Reference is made to your latter of Pedruary 11th Aurthor with regard to the OCAGO INDIAN cases.

I do not want any cases undertaken by you unless there is a possibility of their being prosecuted in the United States Courts, in other words, while you were not responsible in any way for the initiation of the Osage Indian cases. I nevertheless am convinced there has not been a legal basis of authority for our doing the work and want to avoid this in the future, so that when a case is referred to you and you find there is no possibility of its being handled in a United States Court you are to turn it over to the State authorities.

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OSAGE INDIAN MURDER CASE

At a conference between Attorney General Short. of the State of Oklahoma, and Special Agent Smith, a decision was reached to call a Court of Inquiry on March 9th at Pawhuska, Osage County, Oklahoma to determine whether warrants shall issue in this case and whether sufficient evidence will develop to warrant further prosecution.


Attorney General Short has requested that the United States by represented by counsel, and suggests that the United States Attorney's Office be represented in this. He further stated that he had talked this case over with Assistant United States Attorney, Roy St. Lewis, at Oklahoma City and that he would be glad to invite him to set in the inquiry, and if possible, to continue in the prosecution of the case in the event sufficient evidence is developed.

Agents Smith and Street are of the opinion that the presence of an assistant from the United States Attorney's office would lend prestige to this prosecution, and would greatly assist in bringing about favorable results. Agent Smith consulted with Assistent United States Attorney, Roy St. Lewis, who stated he would be glad to assist the Attorney General in this case, if authorized by the Department to do so, therefore, it is suggested that you secure authority, at the earliest possible date, if you deem it proper and advisable, for Assistant United States Attorney, Roy St. Lewis, or some other Assistant, that they may become familiar with the facts in this case before the calling of the Court of Inquiry, which will be held on March 9th.



She is also said to have repeatedly horsewhipped JOHN KIBNEY and kept him at work with a rifle.

BRIDGES, GEORGE JAMES and RDITE DAVIS, about 9 F. M. the might of May 21, 1921 (when ANNA BROWN was murdered) and it now appears possible that MRS. KINNEY and BRYAN BURK-MART may both have had a hand in ANNA BROWN'S murder. MRS. KINNEY, according to MR. TILLMAN, sweed a .BR salibre pistol at that time as her husband, John KINNEY, knows.

June 12th agents proceeded to michits and made appointment with MUGH K. REA for next day re. this case.

J. E. WILKINSON, Spiritualist at Wichita, Mans. is said to be advised mys. MINNEY, as one is a great believer in spiritualism. WILKIN-SON is said to have advised her to kill PRED TILLIAN, who, she claimed has laid a "spell" on her.

MR. REA called JOHN KINNEY to the office and instructed KINNEY to talk freely and fully to us and furnished us a room to talk privately in

gong Kinger is a full blood coage, about forty years of age, hard of hearing, slow of speech but quite intelligent and speaks English very well indeed. Kinger however plainly is of weak will power. He impressed as very favorably by his desire to be truthful and just in his statements and talked freely with us for three or four hours.

JOHN KINNEY stated that he and his wife are now separated; that she is a white memon about forty years old; that they have been married about fourteen years and have no children; that he come two and one-fifth headrights in Osage Tribe; that he is not restricted and did our about 1,650 acres of land in Osage County and a large sum in Liberty Bonds.

That during the last few years he has given said wife, at her repeated requests and for the alleged purpose of safety of the property, in trust for them both, Liberty bonds and money in the aggregate sun of between \$65,000.00 and \$85,000.00 which she still has; that he has also made a will which she has by which she is kix given his entire estate at his death.

That he and she having not been friendly for several years, though living together at times, now have an agreement that she is to get a divorce, keep all the lands and other property he has given her and in addition get \$100.00 per month alimony from him; that she was penilese when he murried her, and the property he has and has given her was all sequired by him by inheritance and by reason of his meage blood, and Indian rights.

It will thus to seen that JOHS NIMEY is tadly in meet of an honest Guardian and attorney to look after him and his property rights at once as his wife is of violent, desperate and erratic character.

JONY MINERY stated further that some years ago he married. ANNA 330NN who was murdered mear Fairfax in May, 1921; that however this marriage was annulled because of his them walld existing common-law marriage to his present wife, referred to above.

That his wife appeared jealous of ANA BROWN and was unfriendly to her; that on one secasion this wife asked him if he thought more of ANA BROWN than he: did not need he told her "me"; that she replied

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that if he did he was liable to be killed some time while out on a drinking party with ANNA BROWN. But did not say who would kill him.

JOHN KINNEY stated that in May, 1621 he and his wife lived on his form, about one and a half miles northeast of Belford Bridge in Omage County, but that neither ANNA BROWN nor BRYAN BURKHARY was ever at that place, so far as he know; that he never heard his wife threaten any harm to ANNA BROWN; that his wife did not possess any pistol in 1921 that he knew of.

