PROCEEDINGS

Of The 76th Annual Session of THE KINGS MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

The Kings Mountain Baptist Association convened with the First Baptist church of Kings Mountain, Tuesday October 5, 1926, at 10 a. m., for a two day session.

After a song service led by C. P. Gardner the moderator, Rev. J. W. Suttle, called the association to order and announced that Rev. D. F. Putnam would conduct devotional service. Brother Putnam read a Scripture passage from the first chapter of the Acts and made a very inspiring talk on the subject of waiting and praying before the Lord. Brother Putnam closed his devotionals by prayer.

The moderator appointed the following enrollment committee: C. C. Hamrick, C. R. Spangler, L. F. King and Max Wilson. Enrollment cards were distributed and the delegates enrolled. 143 was the enrollment the first forenoon.

On motion of D. J. Keeter the old officers were re-elected without awaiting the enrollment of delegates. A standing vote was called for. The officers re-elected are, J. W. Suttle, moderator, D. F. Hord, vice-moderator, G. G. Page, clerk, and George Blanton, treasurer.

The moderator announced the following finance committee, G. D. Hambright, W. H. Hum-

phries, J. R. Walker.

The introductory sermon was preached by Rev. G. P. Abernethy. He read a passage from Philippians 1:1-7, and took the sixth verse as his text. His subject was "Jesus Christ, the Author and Finisher of our Faith."

Prayer by J. J. Beach.

In the absence of the report on Biblical Recorder by J. C. Newton W. R. Beach spoke on the subject.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS (Read by Hoyle Love)

At the close of 1925 we had reported 2,202 schools, but with the mission school 2,250. The membership is now 312,840, a gain of 26,047.

In the last five years we have gained 91,812.

The ratio of Sunday School membership to church membership is 86.1. This means that for each 100 church members there 86.1 people in Sunday School. So far as I know this is the best in the South. Our own Association has 95.8 people in Sunday School out of each 100 church members. There are eleven associations which have more in Sunday School than they have church members. When we fall below the one hundred mark, there are only three ahead of us, namely, Raleigh, Stanley, and Alleghany.

As we come to the close of 1926 and go into 1927 what should be our objective? Brother Middleton says that we ought to have a gain of 25,-

000 next year.

With this in view, let us notice some plain facts

which are worth considering.

1. There are about 125 churches with no Sunday school and over 300 that close a part of the year. An effort should be made to put a yearround Sunday School in each church.

2. There are over 500,000 people belonging to our constituency in no Sunday School. Combined efforts should be made to reach them.

3. The organization of hundreds of schools need

enlarging and improving.

4. Many of our church houses are entirely inadequate.

5. There must be no let up in Teacher Training

or Sunday School Education.

6. Let us not forget Children's week, here we are trying to link up our homes and churches through the Sunday Schools in behalf of our 270,000 Baptist children.

7. The supreme task is in soul winning.

We have 650,000 lost men and women and 900,-000 children in North Carolina. Surely we have

no time to lag.

In conclusion, let me ask who will do this work? Most of it must be done by loyal co-operative pastors, superintendents, teachers and other workers in our local churches. These must have vision, so we have in our Association Brother A. Washburn, who is well qualified and is always on the job carrying inspiration wherever he goes.

Moved and carried that the reports on State, Home and Foreign Missions and Orphanage be read consecutively and all discussed together. The reports were read as follows:

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS (By Zeno Wall)

State Missions is the organized effort of our people to make Christ known throughout the

length and breadth of our entire State.

Nearly one hundred years ago the Missionary Baptists of this State met at Greenville and perfected an organization for doing mission work within the bounds of our state by taking a collection for State missions and by electing a secretary and two or three missionaries; and at that time there were fewer than ten thousand white and colored Baptists within the numbered while the anti-missionary forces twice as many as both the whites and colored. But today a very different story is told, there being more than 364,000 while Baptists 250,000 within this same territory, while it is estimated that fewer than ten thousand missionary Baptists are to be found now, which is, as you can readily see, the strongest possible argument in favor of the organized effort our missionary Baptist constituency; and stead of our having but three missionaries, as as the beginning of our work, we have 146 serving and helping 269 churches, to say nothing of the excellent work being done by our capable Sunday School Secretary and his force, our efficient B. Y. P. U. Secretary and his co-workers our consecrated W. M. S. president and her colaborers, our departments of Evangelism, Stewardship, our Baptist Book Shop, School for Preachers, our Mountain Assembly, Activities, and church building program. State Mission work has, in a way, become the heart of denominational activity sending its vitalizing blood to the needy places of our denominational body, giving help and courage to the weaker members, and holding high and

worthy ideals before our people. It is giving its best to us, and demands our best. Let's pray for State missions, and do all within our power for its increased usefulness.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS (By C. J. Black)

The Home Board is composed of eighteen members from the different sections of country occupied by the Southern Baptist Convention,

with a like number from Atlanta, Ga.

