



PROCEEDINGS

First Day-Forenoon Session

- 1. Pursuant to previous adjournment, the Kings Mountain Baptist Association met with the New Bethel Church on October 6, 1932, in its Eighty-Second Annual Session. Songs by the congregation: "Come, Thou Almighty King;" "Marching to Zion." J. W. Suttle, former Moderator, called the body to order at 9:40 A. M. Devotional exercises were led by J. D. Bridges, reading and briefly commenting on I Cor. 13. Prayer by W. A. Elam.
- 2. An Enrollment Committee was announced. On motion, permanent organization was proceeded with. By standing vote, J. W. Suttle was elected Moderator for the twentieth successive year. Other officers were elected as follows: W. A. Elam, Vice-Moderator; J. V. DeVenny, Clerk; Geo. Blanton, Treasurer; and C. J. Black, Historian.
- 3. A number of visitors, representing the general denominational work, together with several from neighboring Associations, were formally recognized at this time. (See list of visitors.)
- 4. L. L. Jessup moved an Amendment to Article 3 of the Constitution relative to the election of officers. A Committee was appointed to consider such Amendment and to make recommendation on tomorrow.
- 5. Song: "Amazing Grace." Prayer led by A. T. Howell. Without presenting a formal report, T. L. Justice spoke on the subject of Religious Literature. Some announcements were made by B. K. Mason, representing The Biblical Recorder. Report handed in later and published without being adopted.

RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

A glance at the news stands today will convince us that the tendency of the people is toward literature of a mentally destructive nature. Sex appeal, polluted politics, Bolshevism, banditry and

such like seem to meet with public approval in the printed page. Our responsibility at this time is to contrast this demand with that for religious literature. While the reading public is obviously anxious for reading matter of the sort mentioned above, yet there seems to be a spirit of indifference toward the printed expressions of religious men and women. As an example, only about one-fourth of our Baptist families receive the Biblical Recorder, to say nothing of the neglect of Charity and Children, Home and Foreign Fields, Royal Service, etc. Our people called Baptists should have these conditions brought vigorously to their minds without delay and with repeated effort. There is also another aspect of which we should be reminded, namely: The fundamentality of the basis of the religious literature of men; the Bible. Paul referred to it as the breath of God; that literature which is a life-giving force. Ezekiel 37:7; that literature which is the saving power of the nations; Romans 1:16; that literature which is the Christian's defensive weapon; Eph. 6:17; that literature which is a probing instrument; that literature which is a cleansing influence; Psalms 119:9; that linterature which will divert the individual and universal mind and heart and philosophy from its false and erring and ruinous direction. When our people are turned in their reading to the Book of all books, our ships of State and society will gradually right themselves, and our fundamental troubles will flee as the dew from the presence of a rising and gloriously resplendent sun.

6. The Report on Woman's Work was read and adopted, after being very ably and interestingly spoken to by Mrs. John Wacaster, and a special song, "How Long Must They Wait," being rendered by Horace Easom.

W. M. U. REPORT

As we realize that we are stewards of the Gospel, that by Christians must the message be carried to all the world, that Jesus is depending on us, our Christian hearts have a consuming desire to be true to this trust. Yet doubtless in every heart there is the question, How can I be true? How can I do my part toward winning the lost world to Christ? First, be a soul-winner wherever you are.

The W. M. U. is not neglectful of this very important phase of Christian service. She includes among her fundamentals "Personal Service" with "Soul-winning" as the chief motive. Yet surely none of us would claim that we are doing our best. Oh, that it could be said of us as of John Wesley, that he was out of breath from pursuing souls.

Then, too, the W. M. U. places much stress on Praying. The greatest of all things we can do for the spread of the Gospel is to pray. Thru prayer we can journey around the world, even while we stay at home. Things happen in far away places because we pray.

Away in foreign lands they wondered, How their single word had power; At home the Christians, two or three, Had met to pray an hour.

The possibilities of prayer are limited only by the power of God.

Surely prayer is the Christian's greatest privilege, his greatest oppor-

tunity and his greatest power.

The W. M. U. is also trying to lead its members into the light of giving—the Lord's way, the systematic way—the only way, that of tithes and offerings. For by these, His house is to be supported and His Kingdom to be extended.

Upon these three things the W. M. U. is laying special emphasis—

Soul-winning, Prayer and Giving.

A statistical report of our work for the year will be found in the report of our associational meeting. This meeting was held at Double Shoals with a splendid attendance and a very interesting program. Once again I ask for the W. M. U. of this Association your continued interest, co-operation and prayers.

7. The Report on Mills Home was read by W. A. Elam and adopted following an able and stirring address by M. O. Alexander, of Thomasville.

