Parashurama Avatar is the sixth amongst the Dashavtars of Lord Vishnu.



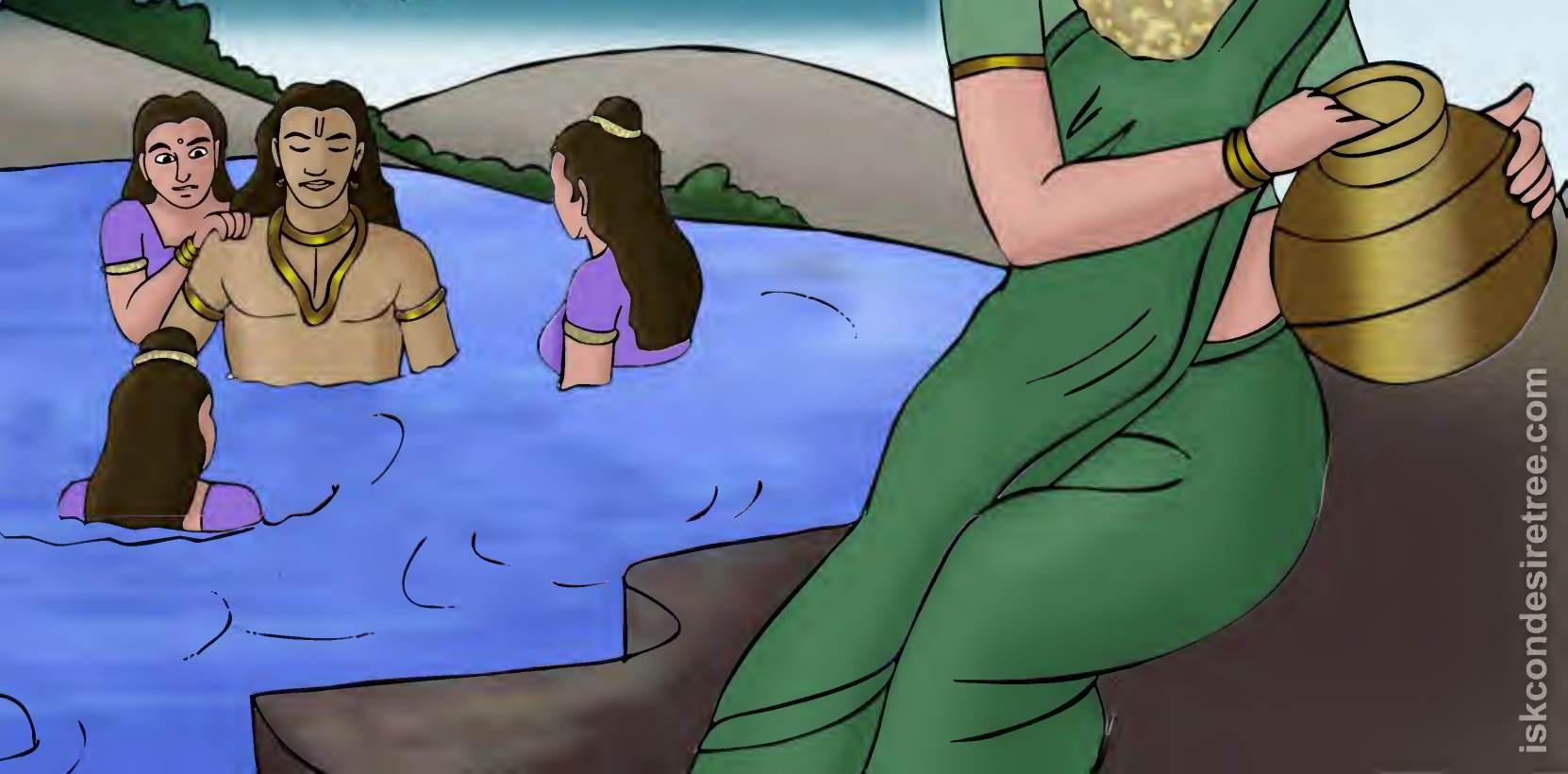

