does not have sufficient fortitude. I urged him to consider my former advice, to concentrate on a means by which he might negotiate with the government for his wife's freedom, but he rejects this completely. Discussions regarding "negotiations" are for a later, much later date. Nevertheless, should his wife receive a lengthy sentence, possibly any sentence at all, since he feels that she - if not he - will be freed, it will be a severe blow.

I have, naturally, encountered many ardent supporters of socialism, in the past ten years, but I have never been associated with two men whose hatred for our government is so profound. Every statement contains the threat of "destruction", of violence, to America. In a recent discussion I casually mentioned that men under similar indictment in the Soviet Union would receive similar, if not worse, treatment, and my words invoked a storm that didn't subside for two days. These men are not merely communists; what is more important is that they are revolutionists - and that, even in the communist organization itself, is a horse of a different color.

I have become friendlier with Vago, out of necessity, for what I am unable to learn from my friend he can be counted on to supply. Vago is presently making plans to return to Budapest immediately following this trial, should he be freed. Certainly after any sentence he receives. He confided in me that he was all ready to leave shortly before his arrest, and, in fact, his mother-in-law's cellar contains many household items ready for shipment. He was concerned with this damaging situation and expressed relief that the government was as yet unaware that he been making such plans. He has made arrangements - surprisingly through a prisoner here - for a letter to come from France offering him employment, a home, etc. This week he instructed his wife to place his brother's Budapest address in an envelope and mail it to my sister in New York with instructions that only I am to open the envelope. He asked me to write to his brother as soon as I am released. I don't know anything about his brother except that he is sympathetic with Vago's ideologies. I will not know until Friday - when my sister visits - whether or not the letter arrived.

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There has been no opportunity for further discussion since he returned from court. I asked Vago what he intended to do in the event he was refused a passport, etc., and he replied as I expected he would (and with additional emphasis): "Then I will go by the tried and proven route". Should he manage to upset the government's case it would seem to be a good idea to arrange for his passport to be refused giving him the opportunity to "make other arrangements".

Upon re-reading these notes last night I realized that the man to whom my friend refers as the one he situated in the "West" may very well be the same person he used to mention in previous discussions: Herman. I have nothing to substantiate this belief, but in any event it should not be too difficult to eliminate from old City College records those of his friends who do NOT fit this description. If the person "Herman" DID fight in Spain it's better than even money that he is the same person now located out West. One way or the other one of the students who went to Spain and returned is the only person who can swear that he forwarded secret information to my friend. It seems obvious that no one will ever prove conclusively that my friend dealt directly with Russians, since he and the Russian with whom he dealt - singular and plural - are the only ones who can corroborate this association. But the link in the "West" can really substantiate an assumption.

I expect to continue my conversation this evening and I'll commit to memory all that he says of any importance. Please make certain that agents do not remove me from the bull-pen tomorrow; a marshal doing so is preferable. I hope you understand that after tomorrow I can not safely visit Foley Square, and that you have made other arrangements.

During my visit last Friday my mother told me that she had contacted a friend of the family, a New York City magistrate, who was interceding in my behalf to have the detainer removed. They were supposed to attend to this last Saturday and I am expecting word momentarily.

I have only 143 days remaining to serve on this sentence.

