The wound, while painful, is not dangerous.

Payne, of Bath county, Va. and Mart McDowell, colored, of this place. "Jerd" has a little home on Knapps creek a few miles above Huntersville where he lives in peace and quietude. He likes to talk of the days spent with his master in that bloody struggle and many and wonderful are the stories of his escapes. At Richmond he was in his glory and it is said he delivered a number of Democratic speeches throughout the city. Many were the sheckels that fell into his palm.