MILLS HOME

This great institution at our doors needs no introduction to Baptists of North Carolina. It is worthy of all the spiritual and material support that we can give it.

In August, the State from one end to the other, was shocked to learn of the tragic death of General Manager M. L. Kesler. He was regarded as the most outstanding child welfare man in the South. He has gone on to glory, but he shall not be forgotten by those of us who remain. We are glad to announce that Professor I. G. Greer has been elected as General Manager and took active charge Oct. 1, 1932. Mr. Greer comes from the Appalachian State College, Boone, N. C. He has had fine training and is regarded as a man of outstanding ability.

On June the 4, 1932, there were in the institution 632 children, of which number 136 were in the Kennedy Home. In the Mothers' Aid Department there were 298 children with 74 mothers being aided in

their own homes.

The children in the Mills Home have the best possible training for their souls, minds and their bodies. The church is active in its agencies looking after the soul. The school is one of the best in the land, training the mind. The bodies of the children are guarded with good food, plenty of exercise, and proper amount of sleep.

- 8. At this point, a number of Committees were announced by the Moderator. (See list of Committees.)
- 9. At 11:30, the Annual Introductory Sermon was delivered by D. F. Putnam, the appointed preacher, after prayer offered by D. G. Washburn. Matt. 16:13-20 was read, and verse 19 selected as the text. Subject: The things of God's Kingdom entrusted by Jesus to His followers. Keys used in opening the stores of the Kingdom to mankind: Faith, love, regenerated and empowered human activity, study and preaching of God's Word, the touch of personal service.
- 10. Closing announcements were made, and a recess for the noon hour was taken until 1:30 P. M. Prayer and benediction by W. W. Rimmer.

Afternoon Session

- 11. Songs: "Stand Up For Jesus" and "Loyalty to Christ." Solo by Horace Easom, "When They Ring The Golden Bells." Prayer offered by M. L. Barnes.
- 12. The Reports on Co-operative Program and Church Finance, State Missions, Home Missions, and Foreign Missions were read in turn, the first by Zeno Wall, the second by L. L. Jessup, third by H. E. Waldrop, and last

by J. B. Davis. On motion to adopt the State Mission phase of the subject was discussed in a speech of much power by J. M. Page. H. E. Waldrop spoke briefly to Home Missions and called the body to prayer. Song: "Amazing Grace" by the congregation. Horace Easom spoke with special reference to the Every Member Canvass as a means of carrying out the New Testament teachings in financing the Kingdom of God. J. B. Davis spoke on the Foreign Mission phase of the subject. Mrs. G. P. Bostick, widow of former Missionary Bostick, was introduced by Zeno Wall, and spoke tender words concerning her deceased husband and his conversion and call of God. Brother Wall closed the discussion with an appeal for religion in the home that should reach out to the nations. The reports were adopted as read.

CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM AND CHURCH FINANCE

"The Co-operative Program is simply the plan or method adopted by Southern Baptists for the prosecution of their Mission, Educational and Benevolent Work. We believe it is the best plan yet devised and it is more and more coming into favor with the churches."

"No plan, however perfect, will work itself, and the apparent failure of the Co-operative Program is really the failure of the pastors and churches to set up the Co-operative Budget, make the Every Member Canvass and thoroughly and completely put it on in the churches." This lack of preparation and execution, of course, causes the lack of support to the local expenses.

The Committee makes the following recommendations:

1st. That every church be urged to make the Every Member Canvass on November 20-27th, and as far as possible see to it that every member, in every church, is given the opportunity to make a subscription.

2nd. That every church possible be induced to send in funds

once each month.

3rd. That ample preparation be made for the Every Member Canvass by sermons, tracts, the organization of the Promotional Work in the Association as suggested by our State Convention Promotional Committee, under the direction of the Southwide Committee.

STATE MISSIONS

The position of State Missions in its relation to other phases of our work is similar to that of a kind and loving mother who has been left by her children to die of starvation. Some of the largest and most important churches in the State, as well as a good many smaller ones, owe their gratitude for financial relief during their earlier days to State Mission funds. Now, in the time of her great need, and as she faces challenging opportunities for greater service than ever, support has been withdrawn by many of our Baptist people, and our State Mission Board has had to retrench its activities

almost to the vanishing point. The Lord is just as interested in the spiritual development of our State as He ever was, and claiming to be His people, we should support this great work with renewed vigor. While conditions are like they are, it is suggested that many local pastors and ministerial students may do a great work by offering their services in training schools, religious services in prison camps, hospitals and other phases of State Mission work which cannot be provided by the Board at this time.

HOME MISSIONS

The eighty-seven years of the work of the Home Mission Board

can hardly be surpassed by any organization in the world.