JOHE KINNET stated that he had no reason to believe his wife implieated in ANNA BROWN'S murder and that she told him several times
that she believed BILL MALE and the BURKHARTS were responsible for
ANNA BROWN'S murder as they wanted her death before LIZZIN Q died, so
that ANNA'S property would go to LIZZIN Q. ANNA'S mother, who
had a will giving nearly all her property to the ERNEST BURKHART family

JOHN KINNEY showed a surprising knowledge of amount and descent of the ANNA NROWN. LICELY Q and family property, and stated that he also believed the HALK-BURKMARTS were responsible for ANNA NROWN'S marder but that he had no evidence to that effect, an all the Indians were afraid to tell mything.

JONE NIMENT stated further that his wife is very courageous and has bed several fights with white tusiness men such as merchants, justinus and tenhers in Osage Sounty: that however he knows that there was justification for her in these affrays as in several of the cases she was trying to prevent Indians being grafted by these men, naming CHAS. ASE-BROOK and othere.

JOHN KINNEY a toted also that during the last year or so his wife has seemed to have a strong belief in spiritualistic mediums and has been telling him some a trunge and weird things; that she has had employed

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J. A. SUBJAPACE detective, Names City, He. a man whom she called FIL-HIBBOR another when she called WILLIAMS and spother whose mane he did not learn; that she told him these men were detectives and that WILMER-CON was a Spiritulist, and informed her that FRED TILLMAR and others at Pawhusha were going to lay a spell on HIBBUY and have him kill her; that WILKINSON also told her that FRED TILLMAR has gut a spell on her; that she told HIBBUY that on one occasion she was in TILLMAN'S office at Pawhusha and PRED TILLMAN "mesmerised" her and had her sign a deed by which she conveyed to FRED TILLMAN the \$ 1,500 ceres of land JOHN HIBBEY had deeded to her, as stated before.

XIMERY stated that MRS. XIMERY related that FRED TILIMAN on that consider told her she could not raise her hands, and shen she tried to do so, she sould not move; that TILIMAN then commanded her to sign the said deed to said land and she obeyed because of the "spell" TILIMAN had laid on her.

FIRSTY stated that the kept telling him that he was possessed with a demon and took him to Kansas City to see a noted Spiritualist who would call up spirite from Osage County, and that this Spiritualist would drove the demon out of him, KINNEY.

RIMMEN stated that he went to Kansas City with his with to see this spiritualist whose name is WOODS, and who lives on Pasco Ave., beyond glootrie Park; that WOODS told him to keep him, WOODS in mind mall the time, etc., and have faith, but that he, RIMMEN, did not believe in such foolishness and told WOODS so, and nothing same of it.

That he, KINNEY, was in a hospital at Empass City and his wife had JOHN GUSTAFSON do some work in bease County for her and SUSTAFSON and wife same to the hospital twice and took him and MRS. KINNEY out riding; that MRS. KINNEY said she had GUSTAFSON hired to see if FRED TILINGE

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had put the deed to the land on record. (This detective "KILKIRBOE" is said to be the man who advised LRS. KINERY to shoot FRED TILLHAR.)

JOHN KINNEY states he is afraid his wife will kill him some time; that she has attacked him many times and keeps talking about spirits and demons and "spells" all the time and has him arrested on false charges, etc.; that he wants to be freed from her and is willing to de se even at the sout of letting her keep the 1,500 acres and all the Liberty mends and money she has gotten from him.

JOFE KINGAY states that his wife seemed to be a good honest woman until a few years ago and made many enemies tesause she took an interest in numerous cases where the whites were grafting the Indians, she taking the Indians, side, but that she has changed.

That shortly after GRERON SIGHART'S mysterious death in a hospital at Okla. "Ity he, NIMMEN, heard HEIRE RIGHEART the widow of CHONGE, telling was, Hissur that BIEL HARB had taken GRORG' BIGHEART to a hospital at Okla. City and had induced CHONGE DIGHEART to sign a deed conveying a lot of land to BIEL HARB. MINSUR Stated that HEIRE BIG-MEART was appealing to MRS. MINSUR for help in this matter, but MRS. WINSU'Y refused and told HEIRE BIGHEART "I won't do it. You Indians are all cowards. I have taken your parts in many of these cases, and you Indians don't stand by me, and I get myself into trouble".

(No deed to his land has ever shown up, but the remor persists from many quarters that it was secured by MAIR. BLIZE RIGHMAR? has seprinciple and is said to be accepting presents from MAIR and refusing to tell anything.)

JOHN MINERY states that the man at his home when JEFF MUTCHISON served notice of suit by R. K. SHEPHED against JOHN MINERY was P. L.

