Guard members respond to decision allowing women in combat

Sgt. Sara Yoke was part of a humanitarian mission to a remote village in Afghanistan with the West Virginia Army National Guard when she and her fellow soldiers came under fire.

She was alongside a special operations troop bringing blankets and other winter supplies to

Yoke, a member of a public affairs unit, was covering the story as a journalist.

When the mission turned into a 45-minute gun battle, Yoke, her commander Lt. Todd Harrell



and others took cover in front of the truck that had carried the in Charleston, earned a Bronze supplies.

And Yoke kept working.
"I was incredibly impressed

with her professionalism," Har-rell said of Yoke. "She continued to do her job. She was calm and cool — I mean she was phenomenal."





Brazil early Sunday, within seconds filling the space with flames and a thick, toxic smoke that killed more than 230 panicked partygoers who gasped for breath and fought in a stampede to escape.

It appeared to be the world's deadliest nightclub fire in more than a decade.

Firefighters responding to the blaze at first had trouble getting inside the Kiss nightclub because bodies partially blocked the club's entryway.

Witnesses said a flare or firework lit by the band started the blaze in Santa Maria, a university city of 260,000. Officials at a news conference said the cause was still under investigation though police inspector Sandro Meinerz told the Agencia Estado news agency the band was to blame for a pyrotechnics show and that manslaughter charges could be filed.

Television images showed black smoke billowing out of the Kiss nightclub as shirtless young men who had attended a university party joined firefighters using axes and sledgehammers to pound at windows and hot-pink exterior walls to free those trapped inside.

crowded nightclub in southern were suffocated by smoke within minutes.

Within hours a community gym was a horror scene, with body after body lined up on the floor, partially covered with black plastic as family members identified kin.

Outside the gym police held up personal objects - a black purse, a blue high-heeled shoe as people seeking information on loved ones looked crowded around, hoping not to recognize anything being shown them.

Guido Pedroso Melo, commander of the city's fire department, told the O Globo newspaper that firefighters had a hard time getting inside the club because "there was a barrier of bodies blocking the entrance."

Teenagers sprinted from the scene after the fire began, desperately seeking help. Others carried injured and burned friends away in their arms. Many of the victims were under 20 years old, including some mi-

More pier art planned for Virginia Street

Hours after artists who painted murals on Interstate 64 bridge columns last summer were honored by City Council, organizers were making plans for a third round of the Peer to Pier project.

This year they're targeting the 12 piers along Virginia Street — six on each side of the road — beneath I-64 near Pennsylvania Avenue.

"It's time to get a round started for 2013," Lori Brannon told members of the Strong Neighborhood Task Force on Wednesday.

Brannon, a neighborhood planner in the city's Planning Department, convinced task force members to start the



Survivors said security guards briefly tried to block people from exiting the club. Brazilian bars routinely make patrons pay their entire tab at the end of the night before they are allowed to leave.

Officials earlier counted 232 bodies that had been brought for identification to a gymnasium in Santa Maria, which is located at the southern tip of Brazil, near the borders with Argentina and Uruguay.

Federal Health Minister Alexandre Padhilha told a news conference that most of the 117 people treated in hospitals had been poisoned by gases they breathed during the fire. Only a few suffered serious burns, he said.

Most of the dead apparently were asphyxiated, according to Dr. Paulo Afonso Beltrame, a professor at the medical school of the Federal University of Santa Maria who went to the city's Caridade Hospital to help victing

Hall isn't the first to voice the opinion that men and women being in close contact while on special missions could add undue stress.

First Lt. Courtney Pierson, 15-year member of the West Virginia National Guard, doesn't think that would be a problem.

She hasn't served in Afghanistan or Iraq, but at times has been the only female while training for a mission in the United States.

"If you make it an issue, it will be an issue," Pierson said.... "If you can't work together and the mission isn't your focus, it's not going to work out real well."

Hall, who was part of a medical unit in Afghanistan, argued that allowing women into the new roles should be decided on a case-by-case-basis.

