[REDACTED] thinks the big trouble is that there is not someone out there (Phoenix) to be telling him all the time how much they love him. [REDACTED] that this is the biggest cause why [REDACTED] he felt like blowing his brains out.

[REDACTED] does not weigh as much as his little boy; that he can hardly talk and just stumbles around, is coughing a lot, and is spiting up big black spots which he says is just mucous.

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BLACK MUSLIM RIOT:

JURY TRIES AND TRIES

LOS ANGELES.

A Caucasian jury trying Black Muslim racists on charges of assault against police during a riot is taking the day off today after more than two weeks of deliberations.

The panel has given no indication to Superior Judge David Coleman that it is near a verdict. The jurist has extended the jury's daily hours of deliberation in an attempt to speed a decision.

One cult member was shot and killed during the April 27, 1962, riot outside a Black Muslim temple here and five others,

were wounded. A half dozen police officers were injured.

Malcolm X, second ranking member of the sect to Elijah Muhammad, has attended court regularly since the jury of 10 women and 2 men received the case May 24. Trial began April 8.

The panel was changed June 5 when Mrs. Jacqueline Ames, 50, a Beverly Hills widow, suffered a heart attack and was excused from further deliberations. Alternate juror Mrs. Lucille G. Jones was assigned to fill the vacancy.

The hour-long riot the night of April 27-28 reached a climax at 12:30 a. m. in the vicinity of

Muhammad's Mosque 27 in a Negro section of the city.

Radio car officers Stanley Kensic and Frank Tomlinson questioned two men peddling clothes from the trunk of an automobile.

"We didn't do anything, you're only doing this to us because we're Muslims," one man shouted and both men fled toward the temple where a meeting was in progress.

Patrolman Kensic caught one man and fired a warning shot at the other. Fifty Muslims poured out of the temple and the battle began. Foot patrol officers joined the melee where — police charged — Muslims had felled and stomped Patrolmen

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Kensic and Tomlinson on the sidewalk.

Other radio units alerted by an "officer needs help call" joined the fray as 200 spectators watched. The gunfire was started by Patrolman Donald L. Weese, 28, who later testified he fired after warning the Muslims who were attacking a brother officer "in the protection of my partner's life and my own."

Patrolman Weese said his partner, Richard T. Anderson, was being beaten with his own nightstick and "by this time a crowd surrounded me. I fell to one knee . . . a man was on my back so I fired under my arm."

One of Mr. Weese's bullets struck Muslim Ronald L. Stokes, 29, who died an hour later, the one fatality of the riot.

Officer Tomlinson in addition to being beaten also was shot in the elbow by a Muslim who grabbed another officer's weapon.

Most seriously injured Muslim was William Rogers, 28, who sustained a bullet wound in the spine that paralyzed him. Now is confined to a wheelchair.

Twenty adult Muslims were booked on suspicion of assault with intent to commit murder.

In the investigation that followed, Malcolm X accused police

of using "gestapo-type atrocity" in the battle. He said "seven innocent, unarmed black men were shot down in cold blood by police . . ."

Los Angeles Police Chief William H. Parker countered that it was "assault on our officers by members of the Black Muslim group . . ."

Nearly three weeks were required for jury selection, during which time more than 400 prospective panelists were excused.

During the trial the Black maintained the incident was a case of police brutality. The prosecution maintained police fought in self defense after the

two officers were attacked by members of the sect.

The courthouse has been surrounded at various times during the trial with groups of Muslims, anti-Muslim Negro groups and individuals sympathetic to both sides.

John Henry Morris, 32, minister of the Muslim temple, is the only defendant charged with intent to commit murder on Patrolman Tomlinson and on Special Officer William Tribble, whom he is accused of trying to shoot.

The other defendants are charged with assault and interference with a police officer in the performance of duty by means of force and violence.

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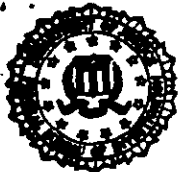

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Muslim Aim: 'Rid Harlem of Dope, Vice'

The Black Muslims will call upon the Negro people of Harlem, in the biggest rally of the year next Saturday, for a moral cleanup and an austerity program to eliminate drunkenness, narcotic addiction and other crime among Negroes.

"We are holding the biggest rally of the year in Harlem on Saturday afternoon to show the Negro community that if it doesn't do something for itself it won't continue to exist," Muslim leader Malcolm X said yesterday.

"The theme of our rally will be the importance of eliminating the causes which give the police excuse to come into Harlem with their brutal measures.

"We intend to point out to an outdoor audience of 5,000 or 6,000 people what alcohol is doing to our community morally and economically, and the effect of increasing drug traffic, and organized gambling, and prostitution and things like that.

"We are going to show how these are destroying the moral fiber of our community, and how no outsiders are doing anything about minimizing it, much less eliminating it, because it is controlled by outsiders."

Malcolm X said in an interview that he expects to maintain perfect discipline at the outdoor meeting, which will not be held in the traditional Harlem rally grounds—the intersection of 125th St. and Seventh Ave.—but in the "poorer" section at 135th St. and Lenox Ave. at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

Although he praised the New York police as the best in handling racial incidents of any police force in the country, Malcolm X chided the police for failure to understand that trying to scare the crowd is not the best way to handle Negro flareups.

The reason that is a poor method, he asserted, is because the New York City Negro has no fear of the police and is greatly different in his psychology from all the other Negroes of the country.

"I don't think that the police or the whites generally realize that today the fear has gone out of Negroes, and the fear has especially gone out of Negroes in Harlem and elsewhere in New York—more so than anywhere in this country. You don't have a place in the country where the Negro has less fear, or is less committed to turning the other cheek, or less committed to non-violence, than here in New York.

"I am not anti-police. I think that the New York police have done more to minimize racial incidents than any other large city in the North. I really believe this. I think they have acted more intelligently as a

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whole to minimize racial incidents than any police force in the North.

"But at the same time somebody who advises them evidently has failed to make them realize that they have a different Negro in New York than anywhere else in this country. And if anything ever did start in New York City, nothing could contain it."

The Muslim minister criticized the police habit of sending police cars to a flare-up scene with lights flashing and sirens screaming. He said that this helps to provoke a riot because of the lack of fear in Harlem these days.

"I am not saying the police shouldn't try to suppress trouble," Malcolm X said, "but different people have different psychological make-ups, and these change with the time, the tempo, the general social, political and even world atmosphere."

"The New York City Negro

has probably had a greater variety of exposure to the cross-currents taking place all over the world than the Negroes anywhere else. He is a different Negro today. The police don't act intelligently when they try to frighten him into submission."

The Muslim minister said he was utterly confident of being able to control his expected turnout of 5,000 or 6,000 Negroes next Saturday. It is his contention that the masses of Negroes are more willing to listen to the Black Muslim philosophy that the Negro should take care of himself, entirely separate from the white race, than listen to the civil rights organization leaders calling for integration.

"Anything that the civil rights organizations have in Harlem can explode if the crowd goes over 200 or 300 people," he said. Explaining his confidence in his own ability to control crowds, including on-lookers who are not themselves Black Muslims, he explained:

"It is the normally undis-

in sympathy with Mr. Muhammad (Elija Muhammad, leader of the Black Muslims). The bourgeois element is the one which is almost never in trouble in any society; they are complacent. But it's the masses who have been pushed to the bottom of the ladder and are in an explosive mood—and Mr. Muhammad's greatest control is over that element. It is an explosive element but at the same time it is the element that reacts to his teaching the most.