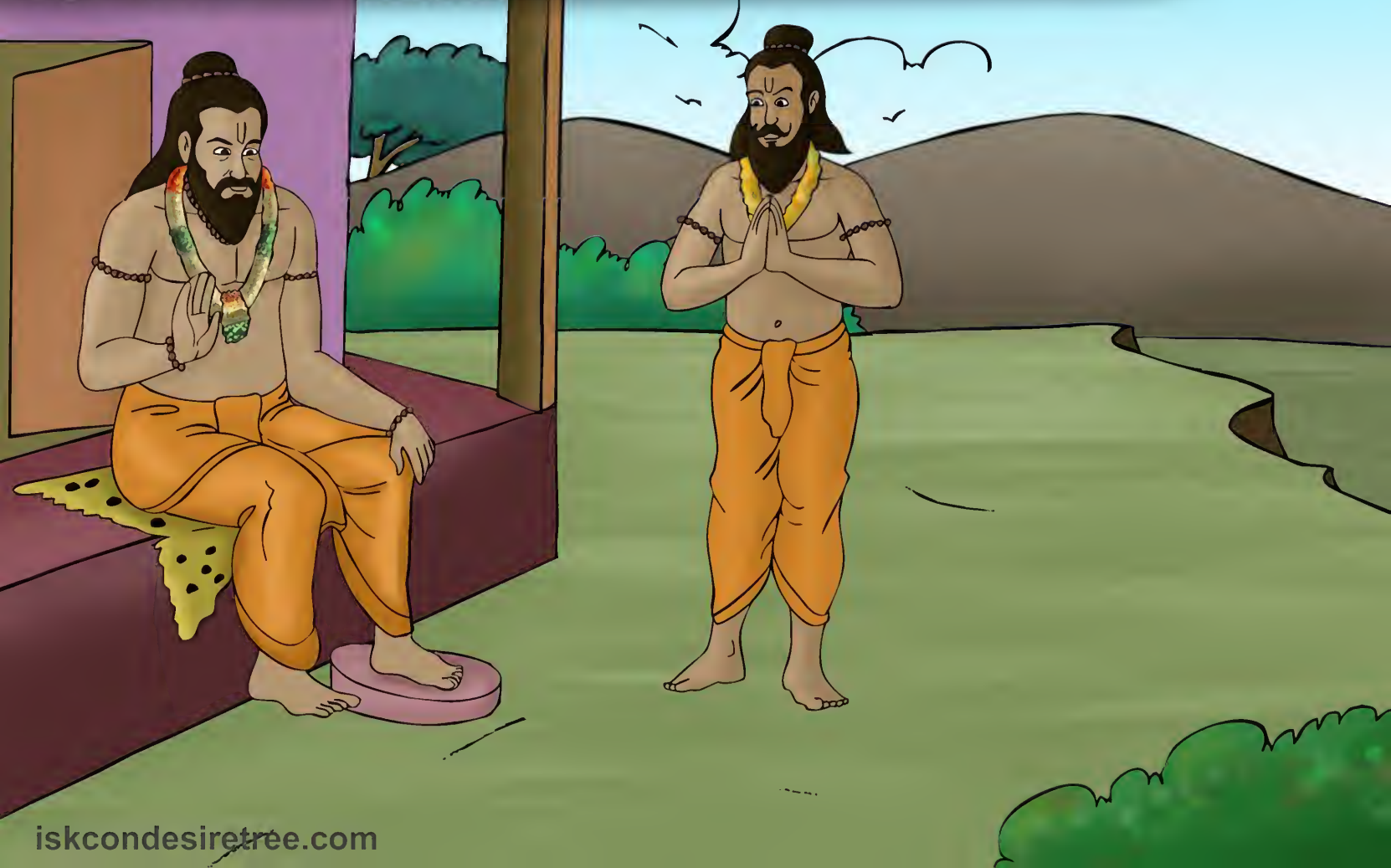
Parashurama returned after awhile. Jamadagni ordered Him to kill His mother and also the disobedient brothers.