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BOSTRIS; that ROBERTS is still on King It's farm near Belford Bridge.

JEFF EUTCHISSON is said to claim that MRS. KINTEY had this man ordered to kill purchisson at that time, but KINEY says he knows nothing of that and don't believe it.

That the detective WILKINSON told him, MINNEY, that the spirit talk was all bank; that WILKINSON is said to work out of the detective office of A. V. STEPHENSON or STRYRES, Port worth, Tex.

The rather long account of JOHN KINNEY'S Statements are set forth for two reasons.

The main one is that MR. and MRS. KIRHTY did live about a mile and a half mortheast of Belferd Bridge in May, 1981 when ARM BROWN was killed, which in the location of the place that R. M. PINE states BRYAN BURYHART and ADEA BROWN was balled.

BRIDGES. GRONGE JAMES and ROITH DAVIS the night ADEA BROWN was killed.

There is a possible connection here, that will have to be traced out the other reason is that M. C. HARGIS, FARD TILLMAN, J. S. SINYSON BD SCHERCE and others keep insisting that MRS. KINNEY is implicated in

ASHA BROWS'S marder, though mone of them has produced any evidence to that effect, and the only motive assigned is jealensy.

there is no doubt that MRS. HIMBET is a desperate character and determined to get a small fortune out of JOHN HIMBET by any means she doese necessary.

HRS. JOHN KINSKY has made many enomies among the whitee in Ocage County. She was not to be found when we were at Wiehite on the 18th of June, but we will locate and interview her fully as seen as possible. It is possible that she may be of great assistance to us, if so inclined or persuaded.

June 18th, interviewed ED SCHEECK, 1608 S. Tace, Vichita, Kane,

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who was evasive and unsatisfactoryin his talk, possibly due to his age
72 years. He declared the woman wa, SHAR had in mind was LUBULA HALUHTT
but stated that she was upreliable and no account and had teld him
nothing.

ED SCHRECK has also changed his theory of this murder, so he stated, and expressed a telief that MRS. MINSEY was implicated in it, but SCHERCK could not or would not give any reason, mutive or information to support his new theory.

Interviewed HUCH K. REA, attorney for JOHN KINHEY, but JR. REA had nothing to add to what KINHEY told us, but promised to assist us all possible.

June 15th, interviewed ELURA COSE, who now lives with her father, SILAS COSE at Tashunga, Okla. LAURA COSE stated in triof that she never did may that RUSE OSLOS told her that JOE ALLER, alias JIMMY HICKS killed. ASHA BROWN and that she, LAURA COSE, never did may that JOE ALLER told her that ROSE OSLOSE killed. ASHA BROWN.

FAURA CORR stated that JEFF HUTCHIRS took her from Enw City to Fairfex and there another man wrote up a statement in which she purported to state that ROSS CHAOR told her, in the Feley Hetel at Fairfax, that JOR ALLER Milled ANNA BROWN and that JOE ALLER told her, LAURA CORN, that ROSE CHAOR Milled ANNA BROWN; LAURA CORN stated to Agents that she teld JEFF HUTCHIRS and the other man at the time that, this was not true, but they had her sign the statement anyway.

LATRA COME stated further that JOE ALLIE and ROSE SAGE both did tell her that they pawned a ring of ABUA BROWN'S at Mynoma, Oklasfor some whiskey but did not say to whom and did not say how or when they got this ring. Also that JOE ALLEY did tell her, LATRA CORN,

that he and 2008 (340% were in Parkin Landay's ear, had a blowout and stopped that will another man for assistance; that ARMA BROKE'S shoe was in the Parkin Ablat ear at the time and Tulk asked about it, and for alless told him it was much oback's shoe and findly bicks said he would not have stopped Tulk if he had known who he was.

Also that ROSE OGLER nor JOH ALLES nor anyone else has questioned her. LAURA CORS. since she was at Fairfax as a coroner's witness in 1921 and that she has never testified nor told that JOH ALLES OF ROSE CRACK told her who killed. ANNA ROSE.

It appears almost certain that there is mothing to the theory that Jor Author or ROSE ORAGE had any part in ANNA BROWN'S morder.

#### HREST ROAM MURDER.

MAY 28th, DICK GREGG was taken from Pawhusha to Sedam, Mans, by Sheriff Buckles of Sedam to answer to a charge of rebling a bank at Elgin, Mans. (DICK 28800 is the man who we have been informed from three separate and anconnected sources to and did marder SENRY ROAZ, name-ly, FRANK TERREUL, INS 900 and DICK STODER). We will question DICK GREGG and JACK HART as soon as possible.

June 2d arranged with confidential informant in Leavenmorth prison that he will get what he can out of JACK HART and report to Agents when Agents call. This informant is also a prisoner but very friendly to Agent weiss and HART has made some talk to informant and evinced a desire to be confidential with him for several months past.