The minister said that the submissiveness that Black Muslims feel to their leadership is communicated at their meetings to the non-members who may be attending, that this is a psychological thing.

The Black Muslims call for a mora cleanup in Harlem is something new in the general racial situation, for virtually all the emphasis by the other non-church organizations has been toward advancement of civil rights.

Black Muslims—Rejected by Orthodox, Upheld in Courts, Defended in Prison Rifts

The Black Muslims, an American Negro movement that is publicly anti-white and racist, in direction but forbids aggression unless attacked, have been in court

prison disputes and court actions involving their claims to be a religion.

They claim to be a legitimate religion, part of the worldwide Islamic religion which has perhaps 500 million followers, most of them in Africa and Asia.

Elijah Muhammad, the "messenger of Allah" leader of the Black Muslims, claims to have received the divine word directly from Allah. He teaches

that Christianity, Judaism and Islam were sent to whites.

One federal judge has ruled that the Black Muslims are a religious group. Another is deliberating a similar case.

Rejected by Orthodox

However, orthodox Muslim groups in America have rejected the Black Muslims as not related to Islam. The American Islamic Assn., a U.S. Canadian Muslim organization, has said Elijah's group is not truly Muslim.

An American orthodox Muslim spokesman, Ahmad Kamal, president of the Jamiat al Islam Humanitarian Foundation, has this to say:

"Orthodox Muslims believe in the Virgin Birth, the immaculate Conception and the Ascension of Jesus Christ. It is not a rejection of

the humanity of Jesus Christ. It is a rejection of the divinity of Jesus Christ."

Elijah Muhammad (Elijah Muhammad's original name) is a Negro, which is said to be the "curse" of the Negro people. The Negro people have a curse upon them, said Muhammad, and that curse is that they are guided by a living prophet, and that prophet is Black Muslims. He is going to have much to answer for. His hate teachings, his dogma and doc-

trine of hatred is utterly non-Muslim. It is anti-Muslim."

Pilgrimage to Mecca

In 1959, Elijah Muhammad was permitted by the Muslim leadership to make a pilgrimage to the holy city of Mecca. Observers believe he could not have done it in the face of American Muslim opposition without powerful friends overseas.

C. Eric Lincoln, social philosophy professor at Clark College in Atlanta, who made a full-scale study of Black Muslimism, believes there is "good reason to believe the Black Muslims will soon be officially sheltered in the community of international Islam. It seems likely that they (Muslim theologians) will find the Black Muslims within the pale—a legitimate if somewhat heretical Muslim sect."

Last July, Federal Judge Bernita Matthews in Washington ruled that William X. Fulwood must be allowed to hold religious gatherings

at Lorton Reformatory, in Virginia, since Black Muslims are a religious group. She did not rule in favor of his request to correspond with Elijah Muhammad or receive newspapers carrying Muhammad's sermons.

Doctrine of Hate

Donald Clemmer, District of Columbia prisons director, had claimed a Fulwood sermon in 1960 caused a "touchy situation" at the reformatory, that Black Muslims preach a doctrine of hate. Fulwood's lawyer had claimed Fulwood was denied several rights and was harassed. Both sides have appealed.

When riots broke out a little later last summer at the Lorton Youth Center, Clemmer appealed that the court ruling restricted him, and there was some Congressional objection to the ruling. Another judge ruled the two cases were not related since Fulwood was at the reformatory, not the youth center.

In Buffalo, Federal Judge John O. Henderson has had under deliberation since November the appeal of five Black Muslims in Attica State Prison to strike down a state ruling that they cannot conduct services because their

movement is not a religion. Suspect Missionaries

At San Quentin Prison in California, where a Black Muslim was shot dead by a guard during a melee among Negro and white inmates in February, Associate Warden Dale Frady said the number of Black Muslim inmates there varied usually from 70 upward.

At California's Folsom Prison, there was a prisoner uprising in February, 1961, over informal mess hall segregation in which some Muslims were said to be involved. Asked about recruiting, Assistant Warden Arthur Oliver said he believed most Black Muslims in prison were recruited after they got there.

Author William Worthy Rochester Trial Pending says many of the prison inmates who were Muslim converts learned of the movement through a column Muhammad wrote for several years in a nationally circulated weekly newspaper. He said Malcolm X, now Muhammad's chief lieutenant and New York and Washington leader, discovered the movement while doing a prison term for robbery and was indoctrinated even before getting out of prison in 1954 that

was demanding a cell facility.

Observers agree that the Black Muslims have a tremendous record of rehabilitation—released convicts who join stay away from crime. One big city urban league director has been quoted: "Frankly, I'd like to find some non-Muslims who are as well behaved."

At Rochester, the trial is pending of 15 Black Muslims charged with inciting to riot and assault in an incident in which two policemen tried to investigate, at one of their secret meetings, a report that someone inside had a weapon.

At Los Angeles, a trial of Black Muslims grew out of a street riot a year ago in which a Muslim was killed and several Muslims and policemen wounded. City officials called the situation dynamic then. Today, Police Director John Power says: "The Black Muslim group is giving a natural death here."

The June 24, 1963 edition of the "New York Herald Tribune", a daily newspaper published in New York, New York, contained an article reflecting that Minister Malcolm X (Little) of the Nation of Islam spoke at the Abyssinian Baptist Church, New York, New York, on Sunday night, June 23, 1963, where he was introduced by United States Congressman Adam Clayton Powell, Pastor of the church. Malcolm X is the first speaker in a series of ten one-hour forums being sponsored in the church by Mr. Powell on the subject "The Negro Revolution".

In his speech, Malcolm X "heaped scorn" on some Negro leaders accusing them of betraying their race by seeking integration. He also claimed, according to the article, that "tricky Supreme Court" decision would only hurl the Negro from ancient slavery into modern slavery."