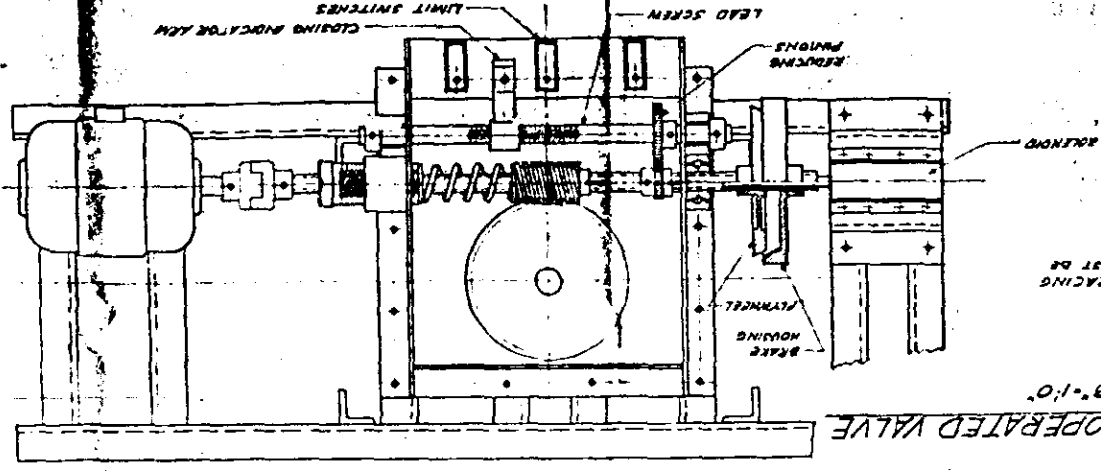

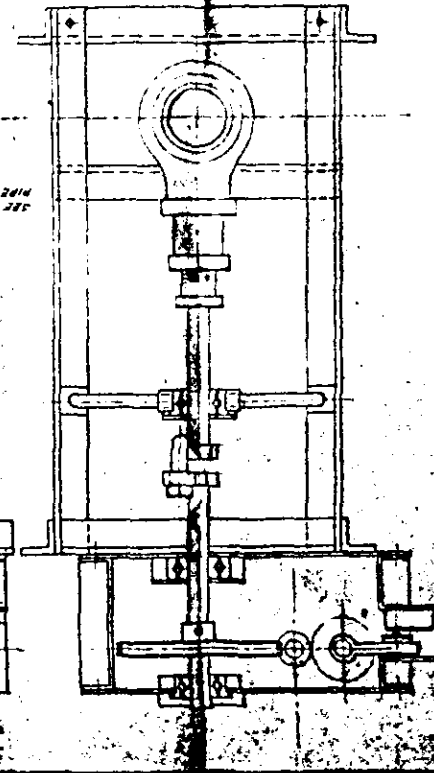
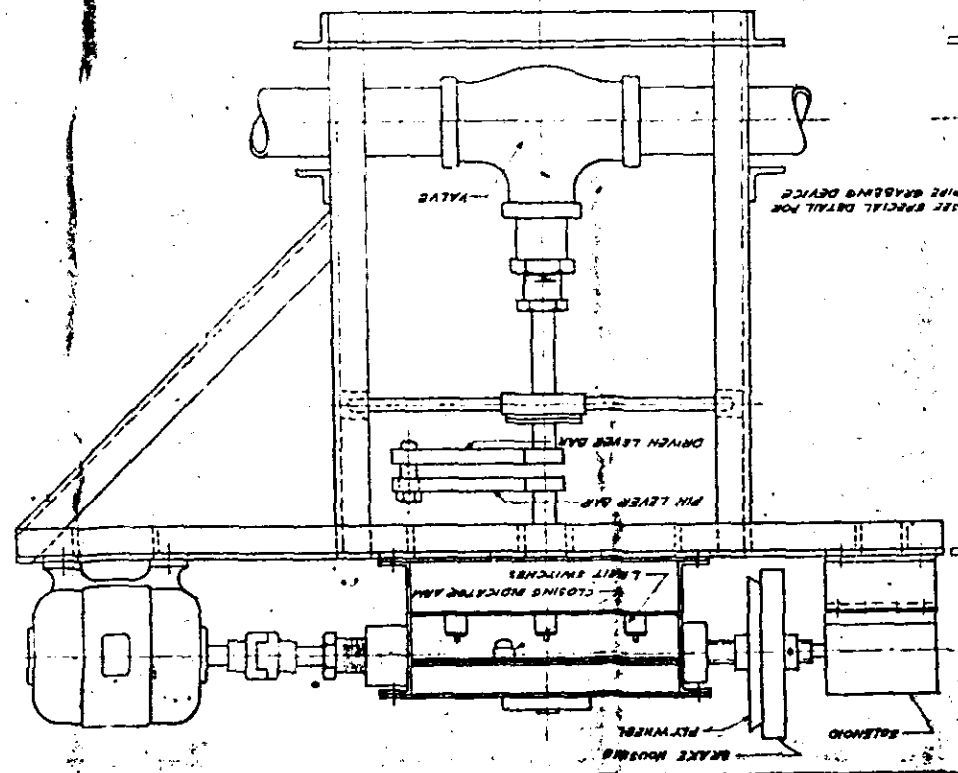

I, Bernard Greenglass, make the following voluntary statement to John W. Lewis whom I know to be a special agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. I understand that it may be used in a court of law.

I was a partner of my brother David Greenglass and my brother-in-law Julius Rosenberg in the G & R Engineering company in which I invested about \$1100 of my own money and about \$3800 borrowed from relatives, in 1946. In 1947 the G & R Engineering company was succeeded by the Pist Machine Products Company, Incorporated in which I received 25 shares of common stock for my investment. In the early part of 1950 I turned over my 25 shares of stock to Julius Rosenberg on his promise that he would pay me \$1000 or \$1500 at a later time if he were able to make a financial success of



Pitt machine Products Inc. To date I have received no payment for the stocks. I think that about \$1100 of the \$3800 I borrowed from relatives, has been repaid, so that I now have about \$1100 of my own and about \$2700 of my relatives invested in Pitt machine Products Inc., which Julius Rosenberg recently sold for about \$10,000. After the Corporation was sold, I asked Julius Rosenberg's attorney Mr. Block if I was going to receive any of the proceeds of the sale, ~~He gave me no answer~~ to this question to pay off the loans made from relatives. He gave me no answer to this question.

