INTRODUCTION.

No attempt has hitherto been made to collect and publish a list of the Christian graves and monuments in Rajputana and Central India, although it must have long been clear that a rich harvest awaited the investigator. In Rajputana the British connection stretched back to 1612, in Central India to 1778, while it was probable also that many of the European military adventurers who had fought and died in the service of the princes during the 18th and early 19th centuries, had left some traces behind them. With these points in view this list was undertaken in 1932 at the request of Lieutenant-Colonel Ogilvie, Agent to the Governor General in Rajputana.

The collection of the monumental inscriptions has in some ways proved disappointing, for in a hostile or indifferent country the graves of a triumphant enemy who has passed on or of a servant no longer useful, were more likely to be desecrated or obliterated than similar graves in the British Provinces. Again the interior of the States are not known to the European officials as are the districts of British India, and it may be that some interesting old tombs have been unavoidably overlooked. For this reason the pages of Dodwell and Miles, and the casualty lists of the Mahratta Wars have been studied, and the names which appear in their pages have been shown in italics in the cemeteries of the stations where they died, or on the battle-fields where they fell in action. It is hoped that this plan may perhaps lead to the rediscovery of a few more forgotten graves.

The Rajputana States lists are principally made from a P. W. D. record, but in many cases it was possible personally to verify the inscriptions and locations. Unfortunately Bhurtpore has not been thus verified, and if any mistakes of topography appear in that section, it is hoped that they will be regarded leniently. The lists of Ajmer-Merwara were collected personally with the assistance of the Political Department.

In Central India also most of the outlying tombs and the greater part of the Gwalior inscriptions are taken from the P. W. D. record, while the inscriptions from the Indore, Mhow, Agra, Neemuch, Nowgong and Nagode cantonments were collected by the writer.

The aim of this book has been to build up from the material thus accumulated, as complete a record as is possible of all the commissioned officers, civil and military, and of their wives and families who have died in these Agencies before the year 1860, when an epoch of British Indian History ended with John Company, and railways and steamships began to alter conditions in the mofussil. The inscriptions are tabulated in the main list, except those concerning the families of purely military officers, whose names and dates will be found in the Appendix. After 1862 the Appendix has been omitted for the sake of brevity, and only particulars regarding the families of officers directly connected with the States have been given in addition to the lists of the officers themselves, which are carried down to the present day.

Material for the biographical notes was collected from the India Office records during a short period of leave in England in the summer of 1933, and my thanks are due to the officials of the Civil and Military Records Department, and of the Library for the assistance that they gave me. Captain H. Bullock has also given me some valuable information concerning the lives and genealogies of the adventurers, but as in the case of the Central Provinces and Berar List, it is to the unfailing kindness of Major V. C. P. Hodson that I owe the bulk of my notes. Once again he allowed me to make use of the still unpublished pages of the "List of the Officers of the Bengal Army 1758-1832" and of his transcriptions of the Cadet Papers of the Madras and Bombay Officers, and once again he permitted me to trespass on his time, and on his accumulated store of knowledge and experience.

The prologue to the British connection with Rajputana opens in 1612 when John Mildenhall, merchant adventurer and self-styled ambassador, came to the Moghul Court at Ajmer, and there he died, it was said of poison which he had

prepared for some of the members of his party, but had taken in mistake. He was a Catholic and the Jesuit Fathers took his body for burial to Agra, where his memorial stone remains to this day, the oldest recorded English grave in India.

Three years later our real history begins with the advent of a very different man, Sir Thomas Roe, Ambassador of King James I to the Court of the Emperor Jehangir. This visit is commemorated by a modern tablet placed beneath the balcony in Ajmer Fort where he presented his credentials to the Great Moghul on the 12th January 1616. Before the party left the chaplain, the Rev. Thomas Hall of Petersfield, died suddenly. Religious and political jealousies ran high just then and as the priest of another religion and an emissary of a rival race, it is doubtful whether the Jesuits would have offered to him also the hospitality of the Agra cemetery; Hall is probably buried in Ajmer itself but no tomb or tradition marks his resting place.

The Moghuls moved to Agra, to the Deccan, to Delhi, and we hear no more of embassies in Rajputana, but the ceaseless wars that heralded the break up of the Empire opened the country to a swarm of military adventurers, French, German, Swiss and Dutch as well as British. Their records are scanty and confused, for with some brilliant exceptions, they were illiterate men, and though many died in the service of the princes, they usually fell in the rearguard of a flying army or at the head of a forlorn hope, and their masters had no time, if they had the inclination, to erect monuments to their memory. So it was in 1775 when Madec lost half his Frenchmen in the attack of the Rohillas on his camp on the Bhurtpore border. So it was at Lakhairi in 1790 when de Boigne defeated Holkar after a stubborn fight, and Durenec wrote that all his Europeans were dead and himself the sole survivor. Bulkeley killed in 1792 at the storm of Balahiri, and Donnelly and Exshaw who fell in the assault of Jajgarh in 1799 have no monuments, nor have Dodd, Vickers and Ryan who when asked by Jeswant Rao Holkar in 1804 to fight against their own countrymen refused, and were murdered near Udaipur. Their bodies were indeed denied burial, but their refusal joined them to the company of those whose "names live for ever more." Lucan, in a similar predicament but under a more humane master, left Scindia to join Lake and to die greatly, the first victim of Monson's retreat.

Near Bhurtpore, however, the adventurers have left some traces of their passing. In a garden still called Somru ka Nagla is a tablet put up by the infamous Walter Reinhardt in 1773, and close to the garden is a cemetery containing seven graves which must have belonged either to his campoo, or to that of Madec. Unfortunately only one of these graves retains its inscription, it bears the date 1767. In 1790 when de Boigne's brigades took part in the Jodhpur war of succession, one of his officers, de la Roy, better known as de Baours, died of wounds received in the battle of Merta, and was buried on the tank bund at Dungolai where his inscription has solved the disputed date of the battle.

The second Mahratta war opened in Hindustan with Lord Lake's campaign against Scindia. He took Aligarh, cleared the Mahrattas out of Delhi, and then having reduced Agra, marched against Daulat Rao's northern army which was then in Alwar. He overtook it at Laswari after a night march of 24 miles and gained a complete victory. It was not a cheap one however, for Major General Ware, 14 officers and 57 European soldiers were among the 172 men buried that evening beneath the mounds which are still to be seen on the battlefield.

In January 1804 Daulat Rao Scindia, his armies shattered at Assaye and Argaum as well as at Laswari, signed the peace of Anjangaon-Surji. In June Holkar, who had watched the discomfiture of his rival in Rajputana without taking an active part in the fighting, retired to Malwa. Lake therefore concluded that no danger was to be expected from that quarter till after Dusseera and sent his exhausted army into scattered cantonments, leaving Monson with a small force to watch Jeswant Rao's movements. In July he was at Bhanpura when Holkar suddenly took the offensive, and then for a reason never fully explained Monson lost his nerve. True he was greatly outnumbered, but he had fought and won against as heavy odds before. He said "he did not trust his men", yet after two months of demoralising retreat through a country turned hostile where a few weeks ago it had been friendly, 800 of these same men, half starved, their clothes in rags, turned with their backs to the flooded Banas and held the massed attacks of

Holkar's army while the main body crossed the river. The 2/2nd Bengal Native Infantry under Major James Sinclair fought until all their ammunition was exhausted, and then with bayonets alone and Sinclair carrying the colours at their head, charged an enemy battery, and cleared and held it till their leader fell. The curtain went down on the final scene of the tragedy as Holkar's cavalry charged in to cut down the heroic remnant, and the havildar, snatching the colours from Sinclair's dead hand, plunged with them into the swirling Banas.

The cold weather of 1804 saw another battle of Delhi and this time it was Holkar's army that fled, Lake caught his cavalry at Farukhabad, while Fraser brought the battalions to bay in the marshes before Dig and routed them, though he himself fell mortally wounded in the final advance. He died in Muttra ten days later, but 6 officers and 61 Europeans were among the dead who were buried on the battle-field. John Pester says that these graves were rifled a few weeks later and no trace of them now remains. The same fate befell the graves of the men who died in the assault of Dig itself, when the fortress was taken on the 23rd December.

From Dig the army passed on to the grim walls of Bhurtpore where another tragedy was to be enacted. Repeated successes had made Lake overconfident and now with Holkar and Amir Khan in the field behind him, he attacked Bhurtpore and its garrison of 50,000 men with an army of 7,800 men, 14 guns and no engineering equipment. Even then with reasonable precautions he might have been successful but faulty reconnaissance wrecked the first two attacks in spite of the heroism with which they were pushed home. In the third storm the European regiments who had been counter-attacked in the advance trenches as they waited for the signal for assault and had suffered heavily, refused to advance, and it was Colonel Don of the 12th Bengal Native Infantry who planted the colours on the walls before the attack was driven back with terrible loss. But if the Europeans failed on February 20th, every man stood forward as a volunteer for the final assault, when Lord Lake called on them to wipe out their disgrace. Next day they were led to the storm of the stockaded breach for the fourth time. For the fourth time a handful only gained the rampart, and for the fourth time the bullet swept breach prevented adequate support from reaching them. For two hours their comrades continued the attack, trying to climb the bastion on their own bayonets which they drove into the walls, but at last it was clear that they had been asked to achieve the impossible and they were recalled. Lord Lake then drew off his army which had suffered nearly 3,000 casualties in the four assaults. But the sacrifice was not entirely in vain, for when the army was halted seven miles away to prepare for a fifth attack, the Raja of Bhurtpore came to the camp to ask for peace and Lake dictated his own terms and got them. Here and there about Bhurtpore are the ruined mounds and graves that hide the bones of Lord Lake's men, but if the tombs of Bhurtpore are in ruins the memory of a half legendary Englishman, Anta Gugur, who took part in the siege, is kept alive in ballad and story. Who Anta Gugur was it is impossible to say though his portrait appears in Buldeo Singh's chhatti at Goberdhan, and shows him as a British officer taking his part in the councils of Lord Lake.

The third Mahratta War 1817-1819 resulted in the foundation of Nasirabad cantonment by Sir David Ochterloney, but the campaign was bloodless in Rajputana.

A double tomb at Mangrol in Kotah marks a strange action which took place in 1821, when the British Government, by a duplication of treaties found itself forced to support its ally the Regent Zalin Singh against its ally his Prince; and when the dislike of a regiment for its commandant led to the death of two young officers and a general court-martial of the regiment.

In 1825 internal intrigue in the Bhurtpore State led to intervention, and another British army approached that city. Lord Combermere had the experience of the first siege to guide him in his approach, military engineering had made great strides in the last two decades and his supply of powder was adequate. The walls were mined and on January 19th after a five weeks siege, the hitherto impregnable fortress fell. The total casualties of this assault were 569 of whom 103 were killed. Among the latter was Brigadier General Edwards, 7 other officers and

61 Europeans. Although the greater part of the graves of this siege also were ruined, those of Lieutenants Candy and Brown and a monument to the men of the 1st Bengal Europeans who fell in the assault are still intact.

With the fall of Bhurtpore peace came to Rajputana and only occasional expeditions against the Bhils and Mhairs troubled her quiet until the great storm broke in 1857.

The British campaigns in Central India followed a different cycle. In 1778 Bombay, hard pressed by the Mahrattas, had asked Bengal for help, but the French were a serious menace to coast-wise shipping just then, so Warren Hastings assembled a force at Cawnpore and dispatched it through Bundelkhand to Gujerat. The commandant, Colonel Mathew Leslie, who had started his career as a Surgeon's mate, and then held a King's commission and fought under Wolfe at Quebec before he became a Company's Brigadier, died at Rajnagar in Chhatarpur State. The Bundela chiefs to whom Leslie had made himself useful erected a chhattri over his remains. A year later Warren Hastings decided to uphold the claims of Raghunath Rao as Peshwa, and to help that end sent Popham to assist the Rana of Gohad against Scindia, and if possible to take Gwalior. He achieved his object and the assault was bloodless, but two of his officers died near Gwalior and two more fell at the storm of Lahar; their graves have long since disappeared. The second siege of Gwalior in 1804 resulted in a few casualties and many deaths from heatstroke during the months of the occupation, but these graves including that of the Fort Commandant Colonel T. Taylor, who was buried near the flagstaff, cannot now be traced. The oldest inscribed graves in Gwalior date back only to 1813 and occupy the little cemetery near the Rakkas Pahar where the Resident Charles Theophilus Metcalfe made his camp when Daulat Rao Scindia settled in Lashkar in 1810.

Gwalior was the State where the adventurers were most deeply rooted. At Narwar is an old chapel, probably built by the Bourbon family who took refuge there when Nadir Shah sacked Delhi in 1737. This chapel contains several tombs, of which one bears the date 1747 and another, to the child of a doctor Dululton that of 1754. Hessing's Brigade, seven of whose eight officers died in the defence of Ujjein when Holkar attacked the capital in 1801, has now no memorial, though there stands near the battlefield a very old grave from which the inscription was lost ten or twenty years ago, but which may be connected with the defence. In Gwalior itself the Filose family have a cemetery as well as the chapel where Jean Baptiste Filose was buried; the Alexanders also own a cemetery. In Bhopal there is a Bourbon cemetery. Among the adventurers who served Holkar only two lie in known graves, W. N. Tone, the brother of the Irish rebel, who was killed in a skirmish near Choli in 1802 is buried at Maheshwar, and G. di Paulo, a Neapolitan, lies beside him.

Except in Bundelkhand where perpetual guerrilla warfare occupied the years between 1803 and 1820 the Second Mahratta War scarcely touched Central India. General Richard Jones occupied Indore with a Bombay division in 1804 but there was no fighting, and though one of his officers died at Rutlam when they marched north to join Lord Lake before Bhurtpore in 1805, his grave is lost.

In 1818 however Central India was a stronghold of the Pindaris and their supporters, and the advance of British troops across the Nerbudda followed inevitably on the outbreak of the Third Mahratta War. A little cemetery at Mouza Doubla holds the bodies of the officers who fell at Mehidpur. Of the graves of the men there is no trace, but 174 men including a number of the Royal Scots and the Madras European Regiment were killed, and a large percentage of the wounded died immediately after the battle. The medical officers of those days contracted for their own medicines and stores and Malcolm's surgeons, to quote a contemporary account, seem to have shown more solicitude for their pockets than for their potential patients. "At Mehidpur in the field hospital there was scarcely a bit of dressing plaster for the wounded officers; none for the men; nor was there a single set of amputating instruments besides those belonging to the individual surgeons; some of these without them. . . . of those amputated, from the bluntness of the knives, two out of three died in hospital."

In the years immediately following the treaty of Mandesore small detachments of British troops occupied strategic points all over the country, and many men died at their posts of the fevers and fatigue of that strenuous campaign. There are such graves at the fords of the Nerbudda, near the great gateway at Jamghat,

at Harsola, Rutlam, Goona and Tharod. In 1818 Sir John Malcolm founded the cantonments at Mhow and Neemuch. When the echoes of the war had died away the Pax Britannica was firmly established in Central India and only the Bhils sometimes failed to recognise it and needed small punitive expeditions to keep them from raiding their neighbours. Captain Bowden Smith, buried at Neemuch in 1837 seems to have been the only officer casualty resulting from these operations.