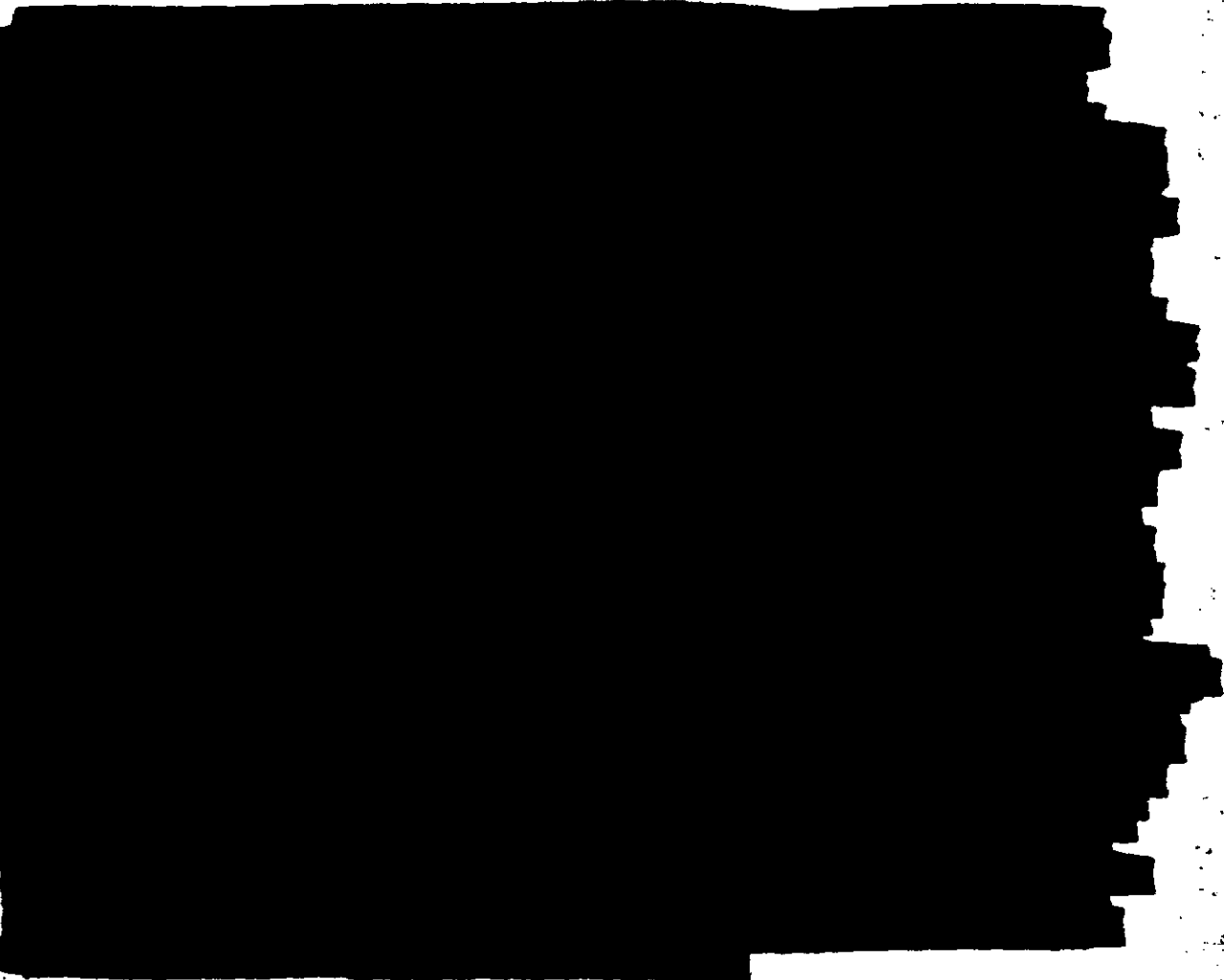

Malcolm X, In DC, Raps Jackie, Floyd, Dr. King

WASHINGTON — The Rev. Mr. Martin Luther King Jr., Jackie Robinson and Floyd Patterson were scathingly criticized here by Minister Malcolm X of the Black Muslims movement as the unwitting tools of white liberals.

On his arrival here to assume leadership of this city's Black Muslims, Malcolm X told reporters that Mr. King's program of passive resistance to segregation had taken a turn in its course that was not planned or expected by liberal white "inspirers" who, he contended, gave financial backing to the integration leader.

Use of Children

These white liberals, the Black Muslim leader said, believed they could direct the King program into peaceful avenues. King and other Negro leaders, he added, can only go as far as their liberal white supporters permit them.

Commenting on the children

arrested and jailed in Birmingham, Minister Malcolm X said "Real men don't put their children on the firing line."

He asserted that the great majority of Negroes protesting in Birmingham have refused to accept Mr. King's program of non-violence.

"The lesson of Birmingham is that the Negroes have lost their fear of the white man's reprisals and will react today with violence, if provoked," he declared. "This could happen anywhere in the country today."

The Black Muslim leader said Robinson and Patterson went to Birmingham, acting inadvertently in the interest of white liberals who "hope these men will head the next column away from trouble."

MALCOLM said that on the Huntley-Brinkley Program that would be on radio that evening, it was stated that the Muslims had met MALCOLM in limousines although MALCOLM said such was false and that a brother had picked him up in a station wagon. MALCOLM said that he told the reporters he wanted to verify two things and that he, MALCOLM, was not the PR man among Muslims and that they insulted him when they referred to him as the heir apparent. MALCOLM said he told the reporters he was in Washington to teach the religion of Islam as taught by ELIJAH MUHAMMAD and the meetings would start on Sunday for their people exclusively as they were going to have like a family meeting. He said the meeting would be to iron out their own differences and look over their own problems. MALCOLM commented that the local newspapers there didn't carry his interview just like he gave it. MALCOLM said they did ask him about the predictions of violence the Negro leaders have been making concerning the race issue. MALCOLM commented that ELIJAH MUHAMMAD had been teaching them for 20 years that this was coming about and now the Negro leaders are just coming to say the same thing that ELIJAH has been telling them for 20 years.

MALCOLM told ELIJAH that he took the ball (in Washington, D.C.) for 4 weeks and that there is a strong sympathy among the masses. He said it was not so much among the upper crust class type but the little ones are for ELIJAH. ELIJAH said that they, the little ones, are the ones they are after. Concerning the meeting on Sunday in Washington, MALCOLM said that there are Africans, Asians and so forth from the Bahamas and if some of them do come to the meeting, he asked ELIJAH how they should be handled. ELIJAH told MALCOLM not to turn them down but be careful what he said. MALCOLM explained to ELIJAH that he desired ELIJAH to know what had transpired.

Malcolm X Scores Kennedy on Racial Policy

Says He Is 'Wrong Because His Motivation Is Wrong'

WASHINGTON, May 18 —

Malcolm X attacked President Kennedy today for the manner in which he has dealt with the Birmingham crisis and with race relations in general.

Malcolm X is the New York and Washington leader of the Black Muslims, Negro separatist movement.

His attack on President Kennedy contained the following specific accusations:

"President Kennedy did not send troops to Alabama when dogs were biting black babies. He waited three weeks until the situation exploded. He then sent troops after the Negroes had demonstrated their ability to defend themselves."

"In his talk with Alabama editors [last Monday] Kennedy did not urge that Negroes be treated right because it is the right thing to do. Instead, he said that if the Negroes aren't well treated the Muslims would become a threat. He urged a change not because it is right but because the world is watching this country. Kennedy is wrong because his motivation is wrong."

"Instead of attacking the Ku Klux Klan and the White Citizens' Committees, Kennedy attacked Islam, a religion. Although he is a member of the Roman Catholic faith, which has always complained of discrimination at the hands of the

Protestants, he did not open his mouth in defense of the Negroes. We don't want to mix with the whites and he therefore attacked us as extremists."

Malcolm X expressed his criticism of the President outside the office of Representative Edith Green, Democrat of Oregon, in response to reporters' questions.

Mrs. Green, chairman of an Education subcommittee, had just discussed with him the Black Muslims' views on race relations and juvenile delinquency.

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ing that Malcolm X mentioned, President Kennedy and Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy suggested that the failure of the nonviolent movement for Negro rights might spur Negro extremist groups such as the Black Muslims.

Several of the editors reported later that the President had expressed concern about Negro extremism and had stressed that violence might easily follow the failure of moderate efforts.

Malcolm X told the reporters today that he had not suggested any new legislation on racial relations to Mrs. Green. He declared:

"As Muslims we have analyzed all such legislation and found that none has solved the racial problem, from the Emancipation Proclamation to the Supreme Court decision. It is all hypocrisy. Nothing was solved."

He said he told Mrs. Green that in the Black Muslim view juvenile delinquency among the Negroes would always be a problem until the "image of the black man is changed in the black man's mind."

