

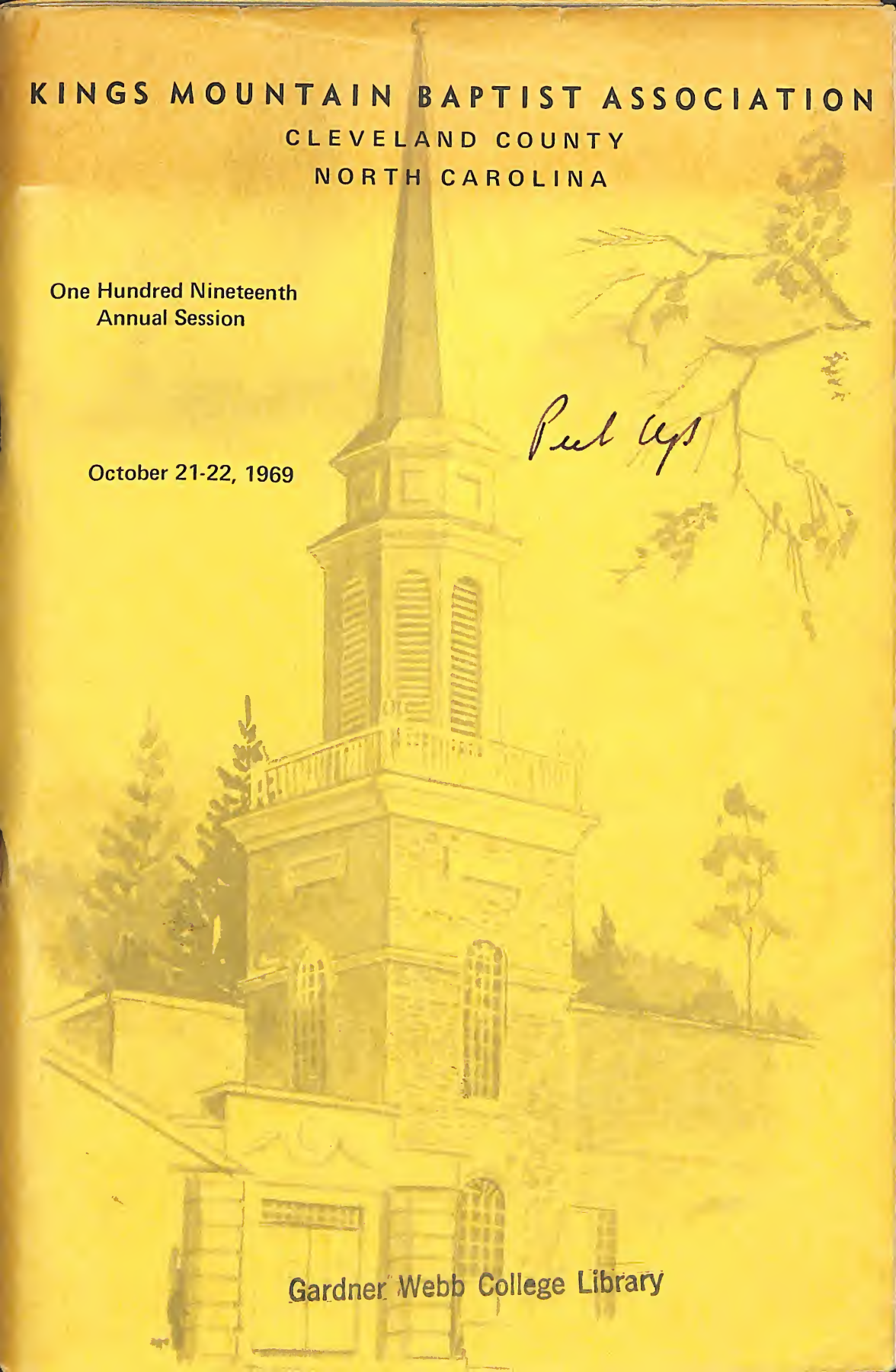

Bethlehem Church was organized in 1842 about one mile from the present site under the name of White Plains. The old site is marked by a few graves and tombstones. The Church was declared debt free in August of 1969. Russell Fitts is pastor. Bill McDaniel is music leader. Mrs. Gene Carpenter is secretary. Jack Lail is Sunday School superintendent and Homer Harmon is Training Union director.



The Patterson Station Baptist Church, which is now the Patterson Springs Baptist Church, was organized on October 18, 1895, at the old Ellis School House in what is now the Eastern section of the Patterson Springs community. The first members came from Pleasant Hill, New Hope, and Elizabeth churches. Services were held once a month, led by the first pastor, P. R. Elam. Rev. Cline Borders served as Interim pastor, August, 1968-September, 1969.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF KINGS MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Preamble

We, the members of Missionary Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the principles and rules of order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

Article I Name

The name of this body shall be the "Kings Mountain Baptist Association."

Article II Purpose

It shall be the purpose of the Association to cooperate with the State and Southern Baptist Conventions in the promotion of Christian Missions at home and abroad, and in any other related objects such as evangelism, Christian education, benevolent enterprises, and social services, which it may deem proper and advisable for the furtherance of the Kingdom of God.

Article III Membership

Section 1: The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist Churches in the area of the Association.

Section 2: Churches desiring membership in the Association shall apply to the membership committee and if recommended by this committee and accepted by the Association shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a period of one year. At the end of one year, upon recommendation of the committee, membership within the Association of such churches shall be determined by vote of the Association. During this period such churches shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except their members shall not hold office nor vote.

