7. Description

Describe the present and original (it known) physical appearance

The Biograph Theater is located on the east side of Lincoln Avenue north of Fullerton Avenue. The area was intensively settled by German and Swedish immigrants immediately following the Chicago fire of 1871.

The structure is a two-story brick building designed to accommodate stores and a theater space designed specifically for the exhibition of motion pictures. It was finished in 1915 from designs prepared by Samuel N. Crowen, a local Chicago architect who was responsible for designing the Lake Shore Building, Willoughby Tower Building and others throughout the city.

The property has a 125' frontage on North Lincoln Avenue and a 120' depth extending eastward to a north-south alley in the rear. Its decorative motif on the exterior is neo-classical with palladian windows directly above the theater marquee. The semi-circular windows are accentuated by white terra-cotta pilasters. The middle of the building is bisected by a white terra-cotta belt course which is repeated.

The bottom floor commercial spaces are provided with plenty of sunlight from the large windows set between the brick piers which carry to the belt course. The arcading of the windows on the second floor serve the same function.

The marquee is little changed from its original condition. It has lost only the name "Essaness" from its front. It retains its early electric lighting scheme and was an early example of later more elaborate marquees. Originally a large perpendicular sign which read "Biograph" was erected on the roof of the building directly above the marquee. This was removed sometime during the 1960's.

The entrance to the theater was remodelled in the late 1920's early '30's in an Art Deco motif. It remains essentially unchanged except for new doors added in the late 1970's. The entry and foyer have been repainted although the essential space remains. The terrazzo floor is from the Art Deco redo. Cove plaster lighting from that period also remains.

The theater auditorium is sited on a south-east to north-west axis. It is rectangular in shape, has a concrete floor pitched downward towards the proscenium and is 67' wide, 92' deep and has ceilings 20' high. There are no central supporting columns, the roof and ceiling being carried by steel trusses which span the auditorium. The theater seat frames are the originals. An air cooling system was added to the building although it is unclear exactly when, but certainly by 1930.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Biograph Theater is worthy of National Register nomination because it is truly a landmark in the City of Chicago. Its importance as a theater is notable only in a local sense.

When motion pictures were new, their exhibition took place in stores and auditoriums which had been converted for the purpose. The Biograph is an early example of a building designed specifically for the showing of motion pictures. Its construction coincides with the rapidly stabilizing neighborhood ardund Lincoln and Fullerton. Its connection with other commercial spaces gave the investors a hedge against the possible failure of this upstart medium. Its modest architectural style was quickly eclipsed by larger more grandiose movie palaces designed and erected after World War I.

The Biograph's national notoriety and, indeed, main claim to fame came on the sultry summer night of July 22, 1934, when noted bank robber/killer, John Dillinger, was ambushed and killed by F.B.I. agents led by Melvin Purvis.

Dillinger, dubbed "Public Enemy #]" by the F.B.I.'s J. Edgar Hoover, attended the Biograph's main bill "Manhatten Melodrama," and upon leaving the theater was gunned down in an alley approximately fifty feet south of the entrance. The F.B.I. agents had been alerted by a female friend of Dillinger's that he would be attending the Biograph that night. His death ended an eleven month career.

Chicago's reputation has always been colored by its history of criminal activities. Until it was torn down in the early 70's, the site of the St. Valentine's Day Massacre was a top tourist draw. The Biograph continues to be so today.

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