"We are not interested in changing the white man's image of the black man," he said.

Two members of the District of Columbia's Commission on Juvenile Delinquency and a member of the President's Committee on Juvenile Delinquency also attended the meeting with Mrs. Green.



A Talk With Gregory

Nobody around here has found much to laugh about in the Birmingham crisis. But comedian Dick Gregory, who spent four nights in a Birmingham jail, manages to get off a few funnies about his experience.

"I was in a cell with 500 other people," he quips. "We had wall-to-wall us. There were so many of us there wasn't enough brutality to go around."

Gregory, who got to the top by "saying out loud what the whites and the Negroes have been whispering to each other for 100 years," came here to do a benefit show for a settlement house.

Still nursing a sore arm suffered when, he says, four guards beat him, he has enlisted for the duration in the civil rights fight. He went into Greenwood, Miss. and Birmingham not as a celebrity, but "as an individual first, an American second, and a Negro third." He got arrested with 850 others for parading without a permit.

"I have three children. The Southern Negroes are fighting for them. It's my problem, too. I'm involved," he says.

He regards Birmingham as a victory for his people.

"Whenever a Negro stands up and says this has to stop, not tomorrow, not next year, but today, it's a victory. We've had a sleeping bear under the couch for 100 years, and he woke up. Everybody knew he was there, although they pretended they didn't, and now he jumped up, and he's hungry and he's vicious."

He thinks the Kennedy Administration made more mistakes in Birmingham than in any other situation.

"They had no more legal right to send troops in last Sunday than they did two weeks before. Everyone in America knows now we have found a formula for getting troops in—stab a white man, turn over a white cab and burn some houses, and they'll come."

He thinks it was "great" to send the children into the demonstrations. "You couldn't keep those kids out of the line. It's the first time in history that the police called up people in the middle of the night and told them their kids were in jail and they were proud."

Gregory stood up for Malcolm X, the Black Muslim leader, whose extremism the Kennedy

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Administration frankly fears. To its consternation, Malcolm X held a Capitol Hill press conference the other day outside the office of Rep. Green (D-Ore.). Mrs. Green invited him to testify before her subcommittee on juvenile delinquency, then decided to hold a conference with him in her office. It went on for almost two hours.

Malcolm X is a tall, solemn young man. He was preceded to the microphones by his public relations consultant, Dolph Thompson, who counselled the assembled reporters to be "objective" and not to debate with Malcolm X because "it has been our experience that many news people are not equipped to deal with Malcolm X in a debate . . . They try to defend white folks and such."

Malcolm X then stepped forward and berated President Kennedy for not sending in troops "while dogs were biting black babies," and Martin Luther King for "trying to please the white folks."

The solution, he says, is for the black man to change his image of himself. No good will come of cooperation.

Dick Gregory says Malcolm X is "a brilliant young man" and that the religious character of the Black Muslims has been ignored:

"Look at the Black Muslims this way: I have a corn and I go to the doctor and he takes it off, and then I put my foot into the same tight shoe and it comes back. So what are you going to talk about first, the corn or the shoe?"

Gregory hasn't studied the situation of his people in Washington too closely yet, but he thinks perhaps the Negro here has job security but no money.

"He's got the name and the prestige and the feeling, but man, he hasn't got the buck to carry through. I talk to a woman in St. Louis and she tells me her son is in the government, with the Agriculture Dept. It turns out he's a janitor."

He does not take Adam Clayton Powell's leadership seriously because Powell's a politician and "when a man becomes a politician, he's a different animal altogether."

Gregory is hopeful about the future: "This thing will break overnight." Meanwhile, he takes a dim view of press coverage of the strife: "Man, you read Time magazine about Birmingham, and he's the picking up a Ku Klux Klan scratchsheet."

Malcolm X In D. C. With Solution To Crime Rate

WASHINGTON —(UPI) —A tall, scholarly-looking impeccably-dressed young man who calls himself "Malcolm X" arrived here to take charge of efforts to expand the Black Muslim movement in the nation's capital.

At an airport news conference which began calmly, but ended on a rather stormy note, Malcolm X asserted that:

—He is not the "Number 2 man" in the Black Muslim movement, as he has often been described in the press, nor is he "heir apparent" to the movement's leader, Elijah Muhammad. But he has been

designated to take charge of here, as well as the one in New York.

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Malcolm X Terms Dr. King's Tactics Futile

WASHINGTON, May 10 — Malcolm X, the Eastern leader of the Black Muslim movement, denounced today the use of Negro children in the Birmingham demonstrations.

"Real men," he said, "don't put their children on the firing line."

The Black Muslim leader criticized the campaign of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. as an exercise in futility and an erroneous approach to the problem of race relations. The Black Muslims advocate the complete separation of the Negro and white races as the only rational solution.

Malcolm X arrived in Washington yesterday to take over Black Muslim leadership in the nation's capital. He will retain leadership of the New York branch and maintain residences in the two cities.

Plans Meeting

In addition to assuming the duties of the Black Muslim temple here, Malcolm X intends to conduct a series of weekly mass meetings reserved exclusively for Negroes. At the meetings he will discuss ways and means of reducing juvenile delinquency, crime, drunkenness and other social evils in the Negro community, which represents 54 per cent of Washington's population.

Discussing the Birmingham demonstrations in an interview, Malcolm X described Dr. King's desegregation program as a "scenario" that was ending in a way not intended by liberal white "inspirers" who, he contended, thought they could direct the demonstrations into peaceful channels.

The liberal whites, Malcolm X contends, help finance Dr. King's movement and those of other established Negro leaders. These leaders, the Black Muslim argued, can only go as far

as their liberal white supporters will permit them.

Malcolm X asserted that the original Birmingham demonstrations rarely exceeded fifty persons. He said the picture had changed radically when Negro bystanders, not under orders of Dr. King's movement, lost their tempers over Birmingham police methods and joined in the fray.

The Black Muslim asserted that the great majority of the demonstrators were Negroes who refused to accept Dr. King's doctrine of nonviolence.

"The lesson of Birmingham," he said, "is that the Negroes have lost their fear of the white man's reprisals and will react today with violence, if provoked. This could happen anywhere in the country today."

"The liberal whites miscalculated in Birmingham," he said.

"They misread the prevailing mood among the Negroes and did not understand that the Negro mass will no longer stand by passively at the sight of police brutality.

"That's why Jackie Robinson and Floyd Patterson are going down to Birmingham. The liberal whites hope these men will head the next columns away from trouble."

Malcolm X said the white Southerners were more forthright and courageous in their opposition to desegregation and integration than the "hypocritical liberal whites in the North."

The white Southerners are standing and facing the problem, whereas the northern Liberals, he continued, give lip service to desegregation and flee from the realities of the problem.

"The northern liberals publicly advocate desegregation but flee to the suburbs when the Negroes approach," he said. Washington was desegregated. What happened? The whites fled to the suburbs."

Malcolm X opens drive in Washington

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A tall, scholarly-looking impeccably dressed young Negro who calls himself "Malcolm X" ar-

rived here yesterday to take charge of efforts to expand the Black Muslim movement in the nation's capital.

At an airport news conference which began calmly but ended on a rather stormy note, Malcolm X asserted that:

"The black man is fed up with the inability of white liberals to solve racial problems in America," he said. "Unless something is done soon, I am afraid we will have a racial explosion — and a racial explosion is more deadly than an atomic explosion."

