Rev. and Mrs. Abraham J. Becker (Pensioned) Lawton, Oklahoma

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

ABRAHAM J. BECKER, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob P. Becker, was born on February 25, 1872, at Woldenfirst, South Russia. Together with his parents he came to the United States of America in 1875, and after a short stay in Indiana, they settled in Minnesota, and later moved to Kansas. Mr. Becker was converted at the age of twelve and joined the Ebenfeld M. B. Church near Hillsboro, Kansas, on March 30, 1884. He received his early bible training in the Buhler Vereins Schule and was graduated in 1896. Later he attended McPherson College and was graduated in 1899. Mr. Becker also studied at the Moody Bible Institute. On October 27, 1897, he was married to Magdalena Hergert, at Fairview, Oklahoma. They were ordained on May 14, 1911, at South Fairview, Oklahoma by Rev. M. M. Just. In 1901 the Conference accepted brother and sister Becker as missionaries to the Comanches at Post Oak. After thirty-six years of diligent work among the Comanche Indians the Beckers took up a new work among the Mexicans at Lawton, Oklahoma. On July 7, 1938, it pleased the Heavenly Father to call Mrs. Becker home to Himself. Rev. Becker carried the load alone till November 13, 1941, when he was married to Katharina Poetker at Lawton. Even though the Beckers are pensioned and live retired in their own home they still have a vital interest in Post Oak and Lawton View Missions.

MRS. KATHARINA POETKER BECKER, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Heinrich Poetker, was born on January 27, 1887, at Lindeau, South Russia. In 1925 she immigrated to the United States of America. At the age of forty she accepted Christ as her Lord and Saviour, and in 1931, she was baptized and accepted into the membership of the M.B. Church of Fairview, Oklahoma. Later she moved to Premont, Texas. On November 13, 1941, she was married to Missionary A. J. Becker at Lawton, Oklahoma. Even though Mrs. Becker was introduced to the missionary work done by Brother Becker through marriage, she nevertheless shares with him a deep interest in this cause. The Beckers by first marriage have six children. Daniel A., born on August 14, 1898; William J., August 21, 1900; Peter A., August 7, 1903; Herwanna N., December 14, 1907; Samuel D., May 9, 1910; and Glen V., February 26, 1918.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

MRS. ANNA HIEBERT GOMEZ, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Abraham Hiebert, was born in Russia on August 30, 1886. She accepted Christ as her Lord and Saviour at the age of nineteen and joined the M. B. Church at Mountain Lake, Minnesota, upon confession of faith and baptism. She received her education at the Mountain Lake Bible Academy. In 1911 she went to Post Oak to help Mrs. Becker in the home as well as assist in the church work. She was married to Joe Gomez on February 16, 1913, at Post Oak Mission near Indiahoma, Oklahoma. She went to assist in the mission work officially at Post Oak in 1936. She has spent a great deal of her time visiting the lowly homes of the Comanches and ministering to the sick. Rev. D. J. GERBRANDT AND FAMILY Indiahoma, Oklahoma

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

DICK J. GERBRANDT, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Gerbrandt, of Reedley, California, was born at Herbert, Sask., Canada, on April 23, 1911. He accepted Christ as his personal Saviour at the age of fourteen and was baptized and received into the fellowship of the Reedley M. B. Church the following year. He received his high school diploma from the Immanual Bible School, Reedley, California, in 1932. He did his college work at Tabor College, Hillsboro, Kansas, where he graduated with the A.B. degree in 1945. He was married to Linda Wiens on April 29, 1934, at Reedley, California. They were ordained at Sawyer, North Dakota, in 1941 by Rev. F. J. Weins and Rev. J. H. Pankratz. Before entering mission work, he served as pastor of the following churches: the M. B. BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

FRANK PETER NICKEL was born to Mr. and Mrs. Peter I. Nickel on January 11, 1917 at Inman, Kansas. At the age of twelve he accepted Christ as his personal Saviour and joined the Buhler M. B. Church by baptism. He graduated from Inman Rural High School in 1935. In 1938 he continued his education at Tabor College, Hillsboro, Kansas, graduating with a Th.B. degree in 1942. During his attendance at Tabor College, Mr. Nickel dedicated his life to God for full time service in the Kingdom. He spent one term at Moody Bible Institute, Chicago, Illinois, and at the Missionary Medical Institute, Toronto, Canada. His practical experience includes preaching, Bible School teaching, and personal work. For three months he served the Ingalls, Kansas M. B. Church as pastor. On October 4, 1942 he was united in holy matrimony to Eva Jantz. Since 1947 they have been serving the Lord at Lawton View Mission, Lawton Oklahoma, under the auspices of the M. B. Board of Foreign Mission. The Nickels were ordained at the M. B. Church, Buhler, Kansas, on May 28, 1950.

MRS. EVA JANTZ NICKEL, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Jantz, Halstead, Kansas, was born at Bloomfield, Montana, on June 23, 1915. In 1928 the family moved to Hillsboro, Kansas. Here Mrs. Nickel graduated from Hillsboro High School in 1933 and from the Junior College Course at Tabor College in 1936. She was born again at the age of thirteen. In 1939 while teaching school she surrendered her life to the service of her master and entered Moody Bible Institute, Chicago, Illinois, that fall in order to prepare for fulltime Christian work. In August, 1941, she was graduated from the three-year Missionary-Bible Course at Moody's. During this time she took many opportunities to witness through personal work, child evangelism, and house visitations. Shortly after her marriage to Frank P. Nickel on October 4, 1942, she was accepted into the membership of the M. B. Church at Buhler, Kansas.



BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

NICHOLAS N. HIEBERT, son of Mr. and Mrs. Nickolai C. Hiebert, was born on July 29, 1874 at Lichtfelde, Russia. His parents immigrated to the United States before he was a year old and settled in Minnesota. At the age of fifteen he accepted Christ as his personal Saviour and one year later, in the summer of 1890, he was baptized by the Mountain Lake M. B. Church and accepted into the fellowship of the Bingham Lake M. B. Church. He received his High School education at Windom, Minnesota. He also spent one year, 1897-1898, at McPherson College, McPherson, Kansas. On May 28, 1899, he was united in marriage to Susie Wiebe at Bingham Lake. They were ordained at Bingham Lake on June 6, 1899, by Rev. Abraham Schellenberg and Rev. Henry Voth. Brother Hiebert's practical experience before entering foreign mission work consists of teaching Sunday School, helping in the choir, and teaching public school at Mountain Lake for five years. At the meeting of the General Mennonite Brethren Conference in 1898 the Lord laid it upon the hearts of the delegates that the time had come for the conference to spread the Gospel to other lands. At the same time the brethren accepted Brother and Sister N. N. Hiebert as the first M. B. missionaries to India. The Hieberts sailed for India in the summer of 1899 and arrived there in October; however, after eighteen short months had passed Brother Hiebert became seriously ill so that he and his family had to return to America. Even though they had to return from the field their missionary interest has continued to glow through the years by encouraging the churches at home,

MRS. SUSIE WIEBE HIEBERT, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Wiebe, was born on July 19, 1880, at Waldheim, Russia. When she was six years of age she, together with her parents, immigrated to the United States where they settled in Minnesota. At the age of fifteen she experienced the forgiveness of sins by claiming Christ as her Saviour. On August 11, 1896, she joined the M. B. Church of Bingham Lake, Minnesota upon confession of faith and baptism. On May 28, 1899, she was married to Nicholas N. Hiebert at Bingham Lake. Shortly after their wedding they were ordained as misisonaries for India. On June 16, 1899 they left the shores of the United States as the first M. B. missionaries to the foreign field. The Hieberts have twelve children: Marie born on June 18, 1900 (deceased, 1947); Susie, June 18, 1900 (deceased, 1900); Albert, May 30, 1902 (deceased, 1909); John N. C., March 5, 1904; Clyde, January 24, 1907; Samuel, April 13, 1909; Alma, December 5, 1911; Annie, December 5, 1911; Waldo, July 3, 1914; Lando, July 3, 1914; Rosella, September 26, 1916; and Alvin, July 14, 1918.