The receipts of the Board have declined in the past eight years from \$908,5555 in 1924 to \$539,351 in 1931. Yet the Board has carried on its work to the glory of God, paying debts, running Mountain Schools, Mission Stations, Good Will Centers, preaching the Gospel to the natives and foreigners.

This work among the foreign speaking people on our shores is in

my opinion the greatest work of our Home Mission Board.

There are thirty-eight mission workers, doing work in 122

churches and mission stations.

The work among the Jews by Rev. Jacob Gartenhaus, a converted Jew, who was reared in the city of Jerusalem, is not surpassed by the work of any man living. He goes day and night telling the story of Christ to his Jewish friends. We can not mention all our mission workers, but we can pray for them.

The Board will have in the next 12 months obligations maturing to the amount of \$251,850. When this amount has been paid it will

leave less than \$100,000 to carry on all the work of the Board.

One of the great features of our Board is our Mountain Schools. There are 14 of them with 114 teachers and nearly 2,000 students. Last year there were nearly 800 students turned away from their doors, because of the lack of funds.

The property of our Mountain Schools is valued at \$1,219,000. There is no doubt that all of our work is in great need of our support and is worthy of all we can do for it.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

The distressing decline in receipts of the Foreign Mission Board during the last two years has been discouraging, but this discouragement is dispelled quickly when we view the things done abroad. We may have a depression here in the homeland, but there comes to us evermore great expansion of heart with renewed determination to press forward when we hear of the marvelous triumphs of our work in other lands. Our missions are prospering wonderfully.

In 1906 we had 214 churches. By 1931 these had grown to 2,681 churches. One of the most remarkable things about this growth is

that 1,868 of these churches are self-supporting.

There were 12,894 members in our churches twenty-five years ago, whereas in 1931 there were 169,311 members. Our membership multiplied thirteen times. The growth in membership has been more rapid during the last few years. It is worthy of note that we baptized

more people last year than we had church members twenty-five years ago.

One of the most specific evidences of growth is shown by the contributions made by the churches abroad. These churches gave for the support of the work last year, \$145,000.00 more than Southern Baptists gave the support of the Foreign Mission Board in 1906. fil fil fil

An outstanding assurance about our work abroad during the last two years has been the wonderful way in which it has stood the strain caused by our failure to support it properly during that period. The fine manner in which it has held together has been a revelation of how solidly the work has been done in other years. It encourages us to take up with more hopeful zeal the support of the work in a larger way in the future.

The present year has been one of great revivals. Think of a revival experience like this reported in Africa by one of our missionaries, when a whole village came to Christ: "One of our Baptist pastors went there and baptized 1.444, and another thousand was seeking baptism. They had left their idols and they wanted a true and living God, but they did not know how to go about finding Him."

Our Pressing Emergency

"We are now confronted with the most critical emergency the Board has ever faced. Our income always drops off seriously in the summer and early fall months. In the past, during this lean period, we have gone to the banks and borrowed money to tide us over. When our income revived, we repaid the banks. During the last two years our income has not picked up sufficiently to enable us to repay the bankers, and we have been forced to add the borrowings for current expenses to our old debt. The bankers have notified us that we cannot borrow more money, yet during the coming lean period we must be prepared to meet promptly the authorized drafts which come in from our missionaries from all over the world. If we should fail to meet one of these drafts when it is presented, the credit of our Board will be ruined. What can we do?"

In response to this statement of the Foreign Mission Board the recent Southern Baptist Convention appealed to the Baptists of the South to raise \$300,000.00 during June and July to relieve the distressing emergency of the Home and Foreign Mission Boards. Of this sum \$190,000.00 is for the Foreign Mission Board and \$110,000.00 for the Home Mission Board. This money is to be used to meet the regular expenses of the Foreign Mission Board such as salaries of the missionaries, both native and foreign. The life of this Board hangs in the balance of Southern Baptist devotion to this cause.

Nine churches report nothing for Co-operative Program. The following show an increase over last year in their gifts: Casar, Dover, Kings Mountain First, Macedonia, Mull Chapel, Patterson Grove, Pleasant Grove, Sandy Plains, and Zion.

13. Miscellaneous announcements were made; the Doxology was sung and closing prayer offered by D. G. Washburn.

Night Session

14. The meeting came to order at 7:00 P. M. Song: "Yield Not To Temptation." Prayer led by W. P. Biggerstaff. Song: "Stepping In The Light." At the instance of the Moderator, Mrs. L. H. Ledford, President of the Associational B. Y. P. U. organization, took charge. The Report on B. Y. P. U. Work was read and spoken to by Mrs. Ledford, showing the large place this work has in the life of the young Christian. Paul Wilson spoke on the B. Y. P. U. in the rural church. A duet was rendered by Misses Madge Spurlin and Frances Graham. The report was adopted.

