On 10/24/64 the Chicago Office, through the cover legend address for CG 5824-S*, received a brief air mail letter from CG 5824-S* postmarked London, England, 9:45 a.m., 10/22/64. This letter, in the handprinting of CG 5824-S* with the interpretations of the Chicago Office incorporated in the parentheses, read as follows:

Dear Avery:

Tourists (CG 5824-S* and CG 6653-S) have little to write about but there is one incident (see CGairtel dated 10/21/64 captioned, "SOLO;IS-C") worth mentioning--the one about Broadman's (GUS HALL) boy (DANIEL RUBIN) not being able to find a copy of the magazine (the edition of the "World Marxist Review" which contained GUS HALL's article on the 100th Anniversary of the First International) while in Milwaukee (Moscow). As you know, the European edition (English language European edition of the "World Marxist Review") is printed in Great Britain. Since all printing presses were busy with the elections (British), they did not get around to this chore (publication of this edition of the "World Marxist Review") until just now. This edition will probably not reach the Milwaukee Office (Moscow) for another few weeks.

On 10/26/64 the Chicago Office received through a mail drop maintained for CG 5824-S* an air mail letter post-marked 12:30 p.m., 10/23/64, London, England. The content of this communication was a brief handprinted note prepared by CG 5824-S* together with two clippings from the British Press, unidentified. Set forth below is the verbatim content of this note together with the Chicago Office's interpretation which appears in parentheses:

Dear Norma:

The enclosed clips (from British Press, unidentified) is an excellent summary of the events regarding K's (Premier NIKITA S. KHRUSHCHEV) removal. The U.S. Press is left out because you are undoubtedly up to date on that.

These summaries and discussions with experts (apparently referring to individuals in the CP of Great Britain with whom CG 5824-S* discussed this matter) close to the scene bore out the above, even if the language is from the enemy point of view /Cap press/.

World Communist movement yesterday reached the brink of self-destruction, and stopped just short of going over the brink while the Soviet leaders are given a chance to save what has been an international party from splitting into a multitude of national groups.

Suddenly, the parties that only a few years ago took no orders except from Moscow turned on the Kremlin with a fury that demands explanation and even rectification of the Khrushchev demotion.

No foreign party has publicly demanded the return of Mr Khrushchev to power, but many parties want to have the full details of what happened and why before they even consider approving the Moscow action. If they get no satisfaction, there is every possibility that some at least may tell the new Soviet leadership that they want to wash their hands of the whole dirty business.

The French party, which has of late been the most Moscow-oriented of the large foreign parties, has issued a statement more wounding to the Kremlin in its stark simplicity than the open criticism voiced for some days past by the Italian party. This said;

"The Political Bureau of the French Communist Party wishes to obtain full details and the necessary explanations concerning the conditions and methods under which the changes decided by the Central Committee of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union were carried out. This is why the Political Bureau decided to ask the CPSU Central Committee to receive a delegation of the French Communist Party."

As recently as Monday, the French party paper "Humanite" was saying that the decision was "the exclusive responsibility of the Soviet comrades." Apparently it is still their responsibility, but no longer quite so exclusive.

Unique position

This question of responsibility goes to the root of the matter, for the Communist movement is unique in being an international organisation composed of national parties which have in the past borne the blame for Moscow's actions without having any right or opportunity to influence them. Some parties, indeed, have been all but destroyed by free electorates that scorned them as the puppets of Moscow.

Now the Communist cry is "No annihilation without representation," and it is taking the form of demands to be represented at what would look to them like an impartial inquiry into the reasons and circumstances of Mr Khrushchev's dismissal.

An article in the Swedish Communist paper "Ny Dag" said that the manner of his removal was "unconstitutional" and leaves "a bitter taste in the mouth." The curtain, it said, had fallen overnight--"a grim contrast to the open electoral campaigns" in which millions of voters had recently decided in Sweden, Denmark, and Britain who would lead their countries.

After the recent Soviet party congresses, "it was the general opinion that the methods by which the new leaders have taken over from Khrushchev definitely belonged to the past. This opinion has now been shown to be wrong. Khrushchev's fall is a new reminder of how long a way it is back to the norms which were introduced by Lenin. . . ."

