

Building and Loan Companies.

A case is now pending in our Court of Appeals which is of vital interest to Building and Loan Companies doing business in this State. It went up from Parkersburg where a sale of property was ordered by the Building and Loan Co. for the payment of dues and interest. The plea of usury was put in and the Court of Appeals will, it is said, be called upon to determine whether the Company's contracts made with its stockholders or with those who borrow from it are indeed usurious.

By some building and loan men this is regarded as a test case involving the existence of all the building and loan associations in the State, for none of them can live on simply six per cent. By others it is considered merely a question as to whether the association in this case—a foreign one—has complied with the laws of the State, an opinion of Judge Greer's, delivered some years