Section 3: The Association shall be sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, or reject churches, according to its Constitution and By-Laws. Member churches may also withdraw as they desire, and, if requested, the General Board may grant letters of recommendation to other like Associations.

Article IV Meetings

Section 1: The Association shall meet annually on Tuesday evening and Wednesday after the third Sunday in October and continue until the business of the Association is disposed of.

Section 2: Special meetings may be called by the Moderator or General Board provided two weeks notice is given to the member churches.

Section 3: Each church shall elect annually, in addition to the pastor, two messengers to the meetings of the Association for each 50 members of the church, provided each church shall have not less than three nor more than ten messengers. These shall constitute the voting body of the Association. The names of messengers printed in the minutes shall include only those attending and registering at the Associational meeting.

Article V Authority

Each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches except as provided in this constitution in Article III, Sections 2 and 3.

Article VI Officers and Their Election

Section 1: The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Music Director, Organist, Sunday School Director,

Training Union Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, and Chairman of Library Council.

Section 2: The officers shall be elected on the morning of the last day of the annual meeting for a term of one year each. The nominees shall be contacted and nominated by the Committee on Nominations (By-Law IV, Section 6) except the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk-Treasurer who shall be nominated from the floor. Committee nominations shall not preclude nominations from the floor.

Section 3: All officers shall complete their work as soon as practicable after the closing of the Annual Session. The newly elected officers shall assume, at the close of the Annual Session, all duties incumbent upon said officers relating to the work of the ensuing associational year.

Section 4: Any person having served two terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election.

Article VII Trustees and Their Election

There shall be three trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer, serving terms of three years each on a rotating basis. On nomination by the Committee on Nominations, one new trustee shall be elected at the annual meeting, no trustee being eligible to succeed himself until after the lapse of one year. The expiration date of each trustee's term of office shall appear by his name in the Associational Minutes.

Article VIII The General Board

The General Board shall be composed of all Associational Officers (Article VI, Section 1) the Associational Superintendent of Missions (ex-Officio without voting privileges), each active pastor, two other members chosen by each member church from its membership and certified to the Association in its annual report, and chairmen of all standing committees of the Association. The General Board shall have the authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by this constitution. It shall be the duty of the General Board to meet quarterly and to make reports and recommendations to the Association in its annual meeting. The quarterly meetings will be in October, January, April and July; on Monday after the third Sunday at 10:00 A. M.

Article IX Committees

Section 1: The Association shall have the following standing committees, with their terms of office being from the close of the annual meeting through the following annual meeting.

A. To be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association at the annual meeting:

- (1) Order of Business Committee (By-Law IV, Section 1)
- (2) Executive Committee (By-Law IV, Section 2)
- (3) Evangelism Committee (By-Law IV, Section 3)
- (4) Finance Committee (By-Law IV, Section 4)
- (5) Ordination Committee (By-Law IV, Section 5)
- (6) Nominations Committee (By-Law IV, Section 6)
- (7) Constitution Committee (By-Law IV, Section 7)
- (8) Membership Committee (By-Law IV, Section 8)
- (9) Calendar Committee (By-Law IV, Section 9)
- (10) Resolutions Committee (By-Law IV, Section 10)
- (11) Historical Committee (By-Law IV, Section 11)
- (12) Seminary Extension Committee (By-Law IV, Section 12)
- (13) Christian Life Committee (By-Law IV, Section 13)
- (14) Any other Committee authorized by the Association.

- B. To be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting, Committee on Committees (By-Law IV, Section 14).
- Section 2: The following committees shall be appointed by the Moderator at least thirty days prior to the annual meeting to serve during the annual meeting:
- (1) Place and Preacher Committee (By-Law IV, Section 15)
 - (2) Enrollment Committee (By-Law IV, Section 16)

Article X Amendments

Amendments to this constitution may be made at any annual session of the Association upon an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the voting members present. Proposed changes must be presented to the association in the first session and voted upon by a standing vote of the Association in the last session. It is recommended that all proposed changes first be submitted to the Constitution Committee.

BY-LAWS

By-Law 1 PARLIAMENTARY RULES

Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting its deliberative assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

By-Law II ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin October 1 and close September 30.

By-Law III DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1: The Moderator shall preside over the meeting of the body according to the Constitution and By-Laws, appoint Committee on Committees, Committee on Place and Preachers, and Committee on Enrollment. He shall be Chairman of the General Board and be an Exofficio (without voting privileges) member of all other committees.

Section 2: The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure, of the Moderator, and shall be Vice-Chairman of the General Board.

Section 3: The Clerk-Treasurer shall send annual report forms to the member churches at least a month before the Association's annual meeting, distribute at the annual meeting mimeographed copies of the digest of these reports, make an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distributing of minutes to the member churches, keep on file copies of minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and shall also serve as Secretary of the General Board. He shall inform all persons elected to office or appointed to serve on committees of such action. He shall receive and bank all funds of the Association in the name of the Association; disburse the same upon instructions from the Association, its General Board, or as designated in the Budget (no money is to be disbursed which is not included in the budget except upon recommendation of the Finance Committee to the General Board or the Association in annual Session); render an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and distribute same at the annual meeting and give a report at each quarterly General Board meeting; and keep books available and up-to-date for examination.

Section 4: The Auditor shall, at the close of the Association Year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records and report to the Association in session.

Section 5: The Historian shall collect and preserve historical data on the Association and its churches, and shall make a written report to each annual meeting of the Association.

Section 6: Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the General Board except the office of Moderator, in which case the Vice-Moderator shall automatically become Moderator.

