Sticky Development

Anderholm-Goodman Invention Patented

The AEC has been granted a patent for a method invented by Curt Anderholm (5214) and Al Goodman (5323) for measuring adhesion of material bonds. The technique solves a long-standing problem in thin-film technology in determining adhesion of a thin film to its substrate.

The method involves using a laser or electron-beam machine to bombard a surface of one of the materials with radiant energy. This produces a compressive stress wave within the material which reflects from the unbonded surface of the other material and subjects the bond between the materials to the reflected tensile wave. The strength of the bond may be determined by increasing the amplitude of the tensile stress wave to the point of bond failure. Tensile strength is then determined by measuring this amplitude.

Curt has been at Sandia eight years in a number of assignments — field testing, special projects, advanced development and, currently, laser research. He earned his PhD in physics from Northwestern in 1963.

Al first joined Sandia when it was part of LASL (Z Division) and transferred to Albuquerque in September 1949. He has worked in reactor research, technical writing, business methods, fuzing research, microcircuitry, materials, thin films and the vulnerability program. From 1956 to 1960, he worked at LASL doing research on energy levels in bromine isotopes, the subject of his dissertation. He earned his PhD in physics from UNM in 1960 and rejoined Sandia that year. • dg

Fishermen: A special Kokanee Salmon season is open through Dec. 31 in Navajo Lake and its tributaries, El Vado Lake, and Chama River upstream to the State Hwy. 95 bridge at Parkview. The bag limit is 24 per day. There is no possession limit on Kokanee during this special season and it is lawful to use snag hooks and grappling hooks; spears, gigs and arrows may also be used provided they are not driven by explosives, gas, air or crossbow.

Bird Hunters: A second, statewide dove season will be held Nov. 27 through Dec. 26. Limits are 10 per day and 20 in possession, and shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Hunters in the valley south of Albuquerque are cautioned about shooting near houses, private property and livestock.

Waterfowl Seasons Established: Ducks - Pacific Flyway - that portion of the state lying west of the Continental Divide and areas east of the Divide but within the Jicarilla Apache Reservation - Oct. 16 through Jan. 16, 1972.

Central Flyway - Oct. 23 through Jan. 16, 1972.

Sandhill Crane - Oct. 30 through Jan. 30, 1972. Open season only in southeastern New Mexico counties of Chavez, Curry, De Baca, Eddy, Lea, Quay and Roosevelt.

Goose: Jan. 1-16, 1972 in Sandoval, Sierra, Bernalillo and Socorro Counties and the Central Flyway portion of Valencia County. In the remainder of the Central Flyway, the season will be Oct. 23 through Jan. 16, 1972. Pacific Flyway south of U.S. 66 will be Oct. 16-Jan. 16. The Pacific Flyway portion north of U.S. 66 will be closed to goose hunting.

At the present time, Ralph's income is made up of LTD payments coupled with Social Security disability benefits, plus Sandia early retirement and the Sandia early retirement adder.



Five Year Project

Sandian Rebuilds Home

"It's been a long haul," sighs Don Benton, supervisor of Data Processing Division 8411, "and I've wondered at times why the house ever attracted me in the first place. But now that the work is nearly finished, my wife Betty, and our four children appreciate its distinctive character. There just isn't another like it."

Fourteen years ago, tract homes in Livermore didn't appeal to the house-hunting Bentons. An older house at 1531 College Avenue did. It was on a big lot and had lots of room. And a few things for a sometime construction man like Don to fix up.

"Sure, it was in disrepair," recalls Don. "Just replaster a few walls; recement two brick fireplaces and three chimneys. Figured we'd live in the house three years and I'd start refurbishing in earnest and complete it in a year. Somehow, nine years passed before the project got underway. And it's gone on for five years. . ."

Working from an architect's plans, the upstairs remodeling began. The old roof was removed. A two-story 10' x 44' addition was built on the rear of the house. New outside walls gave all rooms the same ceiling height. Rearrangement of interior walls eliminated unusable space. New windows and wood casements were installed.

After two heavy rains the Bentons began construction on the new roof. Then came new flooring. The staircase was repositioned from the rear to the front of the house. Heating, air conditioning and humidifying systems and electronic air-filtering units and their duct work were completed as was a fire detection system. Wiring and lighting fixtures were modernized. A contracted job — the tile work in three bathrooms, one with a sunken tub — marked the final stages of the upstairs work. Downstairs activity followed a similar pattern and included the installation of an ultra-modern kitchen. White vinyl plastic siding covers the house outside.

"Except for the roofing, wallboard and tile

work," says Don, "I was part of every job. Many friends helped. The kids were a great help crawling into tight places and shoveling dirt. And Betty — she became a walking encyclopedia of 'where to get it.' She selected and ordered most of the materials. Some from as far away as Colorado, Iowa and Wisconsin. There isn't a mill works, a foundry or wholesale plumbing firm in the Bay Area unknown to her. Yet she had time to manage our kids, take courses at Chabot College and teach in a nursery school.

"Things remain to be done. And rumor has it that some of the more experienced carpenters who helped me over the years accuse me of letting my tolerances slip from 1/16" to 1/4". But it just isn't so." • mc




