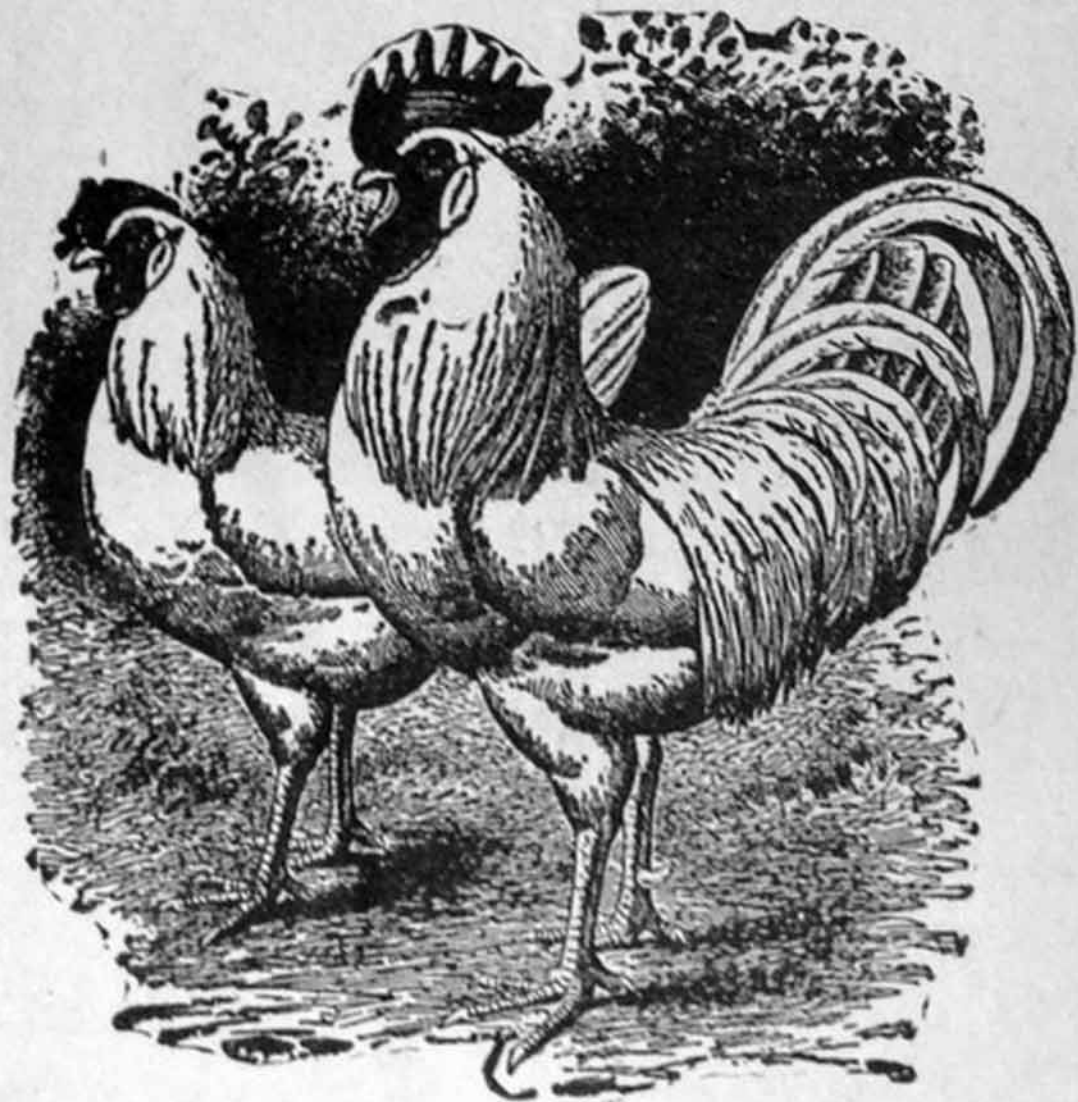

There were fifteen deer shipped out of the county on the Richwood railroad. None of these deer are in the above list.

Middle Mountain on Elk, Gauley, Yew, Black, Tea Creek, Alleghanies, Lockridge, Marlin and Thorny Creek Mountains furnished nearly all the deer killed.

The deer are again in the forests of many of our mountains. In the open season four years ago some forty deer were killed in Pocahontas. Nearly a half of these were killed on lands which are now the Seneca Forest. The increase in the number of deer in four years has been truly remarkable. But then the fawn of four years ago is a grandmother now.