Political crime

The Swedish party is thinking of the effect of the Soviet changes on its own fortunes, but its almost open advocacy of parliamentary elections for the Soviet Union is for a Communist a political crime rather than a deviation. Only reactionaries, according to Soviet propaganda in the past, advocate "free" elections in the Soviet Union.

The Italian party, which was the first to jump into the fray almost as soon as the news became public, has spoken through its elder statesman, Signor Terracini, words which might be easily regarded in the Kremlin as little short of counterrevolutionary: "The replacement

of Khrushchev has been carried out by a method that the Soviet people will not approve."

In a dispatch from Moscow, the Rome Communist "Unita" said that there must have been "some now grave fact, the last straw, that caused the members of the Praesidium to take the extreme decision" on Mr Khrushchev--but nobody knew what it was. When the correspondent of "Unita," Signor Loffa, who is probably the best-informed foreign correspondent in Moscow, is reduced to this kind of speculation, it can be taken for granted that the knowledge of the final cause of Mr Khrushchev's downfall is limited to a very small circle indeed.

It is certainly not to be found in the stories of the Khrushchev personality cult, agricultural mismanagement, of the "Chinese issue," which are being poddled in Moscow. All these issues, and many others on which Mr Khrushchev's management of affairs has been most vulnerable, have been around for a very long while.

The Danish Communist newspaper "Land og Folk" reports from Moscow that the question of Mr Khrushchev's retirement was decided at a Central Committee meeting last February, when he found himself in a minority after proposing that the speech just made by Mr Suslov on the Sino-Soviet dispute should be published.

Praesidium decision

The Central Committee does not decide such issues by a vote in which a minority or a majority could emerge. The decision is usually made by the Praesidium, which recommends a decision to the Central Committee, which then votes accordingly.

"Unita" seems to come nearest to the root of the matter when it mentions the possible relevance of Mr Khrushchev's statement to the Japanese parliamentary delegation. This was the statement in which he made the remark, later denied, that Russia had a "monstrous new weapon" which could destroy all mankind.

The alleged mistranslation was never explained away very convincingly. But this would not have been the first time that Mr Khrushchev had rattled a new weapon to impress those of his associates who were demanding more money to make Russia's defences more secure. And, as has already been pointed out in this correspondence, it was this issue of resource allocation which had indeed come to a head at the beginning of this month when "Pravda" published a statement by Mr. Khrushchev instructing the planners to draw up an economic blueprint that would, in effect, make it impossible for the economy to produce what the military wanted.

ITALIANS FACE A DILEMMA

Rome, October 21

The headline read: "Proclaimed today in Red Square--Khrushchevism without Khrushchev." The paper was the Communist-supported Rome daily "Paese Sera," which was joining its mother-journal, "Unita," in trying to minimise the events of last week in Moscow.

The trouble was that the story beneath the "reassuring" headline did nothing to confirm the headline. The Italian Communist Party is in a dilemma. The party leaders had long sought Mr Khrushchev's removal, regarding him as unstable and at least partly responsible for the break with China.

But Italy is to hold nationwide municipal elections on November 22 and the party in its newly chosen robes of defender of democracy in Italy is acutely embarrassed by the rude method by which Mr Khrushchev was deposed. Luigi Longo, the party chairman, says that the method is to be criticised, and Pietro Ingrao, a noted Communist spokesman, has said: "As a matter of principle, Moscow owes the world an explanation."

Italy not told

The Italian Communists understand that Mr Khrushchev was voted into oblivion by only one vote and that there is the danger of his attempting a comeback, a "danger" because it would mean more awkward headlines. They also express concern, privately, that Mr Brezhnev and Mr Kosygin may not endure even until the Italian municipal elections and that they will be forced to make way for the real masters of the Kremlin, Mr Mikoyan and Mr Suslov. Viewed in terms of local politics, these Kremlin upheavals are disastrous for the party image.

Some younger leaders in the Italian party are expected to urge tomorrow, at the meeting of the Central Committee, that the party seize this occasion to declare its autonomy from Moscow. Signor Ingrao is said to be particularly angry that the French Communists were notified about Mr Khrushchev one week before the event, while the Italian party, the largest in Europe, was told only afterwards. This would explain the decision made in Ivry on October 10 by the French Communists to oppose Khrushchev's excommunication of China and at the same time to condemn Togliatti's testament, which advocated more autonomy for the national parties.

