"Some time about the middle of April, 1923, Page 816,
I was in an automobile with Hal Bait, 39-
ing from Henry to Balston by way of Grey-
horses. Between the Sand Hook school house
and the store at Grayhorse we met Roy Dunoh,
who was in his car. He stopped and all got
out, and Roy Dunoh turned to me and said,
'Bart, who is that fellow you have with you
in the party?' I said, 'He is just another
angel.' 'Well, Roy Dunoh then remarked,
'I am on bad terms with Henry, and have got
him and his wife separated, and I am going
to have his wife. If I have to kill him my-
self.' I said, 'No, I like Henry Roan and
would not harm a hair on his head, and
won't have anything to do with it. If you
want to kill him that is your business, and
