For 50 years, the Missouri Department of Conservation has been tracking Missouri's biggest known trees. Over 130 species make up the Missouri Champion Tree Program, ranging from the relatively petite downy hawthorn to the massive bur oak. These champion trees are some of the most impressive examples of their species that Missouri has to offer. If you want to see a champion tree up close, the following 38 champion trees are on public property.






Figure 4. Bigtooth Aspen. Tower Grove Park, St. Louis City.




Figure 15. Downy Hawthorn. Rockwoods Reservation Conservation Area, St. Louis County.




Figure 22. Northern Red Oak. U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Lake Wappapello, Wayne County.




Figure 35. Sassafras. South Park, Monett, Barry County.




Figure 39. Black Walnut. Hazelwood Cemetery, Springfield, Greene County.
