

This witness places John Ramsey at her home near Fairfax on January 14, 26, and about the 28th, 1923, and on a date intervening between those dates.

This witness is the Chief of Police at Fairfax, Oklahoma, and will testify to seeing John Ramsey drive into Fairfax in the early part of January, 1923, in a major Ford car, and suspecting that he was ending whishey, with the social tance of his deposite watched Ramsey's movements very closely, and recalls that he saw Ramsey in Fairfax during the following days of January as frequently as other citizens that resided there. Mr. Parker places John Ramsey definitely at Fairfax on January 14, 1923.

This witness substantially correlerates the testimony of Bob Parker, except that he is unable to establish any definite date.

This witness substantiates the testimony of Bob Parker and Jim Rhodes, and definitely places January 17 and 18, 1923 as dates he saw John Ramsey at Fairfax, Okla.

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This witness operated a gas station at Fairfax, Oklahoma, and will testify that John Ramsey drove in to his place in the early days of January, 1923, in a new Ford car, and in conversation this witness askel Ramsey where he got the new car and Ramsey's answer was that he managed for it. Following this occurrence Ramsey visited his place and made purchases of gas as regularly as any other patron residing in the vicinity.

This witness testified to seeing John Remsey in a cafe in the latter part of January, 1923, at Fairfax, Oklahoma, but was unable to establish positive date.

This witness placed John Ramsey in company with Henry Roan, in a cafe at Fairfax, Orlanda about a week or ten days before Roan was found murdered.

Phis witness, at his trial in Guthrie, Oklajoma, placed himself at Ripley, Oklahoma, with his family, from about January 7, 1923, contingually until a date some time about January 25, 1923, at which time he visited Fairfax with his wife. This witness at his trial at Oklahoma City testified that he reached Ripley about January 15th, 1923.

No criminal record of Subject is shown in the file of this case.

By Mr. Leahy:

Q.State your name.

Q. You are acquainted with J.M. Springer, one of the atterneys for Ransey and Hale?

A.Yes, sir.

Q. Were you in attendance in Guthrio in July and August of year at the trial of Ramsey and Hale for the murder of E nry

A.I was there all the time.

Q.Were you subposmeed there?

L.Yes. I was.

Q.On behalf of the government?

A.Yes, sir.

Q. During the time that you were there did Springer have a conversation with you in which he tried to get you to say that an automobile drove up to your house a short time before Hanis Roan's body was found, and with Curley Johnson and Boy bursh in the car and had the body of Henry Roan in the car.

A.Yes.sir.

Q. Was that true or false, that they drove up there?

A.It is absolutely false - there was no car there at all.

Q.Did you ever hear of such a thing prior to the time of his sug gesting it to you?

A.No, sir.

Q.State what he said with reference to trying to get you to testify to that?

A.He just asked me if I remembered it and he said "You know that car was up there", and I said, "I know there was not". H said "You know you saw that car", and I said "I did not see that the Well, we had quite a little argument about it.

Q. In that conversation, did he tell you that if you about remove ber that that there would be \$2,500.00 in it for you

I was called as a witness and went to Guthrie in the Hale-Ramsey has case, and after I testified I was told by Mr. Springer that I could go nome that they would call me back if needed. I went to Pairfax and the 2nd day later Charlie Hale, Bill Hale's 2 brother, come and told me they wanted me at Juthrie, that Mr. Springer wanted to see me. We went to Guthrie Hale's car. At Buthrie I met Mr. Springer after court and in front of Fed building and we walked down the street and stopped in a stairway. Mr. Springer then said to me, "That God dam Bill Taylor come down here and swore that John Ramsey was at your house on Jan 15 and we can't have it that way. in mist change that evidence some way". I said "Well, Mr. Springer, hat 3 12 sure was the way it was", and Springer then repeated, "The: Va calast have it that way and we got to change it that is bad evidence . I again told him that was the truth and I would testify to the mame thing. Springer got mad and wheeled around and started away then asked him if I could go home and he said No and left.

