## 'Gender was irrelevant'

Guard members respond to decision allowing women in combat

Sgt. Sara Yoke was part of a humanitarian mission to a remote village in Afghanistan with the West Virginia Army National Guard when she and her fellow soldiers came under fire.

She was alongside a special operations troop bringing blankets and other winter supplies to villagers.

Yoke, a member of a public affairs unit, was covering the story as a journalist.

When the mission turned into a 45-minute gun battle, Yoke, her commander Lt. Todd Harrell



and others took cover in front of the truck that had carried the supplies.

And Yoke kept working. "I was incredibly impressed with her professionalism," Harrell said of Yoke. "She continued to do her job. She was calm and cool — I mean she was phenomenal."

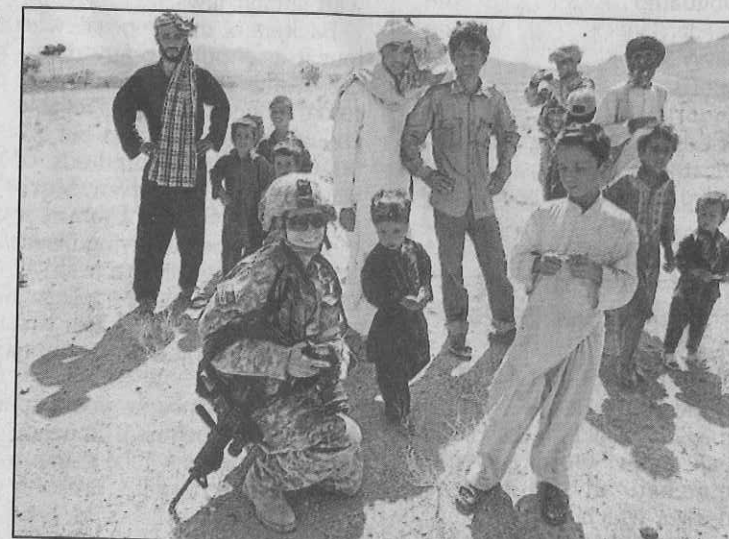

Yoke, now a 26-year-old living in Charleston, earned a Bronze Star and a Combat Action Badge.

As a woman, she is not allowed in a special forces unit like the one whose story she covered. But that's about to change.

Last week, U.S. Defense Secretary Leon Panetta announced plans to allow women into combat roles that were previously closed to them.

Women have been close to the front lines in Iraq and Afghanistan for a decade now. Lifting the ban on women means that now they'll be al-

lowed into frontline positions and potentially elite commando jobs. Military officials have until 2016 to seek exceptions for roles they believe should re-

main closed to women. The changes won't happen instantly, though. Some jobs may

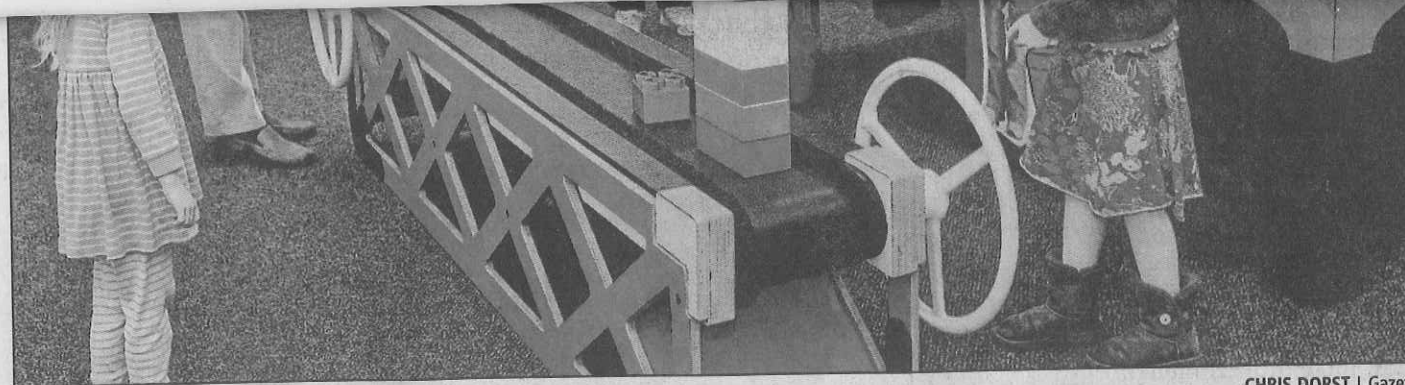

## Gas drilling royalties transform lives of a lucky few

**PITTSBURGH** — Private landowners are reaping billions of dollars in royalties each year from the boom in natural gas drilling, transforming lives and livelihoods even as the windfall provides only a modest boost to the broader economy.