By-Law IV DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1: The Order of Business Committee shall be composed of three members and the Moderator, Clerk and Associational Music Director. It shall prepare a printed

program for the annual meeting of the Association which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the annual meeting. It shall, on the opening day of the annual meeting of the Association, present the printed programs for adoption and serve through the sessions when adjustments in the order of business become necessary.

Section 2: THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

(1) Shall be composed of the Associational officers listed in Article VI, Section 1) of the Constitution along with the chairmen of the Evangelism and Finance Committees. It shall work with Associational Superintendent of Missions in promoting the work of the Association, and lead and assist in determining need for, beginning new mission stations, and organizing new churches.

(2) If such advice is sought it shall advise any group seeking to organize a new church. It shall also seek to help any member church desiring assistance with its problems.

(3) When without a Superintendent of Missions, this Committee shall seek out and recommend to the Association, or its General Board, for election a new Superintendent of Missions according to By-law VI, Section 11.

(4) It shall administer all matters referred to it by the Association or General Board and act on routine or emergency matters between meetings of the General Board. It shall initiate and recommend matters concerning business management, approve employment of all office personnel, deal with problems relating to personnel, and maintain adequate equipment for the office. It shall meet regularly, not less than quarterly, but a quorum of seven shall be necessary to transact business.

Section 3: THE EVANGELISM COMMITTEE, composed of 6 members, shall promote the work of evangelism in the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the Association or its General Board.

Section 4: THE FINANCE COMMITTEE, composed of three members with the Treasurer shall study the Association's financial needs for an adequate program, present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the annual meeting.

Section 5: THE ORDINATION COMMITTEE, composed of 3 members with the pastor of the candidate, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate for the Gospel Ministry.

Section 6: THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE, composed of 6 members, shall contact before and nominate on the last day of the annual meeting of the Association the officers of the Association according to Articles VI and VII of the Constitution. This committee shall also, in cooperation with the nominating committee of the various department of work, recommend workers in these various departments (Article VI, Section 1). It shall also nominate Associational representatives for the various institutions and agencies of our convention and members of the General Board of our Baptist State Convention. This committee shall also assist the General Board in filling vacancies which occur between annual meetings of the Association. This committee's nominations shall not preclude other nominations from the floor.

Section 7: THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE, composed of 3 members, shall be available to study changes or revisions in the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed.

Section 8: THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE, composed of 3 members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution and By-Laws (Article III, Section 2).

Section 9: THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE shall be composed of the following Associational Officers: Sunday School director, Training Union Director, WMU

Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, and the Vice-Moderator as chairman. This committee shall work out as soon as possible each year an Associational Calendar for the coming year and present same to the General Board for adoption.

Section 10: THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE, composed of 3 members, shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation and any other resolutions it or the association may deem wise.

Section 11: THE HISTORICAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of the Historian as chairman and 6 other members. It shall be the duty of the Historical Committee to collect, compile and preserve all materials of interest to the Association and member churches. It shall make its report at the annual Associational Meeting.

Section 12: THE SEMINARY EXTENSION COMMITTEE, composed of 3 members, shall plan and provide for such Seminary Extension classes as may be desired.

Section 13: THE CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMITTEE, composed of 6 members, shall recommend ways in which the Association can work for promotion of civic righteousness and social uplift.

Section 14: THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES, composed of 5 members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution (Article IX, Section 1), and shall assist the General Board in filling vacancies on all other standing committees occurring between sessions. This committee shall also name the chairman of each committee.

Section 15: THE PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE, composed of 3 members, shall receive or solicit invitations for the place or places of meetings for the next annual meeting of the Association, and shall recommend place or places. It shall also recommend the Preacher and alternate for the annual sermon or sermons.

Section 16: THE ENROLLMENT COMMITTEE shall prepare for and direct the enrollment of the messengers at all of the sessions.

Section 17: Members of all these committees, except those appointed by the Moderator, shall be elected to serve for not more than three years on a rotating basis.

By-Law V TRUSTEES

The duty of the trustees shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowment, or other securities of said Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or its General Board.

By-Law VI SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS

Section 1: His selection shall be upon recommendation of the Executive Committee and on vote by the Association in its annual meeting or, between sessions of the Association, by its General Board. His time of office shall continue until termination and organizations of the Association in a serving and advisory capacity.

Section 2: The Superintendent of Missions shall promote the work of the Association and Denomination, cooperating with the churches, their pastors, and officers, and the Associational committees and organizations.

By-Law VII WRITTEN REPORTS

Written reports to appear in the Annual Minutes shall not exceed 300 words, except for History and Statistics.

By-Law VIII AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any session of the annual meeting by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

By-Law IX DEFINE PROCEDURE

Section 1: The business session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

Section 2: Every report, resolution, or amendment offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing if requested by the Moderator.

Section 3: No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject except by permission of the Association.