Subsidised

The only Communists here who are going about with puffed-up breasts are the so-called "Cinesi," those Stalinists who defected from the party last year in favour of Mao and a return to Stalinist ideals. They are believed to be a very small group, located mostly in Northern Italy, and subsidised by funds from the Communist-Chinese Embassy in Berne.

Today, Roman walls are decorated with a benevolent picture of Joseph Stalin, with the following crowing words: "Roman Communists! Khrushchev has fallen! Stalin is vindicated! Long live our glorious comrade Stalin!" This poster is so damaging to the Communist election hopes that one may legitimately wonder which party paid for the posters.

DISCUSSIONS AND BRIEFING BY GUS
HALL, OCTOBER 16, 1964

At approximately 10:00 a.m. on the morning of October 16, 1964, GUS HALL, General Secretary of the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), on the basis of previous arrangements, proceeded to the Prince George Hotel, 14 East 28th Street, New York City, where he contacted MORRIS CHILDS of Chicago. HALL had set up this meeting with CHILDS for the purpose of discussing certain matters and problems of which CHILDS was to be aware in connection with his future travel abroad and discussions with leading representatives of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU).

When this meeting commenced, HALL was in a very foul and ugly mood. He was extremely upset by the removal within the past few hours of NIKITA S. KHRUSHCHEV from his leading positions in the CPSU and in the Government of the USSR. HALL complained bitterly that he had been embarrassed and placed in a very bad position because the CPSU had failed to notify this Party of the pending changes.

When CHILDS delivered to HALL a communication which had been received through Party channels dealing with the changes within the CPSU leadership which had just occurred in the Soviet Union, HALL remarked, "To hell with them, they should have sent this message through yesterday." Even when he was informed that the CP, USA had received excellent service on being informed regarding these momentous changes in the leadership of the CPSU and the Government of the USSR and that no message of a similar nature had ever been received by the Party in the past, HALL was not satisfied.

HALL then went on to remark that he did not believe the CPSU was telling this Party everything and that he believed the reasons given for KHRUSHCHEV's replacement were untrue. He said that he had some public meetings scheduled for Saturday and Sunday, October 17 and 18, 1964, and at that time was going to openly state that this Party knew nothing more regarding the changes of leadership in the USSR than had already appeared in the capitalist press and that the CP, USA cannot get a word on this matter any faster than the press.

HALL remarked that in his opinion the Russians should have informed the Party here at least four or five days ago of the pending changes and that if they had, he would not presently be in this embarrassing position. HALL noted that as he now looked back there had been recent signs of a pending change, but at the time he had no reason to expect that it would be forthcoming. He also noted that within the past few days the Hungarian Ambassador, whether to the United States or to the United Nations HALL did not state, returned to this country and sent to him, HALL, a long message in which he had discussed about everything except possible changes in the Soviet Union. On the basis of this message from the Hungarian Ambassador, HALL stated that he concluded that perhaps even Parties within the Soviet orbit had not been made aware of the imminent changes in the leadership of the CPSU.

HALL then very pointedly asked CHILDS "How soon can you be on your way? It is important that we know what the true situation is." CHILDS' response was that he was completely prepared to travel and would be out of the country that week end. CHILDS, however, pointed out to HALL that that individual must understand that his travel and other arrangements are very unique and that he must take precautions and care in order that he can successfully conclude his job for the Party. He also noted that perhaps because of the new conditions existing within the Soviet Union that some of the individuals with whom he has dealt in the past may "be out." CHILDS stated that he would have to feel out the situation carefully within the CPSU and determine exactly what changes might have been made within the key spots.

HALL then advised that he wanted to discuss briefly a few items which he would like CHILDS to take up while abroad. First of all, he wanted CHILDS to carry with him to the Soviet Union a copy of HALL's recent speech to the National Executive Committee, CP, USA meeting in which he dealt with the status of the ideological conflict between the CPSU and the Communist Party of China (CPC). HALL noted, however, that as of the time of this discussion he only had the original copy of the speech from which his report had been made, but he was having his secretary type up copies from the original and when he next saw CHILDS at 4:00 p.m., October 16, 1964, he should have such copies of his speech available.

HALL also noted that he wanted CHILDS to take up with the Russians the matter of FELIX GREENE and protest to them concerning the treatment that individual had been afforded.