In 1843 however internal intrigues in Gwalior became a menace to the peace of India. A large army, the reason of whose existence was gone, fomented trouble in the state till the Governor General Lord Ellenborough was forced to call the Regent to order, and when he received an unsatisfactory reply, marched on the capital with his family and staff, and with the Army of Exercise to back him. The expedition was a pleasant social affair and little account was taken of the enemy until a cannonball whistled past Lady Gough's howdah as the party approached Maharajpur where they had decided to breakfast. Then for a while, as Lord Ellenborough wrote, "everything and everybody was out of place", but the line was formed at last and after a fierce fight the Gwalior army was routed. Colonel Churchill, a veteran of the Peninsular and Waterloo, Colonel Sanders, Deputy Secretary to Government and four other officers and 54 European soldiers were among the dead that day. Most of them are buried on the battlefield, but the 39th Foot who were at once sent in pursuit of the flying Mahrattas carried the bodies of Lieutenant Bray and thirteen men with them. They are buried near the old Residency at Gwalior. On the same day eleven miles to the south of Gwalior another battle was fought at Panniar, and there 3 officers and 11 men of H. M. 3rd and 50th Foot were buried in nameless graves at the close of the day. As the immediate result of these battles peace was made, and for the next fourteen years the tranquillity of Central India helped to deepen the feeling of security that was so rudely shattered in 1857.

The news of the outbreak in Meerut and Delhi had an instantaneous effect in Rajputana and Central India. In Ajmer Colonel Dixon, who was to die at Beawar a month later, foresaw the greatest danger to Rajputana and brought in his Mhairs by a forced march from Beawar and took the Arsenal over before the disaffected guard could realise what had happened. He thus saved a huge store of ammunition from falling into the hands of the mutineers. Honour seldom goes to those who prevent catastrophes, but Colonel Dixon deserved well of his countrymen for his prompt action. On 28th May the sepoys at Nasirabad revolted, but thorough arrangements had been made for the assembly of the Europeans and no murders took place. Major Hugh Spottiswoode and Cornet Newbury were killed in a charge to retake the guns which the mutineers had seized, and they are buried in the cemetery at Nasirabad. Their Colonel, John Penney, died of exhaustion the same night during the flight to Beawar but his grave has not been traced. On June 3rd the flame of mutiny reached Neemuch and passed on, the station was reoccupied by Major Burton, but on the 7th the cavalry of the United Malwa Contingent on the way to his support, rose and murdered their officers at Mulhargarh. On the 9th the 12th B. N. I. mutinied at Nowgong, and the Europeans suffered severely in their retreat through the jungles and passes of Bundelkhand, five only eventually reached Saugor in safety, while the rest were killed or died of heatstroke or exhaustion on the road. On the 14th the Gwalior contingent troops caught the infection and twenty men, women and children were massacred on that and the following day. They are buried in a special cemetery at Morar.

On 1st July the Indore Residency was attacked, here Colonel Durand was not equal to his opportunity, and in a small community the casualties were heavy. Twenty-two bodies were buried in Indore when the Malwa Field Force came in on the 14th December, and three more were taken to Mhow for burial. The garrison at Mhow, alert to the influence of Indore, rose the same night. Colonel Platt, who commanded the 23rd B. N. I., retained a pathetic trust in his men while the sound of the Indore guns was breaking down the last remnant of their discipline. To the Resident's appeal for help he replied that his men were loyal and could only rise over his dead body, at dusk he paid for his faith and kept his word at the quarterguard. His Adjutant fell with him, while Major Harris was murdered

by the 1st Cavalry, and the other officers chased up to the walls of Malcolm's fort which was the one place in Central India that was never evacuated throughout those two terrible years.

On the 4th July the Contingent troops at Agar revolted, murdering Lieutenant-O'Dowda. Dr. and Mrs. James were done to death by villagers in their flight through Gangapur, but the rest of the Europeans escaped across the Nerbudda to Hoshangabad. Three days later Sehore had to be abandoned. The second outbreak at Neemuch and Nasirabad, the attack on Abu and the mutiny at Erinpura were fortunately bloodless, but on the 18th September an abortive attack on Avah resulted in the death of Captain Monk-Mason, the Political Agent of Jodhpur, who is buried in a nameless grave at Bar. A month later another Political Agent Major Burton, with his two sons and Assistant Surgeon Salder were murdered in the Residency at Kotah by sepoys of the Maharao's army.

By the end of October the tide had turned, and though the Mchidpur cantonment was overwhelmed on November 8th and four out of the seven European officers and N. C. Os. were killed, the Malwa Field Force had begun to clear the country and Lieutenant Redmayne's grave at Guraria marks the battle which broke the revolt in Malwa and finally relieved the little garrison penned up in the fort at Neemuch.

While Sir Hugh Rose swept up through Central India to Kalpi, taking Chanderi on the way, Kotah fell to the Rajputana Field Force in March. Then Tantia Topee and the Maharani of Jhansi seized Gwalior and the veterans of the Central India Campaign were ordered to retake it. This brilliant little campaign was carried through in a week of continuous marching and fighting in unprecedented heat. The grave of Lieutenant Neave and a monument to the 71st Highlanders commemorate the battle of Morar. Lieutenant Reilly and the men of the 8th Hussars who died of heatstroke in the charge at Kotah-ka-Serai have no memorial. A tablet in St. Peter's Church at Morar marks the battle of Gwalior, and the tomb of Lieutenant Rose in the Mutiny Cemetery at Morar, the taking of the fortress.

The pursuit of Tantia Topee and the pacification of the country was all that now remained; the graves of Lieutenants Shaw, Fawcett and Jennings and of a number of soldiers are testimony to those endless marches, and to the surprise attacks on the jungle hiding places of the scattered rebels. With these the fighting ended in seventy-eight years of peace.

The graves of each Province have their special features. In the Central Provinces the most remarkable are the number of inscriptions commemorating men killed by wild animals, but here these are few. In the Punjab Frontier lists the work of the ghazi is in evidence, here there are only three recorded assassinations. Lieutenant Wyllie, uncle of that Sir Curzon Wyllie who was murdered in London in 1909 by an Indian student, was himself the victim of a fanatic in Pertabgarh in 1826, and at Jaipur the young civilian Martin Blake was murdered in 1835, a tragedy which resulted from a palace intrigue and from the vacillating policy of Government. In Central India the outstanding features are the wayside graves. Everyone who knows Malwa has noticed the grave of an unknown soldier between Indore and Mhow, but though less obvious, it is on the great military road which links Asir with Mhow and Neemuch, and passes on to Nasirabad and the north, that these tombs most frequently bear witness to the shifting of troops and the passing of armies. There are many known graves which do not appear in these pages, graves of soldiers and of their wives and children, who died on the march, and for each that is known many must have escaped observation.

Round Neemuch at Jehangira, Piplia, Singaria and Denaria cemeteries mark the recurrent epidemics of cholera, and the days of those grim marches when the sickness broke and the infected regiments left cantonments and went from place to place in the vain attempt to escape the "wandering Jew". At Neemuch too is a striking instance of the impression that a strong personality can leave behind him. On the old Residency, now the Club House, Sir David Ochterloney recorded in English, Urdu and Hindi the date of this building and imparted to it something of his spirit, so that when in 1857 the mutineers burned Neemuch, they feared to touch his property and, with the exception of the Masonic Lodge which was

spared for somewhat similar reasons, it was the only bungalow in the cantonment which survived the outbreak. In the minds of the Bhils also his memory is still potent, and to this day they bring garlands to hang on the wall of the dais where his chair once faced the Durbaris in the great hall. His eldest son who died in 1822 lies in the Neemuch cemetery, and close beside him rests the daughter-in-law of another great man, Robert Burns. The grandson of the "incomparable Sarah Siddons" is buried in the Indore cemetery and a niece of Sir David Wilkie lies a yard or two away. Honoria, Lady Lawrence died at Abu a few years before her husband was killed in the defence of the Residency at Lucknow. While at Lahar there rests in an unknown grave a kinsman of Warren Hastings, the greatest Englishman of them all.

But it is to the memory of the majority, to the men and women, who impelled by duty or the spirit of adventure, came to the cantonments and outposts in these states, played their part gallantly and died, some very gloriously, that this book is written.

An English factory under Master Edwards was already established at Ajmer when Sir Thomas Roe arrived in 1616, but it did not become a British district until 28th July 1818 when Sir David Ochterloney took possession of the tract on its evacuation by Scindia's Subah Bapa Scindia.

			<p>was kept secret till his return from India, when she accompanied him to Constantinople. She died 1675 and was buried in Woodford Church. In 1614 Roe was offered the Embassy to India on a salary of £600 per annum and 500 marks for his outfit. He was to be accompanied by a chaplain and churion and 13 followers. Carrying letters of credence and a royal letter to the Moghul he sailed 2nd Feb. 1615 and reached Surat 18th Sep. 1615. Here his personality carried him past the opposition of Prince Khurram, Governor of Surat and he set out to join the Moghul court. Arrived at Ajmer 23rd Dec. 1615, but was so ill with fever that he was unable to present his credentials till 10th Jan. 1616. Received with courtesy by the Moghul on personal grounds but largely owing to the meanness of King James' gifts, the object of his mission was treated with indifference. In Nov. 1616 the Moghul left Ajmer for Mandu and was followed there by Roe. In Aug. 1617 a number of his retinue died of plague, he alone escaping infection. In the same month he took formal leave of the Moghul, and addressed himself to Prince Shah Jehan who had succeeded Khurram at Surat, for a special treaty in connection with that place. This he obtained, and leaving Surat 14th Feb. 1619 reached London in September, when he was received by the King and the E. I. Company with gratitude. After a short period in Parliament Roe was sent in 1621 as Ambassador to Constantinople where he served with marked success till 1628. In June 1629 he negotiated a treaty between Poland and Sweden and on his return was presented with a special gold medal by the King. In Jan. 1637 he was made Chancellor of the Order of the Garter. Represented England at the Congress for peace negotiations which sat successively at Hamburg, Ratisbon and Vienna. Privy Counsellor and M. P. for Oxford University 1640. Special Mission to Germany 1641. Ambassador Extraordinary to Vienna 1642-43. At the outbreak of the Civil War Roe's sympathies were with the Parliament but he would not fight against his sovereign, he therefore retired to Bath on the plea of illhealth. The Mutiny at Nasirabad, 28th May 1857.

When the news of the outbreak at Meerut reached Nasirabad precautions were taken to prevent the spread of the mutiny to that station, but on May 28th agitators in the bazar precipitated a crisis among the sepoy, and it was reported to Brigadier Macan that an outbreak was imminent. At 4 o'clock that afternoon it was found that the guns had been seized by the sepoy of the 15th B. N. I. and they were shortly afterwards joined by the 30th Regt. The 1st Bombay Cavalry were assembled in the rear of the Artillery lines and were ordered to charge by squadrons. They obeyed the order to charge, but as they neared the guns the men went three about, leaving their officers to go on alone. Major Spottiswoode fell mortally wounded; Cornet Newbury was cut to pieces among the guns, while Capt. Hardy and Lt. Lock were badly wounded.

In the meantime the Europeans had been collected, and at nightfall they fled to Beawar 37 miles distant. The party which included a number of women and children was escorted by the 1st Bombay Cavalry. On the road Colonel Penney who commanded that regiment fell dead from excitement and exhaustion. (See page 26.)

After burning the cantonment the mutineers took the road to Delhi, Nasirabad was re-occupied on June 12th by the detachment of British troops called in from Deesa. The second outbreak on 10th August only led to a temporary disarmament of the 12th Bombay N. I. and there were no European casualties.

The battle of Merta 11th Sept. 1780.

In 1790 Ishmael Beg renounced his allegiance to the Emperor and having induced the Rajas of Jaipur and Jodhpur to assist him, appeared in arms in the Ajmer district. Scindhia thereupon detached de Boigne from his camp at Muttra with orders to punish the rebel and crush the Rajput chiefs. He came on the enemy at Patan on the 20th June, where the treachery of their Jaipur allies enabled de Boigne to secure a complete victory over the Rathore and Pathan cavalry. When the news reached Scindia in Muttra he determined to press his advantage and ordered de Boigne to invade Jodhpur. De Boigne first attempted to capture Taragarh at Ajmer, but finding that the fort was no nearer reduction after fifteen days of siege, he left a small containing force there and marched on towards Jodhpur.

The defeat of Patan was regarded in Marwar as a black disgrace to the Rathors. Bijai Singh of Jodhpur summoned every Rathor between the ages of sixteen and sixty to his standard and was soon at the head of 30,000 men whom he collected at Merta, a walled town about thirty miles from Ajmer. De Boigne having crossed the Luni river found the Marwar army drawn up two miles from Merta with their right flank resting on Dungiwas, and there they awaited his attack instead of themselves attacking the Mahratta cavalry and falling on de Boigne's army as it struggled with the difficulties of the river crossing. At dawn on September 11th de Boigne opened with grape on the sleeping Rathor camp, and in the confusion that followed his infantry advanced and occupied its outer lines. At this point Captain Rohan, who commanded the left wing, advanced without orders thereby breaking the line. The chief of Awah at the head of 4,000 Rathor cavalry clad in saffron, saw his opportunity and charged shouting "Remember Patan". The charge broke and drove back Rohan's battalions and the attack swung round to envelope the main body. De Boigne formed a hollow square and against this the Rathor vainly hurled themselves. Long after all hope of success had gone parties of ten or twenty still charged the square seeking death to redeem their honour. It is said that out of 4,000 only 15 left the field. Before midday the Marwar army was in full flight. Among the killed was a French adventurer Captain De la Roy.

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Action at Awah 18th Sept. 1857.

The Jodhpur Legion after the unsuccessful attack on Mount Abu had established themselves at Awah, and aided by the rebel Thakur of that place defeated a body of Jodhpur State troops at Pali.

Brigadier General G. Lawrence had only a few reliable troops at his command but determined to attack the victorious rebels at Awah and prevent the spread of disaffection from this centre. He reached Awah on Sept. 18th with a small mixed force. The town possessed a strong wall and the approach road was through heavy jungle. As the British approached they came under a heavy fire from the rebel guns on the bastions and also from batteries concealed in the trees. The British Artillery replied, but after an action of three hours Lawrence realised that the enemy would not be drawn out to meet him in the open and that his own force was too small and the position too strong to risk an assault, he therefore decided to withdraw. The British casualties were 6 killed and wounded; the Political Agent of Jodhpur, Captain Monck-Mason was among the former and his body was taken for burial to Bar.

This abortive attempt on Awah was exaggerated by the rebels into a great victory and did some harm, and it was not till the following January when Rajputana was reinforced from Bombay that Awah fell after a five day siege.

Disturbances in Jaipur 1835.

During the minority of Maharana Jai Singh III the State was divided by the intrigues of the Regent Rani and her paramour Jutha Ram against Rawal Byree Saul, who had been placed in power by the British Government. In 1824 the Rani, taking advantage of the posting of a new political officer, succeeded in expelling the Rawal and recalling her favourite from banishment. Released from the strong hand of the Rawal the city was

soon in such a state of disturbance that the P. A. Major Raper called in troops from Nasirabad to be in readiness to take action when called upon. At this juncture Sir David Ochterloney arrived from Delhi and disregarding the opinion of the P. A. agreed to the dismissal of the Rawal, gave permission to Jutha Ram to remain with the Rani and directed Major Raper to follow a policy of non-intervention. As a result of this change of policy conditions in the State rapidly deteriorated, intrigue was rampant, and the tribute to the British Government was 12 lakhs in arrears when the Rani died in 1832. The young Maharaja Jai Singh now took control, but Jutha Ram finding his power curtailed murdered him in order to retain charge during the new minority. On receipt of this news, the A. G. G. Colonel Alves hurried to Jaipur to insist in the dismissal of the murderer and the replacement of the Rawal who should never have been dismissed.

