## It's All in the Way You Answer (Part Two)

It seems certain that Thomas A. Edison was the first to send "hello" over the telephone line. Here is Tom's favorite way to prepare roast chicken, and he suggests that any fowl may be prepared in a similar way, increasing proportions to size of bird, of course.
Place 4-1b. chicken in plastic bag and add approximately two cups of sauterne wine. Allow to stand 3 or 4 hours, then remove bird, do NOT salt the fowl (because this draws out natural juices). Stuff lightly with this dressing:

## $1 / 2 \mathrm{lb}$. pork sausage

$1 / 4$ cup raisins
1/4 cup chopped walnuts
1 cup sliced tart apple 1 cup cracker crumbs
1 cup sauterne wine
Spices to taste
Brown sausage, drain off excess fat, add walnuts, raisins, apple,