disobedience.**

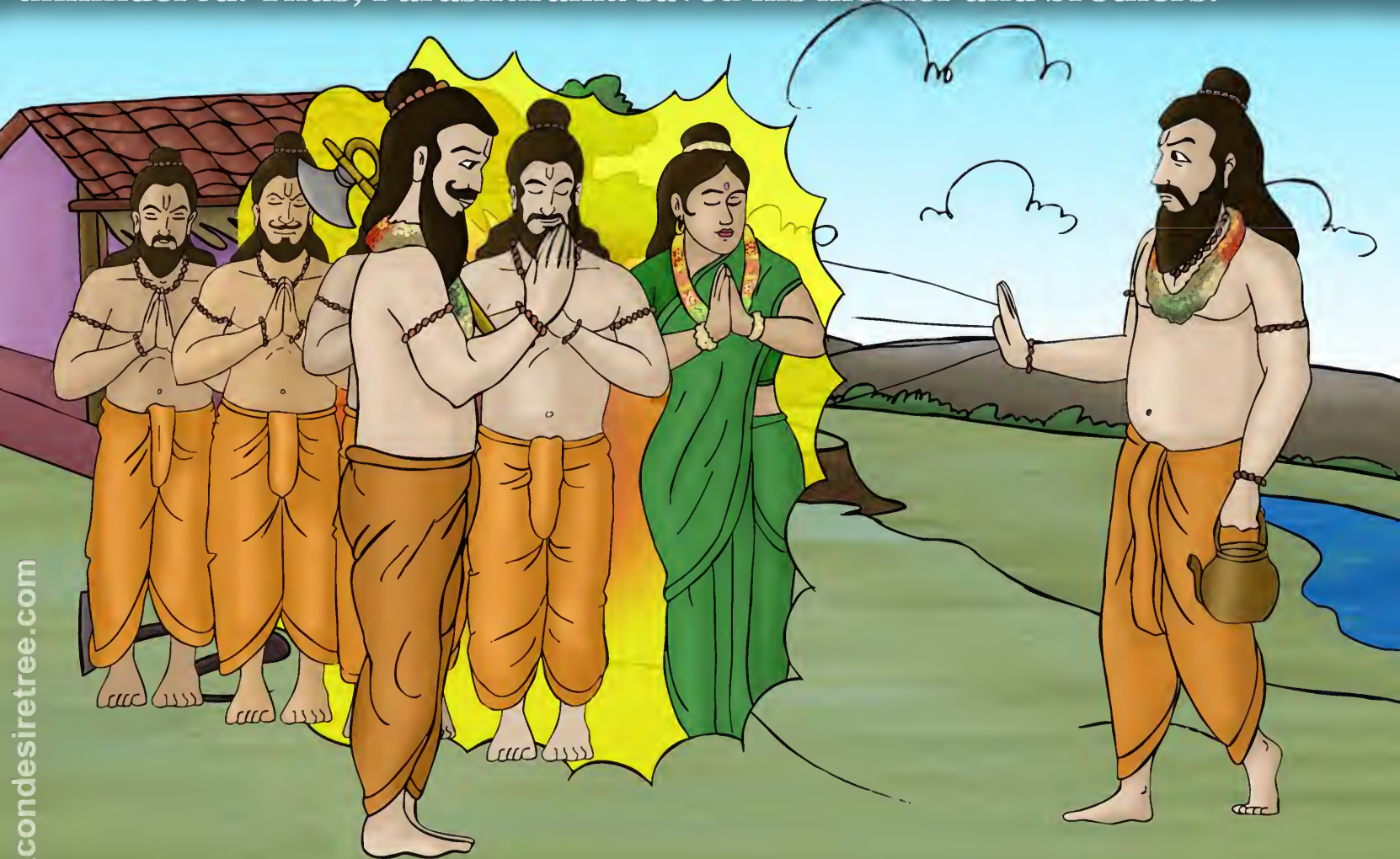


Jamadagni replied,

my son. So be it.