Agents have been trying to get DICK TODDER to produce his informant who claims that DICK CHROS killed REERY ROAM for BILL MALE, and that JACK MART knows it, and heard the deal made between DICK CHROS and BILL MALE, but STODDER declares his informant will not consent to meeting Agents or having his name made known through fear.

June 3d at Pones interviewed JAKES AUTIN 19 years eld who had told CHARCE PRAZIER that he, AUTIN, know all about who killed MERKY ROAM and the SMITES and why it was done.

JAMES AUTIE in intolligent, but shifty. However, Agent voice who interviewed AUTIE telleves AUTIE'S story is probably true, so the as AUTIE is concerned, but that AUTIE'S informants were just telling AUTIE some boastful lies to impress him. AUTIE'S statement, in material substance, is that:

AUTIE & had some illiest business with one DUPPIND, alies DUPPEN and DUCKIN and CURLEY in 1925.

2 at he, AUSIN, ween not know any other names than above of these three men; that DUPPINID lived at Fairfax and was in fail at Pawhuska late in 1982 and early 1925 on a whiskey charge.

That B LCKIE was also a resident of Fuirfax, being an engineer at the Smith-Milliams Hotel there and the Frances Hoose there; that BLACKIE was about 25 years old and was durk complexioned and had tark eyes, and had the upper lid of one eye grown to the eyeball (This cannot be BLACKIE THOMPSON OF HELICON).

That "CURLEY" was a young, rather blond man and slim (This cannot be CULLEY alian ARTHUR JUHESCH, as he is about 45 years old.)

JAMES AUTIU Stated that these three men were all beetleggers in Omage County and associates to his knowledge, but all are gone from there during the past three or four months and are said to be "telow Oklahoma City".

AUTIN States that some six or eight months age DUFFIRID told AUTIN that he, DUFFIRID, had killed HEMRY ROAM because ROAM and he had been partners in teotlegging whiskey and while DUFFIRID was in jail at Pawhuska. ROAM sold their partnership Buick roadster and collected some money due them and refused to divide with DUFFIRID when he was released from Jail.

That DUFFIELD told AUTIE "I man BOAR in his ear and went up and spoke; when he looked I shot him and he fell ever backward, ever the seat back. I met him morth of Pairfax."

JAMES ANTIH States that DUFFIELD told ANTIH that he "Milled BILL SHITH and a MR. BEHNETT ordered two quarts of whickey and when DUFFIELD and OU MRY brought the whicky to Grayhorne Sulty and BYENETT had some officers there to trap them but that DUFFIELD and

CURLEY broke one tottle of whiskey and threw the other away.

JAZS ATTIS states that CURLEY also told him that DUFFIELD killed RESET ROAS and blow up the CHICK bouse.

JAMES AUTHE was very expited while telling the above and stated that if his expenses are puid he will find these three men again and get their confidence and get them to tell him all the facts.

agent however pointed out to AUTIM the reported rewards in these cases and AUTIM has declared be will work for these rewards.

Agents opinion is firmly that AUTIN'S information is pure tunk, put to him by BLOKIN and DUFFIED for some ulterior purpose.

ATTHE in response to questions stated that none of the men had indicated in any way that any one had been hired or paid to do there murders, and that no one but DUFFIRIDS had done the work.

Agent did not indicate to AVIII that Agent had may doubts of the correctness of AVIIII'S information but encouraged AUIII to quietly learn all be one and report to Agents.

Agent Toise had to attend Jederal court as Covernment agent from June 4th to and including June 10th in another ease but Agent Burger remained on this investigation and kept in touch with our under cover wan from McAlester. This under cover man is working but is being delayed somewhat to this date owing to fact that his wife is ceriously ill and he has no ear. Movever he is on the job and progressing slowly to this date, June 11, 1924.

Agent Turger on June 5th interviewed DICK CREGG at Sedan, Kans. with material result that TREGG finally declared he had not committed any of these murders as he would not be guilty of such acts but that he had been "propositioned" to do the killing, and had refused.

CRESC was very wary in his talk but not hostile. He declined to

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tell which particular murder he had been "propositioned" on or by whom he was propositioned but GREGG did invite agents to eall on him again on the lith instant to talk further on the cases. However the Kansas authorities decided unexpectedly to and did transfer GREGG to the Lansing, Kans. State prison before agents arrived at Sedan on the 10th, so that we now shall have to interview GREGG at Lansing. However this will be almost as well as JACK PART is at Leavenworth as well as a confidential man we know in Leavenworth prison.

MR. J. R. BROOKS, attorney, Sedan is well known and friendly to Agents and is GREGO'S strorneys and we feel confident BROOKS will assist us in getting GREGO to tell all he knows.