On June 4th the Resident accompanied by his Assistant Martin Blake and two other officers, proceeded to the palace to make known the decision of Government to the Darbar. After performing this duty he was about to mount his elephant when he was attacked from behind by a man with a tulwar who inflicted severe wounds on his neck. The would-be murderer was seized by Blake who disarmed him and sent him to jail tied to a charpoy. The Resident attended by the two officers was placed in a palanquin and taken to the Agency without interference from the crowd at the palace gate, who were unaware of his identity.

Considerable time had elapsed and vague rumours had begun to spread before Blake mounted his elephant. A crowd had collected before the palace gate when Blake appeared covered with blood and holding the assassin's blood-stained sword in his hand. The report was spread that he had murdered the young Maharaja and he was instantly attacked. He urged on his elephant in the hope of clearing the city but found the gate closed and no escape in that direction. In the tumult before the gate the mahout was wounded and a chuprassi killed behind him. The elephant came to a standstill and Blake jumped from its back on the balcony of a gateway leading into a temple, and running down the stairs shut and fastened the gate. A post of Meenas were stationed nearly opposite the temple and hearing the shouts of "Maro, Maro" and not knowing the cause of the excitement climbed over the walls and murdered Blake the body being afterwards thrown into the streets where it was mutilated. Three chuprassis, an umbrella bearer and the mahout were also killed.

In the meantime the Rawal got information of the disturbance, and took the necessary steps to keep the city quiet. As soon as he heard of Blake's murder he seized the Meena guard and hung them over the gate of the temple before the news could be carried to the Resident who was having his wounds dressed in the Agency House.

The State recognised the heinousness of the crime, and on its own initiative sent the British Government 26 lakhs of tribute money in propitiation.

The 1st Brigade under Major Fremont was sent to reduce Balahiri fort about 45 miles east of Jaipur and to compell Raja Devi Singh, a feudatory chief of Jaipur to pay the tribute due from him. Fremont arrived at Balahiri on August 5th and after calling on the garrison to surrender, constructed a battery and opened fire, a breach was soon made, and after dark fire was kept up by two mortars. By 3 A.M. the storming party was ready to assault the breach but the garrison, aware of their danger, surrendered before the assault was launched. The garrison had contrived to inflict some casualties by musketry fire on the attacking forces, and Captain Bulkeley was among the killed.

LASWARI.

Battle of Laswari 1st Nov. 1803.

At the time of Lord Lake's reduction of Agra on Oct. 17th a considerable enemy force including 17 of Scindia's regular battalions were encamped in the vicinity of Bhurtpore. This force had made no attempt to interfere with the siege operations but it possessed a formidable artillery and was believed to be threatening Delhi. Lord Lake therefore determined to break it up. His infantry was reduced by detachments left to garrison Aligarh, Delhi, Muttra and Agra, but his cavalry was still intact. He left Agra on the 27th October and marched with rapidity in the direction of the Malhattas, but they as usual gave way before him. On the 31st he arrived at Muscri, a 20 mile march, only to find the camp quitted that morning by the enemy.

Battle of Laswari 1st Nov. 1803—contd.

Lord Lake thereupon determined to overtake them by a night march, and went forward with the cavalry at 11 p. m. After a night march of 23 miles he found himself at sunrise in the presence of the enemy.

The battlefield of Laswari lies on the north bank of the Ruparel Nala which flows east from the hills south and west of Alwar. The banks of the nala are steep and difficult. On the north bank and close to it lies the village of Laswari, and about 2,000 yards west by north the village of Malpur. Just above Laswari the stream is dammed and from this a canal carries the water eastward.

When Lord Lake arrived near the nala crossing, he saw the enemy in apparent confusion near Malpur, and thinking that they were in retreat he decided to attack with the cavalry alone. The enemy however, far from retreating, had cut the canal bund and flooded the road of the advancing cavalry, and when the British had crossed the inundations the Mahrattas were drawn up to receive them. Their position was a strong one. Their right rested on Laswari and the nala, their left on Malpur, while their front was concealed by high grass and covered by powerful artillery. Nevertheless the attack was delivered. The 1st Brigade (1st Light Dragoons and the 1st and 3rd N. C.), passed along the whole front of the position and entered Malpur, penetrating the enemy's lines and capturing some guns which they had no means of taking away. On the Mahratta right, the 3rd Brigade (8th Light Dragoons and 4th N. C.) charged three times through their line, but each time the enemy formed again behind them. Lord Lake then withdrew the cavalry to a position on the north east or left of the enemy line and awaited the infantry.

The infantry having made a 24 mile march appeared at 11 A.M. The men were given a short time for rest and refreshment during which the enemy reformed his line until it faced east, with Malpur behind the left and centre, and the right extending towards the nala but not quite reaching it. Lake decided to force his way between the enemy's right and the nala, and detailed the 76th Europeans, the 2/12th, 1/15th 2/15th and part of the 16th N. I. under Major General Ware for this purpose. The Commander-in-Chief himself accompanied this column. It was to be followed by the left wing consisting of the 2/8th, 2/9th and 1/12th N. I. under Major-General St. John. Of the cavalry, the 3rd Brigade was to support the infantry, the 2nd Brigade was to threaten the enemy's left and cut off his retreat, while the 1st Brigade, formed the only reserve of the army. Such artillery as had already arrived was distributed along the front.

The leading column had to march nearly a mile to gain the enemy's flank, and at first escaped observation in the high grass, while the 29th Dragoons marched in the hollow below the bank of the nala. As soon as they were perceived the enemy opened on them with a heavy artillery fire at the same time throwing back his right from the village of Malpur to frustrate the attack. Lake who was in the thick of the fight, thereupon determined not to wait for the deployment of the whole column, but as soon as the 76th had formed, led it, with as many of the Native Infantry as had closed to the front, direct to the attack, while the artillery came into action at the intended point. The 29th Light Dragoons in the low ground to the left of the head of the column, were unfortunately then so placed that they received many casualties from shot intended for the artillery above them. As soon as the 76th came within canister range of the enemy a terrible fire was opened on them, temporarily checking their advance. A body of enemy horse seized this opportunity to charge them, but the regiment was able to repulse the attack. The enemy horse rallied however and maintained such a threatening attitude that the 29th Dragoons were ordered to charge, which deploying from the nala bed, they did with shattering effect. Lake at the head of the now fully deployed infantry of the 1st column, attacked the enemy's second line and an obstinate struggle ensued during which General Ware was killed. The enemy continued to resist until all his guns had been captured, even then their left wing tried to retreat in good order, but 27th Light Dragoons and 6th N. C. under Lt.-Col. Vandeleur, broke their column, and after inflicting many casualties forced the rest to surrender. By 4 o'clock the battle was over and the enemy's force ceased to exist, their casualties were very heavy and the whole of their artillery, baggage, treasure and cattle remained in the hands of the British. Out of a force of 8,000 men the British casualties amounted to 172 killed and 652 wounded. Among the killed were:—

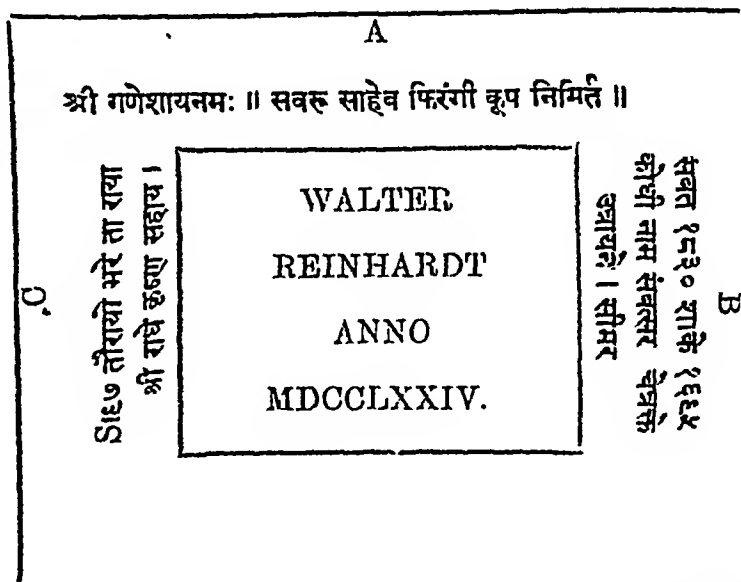

Walter Reinhardt, *alias* Somru b. Salzburg 1720. Said to have been the son of a butcher. Reached Pondicherry on a French frigate about 1750, but deserted in order to enlist in the French army of Southern India where his saturnine expression earned him the nickname of Sombre or Somru as the sepoys called him. Some years later he came to Bengal and enlisted in a Swiss Bn. in the service of the Company. Deserted after 18 days, and escaping to Chandernagore was apptd. sergt. in Law's force. Again deserted and took service as a trooper under Suraj-ud-Daula, Nawab of Bengal. In 1760 he joined the rebel Faujdar of Purnea, by whom he was apptd. to the comd. of a small force, but a few months later following a reverse to the Faujdar's arms Somru deserted him, and joined an Armenian named Gregory who was the minister of Kassim Ali Khan who had succeeded Suraj-ud-Daula in Bengal. In 1763 a rupture occurred between Kassim Ali Khan and the Company, and the former treacherously attacked and captured the English residents at Patna, and in a spirit of revenge ordered their execution. Sombre invited 40 of these unfortunates to dine with him and had them murdered at his table, he then proceeded to the prison where the rest of the prisoners were kept and with his own hands assisted at the massacre of 148 defenceless Europeans. On the approach of an English force, Sombre fled from Patna with the 2 battalions to whose command he had been appointed by Kassim Ali Khan and took service with them under the Nawab Wazir of Oudh. By the end of 1763 Sombre's force had increased to 4 battalions of infantry, one regiment of cavalry and a train of artillery and when the Nawab Wazir was defeated at Buxar, and compelled to sue for peace, one of

the conditions on which the British Government insisted was the surrender of Sombre, but the man was now too strong for his master, who unable to seize him offered to have him assassinated. This offer was refused, but Sombre suspecting such a possibility, plundered the Nawab's Begums who had been confided to his protection, and with a large sum of money thus acquired marched with his troops to Rohilkhand where he took service with the Afghan chief Hafiz Rahmat Ali. Fear of the English soon induced him to quit Rohilkhand and in 1765 he marched to Dig and enlisted under the Raja of Bhurtpore. He appears to have remained in Bhurtpore till 1773 when Rajah Nawal Singh was defeated by Najaf Khan, Wazir of Shah Alam at Barsana, whereupon Sombre transferred his allegiance to the victor but the inscription shows he remained near Dig until at least the following year. Later on he was granted the rich jaghir of Sardhana by the Wazir, where he settled down and remained in the service of the Moghul until his death at Agra, 4th May 1778, when his brigade came under the command of his wife, the famous Begum Somru.

A small enclosure to the north west of Somru's garden contains six graves which are doubtless those of military adventures and of their families. These men had probably served in the brigades of Walter Reinhardt Sombre or of René de Madec who though he left the Jat service in 1772, often entered Bhurtpore while in the service of Najaf Khan and of the Rana of Gohad. Only one of these graves is inscribed.

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Germain Farcy (?) Probably an adventurer in the service of Somru. At Jharsa, near Gurgaon is the grave of Franswa (Francois) Ferey who died 4th Nov. 1816, aged 49. Gurgaon was one of the Begum Somru's cantonments and the Begum who was well known for her generosity to all who had served either herself or Sombre might quite likely have taken Germain's son into her service.

NEAR BARI.

Ambush of Madec's Campoo between Biana and Fatehpur Sikri, 29th July 1775.

In 1775 René de Madec, who possessed a large jaghir with headquarters at Bari for the upkeep of his brigade was in the field with the Imperial troops when he learned that the Rohillas, profiting by his absence had invaded his jaghir. He wished to return at once to Bari, but as the absence of his brigade would seriously weaken the Moghul army the commander in chief Najaf Khan, put difficulties in his way; but finally gave his consent to a short absence. Wishing to rejoin the Imperial Army as soon as possible, Madec neglected the usual precautions and returned by forced marches to his jaghir, in spite of heavy rains which hampered his movements and watted his powder. The Rohillas realised that under such conditions Madec's guns and muskets must be useless, and on 29th July ambushed him at the spot between Biana and Fatehpur Sikri where he intended to camp that evening. As the sepoy's broke rank and began to pitch camp, the Rohillas emerged from their hiding place and hurled themselves *en masse* on the three battalions who taken by surprise and finding their fire-arms useless, allowed themselves to be routed before Madec could reach them. Madec however rushed to the spot with his cavalry, but they were so panic-stricken by the fate of the infantry that they would not charge with their officers and abandoned their commander who wounded and dismounted escaped with difficulty, with the loss of half his white officers, more than a thousand sepoy's, his baggage, his artillery, and his elephants. Luckily for Madec the Rohillas preferred immediate pillage to pursuit, this enabled him to save a large part of his corps with whom he marched without a halt to Agra. He reached that place the following day, and set about reforming the remnant of his battalions. A week later he re-occupied Fatehpur Sikri with reorganised battalions, and from there re-entered his jaghir and cleared it of the invaders. Among the Europeans killed at the camping ground were:—

The battle of Dig, 12th Nov. 1804.

After the repulse of Holkar's army before Delhi on October 14th, Major General Fraser marched with the main army in pursuit of Holkar's infantry and artillery while Lord Lake began his famous pursuit of Holkar himself and of the Mahratta cavalry which ended with the surprise of the enemy camp at Farukhabad.

On the 12th Fraser came up with his quarry in the vicinity of Dig, a fortified town on a rocky site about 20 miles west of Muttra. To the south of Dig at a distance of 2½ miles lies the village of Khasba Au, and 1½ miles east of that is the village of Umrah. General Fraser's camp on the night of the 12th was near the village of Bheij 2½ miles east of Dig, the four places forming the angles of a rough square. Between Dig and Bheij was a jheel which extended in a south easterly direction. The enemy, with 24 battalions of infantry and a large train of artillery was encamped between the fortress and the village of Au, which protected his right. The British force consisted of H. M.'s 76th Regt., the 1st Bengal Europeans, 5½ battalions of Native Infantry, the 2nd and 3rd Regiments of Native Cavalry and 20 light guns, in all about 6,000 men. At dawn on the 13th General Fraser formed his force into two columns, infantry on the right, cavalry on the left, with the artillery on either flank and in this order marched round the marsh to the south of Umrah. In spite of high crops the British columns were soon observed and fired on, but as soon as line was formed the village of Umrah was attacked and carried. The next objective was Au which was also taken. A part of the enemy artillery was posted in a sort of cul de sac in the marsh and these guns with those of the main line, brought a convergent fire to bear on the British force as it emerged from the village of Au, causing considerable loss. General Fraser fell severely wounded and Colonel Monson thereupon took command, and rolling up his line drove the enemy from all his positions and pursued him under the guns of the fortress up to its walls. While Au was being attacked the 2nd Brigade consisting of the Bengal Europeans, and the 1st and 2nd 15th N. I. under Colonel Browne moved against the enemy's left and kept the infantry and guns in check on that side until the arrival of reinforcements, when the general rout began. The Mahrattas fought well and suffered heavy losses, while 87 guns, including some of those lost by Monson in his retreat of the preceding year (see page 77) were taken. The British casualties amounted to 651 killed and wounded. Among the killed were:—

Siege of Dig 13-24th December 1804.

By a treaty dated 9th Oct. 1803, the British Government exonerated the Maharaja Ranjit Singh of Bhurtpore from the heavy tribute which he had previously paid to the Mahrattas, and ceded him a large territory adjoining Bhurtpore which they had taken from Daulat Rao Sindia. Obligations of gratitude should therefore have been added to those of interest and good faith, but after Monson's retreat in July and August 1800, it was suspected that the Maharaja was taking part with the enemy. At the battle of Dig these suspicions were confirmed as a body of the Bhurtpore horse took part in the action, while not only were a remnant of Holkar's infantry allowed to take shelter in the fortress, but the guns fired from the walls into the troops that pursued them, and inflicted many casualties.