Witness Beres stated to Mr. John Leahy, on October 7th, 1925, at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, that some time after the trial of W. K. Hale and John Ramsey at Guthrie, which resulted in a hung Gry, he was approached by Subject Springer at Fairfax, Oklahoma, Springer endeavoring to have him remember that Roy Bunch and Curley Johnson drove up to Sol Smith's ranch house with the dead body of Henry Roam in a car and Sol Smith directed them towhere the body was later found, Springer telling him that he, Berse, could remember these facts if he cared to and insisted that he remember them. This witness will again be interviewed and a written statement obtained from him.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

SULMARY REPORT

It is charged that Subjects Cornett, Homer Rowe and Carl Rowe conspired to "commit perjury in connection with the trials of W. K. Hale and John Ramsey, murderers of Henry Roan, an Osege Indian. Subject Cornett is an uncle of Subjects Homer and Carl Rows. Subjects testified for the defense in the trials of this case at Guthris and Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. At each of these trials Subject Cornett attempted to vindicate Defendants Hale and Ramsey and place the murder upon Curley Johnson, now deceased, and Roy Bunch, who married the widow of Henry Roan, the testimony of Subject Cornett being substantially corroborated by Subjects Homer and Carl Rowe, which was contradicted and clearly shown to be false by the developments of the trial.

Names of witnesses and their statements contradicting evidence giver Subject Henry Cornett follows:-

ED ROBERTSON. Guthrie, Oklahoma.

(Summary of information obtained by him) Witness Rob atson was a special employee of the Government in the invest gation of the Osage Murder cases and questioned Subject Cornette relative to his knowledge of the marders. Cornett stated that he lived near where the marders were committed and knew Hale and was familiar with the underworld of that section.

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but did not know anything about the Osage Murder cases but had an idea that Bill Hale was connected with all the murders. Stated that the pending state case against him. Grant Cornett, could be easily beaten if he was out of jail and in a position to prepare a defense; that he had a Federal case and in which he expected a mandate to be handed down in a few days, which would put him in the Federal Penitentiary: that if the Government would delay its case so that he could make defense in his pending state cases that he would gladly go among the underworld in the Osage country and endeavor to find leads that would assist the Jovernment in the investigation, but that he knew nothing personally of the cases. Cornett was granted a stay of sixty days and he

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we tinto the Osage country to collect information. He kept in direct touch with the sest Robertson and repeatedly reported to Mr. Robertson that he was unable to fininformation that would any light on the guilty parties involved in any of these case. The idea was suggested to Subject Cornett that Roy Bunch might be implicated in the Roan murder. Shortly thereafter Subject reported to witness Robertson that he had a witness, Ray Smith, who was in possession of circumstances that pointed to Roy Bunch and others as Roan's murderer. Ray Smith was located and interviewed by Frank S. Smith, Special Arent of the Department of Justice, in the presence of Roberson and Subject Cornett, and Ray Smith made the following statement:

May name is R.B. Smith. I am a farmer and reside seven miles west of Fairfax.

"I knew Henry Roan and his wife, Mary Roan, for more than a year before Henry I had heard that Roy Bunch was laying up with Mary Rosh and Roan was killed. I saw them together many times. There was common talk that there was going to be trouble between sunch and Heary Roan. About three weeks before Ro. n was: found dead, I was at Henry Cornett's Ranch and Roy Dunch, Bill Taylor and 3 Mary Esan drove up in a car. Henry Cornett made the remark to Roy B. that if he did not look out that Henry Roan would catch him with his, Rosa ! , old : lady and kill him or something like that, and Bunch remarked that he would best Roan to it. Then Taylor said leave him to me, meaning Roan, and 2 will me cold cosh him. There was several other remarks made. Three days bet Te Houly Roan's body was found I was going from my home to Burbank, when I got within a short distance from where the rold coming from Henry Cornett's ranch run, into the Pairian rold, I saw Roy Bunch and Bill Taylor coming from towards, Cornett's ranch is a buick car. As I went through the gate Bunch motioned to me to leave the gete open, which I did. I drove on and turned in to the lake Burbank road and Sunch and Taylor turned into the Fairfax road going towards : Fairfax. Just after I turned into the Burbank road I met Henry Roan coming from towards Burbank in a Buick car. When he passed me I saw he was dinking or under the influence of whiskey. He passed me and went towards Pairfax. From where I met Bunch and Taylor on the Cornett road, they would have just about had time to mast Henry Roan when he got to where they struck the main & Fairfax road. After I passed Roan I paid no more attention to either of them. After I heard of Roan being found dead, the first thing I thought of was that Bunch and Taylor had met him and killed him.

Frank S. Smith, Special Agent, Department of Justice,

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Will testify that based on information obtained from deflorertson, then special employee of the Bovernment, that Subject Cornett lived in the Osage country during the period of the various murders and that Cornett that pressed a desire to assist the Bovernment and that owing to his acquaintance with the underworld in the Osage country and that if he could go into that a court has could pick up some leads that would assist the overnment.