Section 4: Messengers present from half the churches shall constitute a quorum.
By-Law X THE CONFESSION OF FAITH

PROCEEDINGS OF THE ONE HUNDRED NINETEENTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE KINGS MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Tuesday Evening, October 21, 1969

1. An organ prelude was presented by Mrs. E. T. Bailey as messengers from the various churches gathered in Bethlehem Baptist Church for the 119th Annual meeting of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.
2. John Simone, minister of music at Dover, led the assembly in singing, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name."
3. The opening prayer was led by the Rev. Joseph Sanders, pastor of Second Baptist Church, Shelby.
4. Rev. Russell Fitts, pastor of Bethlehem Church, welcomed the messengers on behalf of the Grover Group of Churches.
5. Joseph E. Cabaniss, Clerk-Treasurer, moved "that those now registering, together with those who will register, be elected to constitute the 119th Annual Session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association." The motion was seconded and carried.
6. Rev. B. J. Traywick, pastor at Zion, chairman of the Order of Business Committee, moved the adoption of the printed programs; this motion carried.
7. The Moderator, Rev. James Stamey, Elizabeth, appointed the Committee on Committees and the Committee on Place and Preacher as they appear elsewhere in this volume.
8. Rev. Frank Shirley, Temple, gave the report of the Constitution Committee. Messengers had been handed a copy of the recommended changes as they entered the sanctuary. A motion was made by Rev. Robert Mann, Kings Mountain, First, that election of officers take place on the first day of the Annual Session rather than the last day as there are more laymen present. It was cited that this would require a change of constitution, but since it was being presented on the first day it could be voted on the second day. Motion was seconded and it carried. This would be voted on along with those changes on the printed sheet on the second day of the meeting.
9. Dr. Wyan Washburn gave the Historian's Report. He reported there has been some progress on the writing of the Associational History. His report was adopted.
10. Rev. C. O. Greene gave the Superintendent of Missions' Message. In his message he reported on what our Association has been doing during his ten years as Superintendent; what it is doing; and what we plan to do in the future.
11. John Simone led the group in singing "To God Be the Glory" with Mrs. E. T. Bailey accompanying at the organ.
12. The Moderator gave a special welcome to the following new pastors and ministers of music and education who had come into our Association since last year: Rev. Wilson Payne, Calvary; Rev. Harry Vance, Eastside; Kings Mountain; Rev. Robert Hicklin, Faith; Rev. Ed Brown, Flint Hill; Rev. James Wall, Lattimore; Rev. Wayne Dixon, Lawndale; Rev. John Frazier, Midview; Rev. John Edwards, Mull's Memorial; Rev. Charles Propst, Pleasant Hill; and Rev. Gene Watterson, First Baptist, Shelby. Visitors were recognized at this time.
13. Mr. W. C. Lamb of the Department of Evangelism of the Baptist State Convention spoke on "Shaping the '70's." He said that every mission dollar is vitally important; that the gospel is desperately needed in North Carolina.

14. John Simone led the group in singing "Christ Receiveth Sinful Men."
 15. Rev. William J. Yeaman, Jr., Westview, brought the Inspirational Message using the thought of Spiritual Exercise. Using I Timothy 4:7-8, he brought out the fact that not enough time is spent in spiritual exercise.
 16. Rev. Yeaman led the closing prayer.

Wednesday Morning, October 22, 1969

17. Mrs. E. T. Bailey presented an organ prelude as messengers gathered at Patterson Springs for the second day of the Annual Session.
 18. Robert Decker, minister of music at Elizabeth, led the group in singing "Ye Servants of God."
 19. Rev. John Edwards, Mull's Memorial, led the opening prayer.
 20. Vice-Moderator Russell Fitts recognized Mr. Joseph Cabaniss who gave the report of the General Board and the treasurer's report. Copies of these reports are found elsewhere in this volume.
 21. Rev. Cline Borders, Interim Pastor at Patterson Springs, welcomed the messengers to Patterson Springs Church and made announcements about lunch.
 22. Rev. Wilson Harmon, Waco, gave the report of the Place and Preacher Committee. An invitation has been received from Elizabeth for both sessions of the Annual meeting, 1970. Also, the preachers will be: Inspirational, Rev. Cline Borders; Doctrinal, Rev. James Wilder; and Missionary, Rev. J. E. Bishop; Alternate, Rev. Gene Watterson. Motion was made that the 1970 Sessions be held at Elizabeth; it was seconded and it carried.

23. The Committee on Nominations report was made by Rev. Max Linnens, Boiling Springs. The text of that report is found elsewhere in this volume. It was adopted.

24. Committee on Enrollment, Joseph Cabaniss, Chairman, reported on attendance.
 25. Bob Decker led the group in singing "Glorious Is Thy Name."
 26. Rev. Dale Clark, Sandy Plains, brought the Doctrinal Message, taking as his text I Peter 1:13. He said we need a new vision of a Holy God; ours has become distorted.

27. Moderator Stamey called for the report of the Constitution Committee. Rev. Frank Shirley gave the report, those on the printed sheet and those brought last night concerning the election of officers. Those on the printed sheet were adopted. Rev. C. A. Kirby, Jr., Double Springs, made a substitute motion to the one made at the evening session, that the order of business for election of officers be placed in the morning session the second day rather than the afternoon session. Motion carried.

28. State Convention reports were presented. Those bringing reports were: Christian Literature, Marse Grant; and Cooperative Program, Carlos Young. Horace Barefoot brought greetings from the Children's Homes.

29. Bob Decker led the congregation in a medley of hymns. Mr. Decker then brought special music, "Singing I Go Along Life's Road."

30. Mr. M. Thomas Starkes spoke on "The Church and Our World." He brought greetings from the Home Mission Board, its staff members and nearly 2400 missionaries in 31 states. Taking his text from Revelation 3:1-3 he said we must reactivate Christian concern and wake men up, recapture the New Testament sense of urgency.

31. Closing prayer led by Rev. Wilson Payne, Calvary.

 35. The Moderator introduced Dr. E. E. Poston, President of Gardner-Webb College, who gave a report on Christian Education. He said we're proud of the work

we're doing, but fearful of the dangers lying ahead; that we must not turn our backs on Christian Education.