According to HALL, the Russians did not treat GREENE right because he was supposed to have pro-Chinese leanings. Yet, they did not make any effort to correct GREENE's wrong conceptions. In addition, ALEKSEI ADZHEBEI, Editor of "Izvestia" and son-in-law of KHRUSHCHEV, had gotten into a "fight" with GREENE. HALL qualified the foregoing, however, by remarking that if the report was true that ADZHEBEI had been kicked out, then he, CHILDS, should not raise the matter of FELIX GREENE with the Russians.

The next matter raised by HALL dealt with the proposed December 15, 1964, editorial or preparatory meeting of CPs scheduled for Moscow. In this connection, HALL stated that in his opinion he did not feel that any of the recent changes within the CPSU leadership would or should bring about any postponement of the meeting and he was proceeding on the basis that such meeting would be held.

HALL then advised that he was going to give to CHILDS the original of the "ALBERTSON document" and wanted him to give it to the Russians in order that they could look at it. According to HALL, DANNY RUBIN, when in Moscow, had given a copy or a photograph of the ALBERTSON document to the Russians and their comment regarding the document which was made to RUBIN was that "the document is a phony and you have been taken." HALL then stated "Sure, we were taken. They say you have been had, but I want you to have them check the original."

CHILDS then noted that a number of handwriting experts throughout the United States had seen the original document and all who had examined it concluded that it was authentic. HALL's reply to this was, "Say there are perhaps 35 or 45 or even 55 handwriting experts in this country. They could have talked to all of them well in advance, don't you think? It would have been easy enough." HALL then remarked that the Party's inquiries with experts and other individuals who have worked in the civil liberties field show that the document has many inconsistencies which tend to show that "we have been taken."

At this point in their discussion, HALL noted that he had to leave but would rejoin CHILDS at 4:00 p.m. at the same location.

Subsequently, as noted, HALL did rejoin CHILDS at 4:00 p.m. HALL at this time was a bit calmer than he had been

during the morning session; however, he informed CHILDS that during the period of his absence he had been continuously harassed by numerous radio and television reporters for a statement of the Party on the changes which had occurred in the CPSU, and because he was ill informed could not respond.

HALL then remarked that he wants information fast regarding these recent events in the Soviet Union and that he was very concerned about them. He suggested that a message be sent immediately to the CPSU that they should open up certain avenues so that CHILDS could communicate with this Party and send information back regarding the recent changes in the CPSU. HALL felt that the Russians should also be advised that they should not take any steps which would hamper such communication by CHILDS with the Party here once CHILDS is abroad. He also informed CHILDS that he would be waiting for the information here and that if communications could not be gotten through, then the Russians should be told that they must allow CHILDS to pack up and come back even if it might be necessary for CHILDS to return at a later time for further negotiations on other matters.

In line with HALL's instructions, as noted above, a message was prepared and drawn for transmittal to the CPSU which read basically as follows:

"Comrade MORRIS CHILDS is now on his way and should be in the USSR in a few days. We hope that you will discuss with him some questions regarding the replacement of N. S. KHRUSHCHEV which have not thus far been made public. Comrade CHILDS has instructions to communicate with us. We hope that you will facilitate these communications. He has further instructions to come back for a time to discuss some of these matters that cannot be aired through communications, even if he would have to return for further discussions and the planned December conference. We favor the convening of the preliminary conference in December even if the broader one need to be postponed." The message was to be signed GUS HALL, General Secretary, CP, USA.

HALL also commented at this same time that he wanted CHILDS to make it known and place it strongly before the Russians that he, HALL, was against any postponement whatsoever of the December 15th editorial meeting although he would not object to any postponement for the larger meeting set for 1965.

Specifically as to the delegation he would select to attend the December 15th meeting, HALL remarked that he had made no definite decision in this regard. However, "Regardless what, you MORRIS will be part of that delegation. I will make it certain the others definitely know this and are correctly informed. Don't worry, I will take care of this matter."

Then HALL repeated that he wanted a very large delegation to attend this December 15th meeting and this point should again be called to the Russians' attention. However, he was not going to demand that all of these individuals participate at the same time and that all of these individuals need not be considered as full delegates and can be named as alternates or even observers. He then stated that he, himself, may attempt to go and he will make a fight for a U.S. passport. If he gets his passport, he would first visit some Latin American countries and then some additional countries outside the Soviet orbit in Europe, and then finally see what he could do to get to Moscow.

