Breenbrier Speckled Irout.

The apeckled trout of Greenbrier and Pocahontas counties are of the firmest texture and supply the most delicious eating in the world, says the West Visginia News The black bass are an extra fine game fish, affording rare sport to fishermen and an attractive and enjoyable course on any bill of fare, but they are second to trout. Many fish become tainted in an hour or two after death, owing to their loose texture, but trout are exceptional in this respect. As an illustration, W. H. Cackley relates that some years ago when he was sheriff of Pocahontas county, his deputy, Dick Hill, caught some extra nice trout in Elk and wishing to get them to Dunmore he cleaned them, wiped them dry, wrapped them in paper, put them in his saddlepockets, and rode 16 miles on a hot August day, arriving some twelve hours from the time of starting, when the fish were found to be as firm and fresh as when taken from the water. 