The Board is located at Atlanta, Ga., and Dr. B. D. Gray is the corresponding secretary. He has served faithfully in this capacity for more than twenty years and has given to the Board the very best of his life.

The Home Board carries on mission work in the southern part of the United States, including Cuba and Panama. Its territory is very

large and its task is tremendous.

It has a Department of Evangelism has done much good for the past ten years. This department had to be suspended temporarily during the early part of 1925, but when the Convention met in Memphis that year, the matter was taken under the most careful consideration again, and when the Board met the following June, the work was begun anew. Ellis A. Fuller was chosen to take charge of the work, and the following October he began operations. Much good has been accomplished by this department of our work. Last year 417 baptisms were reported for the short time the evangelists had been working. Many more were added by letter and numerous other things

were done by the workers.

The Home Board has done much good by supporting our mountain schools. Dr. O'Hara of Asheville has charge of this important phase of the work and is doing much good. This work was begun when our schools were scarce and hard to get to. Some of them have had to be discontinued, but we still have several which are doing a great deal of good for our mountain boys and girls.

The Home Board is doing mission work in Cuba and Panama. It has been very successful in these two sections, and yet the task is a very difficult one because of the influence of the

Catholic religion.

The Home Board has a splendid college in Cuba with an enrollment of 250 students and a fine theological department. A great many Armenians have gone to Cuba. These, too, are taking great interest in our school. Last year we had eighty of them enrolled.

The outlook for Cuba is very hopeful indeed, but the task is just begun. Havana alone has a population of 532,000. Cuba makes an especial

appeal to us as it lies to our shores.

The Home Board has done a great deal for the poor churches of the south by loaning them money to build creditable houses of worship in small towns where the Baptists were weak and poor, but this department has had to curtail operations until it is almost out of business. Lack of money has driven it to this point.

It has been operating the Baptist Sanatorium at El Paso, Texas, for sometime, but this has been a great liability to us. The Board has had to care for too many poor patients and the independent ones have gone to other hospitals for treatment, making it hard for this institution to exist. There is a plan on foot to run this institution over the Hospital Commission. If this transaction is consummated, the property of the Sanatorium will pass out of the hands of the Board and will no longer be a liability.

The Home Board has a very important Indian mission that is doing much good. Among these people we have some of our most loyal Baptists. Many of them are great givers and have done much for the work by helping with their means. Last year, the Board had 13 workers. These baptized 333 candidates organized 3 churches, 3 Sunday Schools, and gave away 414 Bibles and Testaments with other religious literature.

Mission work is also carried on among the southern negroes. Negroes are naturally Baptists. This makes a very fruitful missionary enterprise for our Board. Last year our missionaries baptised 1,874 and added 1,805 by letter. Twenty two churches were organized and twenty nine Sunday Schools.

The Board is doing much for the deaf mutes of the south by having a missionary to work with them. Rev. J. W. Michaels, a deaf mute, has chage of this department of our work. He has done much for the deaf of the south by originating an alphabet system that enables speaking people to learn to talk to the mutes. Churches have made arrangements for the mutes to attend their services and enjoy them by having some one to interpret the messages

to the mutes. This is usually done by a young lady. The First Baptist church of Houston, Texas, is an example.

The Home Board carries on a Publicity Department that has done a great good. It has sent forth thousands of pages of good literature to instruct the inquiring minds of the many who come under the influence of our missionaries.

It has workers among our sailors and seamen. Much good is being done along this line. Our workers distribute thousands of tracts and booklets among this class of folks and thus scatter the Word to the ends of the earth.

Possibly the most interesting phase of our Home Board work is among the Jews of the South. Rev. Jacob Gartenhaus, a Jew, has charge of this important work. Last year he baptised 218 and 183 by letter. He has written some very helpful tracts that have done a great deal toward evangelizing the Jews. He believes implicitly in the Messiah and has the power to convince the Jews that he is the Messiah.

