Dear Sir:

This letter being written for the purpose of advising you of the splendid co-operation and assistance furnished this and other agents of the Bureau during the investigation and trial of the W. E. (Bill) Hale case in connection with the Osage murder cases, by J. Geo. Wright, Superintendent of the Osage Indian Agency at Pawhuska, Oklahoma, and his Assistants, Judge Humphrey, Tribal Attorney, and Mr. Wright's Chief Clerk, Mr. McShan. Superintendent Wright's and his Assistants co-operation and assistance in said investigation, cannot be over-estimated. For instance, he furnished this and other agents means of transportation, automobiles and drivers which expedited matters in a way that could not have been done otherwise in the limited time. For instance, he assigned special enforcement officers T. A. Hubbard, J. L. Pyle, and C. C. Graves, all experienced men possessed with arresting authority, and well acquainted with the country and conditions. These men drove agents over the country in locating witnesses and checking of jurors, in the worst kind of weather, and on several occasions have accompanied this and other agents on trips which was necessary to work continuously without rest or sleep for twenty-four hours or more to expedite matters in a limited time.

For your information these officers expressed to this Agent their willingness in the future in co-operating with the Bureau agents in the apprehension of criminals and fugitives that might be in their district and in violation of the Federal laws, and in reality work as one unit in this respect bringing to justice Federal violators.

Trusting this will assist you in the future should similar conditions and circumstances arise, I am,

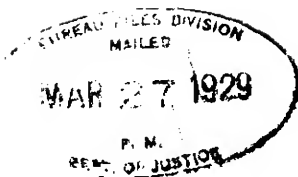

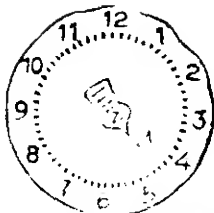



Dear Mr. Breniman:

I enclose herewith copy of the issue of the "Tulsa Daily World", under date of Thursday, September 19, 1929, and call your attention to an editorial under the heading "Government Espionage", on page 8 thereof.

You will recall this is the matter about which I talked with you when you were in Tulsa recently and in the office. The particular thing of interest to this District is the W. K. Hale trial at Pawhuska, mentioned therein.

This article charges that the government prosecutors, through the government agents, constantly watched the jury or jurors for weeks; while the facts are that this is not true. The government officers or the government prosecution had no interest in watching the jury at all in the trial of this case, and did not do so; and none of the other matters mentioned in the article with reference to the Hale trial are true so far as I know.

The matters mentioned therein with reference to the deal between federal prosecutors and Dick Gregg (a convict witness, so I am advised) are not the facts. My information is that Dick Gregg was released to the State of Oklahoma by the Kansas Penitentiary authorities for the State of Oklahoma's use in the trial of its state cases at Pawhuska, and was in charge and custody of state officers when he made his escape, and the government had nothing to do with it.

I think the gentleman who wrote this editorial ought to be interviewed, and it should be ascertained where he got his information with reference to these things, and probably he and his informers, if any, should be called before a federal grand jury to disclose these alleged violations, if they have any knowledge thereof, which I am satisfied they have not.

GOVERNMENT ESPIONAGE

It was in the SINCLAIR case at Washington that the government first espoused the theory of espionage as a technical crime. It was the government's contention that was one of the reasons why Henry H. Halle was so successful as almost the only man to escape the government's clutches. It was alleged that he had set a watch over the government's activities in their private lives and was able to get charge of the government's activities of a State and to use the same for a great many years of operation and his income was derived from the same. It is very interesting to note that in the case of Halle it did not come from the government but from the activities of the government. This is a rather bold exposure.

Right here at home the same sort of zealous exposure was used in a federal court case. It was the case of W. K. Hale at Tulsa. It was fully as exposed and his, so far as we know, not been exposed—that many agents of the government constantly watched the jury or jurors for words. It will be recalled that at the time there was great hurry over the alleged improprieties over the espionage. No real basis was found, it is recalled. But anyway, the young army or snipers tried to earn the pay.

Another phase of the HALE matter which seems to the average responsible citizen to be much more important than keeping SINCLAIR closely confined to a jail on technical charges, was the reported deal of federal prosecutors with DICK GREEN, a convict witness. He is said to have been provided immunity or leniency in some form. Anyway, he made a remarkably easy escape from jail. As a result he killed two earnest and peaceable highway patrolmen in Tulsa. What other calamities may have come or may yet come from that disagreeable HALE episode we do not know. Certainly the general and specific effects of such deals are bad.

What we want to get over is that the valiant prosecutors cannot properly substitute conviction upon technicalities for conviction upon facts and that espionage of witnesses and jurors and shouting about their possible corruption should not be as liberally practiced by agents of the government who make similar things the basis of persecution for an individual. There has been much hypocrisy, much howling about the wolf, in this SINCLAIR affair. We hope the facts bearing upon the activities of the prosecution there and elsewhere will be brought to light. If it is bad for an individual to practice espionage it is bad for the government to do the same thing.

21 Henry Roan, full blood Osage Indian, was murdered between January 24, 1922 and February 6, 1923, and his body was found on Section Thirty-Four (34) Township Twenty-Five (25) N. R. 5 E., Osage County, Oklahoma the same being the regulated homestead allotment of Nok-Pah-Pe (Rose Little Star).

26 Subject John Ramsey was jointly indicted with W. K. Hale in the District Court of the United States for the Western District of Oklahoma, at Guthrie, Oklahoma, January, 1926 term.

30 In the indictment it was charged that John Ramsey committed crime of murder in Osage County by shooting Henry Roan on an Indian allotment under the exclusive jurisdiction of the United States of America, and that William K. Hale aided and abetted and protected the said John Ramsey in the commission of said crime. Hale and Ramsey were tried together and convicted of the charge in said indictment in the said Court for the Western District of Oklahoma on the 29th day of October, 1928 at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

38 On an appeal from the charge and conviction in said case to the Circuit Court of Appeals to the Eighth Circuit, both Hale and Ramsey were granted a new trial; Hale since given a new trial in the Northern District of Oklahoma, and again convicted by a jury and now serving a life sentence in the Federal Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas; no appeal taken by Hale from the last conviction; new trial for subject John Ramsey set for trial in the Northern District of Oklahoma at Lawton, Oklahoma, on November 15, 1929.

Will testify that Dewey Selph was well known to him prior to his death and was serving sentence in the Arkansas State Prison under the name of W. D. Bailey, that Subject died on August 21, 1929, on this prison farm, cause of death, congestion. Dr. Britt also testified that he saw the body of Dewey Selph, after he had died, and that he can establish the death as above stated.

In addition to above named witnesses and [unclear] have been re-interviewed concerning this case, the Government has a number of other witnesses subpoenaed to be used as witnesses in event the defense should use W. K. Hale as witness at the trial of case.