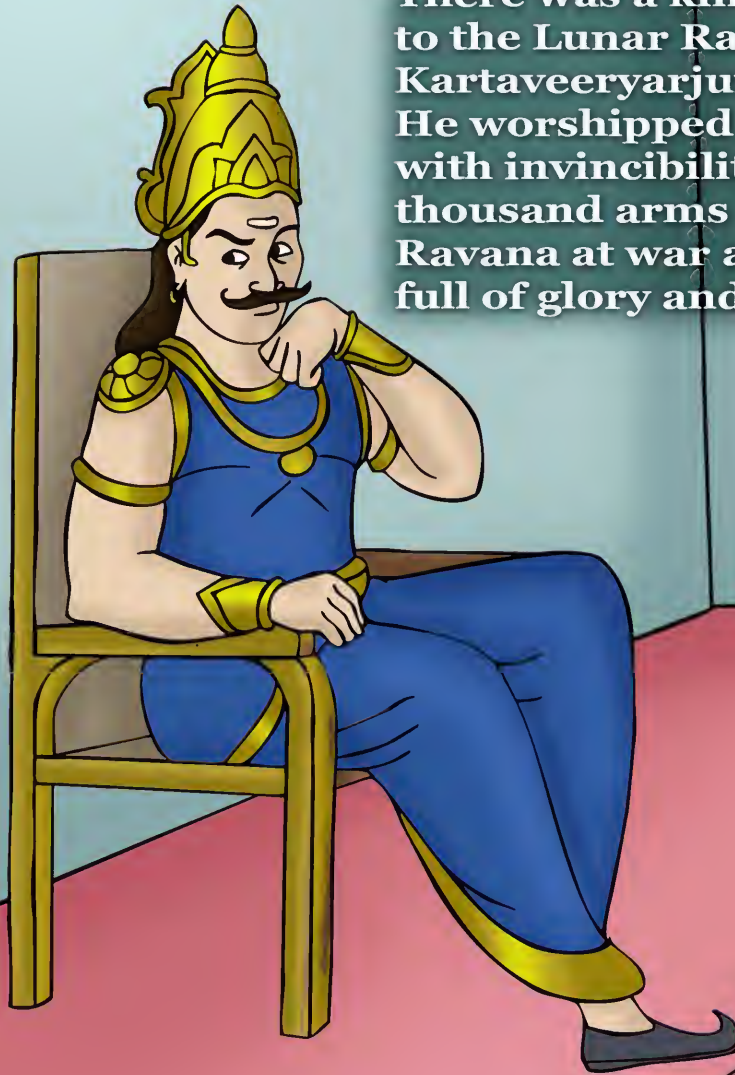

awarded Him an invincible axe.**



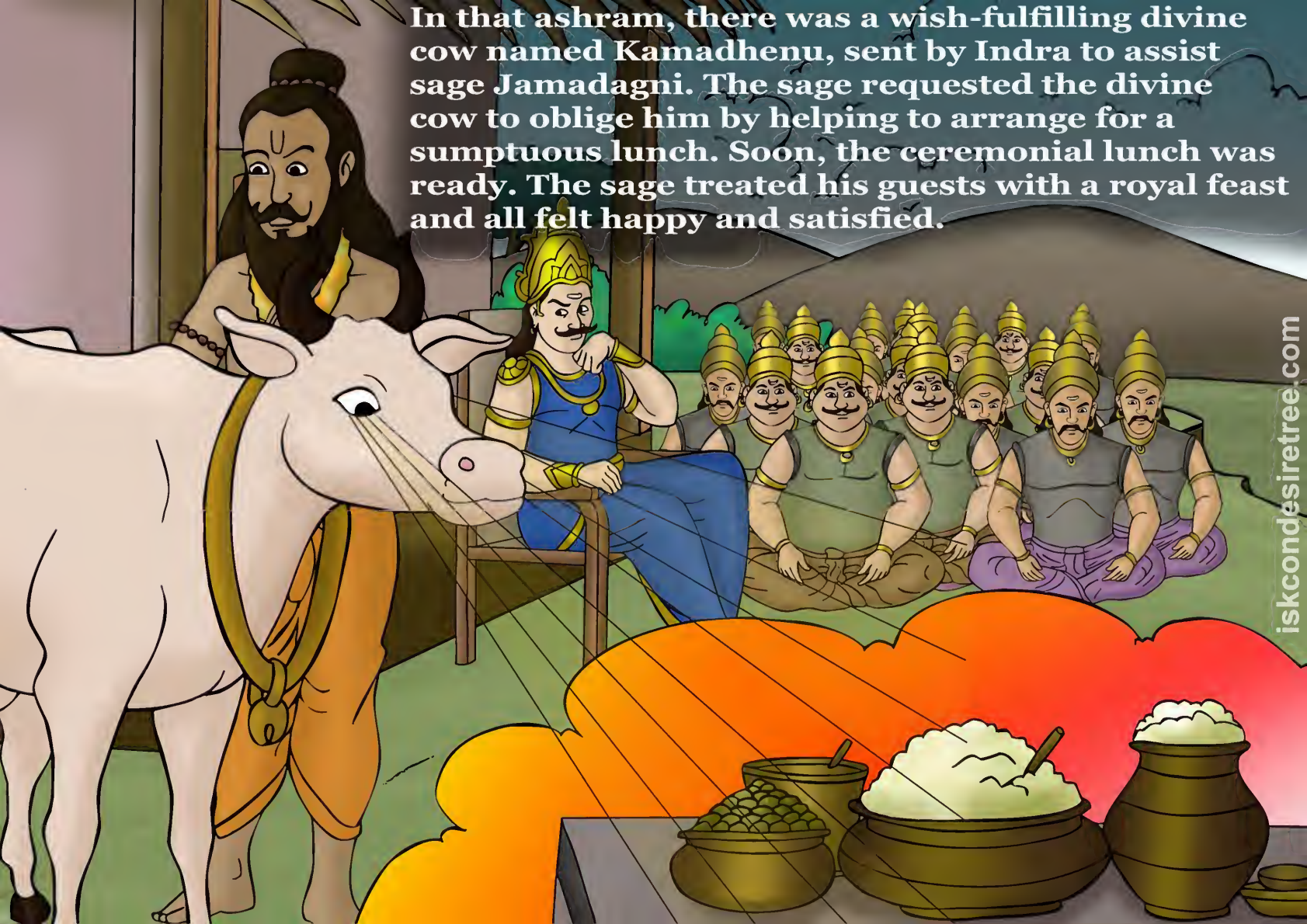

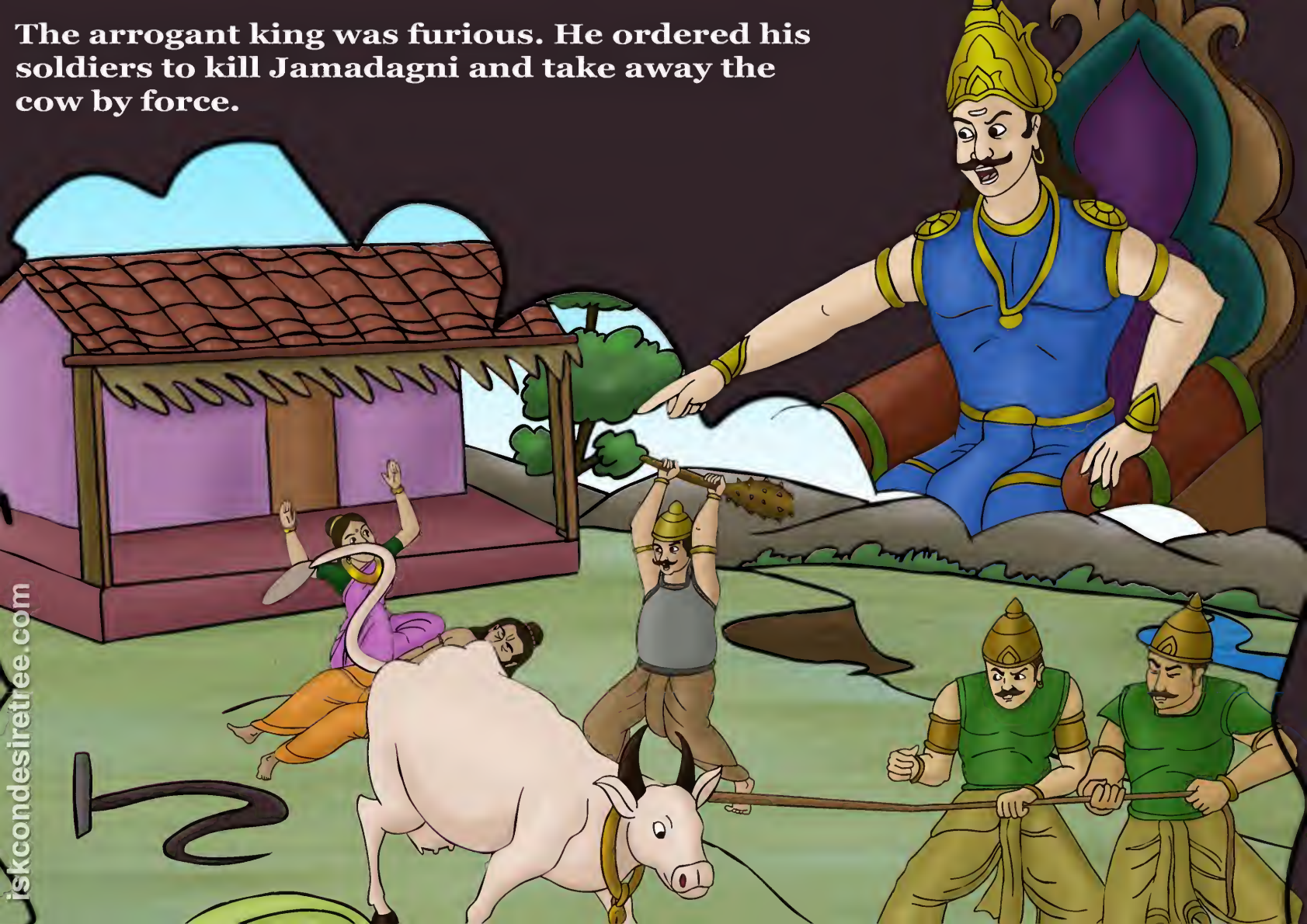

The king offered to give the sage a lot of land and property, in exchange for Kamadhenu cow but Jamadagni didn't wish to part away with his worshipable mother cow.