B, Y. P. U. WORK

The growth of our B. Y. P. U. organization came with the realization of the importance of the young people's work in the local church. For twenty-five years it has grown by leaps and bounds. New methods have been introduced from time to time, and plans have been made as best possible to meet the needs of young Christians.

The Baptist churches of North Carolina have more than 2,400 unions and 457 general organizations. During the past year 368 unions reached the standard of excellence and over 20,000 study

course awards were given.

In the Kings Mountain Association, there are 85 unions with approximately 2,000 enrolled, and 15 general organizations. Most all of the unions have held at least one study course during the past year. Our Association is divided into five districts with a leader for each district and a quarterly meeting is held in each district at which time interesting programs are given by the young people.

Our Associational Convention was held at the Second Baptist Church, South Shelby, June 7 with fifty per cent of our churches represented and a fine program was rendered. Miss Winnie Rickett, our beloved State Secretary, gave the address of the afternoon. Our

meeting next year will be held with Poplar Springs Church.

A number of our churches have the adult union, which is not a new organization but has only recently come into its place of proper emphasis. A special quarterly is prepared for the adult union.

Every church needs a young people's organization for there are young people in every community. It is urged that every church, where it is practical, have a general organization.

For the past year 2 special features have been contributed to by our young people, namely: Subscriptions to the Biblical Recorder and the Johnson Memorial Fund, also all possible pressure and emphasis have been placed on the Every Member Canvass. Our B. Y. P. U. folks seem to be willing to co-operate fully.

We ask for the co-operation of every pastor and all who are interested in the work of our young people that we may "go forward" and that God will continue to bless us.

15. The time having arrived for the Annual Doctrinal Sermon, W. G. Camp, the chosen preacher, came to the platform. Song: "Make Me A Channel of Blessing." Prayer led by J. M. Walker. Is. 6:8, Acts 13:2, and Acts 16:9 were read as a basis for the discourse. From these Scriptures the speaker deduced the vital doctrine of the divine call to service in giving the Gospel to the world. The call from above to the individual; the call from within to the church; the call from without to the chosen group. The three calls blend into one—the call to carry the Gospel message for God. The closing prayer and benediction was offered by the Moderator.

Second Day-Forenoon Session

16. Songs: "Blessed Assurance" and "The Way Of The Cross." Prayer led by L. L. Jessup.

17. Sunday Schools was reported on and spoken to by J. W. Costner, and the report adopted.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS

The chief aim of the Sunday School is the salvation of the lost and the edification of the saved. Thiis is the great concern of God, the mission of Jesus, and the prime endeavor of the Holy Spirit. No man ever had or ever can have a nobler mission.

The soul winner majors on spiritual issues and for that reason is a social worker of the highest order, but he is far more, for he projects himself into eternity by bringing men into fellowship with

God.

To meet the aims of the Sunday School requires men and women of the highest spirituality. They are fellow workers with God. What a fellowship! They are called to be fishers of men. The greatest promises center in them. "They that we wise (or teachers) shall shine as the brightness of the firmament, and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars for ever and ever. Dan 12:3.

The Sunday School exists primarily for distinct spiritual ends; therefore, the workers must be spiritually minded or the school will

fall short of its purpose.

Very nearly all of our churches throughout the Southern Baptist Convention, particularly in North Carolina, demand trained, spiritually minded pasters. The Sunday School teacher should be no less spiritual than the pastor and should be willing at least to train himself or herself as the case may be for the glorious work of teaching God's Word.

Last year we reported a total membership of 11,992 church members and a total Sunday School enrollment of 10,978, or 1,014 less in

our Sunday Schools than the church membership. We reported a total contribution of \$103,500.12 and 718 baptisms; therefore, we gave \$144.15 for each soul we won to Christ. A large per cent of these baptisms came from the Sunday School enrollment.

Your Committee recommends that each Sunday School have at least one training school each year and take a religious census of the community each year.

We suggest, or recommend, that this body of churches elect each year at the annual Association, the Associational Sunday School Superintendent or director and his associates, and the Secretary. These three can confer with the schools in each group and elect the group Superintendents.

The training work of the church must go on, if we are to have trained workers to teach God's Word to the world of men and women and boys and girls, and go out after the lost.

Our Saviour Jesus Christ spent many years training Himself for three years of public ministry. He also trained His disciples. Let's train our teachers and officers so they may be workmen that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the Word of Truth.

In carrying out the recommendations of this report, Associational Sunday School officials were elected for the ensuing year: Superintendent, J. W. Costner; Associate Superintendent, L. H. Ledford; Secretary, E. D. Humphries.