The reduction of Dig was therefore necessitated, and Lord Lake marching from Farukhabad on the 20th Nov. joined General Fraser before the fortress on the 11th Dec.

The town of Dig is a large one with a wall circuit of $4\frac{1}{4}$ miles. The walls are high and constructed with round bastions supported by earthen ramparts; and at the time of the siege they mounted 31 guns. Within the town is a citadel with ramparts 70 to 100 feet high and surrounded by a wet ditch.

Lord Lake after reconnoitring the place chose the south west angle of the town wall for attack, this was formed by a small enclosed work called the Shah Burj and had an exposed masonry wall which could be breached from a distance. He awaited the arrival of the siege train from Agra, then took up his position to the west of the fortress and opened his trenches on 13th Dec. The wall was soon breached but the work of reduction does not seem to have been very skilfully conducted and the enemy were in sufficient numbers outside the walls to impede progress. On the other hand the defence was ill organised and the defenders, neglecting the simplest precautions, made no attempt to repair the breach. On the night of the 23rd-24th the breach was declared practicable. Lake divided the attacking troops into three columns, the right and left were to attack and capture the enemy trenches and batteries, while the centre which consisted of the 1/2nd 8th and 15th N. I., 200 men of the 76th and European Regiments and 80 men of the 22nd Flankers, were to storm the breach. The assault was delivered at dawn and the walls were successfully carried and the town cleared after some hard fighting in the streets. Preparations were at once set on foot to take the citadel but the garrison evacuated it that night under cover of darkness. The British losses during the siege amounted to 227 killed and wounded. 1st Siege of Bhurtpore, 2nd January—24th February 1805.

Having made arrangements for the security of Dig, Lord Lake marched on Bhurtpore where a large number of Holkar's infantry had taken refuge. Bhurtpore is a strongly fortified town of about 5 miles circumference, square in form, with a mud wall and ditch of great height and depth surrounding it on all sides. On Lord Lake's advance the ditch had been flooded to a depth of 8 feet by the cutting of the Moti Jheel bund. The town contained a garrison of not less than 50,000 men and mounted a number of guns on its bastions, while Holkar's numerous cavalry was hovering on its outskirts. Lord Lake, possibly underestimating its strength by the ease with which he had captured Dig, set about the reduction of Bhurtpore with an army of 7,800 men, 6, 18 pounders, 8 5½ and 8 inch mortars and scarcely any engineering equipment at all.

The army encamped near Bhurtpore on 2nd July 1805, and a battery of 18 pounders was commenced on the 5th, 700 yards from the Anah gate on the S. W. side of the city. The mortar battery came into action two days later. On the 8th a breach in the curtain, about 350 yards north of the gate, was pronounced practicable, having been viewed through telescopes. On the 9th the enemy stockaded the breach but that night a storm was attempted.

The storming party moved off about 7 o'clock in three columns. Lt.-Col. Ryan with 150 of the Bengal European Regt. and a Battalion of Native Infantry, had orders to attempt a gateway (Khumbhir gate ?) on the left of the batteries. Major Hawker with two companies of H. M. 75th Regt. and a Battalion of Native Infantry were to carry the advanced guns of the enemy on the right. Both columns were to make their way if possible into the town with the fugitives, but if that should prove impracticable they were ordered to return and support the Centre Column in its endeavour to get in by the breach. The Centre Column consisted of companies of H. M. 75th and 76th Regts. led by the two flank companies of the 22nd, under Col. Maitland. No approaches of any sort had been made, and owing to the irregular nature of the ground over which they advanced, as much as by the heavy fire which greeted them, the Centre Column was thrown into confusion. The Column reached the ditch but found that it was impassable as the Beldars entrusted with the fascines which were intended to fill it would not face the fire and fled with their loads, and the troops therefore retreated to the batteries. About 150 men headed by their officers succeeded in crossing the ditch and ascended to within a few feet of the top of the breach while others stood on a small space below the rampart. Col. Maitland while endeavouring to get his men forward was mortally wounded. Finding themselves unsupported the men on the breach were forced to retire. The Right Column had reached its objective, spiked three guns and then returned to support the centre, the Left Column had been stopped by the inundations. The troops suffered most heavily during their retreat from the ditch as they were completely exposed to the gunfire of the enemy, they lost in all 458 killed and wounded, of which 200 were Europeans. By the 16th a second breach had been made about 150 yards south of the Anah Gate. From the 17th the enemy had been busy stockading the breach but on the 20th Lord Lake, having been reinforced by a Bombay Division, decided to attempt a storm on the following day. Three sowars were sent forward as if eager to desert in order to examine the ditch, when they came back they reported the width of the ditch below the breach as 28 feet and a bridge was made to this measurement. The assault was to be made by two columns, Col. Macrae with 150 men of the 76th, 50 men of the 22nd, part of the 75th and the Bengal Europeans was to storm the breach, while Col. Simpson's column was to attack the Anah Gate. Col. Macrae headed the advance with the Engineers and Pioneers carrying the bridge, but when they reached the ditch the bridge was found to be 12 feet too short, and though Lt. Morris with a few of the storming party swam across and actually reached the rampart, it was impossible to get the main body across and a retreat was ordered and carried out in some confusion, the men being mown down on the counterscarp. This attempt cost the British 530 casualties. Among the killed were :—

On the same day the British cavalry was engaged in preventing the combined cavalry of Holka and Amir Khan from interrupting the attack.

On the 6th Feb. the camp was shifted, partly for sanitary reasons, partly because it was decided to make a breach in a new place. The new breach was made to the south of the Anah Gate on the 11th, but no trenches had as yet been made to conduct the stormers from the batteries 450 yards away, and when they were ready on the 20th the breach had been strongly stockaded.

Three columns were formed for the assault. The Right Column consisting of 300 men of the 65th Regt. the 1st Bn. Bombay Grenadiers and the 1/3rd Bo. N. I. were to attack the Bhimnaraïn Gate about a mile to the right of the breach. The Centre Column under Capt. Grant formed by 200 men of the 86th Regt. and the 1/8th was to drive the enemy from the glacis to the right of the breach where they held a small parallel. The Main or Left Column consisting of 2 companies of the 22nd Regt. the 75th, 76th Regts. the Bengal Europeans, the 1/2nd, 2/12th and 2/15th N. I. and the Bombay Grenadiers were to attack the breach. The column was headed by the Europeans, but when at dawn they reached the head of the approach trench the enemy sallied and counter-attacked vigorously. Taken at a disadvantage in the narrow trench, the storming party was driven back till the flankers of the 22nd Regt. were able to repulse the enemy. When the order for the storm was finally given at about 3 p. m. an idea had been spread that the enemy had mined the advance trench which they had held for some hours, and of all the white regiments detailed for the assault only the companies of the 22nd responded to the advance, the others refusing to move in spite of the gallant example of the 12th N. I., which led by Col. Don planted its colours on a tower to the right of the breach. The Centre Column under Capt. Grant alone performed its task, taking the glacis and 11 enemy guns. The right column failed even to reach its objective.

Next day Lord Lake addressed the troops on parade and offering them the opportunity to wipe out the dis-

grace of the previous day, called for volunteers. Every man stepped forward— Lt. Templeton of the 86th offered to lead the forlorn hope, for which 200 men were selected, and a fresh storming party was organised for that afternoon. Only one column was to make the final assault. This consisted of H. M. 65th, 76th and 86th Regts., the Plank Companies of H. M. 22nd Regt., the 1st and 15th N. I. and the Bombay Grenadiers, the whole headed by the European troops and commanded by Colonel Monson. In passing the General the column greeted him with cheers, then they moved regularly and boldly against bastion No. 4. This bastion was extremely steep, but the soldiers driving their bayonets into the mud attempted to climb by them, others mounted by the loopholes. All the time the enemy crowded on the bastions and walls kept up a sweeping and destructive fire, hurling down pieces of timber, sacks of cotton dipped in oil and pots filled with explosives. Yet some of the stormers actually reached the summit. Lt. Templeton was killed as he planted the colours on top of the breach and Major Menzies fell beside him. For two hours the troops, with an astonishing degree of courage, endeavoured to achieve the impossible, then the orders were given to retreat and they retired to the batteries under a terrific fire. MADHONI HILLS.

261. Near the Madhoni Hills are the remains of a number of graves which are said to be connected with the 1st siege of Bhurtpore, no inscriptions remain. According to Bhurtpore legend the tomb of Anta Gugur was built here. Who Anta Gugur was it is impossible to ascertain, but all the songs and legends concerning him agree that he was a British officer. His portrait appears on the ceiling of a cupola of Buldeo Singh's chhattri at Gobar-dhan (near Dig), where he is represented in the midst of the British Army while Lake is seated at a table talking to the Bhurtpore Vakil. The story is that Anta Gugur came to Bhurtpore to support Lord Lake, and that on meeting the Commander-in-Chief he expressed surprise that the latter should have found the fortress so difficult to capture. "I will take this place in an hour" said Anta Gugur but he had scarcely spoken when a cannon ball from the fort carried off his head. During the 2nd siege Lord Combermere's servant Anthony Gregory was in attendance one evening on his master when he was killed by a cannon ball. Possibly a name taken from one siege may have been added to exploits taken from another.

2nd Siege of Bhurtpore 10th December 1825—19th January 1826.

In spite of Lord Lake's failure before Bhurtpore in 1805 his efforts had led to a peace dictated by himself. By this treaty the Maharaja Ranjit Singh agreed to recognise the full suzerainty of the British, and gave one of his sons as hostage to the Government. Ranjit Singh died leaving four sons, Rumbhir Singh, Buldeo Singh, Lachman Singh and Pritli Singh. He was succeeded by Rumbhir Singh who died without issue, and was followed by Buldeo Singh. Buldeo died leaving a five year old son Bulwant Singh who succeeded his father in 1824 and who, during his parent's lifetime, had been presented with a khilat of succession by the Sovereign Power. Shortly after his succession, Durjan Singh, son of the third brother Lachman usurped the gaddi and assumed the rank and titles of Maharaja. The interference of the British Government was thus necessitated for the protection of the lawful and recognised Prince. A force of 20,000 men was collected under Lord Combermere and arrived before Bhurtpore on 10th Dec. 1826.

On the approach of the British army an attempt was made to cut the Moti Jheel bund and flood the fort ditch as in the previous siege, but the British anticipating the attempt had sent an advance party which arrived in time to prevent any serious damage being done to the bund. Disappointed in his failure on the Moti Jheel bund, Durjan Singh offered to treat, but as he would not make an unconditional surrender, preparations for the siege continued. On Dec. 14th two heavy batteries opened fire from the vicinity of Gopalganj in the N. E. portion of the city. Other batteries were brought into action in quick succession and the city was subjected to an intensive bombardment. Gunfire however could make no impression on the vast mud walls and mining was commenced on Jan. 6th. The enemy carried on a stubborn defence, but in the following week three mines were driven under the N. E. bastions and were sprung on the 14th and 16th with so much success that with the aid of another day's battering practicable breaches were effected. On the 18th a mine was completed under the Natwali Burj and filled with an immense quantity of powder and the following day was fixed for the storm.

The assaulting columns were detailed as follows. The Right Column intended for the assault of the Jungianah breach included 2 coys. of the European Regt., the 58th N. I. and a 100 Gurkhas and was under the command of Col. Delamain. The main column for the assault of the Cavalier breach consisted of troops from the 1st Division under Major General Reynell. It was divided into two columns. Brigadier Paton with 4 coys. H. M. 14th Foot, 5 coys. 41st N. I. and the 6th Regt. N. I. and Brigadier M'Combe with 4 coys. H. M. 14th Foot, and the 23rd and 60th N. I. These columns were to ascend the breach together and on reaching the ramparts to clear the walls, Paton to the left and M'Combe to the right. Brigadier Whitehead with 2 coys. H. M. 14th Foot, and the 18th and 32nd N. I. were to remain in reserve at the head of the trenches.

An intermediate column consisting of 2 coys. Bengal Europeans, the Grenadier coy. of the 35th N. I., the light coy. of the 37th N. I. and 100 Gurkhas under Lt.-Col. Wilson, were to escalate a re-entering angle between the two main breaches.

The left or 2nd Main Column was composed of troops of the 2nd Div. under Major-General Nicholls. It was led by Brigadier Edwards with H. M. 59th Foot, the 18th, 21st and 31st N. I. The reserve under Brigadier Adams and consisting of the 36th and 37th N. I. was to assault the Agra Gate. The explosion of the large mine was the signal for the general assault. At 8-30 on the morning of the 18th this took place with tremendous effect, blowing away the whole of the N. E. salient angle and inflicting heavy casualties on the enemy. Owing to some defect in its construction it also caused many casualties to the Main Column, M'Combe being wounded and several men of the 14th killed. There was a momentary hesitation, but the word being given to advance the column went steadily forward and gained the ramparts. At the same moment the Right Column under Lt.-Col. Delamain surmounted the Jungianah breach and gained the walls, where they inflicted heavy loss on the enemy and then, moving to the left, joined hands with the right column of the main assault. The left column of the main assault moved along to assist the escalading party at the re-entrant, and joining them, took bastion

after bastion till they met the 59th Foot and the possession of the walls was complete. The left Column on reaching the summit of the breach encountered a furious resistance. Here the enemy had turned their guns down the ramparts and Brigadier Edwards fell with many of his men. There was a check, then cheered by their officers the men dashed on and clearing the guns with great slaughter never stopped till they fell in with the head of the 14th Foot. Brigadier Adams' advance had met with complete success and he cleared the streets up to the walls of the citadel. At 4 o'clock that afternoon a white flag was flown from the citadel and the whole of Bhurtpore was in the hands of the British. Outside the town the cavalry had cut off numbers of the cseaping enemy among whom was Durjan Singh.

On the morning of the 20th Bulwant Singh was formally re-installed as Maharaja by Lord Combermere and Sir Charles Metcalfe.

271. Near the Agency Surgeon's Office are a number of ruined graves from all of which the inscriptions have been removed. They are probably the graves of soldiers who fell in the 2nd siege as they are not far from the British lines in that date.

BURRA UEIR.

272. Near the village of Burra Ueir are the remains of a large monument which was at one time surmounted by an obelisk and inscribed on at least two sides. This tomb was desecrated and dismantled by Bunjaras about twenty years ago as the result of a legend that it contained the bones of Anta Gugur and a large treasure. It probably contained the bodies of officers or men who fell in the second siege.

MADARPUR.

273. A Christian tomb about 9 feet square lies between the villages of Madarpur and Barakhur, this tomb is also pointed out as the last resting place of Anta Gugur. It is not far from the spot where Lord Combermere camped in 1826.

Rising of Contingent Troops at Kotah, 15th October 1857.

On the arrival of the British troops at Neemuch the Kotah, Bundi, and Jhalawar levies who had been holding that place, returned to their respective headquarters. At the special request of the Maharao who was apprehensive of the fidelity of his troops, Major Burton did not return to Kotah till 12th October when it was believed that the danger of a rising had blown over. He was then accompanied by his two sons, and an escort of 25 Sikhs in the service of the Kotah Durbar, who were sent back to Deoli and their place taken by a guard of Kotah troops. These were stationed under a tree in front of the Residency. A salute was fired that night by the Maharao in honour of the fall of Delhi. The next day the Maharao paid the usual visit of ceremony to the P. A. After the public meeting a private conversation was held at which no one was present but the Vakil Nand Kishore who was subsequently blown from a gun by the Kotah rebels. The Maharao afterwards stated that the P. A., urged him to punish some of his principal officers who were known to be disaffected, and that probably the Vakil communicated this to the Minister Ratan Lal who used the information to excite the troops.