The Home Board has done great and lasting good in our south land, but at present it is greatly handicapped with debt. The Baptists of the south have been wasting their money on the trivial things of this earth until the cause of our blessed Master is almost bankrupt. The Home Board has been fighting a losing battle for the past two years, and it seems that the end has not yet come. When the Convention met at Houston, Texas, last May, the Board owed \$889.265.04. Is this not a shame? Baptists have the money, but will allow their boards to be-

come bankrupt before they will let it go. What is the remedy? Two things. First, greater consecration. Second, the spirit of giving. The last is never going to come until the first comes. The task is before us, the victory is in sight, if we will only arise and equip ourselves for the things God has called us to do.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS (By H. E. Waldrop)

The Foreign Mission Board if the Southern Baptist Convention has closed the 81st year of its great service as a clearing house of Southern Baptists for the dissemination of the gospel in the most destitute parts of the earth. These 81 years have been filled with perplexing problems, hard work, and often with discouragements. But there has been an almost unbroken progress in evangelistic achievements and expansion of the Kingdom of Christ. The last year was the best year in all the years of the Board's history and work.

The following facts should be carefully stored up by pastors and messengers to this association and taken back to the whole membership of their churches:

1. Things Accomplished last year.

13,269 persons were baptized on our foreign mission fields during the last Southern Baptist Convention year, a gain of 1,135 over the previous year. The total membership is now 140,488. This membership is organized into 1.215 churches, 557 of which are self-supporting. These churches contributed last year \$444,258, nearly \$4.00 per member.

We have on these fields 1,818 Sunday Schools with 76,991 scholars, and 568 women societies with 13,649 members. There are also 574 young people's societies with a membership of 13.858. Of schools of all grades, including kindergarten up to theological seminaries, we have 920 with a total student body of 36,893 before the Board's finances made it necessary to discontinue many of these schools. It is found that more than 50 percent of the baptisms reported for the year was among these students in our Christian schools on the foreign fields.

The medical work of the Board for the year consisted of 214,910 treatments administered to 69,583 patients, of which 5,498 were in-patients. 934 of the operations performed by the Board's

medical staff were major operations.

2. A second fact to be remembered is the Finannancial Condition of The Board.

The Board started the year 1925-26 with a heavy debt and loud calls from its missionaries for reenforcement and relief. During the year the Board received from the Co-operative Program \$1,071,834.16; in designated gifts \$240,613.05; and in total gifts to the Christmas Love Offering \$811,344.11. The debt was substantially reduced, but there was left an indebtedness of \$727,000. The women of the South have undertaken to contribute as a Christmas Offering about Christmas time \$300,000 toward the further reduction of this debt.

The Board has for more than three years denied the missionaries all equipment such as residences, church buildings, school and hospital buildings, etc., and has now for some time

discontinued appointment of missionaries, although there has been sad depletion of the missionary staff by death and resignations. The distress and disaster of these denials of missionary needs may, to some degree, be estimated by the following extracts from missionary letters:

"The hearts of the missionaries have been torn and worn these past months for the news of discouragement that has been coming from the Board has been so hard to stand. In fact the Board is going to lose many men and women because of it for we cannot stand the strain forever and it seems that Southern Baptists have given us the whole thing to bear. We have been forced to break contracts and let preachers go who were employed in good faith, but we personally could not stand the strain. Still it is ours, as the workers blame us. Some are going to be forced to leave their fields because of it. The Board truly did not know what they were forcing us to do.

"We are at present spending our whole time in Canton. The reduced appropriation for our traveling expenses, this year, making this necessary. We have already used more for traveling expenses—far more—than the Board grants us to date. For the same reason, we have had to call off our Preachers' Conference and our Bible Women's Conference, and must depend, from now on on haphazard meetings with our workers who live out of town.

"We know perfectly well that when the Board cut out the appropriation for every one of the eighty preachers, teachers, Bible women and

colporters on the payroll of us two, you did not realize that 'Evangelistic Work in the Canton Field' and 'Day Schools in the Canton Field' meant not only Canton city, where we two have four chapels and schools, but it meant that vast territory assigned to us two—so vast that we formerly did well when we made the rounds once a year, holding meetings of a few days in each place."

