Most Albuquerqueans have already received letters containing the sheets of colored stamps which this year carry the illustration of a young caroler.

Tuberculosis seals have been with us for so long that many Americans are finding them indispensible when it comes to mailing Christmas cards and wrapping packages.

### Full Collection

Joan Barnett, 4222 (5234), has a collection of specimens of all tuberculosis seals issued. Joan reports that the original seals, appearing in 1907, were sold by the American Red Cross.

They were red and white, had a holly wreath printed on them and carried the message "Merry Christmas." They sold so well, Joan has discovered, that the words "and a Happy New Year" were later added and sale continued for a week after Christmas.

For several years the Red Cross issued the seals and then the American Tuberculosis Association took over the project and has made it a holiday tradition.

#### **Finances Work**

Income from the sale of these stickers always helps finance a year's program of vitally needed measures in the fight against tuberculosis.

These measures include low-cost chest X-ray services, rehabilitation and advisory services for the sick, social and medical research, and public health and information.

More than half of the money raised here stays in Bernalillo county.

The final report on the 1953 Campaign notes that \$38,904 has been pledged to the Bernalillo County Fund. This represents an 18.6 per cent increase over last year's total. The total 1953 figure includes employee gifts, Sandia Corporation donation, and gifts from Anderson-Dunham Co. and the Coronado Club.

The number of those contributing has moved up from 90.1 per cent in 1952 to 90.4 per cent this year. The average contribution was boosted from \$6.58 last year to \$7.34 in the recently completed drive.

The payroll deduction method of contributing was widely used this year. Figures show that 60 per cent of the Sandians contributing used this method and it is also interesting to note that this 60 per cent contributed 72 per cent of the total amount.

Another statistic reveals that Sandians contributed one-seventh of the Albuquerque Community Chest budget of \$274,800.

Twenty-one departments in the Corporation displayed 100 per cent contributions. The departments and the number of employees in the department are:


