DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The First Congregational Church is located on the southwest corner of Midway Place and Waller in Chicago. At the northwest corner of the intersection is St. Mark's Episcopal Church. On the east side of Waller (Midway Place ends at Waller) are apartment buildings. Extending three blocks west on Midway are many Victorian homes.

The First Congregational Church is one story high on a raised basement. It is built of yellow-beige Roman brick trimmed with stone. The entrance is on Midway Place and consists of a tall central section between two symmetrical lower masses on each side. The cavernous entry at ground level is framed by posts and lintels which together express the interlocking vertical-horizontal theme of the design. Its two massive piers are topped by large planters. The side walls are composed of vertically-oriented leaded-glass windows separated by thick brick piers which together reinforce the vertical theme of the sides. The rectangular masses of the side aisles have flat roofs but the central nave is covered with a flattened hip roof.

One enters through low entrance doors into a vestibule with a staircase at each end (east wall and west wall). These stairs lead down to the social and school rooms in the basement and up to the nave of the church. The stairs to the second floor rise to a narthex-like room lighted by a large leaded-glass window at the rear of the church.

The auditorium is divided by two aisles into three rows of pews. The sactuary and altar are at the south end of the auditorium. On the east is the pastor's study. Opposite, on the south, is a service stairway. The nave proper is quite tall and lighted by a leaded-glass skylight while the lower side aisles are illuminated by leaded-glass windows. The interior plaster walls are sand colored trimmed in darkstained wood and yellow-beige brick. The interior has been changed by removing the original pews and installing newer pews in two rows with three aisles. The original cube and spheriod ceiling lights have disappeared. The sanctuary has been changed in minor ways. The basement is extensively remodeled. At the rear of the church is an addition built in 1959.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

1908

The First Congregational Church of Austin is important as an early work by one of Frank Lloyd Wright's best students. Not only does the church demonstrate in its artistic qualities the design capabilities of William Drummond, but it also shows how well a Wright student could capture the essence of his master's modern style. As Wright's students were not often given the opportunity of designing buildings other than residences, this church is especially instructive and significant as an uncommon building type by a Prairie architect.

HISTORY

The First Congregational Church was designed by William Drummond in 1904 and built in 1905. It was sold in 1925 to the Church of the Seventh Day Adventists. From them it passed in 1958 to the Catholic Bishop of Chicago. The Our Lady of Lebanon Roman Catholic Church used the building from 1958 to 1973 when the Greater Holy Temple of God in Christ occupied the building as they still do today.

William Drummond was born on March 28, 1876 in Newark, New Jersey. He learned the building trades from his father who was a general contractor. He spent two years at Austin High School (in Chicago), and took several courses at the University of Illinois School of Architecture. Then he spent several months working for Louis Sullivan. In 1899 he was hired by Frank Lloyd Wright and worked for him until 1909. He was chief draftsman and project manager for many of Wright's commissions to which he contributed many ideas. He made the drawings for the Larkin Building (destroyed) which was built by his father, the Cheney house, the Isabel Roberts house and the Bradley house and the Hickox houses. Many of his drawings were used in the Wasmuth portfolio of Wright's work which was published in 1910. He formed a partnership with Louis Guenzel that lasted from 1912 to 1915. Guenzel did the construction while Drummond did the designing. After the first world war Drummond turned to historic designs in order to secure commissions and after the depression he worked for other architects.