HALL also instructed that when CHILDS arrives in Moscow, he should check to determine who had placed the invitation in the message received from the Russians on October 15, 1964, wherein he was invited to attend the November 7th affair here. Specifically, he was to determine if the invitation had been placed by a member of the Presidium or other high body or was just placed there by a lesser official. He remarked that he wanted an answer to this because he is scheduled to be in the Midwest during the period that this affair will be held and that unless there is some urgent reason for talking to some important CPSU official at the November 7th affair, he will not cancel out his Midwest commitments.

HALL then advised further that he wanted another message immediately transmitted in his name to LEONID I. BREZHNEV, First Secretary, Central Committee, CPSU. He stated that this message in essence should be as follows:

"Leonid I. Brezhnev
First Secretary
Central Committee
CPSU

"Dear Comrade:

"The world understands and accepts the fact that there can be differences that can and even do result in changes of

"leadership and that people do get old and sick. What it does not understand is any vagueness or an element of mystery while such changes are made. Any period of unexplained vagueness could result in damaging the prestige of the Soviet Union. We appreciate the problems of the CPSU and the Soviet Government in this matter. The bourgeois press can speculate on why certain changes but Communist spokesmen, under circumstances existing in the United States, can not say anything when they do not know more than what is appearing in the press. This creates unnecessary difficulties. This lack of knowledge and background does not add to the prestige of Communist leaders in capitalist countries who should be at all times come step ahead of the press.

"The retirement of Khrushchev and the transfer of his duties to other tested leaders, is of course, an internal concern to the members of the CPSU and to the citizens of the Soviet Union. We greet the leadership of the great Socialist country and welcome the public declaration on the part of the Central Committee, CPSU of last Thursday, October 15 that the CPSU will continue to promote the policy of peaceful co-existence as announced at the XX, XXI, and XXII Congresses of the CPSU. We also greet the announced intention of the successors of N. S. Khrushchev, in the posts of Party Secretary and State Premier, to carry forward the program of building a communist society at home, international solidarity of the workingclass and all the oppressed, and peace and friendship among the peoples of the world. This declared course will occasion no surprise among those who have learned from long experience to expect and highly value the role of Marxist-Leninists in blazing the trail for social progress.

"With warm fraternal greetings,
Comradely Yours,
Gus Hall,
General Secretary,
CPUSA"

After mentioning the foregoing, HALL caustically remarked that he was saving the text of the message that the Central Committee, CPSU, had directed to the CP, USA regarding the recent changes in their Party and state leadership and that if the CPSU comes out later with additional explanations which are at variance with those that they have furnished, he was going to raise hell and "stick the message up their noses."

In regard to DANNY EUBIN and the rest of the delegation which had recently been in the Soviet Union for a youth gathering, HALL mentioned that they had been mistreated by the Russians and he wanted his feelings in this matter made known to them. He explained that while the American delegation was there representing the leading capitalist country in the world, the Russians put the major emphasis on delegations of Latin Americans and "pip-squeak Africans." He stated that EUBIN had told him that he had noted a lot of opportunism among both the African and Latin American delegates, as many of such delegates and delegations had not taken any position in the ideological fight between the CPSU and the CPC. Yet, HALL noted, EUBIN and the rest of the American delegation fought hard all of the time for the Russian line and received no recognition.

HALL then commented that he was not now having WILLIAM PATTERSON go to Ghana. He stated that PATTERSON had consulted his doctor and the doctor noted that because of PATTERSON's age and history of past heart trouble that he would recommend against such travel. However, PATTERSON will still be a member of the November 7th delegation to Moscow. HALL then added that the Ghana trip on the part of PATTERSON really had not been necessary anyway because HERB APPIEKER had recently visited there. He described APPIEKER's trip as most productive and fruitful. In fact, the recent speech of NKRUMAH at the Cairo meeting of neutrals was, in essence, almost word for word that which APPIEKER had prepared for NKRUMAH. After NKRUMAH's Cairo speech and his return to Ghana, the Americans in Ghana, following the Chinese line, particularly SHIRLEY GRAHAM and those around her, were shocked. HALL felt that there had been good progress made in Ghana and that they were successfully countering the pro-Chinese line there. HALL also noted that NKRUMAH had advised APPIEKER that they would like the Party here to send over Negro and other Marxist teachers and in this connection HALL remarked, "We will send them."

