RONCEVERTE — (AP) — The Greenbrier county sheriff's office reported a Ronceverte store owner shot his wife then turned the weapon—a .357 Magnum rifle—on himself in the couple's living quarters in the rear of their store.

Authorities found the bodies of Clarence H. Keene, 55, and his wife, Vula, 50, Monday morning. Neighbors said they heard what sounded like rifle shots late Sunday night coming from the couple's small market.

Seriously Injured

Most seriously injured was Carl Lermann, Jr., of East Orange, N. J., who suffered a fractured pelvis and internal lacerations. Also injured were William Taylor, eighteen of Belleville, N. J., who received a broken leg and jaw and possibly broken elbow. Both are students of Cumberland university at Lebanon, Tenn., and were believed to have been hitchhiking their way home for the Christmas holidays.

The third man injured was Harry Long, thirty-two, of 145 South Eight street, Columbia, Pa., driver of one of the trucks involved in the crash. He received a face cut and knee injury. It was his first time out, he said, with the new truck.

The machine Long was driving was a truck-trailer van loaded with potatoes. Gutshall was thought to have been the operator of the other vehicle, a pick-up truck, in which Lewis and the three injured victims were passengers.

Trooper Numa Helsabeck, who investigated, said that the Gutshall machine was traveling north on U. S. Route 11 and the van was going south when they collided nearly head-on. Both machines were demolished and potatoes were scattered all over the vicinity. The Gutshall truck ended up beside the highway, headed in the opposite direction from which it had been traveling. The truck was knocked loose from the trailer, left the road, and burned up. The trailer was left across the road.

The accident happened, the trooper said, about five o'clock on a straight stretch of road about a mile south of Mint Spring. It happened on a two-lane highway.

Another student was reported to have been in the Gutshall truck at the time of the collision but a search for him was unsuccessful.

The bodies were taken to the home of Hamrick & Co. of Staunton, where they were viewed by Coroner, C. P. Obenschain, who returned a verdict of death as a result of injuries received in an automobile accident.

For more than 50 years, Laughlin's anthologies showcased writers he considered originals, among them Vladimir Nabokov, William Saroyan, Dylan Thomas, Thomas Merton, James Agee and John Hawkes.

Laughlin's company became New Directions Publishing Corp., one of the world's most influential book publishers.

Laughlin wrote several books of poetry, including "In Another Country," "Stolen & Contaminated Poems" and "The Bird of Endless Time."

REV. GEORGE P. MOORE

Rev. George P. Moore died at his home at Edray about seven o'clock Saturday morning, April 22, 1922. His age was eighty-three years and three months, having been born January 9, 1839. His death was due to the infirmities of extreme age following an attack of influenza. The funeral was conducted from the Edray Church on Monday afternoon, and the burial was in the Edray cemetery. The services were conducted by Rev. C. A. Powers, assisted by Rev. F. B. Wyand and Rev. H. H. Orr. One of the largest congregations ever seen on a like occasion in the Edray community assembled to pay honor to his memory.

George P. Moore was the son of Robert Moore and his wife Eliza Bruffey. He had two brothers, Davis and Clark Moore. His parents and brothers moved to Iowa about war times. His nearest surviving relatives are some nephews and nieces in the West.

Mr. Moore was twice married. His first wife was Miss Elizabeth M. Poage, who died in 1865. His second wife was Mrs. Ruth J. Moore, nee Gay. She died about four years since.

Thus we note the passing of probably the best known citizen of Pocahontas county. His life was well rounded out. Preacher, farmer, merchant, banker and public officer—he did with his might what his hand found to do. With length of days, riches and honor was he blessed.

Mr. Moore was the oldest postmaster in point of service in the United States. Appointed postmaster at Edray by President Pierce at the age of seventeen years, he served continuously, with the exception of a year or two during President Cleveland's first administration to the day of his death. He was elected to the County Court and Board of Education at various times; and served as jury commissioner and county coroner for years and years.

At the organization of the Pocahontas Bank, Mr. Moore was chosen president, which position he held under the reorganization of the institution as the First National Bank, until the beginning of the present year. The officers of this bank were the pall bearers at his funeral.

The firm of Barlow & Moore, general merchants, began business in the year 1867. Mr. Moore's partner was the late Henry Barlow. For fifty-five years this firm has continued in business under his active supervision.