ELIZABETH NEUFELD (WALL) WICHERT (Returned) Dinuba, California

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

MRS. ELIZABETH NEUFELD (WALL) WICHERT, daughter of Rev. Peter Neufeld, was born on October 15, 1873 in the Ukraine. At the age of sixteen she accepted Christ as her personal Saviour and in November of that same year she was baptized and accepted as a member of the Hillsboro M. B. Church. Her practical experience before entering mission work consists of teaching German school, helping along in church work and doing personal work. In 1898 she offered her service in foreign missions to the M. B. Conference and was accepted that same year. On July 4, 1899 she, together with Brother and Sister N. N. Hiebert sailed from New York for pioneer mission work in India. It was her privilege together with Sister Anna Suderman to be a member of the missionary staff at the time when the first Mennonite Brethren church among the Telugus was organized on March 27, 1904, under the leadership of Rev. and Mrs. J. H. Pankratz. She returned to the homeland in May, 1906. Some time after her return she was united in marriage to Peter Wall of Los Angeles, California but later moved to Fairmeade, California where she and Brother Wall had an active share in the work of the M. B. Church. After Brother Wall's death she returned to Los Angeles where she was actively engaged in the work of city missions and house visitations. On July 4, 1948 she was again united in bonds of holy matrimony, namely, to Rev. C. A. Wichert of Dinuba, California. They are residing in Dinuba at the present time.



Rev. John H. Pankratz (Pensioned) San Diego, California

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

JOHN H. PANKRATZ, son of Mr. and Mrs. John J. Pankratz, was born on January 14, 1867 at Iwanenky, South Russia. After completing his elementary school training he attended the Teachers Normal School, Emporia, Kansas during the school year of 1891-1892. In the fall of 1892 he enrolled at the Baptist Academy, Rochester, New York and was graduated in 1894. He continued his education in Rochester in the fall of 1894 when he entered the Baptist Theological Seminary where he continued his studies till 1897. While serving as missionary on the foreign field, he studied at the South India Missionary Language School from 1903 till 1905 when he passed the Telugu examination with distinction. His practical experience before entering foreign mission work consists of three years of evangelistic work in the M. B. Conference and pastoring the First Baptist Church of Allentown and Macungie, Pennsylvania. On September 7, 1899 Brother Pankratz was united in holy matrimony with Maria Harms at Hillsboro, Kansas. They were ordained for foreign mission work. In the fall of 1902 they set sail for India and arrived on the field on October 20 of that same year. It was through the efforts of Brother and Sister Pankratz that the first mission station of the American Mennonite Brethren Conference was established in India. It was also their privilege, together with Sisters Elizabeth Neufeld Wall Wichert and Anna Suderman Bergthold, to organize the first A. M. B. Church among the Telugus. Mr. Pankratz also ordained the first three ministers of the M. B. Mission in India. While they were home on their first furlough he taught in the Bible department of Tabor College during the School year of 1911-1912. They served in India up till September 1926. During their last term in India it pleased our Heavenly Father to call Mrs. Pankratz to her heavenly reward on January 25, 1941. Mr. Pankratz has five children, Rubina Leona born on July 30, 1900; John Ralph, December 22, 1903; Ernest Marvin, April 29, 1906; Linda Marie, September 29, 1908; and Waldo Edgar, June 19, 1911.

MRS. DANIEL F. BERGTHOLD (Pensioned) Reedley, California

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

MRS. ANNA SUDERMAN BERGTHOLD, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gerhard Suderman, was born on December 26, 1875, at Bingham Lake, Minnesota. She was converted at the age of eighteen and accepted as a member of the M. B. Church at Bingham Lake upon confession of faith and baptism. She received her education, beyond the elementary level, at the Chicago Light and Hope, Chicago Bible Institute and later also took some nurses training. In 1898 she, as an independent worker, left from New York for her first term in India. After Brother and Sister N. N. Hiebert and Sister Elizabeth Neufeld (Wall-Wichert) arrived in 1899 the M. B. Conference also asked Sister Suderman (Bergthold) to join the new missionaries and accepted her as a worker under the conference. She together with Sister Elizabeth Neufeld and Brother and Sister J. H. Pankratz organized the first M. B. Church among the Telugus on March 27, 1904. On June 20, 1916, she was married to Missionary Daniel F. Bergthold at Ootacumand, India. They labored in India for many years making their final return to America in 1946. Mrs. Bergthold was left alone when her husband departed to his Heavenly Home on October 25, 1948. At present, she is living in the Home for the Aged, Reedley, California. The Bergtholds have seven children: Viola born on August 17, 1903, by the first marriage; Lydia, March 3, 1907; Bertha, August 31, 1908; Martha, October 6, 1909; Abraham, September 5, 1915 (deceased, 1916); Henry D., August 3, 1914, by the second marriage; and Samuel G., October 21, 1918 by the third marriage.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

