ANOTHER LOGGER MURDERED.

John Moslo, a Croatian, aged 45, disappeared Sunday, Sept. 7th. He was drunk and had a large sum of money on him. He was at camp 46, two miles up the North Fork of Cranberry. On the 16th his body was found beside a hemlock log. He had been killed in a peculiar manner; possibly while asleep. His assailant had cut a round wood sprout, made a withe, and put a tourniquet around the neck and twisted until the neck was broken. The withe was around the man's neck when found. The pockets of the dead man were hanging wrong side out, and had been rifled. The victim was thought to have had 8800 in cash on hand and a check for \$90.

The check was cashed the next day at Richwood after disappearance by another Croatian, who was the last person seen with the dead man on the day he disappeared. Efforts are being made to locate the man who cashed the check.—

The scene of the shooting was directly in front of the postoffice door, the time being about eleven o'clock at night. There were no eye witnesses.

On Friday morning last Deputy Sheriff Hill, of Pocahontas county, brought to Huntersville John A. Lightner, one of the persons sworu to by the jailor and guard of Highland county, Va., as a member of the mob who lynched E. D. Atchison at Monterey on the 5th inst.

On Saturday morning Justice Lockridge committed Lightner to Jail to await a requisition of the Governor of Virginia. On Saturday evening, about 9 o'clock-giving the statement of S. B. Lowry, sr., the jailor of Pocahontas-a man named Zeb Ailstock. a citizen of and well-known in Pocahontas, knocked at the door of the Jail and the jailor asked him in. They sat there talking together for some time and after awhile Ailstock got up and started out, asking the jailor to step outside as he wanted to speak to him privately. As soon as they had reached the outside of the door Ailstock picked up a double barreled shotgun he had left there on entering and leveled it at the jailor and demanded the keys to the cell in which Lightner was confined. When the jailor produced them he, with the gun still leveled on the jailor, ordered him to unlock the door. The jailor did so, and out stepped the prisoner, and the two men soon mounted on a horse left near by and galloped away.