J. M. POWELL, ex-Sheriff, Sedan, Tans. is also a good friend to these agents and is an old auquaintance of both DICT CREGG and his father and has their confidence. HR. POWELL has promised to assist agents in getting both DICK CREGG and his father to tell us all they know.

We have also been arging DICK STODDER again to induce his informant to talk direct to us but STODDER reports his informant still refuses to de this and he, STODDER, sannot in honor disclose informant's identity but will continue his efforts to persuade his informant to meet our requests.

June 13th twiked to J. M. POWELL by long distance but MR. POWELL stated he has not seen DICK GREGG'S father yet and had nothing to report

June 14th JOHN MORAH states that DICK STODDER informed MIRAH that STODDER'S informant still refuses to see us direct, but may consent to de so; that said informant states that GROVER DURBLE saw DICK GREGO with a big roll of money at okean shortly after REMRY ROAD'S warder and intimated that DURBLE knows how GREGG get the money. DURBLE is now

in Leavenworth prison for mail robbery near Okean, Okla. last August. Se will follow this up.

June 16th Least Burger again interviewed DICE GREGG at Lansing, Kans, prison with not results that CREGG stated that EREST BURKEART had propositioned him CREGG, to do the job, of these murders, tut CREGG would not disclose which particular wurders in this case REEST BURKERST had sought to have him do.

IN A gent Burger the facto as he, CREGG knows them, but that he, CREGG, will tell BUACKIE THOMPSON if THOMPSON can come and see GREGG personally and assure GREGG that it will benefit THOMPSON and out THOMPSON'S feet on the ground.

GREGG stated further that he could tell BLACKIK enough of the facts that BLACKIK would have no trouble getting all the evidence in the case.

GREGG'S position was that he would tell a member of his underworld gang. BLACKIE, but not an outsider.

Arranged with GREGS to do as he requested and bring B'ACKIE there to get GREGG'S information as soon as possible.

I replied to your letter dated June 13, 1924, WWG:OCD, on June 20th, stating that I had requested Agent Agents Weiss and Burger to make a full and complete report to date on the W. K. Smith case, so at to set forth fully and completely the status of that investigation to date. I am enclosing their report dated June 23, 1924 herewith.

Agent Weiss has worked continuously on this investigation except what time he has been required to be in court as a witpess in cases which he had investigated before being assigned
to this investigation. It has appeared two or three different
times during this investigation that the point had been almost
taked where we could say who the guilty parties are in one
or more of these murders, but it appears that it has been impossible to get the final and what appears to be a necessary
element in this case; that is, a confession from someone who
can link the perpetrators of these crimes with the crime
itself.

You will note that on May 25, 1924, with the cooperation of the Governor and the Attorney General of the state,

in Osage County on this made, and it is defreved that he will be able to obtain some information which has not been possible to obtain in any other way heretofore. You will also note from agent Weiss and Burger's report that Dick Gregg, a notorious law violator, is now in the Kansas pentientiary, Lansing, Kensas, being held on the bank robbery, charge committed at Sedan, Kensas, and has not yet been tried, and that Dick Gregg and his relatives are willing

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to them ish them all information that they are able to obtain with respect to these murders. Also, that they have nade arrangements with some other law violators and under world characters to secure certain information for them.

That Grady Drake, who was convicted at Denver of automobile that, and is now paroled to the Sheriff at Perry, Okla., was propositioned to commit some of these murders, but that to the present time they have not been able to make proper connections with Grady Drake to cause him to tell the truth of what he knows about these murders, and that this matter is now receiving their attention and they hope in a short time to obtain valuable information from Grady Drake.

You will also note that Osage Indian Superintendent J. Geo. Wright and Mr. Woodward, the attorney for the Osage Tribe, have recently been to Washington and have examined the reports of these Agents, and are anxious that the investigation continue, and also have hopes that the investigation will ultimately be successful. Also, that they have agreed to furnish and as a matter of fact have already furnished a Ford car and the upkeep of same for the use of Agents weiss and Burger as they continue the investigation.

I realize that this has been a very long, drawn-out and extensive investigation, as well as expensive. Agents Weiss and Burger state that they feel confident that they will untimately be able to secure the evidence which will warrent conviction in some of these cases, but they of course cannot and neither can I state how long it may take them to secure said evidence.

I will state that Agents Weiss and Burger are confident that they can complete this investigation satisfactorily, and I know of no Agents in this service in whose ability I place more confidence than in these two Agents, and will state that I believe if these murders can be solved, that they can ultimately solve them.

Knowing as I do that this has been a long, drawn-out investigation, with the statement above. I leave it entirely to you to state whether or not the investigation should be continued or discontinued.


The State Bankers' Association claim to have evidence that "Blackie" Thompson was implicated in the robbery of the Bristow bank on June 4, 1924. 