MRS. MARIA EPP VOTH, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Epp, was born at Mountain Lake, Minnesota, on January, 1881. Following her conversion at the age of twenty, she was baptized and received into the fellowship of the Carson M. B. Church, near Mountain Lake on June 23, 1901. After she finished her elementry training she studied at the Mountain Lake Bible School. Later she also did some work at the Moody Bible Institute. On August 18, 1907, she was married to John H. Voth at Mountain Lake. After having served the Lord together for almost one year they were ordained on July 5, 1908, at the Carson M. B. Church by Rev. Henry Voth and Rev. Abraham Schellenberg. On August 14, 1908, they left from Seattle, Washington, for their first term in India and returned via Seattle in July, 1916. They went out for a second term in 1918 and returned in 1925. BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

MRS. ELIZABETH DICKMAN JANZEN, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Peter H. Dickman, was born on March 9, 1889, at Mountain Lake, Minnesota. She accepted Christ as her personal Saviour at the age of 16 and was baptized and accepted as a member of the M. B. Church at Mountain Lake on July 8, 1906. After she completed her elementary school training she enrolled at the Mountain Lake Academy and was graduated in 1906. Later she also studied at the Moody Bible Institute in Chicago. On August 25, 1907, she was married to Frank A. Janzen at Mountain Lake. They were ordained at Mountain Lake on September 14, 1910, by Rev. Henry Voth and Rev. N. N. Hiebert. On September 29, 1910, they left from New York for their first term in India and returned via San Francisco in June, 1919. BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

MISS MARY C. WALL, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius A. Wall, was born on September 5, 1885, at Muensterberg, Sagradofka, South Russia. She was converted in January, 1908, and five months later she was baptized and accepted as a member of the M. B. Church Munich, North Dakota. Miss Wall's education beyond the grades consists of one year Normal School, after which she studied at Northwestern Bible School, Minneapolis, Minnesota, graduating in 1913. She continued her education by taking a special missionary course while in training at a General Hospital and later at a Maternity Hospital. Before going out to the foreign field she served the Lord in city mission work and in private nursing. She was ordained at Munich, North Dakota, in June, 1914, by Rev. David Dick and Rev. H. A. Neufeld. On June 26, 1915, she left San Francisco, California for her first term in India and returned to New York March 1, 1923. Her second term lasted from November 6, 1924, till April, 1932. She went out for a third term on December 26, 1933, and returned on August 26, 1946. On November 28, 1947, she left San Francisco, California, for her fourth term in India where she is serving the Lord at the Devarakonda station. BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

JOHN H. LOHRENZ, born on March 2, 1893, at Moundridge, Kansas, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Heinrich Lohrenz. Mr. Lohrenz was converted at the age of fourteen and joined the Ebenfeld M. B. 
REV. DILWYN B. STUDEBAKER AND FAMILY Wanaparthy, India




HERBERT L. KRAUSE AND FAMILY Kodaikanal, India

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

MRS. SARAH LOHRENZ WIENS, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lohrenz, was born on February 20, 1883, at Hampton, Nebraska. The Lord gave her the missionary call to China two years before her conversion which she experienced at the age of fourteen. After giving her testimony she was baptized and accepted as a member of the M. B. Church at Henderson, Nebraska. She received her elementary and high school education at Hampton, Nebraska. On October 23, 1903, she was married to Bernard F. Wiens at Hampton. In 1907 the M. B. Conference accepted them as its city missionaries. 

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

AARON A. JANZEN, SON of Mr. and Mrs. Aron F. Janzen, was born on May 24, 1882, at Mountain Lake, Minnesota. He was converted at the age of 24 and on July 8, 1906, he joined the M. B. Church, Mountain Lake, Minnesota, upon confession of faith and baptism. He received his early Bible training in the Mountain Lake Bible School, graduating in May, 1908. In order to better prepare himself for foreign missions, he enrolled at Moody Bible Institute and was graduated in August, 1912. Later he spent one year at the Baptist Seminary, Rochester, New York. Mr. Janzen carried on alone for several years and on January 24, 1943, he was married to Martha Hiebert at Bulawayo, South Africa. They came home on furlough on July 5, 1946. On February 2, 1949, they left New York for another period of service in the Belgian Congo where they are serving the Master at the Kafumba Station.