- 18. The Committee considering the proposed Amendment to Article 3 of the Constitution reported recommending the adoption of such Amendment. The report was adopted. (See Article 3 as amended.)
- 19. The Baptist Hospital was reported on and discussed by D. G. Washburn. The Clerk, H. E. Waldrop, and Rush Padgett added some remarks, and the report was adopted.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Private and denominational hospitals care for 75 per cent of all the patients of this country and spend less than one-half of the money used for this care. Fortunately, the Baptist Hospital belongs to that class that makes a dollar go a long way.

The year 1931 was the hardest year in our history and 1932 is even worse. Demands for help greatly increase and income from pay patients decrease with the passing months. Many of the smaller hospitals have been compelled to discontinue taking charity patients and taht has increased the number sent to us.

A large per centage of our people are out of work, or on short time or cut wages, and we are getting fewer pay patients. This means less income from pay patients. The indications are that Mother's Day offerings will be \$2,500.00 short of last year, so that the income has been reduced from every source and the free service has increased.

To meet these conditions, we have cut salaries, curtailed expenses, left off equipment everywhere and yet we cannot meet the demands.

How to help relieve the critical situation:

1. Let every church make a liberal Mother's Day offering and 2. Let the church sending a patient help pay the expenses—at least \$1.50 per day—and this will help our Hospital to continue its great and glorious work.

20. Christian Education and Boiling Springs Junior College was reported on by B. T. Falls. On motion to adopt, Bro. Falls spoke to the report, outlining the financial status of the Junior College. A song was rendered by the College Glee Club. President Jenkins emphasized some of the advantages of the institution to this immediate section. Remarks were added by J. H. Quinn, J. M. Walker, Rush Padgett, and Moderator Suttle. The report was adopted by standing vote.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION AND BOILING SPRINGS JUNIOR COLLEGE

To the Kings Mountain Baptist Association:

A report on Christian Education to this Association is to all intents and purposes a report on Boiling Springs Junior College, around which our devotion to Christian Education has centered for the past quarter of a century. Your Committee makes the following report in regard to the College:

First. The College has met all requirements of the Standard Association of Southern Colleges and secondary schools, excepting an income of \$10,000 over and above tuition and fees. This requirement it has been unable to meet.

Second. The College closed its year June 30, 1932, with a considerable deficit in operating expenses, most of which it owes to its faithful teachers.

Third. For the ensuing year the Board of Trustees has contracted with the teachers to take the school and operate it for its income, and to pay the Board 10 per cent of the receipts after paying overhead expenses, not including salaries, which 10 per cent the Board will use toward liquidating the indebtedness. All expenses have been reduced to a minimum.

Fourth. There is an enrollment of 98 College students in the present semester. The morale is splendid and the general spirit and resolution to carry on is manifest both in the student body and in the faculty.

Fifth. The terms of the following trustees expire with the meet-

ing of this Association: J. W. Suttle, Mrs. John Wacaster, W. W. Washburn, D. F. Hord, Zeno Wall, of the Kings Mountain Association.

Sixth. The money which the Kings Mountain and Sandy Run Associations authorized and directed the trustees to borrow to procure the necessary equipment to standardize the school is due the bank and private parties, and the bank has called its loan, now amounting to about \$1,800.00. There is other pressing indebtedness which must be arranged somehow.

Seventh. The Board by resolution recommends that each church of the two Associations designate at the earliest practical date the fixed sum which it will raise during the next year, at such time or times and in such ways it may elect, for the aid of Boiling Springs Junior College; that both Associations at their present sessions take necessary steps to raise this fall at least \$2,000.00 to apply on the two outstanding notes which were executed by authority of the Associations to secure funds with which to add the necessary equipment to become a Junior College; and your Committee respectfully lays these requests before this body for immediate action.

It was pointed out that notes against the trustees of the school are now due, and the pastors and delegates were asked to assume this debt by raising 10 cents per member in their churches within the next few weeks. The effort resulted as follows:

Boiling Springs, \$100; J. L. Jenkins, personally, \$100: Pastor Suttle's churches, Double Shoals \$17.90, Double Springs \$34.60, Lawndale \$9.70, New Bethel \$16.50, Patterson Grove \$16.80, Waco \$19.60; Pastor Camp's churches, Carpenter Grove \$11.70, Casar \$12.50, Pleasant Ridge \$17.90; Pastor Padgett's churches, Grover \$36.10; Lattimore \$34.30, Poplar Springs \$22.20, Zoar \$25.70; Pastor Elam's churches, Dover \$31.80, Fallston \$18.40, Sandy Plains \$34.80; Pastor Waldrop's churches, East-side \$33.00, Elizabeth \$43.10, Buffalo \$10.80, Ross Grove \$21.90; Pastor Washburn's churches, Pleasant Grove \$21.90, Union \$35.70, Zion \$29.90; Shelby First \$159.10. Shelby Second \$62.30; Oak Grove \$27.10, Bethlehem \$34.30, Mount Sinai \$14.00, New Hope \$30.80, Pleasant Hill \$20.00, Kings Mountain First \$61.70; Mull Chapel, New Prospect, Wallace Grove, to be presented by delegates: Kings Mountain Second and Macedonia, not present when the subject came up.