In Pennsylvania alone, royalty payments could top \$1.2 billion for 2012, according to an Associated Press analysis that looked at state tax information, production records and estimates from the National Association of Royalty Owners.

For some landowners, the unexpected royalties have made a big difference.

"We used to have to put stuff on credit cards. It was basically living from paycheck to paycheck," said Shawn Georgetti, who runs a family dairy farm in Avella, about 30 miles southwest of Pittsburgh.

Natural gas production has boomed in many states over the past few years as advances in drilling opened up vast reserves

buried in deep shale rock, such as the Marcellus formation in Pennsylvania and the Barnett in Texas.

Nationwide, the royalty owners association estimates, natural gas royalties totaled \$21 billion in 2010, the most recent year for which it has done a full

## More pier art planned for Virginia Street

Hours after artists who painted murals on Interstate 64 bridge columns last summer were honored by City Council, organizers were making plans for a third round of the Peer to Pier project.

This year they're targeting the 12 piers along Virginia Street — six on each side of the road — beneath I-64 near Pennsylvania Avenue.

"It's time to get a round started for 2013," Lori Brannon told members of the Strong Neighborhood Task Force on Wednesday.

Brannon, a neighborhood planner in the city's Planning Department, convinced task force members to start the

pier project two years ago after seeing similar murals in the Tremé neighborhood of New Orleans.

In 2011, artists painted murals on 10 piers beneath I-64 along Washington Street, five on each side of the street. Last summer they painted another 10 piers on the north side of Kanawha Boulevard.

While the task force hopes to tackle all the cross streets from Washington to the river, Virginia Street rose to the top this year.

"One reason Virginia Street is good," City Councilwoman Mary Jean Davis said, "Virginia Street directs you to the Civic Center, so it's going to get a lot of visibility.

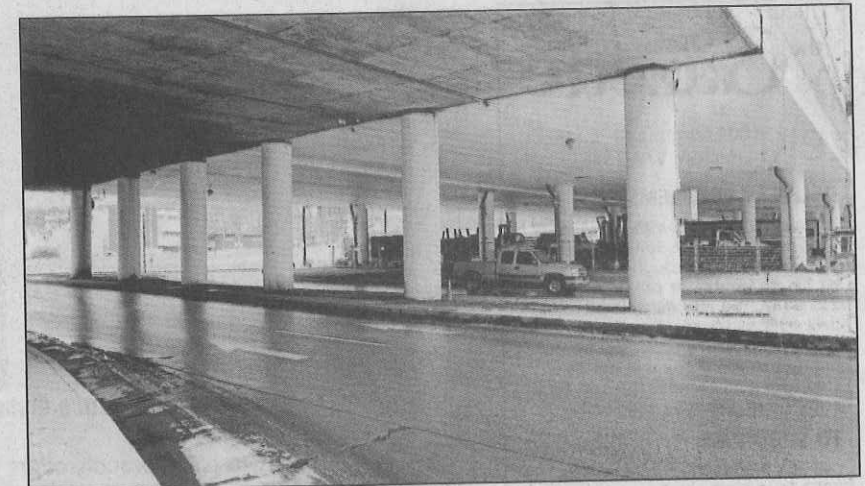
"One thing that impresses me is you

need to stop to appreciate the murals," she said. "On Washington Street, I saw a class group walk around each of the piers and look at them."

Fundraising for this year is already underway, Brannon said. Davis has secured a promise of \$10,000 of city funds, which would need City Council approval, she said.

"I talked to [FestivALL Director] Larry Groce. They're going to ask the Greater Kanawha Valley Foundation for funding again. That gets us to \$20,000." FestivALL organizers provided \$10,000 for the murals in each of the first two years as part of their support of public art.

Guizada Fandanguera, started playing at 2:15 a.m. "and we had played around five songs when I looked up and noticed the roof was burning."

He confirmed that accordion player Danilo Jacques, 28, died, while the five other members made it out safely.  
 Police Maj. Cleberson Braid Bastianello said by telephone that the toll had risen to 233 with the death of a hospitalized victim. He said earlier that the death toll was likely made worse because the nightclub appeared to have just one exit through which patrons could leave.

Survivors said security guards briefly tried to block people from exiting the club. Brazilian bars routinely make patrons pay their entire tab at the end of the night before they are allowed to leave.

Officials earlier counted 232 bodies that had been brought for identification to a gymnasium in Santa Maria, which is located at the southern tip of Brazil, near the borders with Argentina and Uruguay.

Federal Health Minister Alexandre Padilha told a news conference that most of the 117 people treated in hospitals had been poisoned by gases they breathed during the fire. Only a few suffered serious burns, he said.

Most of the dead apparently were asphyxiated, according to Dr. Paulo Afonso Beltrame, a professor at the medical school of the Federal University of Santa Maria who went to the city's Caridade Hospital to help victims.

It will require a change in military culture, Yoke said.

"I don't want to say [the military is] chauvinistic but it might take 20 years for this to happen and the culture to change," she said.  
 As a woman among male soldiers, she had mixed experiences, she said.

She earned respect from some by being good at her job. Others sexually harassed her, she said. Sometimes men were hesitant to associate with her for fear something they said could be taken a wrong way, Yoke said.

"I just think that just because the ban was lifted doesn't mean

there will be overnight changes," Yoke said.

"Something this broad, it's going to be a challenge. There's a lot of attitudes that are going to be challenged. I understand both sides of it too. I just think it's really important for this to happen though."

Others, like Capt. Rechelle Hall of Teays Valley, say there are probably more disadvantages than advantages to allowing women in combat roles.

She fears that the standards will be lowered for women.

"Sometimes even though they say they're not lowering the standards, they sometimes do," Hall said.

chapter, and we just formed a North Dakota chapter. We've seen a lot of new people, and new questions," said Jerry Simmons, the director of the association, which was founded in 1980 and is based in Oklahoma.

Simmons said he hasn't heard of anyone getting less than 12.5 percent, and that's also the minimum rate set by law in Pennsylvania. Simmons knows of one contract in another state where the owner received 25 percent of production, but that's unusual.

By comparison, a 10 to 25 percent range is similar to what a top recording artist might get in royalties from CD sales, while a novelist normally gets a 12.5 percent to 15 percent royalty on hardcover book sales.

Simmons added that for oil and gas "there is no industry standard," since the royalty is of-

ten adjusted based on the per-acre signing bonus a landowner receives. While many people are lured by higher upfront bonuses, a higher royalty rate can generate more total income over the life of a well, which can stretch for 25 years.

Before Range Resources drilled a well on the family property in 2012, Georgetti said, he was stuck using 30-year-old equipment, with no way to upgrade without going seriously into debt.

"You don't have that problem anymore. It's a lot more fun to farm," Georgetti said, since he has been able to buy newer equipment that's bigger, faster and more fuel-efficient. The drilling hasn't caused any problems for the farm, he said.

Range spokesman Matt Pitzarella said the Texas-based

company has paid "well over" \$1 billion to Pennsylvania landowners, with most of that coming since 2008.

One economist noted that the windfall payments from the natural gas boom are wonderful for individuals, but that they represent just a tiny portion of total economic activity.

For example, the \$1 billion for Pennsylvania landowners sounds like a lot, but "it's just not going to have a big impact on the overall vitality of the overall economy," said Robert Inman, a professor of economics and public policy at the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton business school. "I think the issue is, what difference does it make for the individual families?"

Pennsylvania's total gross domestic product in 2011 was about \$500 billion, according to

The mural project will cost more this year, Brannon said, because there are two more piers than in past years. That adds \$4,000 to the budget. And the task force needs at least \$3,000 to rent scaffolding and pay for clear coating the finished murals.

Assistant Mayor Rod Blackstone said he's got some ideas on how to raise the missing \$7,000.

"One is the West Virginia sesquicentennial. We can tie this to the sesquicentennial: June 20 is one day before FestivALL starts."

"I've also talked to people at the state level," he said. "If we do this project at the state level as a West Virginia project, we stand a good chance of getting funding from the state. If we make this a statewide initiative, try to engage artists across the state, we could get up to \$30,000."

"And there is a private enterprise who has expressed interest in helping out," Blackstone said. "It looks optimistic."

Painting of some of the piers could cause safety problems because the columns stand close to traffic lanes, Brannon said. Similar problems last summer forced the city's Traffic Engineering Department to devise a safety plan involving

warning signs and orange cones along the Boulevard.

"On the north side [of Virginia Street], piece of cake — lots of room on both sides," she said.  
 "On the south side there's not a lot of space between the piers and the berm. So we would be looking at some kind of traffic control. I'm not saying it's not doable, but there are some pretty major hoops to jump through."

In addition, stains running down some of the columns indicate stormwater leakage from an expansion joint that runs above the columns, she said. Several artists complained last summer that runoff from expansion joints caused problems.

A grassy area at the west end of project zone could provide additional opportunities, Brannon said.

"We'd have to work with the Division of Highways, but there's room for some interactive signage. Right now we don't have anything that explains what the project is all about."

With 20 murals completed and 12 more planned, Peer to Pier is reaching a good size, said Joe Denault, a West Side city councilman.

"We're starting to get to a critical mass where you can print brochures and attract visitors."

the U.S. Department of Commerce.

Inman noted that total gas industry hiring and investment can have a far bigger effect on a state or region, and companies have invested tens of billions of dollars just in Pennsylvania on pipelines, infrastructure, and drilling in recent years.

For example, in North Dakota the shale oil and minerals boom contributed 2.8 percent of GDP growth to the entire state economy in 2011, according to Commerce Department data.

Another variable in how much royalty owners actually receive is the wholesale price of gas. That has dropped significantly over the past two years even as production has boomed in Pennsylvania and many other states. Average wholesale prices went from about \$4.50 per unit of gas

in 2010 to about \$3 in 2012. For many leaseholders, that meant a decline in royalties.

The boom in natural gas royalties has even led to niche spin-off companies that look for lease heirs who don't even know they're owed money.

Michael Zwick is president of Assets International, a Michigan company that searches for missing heirs.

"It was an underserved niche," Zwick said of oil and gas leases. When a company can't find an heir to lease royalties, the money often goes to state unclaimed property funds. Zwick said he has found a few dozen people whose gas lease money was being held in escrow, including one who was owed about \$250,000 in drilling royalties. But the average amount, he said, is far lower.

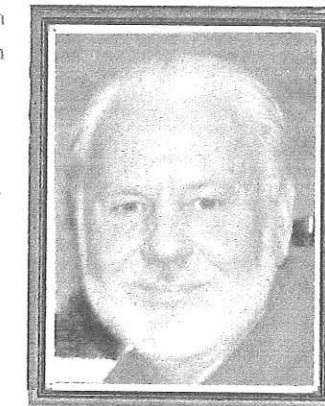

He enjoyed gardening, doing yard work, cutting grass and blowing leaves. He was an avid sports fan, especially of the Ravens, and of all West Virginia sports.

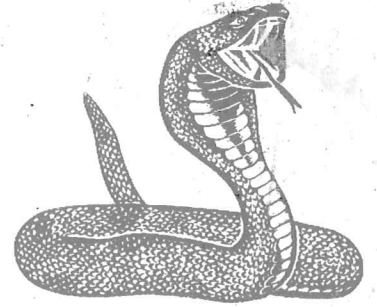
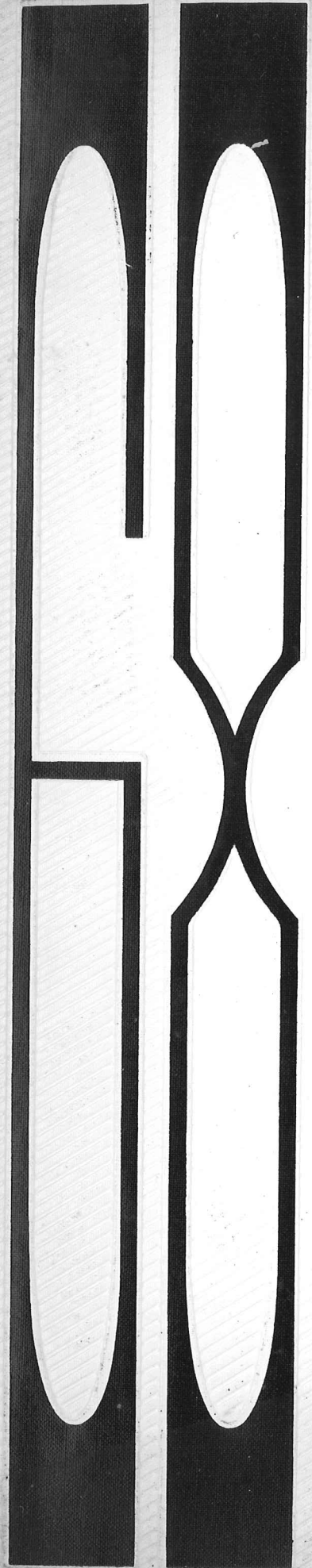