MRS. MARTHA HIEBERT JANZEN, Was born to Mr. and Mrs. Peter P. Hiebert on November 1, 1905, at Cottonwood City, Minnesota. She was converted at the age of twelve and four years later, on September 25, 1921, she was baptized and accepted as a member of the M. B. Church, Mountain Lake, Minnesota. She completed her high school training on May 28, 1925, at the Mountain Lake High School. In order to prepare herself for foreign mission work, she enrolled at Northwestern Bible School and was graduated on May 24, 1928. While she was home on her first furlough, she enrolled at Corn Bible School and was graduated in April, 1935. She also took nurses' training at Willows Maternity Hospital, Kansas City, Kansas where she received the O.N. degree. Later she studied at the Counsel Supeaieur Hygiene Colonial Belgium where she received the Accoucheuse (Midwife) degree. She was ordained at Mountain Lake, Minnesota on November 24, 1946, by P. R. HEINRICH GERHARD BARTSCH, son of Gerhard and Anna Siebert Bartsch, was born on December 17, 1896, at Sparrow, South Russia. Mr. Bartsch received his schooling in Hepburn Bible School where he graduated in 1926 and in Winkler Bible School, graduating in 1928. On May 20, 1928 Anna J. Funk and Heinrich G. Bartsch were united in holy matrimony. On January 12, 1932 Rev. and Mrs. Bartsch arrived in Kafumba to take up the work to which the Lord had called them. ANNA SIEBERT BARTSCH, born in Katerinowka, Russia, was united in holy matrimony with Heinrich G. Bartsch on May 20, 1928. The Bartsches and their two children went to the Belgian Congo for mission service arriving at Kafumba of the Kwango District on January 12, 1932. One year later she accompanied her husband and other missionaries to the Dekese territory where they became the pioneer missionaries among the Dengeses, building the Bololo Station. 
Rev. Gerhard B. Giesbrecht and Family Mission Colony, Paraguay

He returned on furlough July 24, 1949, and on August 11, 1949, was united in holy matrimony to Dora Schellenberg at Blaine, Washington. He studied at Tabor College during the school year 1949-50 and was granted the A.B. degree. The Wirsches are at present residing in Seattle, Washington, where Mr. Wirsche attended the University of Washington during the school term.

MRS. SALOME DORA SCHELLENBERG WIRSCHE iS the daugher of Mr. and Mrs. George F. Schellenberg, Lynden, Washington. She was born at Waldheim, Saskatchewan, on September 13, 1923. She found peace with God at the age of twelve and two years later followed the Lord in baptism and became a member of the Mennonite Brethren Church at Waldheim, Saskatchewan. In her seventeenth year the Lord began speaking to her about surrendering her life to Him for service, and while in Bible School she yielded to the call. She attended Bethany Bible School, Hepburn, Saskatchewan, three years, graduating in April, 1944. Her practical experience includes Daily Vacation Bible School work, personal work, and house visitations under the Western Children's Misison. BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

HARRY FRIESEN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob F. Friesen, Jansen, Nebraska, was born at Meade, Kansas, on September 30, 1923. Together with his parents, he moved to Jansen, Nebraska, at the age of 3. He was converted and accepted into the Jansen, Nebraska, M. B. Church when he was ten years old. During his senior year in high school at Fairbury, Nebraska, he submitted to a serious operation but the Lord spared his life. This was in 1941. That fall he enrolled at Tabor College where he took an active part in Mission Band and Y.M.C.A. He graduated with an A.B. degree at Tabor in May, 1945. From September, 1942 to May, 1945 she attended Tabor College. She received her A.A. degree from Tabor College in the spring of 1944. After her marriage to Harry Friesen on June 1, 1945, they moved to Dallas, Texas, for further She worked as secretary to the preparation. Registrar of the Seminary and also took two night school courses in the Dallas Bible Institute. In addition, she took active part in church work, serving in Sunday School and young people's work. BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH


