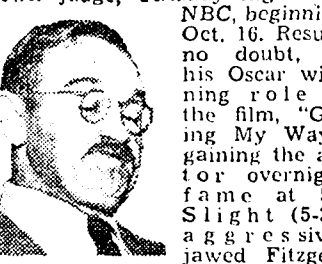

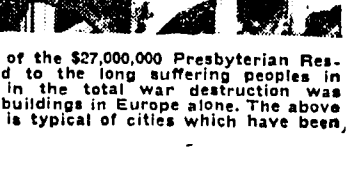

Ard-Wood Civic Plans Bus Service

Association Passes Resolution Against Widening Streets

A move to reinstate school bus service from the area served by the Ard-Wood Civic Association to the Ardmore Junior High School was started by the Association at their meeting held last week. Bus service has also been requested for the Senior High School students.

F. A. DuBois, superintendent of the Lower Merion School District assured officials of the group that the matter will be given every consideration as soon as manpower is available to operate such services. Action by the School Board is expected in the near future.

After adopting a resolution disapproving the general widening of all roads and streets in Lower Merion Township, the Association sent all Township commissioners, members of the Planning Commission, and all presidents of various civic associations, copies of the resolution.

A general meeting of the group will be held in January when election of officers and directors for the year 1946 will be held. The association has included in its area, Arnold Rd., Drexel Rd., St. Paul's Rd., and Edgemont Ave. Applications for membership from these sub-divisions should be made so that they may be acted upon at the January meeting.

KNOW YOUR STATE

Publication by the State Planning Board of a program for the conservation of the State's natural resources emphasizes the realization, forced on us by the war, that any further wasteful use of soil and mineral resources can only be at our national peril. Coal, oil, iron, top soil and forests were supplied to us by nature with a prodigal hand. We have spent them all with equal prodigality. The New World, once an untapped reservoir of energy and raw materials, has contributed so much to the development of the mechanical age and the materials of modern warfare that today the world's largest reserves of oil, coal and timber are no longer to be found on American soil.

More than any other 45,000 square miles on the earth's surface, Pennsylvania has contributed to the energies of modern civilization. The time to guard its remaining resources has unmistakably arrived. Europe faced these problems long ago. Its forests and soil had supplied food and timber for thousands of years. In the Nineteenth Century the tremendous growth of its population forced attention on conservation when the United States was merely beginning to explore its seemingly inexhaustible wealth.

In 1873 Robert Louis Stevenson,

the author, urged the Royal Society of Scotland to study the influence of forest growth on the flow of streams and on the temperature and moisture content of the air. In that year America needed no such studies. Our forests were prodigious, and Pennsylvania forests were leading the nation in their output of saw timber. Today the American housing and construction program is everywhere handicapped by a shortage of lumber and our Eastern cities must be supplied mainly from the far West.

Conservation is being forced on the attention of every thoughtful American. It is a broad field, as the State Planning Board points out in its latest issue of "Pennsylvania Planning." It means saving from waste, not only our hard and soft coal with their precious by-products, and our soil and our forests, but also our cities from decay through noise and traffic jams. It means protecting our residence neighborhoods from unnecessary invasion by business and industry, and our industry and business from unnecessary handicaps caused by the pollution of streams and rivers.

The 1945 Session of the General Assembly under the leadership of Governor Martin passed many important conservation measures. Their success in making this Commonwealth the leader in the protection of America's resources rests finally on the understanding and support of all our people.

VICTORY'S SONS



While on a bomber escort mission to targets in Oldenburg, Germany, Lt. Col. Francis Gabreski shot down two Nazi fighters, although his own plane was already damaged. But that was only the beginning. Above him he saw a flight of Messerschmitt 110s, armed with rocket cannon. A swarm of smaller fighters accompanied the 110s.

Although outnumbered, Colonel Gabreski dauntlessly led his unit into the Messerschmitts, breaking their formation. He singled out the lead plane and sent it down in flames. Climbing back to the melee, he spotted another cannon-carrying Nazi plane getting into position to attack the American bombers. Colonel Gabreski fired from 600 yards and it crumpled. The bombing mission got through safely.

On another occasion, Colonel Gabreski destroyed three Focke-Wulf 190s. All told he is credited with 28 enemy planes—all downed in aerial combat. He holds the Distinguished Service Cross, the Silver Star, the Distinguished Flying Cross with six oak leaf clusters, the Air Medal with four oak leaf clusters, and the Polish Cross of Valor.

R. P. Scott Opens Mercury Agency Won Navy Award For Manufacturing Work During War

Raymond P. Scott opened the doors of 43 E. Lancaster Ave., Ardmore last Friday and gave the Main Line its first glimpse of post-war Mercury automobiles. And Main Liners took advantage of the opening to crowd the show rooms. On display were three models—one sedan coupe, a two-door sedan and a town sedan.

Scott moved from 213 E. Lancaster Ave. where, during the war, he manufactured air plane parts for Grumman Hell Cat planes.

For this work he and his company recently received the Navy Certificate of Achievement. He undertook war work in order to keep his employees busy for the duration after cars were frozen in 1942. He employed 40 people at one time.

Prior to 1941 he was located at 125 E. Lancaster Ave. where for years he operated the Main Line Dodge Agency.

New Mercury cars are being received now on a monthly quota basis. Orders are being placed daily with the Scott office which holds the Main Line Mercury and Lincoln franchise.

Scott has already re-employed eight returned veterans whose places he kept open while they were in the service.
