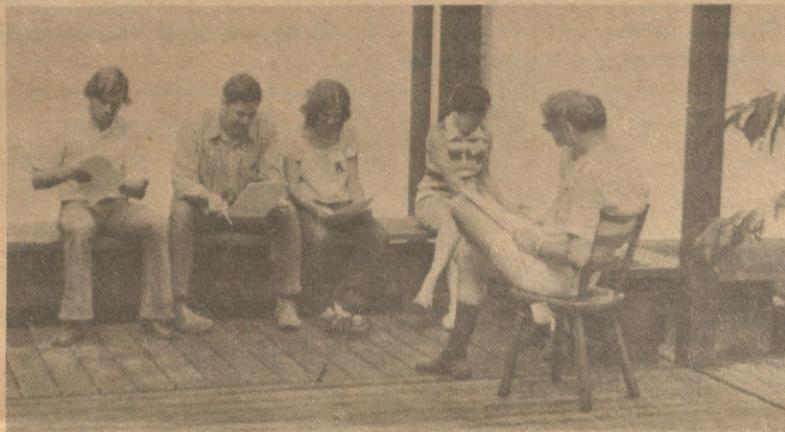
This summer the Bar-Disco was opened to the general public every Friday night. When the drinking age was lowered to eighteen on July 16 the gross income from the bar increased eighty per cent. The crowd was capacity which included filling the disco with an average crowd. Tables were set up to provide beer service because the coolers could not keep up. After three hours the beer was gone. In August the income was up again - another thirty per cent.

Plans were presented to Council which included extending the bar, adding a cooler, dishwasher, and ice machine. Also included in these plans was the idea of knocking out the wall and therefore extending the bar into the bookstore storeroom, doubling the bar space. Doing this the bar could handle the over-eighteens, leaving the Disco for others who wanted to come in and dance, listen to records, or just chat. Had these plans been approved at the time of presentation the

Bar-Disco renovations would have been completed for the fall term.

Council chose to delay approval until two weeks before the fall opening was planned. Thursday night these renovations were finished, forty-five minutes after the Bar opened. Only at the Ste. Hilaire Conference was approval given to extend the bar into the store-room.

Due to Council's slow action, those over eighteen will have to drink and dance amid plaster dust and concrete chips. Those under eighteen will just have to be patient. Then maybe the bar will have to be closed completely until renovations are completed.

A THINK WEEKEND

The leadership conference at Ste. Hilaire is not a wild weekend's party. Far from it. The purpose of the Ste. Hilaire conference is to provide an opportunity for the campus activity leaders to get together and plan the years ahead and to work out problems facing you, the student body. More im-

portant this is the only chance for the leaders to get to know the other leaders, their problems and ideas. If two heads are better than one, then twenty heads should be able to conquer all worldly problems except the war in Viet Nam. And they did.

For forty-eight hours the chairman of your activities thought, discussed and argued current and foreseeable campus problems. How do fifteen separate committees coordinate their scheduled activities without conflicts and large gaps of no action at all? Simple. You set up S.A.C.C. (Student Activities Coordinating Committee). Once these activities are coordinated how do you cover them - by communicating. This year there is no excuse. Activity leaders know exactly how this is done. Never again will people wonder why their activities were not photographed and reported. They will know who is to blame. How do you find out what's planned? The facilities available are obvious, not effectively used, but obvious. There are bulletin boards for posters and notices, "The Dram", and a sound system; all better than the most commonly used one - the campus grapevine.

When the activity plans and problems were settled, there was a down-to-earth dollars and sense one to be resolved. There the tears began to flow. There are X dollars available for activities and greater than X dollars wanted. So the conference resolved that the activity leaders will do the best for you with the dollars allotted to

them. Now it is up to you to come out and help and contribute any time or abilities.

To quote the S.D.B. constitution "The Student Discipline Board shall act as the judiciary wing of the Students' Council with authority awarded to Students' Council by McGill Senate to exercise disciplinary powers over an infraction of the By-laws of the Students' Society and over an offence committed by a student against University discipline provided that the offence was not committed while undergoing an examination or instruction under University Supervision." On paper it sounds good, but the board has met only once in the last year. The conclusions arrived at, at the conference, were, first, that policies would be formed to make this board more effective. Secondly, it was firmly stated that the rent-a-cops are ineffective. Hopefully action will be taken soon.