Based on this theory a stay of executions and

with the comise that Cornett would get and furnish to the Department of Justice each information that he could find. Repeatedly after this Cornett reported to Agent Smith that he was unable to obtain any information, but would continue to try.

Roy Bunch, Fairfax, Omlahoma.

Will testify that all the evidence given by Henry Cornett, Horie Rowe and Carl Rowe in the trial of Bill Hale and John Ramsey, at Juthrie and Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, was false in its entirety, and also the facts set out in the first statement of Ray Smith; that he was not at Henry Cornett's

1- place with Bill Taylor and Mary Roan as testified to by these witnesses; that he was 2 never at Henry Cornett's place in company with Bill Taylor; that he was not on good terms with Bill Taylor at that time, nor prior to that for a long period of time; that he owned no automobile at the time that these witnesses testified he was at Cornett's; that Mary Roan Bunch had no automobile at that time as it had been confiscated at that time under the law and later was sold.

8. Mary Roan Bunch, 9 Pairfax, Oklahoma. This witness will corroborate in detail testimony given by Roy Bunch.

1 Bill Taylor, 2 Fairfax, Oklahoma. Will testify that he was never at Cornett's place but one time in his life and that was a year and a half, or proximately that period of time, prior to Roan's murit; that he was never at Cornett's place after that time with anyone; that the testimony of witnesses Henry Cornett, Homie Rowe and Carl Rowe is false in its entropy; that

he was not on speaking terms with Roy Bunch for six months prior to the finding of Brown's body and for a long period thereafter; that he was employed in Fairfax, Oklahome, as a mechanic, working eight hours a day and did not lose any time prior to the time which these witnesses testified that he was at Cornett's ranch, nor thereafter, and the records of the firm for whom he was employed disclose that he was said for eight hours service for each day from January 1st until March 1st, 1923, and was not absent from duty any time during this period of time.

T. B. White, formerly Special Agent, Department of Justice, now Warden of Federal Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas. Will testify substantially to the same facts as set out in testimony of Special Agent Frank S. Smith.

W. T. Carroll, Fairfax, Oklahoma.

At Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on October in, 1926, W.T. Carroll appeared as a withest backfore the Federal Grand Jury, and made 11; following signed statement to Agent rank S. Smith and Mr. John Leahy:

By Mr. Leahy:

4. Your name is W. T. Carroll.

A. Yes, Sir.

Q. You reside at Fairfax?

A. Yes, sir.

Q. You know Homie Rowe?

A. Yes, sir.

Q. How long have you known him?

A. About 3 years.

Q. Do you recall him being subpostated as a witness to attend the trial of John Remsey and W. K. Hale at Guthrie a short time ago?

A. Yes, sir.

Q. Before he went down to the trial did you have a conversation with him?

A. Yes, sir.

Q. In that conversation did he state to you whether or not he knew anything with reference to the Hale and Hamsey case?

A. He said no did not know anything.

Q. Did you caution him against being influenced by anyone to testify about something he did not know anything about?

A. Yes, sir.

Q .- What did you say in that regard?

- A. We went out to the ranch and I told him I heard he had been sufficiented as a witness and told him not to tell anything but the truth and not to let anyone influence him in telling anything but the truth.
- Q. Was that in response that he said he did not know anything?

A. Yes. sir .

Q. Have you talked with him since he was down there as a willess?

A. Yas, but not on these matters.

Q. He didn't state what he testified to?

A. Ro, sir.

In the fere part of Jennary 1925 John Bensey came to my home, where I now, reside, and was driving a new Ford Readster, and told me at this time and place that Bill Eale had bought and paid for said car for him (Remsey) and that he got the car at Ponca City, Okla. I then asked Bander my hale had given him the said car, and Bandey told me that Hale had given him said car for doing a jet for him. At this time John Bansey's family was living at Ripley, Okla., and John Remsey himself was staying at Eenry Grammer's place. Several times thereafter, and prior to the killing of Henry Roam, John Ramsey would come to my home and on one or two escasions asked so how far I would go for money, and about this time some one came up and interrupted the conversation.

After the killing of Henry Rosm, while I was visiting at John Ramsey's house, Ramsey said, when I asked him if hale had anything to do with caknew anything about the killing of Henry Rosm: "Yes", he thought Hale did know, but they would have a hard time proving it because Hale than that would not talk, and he thought it would be easy to stick it.

