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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Getty Family Mausoleum, or Getty Tomb, has long been regarded as one of the finest structures designed by Louis Henry Sullivan, architect, writer, and philosopher. Sullivan, although partially educated at the historically oriented Ecole des Beaux Arts in Paris, was a major force in the attempt to create an original, indigenous American architecture. He consciously rejected all literal historic precedent in his designs. These designs were often embellished with his unique style of ornament, based on foliate or geometric forms.which he conceived as being of, instead of on, the building. Sullivan literally "grew" his ornament out of the structure, and is said to have drawn the design for the gates on this building himself, full size. This building is considered to possess some of Sullivan's finest ornament.

Although Sullivan was to die in poverty in 1924, this building was designed at the height of his career, in 1890, or roughly at the same time as most of his other world famous designs, such as the Auditorium Theater (1886-9), the Wainwright Building (1891), the Schiller Building (1892), and the Transportation Building for the Columbian Exposition (1893). His later designs include the Schlesinger & Mayer (Carson, Pirie & Scott) store (1898-1901), and a series of small banks, most notably that at Owatonna, Minnesota (1908). Through his buildings and later his writings, he was a major influence on numerous architects, particularly his one-time employee, Frank Lloyd Wright.

Wright himself said that the Getty Tomb was "entirely Sullivan's own, a piece of sculpture, a statue, a great poem addressed to human sensibilities as such. Outside the realm of music what finer requiem."

The significance of this design was early recognized abroad; a plaster cast of the doorway was exhibited and received an award at the Paris Exposition of 1900.

The structure itself, built as the tomb of Carrie Eliza Getty, deceased wife of a prominent Chicago businessman, is located in Graceland Cemetery, the burial place of many prominent Chicagoans. It stands across a pond from Sullivan's earlier Ryerson Tomb (1889), and only a short distance away from the grave of Sullivan himself. The building was designated an official Chicago Landmark in 1971, and a citation from the old Chicago Architectural Landmarks Commission states: "...Stone and bronze stand transformed in rich yet delicate ornament, a requiem for the dead, an inspiration to the living."