He said the "explosion" might come in Washington or "anywhere else in the country where black people are fed up with white hypocrisy."

He said the "white press" tells lies when it reports that the Black Muslims preach race hatred.

What the Black Muslims really advocate, he said, is not "bloodshed" and certainly not "integration," but rather a "separation" of the races, with black men given a special territory of their own in the United States and full government financing to make it economically strong and liveable.

"The government should subsidize everything we need to solve our own problems," he said.

"How many Black Muslims are there in the United States today?" a reporter asked.

"I don't know," Malcolm X replied with a smile. "But there will eventually be 20 million."

Malcolm X Starting Drive in Washington

WASHINGTON, May 9

Malcolm X arrived today to take over the leadership of the Black Muslim movement in the capital, where race relations have been causing anxiety.

Malcolm X said that he would continue as the leader of the movement in New York City and that he would maintain a home there as well as here. The local Black Muslim leader has been relieved of his duties because leaders of the movement say that he is unable to expand the movement in Washington.

Malcolm X described race relations in the nation as explosive. He said that unless the white majority acted swiftly to extend full civil rights to Negroes the situation could culminate in bloodshed. The extent of the Muslim movement here is a matter of speculation; the group declines to disclose its size. However, it maintains a mosque on Fourth Street, N.W.

"Birmingham," Malcolm X contended, "is an example of what can happen when the Negroes rely on the whites to solve their problems for them. The whites will never open the doors to the Negroes, who must learn to stand on their own feet, rely on themselves to improve their human condition. It is only by separating themselves from the white majority and leading their own lives that the Negroes can avoid situations which produce Birmingham."

The Black Muslim leader said that "the Negroes in this country are fed up with their lot and the refusal of the whites to give them their rights."

"When a situation has reached the point that it has in Birmingham—something must give," he said. "It can't continue."

Malcolm X said that he intended to conduct all-Negroes mass meetings each Sunday evening in Washington. By excluding whites, he asserted, the Negroes can discuss their problem without embarrassment, and reach the necessary conclusions. Fifty-four per cent of this city's 752,956 persons are Negroes, according to the Census of 1962.

The solution for the Negroes in Washington, according to Malcolm X, is to embrace Islam, the religion of the Moslems. Elijah Muhammed, the national leader, has suppressed alcohol, prostitution, narcotics, juvenile delinquency and crime among his followers, Malcolm X said. This behavior pattern, and not that offered by Christianity is the one for the Negroes, he continued.

"By 1970, 90 per cent of the Negroes will be converted to Islam. Christianity is a white man's religion. It is always emphasizing the role of the white man. Islam does not recognize color; it only recognizes the human personality," he said.

The leaders of the established Negro organizations, Malcolm asserted, have performed poorly, judged by results on civil rights.

"We [the Black Muslims] don't do a lot of talking. We shall be judged by our performance," he said, continuing:

"We don't preach hatred and violence. But we believe that if a four-legged or two-legged dog attacks a Negro he should be killed. We only believe in defending ourselves against attack. What is hatred? We are only telling the truth about how the white man treats the black man."

"Elijah Muhammed has a plan to separate the 20,000,000 Negroes from the white majority, but it is for him to speak. If the Negroes can't return to Africa and can't get their rights here, there should be a divorce with a property settlement. That means the Negroes should receive a part of this country where they can live their own lives."

MALCOLM continued that he has been involved in so many things that his nerves are about shattered. He stated he had diarrhea the first of the week and it was worse than the diarrhea he had had in Arabia. MALCOLM stated he had called the Messenger and was going to ask about hiding out for a couple of days, but the Messenger had mentioned to him about the importance of this going on without observation on Sunday and someone would be there at that time. MALCOLM said he is going into that and will do it after Sunday.

Malcolm X On a Mission

The second in command of the Black Muslim movement will return to Washington this week in a campaign to reduce crime among Negroes in the Nation's capital.

Malcolm X, deputy of Muslim leader Elijah Muhammed, said he would arrive in Washington on Thursday or Friday. He will initiate a "revival-type program" aimed at eliminating "the deteriorating moral condition of our people in Washington."

Mr. X accused police of breaking into Muslim mosques in Rochester, N. Y., and Newark, N. J. In Newark, he said, police tried to enter the mosque "on the pretext that there was a bomb in there." Muslims refused to let them in. "You could have had one of the worst race riots in Newark," he said.

"You will have a nasty situation from here on in," he said, "in any case where police try to break into our sanctuaries. It won't be like in Birmingham, Ala.—turn the other cheek. You won't have that with us."

In the 1960 census, Negroes comprised 54 per cent of Washington's population of 785,956. Police figures show that Negroes made up about 80 per cent of all arrests of adults last year.

Members of the Black Muslims sect are pledged not to drink, smoke, or carry weapons.

The Black Muslims, he said, speak "directly to the Negro in the community."

"Our goal is eliminating the frame of mind that makes us turn toward alcohol, dope, gambling and crime. We will spread a message among our people."

The campaign will be centered at "Mosque No. 4," the central Washington temple of the Black Muslims. The building, at 1519 4th St., N. W., holds 400 to 500 persons, Mr. X said.

Leader Ordered Him to Capital

Sunday revival meetings may also be held at a hall in the WUST radio station building at 815 V St., N. W. That auditorium holds an estimated 1,000 persons.

Mr. X said he would stay in Washington until Mr. Muhammed tells him to leave. He said the Muslim leader had ordered him to go to the capital.

The Los Angeles trial began on Tuesday. The 14 defendants are charged with assaulting police officers who stopped a car to question two members of the sect. In fighting that followed the incident, one Muslim was killed and two severely injured. Several policemen were badly hurt.

Mr. X said that he will give the facts of the trial to foreign correspondents and the five Negro Congressmen in Washington. "The deed that was committed out here against us was so illegal and atrocious that they're afraid to tell the facts," he said.

In Washington yesterday, Deputy Police Chief George R. Wallrodt said he had not spoken to Mr. X and did not know what his plans are. "We have a Black Muslim mosque here," he said. "In previous years they've held many meetings there. We've never had any trouble with them in this city."

Prepared For Campaign

Mr. X made his plans known from Los Angeles, where he is attending the trial of 14 Black Muslims accused of attacking police in a disturbance last April. He said he had been in Washington from last Sunday to Wednesday to prepare for the campaign.

"The government seems unable to correct the situation," Mr. X said. "Negro leaders there also seem unable to correct it. The constant criticism by outsiders

Black Muslims Fill Post Here

No. 2 Man Sent To D. C. Mosque

Malcolm X, No. 2 leader of the Black Muslim organization, is the new minister of the sect's Muhammad's Mosque No. 4 at 1519 Fourth street N.W.

In a telephone interview from his New York headquarters today, Malcolm X said his assignment to Washington "is effective as of now."

"I intend to hold a press conference next week and spell out the purposes for which Mr. Elijah Muhammad is transferring me to duties in Washington," Malcolm X said. "I will spell out his program for our followers in the District of Columbia."

May Live Here

Lucius X. Brown, former minister of Mosque No. 4, will be transferred to other duties, Malcolm X said. For the time being, Malcolm X said he will divide his attentions between the District Mosque and Mosque No. 7 in New York City.

"I might establish a residence in Washington" he said. Malcolm X said one purpose of his transfer here is to "help in the fight against crime and juvenile delinquency."