36. Rev. Fred McGehee, Jr., Double Shoals, gave the Committee on Committees report and it was adopted.

37. Organizational reports were given as follows: Sunday School, Rev. Fred McGehee; Training Union, Rev. Fred McGehee; WMU, Mrs. W. D. Ledbetter; Music, Mr. Allen Jolley. These were adopted as found elsewhere in this volume.

38. Rev. James Rice, Churchill Drive, gave the report of the Committee on Resolutions. The full text of that report is found elsewhere in this volume. Rev. Rice also thanked the people for their support of Michael Remy, the student at Gardner-Webb College from Haiti.

39. Mr. Allen Jolley led the group in singing "Love Lifted Me."

40. Rev. C. O. Greene led in a Grassroots Survey of some of the priority objectives the Southern Baptist Convention Long-Range Planning Committee feels will be the major concern of the churches during the 1973-79 period. These objectives if approved will guide the personnel of the SBC, state conventions, and associations in planning special materials and projects.

41. Allen Jolley led a hymn of praise "He Lives."

42. Rev. Harold Threatt, Putnam Memorial, brought the Missionary Message, saying all Christians are missionaries. He gave us this thought to carry with us: "If you were arrested for being a Christian, would there be enough evidence to convict you?"

43. In the election of Officers, Wilson Harmon made a motion that Rev. James Stamey be re-elected Moderator: W. V. Tarlton, Ross Grove, seconded the motion. Rev. C. O. Greene presided and Mr. Stamey was re-elected. C. A. Kirby, Jr., nominated Russell Fitts as Vice-Moderator, there was a motion and second to close nominations and elect by acclamation. It carried. Roland Leath, Shelby, First, nominated Joseph Cabaniss as Clerk-Treasurer; motion and second to close and elect by acclamation. Motion carried.

44. Mr. Horace Eason, Shelby, First, conducted a brief memorial service in memory of those who have expired during the year. He read the names of ministers and deacons. A complete list is found elsewhere in this volume. Mr. Van Ramsey sang "Sunrise Tomorrow."

45. Joseph E. Cabaniss, Clerk-Treasurer, gave a final report on attendance. Messengers registered 348; alternates, visitors and others 132; total attendance 480. Meeting was adjourned with prayer.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

"Forasmuch as many have taken in hand to set forth in order a declaration of those things which are most surely believed among us . . ." (Luke 1:1).

This annual report from your Historical Committee will be about the book we plan to write, a history of the first 120 years of the King's Mountain Association. We have had two full committee meetings this year making plans for various aspects of this book. Some assignments have been made and much material is being gathered. We hope all member churches will insist that their historians and church clerks or the church history committee gather material and write their own church history as closely as possible after the outline recommended by the Southern Baptist Historical Commission. These outlines have been furnished by your Historical Committee for all the churches.

Financially, we are doing only fairly well with approximately \$1,500 being paid in through September 30, with the expenses to date amounting to \$294.59. Our committee would urge each church to follow the Associational plan and provide for us ten cents per member for two years; that is, ten cents for the year just past, and ten cents for the coming year, 69-70. This will give us a nest egg of approximately

\$5,000. We hope to have a prepublication sale of the book and plans for us will be outlined during the coming year.

Church histories have been received from Boiling Springs, Carpenter's Grove, Faith, Zion and a new history of the First Baptist Church of Shelby will soon be in print.

Each church will soon be given a history time table to go by which will indicate the type of materials, sketches, photographs, minutes, and other sources which the Association's committee will need to incorporate in the book. We will have to have all of this material by at least June 30, 1970 to have the book ready by the end of the year.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

The Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention continues to provide excellent service to our churches and pastors. During the years when the pastor is still in the active ministry the Board provides for health coverage and for disability benefits. After retirement those who have participated in the plan receive a monthly check to help meet the needs of those difficult years when income is greatly reduced. Many men would no doubt be on the welfare rolls if this service did not exist.

A new program, called the Group Insurance plan, begins October 1, 1969 and provides a broader coverage than the Life Benefit Plan which has been in existence since 1964. This plan came about because the Board has consistently tried to increase benefits with the changing economic conditions of the times. The Board's executive secretary summed up this basic philosophy when he said, "The basic philosophy of our Board is to provide programs that will partially replace income for a minister, church or denominational employe when his earnings cease because of retirement, disability or death."

The following are excerpts from the Board's publication, THE YEARS AHEAD, give some indication of the provisions of the new plan.

"This New Plan succeeds the Life Benefit Plan offered since 1964. Members of the Life Benefit Plan will have an option of remaining in it or transferring to the New Plan.

The new Group Insurance Plan has two separate schedules of benefits.

Schedule I benefits parallel the coverage provided in the Life Benefit Plan except benefits do not decrease until age 65.

Schedule II provides benefits from \$5,000 to \$60,000, depending on the participant's annual earnings. Both schedules have provision for accidental death and dismemberment as well as providing for some continuation of some life coverage after age 65. In addition, both schedules provide Dependent Life Insurance benefits for spouse and all children, age 14 days to 23 years.

Another extremely important benefit Long-Term Disability Income Protection. The disability benefit pays 60 percent of a participant's monthly earnings (70 per cent, if dependent Social Security is involved) to age 65 with \$1,000 a month maximum.

Any minister or denominational employe may join the Group Insurance Plan when it initially opens without a medical examination or other evidence of good health required. This applies to any member of the Life Benefit Plan who wishes to transfer.

The total cost per month for the employe Group Life and Accidental Death and Dismemberment Insurance and the Dependent Group Life Insurance is:

\$0.70 per \$1,000 of Employe Group Life Insurance

\$0.60 per \$100 of monthly earnings for Long-Term Disability Income Benefits.