I beg to submit the following report regarding the investigation of the marder of certain Osage Indiana supposed to have been started at Panhuska on the 9th inst.

I received the Department wire on Monday March 9th, and immediately got in touch with the Attorney General of Oklahoma's office, and found that the investigation would not start until Nedny sday Merch 11th, and in accordance therewith I arriged in Pawhuska yesterday and immediately got in touch with Mr. J. Berry King, Assistant Attorney General of the State of Oklahoma, in charge of the investigation on behalf of the state, and with the Department of Justice agents, Berger, F. S. Smith and Street, who have been in charge of the investigation of these murders during the past several months. The entire time since at arrival has been apont in conferences, in the interviewing of witnesses and in an attempt to agree upon some definite plan of action. The Judge of the District Court, Judge Yorten, apparently, upon the request of the Attorney General's office and the Department of Justice agents, had set aside the week of Barch 9th to 14th to held a court of inquiry, upon the understanding the tavailable witnesses would be presented before him in the course of the week. As a matter of fact matters have not progressed sufficiently to warrant this procedure at this time. During the peat four years there have been a series of murders committed upon hauge Indiang to the number of few or five, apparently all traceable to one namer or new or rive, apparently all traceable to one has or group of men living near Fairfax. Oklahoma. The head of this group is wealthy, powerful and absent, and the Department of Justice agents have been confronted with an unusually difficult task in developing any testic my whatever. The evidence so far gathered would probably warrent the holding of this one man by a maristrate for the murder of the Casge woman Amas Brown, but hardly sufficient to obtain a conviction upon a trial before a jury. 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in bringing the guilty persons to justice, and the
Attorney General of Oklahoma has assigned his assistant
Mr. J. Berry King to these cases, and will comperate on
them as long as necessary or until the cases are finally
comeluded. All of the evidence in the various cases has
been gathered and the cases themselves have been worked
up by government agents, and although there is no federal
question involved, the Attorney General's office, through
lir. King, feels that the government should lend its
assistance to the prosecution of these cases, and is
very positive and very frank in its declaration that they
do not care to proceed either with a sourt of inquiry or with
the issuance of warrants and the preparation of the cases
until and unless they are assured that they will not only
have the assistance of the government's agents, but that
the government will assign one of its criminal prosecutors
to assist their office in the entirehandling of the fasses,
which will seen that whoever is assigned by the Department
of Justice to assist the Attorney General of Klahoma's
office will have to devote his entire time and attention
to these cases until they are finally concluded. The
Assistant Attorney General, Mr. J. Berry Hing is very
anxious to have Special Assistant Attorney General Caborne assig
ed to these cases if possible. If not, they want so as other
Department prosecutor specially easigned to these cases.

There is no question in my judgment but what these Indians were surdered as the result of a conspiracy headed by one William Hale of Fsirfax, the actual perpetrators of the various crimes being either his nephews or underworld characters hired by him or them. This i pression prevails in Pawhuska and throughout Deage count, but the perpetrators of these crimes are powerful, influential, and by the crimes themselves have so terrorised the Deage Indians and the people living in and near Fairfax, Oklehome, that it has been an almost impecability for the Department of Justice agents to get at the real facts in the cases. It is my judgment that the first arrest will be of unterfal assistance to the government's agents, and may uncover the week link in the compiracy, and perhaps bring about the break that will bring the whole thing to light. This, however, is only a guess, and as above atased it is certain that unless a weak link is discovered so e place these are going to be unusually difficult cases.

The Assistant Attorney General of Oklahoms, Mr. King, has determined to postpone the court of inquiry until a later date for two ressons; first, to enable the Department scents to examine more fully several witnesses who have not talked freely as yet, and; second, for the purpose of









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obtaining assurance from the Department of Justice that a government prosecutor will be assigned to this ease to cooperate and assist in this matter in its entire management, preparation and trial. Without this assurance the indications are at present that it will be impossible to get the Attorney General of "klahems"s office to act in the cases. This statement of the state's attitude was finally made just prior to my sending my second telegram on this date cancelling the suggestion that Mr. Roy St. Louis of the District Attorney's office at "klahoms City be requested to comhere tomorrow, March 13th. This step being entirely unnecessary at the present time, in view of the postponment of the court of inquiry.

I desire to take this opportunity to commend agents Smith. Berger and Street very highly for the work they have done in this case, especially in view of the almost insurmountable obstacles that have been placed in their way and the powerful influences that have been working spained them continuously.

Regarding the matter of assigning a government prosecutor to assist throughout these cases as above stated, these are primarily the State of Oklahoma cases. There is no federal jurisdiction, and none but a moral resson for the sesignment of a government attorney to these cases. However, the victims of these carders have all been Casess, wards of the government and the whole conspiracy is a parently directed towards the obtaining the victims funds and allotments. The case has been entirely worked up to this point by Deportment of Justice agents, and the moral effect, as well as the assistance to the State of Oklahoma of having a government prosecutor in the case would be of material assistance.

