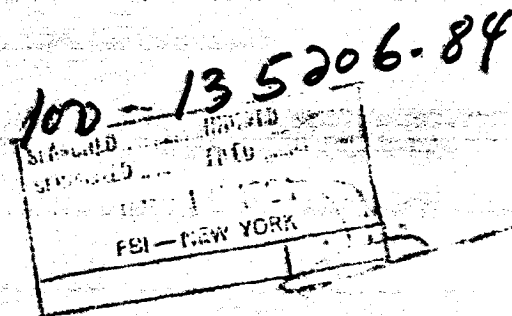

AND "PEOPLE'S WORLD" (PW) NEWSPAPER'S CONTINUED
SUPPORT OF KPFA'S PROGRAMS

The "Daily People's World" (DPW) newspaper, a West Coast Communist newspaper, on February 8, 1957, became a weekly newspaper, and has been known since that date as the "People's World" (PW) newspaper.

DPW, November 18, 1955, Page 6, Column 5

Doctor HERBERT APTHEKER, Communist writer and lecturer, will discuss current affairs for fifteen minutes on KPFA on November 19, 1955. Doctor APTHEKER's commentary is a monthly KPFA feature.

DPW, December 5, 1955, Page 5, Column 2

ADAM LAPIN, Associate Editor of the DPW, will participate in a roundtable forum over KPFA on the following Tuesday evening. Program is for forty minutes and the topic to be discussed is "Peaceful Co-Existence Between Capitalist and Socialist Nations".

DPW, December 8, 1955, Page 3, Column 1

An article entitled "Lapin Plugs Co-Existence on Air Forum". ADAM LAPIN was one of a three-man panel to discuss over KPFA the chances of peaceful co-existence being successful.

DPW, March 7, 1956, Page 3, Column 4

This article indicated that JOHN WEXLEY, author of "The Judgement of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg" was scheduled to be interviewed on KPFA on that date.

JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG were convicted in U. S. District Court, Southern District of New York, on March 29, 1951, of conspiracy to commit espionage on behalf of the Soviet Union. They were executed at Sing Sing Prison, New York, on June 19, 1953.

An interview with PABLO GARCIA, one of eleven Puerto Rican Communist Party(CP) leaders arrested under the Smith Act, will broadcast over KPFA twice during the week. GARCIA is free on \$15,000.00 bail pending trial. The broadcast, "Men and Issues" will be on Thursday and Saturday evenings.

A source advised on October 31, 1955, that the Bay Area Council of Sobell Committees (BACSC) was formed on October 17, 1955, in San Francisco, California, as the local affiliate of the National Sobell Committee, to carry out the policies of the National Committee to obtain the freedom of MORTON SOBELL.

On April 10, 1962, a second source advised that the BACSC has its headquarters at 345 Franklin Street, San Francisco, California, and is continuing to function and plan future Sobell affairs.

On December 18, 1959, a third source advised that MARY KRVAR, a member of the Warehouse Club, Communist Party (CP) East Bay Region, Oakland, California, and the paid organizer for the BACSC, has stated that the CP is interested in controlling the BACSC so that the BACSC will continue to follow the line of the National Sobell Committee in attempting to obtain the freedom of MORTON SOBELL.

COMMITTEE TO SECURE JUSTICE FOR MORTON SOBELL

"Following the execution of atomic spies Ethel and Julius Rosenberg in June, 1953, the 'Communist campaign assumed a different emphasis. Its major effort centered upon Morton Sobell, 'the Rosenbergs' codefendant. The National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case - a Communist front which had been conducting the campaign in the United States - was reconstituted as the National Rosenberg-Sobell Committee at a conference in Chicago in October, 1953, and 'then as the National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell in the Rosenberg Case'..."

(Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications" dated December 1, 1961, issued by the House Committee on Un-American Activities, page 116.)

In September, 1954, the name "National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell" appeared on literature issued by the Committee. In March, 1955, the current name, "Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell," first appeared on literature issued by the Committee.

The Address Telephone Directory for the Borough of Manhattan, New York City, as published by the New York Telephone Company, on April 9, 1962, lists the "Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell" (CSJMS) as being located at 940 Broadway, New York, New York.

Dear Member,

The 1975 nominating committee - consisting of the undersigned, Ms. Fanny Gronblatt and Dr. Ardon Denlinger - unanimously proposed the enclosed slate of 25 board members for 1975-76 which was endorsed by the board at its last meeting by a vote of 12 to 4. Since the slate is the result of careful consideration and full discussion by the committee and the board we feel we owe it to our members to describe briefly the new nominees and explain why four of the former members were not renominated. Three others were not renominated because they had either resigned or let their membership in the organization lapse.

In accordance with the stated objectives of our society we have, as always in our ten year history, sought board members who were not only generally concerned with peace but also had some specific relation to, knowledge of and interest in the GDR. We feel that this condition is admirably fulfilled by all six new candidates presented to you below to complete our 25 member board. (The 19 renominations as well as the 6 new nominations are listed alphabetically on the enclosed slate.)