John Ramsey said: "We're ready to go - everything is ready to go". Bill Hale said: "Be sure and don't fail. "John Ramsey made same answer to the effect: "You never knew me to fail". When John Ramsey came from the booth he said: "Webb, don't you never tell anything I said. You are not allowed to, are you?" While I cannot state as to the exact date the above mentioned conveysation took place, I do very clearly remember it was just a fire days before Henry Boan's body was found near Fairfax, Okla.

In the following fall season, same year, I was sitting in front of the telephone office at Fairfax when John Remsey came up to whe I was sitting. Remsey told me to come out - he wanted to give me one brock corn - he wanted to give me some - that I had been good to him and he wanted to be good to ma. I said: "John I done see why you should be good to me". And he said: "Well, maybe you have done more than you think you have

While Earsey and I were talking Bill Hale walked back and forth, but did not say anything. At the time of Bill Hale's arrest he remarked to me: "I want you to stand pat old boy - I'll depend on you". This remark was at Bill Hale's house at Pairfax, Ohla. at the time he was taken into custody by Federal officers".

K. Templeton, County Attorney for Osage County, wanted to give you a ticket and a small amount of money for your return to Denver, Colin and that you refused to accept the ticket and money, and that you stated to T. J. Leeby that you were entitled to a considerable amount of money for this services you had rendered to the Osage Tribe. I wish you would just state now what it was that C. K. Mampleton and P. J. Leahy said to you with reference to your return to Colorado, and about furnishing your ticket, and how such matter came up, if it did come up.

I was in Bartlesville, Loaby and Templeton came out of court. John Leahy se id to Temploton "that are we going to do with Matth? He said he would keet me a ticket to Colorado and expense menny. I said "I want to see you at Pawhusks, Mr. Leaby". When I saw him at Pawhuska I said "the Osages wan" to give me some money for what I did for them in the murder trial". He said "Matt, the Indians don't owe you anything." I said "they don't owe me : ay money, but they are willing to give me some, and I wish you would see M Wright and see if there are some arrangements cans be made so the Indiana

can give me money for services rendered in the past".

College did you think that the Gosge Indians should give you some money? . A A. Beceuse I had been in these cases for about two years and had not received a dollar in salary or compensation.

- Q. You thought you were entitled to some compansation for the time you had spent and devoted to this cause?
- A. Yes.
- Q. Where did this conversation take place?

Upon arriving in Denver and finding out what he wished the affidavit to contain I told him thut I would have nothing to do with it for it was contrary to the facts that had been sworn to by me in trials past, and also been admitted by both of the defendants and I could not assist him in getting that afficevit as it was not the facts in the case.

- Then before you started with Weaver to Colorade you did not know the nature of the affidavit he desired to secure from Shorty Theeler?
- A. Mo.
- Q. He did not reveal that to you?
- Q. Then was it that he revealed the nature of the affidavit he wanted to secure?

Sir:

I have just had an interview with Mr. J. R. Burger with reference to the above entitled matter, and I concur in the opinion of Mr. Leahy, Special United States Attorney General, in that some Agent be personally stationed at Pawhuska to keep track of Government witnesses and watch the manoeuvers of the defense, as you are doubtless well aware that the Defendant and his Attorneys are doing everything that can be done to prevent a fair and impartial trial of this cause.

It has also come to my attention that probably some of the Attorneys for Mr. Hale have been in Denver, Colorado, with Government witness Matt Williams, in an endeavor to cause this Witness to commit perjury, or at least to change his testimony. It might be important to the Government that this matter be investigated and that Mr. Williams' statement be corroborated at Denver. It is the policy of the Government in this case to prosecute any and all persons who are guilty of perjury or subordination of perjury.

Mr. Leahy, as I understand it, has asked that Mr. J. R. Burger come to Colorado Springs for a conference and that he, Mr. Leahy, got in touch with Mr. White prior to the time that Mr. Leahy took his vacation, in this respect.

I have turned over to Mr. Leahy all the records in this office for his perusal.

As I understand it, Mr. Leahy has gone to Colorado Springs so that he might study this case undisturbed and to be in good physical trim when the case comes on for trial September 4.

I might suggest that if Mr. Burger is given authority to go to Colorado Springs to confer with Mr. Leahy, he might also take the investigation at Denver in connection therewith.

I trust that you will pardon these suggestions and any presumption that there may be on my part, what I do is for the best interests of the Government.