At 11 A. M. on the 15th the Residency was suddenly surrounded by a large body of troops and rabble from the town, the servants escaped into the ravines close to the house leaving Major Burton and his sons alone, while the guard stood aside and offered no resistance to the rebels. After murdering Sub-Assistant Salder, who was lying ill in bed, and a native Christian doctor who lived in the compound, the mutineers opened fire on the Residency with roundshot. They then surrounded the house, but being fired on from within and suffering several casualties retired after setting fire to the house. Major Burton and his sons took refuge in a room at the top of the house. The rebels thinking them dead again approached the house and were again fired on and forced to retire, they then brought up their guns and training them on the room in which the defenders had taken refuge knocked down part of the wall. The defence continued however till 4 o'clock when the Burton's ammunition gave out. The rebels realising that they were now powerless rushed the room. Arthur who was standing at the door defended it with his sword but was overwhelmed and the three men were soon cut down. Major Burton's head was cut off and hoisted on a standard, and afterwards fired from a gun, the bodies being thrown out on the plain. They were subsequently buried by the order of the Maharao.

The fall of Kotah 30th March 1858.

It was not until March 1858 that a sufficient force could be collected at Nazirabad to punish the Kotah rebels. This force with a fighting strength of 5,500 men was placed under the command of Major General Roberts who arrived opposite Kotah with his 1st Brigade under Brigadier Macan on 22nd March. A few hours later they were joined by Brigadier Park's Brigade and the siege train. They encamped to the westward of the town on the left bank of the Chambal. Two batteries were erected at Sakhtpura and one at Kinari, and these opened on the morning of the 24th.

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The fall of Kotah—contd.

Kotah City is defended by an encircling wall of great height and strength and is divided within by two transverse walls. The palace of the Maharao stands in the southwestern section of the city and had remained throughout the year in his hands, while the rebels held the central and northern sections. On the 26th the Maharao was reinforced in his section of the city by British troops when the rebels, of whom there were about 6,000 in Kotah fiercely assaulted his position on two successive mornings. During the days that followed the batteries were advanced nearer the walls and several magazines were exploded in the rebel quarter of the city, with some effect on their spirits. On the 29th the General decided that the city was ready for assault and the following morning the remaining British troops crossed the river at dawn, assembled in the Maharao's quarter and entered the rebel section by the Kitanpal gate in the first of the transverse walls. The first column under Brigadier Parke turned to the right and cleared the Pattardar Burj, and the Zorawan Burj and Surajpal gate on the outer wall. This manoeuvre which was carried out with rapidity, turned the enemy's flank and hemmed him on the Chambal on the opposite side of which was the British camp. The 2nd column followed the first as far as the Surajpal and then seeing that the Brigadier was in firm possession turned left and seized first the Rampura gate in the second transverse and then the Lalpura gate in the outer wall. Many of the enemy had fled through the Surajpal gate before Park's advance, the rest hemmed in in the city threw themselves over the wall, or stood to a desperate resistance in the houses. Between 400 and 500 rebels were killed and numbers of prisoners were taken. Of the British force 14 were killed and 46 wounded, among the latter Lieutenant C. Hancock Bombay Engineers died of wounds.

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Battle of Mangrol 1st Oct, 1821.

Since the death of Goman Singh in 1771 Zalim Singh Jhala had acted as Regent of Kotah on behalf of the Maharao Umed Singh, and through 34 troubled years had not only kept the State intact but had greatly augmented its power and influence. In 1817 when the Marquess of Hastings collected forces to exterminate the Pindaris, the Rajput States were asked to join the alliance. Zalim Singh was the first to send an envoy to the Governor General, and when hostilities actually began the Regent directed his forces so efficiently that the Kotah territories were closed to the Pindaris, while all the resources of the State were open to the British armies moving in the vicinity. The treaty concluded in Delhi in 1817 by the envoys of Zalim Singh was signed by the Maharao but the Regent's seal was also appended. In March 1818 two supplemental articles were agreed to in Delhi and transmitted direct to the Regent, one of these guaranteed the real administration to his sons and successors in perpetuity. This political ineptitude committed the British Government to the support of the nominal ruler in one agreement and of the real ruler in another, but during the lifetime of Umed Singh the evils of the position were not apparent. On the accession of Kishore Singh the position changed. Kishore Singh like his father was an indolent man who would have been content to let matters stand but he fell under the influence of Gordhan Singh the younger son of the Regent. Gordhan Singh was jealous of his elder brother, the Regent Apparent, and to gain his ends was prepared even to ruin his father and his family. Bloodshed soon became inevitable in spite of a temporary re-conciliation in 1820, when Gordhan Singh was banished. He continued however to exert his influence from outside the State and in 1821 Kishore Singh returning from a pilgrimage with a following of 3,000 men called on all his loyal subjects to join him. This was a summons no Rajput could ignore and the Haras flocked to his standard and even some of the Regent's own troops deserted. Both sides now called on the British Government for assistance, which, after making every effort to secure a second conciliation, decided to support the substance of power and sent troops to the Regent.

At daybreak on the 1st October 1821 the opposing forces took up their positions near Mangrol. The Regent's army consisted of 8 battalions with 14 guns and 14 paegas of cavalry. Of these 5 battalions 14 pieces and 10 squadrons composed the advance, while the rest under the old Regent himself formed the reserve about 500 yards to the rear. The British troops consisting of 2 battalions of infantry and 6 squadrons of cavalry with a Horse Artillery Battery formed on the right of the Regent's line. The Maharao's camp stood on some rising ground a little behind a stream. The Prince with a band of 500 Hara horsemen held the right of the line, the Raj Pultan the left, while the centre was filled with a tumultuous rabble.

While the opposing forces were taking up their positions the P. A., James Todd, taking advantage of the pause, rode out between them and made a last appeal to the Maharao not to risk the lives of himself and his men in such an unequal contest, but the Hara refused to accept the honourable terms held out to him and Todd gave the signal for the action to commence. There was a discharge of cannon and firearms from the Regent's whole line and from the Horse Artillery. The Haras returned the fire with a desperate charge, forcing their way up to the muzzles of the guns and would have turned the Regent's flank but for the advance of the British cavalry. Checked by this intervention the Haras retreated across the stream, and the Maharao, surrounded by a mass of 400 of his clan halted on the rising ground half a mile to the rear, while his infantry broke and fled in all directions. The British troops crossed the stream, and while the infantry made a move to cut off the retreat to the south, 2 squadrons of the 4th L. C. were ordered to charge the Maharao. Each troop was led by a British officer but at the moment of impact the men checked and left their officers unsupported, Lieutenants Reade and Clerk were killed and Major Ridge was seriously wounded and only saved by his orderly. The Maharao, satisfied with repelling the charge, moved his men slowly away until the Horse Artillery hastened their flight with a charge of grape.

After this action the Regent was instructed to grant a complete amnesty to all who had taken the field against him and peace was restored. On 31st December the Maharao returned, and was met by both Agent and Regent and once more placed on the gaddi. Certain departments were placed in his hands though the real power remained with the Regent, and a British Representative was left in Kotah to see that both parties observed the agreement.

Monson's Retreat 8th July—31st Aug. 1804.

In May 1804 Holkar, harassed by a retreat through country which he himself had previously devastated, crossed the Chambal. Lord Lake believed that there was now no danger of his return northwards till the close of the rains, and as his army was suffering from heat and fatigue he returned to Agra on May 17th, and sent his cavalry to cantonments in Cawnpore and his infantry to quarters in various scattered cantonments. Monson who was still in the field near Tonk, was instructed to watch Holkar's movements, and Lake regarded his presence on the border as the bolt in the shut door of Malwa.

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Monson's Retreat—contd.

At the end of May Monson moved southwards. On July 2nd he captured the fort of Hinglasgarh, 40 miles south of Kotah. His camp was then at Sonara. Holkar was at Rampura, west of the Chambal. Monson moved on to Bhanpura where, on July 8th he heard that Holkar instead of continuing southward, had recrossed the Chambal with a view to cutting in behind Monson. This placed Monson in a critical position. He had about 3,000 infantry with 10 or 12 guns, and a body of irregular horse and 6 "gallopers" under Lucan. Holkar was now facing him with a large force of horse, foot and artillery. At first Monson moved forward to attack the Mahrattas, but his nerve failed him and to the surprise of both officers and men he fell back on the Mokandara pass. At Sonara he detached Lucan with the irregulars to cover his retreat. These fought heroically against 10,000 of Holkar's army and having repulsed all charges, had themselves become the aggressors when Lucan was killed by a traitor in his own paega. Then for want of a leader they broke and fled. The sacrifice of Lucan and his irregulars had enabled Monson to reach the Mokandara pass in safety. This is a long winding defile through a ridge 30 miles south of Kotah. It is a position of great strength which five companies could have held against an army but Monson "had no confidence in his men". On the 10th Holkar made several ineffectual attacks on this pass with his cavalry and soon after these repulses was joined by his infantry and artillery. Monson fearing to be cut off from Kotah by the Ghatoli, a similar pass on his right, continued his retreat. He was now in great straits for food as the villages through which he passed had been fired to prevent him getting supplies. He reached Kotah on the 12th but the Maharao refused either to admit him or to give him supplies. To add to his difficulties the rains which had set in with violence on the 10th, now became incessant, and it took him 24 hours to cover the 7 miles to the Gamaeh Ghat where he crossed the Chambal, after being delayed another day by the flood. On the 17th the force reached the Mej, where floods delayed his passage till the 26th. On the 24th he was attacked by a body of Holkar's cavalry, but they were beaten off. On the 26th July Monson reached Rampura in Tonk, having lost all his guns and equipment at the Mej. Rampura was held by a small force under Captain Hutchinson of the Bongal Artillery; and here orders reached Monson that he was not to retreat further than Kotah, now 45 miles in his rear, but he was no longer in a position to keep the field and he decided to retreat to Biana where he would have found a strong position and could have received help from Agra. Twenty miles from Rampura his road crossed the Banas, now a formidable river, and though Monson had remained in Rampura for three weeks he had made no preparations for the crossing. On August 14th he was reinforced by the 2/9th and 1/14th B. N. I. with 6 guns. He left the 2/8th and 4 companies of the 2/21st in Rampura and with the remainder of his force which now consisted of the 2/2nd, 1/9th, 1/12th, 2/12th, 1/14th and 6 companies of the 21st N. I. and 2 howitzers, marched on 21st August to Khushalgarh. The next day he was held up by the Banas. Holkar now came up in force with the obvious intention of attacking, the river was impassable but by a lucky find of three boats the treasure and a guard of 6 companies was put across. On the 24th the river was fordable and the enemy began to cross to the right and left while Monson was crossing in the centre. He therefore decided to abandon his howitzers and left Major Sinclair with 5 companies of the 2/2nd to cover his retreat from the river. This little force was at once heavily engaged and their stand is the one brilliant spot in this sombre picture. They fought till all their ammunition was exhausted, and then with bayonets fixed, charged the Mahrattas who fled before them abandoning their guns. Such was the awe with which they inspired the enemy, that it was only after repeated threats and encouragements from Holkar himself, that volunteers from his cavalry could be induced to charge and cut down this heroic remnant. The 2/2nd having enabled Monson to clear the river, he continued his retreat in a hollow square, and though on leaving Biana all order was lost, the memory of the stand on the Banas prevented the Mahrattas from making any serious attack on the survivors who were able to straggle in to Agra on the 31st August. In this retreat 22 European Officers were killed and a large number of sepoy, while the prisoners were brutally mutilated or killed by Holkar. Among the killed were:—

Revolt of the Cavalry of the United Malwa Contingent, 7th June 1857.

The troops at Neemuch mutinied on June 3rd and after a few hours spent in burning and looting the cantonment, marched away towards Agra. Next day the station was reconquered by Captain Lloyd, Political Agent of Mowar with 17 Sadri troopers; and the cavalry of the United Malwa Contingent under Lts. Brodie and Hunt was ordered from Mehidpur to support him. The men marched in obedience to orders till they reached Mulhargarh, where they rose, and after murdering their officers made off to join the Neemuch mutineers. The bodies of the two officers were buried by the civil authorities of Jaora State but were subsequently re-interred in this cemetery.

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The Outbreak at Indore 1st July 1857.

Soon after the news of the mutinies at Meerut and Delhi reached Central India, signs of unrest became apparent in Indore, and by May 20th 150 cavalry, 3 companies of infantry and 2 guns of the Bhopal Contingent, 200 men of the Malwa Contingent, and 270 men of the Malwa Bhil Corps were concentrated round the Residency. To these were added 3 companies of infantry and 3 guns and some troopers of Holkar's army, and the whole force was placed under the command of Captain Travers. Towards the end of June anxiety was felt regarding the attitude of Holkar's troops; their guns which had been placed to command the entrance to the city, were shifted at night, and trained to command the Residency stables where the Bhopal sowars were quartered. The Superintending Engineer therefore asked that these guns should be brought into the Residency grounds and that the place should be entrenched, but the Resident, Col. Durand, refused both requests. At 8 o'clock on July 1st some State sowars accompanied by a city rabble streamed up to the Residency Bazar calling on their comrades to rise. The response was instantaneous, the guns trained on the stables opened with grape and the attack on the Residency began. Captain Travers called out the cavalry and formed them up for a charge, but the men were unwilling, and when he gave the order to gallop and himself charged the guns, he was only followed by five Sikh sowars. This tiny party captured the guns but was unsupported and forced to retire under a heavy fire. The two guns of the Bhopal Contingent were then brought into action against the rebels, 14 gunners remaining loyal and serving the guns well until Captain Cobbe and their European Sergeant were injured. Meanwhile Captain Magniac tried to bring up the infantry of the Bhopal and Malwa Contingents, but with twelve exceptions these went over to the enemy. The Bhils were loyal but too panic stricken to be relied on in the open, so they were placed in the upper story of the main building. At the first attack Durand had sent to Mhow asking for help, but no assistance could be expected for some hours, the rebels were being rapidly reinforced and the position of the Europeans in the Residency was now precarious. The Bhopal Cavalry, who had taken refuge to the east of the house, saw that the rebel infantry was creeping round to outflank them, and sent word to Durand that if he would retreat at once they would see him and his party to safety. Nothing could be gained by a further resistance, the Bhopal guns were unlimbered and brought round the house, the women, the children and the wounded were placed on the waggons, and at 10 o'clock, with the Sikh sowars leading and the Bhil Corps bringing up the rear, the whole party set out for Schore.

As soon as the Indore Residency had been abandoned, the rebel sowars galloped past from the bazar and entering the area inhabited by the European and Eurasian clerks, began to hunt down these unfortunates. Twenty-eight men, women and children were killed, the greater part in or near the jail where they attempted to take refuge, as the bloodstained walls bore witness when the Malwa Field Force marched into the station on the 14th December. Twenty-two bodies were found close by, in the well in front of the Telegraph Office, and these were buried in the cemetery. The bodies of Mrs. Beauvais, of Mrs. Crawley and her child were found in a field some distance off and were conveyed to Mhow for burial (see page 113) that of Mr. J. E. Martin of the Agra Bank, who died of exhaustion while attempting to escape was never recovered, and two others were not identified. No arrangements appear to have been made either before or during the attack to collect the Europeans in the Residency, although a warning of its imminence was received by Durand on the evening of the 30th, and the Residency itself was not completely surrounded until its evacuation. Some wounded Europeans however were rescued and sheltered by Holkar and were subsequently sent to Mhow with the remains of the treasury.

