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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The church and rectory are located on a site which fronts 125'-0" on the east side of N. Leavitt and has a depth of 102'-6" on the south side of W. Haddon. The church is quite similar to a type of masonry church which became common in Russia toward the end of the 19th century. Going from the front to the rear of the site, it is divided into the following elements, set symetrically upon an east-west center-line: the tower, narthex, nave (naos) and chancel The tower and nave dominate the composition and are similarly The tower has a tall narrow square base which is capped by an open eight sided two story belfry and spire. The walls of the nave treated. which is also square in plan and the widest portion of the building, having a width of 47'-3" serves as a base for the eight sided clerestory above, which is covered by an eight sided roof similar in treatment to but of lower pitch than the tower's spire. Both these roofs are each capped by a narrow drum supporting a bulbous dome with three-armed Orthodox cross. The chancel and narthex are comparatively low and simply 'mosted. The overall length of the church is 97'-0", and it is set back from the front of the site 5'-6". rectory is a rectangular two story building 60'-2" deeo by 35'-5" wide and is situated 17'-4" to the south of the church toward the rear of the lot, leaving a large yard to the south of the front of It has a low pitched roof with gables at the east and the church. west ends. At the center of the front on the second floor is a bay window with balcony running the full width of the building in front Both the church and rectory have stucco faced brick walls with elaborate window frames, eaves, canopies and railings of ornamental sheetmetal. The only important changes made since the time of construction have been in the color scheme and in some The present color scheme of the church, details of the rectory. white walls with yellow trim, although not like the original in which different masses were painted in different colors, is quite similar to one of three schemes prepared by its architect, Louis H. Sullivan. An open arched entrance gallery at the NW corner of the rectory has been walled up and a one story addition 14'-0" x 30'-0" at the NE corner has been constructed. The railings on the balcony of the rectory and the lower story of the belfry have been changed. interior of the church, decorated with copies of murals in the Cathedral of St. Vladimir in Kiev, looks much as it did when first completed.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This is the only church to have been both designed and constructed under the direction of the renowned architect, Louis H. Sullivan. Of Sullivan's mature works, it is the only one to have been derived from a historic building type.

The church has unique associations with some of the most important figures in the history of Russia. Its construction was made possible by personal contributions from Nicholas II, last Czar of Russia. A marble plaque in the entrance commemorates the visit of Grand Duke Boris Vladimirovich, Lousia of the Czar to the church shortly before its consecration. The church was consecrated in 1903 by Bishop Tikhon who later returned to Russia and in 1918 became the first patriarch of the Russian Orthodox Church since the time of Peter the Great. Bishop Tikhon seems to have been interested in the church from the outset of its construction as a letter to him from Sullivan in 1900 indicates.

The church contains numerous interesting examples of Russian ecclesiastical art, among them, its iconostas which was constructed in Russia and presented to the church in 1912 by Charles R. Crane who was then American Embassador to China. The murals which adorn the walls are copies of those which were painted for the Cathedral of St. Vladimir in Kiev by such noted late 19th century Russian artists as Vasnetsov, Nesterov and Vrubel.

The church is the oldest surviving Orthodox church in Chicago.