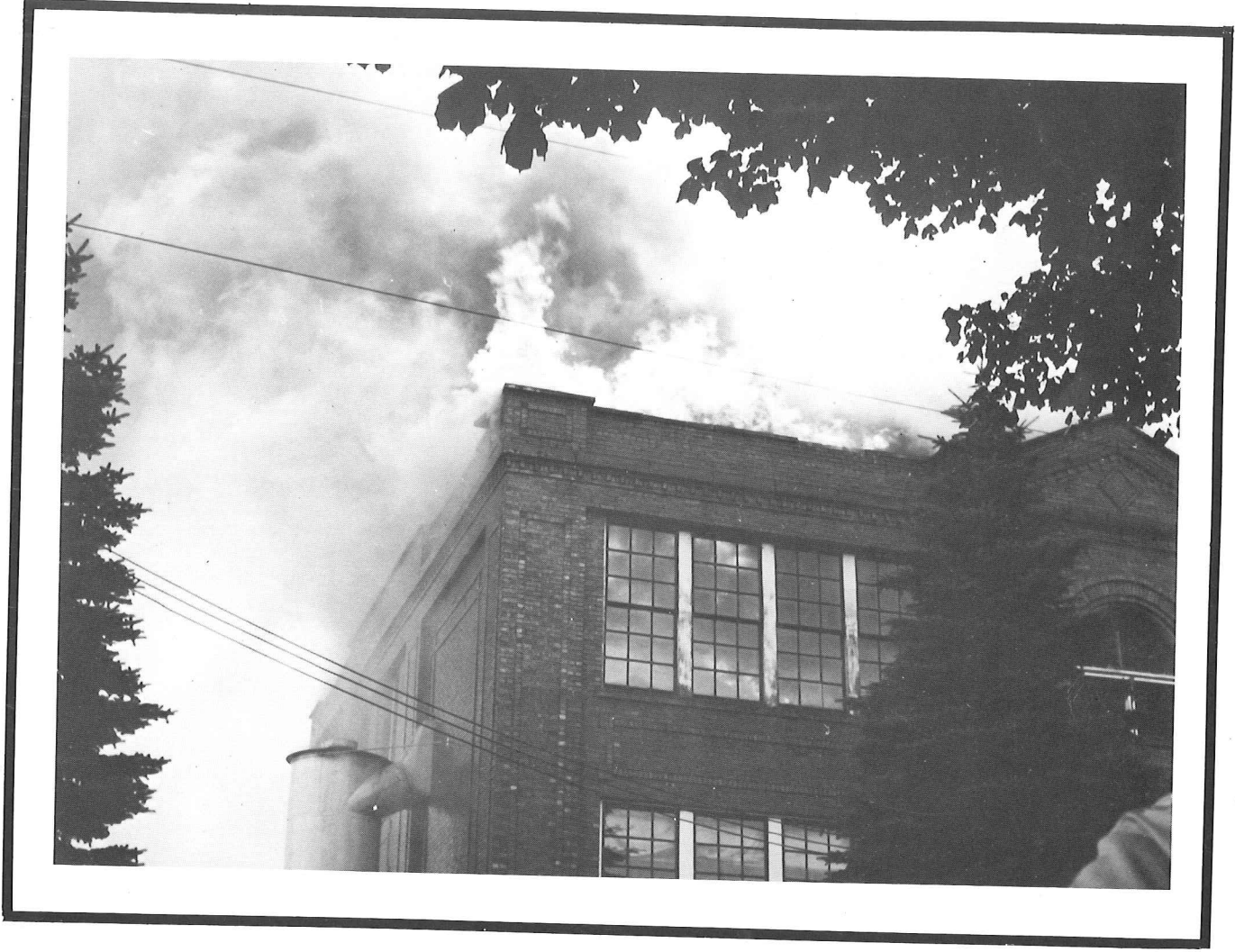

It is with this thought in mind that once again we present for you THE MARLINTONIAN. May you cherish it as a true friend.