The Mutiny at Mhow, 1st July 1857.

The troops in Mhow, consisting of the 23rd B. N. I. and the 1st Light Cavalry, had, from the first news of the outbreaks in the north, shown a disposition to mutiny; but the presence of a European battery, and the precautions taken by their commander Captain Hungerford, kept them steady throughout May and June.

On the 1st July firing was heard from the direction of Indore, and soon after a note was received from the Resident asking for help. The battery was turned out, but owing to the defection of the native drivers there was some delay in getting it away. At Rao, halfway between Mhow and Indore, Hungerford received a note from Captain Travers stating that the officers and ladies of the Residency were retreating on Simrole, and the sowar informed him that the idea of retiring to Mhow had been abandoned as it was believed that it might be attacked by Holkar. The battery turned about and galloped back to Mhow, as Hungerford feared that the sepoys might rise in his absence. On his arrival all was still quiet and he asked permission to take the battery into the fort, but the Commandant, Colonel Platt, who had great confidence in his men, hesitated, and only gave permission after repeated representations by the battery commander. In the meantime the families of the officers and men had been assembled in the fort. At nightfall the troops broke into open mutiny. Co'nel Platt who had retained his belief in his men till the first shots were fired, galloped to the fort, ordered out the battery, and then rode with his Adjutant, Captain Fagan, straight to the quarter guard of his own regiment, where they were both instantly shot. Major Harris of the 1st Light Cavalry was at the same time cut down by his own men. The remaining officers escaped to the fort though some who were on foot were chased by mounted sowars up to the glacis and were pulled up over the walls of one of the bastions.

Hungerford, after disarming the men at the fort gate, took his battery to the parade ground which, though lit up by the burning bungalows, appeared to be deserted. He was fired on however and unlimbering he opened on the lines with grape. At the first shot the cavalry in regular files left their lines at a hard trot and took the road to Indore, while the infantry fled in disorder. In the weeks that followed the fort defences were strengthened and Mhow remained throughout the Mutiny, the only station in Central India which was never abandoned.

Jam, was formerly of some importance as it commanded the pass of that name on the main road between Mandleshwar and Indore, it was ceded to the British in 1818, and for some years was guarded by a detachment from Mhow. It was finally restored to Holkar. The graves appear to belong to the period of occupation.

Owing to a quarrel between Marigny and Raymond, then C. in C. of the Nizam's Army; and also to the declaration of war between England and France which, owing to the French influence with the Nizam put a stop to his hopes of advancement in Haiderabad, Tone resigned. He set out for Calcutta but was attacked by dacoits in the jungles of Orissa, his horse and baggage was stolen and he himself wounded in the foot. In this condition he completed the remaining 200 miles of his journey. In 1796 Tone accompanied the Resident, Major Palmer to Poona, carrying letters of recommendation to the Peshwa's Court; and was appointed to Boyds Corps. In 1798 he was selected by the Peshwa's brother Amrit Rao to command

			a brigade, all the officers of which were to be British, but this scheme was ultimately abandoned. Commanded 200 sepoy under Lakwa Dada and the Bhaïs in the defence of Seondha 1801, but was compelled to surrender to Perron who subsequently offered him service in his own army. This offer was refused but Tone was allowed to return to Maheshwar with a grant of Rs. 10,000. Was shot through the head in a skirmish at Choli, near Maheshwar in 1802 while in the service of Holkar. Possessed some literary ability, wrote verse and also a pamphlet entitled "Some institutions of the Mahratta People" which is still quoted by historians. <i>Ref. Compton.</i>
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Nearer the town are 9 uninscribed graves which appear to be very old. Maheshwar commands an important ford of the Nerbudda and during the Mahratta and Pindari War this was guarded by a detachment of British troops; possibly the graves date from this time.

MANDLESHWAR, NIMAR DIST.

Mandleshwar also dominates one of the Nerbudda fords. In 1819 it became the headquarters of the administered District of Nimar, but in 1864 was restored to Holkar State. On a small artificial mound overlooking the river are three old European graves from which the inscriptions have been removed, and one surrounded by a wall built in the Mahomedan fashion. A fifth but much newer tomb retains its inscription.

MEHIDPUR.

The Battle of Mehidpur, 21st Dec. 1817.

At the outbreak of the Third Mahratta War the 1st and 3rd Divisions of the Army of the Deccan held the fords of the Nerbudda, then as the net began to tighten round the Pindaris the 1st Division, under Lt. General Sir Thomas Hislop marched on the Sindh river, and the 3rd under Brigadier Sir John Malcolm moved up on the right. On 12th Sept. 1817 the two divisions met at Ujjain, and two days later marched together on Mehidpur, where Holkar's army was lying. On the 15th, Malcolm, as Political Officer, received Holkar's Vakil but the negotiations met with no success as the Mahratta councils were divided, a strong party being in conflict with the Regent Tulsi Bai who favoured peace with the British. On the 20th her opponents succeeded in separating her from the 11 year old Holkar, and she was immediately seized by Gafur Khan and beheaded on the river bank in front of the Mahratta camp. The Vakil was then recalled. The British continued their advance along the Sipna and reaching an eminence in sight of Mehidpur on the morning of the 21st, saw Holkar's army drawn up in a strong position beyond the river. The enemy infantry, 5,000 strong, stretched from Mehidpur on the left to the river, their front was covered by nearly a 100 guns in line, while behind a mass of 30,000 horse formed a second line.

Sir John Malcolm went forward to reconnoitre while Sir Thomas Hislop made dispositions for the attack. It was seen that the river was traversible by two fords, and the cavalry, horse artillery and light infantry crossed and cleared the opposite bank of the enemy, but this manoeuvre brought them under heavy fire from the enemy batteries. Shortly before midday the two brigades of the line followed the skirmishers across the river, an extraordinary movement of countermarch being carried out during the passage in order to advance the right front, a manoeuvre which exposed the brigade to considerable loss. Both brigades then formed up on a strip of sand on the far bank and the order was given for a direct frontal attack. Launched against the batteries the advancing line was received with a discharge of chain, grape and round shot which for a moment caused it to hesitate, but the line steadied and the charge was pushed home among the guns where the enemy gunners gallantly awaited the oncoming bayonets and were killed almost to a man. Behind the batteries the Mahratta Infantry made a stand but were soon swept away by the impetus of the advance. Seeing the destruction of the guns and infantry Holkar's cavalry incontinently fled, the pursuit was immediately taken up by the British squadrons and numbers of the enemy were killed in their flight.

The whole action only lasted for three hours and soon after midday the huge Mahratta host had melted away leaving behind them 76 guns, 3,000 dead and their camp in the hands of the British. Holkar's resistance was completely broken, and a few days later he sued for peace. On Jan. 6th 1818 a treaty was signed at Mandesore.

The attack at Mehidpur was made in a manner which did more credit to the courage than to the skill of the leaders and the British casualties were heavy. Out of 5,500 men engaged, 174 were killed and 621 wounded of whom 200 subsequently died for want of proper medical attention. Among the killed were —

Mutiny at Mehidpur, 8th November 1857.

Signs of unrest had been apparent in the Cantonment during the hot weather and rains of 1857, but the infantry of the United Malwa Contingent had made no attempt to follow the example of the cavalry who had killed their officers on the Neemuch road on 7th June and an attack from outside was the greater danger. At dawn on November 8th this fear was realised when a body of Wilayatis and Rohillas about 4,500 strong attacked the station. Major Timmins, Commandant of the Contingent had received news of the approach of the rebels and endeavoured to hold the Cantonment with his guns and about 250 men who remained loyal. From 7 A. M. till 3 P. M. the little band held the Wilayatis off, but when four out of the seven Europeans were dead and the gunfire slackened, the rebels charged the guns. The sepoy broke and dispersed before the Wilayatis reached them, many going over to the enemy but a handful of faithful men followed Major Timmins and Lt. Dysart in their flight, and a few more helped Sergt. Major Bradshaw to escape. Mrs. Timmins who had endeavoured to join her husband when she saw the sepoy waver, had her horse shot under her, but was saved by her dhirzi who hid her in his hut until the arrival of the Malwa Field Force which her husband had succeeded in reaching. The rebels burned the Cantonment, including the hospital which was full of sick and wounded men, and then marched away towards Mandesore, taking the guns of the contingent with them :—

BOURBON CEMETERY, BHOPAL CITY.

There is an old cemetery belonging to the Bourbon family not far from Bhopal station. It contains many tombs including those of Madame Dulhan and of Sebastian Bourbon. All have now fallen into decay and no inscriptions remain.

The Bourbons of Bhopal.

Much of the early history of the Bourbon family of Bhopal is conjectural, but their descent from the Royal House of France is generally accepted. Jean Phillippe Bourbon, a relative of Henry IV of France, killed an important connection of both in a duel, and was forced to leave the country. He travelled East and landing in India in 1560, went to the court of the Emperor Akbar where he claimed the protection of the Moghal in return for his services. The Emperor appears to have treated Jean Phillippe with distinction, bestowed upon him a jagir, and after his marriage with Juliana (tomb in Agra Catholic Church) an Armenian lady who acted as doctor to the ladies of Akbar's household, made him Governor of the Imperial Harem. This office became hereditary and was held by successive members of the Bourbon family until 1737 when Nadir Shah sacked Delhi. The incumbent at this date was Francis, who with his wife and family escaped the massacre in Delhi and took refuge in Shergarh, a fort situated in the Bourbon jagir. Here Francis was befriended by the Raja of Narwar who took him into his service, and the family regained much of its former prosperity. His son Francis II had married in 1732, a Miss De Silva, by whom he had three sons Pedro, Savelle and Salvador (1736). In 1778 the then Raja of Narwar became jealous of his jagirdar and determined to seize his property; he therefore murdered all the members of the Bourbon family in Narwar and marched against Francis at Shergarh. Francis and his son Salvador raised a force but were defeated and killed. Some twenty years before Salvador had married Anthonia de Brevette and by her had a son also named Salvador, this son was either in Gwalior at the time of the attack, or escaped there with the younger members of the family and took refuge with the Christian community of that place. Two years later when Gwalior was taken by the British, the younger Salvador who was in financial straits appealed to Lt.-Col. Jacob Camac for help. Camac gave him a sum of money to relieve his immediate necessities, and two villages for the support of his wife, nee Thorne or Thome, and of their children. A few years later he travelled to Bhopal with his cousin Pedro and both took service with the Begum Mamola. By loyal service Salvador gained a strong position in Bhopal and, after a brief eclipse following on the murder of his patron, was given a command in the army by the Minister and virtual ruler of Bhopal, Wazir Mahomed Khan. Salvador ably seconded the Minister in his struggles against the Mahrattas, and in 1812 when Scindia and the Bhousla combined to attack Bhopal City, so distinguished himself that he was subsequently granted a jaghir worth Rs. 12,000. Shortly afterwards Wazir Mahomed died, and his son Nazar Mahomed became the ruler of Bhopal. Salvador did not long survive his friend; on his death Nazar Mahomed appointed his son Balthasar, or Shahzad Masih (1772-1829) as his Minister of State. Balthasar displayed great ability and in 1818 when the state was once more in danger of extinction from the Mahrattas, was sent by the Nawab to the camp of General Adams to conclude a treaty with the British. This treaty was successfully negotiated and Balthasar was appointed by the British General to the command of a Bhopal contingent which served with distinction with the British forces. On the death of Nazar Mahomed, his widow Kudsia Begum, confirmed Balthasar as Minister and increased his jaghir at Ichhwar to the value of Rs. 34,000 in perpetuity. In 1822 he married Isabel Johnston, better known as Madame Dulhan, who became the favourite and companion of the Ruling Begum. Balthasar died in 1829 leaving no legitimate children, but his son Sebastian, or Meherban Masih, born after his death by a Brahman woman of Ichhwar was recognised and adopted by Madame Dulhan, and when Sebastian married Joan Bernard she bestowed on him a jaghir worth Rs. 12,000 from her own

property. In 1857 the loyalty of Sebastian and his family enabled Sikandra Begum to contend successfully with the religious fanaticism of her own family; and not only saved Colonel Durand and his party who had fled from Indore to Sehore for protection (*see page 92*) but also enabled her to render great services to the British Government in the troubled times between 1857 and 1859. Sebastian died leaving his estates heavily encumbered and the Jaghir was resumed, a cash payment being made in its stead to his son Bonaventura who used some of the money to complete the church commenced by Madame Dulhan. With Bonaventura the fortunes of the Bourbons continued to decline and such of his grandchildren as remain in Bhopal occupy obscure positions and draw monthly pensions of only a few rupees from the State.

604. On the banks of the Newaj river between the villages of Bhopalpura and Naihera are the cemetery and ruins of Dobria Cantonment. This was the headquarters of a small irregular force, raised at the close of the Third Mahratta War; it consisted of 300 horse, foot and artillery, recruited from Sarangpur and officered by the Bombay Army. The cemetery contains 5 graves from all of which the inscriptions have been removed. A curious tale is told locally concerning one of these tombs. There had been some friction between the Commandant of the station and his 2nd in Command, and this came to a head when the latter built himself a boat which he refused to lend to the Commandant. One day during the rains the Commandant determined to take the boat, and on being once more refused permission, put the owner under arrest and spent an afternoon on the river. On his return he was challenged by the indignant owner and a duel was fought in which one or other of the combatants was killed.

1st Siege of Gwalior 3rd Aug. 1780.

The fortress of Gwalior stands on a vast rock rising two to three hundred feet above the plain. The sides are almost perpendicular and where they are less steep the rock has been scarped away from the foot of the walls. The main approach is by a series of steps running up the east side of the rock and defended by seven gateways. On the western side another gateway stands at the head of a re-entrant, the road to it being commanded from the walls on either sides. Up till the end of the 18th century the fort was regarded as impregnable but when, in 1778, Warren Hastings decided to uphold the claims of Raghunath Rao as Peshwa, and Popham was detached to assist the Rana of Gohad against Madoji Scindia, Hastings urged the importance of the capture of Gwalior. The task seemed at first sight beyond the strength of Popham's small force, but the Rana put him in touch with the members of a criminal tribe who were in the habit of climbing the face of the rock and entering the fort in order to commit small thefts among the garrison. They disclosed their track to Captain Popham, and with the aid of scaling ladders, a small party of British troops entered the fort shortly before dawn on August 3rd 1780; they were quickly followed by Popham himself with two battalions, and the surprised garrison made little attempt at resistance and finally fled through the gates. There were no British casualties. The fort was restored to the Rana of Gohad, to whom it had belonged, in May 1781, but Scindia recovered it again by bribery at the end of that year.

2nd Siege of Gwalior Jan.—Feb. 1804.

Soon after the battle of Laswari which had completed the overthrow of Scindia's regular forces, Ambaji Rao Inglia who had charge of an important tract of country belonging to Scindia, decided to betray his master and towards the end of December 1803 offered to hand over to the British Government the Fortress of Gwalior and the territories lying to the north of it. On the 21st December Lord Lake despatched Lt. Col. White with a small force of Native infantry to occupy the place, but when the latter arrived before Gwalior, the Killedar refused to give it up. Col. White's force was then augmented until it contained the 1/14th, 2/9th, 2/11th and 2/8th N. I. and a detachment of the 16th N. I., the Flank Companies of the 76th, a company of Artillery and some heavy guns and with these troops he set about the reduction of the fortress. He established batteries and breached the walls on the west side of the fort close to the Ghargarajphul and was about to storm the fortress when on February 4th 1804, the garrison surrendered.