I would suggest that the Department's decision in this matter be communicated as sperdily as possible to the Atterney General of Oklahoma at Oklahoma City, and would respectfully request that I may receive a copy of the same, as I shall endeavor to keep in touch with the situation until some one class is assigned to these cases.

Anna Brown, full blooded Osage Indian woman was murdered on May 22,

1921 in Osage County, Chlahoma. She was about 35 years of age and the divorced
wife of one Odie Brown, a white man and ex-cowboy now living in Ponca City.

Oklahoma. She had no children and died intestate, leaving as her heirs hor
mother, known as Lizzie 2, her sisters, Mrs. Mollie Burkhart (wife of Ernest
Burkhart), Mrs. Rita Smith (wife of W. E. Smith), and a half-sister, Mrs. The
Bighart. W. E. Smith was a white man as is also Ernest Burkhart, the lati
being a brother of-Bryan, Duke and Horace Burkhart, and all nephews of Wm. I
Hale.

Anna Brown was without enemies so far as is known but of a dissolution and immoral character, frequently going out with white men, whom she preferral.

On May 27, 1921 her decomposed and swollen corpse was found in a ravine and 32-calibre bullet hole was discovered in the back of the head. An investigation immediately was started and her brother-in-law, W. E. Smith, was the magnetive member of the family in pursuing the investigation which had not proceeded far before it pointed pretty closely to Hale and the Burkharts.

Anna Brown left an estate of approximately \$100,000, half of which under the Oklahoma law went to her mother, Lizzie Q, who was very old and sick and expected to die at any time. Lizzie Q was living with her daughter and son-in-law Mollie and Ernest Burkhart, at Grayhorse, and she had made a will leaving the bulk of her estate to Ernest Burkhart's wife and children. Her estate at that time was approximately \$200,000, in addition to the \$50,000 left her by Anna Brown. It meant that Ernest Burkhart's wife and children had prospects of acquiring the stortune as soon as Lizzie Q passed away. She did pass away at Ernest Burkhart's home 60 days after Anna Brown's murder.

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Bryan Burkhart was arrested charged with the murder of Anna by on and Hale, et al. furnished bond for him and he was acquitted.

Late in 1921 Joe Grayhorse, an Osage Indian, died very suddenly immediately following a land deal which he had had with William Hale.

The Charles Whitehorn murder occurred in the latter part of 1921, his pody having been found near Pawhuska. There is no evidence up to the present to connect this death with the suspected motive causing the others. The same is true in connection with the death of Minnie Kile, who died in first part of 1922, however, on March 26, 1922, under circumstances which warranted suspicion, one Anna Samford, a full blooded restricted Indian, described was married to a write man named Tom McCoy, and shortly after her deat McCoy married a woman said to be a niece of Bill Hale.

On January 15, 1923 the body of Henry Roan was found four miles northwest of Fairfax, where they all lived, there being a bullet hole that the head. The interesting connection of this murder with the others is the Roan, a relative of Lizzie Q, carried a \$25,000 life insurance policy pays to William Hale.

Minnie Kile was the sister of Rita Kile Smith. Minnie was married to W. E. Smith and living with him at the time of her very sudden death, and after her death. Smith married Rita, who was killed with him as shown later.

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On March 10, 1923 Rita Smith, her husband, W. E. Smith, and a servant, Nettie Brookshire, were killed by the blowing up of their home at Fairfax at about three o'clock in the morning. The two women were killed instantly and Smith died a few days after the explosion, he having made a dying declaration to the effect that the only enemies he had in the world were Hale and the Burki into

Thus it will be seen that the following members of the same family have either positively been murdered or have died under very suspicious iroumstances: Lizzie Q, mother of them all, Anna Brown, Minnie Kile, Rita Soth, all daughters of Lizzie Q; Henry Roan, W. E. Smith, and collaterals of the mily.

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Nettie Brookshire and Anna Sanford, and in each instance the persons who would have benefitted by the death have been the Burkharts.

The only surviving daughter of Lizzie Q now resides at Pawhuska wher husband, Ernest Burkhart, who is a nephew of William Hale.

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In re Osage Investigation at Pawhuska, Oklahoma.

I beg to submit the following report as supplemental and in addition to the report previously sent under date of March 12th from Pawhuska, Oklahoma.

I am making this supplemental report for the reason that I was obliged to use the State's stenographer in making the report of Earch 12th at Fawhuska, and less to submit copy of the same to Assistant Attorney General of the State of Oklahoma, Mr. J. Berry King. I was further obliged to leave for St. Louis, Missouri, inmediately thereafter, and am taking this, the first opportunity that I have since had, to make a confidential supplemental report upon said investigation.