Sunday afternoon twenty weary, thought-exhausted people came back to Mac. Together they are better prepared to tackle the opportunities at hand. With mini-workshops planned monthly for further discussion on problems as they arrive, there is hope for better action in the future.

Life is not all work and no play at a conference. There are football games to be played, cider to be disposed of and on a hot night, why not take a swim? All these activities are just as important as formal discussion sessions. Each leader found that even though you are not sitting discussing topics you still cannot stop thinking about them.

Get Off

It seems a shame that there was no time arranged to inform the new students of the laws and traditions of Macdonald Campus. It has been the second year the rules concerning the oval have been overlooked.

For those new students, the oval is that area of land surrounded by Main Building, Brittain Hall and Stewart Hall.

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COUNCIL CORNER

Carefully following Robert's Rules of Order, the Council meeting was called to order. First on the agenda was approval of all the outstanding minutes. Progress was impeded due to the fact that the President had not read the minutes. After a brief spelling bee the minutes were approved.

As has been the practise in the past, Council looked into the possibilities of offering group insurance rates to individual students. However, Continental Casualty Insurance Company refused to offer the policy again as last year only fifty-five students applied for it. Consequently it was decided that if any student planned to break a leg he would have to get his own insurance.

A letter was received from the Assistant Registrar of McGill requesting that student representatives from Macdonald be recommended for the following Senate Committees:

The president reported on the happenings with the Dean's Selection Committee. At the only meeting held, it was agreed that the position be advertised in various scientific journals. In the interim Dr. Klinck has been appointed acting dean as well as acting Vice-Principal of Macdonald College.

Remember the special athletic fund set up which includes the anonymous donation, your extra ten dollar fee, plus money from the Graduate Society? A special committee was set up by Council to administer this fund. It includes:

- Athletic Director of Macdonald College
- Representatives from M.A.A. and W.A.A.
- Graduate Society Member
- Three members-at-large

It's your ten dollars so consider taking an interest on where your money is going.

The chairman of the P.G.S.S., Mohammed Hamer, arrived at Council to lodge the complaints that the post-grads have about paying the extra fees. Some of the post-grads feel they aren't getting enough fun for their money. However it was pointed out that, although most of the post-grads are older students with differ-

ent interests, at no time had they ever come forth to offer suggestions to activity committees or Council as to what the post-grads would like to see done with their money. Then P.G.S.S. was reminded that all positions on activity committees are open to all students of Clan Macdonald. Because the post-grad rep on Council wasn't in attendance at the meeting to give his report, the discussion was left there - totally up in the air.

It has been brought to the attention of Council that several pictures of graduates were missing from the Clan. The editor pointed out that all graduates were reminded three times about submitting their pictures and write-ups. Deadlines have to be met with the publisher so it was impossible to wait any longer. Class of '72 - take note!

BAR-DISCO ANYONE?

The Macdonald College Bar-Disco is presently in its second year of operation. It was created to serve the student population with a bar for use of the over 20 crowd and a disco for all students. However, since last year, great changes have occurred. As a result of the lowering of the drinking age in the Province of Quebec to 18 and in addition to the coming of John Abbott College to the Macdonald Campus, Bar-Disco operation has had to change drastically.

During the late summer the bar structure itself was doubled in serving capacity by installing new equipment and renovating the bar so that three instead of two bartenders could work. The area that was strictly Disco last year has been licenced for Thursday and Friday nights to help accommodate the increased drinking population. On Saturday night, however, the operation is carried on as it was last year with the Disco open to under age students. Also, the Disco is open Tuesday nights with a disc jockey on duty. This session is

for anyone who likes music - any type - and has records which he thinks others would like to hear. These students are asked to bring their records to be played, and anyone may drop in to listen. The session is from eight until ten. No drinks will be served.