"It's almost impossible for the police to prevent crime in the Negro community," he said. "The so-called Negro leaders never help the community lift itself by its own boot straps, so to speak."

The Black Muslim future program in Washington will attempt to counteract the influence of "professional Negroes... the Uncle Tom leaders" of the community, Malcolm X said.

"The Negro Uncle Toms are only able to pose as leaders as long as no real leaders exist," he said. "There is more leadership among the masses, and we feel we have the pulse of the public because we work with the masses."

Malcolm X said the Black Muslims will "go into the community and restore the Negro's confidence that will cause him to lean away from crime."

"This can't be left up to the greedy politicians and Negro Uncle Toms," he said. "The only reason these people are leaders now is because they have blackmailed the white man into giving them positions in the community. If they were not Negroes, they couldn't hold these positions anywhere else."

No Favors Sought

Malcolm X said the Muslims will advance a program of co-operative action on crime and juvenile delinquency here.

"We will co-operate with other groups... be they black or white," he said. "We are not looking for positions from the white man and will co-operate with him if he wants to help."

[redacted] was in contact with a brother minister believed to be MALCOLM X LITTLE, Minister of Muhammad's Mosque Number Seven, New York City, and mentioned that the "New York Times" article had one statement that was a "rough one". MALCOLM stated he was aware of what the "devil" says for purposes of division; that the devil has only one nature, divide and conquer. [redacted] agreed and added they could offset it with all the releases that are being sent out. It was indicated that [redacted] told MALCOLM he could say he read such and such in the "New York Times" but that he was heard to say that such and such is the case; that MALCOLM should let them know that he is still dependent on ELIJAH MUHAMMAD. MALCOLM stated he was talking to representatives of "News Week" Magazine yesterday and had told them that he takes orders from them (probably the Royal Family of ELIJAH MUHAMMAD). MALCOLM continued that [redacted] told him he had read that and they had been discussing it at "Life" Magazine. MALCOLM stated he had told [redacted] he takes orders from anyone in the messenger's family, "not only his sons and daughters, but his cousins".

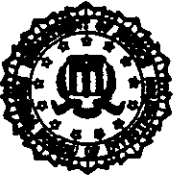

Malcolm "X" was scheduled to speak on the teachings of Elijah Muhammad and the Nation of Islam (NOI) in the Township Auditorium, Columbia, South Carolina, at 7:30 P.M., on April 17, 1963.

On April 16, 1963, the Columbia Township Board of Commissioners, acting on a motion proposed by the Richland County, South Carolina, Delegation, cancelled the Muslim contract to hold the meeting in the Township Auditorium, basing the cancellation on the fear of "possible disorders."

b7c Subsequent arrangements were made to hold the meeting in a Negro Masonic Hall in nearby West Columbia, South Carolina. On the afternoon of the meeting, April 17, 1963, [REDACTED] was advised that the Masonic Hall would not be available for the meeting.

The meeting was held on April 17, 1963, in "Muhammad's Temple of Islam," the regular NOI meeting place on Waverly Street, in Columbia, South Carolina.

At the beginning of his speech, Malcolm "X" castigated the "city fathers" for not allowing the meeting to be held in the Township Auditorium.

During the speech, attended by approximately seventy (70) Negroes, Malcolm "X" stated that it would be difficult to estimate the number of Muslims in South Carolina, inasmuch as the best part of the tree was the root underground; and that, when fighting for freedom, you are engaged in a war; and, when fighting a war in enemy territory, you never wear a uniform.

He stated that there is no such thing as a Democratic or Republican party in the United States; that the political battle is between the Conservatives and the Northern Liberals; and that the Liberals have perfected the use of the Negroes against the Conservatives and, therefore, the whites remain in control.

Malcolm "X" stated that the Muslims advocate separation, which he defined as being a voluntary action between two equals, and described segregation as a situation that is forced on an inferior.

He cited Harlem in New York City, where the whites control everything, and it is called integration; therefore, integration still keeps the white man on top.

He concluded by stating that the Muslims want a future for the black man, and that the United States Government is in trouble all over the world, and is a sinking ship of state, and the Muslims don't want to board such a ship.

Malcolm X Raps L. A. Press As Favoring Cops In Trial

LOS ANGELES — Malcolm X, national representative of Muslim Spiritual Leader Elijah Muhammad, denounced the local press for its one-sided coverage of the assault trial of 14 Muslims who were victims of an attack upon their Mosque in April, 1962.

He pointed out that the daily newspapers in Los Angeles have been faithfully printing what police officers and other prosecution witnesses have said on direct examination, but have been totally omitting defense Atty. Earl Broady's cross examination, which the Muslim minister described as brilliant.

"Anybody reading these papers," he said, "would think we didn't have any lawyers. They print everything these policemen say as if it went unchallenged."

Malcolm, who is currently involved in switching his base of operations from New York to Washington, arrived in time to hear the testimony of police officer Donald L. Weese, who reportedly admitted killing Ronald Stokes and shooting four other men, all of whom were unarmed.

DESCRIBES SHOOTING

A chill of horror and disbelief swept over the courtroom as Weese described how he shot the five unarmed Negroes and was still pulling the trigger at Stokes as he fell.

Then he allegedly hit another man lying on the ground in the head with his gun before reloading for more action.

When Weese testified under cross examination that he shot to stop Ronald Stokes, Broady referred him to his testimony before the Los Angeles County Grand Jury. Weese said...

Malcolm X Denounces JFK On Civil Rights

WASHINGTON — President Kennedy was bitterly denounced by Malcolm X, Black Muslim leader.

He made his denunciation to the press after discussing Black Muslim views on race and juvenile delinquency with Representative Edith Green, Oregon Democrat, who is chairman of the House education subcommittee.

"President Kennedy did not send troops to Alabama when dogs were biting black babies," Malcolm X said. "He waited three weeks until the situation exploded.

"He then sent troops after the Negroes demonstrated their ability to defend themselves."

Malcolm X said President Kennedy did not tell the Alabama editors that he talked with that Negroes ought be treated right because it is the right thing to do.

"But instead, he said that if Negroes are not well treated the Muslims will become a

threat," he declared. "He urged change not because it is right but because the world is watching this country. Kennedy is wrong because his motivation is wrong."

Malcolm X accused President Kennedy of attacking Islam, a religion, but "did not open his mouth in defense of Negroes."

"Kennedy is a member of the Catholic faith, which has always complained of discrimination at the hands of Protestants," he claimed.

"We Muslims don't want to mix with whites," Malcolm X said, and on that account the Black Muslims are labeled "extremists."

Asked if he had proposed any new civil rights legislation, he replied:

"As Muslims we have analyzed all such legislation and found that none has solved the racial problem, from the Emancipation Proclamation to the Supreme Court decision. It is all hypocrisy. Nothing has been solved."

Assertive Spirit Stirs Negroes, Ruts Vigor in Civil Rights Drive

Racial Pride Increases Throughout U. S. 'Black Nationalism' Is Viewed as Powerful Force for Change

By M. S. HANDLER

A new assertive mood, characterized by some Negro leaders as "Black Nationalism," is spreading throughout the United States.

This spirit is usually identified by the general public with the Black Muslims, the extremist group dedicated to the establishment of a Negro nation carved out of America.

But, in the opinion of many responsible Negro observers, this new mood also lies behind movements with much greater Negro support—the voter registration drive in Greenwood, Miss., and the assault by the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. on segregation in Birmingham, Ala., to cite two examples.

