The city was crowded with veterans from all the Southern states and it was said the crowd was one of the largest that was ever in the city, so large that a great many persons had trouble in securing accommodations. The parade on Thursday, from near capital square out to where the Stewart monument was unveiled was one of the largest parades ever in the city and consisted of both infantry and cavalry. The military companies of Richmond took part in this parade. On Monday the Jeff Davis monument was unveiled and on each day and night during the Reunion something of interest was provided for the entertainment of the visitors.