Announcements were made and a recess taken for the noon hour. Benediction by I. D. Harrill.

Afternoon Session

Song: "Stand Up For Jesus." Prayer led by J. G. Hicks.

21. Old Ministers' Relief was reported on and discussed by W. E. Lowe. After additional remarks by the Moderator and Rush Padgett, the report was adopted.

OLD MINISTERS' RELIEF

The Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, through its relief fund and its annuity fund, is grappling with a great and growing problem of providing for ministers, their widows and dependent orphans in the best posesible way.

The permanent relief fund is still less than \$600,000 and the relief beneficiaries are receiving on a n average less than \$150.00 per year. The Board's great task is to bring in a better day for our old soldiers of the cross. The Board reported a good year and expressed their gratitude that the blessings of God had been given to them in large measure. While none of their ideals have been reached, they report faithful endeavor and worthy progress.

We would plead for our old and disabled preachers. It is so easy to forget them in their time of great need. The churches turn them off for younger men to lead them.

For years, the Relief Board has had a reserve fund to draw from when t was necessary to do so. But now the reserve fund has become exhausted and it is up to the churches to provide more worthily for this essential work. The very little that the Southern Baptists have been doing for them has become less and less. Our Lord would have His people come to the assistance of these old preachers who have no one to help them. They are not our objects of charity but they are our retired soldiers. Their claim is a righteous one and we are debtors to them.

22. J. L. Jenkins read the Report on Temperance and Public Morals. On motion to adopt, L. L. Jessup, Chairman of a Special Committee named last year, discussed that feature of the report dealing with public gambling as carried on at the annual Fair of our county. This phase of the report was also spoken to by Geo. Dover, J. F. Moore, Rush Padgett, C. J. Black and L. H. King. The report was adopted as read, carrying the recommendation that the Special Committee of last year on public gambling be continued. (See list of Committees.)

TEMPERANCE AND PUBLIC MORALS

A crisis has been reached in the history of Prohibition. However

the political scene may shift facts and principles with reference to intoxicating liquor—and the traffic in it—remain the same. Alcohol is still a habit-forming, narcotic poison, striking down self-control and turning loose the baser passions. Drunkenness is a deadly evil, only a little less devastating than war, carrying in its train of evils disease, insanity, poverty, disgrace and death, broken hearts and broken homes, blasted careers and ruined souls.

The whiskey traffic, born of a lust for gain, is and always has been and always will be incurably lawless. In view of these facts, we can never consent to our governments—national, State or local—licensing the selling to our people of beverages containing alcohol, a habit-forming narcotic poison. On the other hand, we will, to the extent of our ability, oppose it without compromise, pledging ourselves to en-

force the law against it.

It is a lamentable fact that divorce, with all of its attendant evils, is on the increase. America leads the world in divorces. We would put our stamp of disapproval on all forms of amusements and immoral tendencies, such as dancing, card playing, Sunday golf, gambling of all kinds and all other evils which tend toward the abandonment of worship, the desecration of the Sabbath, and the undermining of the home, of character, and the church of God, which Christ purchased with his own blood.

We, your Committee, make the following recommendations:

First. That a conserted, consistent, constructive, and persistent propaganda of education be projected in the home, in the churches and in our public schools to inform our people, especially the rising generation, of the deadly perils of the whiskey traffic, that we teach our young people and remind them of our experiences while we were under the bloody reign of whiskey a generation ago.

Second. That we reappoint the Committee which was selected last year of which Brother L. L. Jessup is Chairman to continue their negotiations with the officials of our Cunty Fair, relative to putting the ban on all chance games and gambling devices.

Third. That we respectfully petition the County Commissioners and other officers of Cleveland County to use every power given by law in curbing the practice of gambling at the County Fair, and throughout the County.

Fourth. That we covenant together to discourage the tendency on the part of our own members in giving either their direct or indirect support to the evils under consideration, or any other evils.