For the term Black Nationalism is now used by Negroes to embrace a multitude of feelings, many of them contradictory, but all having one concept in common—identification of American Negro population as a group with a common heritage of suffering and achievement, engaged in mass action to compel the white majority to recognize and implement their legal rights.

A Way of Life

A Negro social philosopher, Dr. C. Eric Lincoln of Clark College in Atlanta, explains that Black Nationalism developed because "the Negro is required to be Negro before, and sometimes to the exclusion of, anything else."

But Dr. Lincoln says that this new mood goes beyond earlier appeals for equality.

"Black Nationalism is more than courage and rebellion," he says. "It is a way of life," rejecting white symbols and culture and emphasizing pride in being black.

As yet Black Nationalism has not developed into an organized political force, although the potentiality worries both Republicans and Democrats.

Democrat Takes Note

Louis Murkin, a Negro, who is deputy chairman of the Democratic National Committee, notes the rising demands of his race to improve its lot and says Negro aspirations can be summed up in one phrase: "White man, move over."

Negro leaders differ in their assessment of this new mood, but they agree that it is a powerful new force in American public life.

It is threatening the old order of Negro leaders, the business and professional class and ministers. It is questioning the co-leadership of liberal whites in the struggle against discrimination.

Moreover, it is helping destroy the stereotypes of the blackless Negro as well as the Uncle Tom.

Heartaches For Some

It is bringing new heartaches as Negro parents find they no longer understand their children, who are filled with new racial pride. It has also brought to the surface widespread hatred for the white man.

One highly placed Negro leader, who has dedicated his life to integration within the present framework of society, sadly remarked:

"There is a bit of hatred in every Negro's heart. The Negro would not be hurt if he did not resent the oppression to which he has been subjected. But this feeling would be stifled if the Negro were to receive the equal status he is entitled to as a citizen of this country."

Black Nationalism as a mood is to be found in varying degrees in all segments of the Negro population, but only the Black Muslims expound a complete renunciation of coexistence with the whites.

Malcolm X, the dynamic leader of the Black Muslims in New York, contends that the Negroes "have already succeeded" emotionally and intellectually since American society.

To this, Roy Wilkins, the executive secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, replies:

"Wash. Ninety-nine per cent of the Negroes want in."

In an interview published this week in U. S. News & World Report, Mr. Wilkins described the dominant mood of the Negroes today as "very great impatience" with the slow progress toward the "status of full citizenship." He said the Black Muslims are an outgrowth of this sentiment. But he pointed out that the Muslims' "idea of black for black has always been around in one form or another."

However, even the most bitter opponent of the Black Muslims agrees that they have contributed to the growth in Negro racial pride, group identification, self-respect and the conscious worth of Negro values.

The Black Muslims have never published any figures about their membership, but estimates have ranged from as low as 25,000 to as high as 250,000, with the number often put as 70,000. None of these estimates, however, is based on verifiable data. There are more than 18,000,000 Negroes in the country.

Followers of Islam

The Muslims assert that they are faithful followers of Islam, a claim that raises some doubts among their opponents. The Muslims note, however, that Elijah Muhammed, head of the movement, has made a pilgrimage to Mecca, a journey reserved for Islam's faithful.

The Black Muslims reject Christianity as a white man's religion imposed on the Negroes to insure their prolonged servitude and inferior status. Christianity promises rewards

to the hereafter, and according to the Black Muslims this belief is designed to condition Negroes to accept their inferior status on this earth. But all the old-line Negro leaders insist that the Christian churches are the most powerful force in the Negro community, without which no gains can be made.

The Black Muslims are organized in a vertical chain of command that makes for authoritarian control vested in Elijah Muhammed, who resides in Chicago. A highly trained praetorian guard, called Fruit of Islam, assures almost military discipline and unquestioning execution of orders.

This elite was recruited in part in penitentiaries among prisoners who were later rehabilitated.

Malcolm X, who is of impressive bearing and is endowed with a shrewd mind, today overshadows Elijah Muhammed.

Rising Popularity

Other Negro leaders are very conscious of the growing popularity of Malcolm X. While they reject his contention that alienation of the Negroes from the American social order is "an accomplished fact," they concede that he is able.

They also grudgingly admit that the puritanical code of the movement—its prohibition of smoking, drinking, gambling, prostitution, and narcotics, its destroying the old symbols affixed to Negroes.

The obscure origins of the Black Muslims used to generate derision. But one visit to the Black Muslim restaurant on Lenox Avenue is enough to silence those who make fun of the movement. Waiters dressed in immaculate white jackets and black trousers move about quietly. Mirrors, glass and tables, chairs and floor are all kept antiseptically clean.

The old-line leaders also note that Black Muslim ideology, which preaches racial pride, is sweeping Negro communities.

For example, a distinguished Negro who is committed to a "social contract" between the white and Negro populations tells the story of his daughter, the only Negro pupil in an upper middle class school in Westchester County. Though friendly and helpful at school, white pupils refused to attend her Christmas party. She was deeply hurt but said nothing. Several months later, without the knowledge of her parents she wrote a moving essay for school on the meaning of being black.

Warns of Dangers

James Farmer, executive secretary of the Congress of Racial Equality warns of the perils of Black Nationalism. CORE is the organization identified with the sit-ins, freedom rides and voters' registration.

"There is the possibility that Black Nationalism could develop into hate of everything that is different," he says. "How it turns out will depend on how successful the Negroes will be in bringing down the barriers to desegregation."

Whitney Moore Young Jr., executive director of the National Urban League, which has contributed greatly to equal job opportunity, assessed the situation even more seriously.

"In previous generations the Negro believed what is white is right," he said. "This was the standard to which the Negro aspired. This has changed. The Negro is taking a second look and is rejecting many of the white man's values and codes of behavior."

Mr. Young attributed the radical change in the Negro's attitude to the fact that "he no longer feels innately inferior to the white man."

This point was brought home to a white man who drove a few blocks out of his way to take a Negro home. As the Negro got out of the car, he turned and said:

"Thanks for the lift. It was mighty black of you."

Negroes are Divided

There seems to be a sharp cleavage between Negro intellectuals and Negro organization officials in their assessment of the Negro's viewpoint. The intellectuals are closer to James Baldwin, the Negro author, sharing his anger, despair and rage.

In his essay, "Letter From A Region In My Mind," Mr. Baldwin, said:

"The treatment accorded the Negro during the Second World War marks, for me, a turning point in the Negro's relation to America. To put it briefly, and somewhat too simply, a certain hope died, a certain respect for white Americans faded. One began to pity them, or to hate them."

Many New York City Negro intellectuals are categorical in their belief that the Negro fundamentally hates the white man.

They insist that this hatred is spreading as the entrenched white men in the North resort to more refined and resourceful techniques of confining the Negroes to black ghettos, denying them equal work opportunities and hospital facilities and arranging de facto school segregation and token desegregation of the major institutions of higher learning.

Dr. Kenneth Clark, Negro professor of psychology at the City College of New York, says "the Negro does not feel himself a part of this white dominated country, and there is no reason why he should concern himself with this country's international relations."

"There is a colossal indifference to the United States Government's foreign problems," he said. "If I were to talk to a Negro crowd about foreign af-

fairs people would say to me, 'man, what are you talking about?'"