Applications will be accepted through November 30, 1969, for the Health Benefit Plan and coverage will begin January 1, 1970. The Plan pays full cost of a semi-private room regardless of the amount. It also provides hospital, surgical and major medical benefits."

The Association would urge all pastors and churches to investigate the benefits offered in all the plans offered by the Annuity Board. We believe this is a wise investment.

WORLD MISSIONS REPORT — STATE — HOME — FOREIGN

Jesus told his disciples that "the field is the World." We are to "go into all the World" - "preach the gospel to all creatures" - - "make disciples of all nations" "baptize them" (all) - "Teach them" (all) - "to observe all things" that Christ comanded - for Our Lord has "all power" in Heaven and Earth - and He has

promised to "be with us all-ways even unto the end of all-time."

That we may the better implement the carrying out of this great commission of Christ Baptists have three phases - State, Home and Foreign Missions: - these do not work separate and apart, but supplement and complement each other.

Our State supports twenty-plus different objects. 66.66% of every dollar that goes through the Cooperative Program to World Missions remains here in our State for the promotion of State Missions.

Last Year, Southern Baptists gave 46¢ per member, on the average, to Home Missions through the Cooperative Program, 41¢ through the Annie Armstrong Offering, and 5¢ through other sources for a total of 92¢ per member. On the average, it took 36 SBC members to produce \$.01 for each of the 3,282 missionaries (including 897 summer workers). Each home missionary (including the 897 summer workers), on the average, represents 3,453 Southern Baptists. There were 20 professions of faith, 166 scripture portions and/or tracts distributed, and 50 sermons and addresses delivered in the field per missionary last year (including the 897 summer workers).

Each Foreign Missionary, on the average, represents 4,779 Southern Baptists. There were 258 church members in the field and 21 persons were baptized per foreign missionary last year.

Southern Baptists gave \$1.15 per member, on the average, to foreign missions through the Cooperative Program, \$1.29 through the Lottie Moon Offering, and \$.18 through other sources for a total of \$2.62 per member last year. On the average, it took 9 SBC members to produce \$.01 for each of the 2,371 foreign missionaries.

October 31 will complete 10 years of service as your Superintendent of Missions. They have been busy years as a few figures will show. In these 10 years I've spoken more than 2000 times, had more than 7500 personal conferences, attended about 3500 meetings, had about 400 persons join various churches at services I conducted, and have driven more than a quarter of a million miles. Consider the background of reading, studying, planning, and promoting which these figures represent and the effort seems prodigious. Yet, for the most part they have been happy years marred only by about three months sick leave.

These ten years have been years of crisis and change. Cleveland County has just about completed its transition from an agricultural to an industrial county. We had 14 high schools in the county 10 years ago; we now have 4. The Vietnam war has taken its toll in more ways than one. Affluence is on every hand; money and leisure time have combined, along with these other influences, to deeply affect the life and worship of all our people.

While these years have brought crisis and change they also offer us great opportunities for the decade of the '70's. Our churches will be changing drastically many of the "Old ways" as we seek to meet the needs of our world. New grading systems, new curriculum, new church study courses, new methods, and new approaches will be our lot as we seek to seize the opportunities of the '70's. Your Superintendent of Missions, Mrs. Mae Petty, the office associate, and about 200 volunteer workers will seek to inform you of these changes, interpret them for you, and help you in any way we can in achieving the primary concern of the church, that of helping people to find in our lovely Christ the answer for their need.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING REPORT

Never before have your Baptist Homes for the Aging been more conscious of the Lord's Presence and of His Goodness than during the past year. At a time when the economy of the Homes was at its lowest ebb, with a sizeable deficit looming larger by the moment, when the weather was at its severest on the 3rd Sunday of February, the day of the Special Offering, the churches came through with an offering that promises, at this point, to be the greatest in the Homes' history. The Lord, who is in charge of the weather and in charge of the Baptist Homes for the Aging, has surely rewarded our faith and moved upon our Baptist people to see the urgency of our needs, and we are grateful.

Ours shall continue to be a relationship of trust in the Lord and faith in our Baptist people. We earnestly hope that a continued and sustained effort will be made by our churches to increase and strengthen the amount of the two main sources of support for our ministry to the Aging - - the Special Offering, and the Cooperative Program. Through these two sources, one-third of the total income for the Homes is derived, and 85% of the residents, who are financially dependent, are cared for and supplemented. If we are to continue to assist these many needy persons, and if we are to reduce the deficit in the operation of the Homes, brought about by the rising cost of living, we must have more liberal support from our churches.

We do not believe that our Baptist people would want to curtail any of the vital ministries of the Homes and that they will respond to this urgent appeal.

Since last year, the Yanceyville Home, our newest Home, has been filled to capacity, and we now have almost 200 deserving older men and women living in our midst there and in our other four Homes - - Resthaven, and Hayes Home, in Winston-Salem, the Albemarle Home, in Albemarle, and the Hamilton Home, in Hamilton. These wonderful people are finding much happiness in Christian companionship with persons of their age group, and great security in knowing that they will be loved and cared for in sickness as well as in health.

It is deeply rewarding experience to see the light and joy of Christ on an older person's face and to hear words of deep appreciation almost daily for the Christian

love and nurture that North Carolina Baptists are making possible through this ministry. We believe, therefore, that our Baptist people will want to have an ever-increasing part in so worthy a labor of love in the Master's Name. We know that the Lord will not fail us and we also believe that our people will want to be as faithful as possible.

