A Life Sketch of Henry M. Moffett end His Family by W. T. Price.

This eminent citizen bore a prominent part in the early organized history of our county as for a time the assistant and then the successor of Josiah Beard as clerk of the county of Pocahontas.

His friends rested in the opinion that he was slain by Indians, whereupon Mrs. Mary Moffett February 28, 1749 qualified to administer on the estate, giving bond for 500 pounds, with her brothers William and Robert Christian as securities.

His wife was a sister of Col. Samuel McDowell of Timber Ridge.

The Governor incidentally learning the fact, looked him up, had him for a privileged guest at the executive Mansion, over the Sabbath, took him to church in the morning, led him to his own family pew and sat by him through the services.

Mr. Moffett was crushed by his bereavment and did not survive his wife, but a very few years. He passed away very peacefully having made a good record in the service of his adopted county, that had honored him repeatedly with the best office in her power to confer. My name is Mary West and I have been researching my family history at the WV Genealogical Society here in Elkview.

I have been running into a problem locating 3 ancestors of mine, but especially one in particular by the name of Elizabeth Hicks.

Elizabeth Hicks is my Gr Gr Gr Grandmother, she married William Washington Nottingham who was the son of Jacob Washington Nottingham, who was the son of William Nottingham who married Susannah O'Brien and immigrated to America from England in about 1778. I am sending copies that have all the information.

The other 2 I am looking for are Elizabeth and William Washington's son's James S. Nottingham and Newton Nottingham, more specifically their wives maiden names, where they married and lived, and the wives parents names and where you locate them at so I can research further. And also the Fitzwater connection - see below.

James S Nottingham married Mary M? and Newton married Elizabeth?.

The Fitzwater's are tied in with James S and Mary M somehow, I don't know if she was married to a Fitzwater before James S or if her maiden name was Fitwater or her maiden name may have been Perdue, see the article I have enclosed on Sarah Perdue Wood. She may also have been married to a Sergent or it may have been her maiden name.

My Grandmother Mary Ellen Nottingham was said to have step brothers and sisters some were "Billy" William Sergent and Thomas Sergent. There are Fitzwater's listed in the Clay Census with James S and Mary M, but they are listed as Grandchildren. My father's only living brother says that Emma and "Nettie" Jeanetta (or Jenetta) Fitzwater were his mother Mary Ellen Nottingham's 1/2 sisters but I think they may have just been raised together.

One of the reasons I am making this request to you is that they began around Bath Co, VA, Pocahontas Co, (W) Va, Braxton Co, and then into Clay. I am hoping that you may be able to locate Elizabeth Hicks in Bath Co or Pocahontas Co, and hopefully also James S and Newton's wives and families.

Any leads you could find for me would be greatly appreciated.

I am enclosing a \$10 check, if this is not enough let me know.

Soon after the Civil War ended there was a killing on Big Buffalo Creek. John Stuart Nottingham, an eleven year old boy murdered his father James.

There had been a lot of family trouble and Quarroln amoung relatives. The boy said his aunt had hired him to kill his father.

The jury heard testimony, and returned a verdict of guilty. In view of the boys age and evidence of a lack of good moral training, the younger received a prison term rather than excution.

George Nicholas, grandfather of the boy and one of the most respected citizens of Clay County, petition the governor to commute the lad's sentence.

Nicholas agreed to take care of the boy and to be responsible for his good behavior.

The petition was signed by the judge, the prosecuting attorney, and the members of the jury.

The Governor released the boy to the custody of his grandfather to climax one of the most noted murder cases in Clay County.

At the time the population of the county was less than 2,000.