23. The Historian's Report was read and spoken to by C. J. Black, and the report was adopted with provision that it be inserted in the Minutes in full.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

The Kings Mountain Baptist Association has enjoyed some very extraordinary advantages in that of producing historians who were able to compile its history in a most excellent way. We refer especially to John R. Logan, who wrote such awonderful history of this Association, coupling it with that of The Broad River. His history reached down to the beginning of the eighties, and after thirty years

elapsed, the brethren decided something ought to be done to show that we appreciated what Brother Logan had done, so they appointed Hon. E. Y. Webb to prepare a short history covering the period from Logan's account down to 1910. This he did in a very scholarly way. The paper was read at the 1911 meeting of the Association which met with Cherryville Baptist Church that year. We cannot make this paper as complete as he did because of the cost of printing and the small amount given to have our Minutes printed. We are giving a more summary of the work done by this Association from 1911 until 1931.

In 1911, this Association was composed of thirty-seven churches and had a membership of 7,666, and at the close of the next decade it had 39 churches and a membership of 8.134, a gain of 468. During this decade, it had at one time 42 churches with a membership of 8.570, but it lost some of its churches and consequently some of its numbers.

The next decade experienced a marked change in many ways. The Association began with 8,134 members and ended with 11,992. This was an increase of 3,858, or 47 per cent. During the first decade, 310 baptisms in 1911 were reported and 499 in 1920. There was an increase of only 370 during the entire ten years, but the second decade showed a very great increase. It began with 8,134 and ended with 11,992. During the first decade, there was a very great increase in gifts to all of the Convention enterprises, showing that we emphasized giving but did not stress evangelism. During the second decade, we stressed evangelism and did not show as much interest in benevolence, consequently, there was a great increase in baptisms and a marked decline in gifts.

In 1911, we gave to all objects of the Convention \$1,917.25, and in 1920 \$684.22. designated and \$33,554.52 not designated, making a grand total to missions that year of \$34.238.74. This was an increase of \$32,321.49, but in 1931, we dropped to \$8,834.90 to the Co-operative Program and \$1.256.25 designated. Please note the decrease. What caused it? Three things brought it about. First, the failure of so many of our banks in this section; second, the great decrease in the price of farm products; third, a great decline in Godliness. A peculiar feeling came over the people that no one can explain.

In 1911, we had 4.671 enrolled in our Sunday Schools, and 1920 we had 5.723, an increase of 1,052. 1921 we reported 6,452 enrolled in Sunday Schools and 1931, 10,892, an increase of 4,420, or 68 per cent. This increase in Sunday School work shows why we increased so much in membership.

At the beginning of this period, we had but 17 Woman's Missionary Societies with 4 auxiliaries, and a membership of 347. In 1920, we had 22 societies with a membership of 610. The second decade began with 17 in 1921 and reported 26 in 1931. The membership was not reported in the 1921 Minutes, but 669 were reported in 1931, with a large number of Y. W. A.'s, G. A.'s, Sunbeams, and Royal Ambassadors. The increase in membership was not so great as the increase in gifts. Our women wrought nobly during these twenty years of our history.

The next thing we wish to mention is the B. Y. P. U. work. At the beginning of this period of our history we are discussing, the B. Y.

P. U. work had scarcely begun. A few churches in our cities had organized their young people, but a B. Y. P. U. in a country church was not known in many sections. No B. Y. P. U. is mentioned in our Minutes until 1918. The Minutes for the 1918 session show that we had 3 unions with a membership of 131. No more mention is made of them until 1926. Here we have a period of eight years without any report.

At the 1926 session of this Association, the reports showed that we had 36 senior unions, 13 intermediates, and 19 juniors. In 1931, we had 7 adult unions, 32 seniors, 20 intermediates, and 29 juniors, with a membership of 1,910. This phase of our work has outgrown all of the others. Our young people have shown remarkable interest in the Lord's work.

Possibly I ought to mention pastors' salaries in this paper. Figures help materially when they are correct.

At the beginning of this period, we gave in pastors' salaries for the year \$8,431.05, and in 1921, we gave \$21,482.24, which was a very marked increase. Last year, we reported \$27,832, which was \$2,244 less than was paid them the year of 1930. This year will show a still decrease.

Brother A. C. Irvin served as Moderator for the 1911 and 1912 sessions. After him came our present incumbent who has served for these twenty years. This body ought to show him in some tangible way how much they appreciate the noble service he has rendered the Baptists of this county for these twenty years. We are able, why should we not do it?

- D. S. Lovelace was Clerk for the sessions of 1911 and 1912; after him came J. J. Lattimore who served until 1921 when G. G. Page was elected and served until 1929 when our present Clerk was elected.
- H. D. Wilson served as Treasurer during the 1911 and 1912 sessions, then came our present incumbent who has served as long as our Moderator.