"It was in our absence, on one of our missionary journeys, that the news came of this complete cutting of the ground from under us two.

"We are not complaining. You know better than we what the resources of the Board are; and all we do is to state the case; and we feel sure that you will do the best you can for the work we love better than we love our lives."

A small volume of extracts similar to the above could be made from missionary letters to the Board, but the above are sufficient for any who will have their hearts touched.

The world which the Foreign Mission Board is facing is a world in desperate need, but a world ready for Christ, its only hope. Will the Baptists of this Association suffer their beloved missionaries and their Foreign Mission Board to appeal in vain to them? Will they ignore the cries of a lost and ruined world for which Christ died and for which we have a sure and only remedy? The world needs the gospel, hundreds of young people are ready to carry it, and our people have the money to send them, if they would only give it.

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE (Prepared by Rush Padgett and read by A. V. Washburn.)

Of all the objects fostered by our Association, there is none dearer to our hearts than the Orphanage. It is loved and supported by nearer all our people than any other phase of of work.

Since the beginning more than forty years ago there has been a constant increase in the amount given from this association until last year. In 1900 this Association gave to the Orphanage \$165.97; 1907, \$459.87; 1910, \$731.79; 1920, \$1,966.08; 1921, \$2,693.48; 1923, \$3,943.91; 1924, \$4.955.04; 1925, \$2,813.10.

Thus we see a constant growth until 1925 where we see a considerable drop in the offerings to the Orphanage. It is hoped that we would not retract in any of our work and certainly it would be hoped that we would not fail the homeless child. Can we see the stream of applications flow on without any sign of abatement and not be moved to action? We have done much in the past and yet what a challenge the future holds for us, will we meet it worthily?

The total number enrolled from the beginning is 2,442. Number now in the two homes reaches 581. There are 373 children being aided

in their homes with their mothers.

The monthly cost per child is \$24.92. The daily cost of maintaining the institutions is \$482.23.

The total number of children being aided by the orphanage in the different ways number

954, such a wonderful work surely we will press on The committee offers no new method of doing the work. But do very urgently request that we be more faithful in working the plans we already have.

Dr. Charles E. Maddry, secretary of the State Mission Board discussed the reports.

Brother Zeno Wall announced that a fund was being raised in China to erect a memorial to the grave of G. P. Bostic who had given his life to China Missions and whose body lay in Chinese soil and that friends in this association had the privilege of contributing to this fund.

REPORT ON CHURCH FINANCE (Read by J. C. Gillespie)

Giving is so vitally connected with our Christion living that not to give means stagnation. The effect may be illustrated by the stagnant lake that does not give out any of its water.

Then, too, the matter of church finance has to do with the base of supply, which, when not properly met, causes all the departments of the work to suffer. The local expenses must be met that the greatest efficiency may be found in the force of the local workers and hence the greatest efficiency in the base of supply.

This may be done by getting each individual member, as nearly as possible to give "as he purposeth in his heart," and that this purpose be "as God has prospered him." (See 2 Cor.

9:7; 1 Cor. 16:2.)

To accomplish this task it is necessary that we continue to teach Stewardship in our churches. It is needful that our people discover their duty with reference to giving and how and when to give. These things may be learned by the study of Stewardship.

Then as a practical method for collecting

funds and financing the churches, we suggest the Budget system with the every member can-

vass as the best plan.

When we shall have learned that in this way we honor the Lord with our substance (see Prov. 3:9) and that we are not to give grudgingly but that god loves the cheerful giver |see 2 Cor. 9:7b), then we may well look for greater efforts for the promotion and the extension of God's kingdom among us and out to the ends of the earth.

REPORT ON WOMAN'S WORK (By Mrs. John Wacaster)

Organized work in the interest of missions 27

among Baptist women of North Carolina dates to the year 1815 of 1816 when the first society was organized in Fayetteville. In the following years the work went forward slowly, receiving much opposition from the brethren. The state organization was not completed however until 1886, since then our work has grown steadily and today I am happy to report that we are still going onward.

One force in the development of our work has been the definiteness of our aim. During the years we have had a standard of excellence toward which we have continually striven. The following organizations reaching all points are classed as A-I organizations. W. M. S. Boiling Springs, Shelby First, Waco and Zoar Y. W. A. Zoar; G. A., Zoar; R. A., Zoar; Kings Mountain First. Sunbeams, Boiling Springs, Zoar.