Since the reactivation of the Foundation, around 1962, the total assets have increased from \$350,000 to the present excess of slightly over one million. This is positive proof that the Baptists of North Carolina have discovered that the Foundation is really a service arm of the Baptist Convention of North Carolina.

As mentioned above, the Foundation renders a service to: (1) God, (2) individual Baptists, and (3) Baptist agencies and institutions. Every Baptist has an opportunity through his Foundation to provide for continuing stewardship in the agencies and institutions in which he has an interest.

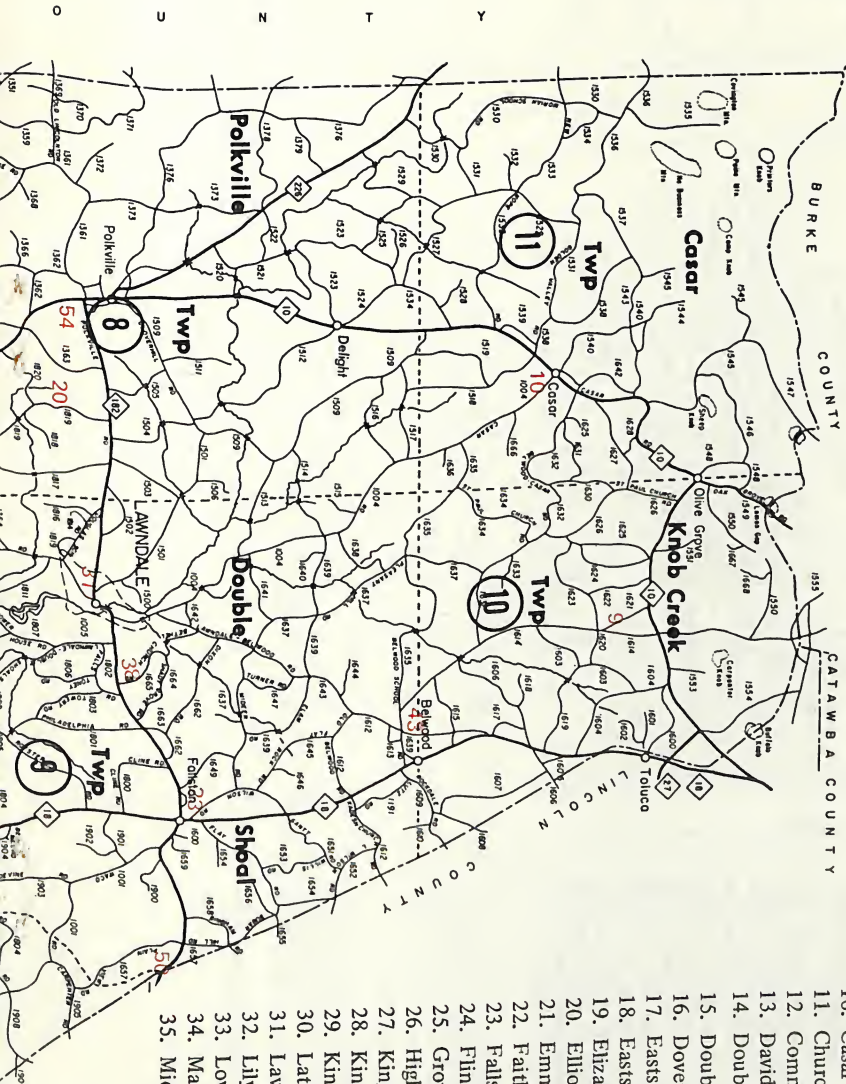

GARNDER-WEBB COLLEGE REPORT

R. Patrick Spangler, Chairman, Board of Trustees

E. Eugene Poston, President of the College

The 63rd year of service to the Baptists of North Carolina was a new beginning for Gardner-Webb College. Approximately three hundred juniors were enrolled, constituting the first junior class in the history of the college. The senior class will be started during the fall of 1970. The first four-year graduating class is scheduled for the spring of 1971.

There are 1460 students enrolled at Gardner-Webb for the 1969-70 school term. These students are led by 87 faculty and 46 administrative and staff members. 48 additional employees constitute the cafeteria and maintenance forces.

At the present time there are 26 faculty and administrative members who hold an earned doctorate. Seventeen others have three years beyond their Bachelor's degree. Eight others are on leave of absence working on their Doctorates. The college should be able to meet the standards of faculty training for a four-year college by the time of the first graduating class.

During the past school year 11,778 volumes were added to the Gardner-Webb College library. The trustees, the administration and the faculty are giving priority to the library. Christian trustees, Christian faculty members, Christian administrators, an ample supply of good books, and interested students make a Christian college.

A new organizational structure for the college was initiated this year. Divisions replaced departments as the primary units. The following organizational structure is in operation:

Gardner-Webb College lost one of her finest supporters this year. Mrs. O. Max Gardner, Sr. died January 16, 1969. Mrs. Gardner was a "First Lady" in every respect. She exemplified Christian dedication in every walk of life. Her influence will live forever.

At the present time there are 90 ministerial students enrolled at Gardner-Webb. There are 49 others preparing for full time Christian vocations. This past summer 24 of Gardner-Webb's students did summer mission work in North Carolina, California, Texas, New Jersey, Maryland, and Pennsylvania, working in various programs and in various positions. The Reverend Charles W. Freeman has developed an intern program on a trial basis with local pastors for the ministerial students.

During the past year the Endowment Funds have increased \$60,000 through bequests, gifts and savings. The plant assets increased \$437,000. At the present time the assets of the college are valued at \$8,230,000 (total of plant and endowment). The Endowment Fund is valued at \$1,940,000, including an irrevocable trust. As of June 30, 1969, Gardner-Webb College owed a debt of \$1,055,000 to the First Union National Bank of Charlotte, North Carolina. This is being amortized at \$11,000 per month plus interest.