He returned from Court yesterday evening unusually elated. Was congratulated for his demeanor and resourcefulness on the witness stand. This is the most confident and hopeful I have known him since his arrest. We paced the cell block until after 11 P.M. discussing the days events from which the following emerged:

\* He is slightly concerned that Arthur Barr, Joel's brother, may testify that he, Julius, gave him money to send to Barr. This would also indicate that possibly now and surely at one time Arthur knew of Joel's whereabouts. But at the same time he admits that Arthur Barr is (what he describes as) a solid person.

\* Coincidentally, he reiterated his experiences in the Tombs during the Orbach strike. He was a member of the American Youth Congress then. Was fined \$25 or two days for disturbing the peace. Two of the men also imprisoned for the same offense were called Charlie and Moe. Both of them were members of the floor boys local of the Furrier's Union.

\* Mentioned an apartment rented by a student, ostensibly used for studying, on Morton Street, where he, Joel Barr, and "Bill" used to meet in secret to discuss their plans. Rent for this apartment was \$55.00 per month.

\* Is slightly concerned over whether or not the FBI can locate the passport pictures he had taken of himself and the family when he was contemplating flight. Asked me, as a photographer, if it were possible for them to canvass all the studios in New York. The pictures were not arranged for in his name. They were photographed at approximately the same time as was Greenglass.

\* Witness from the Tombs did not return to the elder Bloch's office.

\* Claims that the Sodoravich woman cannot possibly confess since it would involve her "entire family". I repeat that this husband and wife combination enjoyed the same position as did the Rosenbergs.

\* Sobell will definitely not testify (big secret) thus preventing the government from introducing witnesses in rebuttal. Kuntz claims Sobell - at the very worst - guilty at this time of association only, and may possibly be acquitted.

\* His lawyers are pleased with all attempts to label him a communist, claiming this detracts from the original issue and is grounds for a reversal.

Other than lengthy, detailed conversations between Brothman and Rosenberg concerning the structure of the organization, the manner of and reasons for its crumbling since the Fuchs arrest and its future potential, nothing relevant has been mentioned since my last communication. Except perhaps that:

\* The Herald Tribune is being subpoenaed in order to contradict the contentions of the Greenglass' that their recollection of Harry Gold was vague.

\* They have been notified by Macy's that unless they produce a receipt number it will be impossible to locate the sales slip for the console table. Incidentally, I'm convinced, personally, that he bought the table as he claims, and unless the Government is certain he did not I wouldn't press this matter. As a last resort they will ask the Court to order the department store to locate the receipt regardless of the difficulty involved.

\* He claims that they continue to toy with the possibility of returning Bernhard and his records to the stand, but nothing definite has been decided.

His attitude continues to be one of confidence. If nothing more concrete and damaging can be produced than has to date he believes there is a possibility of an acquittal. Especially against his wife and Sobell.

Mr. Cammarota:

As I intimated at our meeting circumstances are such as to require an immediate clarification of my position.

Several days ago I requested and obtained permission to visit with Rosenberg in his cell for several hours each evening. Nothing of importance has resulted from our conversations (with the possible exception of the statement that his "first contact from the Soviet Union was a Jew, an Engineer, and from Kharkov",) other than continued instructions in the procedure to be followed upon "my release". As you are no doubt aware, his attorney was here Saturday and, among other statements, informed Rosenberg that "public sentiment" would be a pertinent factor in the struggle to save his life. Rosenberg informs me that word has reached his attorney of impending "European reaction" to the sentence: "My friends in Europe (and I assume that he assumes we understand the allusion) will not remain idle" he explains contentedly. With reference to his "friends" here, the attorney awaits "word and funds". There is absolutely no talk of "negotiating" with the government, not for himself nor his wife.

As per arrangements I made myself visible to his attorney to facilitate future contact. He also left additional instructions with Rosenberg regarding "Retort!" - relative to Brothman's thesis and to the manner (coded) in which contact is to be established between his office and my future intermediaries. I was given to understand that Howard Fast, a personal friend both of Bloch and Dennis, will edit the commentaries on the trials for the publication. It has been definitely decided to make available for my immediate use (upon release), among other items I mentioned previously, two thousand dollars. I believe they arrived at this sum not only because it represents a sufficient amount to cover all necessary purchases (initial purchases, that is), but also in order to observe my actions and conduct at what might be a minimum loss. I have, over the weekend, been given the names of the "contacts" in New York, Detroit, Chicago, and California, as well as the coded message I am to use in greeting. Since, to their best knowledge, I have only a few days remaining, they are anxious to prepare me for the task ahead, and the greatest part of the time is spent in discussing the publication and the underground methods of operation to be utilized. The much more important realization of my accepting this assignment lies in the statement made Sunday by Rosenberg: "If you successfully complete this I'm going to make certain you meet with my friends for more important work". This is the point I was trying to establish when we met last week, and a conclusion I have recognized and awaited since my first intimacy with this man. I am absolutely certain that a complete submission to his plans and desires at this time will ultimately result in the establishment of contact with his friends.