The casualties sustained by the British force were few, but on January 29th Sergeant Parsons and several men were killed by gunfire in one of the batteries. Their graves cannot be traced. Pester states that during the following summer, many of the Europeans left on garrison duty in the fort, died of heat stroke. No trace of their graves now remain.

The fort was returned to Scindia by Treaty in 1805.

About 300 yards to the W. S. W. of the Old Residency Cemetery but concealed from it in a small ravine, is an enclosure containing 14 tombs, only one of which is inscribed. This cemetery marks the site of the first halt of H. M. 39th Regiment, now the 1st Dorsets, after the Battle of Maharajpur (see page 167). It appears from the Regimental records that when the Mahrattas broke at the close of the action the 39th Regt. pushed on in pursuit carrying their dead with them and these were buried near the encampment which they subsequently occupied from Jan. 29th 1843 till 10th March 1844 as part of a Division to guard the transaction of events in Gwalior. Traces of this camp can still be seen.

The Outbreak at Gwalior 14th June 1857.

The Gwalior Contingent stationed at Morar consisted of 2 regiments of cavalry, 4 field batteries and 7 infantry battalions. Early in May it became clear that no confidence be placed in these troops and the news of the Jhansi massacre swept away their last hold on discipline. On the morning of the 14th some bungalows were burned and a number of the officers' wives took shelter at the Palace or at the Residency. At 9 P.M. the bugle gave the alarm for the outbreak, the Cantonment troops rose, and by the light of the burning bungalows the Europeans were hunted through the Cantonment. Six Officers, six N. C. Os., three women and five children were shot or bayoneted in the Cantonment, the remainder succeeded in reaching Scindia's Palace. In some cases the men of their own regiments escorted officers and ladies to the Palace before themselves joining the mutineers. Scindia found himself unable to give more than a temporary refuge to the fugitives as his own troops were tainted, but he supplied them with carriages and a troop of his own bodyguard to escort them across the Chambul on their way to Agra where they eventually arrived in safety.

Gwalior Campaign of the Central Indian Field Force, June 1858.

On May 30th 1858 the Rani of Jhansi and Tantia Topi, at the head of a mixed force of 1,100 men entered Morar. Next day Scindia with 8,000 men marched out to oppose them, but on the advance of the rebels his whole army went over to the enemy, he himself fled to Agra, and the rebels took possession of Gwalior without further opposition. On receipt of this news, Sir Hugh Rose, in spite of serious ill health again took over his relinquished command of the Central India Field Force and marched on the city. During the march the temperature is said to have reached 130° and there were many casualties among the exhausted troops.

On 16th June he reached Bahadurpur, 5 miles from Morar, and sent forward a reconnoitring party. They reported that the cantonment which had only been partially wrecked in the outbreak of the proceeding year was strongly held by the rebels. In spite of the heat and the fatigue of his troops who had already made a long march the General decided to attack at once. He formed his force into two lines, the first under Brigadier Stuart and the second in support under Brigadier Napier. Captain Abbott covered the advance with the third Cavalry. The ground on the right of Morar was ravined and the General's plan was to mask the dangerous ground on his left towards which the enemy endeavoured to draw him, to outflank the enemy left, double it up and cut off their retreat over the bridge leading to Gwalior. The enemy fought stubbornly but the British troops swept past the broken ground, took the cantonment by storm, and only the difficulty experienced in crossing a deep nala to their right prevented the cavalry from getting round in time to cut off the main line of the rebel's retreat along the Gwalior road. Many of the mutineers remained in this nala and those to the rear of it after the cavalry had passed, and as the infantry advanced to clear them, they were met by a heavy fire. The skirmishers of the 71st Highland Light Infantry were sent forward, Lt. Neave who led their charge fell mortally wounded when close to the ravine, but the 71st took the nala and those to the rear of it, while Lt. Rose of the 25th Bombay infantry placed a party to enfilade those dangerous entrenchments, and after a stubborn resistance the whole of the rebels in the nalas were killed. The advance and action was accomplished in two hours. The H. L. I. lost 4 N. C. Os. and men in addition to Lt. Neave.

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Battle of Kotah-ki-Serai, 17th June 1858.

Immediately after his success at Morar Sir Hugh Rose decided that owing to the open nature of the ground an advance on Gwalior from the Cantonment would be too costly. He therefore got into touch with Brigadier Smith who was advancing from Antri with a brigade of the Rajputana Field Force, and ordered him to occupy Kotah-ki-Serai, and to wait there till the arrival of the Kalpi garrison would enable the General himself to join him with his division, when a general assault could be made on Gwalior from the south.

On the morning of the 17th June Smith marched through the pass of Kotah-ki-Serai which he had reconnoitred and picketed on the preceding evening. He met with no opposition and reached Kotah-ki-Serai, about 3 miles from Gwalior, at 7 A.M. when he observed that the enemy in possession of the heights in front of him were about to attack. His position was now so precarious that he decided to disobey his orders and himself take the

initiative. As Smith's brigade advanced the rebel guns opened fire at 15,000 yards, but they were soon silenced by the Horse Artillery and began to retire, whereupon the 95th Regiment and the 10th Bombay N. I. under Colonel Raines advanced to within 50 yards of the enemy's breastwork, when they charged it putting the rebels to flight. From the captured breastwork Colonel Raines observed that enemy guns, supported by cavalry and infantry, were in position on another hill about 1,000 yards from that which he now occupied. There was a check, then as the cavalry debouched from the head of the pass he continued his advance up the Gwalior road, the guns and cavalry retiring before him. Another body of cavalry two to three hundred strong now formed up to protect Gwalior, and a squadron of the 8th Hussars were ordered to charge them. In spite of the rough intervening ground and the appalling heat of the day this charge was carried out with such success that the Hussars swept the rebels back through their camp, where they took three guns at the cross road from Gwalior to Morar. There they came on a large force of hostile cavalry and infantry trying to escape from the camp to the fort, many of these made a stand but the Hussars never slackened pace and dashing into the midst of them, cut them down by scores, and continued the charge right down the Phulbagh cantonment. Here the Rani of Jhansi, dressed as a cavalry soldier was cut down by a Hussar. The squadron had now covered from three to four miles, but the country behind them was swept clean of the enemy, and they turned about and withdrew at any easy pace, though under a heavy artillery fire from the fort. The men were so completely exhausted by the charge that they could scarcely sit in their saddles and the squadron was brought out of action by the regimental doctor Captain Poore, himself a hospital case, the other three officers being completely disabled by the heat of the sun and Lt. Reilly dying almost immediately from exhaustion. Eight men were also killed or died of heatstroke during the charge. Seeing their weak condition bodies of mutineers began to collect on their flanks, but as they retired a troop of the 1st Bombay Lancers came out in support and the fire of the 95th prevented any further attack being made. That night Brigadier Smith bivouacked in the pass to the north of Kotah-ki-Serai and there awaited the advance of Sir Hugh Rose.

Battle of Gwalior 19th June 1858.

On the 18th, the arrival of re-inforcements from Kalpi, enabled Sir Hugh Rose to move forward from Morar and join Brigadier Smith in camp near Kotah-ki-Serai. This position was not secure as the rebels dominated the ridge to the left of the road and before any advance could be made on Gwalior it was clear that this force must be turned and driven in on Lashkar. Rose decided to make a surprise attack a little before dawn on the 20th, but while the necessary preparations were being made the rebels were seen to be issuing from Gwalior and the General received news from the Political Officer, Sir Robert Hamilton, that they intended to attack that day. He therefore decided to take the initiative and ordered out his men, who were resting after their night march from Morar. One party consisting of the 86th Regiment and the 25th Bombay N. I. under Brigadier Stuart was sent to attack the enemy position on the left flank, while Brigadier Smith with the 95th were ordered to round the shoulder of the hill and attack it on the opposite side. The rest of the force was disposed in support of the attacking columns or in defence of the camp. Both attacking parties were successful, the 86th drove in the enemy infantry on their guns and finally back through the battery, while the 95th, arriving a moment later, turned the captured guns on parties of rebels on the plain below which they now commanded. From the ridge Gwalior and Lashkar lay in full view of the British force and Sir Hugh Rose felt convinced that that he could take them before sunset. He determined to make a general advance against all the positions which the enemy occupied for the defence of Gwalior, extending from beyond the palace of Phulbagh on the right, to the extensive barracks which lay to the left of the parade ground, and then to take Lashkar by assault. The advanced line moved down the slopes towards Lashkar, and in spite of the difficulties of the broken ground, pushed back the rebels and cleared the hamlets at the bottom by hand to hand fighting. The way was now open for the final attack, and the General reorganised his line and gave the order for the advance on the parade ground where supported by two 18 pounders, a large body of rebel cavalry and infantry were drawn up. At the same time a captured 9 pounder was brought up and discharged a round of shrapnel just over the rebel guns, killing or putting their gunners to

flight. Seeing this the hostile force on the parade ground began to retire. They were immediately charged by the 1st Bombay Lancers who cleared the right half of the ground and pursued the rebel infantry into Lashkar where Lieut. Mills was shot through the heart. The 95th occupied the parade ground and cleared the buildings surrounding it. The cavalry, who brought back the body of Lt. Mills, were then recalled and the 95th were sent into Lashkar to clear the streets up to the palace, but the enemy fled so fast that none were even sighted by the advancing troops, and before evening the whole of Lashkar was in the hands of the British. In the meantime Brigadier Smith had occupied Phulbagh after some fierce fighting, and his cavalry pursued the retreating enemy until men and horses could go no further. That night the Fort which all day had kept up a continuous fire on the advancing troops was all that remained to the rebels. Sir Hugh Rose gave orders for its close investment, as he anticipated that it would be evacuated during the night.

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Capture of Gwalior Fort 20th June 1858.

On the morning of the 20th the enemy again fired on Lashkar from the Fort. Lt. Rose who, with Lt. Waller and a party of the 25th Bombay N. I. were on guard at the main gate, burst open the doors and surprising the other gates before the garrison, a party of fanatical Musahnan artillerymen could shut them, reached the last gateway in which the rebels had stationed a gun. Rose and his party rushed the gate and engaged in a hand to hand fight with the rebels who defended the narrow street leading into the fort itself, while Lt. Waller climbed with a few men on the roof of a neighbouring house and shot down the gunners. The determined gallantry of this handful of men carried all before it, they took the fort and killed every man that remained in it, but their leader was mortally wounded in the assault and died the following day.

Jean Baptist was adopted by De la Fontaine, another officer in Madec's Brigade, and by him was educated at Delhi and Calcutta. At the age of 12 he is said to have conducted a campaign against Nawab Bhambu Khan of Saharanpur and afterwards returned to his studies. In 1797 De la Fontaine died leaving his possessions to Jean Baptist, who in the same year inherited three of Michael's battalions on the latter's flight to Europe. To these Jean Baptist added three more which he raised in Hindusthan. He then entered the service of Scindia and was sent to serve against George Thomas in Haryana. In 1801 the discipline of the force was so bad that the Emperor had it expelled from Delhi. This appears to be the only edict of the Emperor's that was ever carried into effect. On the suicide of

			<p>his brother Fidele, Jean succeeded to his battalions, then at Ujjein. At the outbreak of the 2nd Mahratta War Jean Baptist's brigade consisted of 8 battalions of infantry, 500 cavalry and 45 guns. Half of this force was dispersed at Assaye while their commander was at Ujjein with the remainder; when the news of the defeat reached him he retired to Rajputana. Afterwards he was employed to subjugate petty Rajput chiefs in Malwa and round Gwalior. His troops were always ill disciplined and Jean Baptiste and his officers were sometimes confined and even tortured when pay was in arrears. In 1804 he made his headquarters at Sipri from where he seized Chanderi, Raghugarh and Karauli which were confirmed to Scindia by the treaty of 1817. Battle of Maharajpur, 29th December 1843.

On the death of Jankoji Rao in 1843, his young widow Tara Rani had adopted an eight year old boy who was raised to the gaddi under the title of Alijah Jayaji Scindia, and the Mama Sahib, maternal uncle of the late Scindia was chosen by the Chiefs of Gwalior as Regent. His selection was recognised by the British Government to whose interests he was attached. A few months later the intrigues of a party headed by Dada Khasgiwala poisoned the mind of the Maharani against the Mama Sahib, and he and his adherents were expelled from the state, in spite of the protests of the Resident, while Khasgiwala, who had won over the army became the paramount influence in the state. Affairs quickly went from bad to worse and large bodies of mutinous troops assembled round Gwalior and threatened to irrupt into the neighbouring states. The Resident was withdrawn. The Maharani wrote asking for his return and was informed that relations could not be re-established unless Khasgiwala was banished. Khasgiwala intercepted this reply, and concealed its contents from the Maharani. This act was regarded as a virtual supercession of the authority of the Maharani and the young Chief, whose interests the Government were bound to uphold. At the same time war was again threatening in the Panjab and the unsettled conditions prevailing in Gwalior would become dangerous to an army operating in the north. Drastic action had thus become necessary. Lord Ellenborough demanded an interview with the Maharani to negotiate measures for the restoration of an efficient government in the state and for the reduction of the mutinous army, and a demonstration in force accompanied the Governor General on his journey through the state with a view to overawing any possible opposition. This interview was to take place at Hingona on 26th December 1849, but the day passed without the appearance of the Maharani and her son who were held in restraint by their army, so the Governor General, accompanied by 12,000 troops under the Commander-in-Chief, Sir Hugh Gough, continued his march on Gwalior. Gough appears to have regarded the State army as a mere rabble and to have taken no precautions on the march. Such was his ignorance of the enemy's movements that on December 19th the non-combatants of the party were proceeding on their elephants to Maharajpur where it had been arranged that they should breakfast, when a roundshot which narrowly missed the howdah in which Lady Gough was sitting, announced the presence of the enemy, 18,000 of whom held a strongly entrenched position in and around the village itself. For a moment all was confusion, then the 5th Brigade consisting of the 39th Foot and the 56th N. I. under Brigadier Wright were launched against the village, while the 3rd Brigade containing the 40th Foot and the 2nd and 16th N. I. under Major General Valiant attacked it from the rear. The 4th Brigade under Brigadier Stacy supported both columns. After a sharp contest the enemy were driven out of Maharajpur, and the British troops advanced carrying the villages of Chounda, Shikapur and Dompura after fierce fighting. The cavalry at the same time were fully employed. The enemy were finally driven from the field with great loss but the British casualties were also heavy and amounted to 106 killed and 684 wounded. A memorial was erected to the memory of the fallen at Maharajpur and Panniar (See page 169) in Calcutta.

These two victories fought on the same day, reduced the state to order and the Treaty of Gwalior was concluded on 13th January 1844. By a clause of this treaty the Gwalior Contingent was reformed and placed under British Officers.

On the same day that the main army gained the Battle of Maharajpur Major General Grey, who was advancing from the south with the left wing, gained another decisive victory at Panniar. Having crossed the Sindh river at Barka-ke-Serai on the 28th September, he heard that the enemy 12,000 strong were in a position at Antri, 7 miles off. On the following day he made a long march to Panniar about 12 miles from Gwalior, the Maharattas at the same time proceeding by a parallel movement until they reached the fortified village of Mangar, near Panniar, where they took up a strong position 4 miles to the east of the British camp, and commenced to attack their long line of baggage. Detaching all the cavalry he could spare to protect the baggage, Grey attacked the enemy's centre with the 3rd Buffs, the 39th N. I. and a company of sappers, who carried every position before them in spite of a galling fire from the enemy's guns. At the same time the 50th Foot and a wing of the 50th N. I. supported by the 58th N. I. attacked and routed the enemy's left. After a conflict of two hours the Maharattas were driven from their positions with a heavy loss in men, and also with a loss of all their guns and ammunition. The British losses were 35 killed and 182 wounded. Among the killed were:—

By one of the articles of the treaty with Scindia at the close of the 2nd Mahratta war, the fortress of Gohad was to be assigned to him, on his providing the Rani of Gohad with an equivalent elsewhere. The kiladar however, instigated by the Rani, refused to surrender the fort and coercion became necessary. A force consisting of the 2/11th, 2/16th, 2/24th, and 2/25th Bengal Native Infantry under Lt. Col. Bowie was sent against Gohad in February 1806, and after a sharp engagement the fort was carried with the loss of 5 officers and 100 men.