The college is entering a capital funds campaign January 1, 1970. The campaign is designed to assure accreditation as a senior college.

Mrs. Allen Dixon led the congregation in singing "Hark, the Voice of Jesus Calling". Mrs. Conrad Beam was organist.

The Call to Prayer was led by Mrs. P. A. Cline.

During the business session Mrs. David Beam, chairman of the nominating committee, presented the report of her committee and the following officers were elected for the coming year: Director, Mrs. Dwight Ledbetter; W. M. S. Director, Mrs. Joe Hamrick; Y. W. A. Director, Mrs. Frances Wyatt; Sunbeam Director, Mrs. W. Gerald Osborne; and Secretary-Treasurer, Mrs. Thomas Austell. The G. A. Director and Assistant W. M. U. Director are yet to be elected.

The treasurer's report and the proposed budget for 1969-70 were accepted.

It was decided that the annual W. M. U. meeting be held in the spring and the following Place Committee was appointed: Mrs. Elvin Wright, Mrs. L. H. Ledford, and Mrs. Robert Randall.

Mrs. Ledbetter announced that the Kings Mountain Association W. M. U. is an Advanced W. M. U.

Mrs. John Berry Hamrick reported on the Ministry to the Deaf, telling about the organization of a sign language class at Cleveland Technical Institute and the formation of a Sunday School Class and worship service for the deaf at First Baptist Church in Shelby. Mrs. Emma Hambright who is working with the deaf at First Baptist presented ways in which W. M. U. members can help with the project.

A count was made of the number present from each church. There were 130 representatives from 31 churches.

Mrs. Allen Dixon sang "Seal Us, O Holy Spirit" and "Forth In Thy Name" after which Rev. C. O. Greene, Superintendent of Missions of the Kings Mountain Association, brought the message for the evening. Using the theme "Seal us for service", Mr. Greene urged W. M. U. members to be Christlike in every relationship of life and to give of themselves in genuine service to others.

Mrs. Hugh Long and Mrs. James Monroe, assisted by the W. M. U. Director, presented the closing meditation.

Mrs. Dixon led the group in singing the chorus of "Seal Us, O Holy Spirit" as the benediction.

BY-LAWS FOR ASSOCIATIONAL W.M.U.

ARTICLE I: NAME. The name of this organization shall be Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II: OBJECT: The object shall be to promote Christian missions through the organizations of Woman's Missionary Union in the churches and missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE III: RELATIONSHIPS.

Section 1. Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to Kings Mountain Baptist Association, shall be the liaison organization between church organizations and the N. C. Woman's Missionary Union.

Section 2. This associational Union shall recognize the autonomy of church organizations as provided in the Baptist democratic process of operation.

Section 3. Church organizations shall be recognized as units through which the object of this Woman's Missionary Union is accomplished, each responsible for its own program, and contributing to the work of the association.

Section 4. This associational Union shall be guided in its plan of work by the associational aims for Advancement.

ARTICLE IV: MEMBERS. The members of Woman's Missionary Union organizations in the churches and missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association shall constitute the membership.

ARTICLE V: OFFICERS.

Section 1. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, YWA Director, GA Director, Sunbeam Band Director, and others as needed. These officers shall be elected annually in a meeting of the associational WMU and shall hold office for one year or until their successors are elected. The tenure of office shall be 5 consecutive years.

Section 2. These officers shall perform the duties set out for them in these By-Laws and the leaflet, "The Associational WMU."

ARTICLE VI: NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS.

Section 1. The nominating committee composed of 5 women shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee, and elected by the associational WMU to serve for one year.

Section 2. The nominating committee shall nominate officers and promotional directors. Other nominations may be made from the floor.

Section 3. The nominating committee, in event of a vacancy, shall present a nominee for the unexpired term for election by the associational WMU (or the Executive Committee).

ARTICLE VII: MEETINGS.

Section 1. Day and/or night Associational WMU meetings (including business women) shall be held annually.

Section 2. Other meetings shall be held as authorized by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VIII: EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the officers, promotional directors and any others desired.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall schedule the regular meetings of the organizations, plan the program of activities, hear reports and check progress on the Aims for Advancement.

Section 3. Regular meetings of the Executive Committee shall be held quarterly.

ARTICLE IX: PROMOTIONAL DIRECTORS.

Section 1. There shall be directors of mission study, prayer, community missions, stewardship, and others as needed.

Section 2. These directors shall furnish information for corresponding local chairmen, hold conferences, and carry out other plans as authorized by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE X: COMMITTEES.

Section 1. There shall be committees standing or special as needed.

Section 2. Committees, except those otherwise provided for, shall be appointed by the president.

Section 3. The president shall be ex-officio member of all committees except the nominating committee.

Section 4. The duties of these committees are such as are set forth in these By-Laws and the leaflet, "The Associational WMU."

ARTICLE XI: FINANCES.

Section 1. The associational WMU shall adopt an annual budget, funds to be provided by WMU organizations in the Association.

Section 2. These funds will be on 50 cent per W.M.S. member basis, and are to be sent to the Associational Treasurer by December 1.

ARTICLE XII: PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY. The rules contained in Robert's RULES OF ORDER, REVISED or the Parliamentary section in the WMU Year Book shall govern the Union in all cases to which they are applicable.

ARTICLE XIII: AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS. These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the associational WMU provided the amendment has been submitted in writing at a previous meeting.