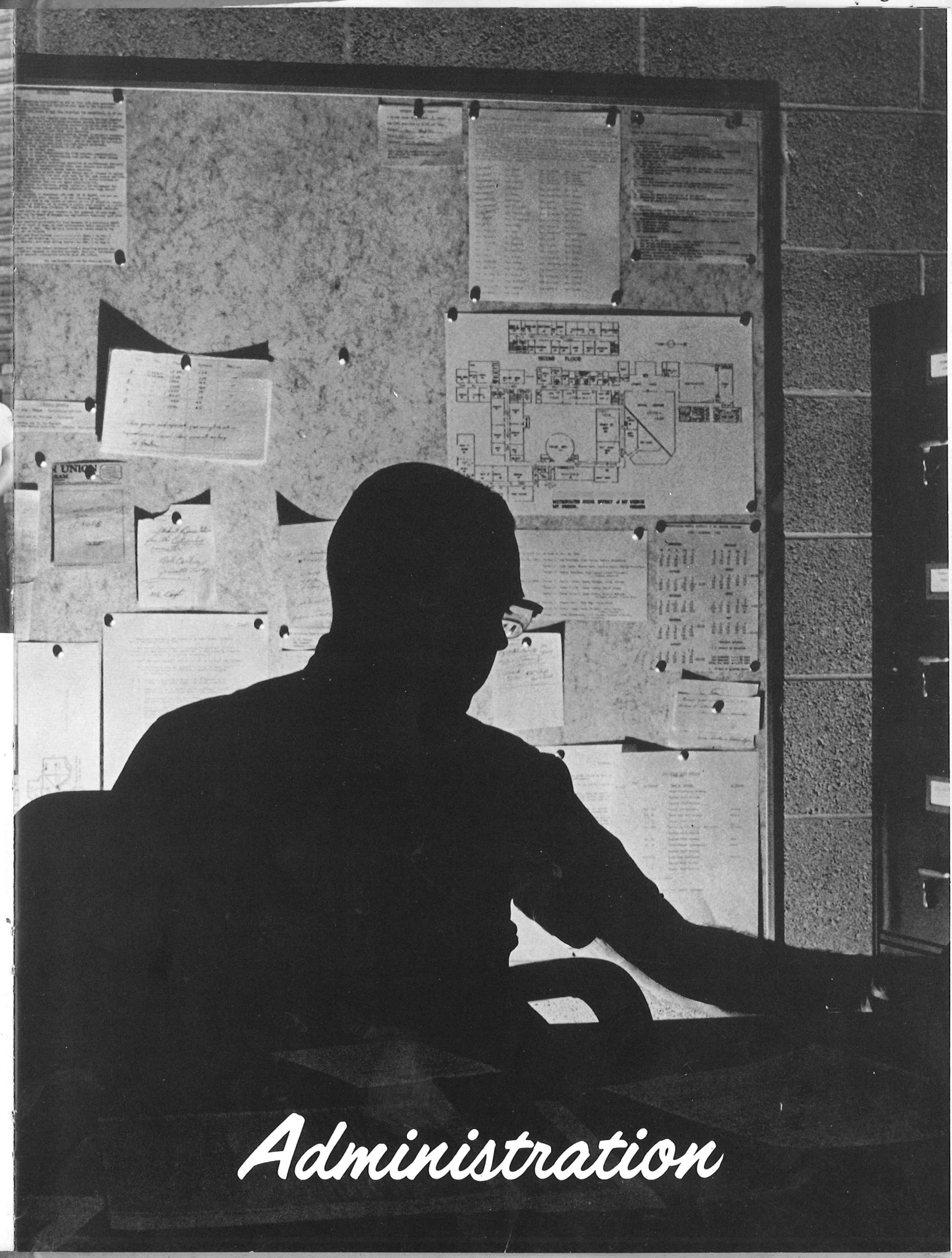