But all other activities aside this many sided man was most widely known as a minister of the gospel. Early in life he professed his faith in Christ, joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, and later was ordained a preacher. Few ministers have married and buried more Pocahontas people than he. Mr. Moore was an enthusiastic christian, ever letting his light shine; liberal in the support of every good cause, he left his impression upon those with whom he came in contact.

Thomas Austin Moore, Sr., 24, of Hughesville, Maryland, died from drowning after a boat capsized in rough seas in the Chesapeake Bay Saturday, January 12, 1974. He and three other men were sea duck hunting. Two were saved and Moore and Jeffrey Langely, 27, of Bryantown, Maryland, drowned. *Boat*

He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Moore, formerly of Cass.

Surviving him are his wife, Linda M. Moore, two children, Stephanie C. Moore and Thomas A. Moore, Jr.; a sister, Louise E. Montgomery, and his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Harry E. Curry.

Capt. J. W. Mathew, one of Greenbrier county's oldest and best known citizens and business men on Anthonys creek, died on Tuesday afternoon, January 7, 1930, at his home at Alvon. He had been sick for some time and had lain in an unconscious condition since Friday last. He was 90 years old on November 9 last. Capt. Mathews served in the war between the states and was one of the few surviving Confederate veterans. His wife, who is several years younger than he, and a son, Charles F., of Alvon, survive him. He was a member of the M. E. Church, South. Captain Mathews had always expressed a desire to be buried in a Confederate uniform, of which he was very proud, and his last wishes were carried out when he was laid to rest on Wednesday afternoon. Rev. N. W. Russell conducted the funeral service.

In accordance with the last wishes of Capt. Mathews his body was drawn to the grave in a two-horse wagon. Captain Jacob Warwick Mathews was born in Pocahontas county on November 9, 1839, and was a son of Samuel G. and Naomi Hudson Mathews. At the age of 21 he enlisted as a private in Co. I, 25th Virginia Infantry of the Confederate army and saw service in many of the historic battles of the Civil war. He was one of the so-called "Immortal 600," having when a prisoner of war at Charleston, S. C., been placed with a number of other Confederate prisoners to the number of about 600 between the Federal defenses and attacking Confederates and being exposed to the fire of the attacking Confederate army. Fortunately the danger of the prisoners was discovered in time to avert any casualties. There were three other Greenbrier county prisoners of war among these prisoners. They were Col. Ford, J. Wash McDowell and Dr. Lewis. Capt. Mathews was the last of the group from Greenbrier.

The deceased was one of the best known men of the county; he was in the mercantile business at Alvon until about ten years ago, when old age forced him to retire from active business, although he continued to manage his large farm until the time of his recent illness three weeks ago.

He enjoyed robust health during his life time, never failing to attend every Confederate reunion and was buried in his uniform. Death came to him at ripe old age, claiming him a grand old man, from the ever-thinning ranks of the Confederacy.

Besides his wife and son he is survived by a sister, Miss Minerva Mathews, aged 81 years, who lived with him.—Greenbrier Independent.

FORMER LEGISLATOR AND RETIRED Superior Court Judge Ralph Moody, 81, died Feb. 19 in Anchorage.

Moody was raised in a poor Alabama farming family. While Moody was in high school, his father gave him a calf to raise. When the calf was grown, Moody rented it out to a next-door neighbor for milking. This milk money paid Moody's tuition at the University of Alabama Law School where he received his doctorate of law.

In 1946 Moody moved to Juneau to work for the Office of Price Administration, but within two weeks he had landed another job as an attorney with the Army Corps of Engineers. The young lawyer soon entered state politics, first serving in the territorial and state Legislatures, and then as majority leader of the first state Senate.

In 1960, Governor Bill Egan appointed Moody to the position of state attorney general. Two years later, Egan appointed him to the Superior Court bench, a post he held for 23 years.

Moody quickly gained the reputation of a by-the-book judge. He scoffed when anyone suggested poverty was an excuse for committing a crime.

"I don't buy that," he once said. "You shouldn't get off because you're poor any more than you should get off if you're rich."

He also was tough on repeat offenders who tried to use divine salvation as a cover. In a national magazine interview, Moody recalled what he told a criminal up for sentencing in his court years ago:

"Well, I've been sitting on this bench a good many years, and a lot of you fellows find God there [in jail]," Moody said. "However, he never seems to accompany you when you leave, so I've concluded that he lives there, and I'm sending you back where he can keep an eye on you."

Seaborn Buckalew, a longtime Moody friend and fellow judge, once said: "A defendant who stood in front of him would have a moment of terror. He was no-nonsense—straight as an arrow."