New Candidates for the Board of Directors

- 1) DR. EDWARD ABERLIN - long standing active member of the society, has presented lecture and slides of his visit to the GDR.
- 2) DR. DAVID BATHRICK - Professor of German, University of Wisconsin at Milwaukee; Editor, New German Critique.
- 3) ROY BENNETT - United Nations correspondent for the Tribune of London; Executive with Noblemet International (activist in East-West trade); Associate Editor, Social Policy; Lecturer at New School for Social Research. Member of 1967 Study Group in GDR.
- 4) DR. RENATE BRIDENTHAL - Assistant Professor of History, Brooklyn College; Editorial board of Science and Society; authority on German women's movement.
- 5) DR. CALLISTUS NDLOVU - Director of Africana Studies Program and Institute at Hofstra University; co-sponsor of lecture by GDR diplomat Dr. Gottfried Lessing at Hofstra.

6) ~~MORTON SOBELL~~ served 20 years in prison on frame-up charge of conspiracy with Julius and Ethel Rosenberg; active in Attica defense; electronic-medical engineer interested in developments in the GDR; author of Doing Time being considered for translation in the GDR, Hungary and the USSR.

As indicated above, two vacancies were created by an explicit or implicit resignation, and no question arose about them during the lengthy board meeting which argued and, finally, adopted the nominating committee's proposal. There was, however, a serious question raised by the other four board members who were not renominated.

The nominating committee made it clear to all board members, and feels it should also make it clear to the entire membership, that its refusal to renominate these four members - one of whom is a long-time member of the organization - is not based on any criticism of their general competence or interest in the GDR. It is based on two specific facts.

The first is the fact that during the fall of 1974 these four board members, without the knowledge of the officers or board of the Society, used their connection with it to set up a new unrelated "US Committee for Friendship with the GDR," revealing their activities only when it became possible to present the board with a fait accompli. (Board members' names were deliberately eliminated from lists used for mailing material about the new organization and at least one board member was specifically refused a copy of a general circular about it which was being distributed by one of the four at a meeting she attended.)

This is the main CP activity

~~The board of our society does not object to the existence of the new group - in fact we welcome every extension of US-GDR friendship and hope that we can cooperate in many large scale activities with this new group. We do object to the deliberate attempt to conceal its formation from the majority of our members and to the disingenuous use of the society's name in approaching possible sponsors. (Friends have embarrassed several uninvolved board members by saying: "I signed your thing the other day" etc.)~~

The second fact is that the four board members in question are now all members of the steering committee of the new group - and one is general secretary pro tem - and we feel that both in terms of time, energy and possible disagreement on specific plans, as well as in terms of public confusion, it would be absurd for us to encourage such an "interlocking directorate."

We urge to all members make extraordinary efforts to insure a full attendance at the annual membership meeting at 6:30 pm, Friday, May 9 so that the election of the new board is based on the largest possible membership vote.

NEW YORK, Dec. 9—The Daily World 50th anniversary celebration in New York yesterday was marked by the participation of large numbers of non-Communists and new Daily World readers. These included many prominent personalities.

Among those in the audience were Carl Braden, co-chairman of the National Alliance Against Racist and Political Repression and long-time leader of the Southern Conference Education Fund (SCEF) in the South; Edward Bragg, vice-president of Local 1199 of the Drug and Hospital Workers Union; Jane Benedict, chairwoman of the Metropolitan Council on Housing, recognized as one of the nation's foremost organizers in the fight for tenants' rights.

Morton Sobell, who served 18 years in jail as a result of McCarthyite repression, was also in the audience.

Some of the writers and editors in the audience included Dr. Philip Foner, history professor and author of books on labor and trade union history; George Murphy, Jr., of the Washington Afro-American; Joe Walker, New York editor of Muhammed Speaks.

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Memorial meeting for the Rosenbergs

NEW YORK, June 14—Homage will be paid to the "courage, innocence and integrity" of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, at a memorial meeting here next Friday, June 22, at 7 p.m. The meeting, at the Martin Luther King Center, 310 West 43rd Street, will mark the 20th anniversary of the Rosenbergs' execution.

The meeting is sponsored by the National Rosenberg-Sobell Committee.

The Rosenbergs, victims of the cold-war hysteria, were convicted of "atomic espionage." They were executed in Sing Sing prison on June 19, 1953, after repeated attempts to get them to "confess" had failed.

Their co-defendant, Morton Sobell, was sentenced to 30 years imprisonment. A world-wide movement finally won Sobell's freedom after he had spent 19 years in federal prisons.

The memorial will combine a tribute to the Rosenbergs with support for current victims of repression. The program will include Morton Sobell, Father Ned Murphy, Carlos Feliciano, George Merritt, Charlene Mitchell, and Walter and Miriam Schneir. Pete Seeger and Howard Da Silva will also appear.

The United Defense to Free Political Prisoners is co-sponsoring the meeting. In a letter sent this week to members of the defense coalition, Charlene Mitchell, UDFPP spokesperson, stated:

"For those of us who are reaching middle age, the memory of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg is still vivid—and even after twenty years evokes deep emotion. For those who do not know of the Rosenberg case, it is important to learn about them.

"Julius and Ethel Rosenberg found the dignity to resist. Their innocence had no price. Their courage and sacrifice must be seen as part of the heritage of struggle upon which we must continue to build.

"It is certainly in keeping with the spirit of the Rosenbergs that attention will be given to some of today's victims."