HALL then stated that EUBIN had told him that while he was in Moscow he had been unable to find a copy of the "World Marxist Review" in which HALL's article dealing with the 100th Anniversary of the First International had appeared. HALL stated that CHILDS should check to determine whether the Russians had ever printed this article in the Russian language or attempt to determine perhaps if they had

burned or destroyed all copies of this publication. In this connection, CHILDS told HALL that he did not think this was true since the English language and other language translations of the "World Marxist Review" are made from a master copy which is initially published in the Russian language. HALL, however, wanted this matter looked into and an explanation found as to why his article could not be found in the Soviet Union.

HALL next asked CHILDS to find out when he was in the Soviet Union whether the Russians were aware that a great volume of English language material was being distributed by the Chinese in many countries. He stated that if they are not aware of this, he suggests that they take some action to see what can be done to counteract it. In addition, CHILDS was to find out if the CPSU was aware that the Chinese had recently held world conferences in Peking and Tirana, Albania.

HALL then noted that he wanted CHILDS to contact someone in the CP of Great Britain while he was abroad and set those people straight on a recent article published in an official CP of Great Britain organ. According to HALL, the British Party had published an article authored by MARTHA DODD STERN in which STERN highly praised the ROSEN student group which had visited Cuba. HALL wants the British told that this is an anti-Party and anti-Soviet group and that they should not publish such junk.

HALL then provided CHILDS with a number of copies of his recent speech before the National Executive Committee, CP, USA and the item which he had referred to earlier in the day. At least one of these copies was to be personally transmitted to the CPSU. In addition, he wanted CHILDS to make certain that a number of the other copies were mailed to various Parties throughout the world in order that his position and the CP, USA position in connection with the current CPSU-CPC differences would be clearly understood. Among the Parties and/or publications that HALL would like to have copies of this speech mailed to were the following: Spain, Portugal, Greece, Cyprus, South Africa, Senegal, "African Communist," Dominican Republic, Haiti, Paraguay, Mongolia, Syria, Algeria, Mexico, Bolivia, Peru, Yugoslavia, Ecuador, Guatemala, Honduras, British Guiana, Lebanon, Iraq, and Iran.

In regard to this speech, HALL noted that at one time he had considered the removal of a certain paragraph which appeared on page three. However, now he will not delete this paragraph and feels that it properly belongs in this report. This paragraph was as follows:

"It seems timely that to close one's eyes to the real nature of this split is the most harmful of all mistakes. It is the path to opportunism and capitulation. And to try to pass it off as only a disagreement between the CPs of the Soviet Union and China or to suggest that somehow it is a personal feud between Khrushchev and Mao Tse-tung, is but a further step along an opportunistic path."

HALL next noted that the Russians should be informed that the Party was going to give up on the "National Guardian" and that "we are going to turn the 'Peoples World' into a non-Party paper." He stated that the Party will attempt to reorganize the staff, broaden the paper, and make it a publication more consistent and meaningful to the left.

As to the "National Guardian," HALL stated that there is no question but that "Chinese money" is being used to finance this paper and the Russians should be so informed. He said that RUSS NIXON had recently been attempting to buy up the remaining outstanding stock in the "National Guardian" but had been turned down. In HALL's opinion, it was only with Chinese money that RUSS NIXON would have been able to have purchased such stock.

HALL then stated that the Russians should also be informed that the American Party is in a unique position to help them internationally on the racial question. He stated that the Party here has a good strong, Negro cadre and that they have received many invitations from Parties abroad for CP, USA representatives to visit and speak in African and Asian countries like Kenya, Ghana, India, etc. The Party here is now thinking of sending CLAUDE LIGHTFOOT of Chicago to India in mid-December to speak and visit with the Indian Party. The CP, USA is paying the expenses for such visits now, but it is believed that the Russians should pay in the future because their party will also greatly benefit.

HALL then instructed CHILDS that while he is in the Soviet Union he should attempt to work out with any Latin American CP representative whom he finds there some arrangements for exchanges, both personal and otherwise, between the CP, USA and Latin American Parties. He wanted CHILDS also to find out why and how come the CP, USA had been the only Party in the Western Hemisphere not invited to the conference of Latin American CPs which was scheduled for late November, 1964, in Cuba.