It is raining now. It sure will be a mess if it rains much, and the raining season will soon start. Then I guess we will wear coveralls all the time and big heavy shoes. I do not think I'll like that.

I hope you all are well. I am fine so far. Tell everyone hello for me. Sure hope I hear from you real soon. Love and kisses to all.

He was platoon runner and while carrying a message, a high explosive shell struck very close to him, causing a very severe concussion. He delivered his message and then fell dead.

No soldier of his regiment met a braver death and we often remember his heroism and devotion to his duty.

He was buried in about the centre of this village by some of his comrades who were under shell fire at the time, and a suitable cross marks his grave.

Joe was a good boy and he was well liked by everyone of the company and we were very sorry to lose him.

The Honorable Thomas Summers McNeel, president of the Pocahontas County Bar Association and for more than 52 years as practicing attorney at this Bar; finished his duties on May 23, 1950, when his soul was called to the Court of the Supreme Architect of the Universe where all matters in difference are res adjudicata.

Thomas Summers McNeel was born at Millpoint, Pocahontas County, West Virginia, on October 15, 1872, the son of Isaac McNeel and Miriam Nancy Beard McNeel. 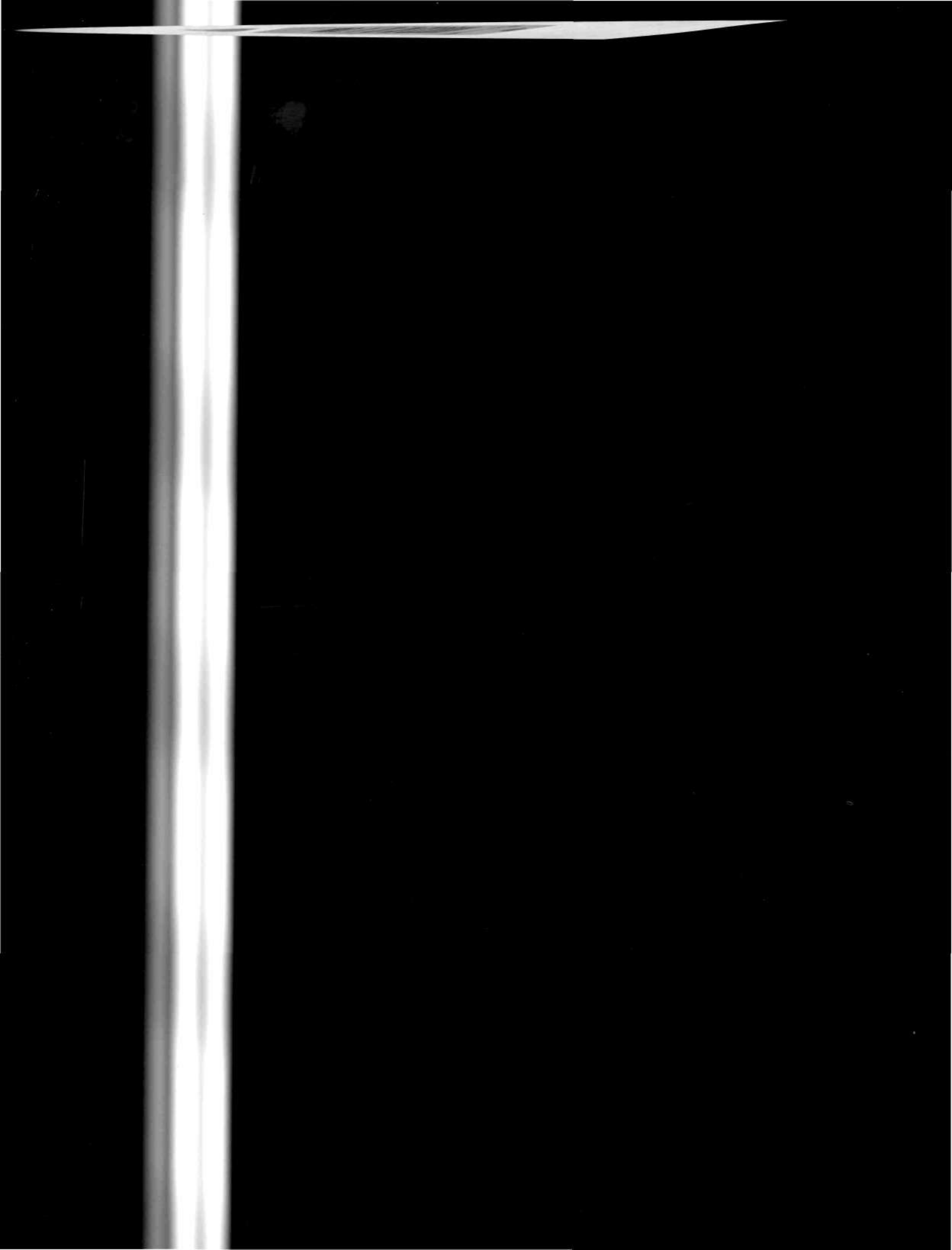