Siege of Lahar, 20th April 1780.

On the 20th April 1780 Captain Popham, whose force consisted of a company of Artillery and 2,400 native infantry drafts formed into 4 battalions, attacked the fortress of Lahar which was held by the Mahrattas. As the small guns which they had with them could not break down the walls, Popham decided to assault them. The attack was led by Lieutenants Gardiner and Logan who were both killed in the breach, but Mr. O'Dell a civilian volunteer, rushed forward and took command, and the storming party mounted the wall under a heavy fire and carried the place by sheer pluck and determination. The British losses amounted to 123 killed and wounded.

Fifty yards from the Lahar Police Station is a masonry tomb from which the inscription has been removed. It stands in the compound of a ruined bungalow which is said to have belonged to Kartoos Sahib, an officer who commanded an outpost at Lahar in 1858. (Possibly Lt. Col. Curtis of the 1st Cavalry). The tomb is probably that of Lt. Fawcett who was killed in an action at Bijapur, two miles from Lahar in 1858.

Action at Bijapur, 5th September 1858.

In August 1858 a column under Lt. Col. G. H. Robertson was in pursuit of a body of rebels under Man Singh. This column overtook the fugitives at Bijapur near Lahar at daybreak on September 5th. The enemy were encamped on the banks of the Chupet river beyond the village. The cavalry was sent round to the right of the village to attack the mutineers left while the infantry made a frontal attack through the village. The enemy about a thousand strong were posted on some high ground, but the impetuosity of the British attack drove them back into the ravines beyond and into the river itself where they lost over 450 men. The bulk of the dead belonged to the Gwalior Contingent and to the 40th, 50th and 52nd B. N. I. The British casualties amounted to 24 killed and wounded among the dead were:—

After the Central India Field Force had forced the passes into Bundelkhand, Brigadier Stuart was sent against the fortress of Chanderi. On the 6th of March the attack began and the rebels who were posted in the jungle and broken ground in front of the fort were driven back behind the curtain wall. The bombardment began on the 7th and the breach was pronounced to be practicable on 16th. The following morning the fort was stormed and carried, the enemy suffering heavy losses both in the fort and in the surrounding jungles where they were cut up by the cavalry of the Haiderabad Contingent as they attempted to escape. The British casualties were 1 officer and 2 men killed, and 4 officers and 19 men wounded.

GOONA.

Originally the headquarters of Daulat Rao Scindia's Contingent, Goona was taken over as a permanent cantonment for the Central India Horse when that Regiment came into being in 1858. There are two small cemeteries about 30 yards apart, these appear to have been built at the same time, and between them is a large uninscribed grave which is considerably older than the cemetery wall. This is probably the grave of Lt. Edward Faithfull.

This regiment had taken part in the Gwalior Campaign in the previous year and was then engaged in the pursuit of Tantia Topes and in the pacification of Central India. The other cemetery contains 8 inscribed graves.

His horse fell twice before reaching the summit and he was shot dead by a rebel as he mounted the crest. He "was buried where he fell and many years afterwards a monument sent by relatives from England was set up over his grave by officers of a later generation." Probably this was the occasion of his re-interment in the cemetery at Goona. Ref. Watson.

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AGAR.

Agar was first occupied as a cantonment in 1814 when it became the headquarters of a small mixed force of irregular troops. In 1860 it became one of the two permanent stations selected for the Central India Horse having previously been used as a cantonment by the Irregular Corps which were incorporated in the regiment. The cemetery contains several old tombs from which the inscriptions have been removed.

The Mutiny at Agar, 4th July 1857.

On the 4th July the 5th Infantry of the Gwalior Contingent which had received emissaries from the Indore rebels, mutinied at Agar. Hearing a tumult Lieut. O'Dowda, whose horse was saddled, rode to the lines where he was immediately shot. The Commandant, Captain Carter, rode in the same direction a few minutes later but was stopped by four sepoys who entreated him to go back, and he returned to his bungalow and made arrangements for flight. Conveyances were procured, and with the exception of Dr. and Mrs. James (*See page 178*) who became separated from the other fugitives, the officers and ladies left the station safely and finally reached Hoshangabad.

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UJJAIN.

Outside the walls on the South side of the city and near the Mahakaleshwar temple is a very old tomb from which the inscription disappeared about twenty years ago. It is said locally to be that of a European artillery captain in the service of a ruler of Ujjain. The grave is near the site of the stand made by Hessing's Brigade in 1801 and may be connected with the battle.

Battle of Ujjain, 2nd July 1801.

During Scindia's absence in the Deccan Jaswant Rao Holkar had employed himself in devastating Daulat Rao's districts, and on the death of Nana Farnavis, Daulat Rao, leaving Sarje Rao Ghatke in charge of affairs at Poona, marched northwards with 5 battalions of infantry and 5,000 horse. Holkar hearing of this approach concentrated his forces in the neighbourhood of Ujjain intending to plunder that city, but Scindia despatched 4 infantry battalions under George Hessing to the defence of his capital which they reached by forced marches. Then at intervals of a few days he sent off two more bodies of infantry and finally some artillery. Holkar seized the opportunity to deal with these small forces in detail and crushed the first party, the second and third had united and were able to repulse him though not to reach Ujjain. Holkar then began to retire towards Indore but Amir Khan persuaded him to return and attack Hessing. On July 2nd 1801 Holkar and Amir Khan advanced on Hessing's battalions which were drawn up under the walls of Ujjain. Amir Khan opened the action by a charge of his own cavalry which dispersed Hessing's horse. He then concentrated a heavy artillery fire upon the four battalions of regular infantry, throwing them into confusion. Hessing seeing his men waver fled precipitately from the field, leaving his subordinates to oppose Holkar's brigades. Both officers and men fought to the last with the utmost gallantry but were finally overpowered by a charge of the Pathan horse led by Amir Khan himself. Of the twelve European officers engaged eight were killed, three were wounded and made prisoners, and the halfcaste Hessing himself alone escaped. The heads of the dead officers were cut off and carried to Jeswant Rao Holkar, who rewarded this atrocious act of mutilation by a reward of Rs. 1,000 for each head. On the following day Ujjain was plundered.

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Battle of Mandesore, 23rd Nov. 1857.

After the fall of Dhar, the Malwa Field Force marched northwards to the relief of Neemuch, and after exterminating a large body of the Mahidpur rebels at Rawal reached Mandesore. General Stuart crossed the Siwana, skirted the town, and took up a position astride the Neemuch road where he could prevent the arrival of reinforcements from the Neemuch mutineers. On the 23rd Stuart advanced about four miles and found the enemy drawn up in a strong position with their left resting on the village of Guraria Dida. Fierce fighting continued all day, and by evening the enemy had fled, many taking refuge in Guraria. The village was shelled and pickets posted round it, as the British force was too exhausted to continue the fight that night. In the meantime 200 rebels had issued from the town of Mandesore and attacked the baggage and rearguard, the mounted troops were immediately ordered to the rear, the guns opened fire, and the cavalry charged the retreating enemy. The pursuing force suffered some casualties among a group of gravel pits in which a number of the rebels had taken shelter. The enemy evacuated Mandesore that night and with the reduction of Guraria on the following day the Malwa Campaign was ended.

1st Outbreak at Neemuch, 3rd June 1857.

The troops at Neemuch consisting of battery of Native Horse Artillery, the 1st B. C., 72nd N. I. and 7th Infantry, Gwalior Contingent, were early infected by the spirit of mutiny. There was an alarm on the 28th May, but the officers succeeded in temporarily pacifying their men. On the night of June 3rd some troopers of the 1st B. C. gave the signal to the sepoys to rise and the whole station was soon in flames. The officers and their families had assembled in the quarter guard of the 72nd Regt. and the artillery trained a gun on the building, but the sepoys of the 72nd protected them, and at 1 A.M. they were allowed to escape to Jawad to the camp of the P. A. of Kotah, Major Burton (*see page 73*) From there the women and children fled under the protection of the Rao of Bedla to Udaipur, where the Maharana placed them for safety on the island of Jugmundir. The only lives lost were those of Store Sergt. Supple and his family who were trapped and massacred in their quarters in the Commissariat Stores. After systematically burning and looting the station the mutineers marched for Delhi. On the day following their departure the officers returned from Jawad and re-occupied the station with the Contingent troops of Jhalawar, Kotah and Bundi, who were with Major Burton.

Lancers, 200 men of the 12th Bo. N. I. and 2 guns. On Aug. 12th Colonel Jackson who was in command of the station received information that some disaffected men of the 2nd L. C. and the 12th Bo. N. I. were endeavouring to promote a disturbance and he called out the 83rd to disarm them. The affair was mismanaged and in the mêlée a private of the 83rd Foot was killed and several others wounded. The body of the private was no doubt buried in the cemetery but the grave cannot now be traced.

<p>The rebels at Mandesore had seized and occupied the fort of Jearun about 10 miles to the south of Neemuch. On 23rd Oct. a small force consisting of 50 men of the 83rd Foot, 120 sabres of the 2nd Bo. L. C. and 100 men of the 12th N. I. under the command of Captain Tucker were sent to dislodge them. Jearun was a strong position, held by a large and determined body of rebels and this force proved inadequate for the task. The action was opened with an infantry attack which was met by the sally of a mass of rebels who overwhelmed the infantry and drove them back. Captain Tucker immediately charged the enemy and in his turn drove them behind the walls of the fort, but was himself killed in the charge. Captain Reid commanding the 83rd had been killed in the initial attack and six out of the nine remaining officers were wounded, so the force retired to Neemuch. That night the enemy who also appear to have suffered heavily, evacuated Jearun and retired to Mandesore.</p>

Siege of Neemuch Fort, Nov. 3rd-21st 1857.

On Nov. 3rd a body of Mandesore rebels about 4,000 strong moved against Neemuch. The troops about 300 in number in addition to 40 sick men and followers took shelter in the fort which was provisioned. The fort however was weak and not large enough to accommodate the cavalry which remained without to harass the enemy attack. The enemy pressed the siege, and though the defence was carried on with spirit, they continued to gain ground and the position in the fort became critical. Just before dawn on the 31st the rebels delivered a general attack, pressing up to the walls with their scaling ladders and some succeeded in mounting the defences. After a fierce struggle they were driven back with heavy loss leaving behind them a standard and four of the ladders. On the following morning the approach of the Malwa Field Force which was the cause of the last desperate attack, raised the siege, for the rebels marched back to meet the British advance at Mandesore and there, in the fighting of the 23rd and 24th the rebellion in Malwa was effectively broken. On the 25th Neemuch was relieved. Sergt. Nimmo and Pte. Connery of H. M. 83rd Regt. were also killed during the siege and were buried beside Lt. Brett.

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The Mutiny at Nowgong, 9th June 1857.

The revolt at Jhansi was quickly followed by the rising of the 12th Bengal Infantry at Nowgong, which in addition was garrisoned by the 14th Irregular Cavalry and a detachment of Native Artillery. The gunners were the first to show definite signs of disaffection and the guns were brought in to the quarterguard of the 12th B. N. I. on May 30th. On the 9th June the news of the massacre at Jhansi reached Nowgong and the same evening the havildar of the 12th who remained loyal, was shot at guard mounting and the guns seized by the mutineers. The officers tried unsuccessfully to reason with their men, the women and children were then collected and the Europeans left the station with the few men who remained faithful. It is not known whether an attempt was made to follow them as they fled across country, but if so the darkness saved them. The party which left the cantonment consisted of the Commandant Major Kirke, and his son Henry, Captain Scott, Lts. Barber and Jackson, Dr. and Mrs. Mawe and their two year old daughter Lottie, Mrs. Smalley and her baby, Mr. Sturt of the Salt Department, Messrs. Langdale, Johnson and Tierney of the Agency Office and two children, the Artillery Sergeant, Sergt. and Mrs. Kirchoff and a number of Eurasian bandsmen with their wives and families. This party unable to carry with it any adequate supply of food made for Allahabad. On the 17th June they reached a small pass near Kalinjar which they found to be held by Bundelas. The Bundelas at first endeavoured to extract money from the party in return for a passage through the hills, but though they were given a considerable sum, began to fire on the top where the fugitives were spending the night. Lt. Townsend was killed in its defence. Major Kirke had by this time become unhinged by his sufferings, and Captain Scott taking command collected the party and forced the pass with the loss of several of the faithful sepoy. On the following day one of the sepoy got news that Allahabad had risen, and uncertain where to go in the face of this new disaster the party turned back towards Kalrai, wandering in the blistering heat through the byeways of Bundelkhand, short of food and often of water, headed back from any direction in which they might have hoped to find a refuge, plundered of all they possessed and in perpetual danger. Major Kirke was the first to die, and he was soon followed by Mrs. Smalley, then the Artillery Sergeant died of apoplexy, while the Kirchoffs were killed by villagers. At Kalrai the remaining sepoy deserted, and the surviving Eurasians and their families decided to stay in Chhatarpur territory as the Rani seemed inclined to treat them kindly and they felt unequal to further effort. The rest of the party went on to Mahoba, losing Lts. Barber and Ewart, Dr. Mawe and Mrs. Smalley's child, who all died on the way. The fate of the subordinates who at some period of the flight became separated from the rest is not recorded, but Capt. Scott believed that they were killed by villagers. Scott himself with little Lottie Mawe, Lt. Jackson and Henry Kirke were taken prisoners by the Bundelas and on June 30th brought to Banda for execution, but the Raja took them under his protection and treated them with kindness, and a few days later, hearing that Mrs. Mawe was a prisoner in one of his villages he had her brought in. The little party of survivors were then sent by the Raja under escort to Nagode which they reached on July 14th whence they subsequently found safety in Saugor.

In January 1809 it became necessary to send a force against Lachman Dawah the refractory chief of Ajaigarh. The detachment employed was under the command of Lt.-Col. Martindell and on the 22nd it reached and attacked Rajaoli an outpost which dominated the approach to the main Fortress. The hill on which this outpost stood is most precipitous and the British troops advanced under a hail of rocks and bullets. The attacking force pushed upwards till they reached the protection of the walls when they stopped to take breath for the final assault, but the enemy unwilling to face a storm seized the opportunity presented by this lull to evacuate the fort. The British losses on this occasion amounted to 28 killed including Lt. Jamieson who died soon after the assault, and 115 wounded.

After receiving reinforcements Martindell carried the similar fortified hill of Behouta and proceeded to bombard the main fort which surrendered on Feb. 13th.

NOTE.—Bellasis is said by Compton to have been killed as above while serving with Shepherd's brigade at the siege of Seondha in Datia State which was then held by Lakwa Dada and the Bhais. Col. L. F. Smith however writes from Cool. (Koil, Aligarh), in a letter dated Dec. 5th, 1799 :—" I am sorry to acquaint you with the melancholy death of Colonel J. H. Bellasis, who was killed a fortnight ago in storming a fort near Lahor (Lahar) a place well known to the officers who served under Major Popham." As Lakwa Dada only went into rebellion at the end of the following year and the storm of Seondha took place on the 3rd May 1801 it would appear that Compton's account of Bellasis death is not correct.

TERROWA.