Zoar church has the distinction of being the only full graded A-I organization in the Association, there being only three in the entire State of North Carolina. For this honor she received a lovely banner from the Southern Baptist Convention.

One of the outstanding forces in our achievements is our Mission Study courses. We believe that an intelligent understanding of the needs begets interest and a genuine interest brings forth gifts. During the past year 49 Mission Study classes were held.

Still another secret of our progress is our regard for little things we do not have large gifts, but an almost infinite number of small contributions. Greater than any of these possibly greater than all of these is the reliance up-

on Jehovah as shown in the emphasis placed on prayer. We have study courses in prayer and definite times set apart for prayer times when the women of the state and the South unite in petitions for definite courses. These are some of the forces that have led us thus far toward victory and will guide us if followed out to undreamed of achievements in the future.

Our Association had the honor of winning the state banner given in Raleigh last March to the Association doing the best allround work.

Regular reports count much in our work; during the past ten months (our associational W. M. U. year), we raised \$4,677.07. Total number of organizations 55. Our annual meeting was held at Bethlehem with a splendid attendance.

The following are the officers for the coming year: Superintendent, Mrs. John Wacaster; Junior Superintendent, Miss Meldona Livingstone; Secretary, Miss Gertrude Street; Treasurer, Mrs. U. A. Black. Divisional Superintendents are: Division I, Mrs. D. F. Hord; Division II, Mrs. S. B. Hamrick; Division III, Mrs. Frank Elam; Division IV, Mrs. Fred Washburn.

In closing we ask your sympathy, co-operation and prayers, for there remains much to be done. The fields are white unto harvest and our prayer is, "that we may enlist more of our wo-

men in this great cause."

HISTORIAN'S REPORT FOR 1926 (By C. J. Black)

In 1693 several Baptists from West England and New England settled in South Carolina and organized themselves into a church with Elder William Screven as pastor. In 1737, a colony of Welch Baptists settled at Society Hill and began operations for their Lord. It was not long before both churches saw that it was best for them to organize themselves into an association, so in 1751, they organized The Charleston Baptist Association with only four churches. In 1771, The Congaree was organized out of This assochurches in upper South Carolina. ciation did not exist very long because of the erroneous teachings of Morgan Edwards. had them to place the discipline of the churches in the hands of the association instead of the churches themselves. This soon destroyed the freedom of them and they ceased to be Baptistic. After a few years, some hero of the Lord brought the scattered masses of the once Congaree together and formed The Bethel association. This was in 1789. This association did much good, and in 1800 the Broad River was organized out of it. This association operated in the upper part of South Carolina and the lower part of North Carolina. It soon became so large that it too had to be divided, 1851, the Kings Mountain association was or-

ganized at Double Springs Baptist church. Cleveland county. Thirteen churches went into the organization. These were, Buffalo, Sandy Run, Zoar, Zion, Double Springs, Bethel, Mt. Sinai, Mt. Pleasant, Broad River, Beaver Dam, and Pleasant Hill. The total membership of these thirteen churches was thirteen hundred and twenty five. Thomas Dixon was elected the first moderator and John R. Logan the first clerk. The association now has forty one churches and a membership of ten thousand. first there was not a single Sunday but now we have forty one. All of our organizations for the development of our young people have come into existence since the organization of this association.

John R. Logan was the first man to undertake an extensive history of this association. His task was a stupendous one, but he did his work well. His history was published in 1882. It is very rare now, and because of this it is

unreasonably expensive.

In 1911 Hon. E. Y. Webb wrote a short sketch of the association which was published in the minutes of that year.

Your historian desires to make the following recommendations:

1.—That our churches be instructed concerning the minutes of our association so that they will give more for the publication of them.

2.—That our church clerks be instructed concerning their letters to the association. Their reports are incomplete and do not give the information the clerk must have to give a correct account of the work done by our churches dur-

ing the year.

3.—That the clerks take enough interest in the matter to give the correct date of the organization of the churches they report for.

4.—That a committee be appointed to take into consideration the revision of the Logan

history, or a republication of it.

5.—That all old minutes and old religious newspapers be brought together and that they be placed in a fire proof vault for safe keeping.

6.—That a complete file of the minutes of the Kings Mountain association be bound and placed at Wake Forest College for safe keep-

ing.

