Thompson further stated that at that time in 1920 Ernest Burkhardt explained that the reason he wanted Bill Smith and wife killed was that Smith's wife and Ernest Burkhardt's wife were sisters; that their mother was very old and sick and liable to die at any time; that if the old mother died first, Smith's wife would inherit part of her estate, but if Mrs. Smith died first, the old mother's estate, of the most of it, would be inherited by Mrs. Ernest Burkhardt, so that he wanted Mrs. W. E. Smith killed before the old mother died. At one time, in 1920, Ernest Burkhardt was in a big rush for them to kill the Smiths right away, as he said the old lady was sick and old and might die at any time. Thompson also stated that he stayed several nights, ten or more, with Horace "Duke" Burkhardt, Ernest's brother, and his "Duke", urged Thompson a number of times to kill the Smiths, as Ernest had proposed. Thompson said it seemed to be family knowledge that Ernest had asked him to kill the Smiths. He also stated that the 1920 car which Ernest proposed to give him was insured for more than it was worth, that as the insurance and only reason for running the 1920 Ford is to be used for racing.

the insurance. Thompson took the car and Ernest reported it stolen. A few days later Thompson was caught with it at Oilton and arrested, charged with the theft of the car. Ernest sent him word to "stand pat", and he did, and was sentenced to five years in McAlester penitentiary, of which he served fifteen months, and was paroled in March 1922, with no help from Ernest Burkhardt. After being paroled he went back to Osage County and saw and talked with Ernest Burkhardt and Bill Hale. Ernest again renewed his proposals that Thompson kill Bill Smith and wife; on one occasion Ernest said that the Smiths had moved to Fairfax, and went on to state that we (Thompson and Orley Johnson) should trail Smith around, so as to be sure when Smith and his wife were in the house, then put a shot of nitroglycerine in the basement and blow them both up.