Among her concerns is safe-ty, she said.

"If there's someone having to look out for you instead of doing their job, then yeah, that's an issue," Hall said.

The mural project will cost more this year, Brannon said, because there are two more piers than in past years. That adds \$4,000 to the budget. And the task force needs at least \$3,000 to rent scaffolding and pay for clear coating the finished murals.

Assistant Mayor Rod Blackstone said he's got some ideas on how to raise the missing \$7,000.

"One is the West Virginia sesquicentennial. We can tie this to the sesquicentennial. June 20 is one day before FestivALL starts.

"Tve also talked to people at the state level of this project at the state level as a West Virginia project, we stand a good chance of geting funding from the state. If we make this a statewide initiative, try to engage artists across the state, we could get up to \$30,000.

"And there is a private enterprise who has expressed interprise who has expressed instempting of some of the piers could cause safety problems because the columns stand close to traffic lanes, Brannon said. Similar problems last summer forced the city's Traffic Engineering Department to devise a safety plan involving

warning signs and orange cones along the Boulevard.

"On the north side [of Virginia Street], piece of cake — lots of room on both sides," she said.

"On the south side there's not a lot of space between the piers and the berm. So we would be looking at some kind of traffic control. I'm not saying it's not doable, but there are some pretty major hoops to jump through."

In addition, stains running down some of the columns indicate stormwater leakage from an expansion joint that runs above the columns, she said. Several artists complained last summer that runoff from expansion joints caused problems.

A grassy area at the west end of project zone could provide additional opportunities, Brannon said.

"We'd have to work with the Division of Highways, but there's room for some interpretive signage. Right now we don't have anything that explains what the project is all about."

With 20 murals completed and 12 more planned, Peer to Pier is reaching a good size, said Joe Denault, a West Side city councilman.

Before Range Resources drilled a well on the family property in 2012, Georgetti said, he was stuck using 30-year-old equipment, with no way to upgrade without going seriously into debt.

"You don't have that problem anymore. It's a lot more fun to farm," Georgetti said, since he has been able to buy newer equipment that's bigger, faster and more fuel-efficient. The drilling hasn't caused any problems for the farm, he said.

Range spokesman Matt Pitzarella said the Texas-based

\$1 billion to Pennsylvania landowners, with most of that coming since 2008.

One economist noted that the windfall payments from the natural gas boom are wonderful for individuals, but that they represent just a tiny portion of total economic activity.

For example, the \$1 billion for Pennsylvania landowners sounds like a lot, but "it's just not going to have a big impact on the overall vitality of the overall economy," said Robert Inman, a professor of economics and public policy at the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton business school. "I think the issue is, what difference does it make for the individual families?"

Imman noted that total gas industry hiring and investment can have a far bigger effect on a state or region, and companies have invested tens of billions of dollars just in Pennsylvania on pipelines, infrastructure, and drilling in recent years.

For example, in North Dakota the shale oil and minerals boom contributed 2.8 percent of GDP growth to the entire state economy in 2011, according to Commerce Department data.

Another variable in how much royalty owners actually receive is the wholesale price of gas. That has dropped significantly over the past two years even as production has boomed in Pennsylvania and many other states. Average wholesale prices went from about \$4.50 per unit of gas as a state of the states.

in 2010 to about \$3 in 2012. For many leaseholders, that meant a decline in royalties.

The boom in natural gas royalties has even led to niche spinoff companies that look for lease heirs who don't even know they're owed money.

Michael Zwick is president of Assets International, a Michigan company that searches for missing heirs.

"It was an underserved niche," Zwick said of oil and gas leases. When a company can't find an heir to lease royalties, the money often goes to state unclaimed property funds.

Zwick said he has found a few dozen people whose gas lease money was being held in escrow, including one who was owed about \$250,000 in drilling royalties. But the average amount, he said, is far lower.














CONFLAGRATION




FAREWELL

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