The historian of your association has just completed a history of his church which he has labored on for many months. He wishes to thank the moderator and many of the brethren for their assistance in this undertaking.

Let us study our history that we may appreciate the labors of our predecessors more than we have been able to up to this good hour.

REPORT ON EDUCATION
(By D. G. Washburn)
North Carolina Baptists believe that Christ-

ian Education should develop the whole man the physical, intellectual and spiritual, and to this end are pursuing a broad systematic educational program. The ideals are the same as in other years, but methods change for the rea-

son that our problems change.

At one time Baptists owned fourteen High Schools in North Carolina. Now the Convention has only one—Boiling Springs. The Home Mission Board has four—Sylva, Haywood, Fruitland and Mountain View. At one time there were three or four times as many students in our High Schools as there were in college. For the school year 1925-1926 there were nearly twice as many in our colleges as in our High schools.

The ideal and need for Christian Education has not changed, but the type or grade of student to whom we must appeal has changed, and now Baptists are concentrating on Junior colleges and colleges, seeking, if possible, to train future leaders and through them reach as

many people as possible.

The following facts for the sessions of 1925-1926 indicate a steady growth. There were enrolled 1,081 High School students in Mars Hill, Wingate, Boiling Springs, and Buie's Creek, while 1,787 students were enrolled in college, as follows: Wake Forest 731, Meredith 467, Chowan 149, Mars Hill 271, and Wingate 169.

In our High Schools and Colleges we had 238 preparing for the ministry and 32 for Foreign Mission service. During the year Building and Equipment were added and completed valued at \$1,150,155, thus bringing the value of all

Schools under the control of the Convention to \$3151,518. Their total endowment is valued at,

leaving off the indebtedness, \$2,072.052.

The Home Mission Board owns in North Carolina four Schools, Fruitland, Haywood, Sylva and Mountain View. These enrolled 533 studets, among them, thirteen ministerial students. These Schools are valued at \$315,888.

These facts are encouraging and yet we must not forget that "To them that hath shall given." God has wonderfully prospered North Carolina Baptists and has given larger responsibilities and opportunities. The task ahead of us, is to see to it that our Institutions provide the best to the end that our leaders shall be equipped with manhood and womanhood, sympathy and scholarship.

To accomplish this end, money must be given by our people, for our Institutions must have buildings, annual support and endowment. It is no longer a question of students, for the best who graduate from our High Schools are seeking to enter our Baptist Schools. It is solely a question of proper financial support for those already in, or those seeking to enter that they may prepare and equip themselves for efficient service in Kingdom Work.

REPORT ON BAPTIST HOSPITAL (By W. E. Lowe)

Our Baptist Hospital at Winston-Salem is operated for service and not for profit. Private hospitals may sometimes be operated by their owners as a source of personal revenue,, but this is not true of the North Carolina Baptist Hospital. Its only resource for charity work is oftimes through free-will offering on Mothers' Day of each year. The 4 percent received from the Co-Operative Program is used for the payment of bonds which come due each year. This was authorized by our Convention in the erection of the institution.

The number of charity patients continues to increase year by year. There were about 400

charity patients cared for last year. These patients come from all parts of the State. These poor people, whom we shall always have with us, would have no place for treatment were it not for the charity work done by our Hospital. The money given for this Hospital work is not used for the benefit of the sick and suffering of Winston-Salem, for the churches of Winston Salem have given liberally for the support of the Hospital and more than pay the expenses of their own patients, but for the benefit of the poor sufferers scattered over the State.

Some facts about the splendid work of our

Hospital:

The average death rate of other hospitals is 34.8 per 1,000. For our Hospital it is 14.3 per 1,000. Their death rate is nearly three times that of ours.

The average death rate of mothers in giving birth to children in other Hospitals is 20.5 per

1,000, in our Hospital no deaths at all.

The average stay in other Hospitals is 10.7 days, in our Hospital 9.0 days, or in other words one day in every 10 is saved by going to our Hospital. All this speaks well of the character of our service, the efficiency of our nurses, and skill and ability of our physicians. The nurses are taught that prayer is the great part of our ministry and they go to their work each morning from the prayer meeting.

The rich and the poor share alike every good thing. There are no charity wards. The paypatients and charity patients are placed side by side. Nobody knows the one from the other except the officials of the institution. They are

all God's children and all deserve the best we

can give.