In regard to money requests to be made to the CPSU as a subsidy for the CP, USA in 1965, HALL stated that he had no specific facts or figures that CHILDS should use in this regard and that CHILDS should formulate the request for this money on any basis that he deems suitable and supportable.

However, the Russians should be told not to pay attention to any crisis appeal for money made by such people as JIM JACKSON or JIM ALLEN, etc. In connection with such requests the Russians should completely ignore them and consider only money matters raised by either HALL or CHILDS. In addition, HALL stated that the Russians should be told that from time to time he has to "create a money crisis" in the Party in order that the leadership does not feel that the Party has unlimited funds available and because he must necessarily conceal the fact from the membership and leadership in general that monies are being received from the CPSU. CHILDS was heard to state that he would handle HALL's request for the Party subsidy as noted but must demand from HALL that this individual instruct any person visiting the Soviet Union to "keep their mouths shut regarding inner-Party matters, particularly finances." He further suggested that HALL must specifically inform such individuals as PHIL BART, who is presently scheduled to head up the November 7th delegation to the Soviet Union, that "BART and his pip-squeaks must say nothing." HALL agreed that he would talk to BART on this matter.

On October 17, 1964, CG 5824-S* advised SA RICHARD W. HANSEN that several individuals, namely [redacted] an individual who had been expelled from the CP, USA for ultra-left activities, and ELMER JOHNSON, both of whom are from Chicago, had been in contact with WANGERIN. These persons are presently outspoken supporters of the CP of China ideology and support the CP of China in the ideological dispute with the Soviet Union. In their contacts with WANGERIN, both [redacted] and JOHNSON have offered him some financial assistance, the extent of which is unknown, and have endeavored to get WANGERIN, a charter member of the CP, USA, to disavow allegiance to the CP, USA and support the Chinese position. Both [redacted] and JOHNSON individually and jointly have allegedly told WANGERIN that the CP of China would be happy to accept him and his wife in the Peoples Republic of China. According to CG 5824-S*, it is unknown upon whose authority the offer regarding the acceptance in the Peoples Republic of China was made, but it is known that as of early October, 1964, WANGERIN had not accepted their offer.

The source further noted that it was the general feeling of the leadership of the CP of Illinois that both JOHNSON and [redacted] do have some contact with pro-Chinese elements in the United States and would undoubtedly be in a

Previous memoranda advised that CG 5824-S* departed on Solo Mission 16 to the Soviet Union on 10/19/64. CG 5824-S* carried with him a personal message from Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, to Lenoir I. Brezhnev, First Secretary, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union, requesting the inside story concerning the recent political upheaval in the Soviet Union which resulted in the removal of Nikita S. Khrushchev from power. On 10/20/64, NY 694-S* at the instructions of Gus Hall, transmitted a message to the Soviets making reference to the message being carried by CG 5824-S* and stating that CG 5824-S* after being briefed on the reasons for Khrushchev's removal was to return to the United States to brief Hall in the event that this matter could not be aired through communications.

The Soviets beamed a coded short-wave radio message from Moscow to NY 694-S* this morning advising that CG 5824-S* would return to the United States in two days to brief Hall on the recent political changes in the Soviet Union.

For information. CG 5824-S* will be promptly debriefed upon his return and you will be advised as to the results of his mission.

My memorandum dated October 27, 1964, captioned "Soviet Personnel Intelligence Activities" furnished information to you concerning the recent political upheaval in the Soviet Union which resulted in the removal of former Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev from power.

Material contained in the enclosed memorandum, supplied by sources which have furnished reliable information in the past, sets forth the version of Khrushchev's removal which was furnished to the Communist Party, USA, by the Communist Party of the Soviet Union. It is noted that the version of Khrushchev's removal furnished to the Communist Party, USA, differs materially from that set forth in my memorandum of October 27, 1964, which contained information supplied by a different source.

Because of the sensitive nature of our sources, we have classified this communication and its enclosure "~~TOP SECRET~~." This information is being furnished to other officials of the Government.