As stated in the previous report, no witnesses were called, and a great many had left the County of Osage and the State of Oklahoma for the reason that there had been too much premature publicity in all of the Oklahoma papers regarding the proposed court of inquiry to be held at Pawhuska. A personal telegram might as well have been sent to each suspect and witness connected with these Osage murders. It is my judgment that all of this publicity care either from the Governor of Oklahoma's office or the Attorney General's office at Oklahoma's office or the Attorney General's office at Oklahoma City. At any rate, it absolutely prevented any investigation. I was also unable to state in my report of Karch 12th that, in my judgment, the Department of Justice has more then performed its moral duty in providing its egents. Who have developed all of the testimony so far se cured in this case. There is no federal jurisdiction attaching and no sound reason, that I can see; for the assis ment of a government attorney to assist the County Attorne of Osage County, who is honest and conscientious if not able, and the Attorney General's office of Oklahoma. a State matter, and the State of Oilahoma, with its enford ment officers and its legal staff, ought to be able to co with these cases, assisted, as they have been and will be, by some of the best agents in the employ of the Department of Justice. Mr. J. Berry King, however, is apparently sineare in his statement that the Attorney General's office and the State of Cklahoma will do nothing further unless of government attorney is assigned to assist in the preparation handling and wiel of these cases.

I was of the opinion at Pawhuska, and am still the opinion, that sufficient evidence has been gathered to warrant the arrest of Bryan Burkhart, nephew of William Hale, charging him with the murder of Anna Brown. The Department of Justice agents believe that the arrest of this one individual would have heartened a number of witnesses who are at the present time afraid to tell what they know, and would have assisted them in the discovery of additional facts regarding the other nurders. As above stated, however, the Atterney General of Oklahoma's office did not agree with our agents or my opinion, hence no action was taken.

I do not need to say that this supplemental report is confidential, and I would respectfully request that no copy of it be handed to any representative of the State of Oklahoma.

Referring further to the Osage Indian case, Special Agent Smith and Burger are still assigned to this investigation.

Special Agent Blake, just at this time, has an important investigation, which Agent Smith was handling at the time he was assigned to this office, and owing to the fact that there is some delay on this Osage case, Special Agent Blake requested that Agent Smith be allowed to complete his investigation. I have, therefore, taken the liberty of permitting Agent Smith to return to Ft. Worth to get his case in shape for the Grand Jury.

I have had this investigation up with the State Attorney General, and hope to be able to advise you within the next few days whether it will be possible to get this in the state court without further delay. However, the State Attorney General is still of the opinion that a prosecutor should be assigned by the Government to assist the state in the prosecution of these cases, and I presume you will advise me in due time whether such a course will be followed.

Agent Burger is still making investigation on this case and report has been prepared, which will follow in the next day or so.

I realize that permitting Agent Smith to return to Dallas, Texas, without first securing authority, is not in accordance with the regulations, however, as I am

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endeavoring to keep the expense of this case down to the minimum, and not getting straightened out after my trip to Washington, I have not had the time to devote proper attention to the Indian case, and trust permitting Agent Smith to assist Agent Blake in an important case, while technically assigned to this investigation, will be approved.

As soon as I am advised by you if a Government attorney can be assigned to assist the State's Attorney General, will be able to arrive at some definite conclusion with the state authorities as to the further procedure in this case.

Special Agent Smith and this Agent conferred with Mr. Barry King, Assistant to the Attorney General for the State of Oklahoma, relative to commencing court action in connection with the Osage Indian Cases.

Mr. Hisz agrees with this Agent that sufficient evidence has been developed to warrant prosecution of Bryan Burkhart for the murder of Ama Brown, however he intimated that he was not willing to institute prosecution, at this time, and be blamed for failure to convict in the event prosecution unsuccessful. He agreed, however, to take charge of the Court of Inquiry as soon as the arrangements could be made to have this Court opened by the District Judge, provided the Government would furnish an attorney to assist in the inquiry.

Mr. King finally stated that if the local attorney for the Indian Agency at Pawhuska, Oklahoma, would agree to represent the United States in this inquiry, that he would proceed at once and Special Agent Smith is now endeavoring to make this arrangement with the District Judge and the Agent in Charge of the Indian Agency at Pawhuska.

I believe we are in a fair way to either get this case in the court where it can be turned over to the state, or else the case can be referred to them for their attention at such a time as they desire to take up the case. -2-Director

In the event that we can succeed in getting this Court of Inquiry opened, I believe it will only be a matter of a few days until we can get into court and get out of the case creditably, however, if we are unsuccessful I intend, with your permission, to close this case up be referring it to the state for prosecution.

I believe that I will be able to keep any unfavorable comment out of the local papers, even though the state authorities should attempt to give out any interviews reflecting on the Government's handling of the case.