This year 500 of the poor sick ones will come. It will cost us \$25,000 to do this work. We need help from the brotherhood of the State. Let us not forget to make a great offering on Mother's Day for our Hospital and help to carry on this great work for the benefit of the poor and needy.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE AND PUBLIC MORALS.

What is the remedy? It is easy to say what it is. Let us have better homes. Let us erect a higher standard in them, and then our young people are safe. Apply the acid test to present day amusements and eliminate all of them you find to be detrimental to the best interest of our children and we are safe. Otherwise we

are not.

REPORT ON B. Y. P. U. WORK

(By W. G. Camp)

To those of us who remember the struggles that the B. Y. P. U. work was having twenty five or more years ago, its present accomplishment is wonderful. The present B. Y. P. U. organization of North Carolina was formed in 1909 and the first State Convention was held at Durham in 1910. At that Convention sixteen years ago ten unions were represented. The last Convention was held at Meredith College, Raleigh, June 1926, and was attended by more than sixteen hundred representatives. The B. Y. P. U. State Conventions have become the largest Baptist meetings in North Carolina.

There are unions in approximately 1,150

churches and in all of our schools and colleges in the State, making the total number of unions in North Carolina 1,800. This is splendid, but we must at the same time remember that there are at least one thousand churches in North Carolina which have no unions and are without the valuable training services furnished by the B. Y. P. U. In the Kings Mountain Association we have unions in 34 churches. There are, therefore, 7 churches in our Association without such organizations. We have 19 Junior unions, 12 Intermediate unions and 35 Senior unions in the churches where the work is fostered.

In the State we have two whole time workers in the field, these being Mr. Perry Morgan, General Secretary, and Miss Winnie Rickett, who is the Junior and Intermediate Secretary. They conduct training schools and institutes, hold associational and district rallies and plan for the programs and meetings of the State Convention. Their services are obtainable for work in city, town and country churches anywhere in the State. They may be reached by a letter addressed to Raleigh, N. C.

The work is fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Pastors everywhere commend the work accomplished by the unions in the highest terms. The B. Y. P. U. is one of the greatest training agencies of the young people in our denomination. Its object is declared in its constitution to be "The increased spirituality of the young Christians, their training in essential church activities,

their edification in Scriptural knowledge, their instruction in Baptist doctrine and history, and their enlistment in all forms of missionary endeavor through existing denominational organizations." This is a great aim and its plishment has been undertaken and carried on in a great way. Their program is for enlightment and enlistment. They have a curriculum of twenty books in addition to the topics studied in the B. Y. P. U. quarterly. These books deal with such subjects as stewardship, church membership, Sunday School and church methods, Bible study, doctrine, Christian service, and Baptist history. The work is truly educational and is bearing rich fruitage from year to year in preparing our young people for active, intelligent and capable participation in advancing our great cause. Those advantaged by such training readily take leadership in the work of their churches s they reach mature age. good accomplished is beyond computation.

We heartily recommend that all of our churches undertake the maintenance of at least one B. Y. P. U., and that the number be increased as rapidly as possible until all of the children committed to our care by Divine Providence have the advantages offered by this work. We recommend that the churches elect the officers of the unions, publicly installing them and recognizing them as church officers; that they be called upon for regular reports and be made to fully realize their responsibility to the church. We further recommend that each individual church support this work financially, regularly defraying the expenses of its local union

and contributing to the cause in the State at large; and that the work and workers have and be assured of having the sympathy and prayers of all of our people.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF BOILING SPRINGS HIGH SCHOOL (By Principal J. D. Huggins)

To the Kings Mountain, Sandy Run and Gaston

County Baptist Associations:

Your school closed its 19th year on April 21, 1926. The total enrollment for last year was 224. This was 48 less than was the enrollment for year before last. At the date of the associational meeting last year, the school had enrolled 211. This year (to date) it has enrolled 172. This is 39 less than was the enrollment at the same date last year. The loss in enrollment has been confined almost entirely to the 8th and 9th grades, the first two years of high school.

During the nineteen years of its history, 495 young men and women have been graduated and approximately 5,000 students have enrolled

and been benefited by its work.

The four Literary Societies have enrolled the entire student body. The spirit of the B. Y. P. U. dominates the life of the institution.