Mr. Farmer says this lack of interest is due more to Negroes' preoccupation with their own problems than to a conscious withdrawal from the problems of the United States.

Thus students at the all-Negro Atlanta University said they were not interested in and did not favor the American Government's Cuban policy until last fall when war seemed near.

Asked why they changed their minds, one replied:

"Well we wanted to find out why we might have to get killed."

Widening Gulf

The evidence seems to indicate that the widening gulf between the dominant white majority and the Negro minority in the United States is paralleled by a growing rift separating the educated Negroes from the Negroes masses.

For example, Atlanta University students from rural districts said they had lost contact with their own families after a brief time at the university. They said they found it difficult to communicate when they returned home during the holidays.

Such alienation is found in all societies, but it apparently is more acute for the Negro because of his struggle for civil rights. Professor Samuel duBois Cook, Negro sociologist of Atlanta University, explains the effect of education on Negroes:

"In a sense the Negro's very progress tends to magnify his frustrations, insecurities, anxieties, tensions and pathetic dilemmas. For his unmet desires expand, his longings intensify, his expectations are greater, his level of aspiration soars, and his imagination and vision are more lucid, inspired and vivid. Accordingly, his disappointments are more bitter, his blocks more intolerable, his barriers more baffling and gnawing, suffering more poignant. Success aggravates failure. Failure erodes success."

Southern students publicly accept Dr. King's approach of non-violence as the guideline for all assaults on segregation.

Nevertheless, they seem attracted to the extremist views of Malcolm X, although reluctant to discuss them.

Leslie Dunbar, of the Southern Regional Council, one of the white men most intimately associated with Negro communities in the South, says it is difficult, if not impossible, to ascertain the true feelings and aspirations of the Negroes. He doubts whether the Negro leaders themselves are fully cognizant of "what the Negro masses want because, he says, the Negro almost instinctively hides his feelings, even from members of his own race."

Malcolm X goes even further: "Because of his special history the Negro has had to become a two-faced individual. I could take you to a round of meetings in one evening and you would find the same Negroes responding enthusiastically to the most divergent point of view on the same theme. And this is when he is among his own people."

But Malcolm X believes he knows where the Negro masses stand:

"The black masses in this

country are not divided, it is the leadership that is divided. The established Negro leaders have lulled the white man into believing everything is under control. There is a difference of night and day when a white man and a Negro say 'our country.' The white man means it. The Negro behaves like a house dog and wags his tail."

Malcolm X maintains that the Negroes should dispense with white liberal leadership and guidance in the civil rights fight. This view, which is shared in part by moderate Negroes, is based on two assumptions.

The first is that the Negroes have developed enough leaders capable of taking charge of their own struggle. The second is that the white liberal cannot be trusted because he is identified with the white man's power structure and when the chips are down will support the white man's interests.

The consensus among Negro leaders is that the key to the problem of race relations is the refusal and inability of the white majority to understand the prevailing mood of the Negro minority. There is no escape from blackness for the Negro, they said, and this goes for all Negroes regardless of their station in life.

Thus a Negro girl with Caucasian features, a graduate cum laude from Vassar, recalled that whenever her white college friends held a party they included her but always invited a Negro man as her escort. She knows this was done out of kindness, but to the Negro girl it meant there was no escape for her from her race. Now she is Negro-conscious and is working actively on racial problems.

Although Malcolm X regards the Negro Christian Ministry as an evil influence, he found it politically expedient to share the same platform with Representative Adam Clayton Powell, who is pastor of the Abyssinian Baptist Church, one of the largest Protestant congregations in the United States.

Malcolm X had no compunction on this score because Mr. Powell shares his opposition to whites in policy-making positions in Negro civil rights organizations.

Negro leaders believe there are other clues indicating a tactical shift by the Black Muslims to exploit the old-line Negro organizations.

Muhammad Speaks, the Black Muslim newspaper, has begun to report Mr. Powell's speeches with approval. It also published a lengthy interview with A. Philip Randolph, president of the Sleeping Car Porters Union.

There is no doubt in Mr. Farmer's mind that Malcolm X is beginning to emerge as a political power. Interviewed last Sunday on the WINS program, "News Conference," Mr. Farmer suggested that Mr. Powell might consider the Black Muslims a political threat to him and that this fear might explain his friendly public attitude toward Malcolm X.

Regardless of tactical shifts Malcolm X remains firm on one point:

"You cannot integrate the Negroes and the whites without bloodshed. It can't be done. The only peaceful way is for the Negroes and whites to separate."

He added that at the Mosque in Harlem, number Seven, there were 600 individuals in attendance.

MALCOLM indicated that members of MUHAMMAD's family should encourage MUHAMMAD to go to Egypt for a rest in order that he could get away from all the problems currently facing the NOI. (Chicago will follow through established sources for any specific information concerning any contemplated trip by ELIJAH MUHAMMAD in that regard and in the event such information is developed it will be appropriately handled).

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**MALCOLM X DISPUTES
NONVIOLENCE POLICY**

Malcolm X, the Eastern leader of the Black Muslim movement, charged last night that the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s policy of non-violence was "disarming" Negroes in their struggle for rights.

"The followers of Martin Luther King will cut each other from head to foot, but they will not do anything to defend themselves against the attacks of the white man," Malcolm X said in a television interview.

The interview, with Dr. Kenneth Clark, a professor of psychology at City College of New York, was recorded on tape for broadcast last night over stations WNDT in New York City and WGBH in Boston.

"King is the best weapon that the white man, who wants to brutalize Negroes, has ever gotten in this country, because he is setting up a situation where, when the white man wants to attack Negroes, they can't defend themselves because King has put this foolish philosophy—you're not supposed to fight or you're not supposed to defend yourself."

He said followers of Elijah Muhammad, the leader of the Muslim movement, "don't advocate violence, but Mr. Muhammad does teach us that any human being who is intelligent has the right to defend himself."

The June 4, 1963, edition of the "New York Herald Tribune", a daily newspaper published in New York, New York, contained a notation in the radio-television section, page 15, to the effect that at 10:30 p.m. on that date Television Channel 13 would have a special program called "Conversation With Malcolm", which would feature an interview with the "Black Muslim leader".

The June 5, 1963, edition of the "New York Herald Tribune" contained an article on page 18 relative to the appearance of Malcolm X (Little), described as a lieutenant of Elijah Muhammad, on Television Channel 13, WNYT from 10:30 to 11:00 p.m., June 4, 1963. Malcolm X was interviewed by Dr. Kenneth Clark, Psychology Professor at City College New York and an authority on the psychological effects of racial segregation.

According to the article Malcolm X talked of his childhood, young adulthood, his conversion to "Islam" in prison, the teachings of Elijah Muhammad, the Jews, and Dr. Martin Luther King. He classified the Christian society as "religious hypocrisy," he criticized liberals who put Negroes on the back and talk integration while thinking segregation, and he criticized Jews for exploiting Negroes by controlling 90% of the businesses in every Negro community. He also criticized Dr. Martin Luther King for having the support, financial and otherwise, of white people and declared that the masses of black people do not support Dr. King. He classified as a "sellout" the recent agreement negotiated by Dr. King in Birmingham, Alabama, during the racial crisis.

In regard to the teachings of Elijah Muhammad the article quoted Malcolm X as stating that "Mr. Muhammad teaches us to love each other," which, according to Malcolm X means "love our own kind".