Last year he was commended by Leonard Jaffe, director of Space Applications, NASA, for his contributions to the successful launch and orbit of the Nimbus II Weather Satellite. Nimbus II is the world's most sophisticated weather satellite, and provides day and night worldwide pictures of clouds and radiation data on the temperature of the earth and its atmosphere.

He was a veteran of World War II and the Korean War, having served in the Air Force from September 6, 1943, to February 21, 1953.

A son of the late Robert W. and Madge Sheets McQuain, he was born at Dunmore and lived during his early life in the Doe Hill area of Pendleton County.

He attended public schools in Pendleton County and received his bachelor's degree in chemistry from Bridgewater College and a master's degree from the School of Engineering, New York University. He also took advanced research courses at the University of Virginia and George Washington University.

He graduated *Supra Cum Laude* from Bridgewater College with one of the highest averages ever made at the school. While at Bridgewater he was named to "Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges."

Editor Cal Price Is Dead

MARLINTON, June 14 — (Special)—Calvin W. Price, a country editor who was "sinfully proud" of receiving a monument during his lifetime, died unexpectedly today at his home here. He was 76.

Famed for his editing of the Pocahontas Times, he was an expert conservationist, an untiring census taker for the West Virginia bear, and a friend of three generations of Pocahontas County residents.

IN 1955, Calvin W. Price State Forest was named for him.

"I'm sinfully proud of it," he said then. "It's not often a man gets his tombstone before he dies."

He was a member of the West Virginia Press Association's 50-year club and once was honored on a nationally broadcast radio program as the typical country newspaper editor. He is one of the few men ever to receive a lifetime honorary membership in the Press Club of Charleston.

Mr. Price was born Nov. 22, 1880, in Rockingham County, Va. He was 15 when he started as an apprentice on the Pocahontas Times.

FOUR YEARS later he became a partner and in 1906 became sole owner.

Under his direction, the weekly publication evolved into a state institution.

Type is hand set and an ancient flat bed press is used to produce copies of the Times.

Mr. Price was a short, plump man, his eyes wrinkled with laugh lines. On a typical day, he would be in need of a shave and printer's ink would be smeared across his shirts and stained on his hands.

HE HAD the happy quality of never forgetting a name (for years he knew every resident of the county personally) and of being genuinely interested in all whom he met.

His stories of hunting and fishing were famous. For the major part of his life he wrote lovingly about nature, his affection based on profound knowledge.

He was a man of impeccable manners. Once, a friend asked him why he wasn't making corrections of obvious typographical errors in his newspaper.

"Oh, I couldn't do that," Price replied. "The lady who set this type would have her feelings hurt if I made any change."

He was in good spirits and health until the time he died. His wife, Mrs. Mabel Milligan Price, was with him.

Other survivors are four daughters, Mrs. John Branch Green of Richmond, Va.; Mrs. Isaac McNeel of Charleston, Mrs. J. D. Hubbard of Virginia Beach and Mrs. Basil Sharp of Marlinton; a brother, Dr. Norman Price of Marlinton; a sister, Mrs. F. R. Hunter of Marlinton; and 10 grandchildren.

The body is at Smith mortuary here.

KILLED BY LIGHTNING

In the electric storm on Friday afternoon, May 26, 1939, Okey Leland Peyton, aged 14 years, was instantly killed by lightning on Little Mountain, west of Hillsboro, and Okey Lee Coleman, aged 14 years, was so badly injured by the same stroke of lightning that he died from injuries and exposure on Monday, May 29, 1939.

The boys, close relatives, left their homes on Stamping Creek, to go ground hog hunting on Friday morning. They failed to return and some search was made for them on Saturday morning, but word came to the families the boys had been seen in an automobile at Frost. This proved to be misinformation, and on Sunday further search was made, but with no success. On Monday morning Watauga Citizens Conservation Camp was notified and forty enrollees with their leaders responded for a systematic search. By eleven o'clock young Coleman was found, barely alive; caught in a wire fence, sorely torn, and wounded and delirious. He died as the party was carrying him in.