There are now 18 ministerial students, 7 volunteers and 119 enrolled in the Bible department.

As the State Educational Board is so heavily in debt that it is not possible for it to materially aid the school, it is earnestly hoped that the three associations will take care of the tuition of the ministerial students and the volun-

teer girls.

In view of the fact that the enrollment of the lower classes is being materially decreased by the phenomenal growth of the state high school system and especially due to the fact that there seems to be a very great demand in this section for a junior college in which the graduates from the surrounding high schools may secure two years college work, your board passed at its last meeting the following resolution: "Resolved, that this board recommends to the associations that this school become a junior college the next scholastic year.



REV. A. C. IRVIN

Born February 4, 1843.

Died January 8, 1926.

Abram C. Irvin was born of noble parentage, in Cleveland County, N. C., near Zion Baptist church, and died in the Shelby Hospital January 8th, 1926, after a brief illness. His father was A. J. Irvin, and his mother was Miss Elizabeth Beam before marriage. Brother Irvin was married twice: first, to Miss Harriett Weathers, and to this union two girls were born—Ollie, now Mrs. J. W. Wood, and Hester, now Mrs. C. A. Washburn; second, to Miss Mariah Jane Cornwell, and to this union three sons—J. W., J. Y. and Pink, and one daughter, May, who preceded him to the other

world many years ago.

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He was converted early in life and united with Zion Baptist church in which he held continuous membership to the time of his death. During the Civil war he joined the Confederate army and did his duty till it was over. After the war was over, he, along with his comrades, came home to help rebuild the South. But the Lord wanted him to help set up the Kingdom of God in the world, so not long after his return home he heard and responded to the call of God to preach the Gospel, and for Fifty Years he visited in the homes of God's children, preached the gospel in arbors. groves, homes, school houses and churches, buried with Christ in baptism over three thousand precious souls, laid away to rest uncounted hundreds. united in the holy bonds of wedlock scores scores of happy hearts, and was used of the Holy Spirit in calling out many "preacher boys" as he loved to call them, a portion of whose mantel has fallen upon D. Frank Putnam, D. Gordan Washburn, B. Monroe Bridges, James G. Gillespie, and D. F. Putnam. Zeno Wall. Zeno Wall.



MISSIONARY G. P. BOSTICK
Born May 29, 1858. Died June 21, 1926,

Rev. George Pleasant Bostick was born at Floyd's Creek, in Rutherford County, North Carolina, May 29th, 1858, and died at Kweitchfu (Gwadayto) China, June 21, 1926. He was educated at Wake Forest College, and the For nearly two Baptist Theological Seminary. years he was pastor of two of our Baptist churches here in our state—at Concord, and the First Baptist church, Durham. But the call of Christ to China was too strong for him to remain in this land, so in the spring of 1889 he and his young wife, and their only child, Adelaide Price, sailed away to China where they gave their lives to the cause of Christ. While away from home preaching tour his wife contracted smallpox and died and was buried when he returned. But four years later God gave him another companion the person of Miss Mary Thornton, herself missionary to China, and God blessed this union with four fine children—Bertha, Mattie, Sam and Thornton. But in 1900 the peace of the family was again broken into as the Boxer uprising compelled them to flee for their lives. They went to Chefoo where they spent two and half years. But as soon as it was safe for him to travel again he went back into the interior of China to carry on the work of the Lord, and to prepare a place for his family; and, lo when he returned he was met by his motherless children who told him that mother died of pneumonia two weeks and had already been buried. Oh, what a test of faith! But he held on to the Lord, and went right on with his work. In 1905 he and his family moved to Pechow, the home of his sister, Attie, where he lived the remainder of his life as an evange-55

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listic missionary preaching the gospel to uncounted thousands, sending out tracts and Bibles, baptizing hundreds of Chinese (some of whom have already baptized thousands, in turn) organized the baptized into churches in which they might worship and be trained, contended for the faith once for all delivered to the saints, and doing all within his power to advance the Kingdom of God among the heathen. In 1907 he was married to Miss Lena Stover of Luray, Virginia, who through the closing eighteen years of his life shared with him both his joys and sorrows, and who was at his bedside at the time of his death. His body rests in China today—the land to which God called him, and where he gave 37 glorious years, and his soul has gone back to God who gave it, and he has left to us an heritage of faith and sacrifice of incalculable value.


