Of Interest to Small Operator.

Under the recent ruling of the Inter-State commerce commission railroads are required to furnish cars to shippers within six days after order is placed of dimensions ordered. This order will benefit the smaller shipper of lumber and coal who generally hasty wait until the larger operator is shipped and to a large measure prevents tipping of the car distributor. Sometime ago an agent approached by a shipper chastised for not placing a car to be loaded and the agent said: "You are the only man I didn't cough up."

Printing Stamps of Glue.

Printing stamps quickly made from lead of rubber are a German invention. Several sheets of tinfoil are placed in the type form, covered with a deep impression, is taken and the resulting tinfoil matrix is melted and surrounded with oiled paper. Melted joiners' glue mixed with printer's roller composition is used for the casting. The matrix is mounted on a wooden handle, although rather soft at first, but hardens a few days without losing any elasticity.
