



THE MOST AMAZING TRICKS EVER DONE

FOLLOW THE LEADER

One of the most amazing magic tricks performed in America has been Harry Blackstone's Floating Electric Light. From a table lamp he was able to unscrew a lighted bulb which continued to glow as he balanced it in the palm of his hand. Furthermore it remained suspended in mid-air ofter he walked away from it, and ot his command fallowed him wherever he went. Every few steps he passed his hands aver, under and around it to prave that it was not supported or lit by hidden wires.



An exceedingly difficult billiard table trick has been successfully performed by Charles C. Peterson of St. Louis, the greatest trick shat player of all time. After placing a silver dallar on edge between the cubes and against the cushion at one end of the table, Peterson was able to hit the coin with his cue so that it ralled to the other end and then returned to its original upright position between the cubes. He performed this trick with success on an average of once in six tries.





NO TELEPATHY

The most complete and amazing mind reading act was the ane developed by Mr. and Mrs. Julius Zancig and used in their vaudeville act in the early 1900's. Their code consisted of nearly 500 innacent phroses and gestures with which Zancig, in the aisle, conveyed to his wife on the stage, the answers to the questions he was about to ask her. Consequently, she was able to describe or read anything handed to him by members of the audience.

A SOFT DIVE

When his act, which consisted of diving S1 feet into a shallow tank, became a bit stale, an American circus performer in Copenhagen, Denmark, decided to try something new. His present act consists of diving from a narrow platform high in the air, and landing on his head on a sixteen inch thickness of foom rubber. His next step: thinner rubber.

It has been suggested that he also flip a pot of tea on his neggin and proceed to pour the beverage into the seven cups for the audience.

THE BIG PARADE

A street parade staged by the Barnum and Boiley Circus in New York on March 18, 1893, was the most elaborate circus procession ever presented. The spectacle was headed by a platoon of mounted police and included three bonds, three colliopes, o fife and drum corps of fifty men, scores of costumed performers riding on horses, comels and elephants, nine Roman chariots, seven wagons with cages of wild beasts, and twenty-two



trucks carrying posters of famous events. The entire parade comprised at least forty vehicles, 250 animals and 475 individuals, and was over two miles long.

COME SEE MY ETCHINGS

Probably the world's most famous tattooed specimen was a Turk who was brought to the United States by the late P. T. Barnum, Every port of the man's body was tottooed. Bornum paid the highly decorated Turk \$1,000 a week and dubbed him "The Living Picture Gallery." There were 388 separate designs tottooed on his body.



A DANGEROUS MIXTURE

An American trainer was the first to mix lions and tigers, both male and female, in the same cage. At one time he had a total of forty lions, tigers, and bears all performing together within a thirty two foot arena. Bears are considered the most dangerous of onimals.