WITH COMMUNIST PARTY OF THE SOVIET UNION
REPRESENTATIVES ON QUESTION OF LITERATURE
SALES IN UNITED STATES**

GUS HALL, General Secretary of the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), in connection with a briefing on matters to be taken up by a representative of the CP, USA with representatives of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU) in the Soviet Union, turned over two items which had been prepared by PHIL FRANKFELD of World Books, New York City. The items provided by HALL were captioned, "M E M O" and "SALES TO PROGRESSIVE BOOKSHOPS," each of one page in length. According to HALL, these items could serve as the basis for discussion with literature people in the Soviet Union.

The full text of the above-noted items is set forth below:

"M E M O

- "1) See attached sheet giving total paid orders from progressive bookstores, April-August 1964.
- "2) Two of the progressive bookstores now receive books etc. directly from M/K, thereby eliminating New Era as wholesale-distributor. These are: Progressive (L.A.) and International (S.F.).
- "3) The Morning Freiheit ordered 100-150 copies per issue of Sovetish Heimland. They are now receiving their copies directly from M/K. We have had to cut our order accordingly.
- "4) No importer of English translations of Soviet books, etc. can possibly exist on the sales of English books. They depend in the main on the sale of Russian & Ukrainian language books.
- "5) There is fierce competition between importers of Soviet books in our country. They can also be imported from abroad-England, France, Canada etc. without having to pay duty & other costs. One such importer in Chicago announces 'slashing price reductions' and offers prices which are almost impossible to meet, hard as one may try. By offering bargain basement prices, it tends to reduce the intrinsic worth of Soviet books in the English language.

- "6) We continue to exist through the continued sale of out-of-print Marxist books & pamphlets. Despite sharp reductions in overhead (rent, utilities, labor etc.) the perspective is not clear as to whether we can continue much longer.
- "7) We have paid out to M/K over \$2,000.00 from June 25 to Sept. 2nd.
- "a) We are committed by contract to run ads in the NY TIMES thru Nov. 6th amounting to \$900.00. It must be paid by then.
- "b) The last check I drew was on Aug. 31 for the week of Aug. 17-22nd. I have not been paid now for four weeks. The immediate prospects are bleak about being able to draw anything for the next two weeks at least.
- "8) Some immediate steps would include receiving the balance due for advertising & promotion of M/K books for 1964. The possible arrangement of a monthly allocation as a service fee. Revisiting all accounts for new orders & re-orders, etc.

M/K referred to above is Mezhundarodnaja Kniga, the official Soviet exporter and importer of printed material such as books, newspapers, etc.

INTERNAL SECURITY - C

The Bureau's informant in this case, Chicago 5824-S*, left New York on 10/19/64 for a SOLO trip to Soviet Russia to represent the Communist Party, USA in discussions with the Soviets. He was specifically instructed by Gus Hall to attempt to determine the inside story concerning the recent political upheaval in the Soviet Union which involved the removal of Nikita Khrushchev. He was instructed by Hall that if important information in this connection was obtained, he should return to the States immediately to brief Hall in order that Hall could properly present the Soviet position in this matter. We told the informant to comply with these instructions in order that we could have immediately the benefit of any information he should develop in this connection in Russia.

We received a message through our clandestine system of communications from the informant to Hall yesterday in which the informant stated that he would be returning to New York within two days for a conference with Hall. A further communication was received this morning indicating that Chicago 5824-S* is now in Paris, and is seeking plane reservations to New York. He expects to arrive in New York tonight.

The Chicago Office requested authority to send Special Agents Richard W. Hansen and Walter A. Boyle, who are the contacting Agents who deal with Chicago 5824-S*, to New York in order that he may be debriefed for such information as he may have developed. It appears that the informant did not bring his wife back with him on this trip since no mention is made of her. She apparently remained in Russia, which suggests that the informant will be in the States only a few days and will then return to Moscow to continue his discussions with the Soviets.

In view of the likelihood that the informant would have information of interest, it was considered desirable to have the Agents who have been contacting him meet him in New York tonight.

SUGGESTION, CHOU EN LAI HIMSELF WOULD HEAD THE CHINESE DELEGATION. CHOU EN LAI SUGGESTED ALL SATELLITES BE ADVISED OF SOVIET INVITATION TO CHINESE, AND THAT DELEGATIONS FROM ALL SATELLITES EXCEPT YUGOSLAVIA BE INVITED TO CELEBRATION.