For the remainder of this month, access to the Bar-Disco may be obtained by presenting a Macdonald or John Abbott I.D. to the door attendant. Also a Macdonald or John Abbott student can sign in one guest by paying a charge of 50¢. Early next month the membership system used last year will be back into use. Students will pay \$2.00 for a Bar-Disco membership. The membership will allow them to enter the Bar free of charge on all nights except those when a band or some other form of special entertainment is offered. On

these occasions members will be asked to pay an additional charge to cover costs. On any evening a member may sign in one guest by paying a 50¢ admission charge.

Further renovations are now in the organizing stage. The bar area is to be doubled in size so that the Disco can once more be available to under age students any night on which the Bar-Disco is in operation. These renovations, it is hoped, will be completed by mid-term.

One point of interest to all patrons - this is predominately a student bar, and as students are not rich in most cases, no tipping is expected.

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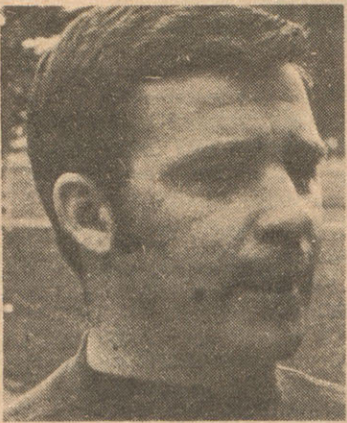
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ATHLETICS THIS YEAR

JAC (JOHN ABBOTT COLLEGE) invites Macdonald students and staff to participate in the various recreational and instructional-physical education programs offered around campus. All activities will be posted around campus on the athletic bulletin boards and also in the Community Services office (bulletin board to the left of door as you enter and also one across the hall). The M.A.A. and the W.A.A. will continue to take care of the Macdonald intramurals and JAC and Macdonald will combine in all intercollegiate activities this year.

Athletics on the Macdonald campus appear to be on the upswing. After last spring's announced cutback of financial support by McGill, members of the Clan Macdonald united to raise enough money to operate a limited inter-collegiate program for 71-72. Thanks to the graduates, whose contribution led the way, the students who voted an increase in their athletic fees and to the Stewart Fund for matching the students contribution.

Since last spring several things have happened to intercollegiate sports on campus and in the Province of Quebec. Locally, John Abbott College has joined forces with Macdonald in the field of Athletics. For the present time our combined teams will play under the title of Macdonald-Abbott Clansmen.

It is the hope of the Athletic Department of Macdonald and the Physical Education Department of John Abbott that combining will help us competitively, financially and act as a unifying agent on this campus.

Provincially a new athletic association has been formed and is now known as the Quebec Universities Athletic Association. This body was formed with an eye on using athletic budgets and a desire to offer

a more realistic program. Travelling costs will be held at a reasonable level and divisions have been formed which will allow smaller schools to compete at a level suited to their particular needs. Macdonald-Abbott will compete in White Division football with a chance to play-off with the other division at season's end. Our men's basketball team will continue to play 'A' division while hockey and girl's basketball will play 'B' division for this year.

Our total athletic program consists of a variety of inter-collegiate sports besides the one's mentioned as well as a comprehensive intermural and recreation program. Information regarding starting dates, schedules, etc. will be posted well in advance of each activity for interested people.

Members of the Athletic departments of Mac and John Abbott extend an invitation to all potential players to turn out with the team of their choice, whether it be intercollegiate and/or intramural. A successful program is one in which a large percentage of the student body becomes involved either on or off the playing field. We hope '71-'72 will be considered a successful one.

The Centennial Centre Building Committee hires a building manager, a receptionist, janitors and desk attendants. All must be paid for by, at present, Mac students. The fifteen dollars is the fee paid by all students to allow them the right to use the public facilities. The fees paid by John Abbott will also be used to cover the costs of expansions necessary during J.A.'s temporary stay at Mac.

There is a false rumour on the campus grapevine that Mac students cannot support the building alone and need J.A. money to maintain the building! It is possible for Mac students to maintain the building using their reserve funds. It is also possible, but not desirable for campus unity, to open it only to Mac students. But don't take anyone else's word for it: look around and see what the C.C. can give you.

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