The search continuing, about four o'clock in the afternoon the dead body of Okey Leland Peyton was found on the Joe McNeel place, nearly a mile from where the other boy was found. He had evidently suffered instant death from a bolt of lightning which had struck a sugar tree under which the boys were sheltering from the rain. It was apparent young Peyton had been leaning against the tree when it was struck. There was raveling from his shirt on the tree where the electric charge had left the tree to enter his body on its way to the ground. Evidently, death came instantly.

How young Coleman had made his way from the place of the tragedy to where he was found nearly a mile away can never be known. Hurt to the point of helplessness, he endured exposure from heat, cold and rain for almost seventy two hours before help came, and that too late.

Okey Leland Peyton, son of Henry W. and Verce May Coleman Peyton was born at Seebert, March 1, 1925; died May 26, 1939. Burial in the Sharp cemetery on Stamping Creek, Wednesday afternoon.

Police said Mrs. Grosso slapped the child before supper yesterday and when the pretty little blonde girl sulked over her meal, Mrs. Grosso thrashed her with a belt containing a buckle.

An autopsy indicated that a savage blow on the girl's head had caused the death, and police said they were still hunting for the weapon.

When the child crying bitterly, went up to her bedroom to get her pajamas, Mrs. Grosso told police, she sulked and refused to come down for assistance in putting on the night garments.

Mrs. Grosso told police she went upstairs and found her weeping on the bed. In a fit of rage, Mrs. Grosso said she whipped her with a razor strap.

As she started to help her with her pajamas, Mrs. Grosso said she fainted and fell on top of her.

When she came to, the child was gasping. Mrs. Grosso told police she washed her face and while she did so the little girl cooled and died. Mrs. Grosso thought this was about

She called a neighbor. Later she called police. Ratliff was respon-

Anna was one of four children cast adrift in the world last fall when her mother died in West Virginia. She and her brother, James, 18 months old, came to Detroit to live with their mother's sister, Mrs. Grosso. The other two went to their grandparents' home in West Virginia.—Philadelphia Inquirer.

A little grandson, Raymond Sharp, aged 10 years, had disappeared; also one of the farm horses.

Sheriff Rodney Buzzard and State Trooper O. A. Harper, took the trail, and on Thursday afternoon, Clyde Sharp, a grandson, was arrested in a shanty at a brick yard at Elkins. He confessed to killing his grandmother and uncle by striking them on the head with a heavy iron bolt as they lay in their beds. He said he had struck his uncle first. He said his object was robbery. He got only about \$17 overlooking a much larger amount in a pocket of his grandmother's night dress. He was brought to Marlinton, and is being held in jail for the grand jury. His little brother, Raymond was with him at the time of his arrest.

Clyde Sharp is 21 years old, the son of Cecil Sharp, of Clarksburg. He recently completed a sentence of a year in the penitentiary for stealing an automobile.

Mrs. Sharp was the widow of the late Clark Sharp. She was one of the prominent Kittle family of Randolph County. Two of her sons were in Marlinton, Charles A. Sharp, and one of the County Commissioners, El Sharp.

After Jones climbed over a fence and went to Miss Wooddell's aid, Shinaberry then went around the corner, shot himself, and staggered a few feet, fell on his face and died.

No motive was given for the shooting.

On last Saturday night at about ten o'clock, Leroy Sprouce, aged 17 years, was shot while riding along the state highway in a Ford pick-up truck driven by Jaze Buzzard.

Buzzard and Sprouce were returning to their home in a Ford Pick-up truck, when they neared Frost, it is said that they noticed someone sitting on the bank above the road, who they identified as Clifford C. Sharp, of Frost. As they came within line with the assailant he opened fire with a gun loaded with buck shot, hitting the side of the car and several shots hitting Sprouce in head and back. The first shot, it is thought, was the one that ended the life of Sprouce, the shot penetrating his skull and lodging in his brain. The second shot that was fired by the assailant was fired into the rear of the car, hitting the back of the seat, one shot lodging in the cap that was worn by Buzzard.

Immediately after the shooting the local state police were called to the scene of the crime and after investigating the matter, they called at the home of Clifford C. Sharp, who was found in bed, and placed him under arrest as the assailant. Sharp was brought to Marlinton early Sunday morning where he was lodged in the county jail to await the action of the grand jury, which was called into special session here on Tuesday of this week, when an indictment of murder was placed against Sharp & he was held without bail for the October term of the Circuit court,