Now, we have reviewed the last twenty years of our history. This period had seen many changes come about. These changes have been in many ways. The men who had the work on their hearts twenty years ago have nearly all passed to the great beyond. The few remaining have about spent their strength. Soon they, too, will be numbered with the past. Twenty years more, and a new crowd will have charge of this body. What will it be?

We have gone through some trying financial strains during these twenty years. We made more money than we knew how to spend. We played the fool with it and hard times came our way. We made debts when we had the money, now we have to pay them when we do not have the money. What the outcome will be we cannot tell. God alone knows. We trust that we have learned our lessons and that the next time we have any money, we may know what to do with it.

Committee on Associational Finance reported having received the sum of \$134.35 for Minute Fund, \$36.49 for Co-operative Program, \$3.50 for Mills Home, and \$2.50 for Baptist Hospital. A collection amounting to \$15.40 was taken to supplement the Minute Fund. The following Treasurer's Report was presented:

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE: We, the messengers of Baptist churches located in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order and rules of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

ARTICLE 1. The name of this organization shall be the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE 2. The membership of the Association shall consist of such messengers as may be selected by the churches composing it and duly certified to in the annual letters sent by the churches to the appointed meetings, the basis of representation being two messengers for each church having a membership not exceeding fifty, and one additional messenger for each increase of fifty or major fraction thereof in church membership. All pastors serving constituent churches together with all regularly ordained ministers holding membership in these churches shall also be members of the body. The courtesies of the floor may be extended to representatives of the denominational interests, and also to ministers and members of other Christian organizations.

ARTICLE 3. The Association shall meet annually, the time and place being determined at the previous session; and each annual meeting shall organize itself by enrolling its membership, and by electing from its membership the following officers: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Historian, whose duties shall be to serve in the usual capacity of such officers and who shall hold office, unless duly deposed by the electing body, until their respective successors are elected.

AMENDMENT (To Article 3): At the discretion of the Association, all officers may be elected at the close of one session to serve until the close of the succeeding one.

ARTICLE 4. An Executive Board, consisting of not less than seven members, shall be elected at each annual meeting, and this board shall be authorized to discharge the functions of the Association in dealing with new matters and emergencies arising between annual sessions of the body, provided such actions shall not be inconsistent with or in conflict with previous actions of the Association. On advice of a majority of this board, the Moderator may call an extra session of the Association to deal with any special emergency which may arise; but such extra session shall be made up of the regularly accredited delegates of the previous regular session, and shall have authority to deal only with the special matter for which they

are called together. The Moderator and Clerk shall be ex-officio members of this Board.

ARTICLE 5. The prime purpose of this Association shall be to counsel together for the enlargement and strengthening of God's Kingdom by promoting unity and growth among the churches composing it, and by co-operating with the programs of the State Baptiist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in the work of Missions, Christian Education, and Social Service, and any and all other objects. At each annual meeting one or more delegates shall be elected to represent this body in the ensuing sessions of these conventions.

ARTICLE 6. The Association may receive other churches into its fellowship on letters of dismission from other like organizations. It may also receive newly constituted churches whose articles of faith harmonize with the Confession of Faith attached hereto, and whose practice conforms to the purpose of this Association as set forth in Article 5 above.

ARTICLE 7. While disclaiming the right or authority to interfere in the affairs of any local church, this Association asserts its privilege of using its discretion in receiving churches into its fellowship, and in withdrawing fellowship from any church found on careful investigating to be walking in disorder or failing in practice to endorse and support the missionary and benevolent work of the Baptist denomination.

ARTICLE 8. This Association shall conduct its business sessions in accordance with parliamentary practice as set forth in any well-authenticated book dealing with the subject.

ARTICLE 9. This Constitution may be changed or amended at any regular meeting of the Association; provided, however, that each proposed change in amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on during the day following, and two-thirds of the members present shall concur in its adoption.

CONFESSIONS OF PAITH

- 1. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and the New Testaments to be a divinely inspired revelation from God.
- 2. We accept the New Testament alone as revealing the only plan of salvation, and as the final authority in all matters of church polity and practice.
- 3. We believe Jesus Christ as revealed in the New Testament to be the Son of God and the divine Savior of all who truly accept Him as such.
- 4. We believe salvation is attained through spiritual regeneration in the act of repentance and acceptance of Jesus as Savior.
- 5. Since spiritual redemption was made available by the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus, we believe that every regenerate person should symbolize his own salvation by being buried with Him in baptism.
- 6. We believe a local church modeled after that New Testament order is a company of regenerate persons voluntarily joined together for the purpose of extending God's Kingdom on earth.
- 7. We believe that each church should from time to time, as a congregation, celebrate the Lord's Supper as a memorial to Him.
- 8. We believe in the ultimate triumph of God's Kingdom over all opposing powers, and that every regenerate soul shall have a share in that triumph.