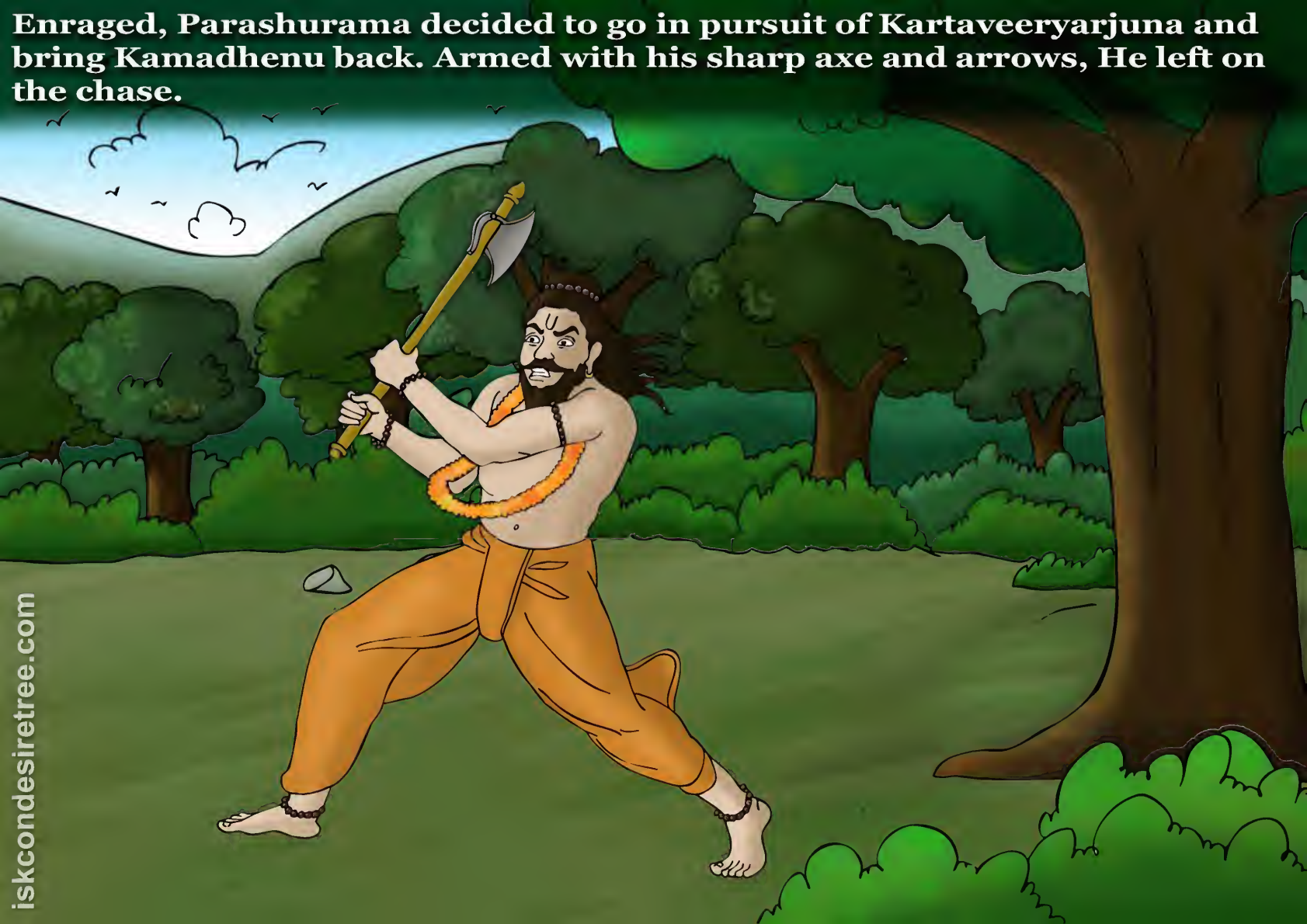
The arrogant king was furious. He ordered his soldiers to kill Jamadagni and take away the cow by force.

Parashurama then respectfully brought Kamadhenu back in the ashram.



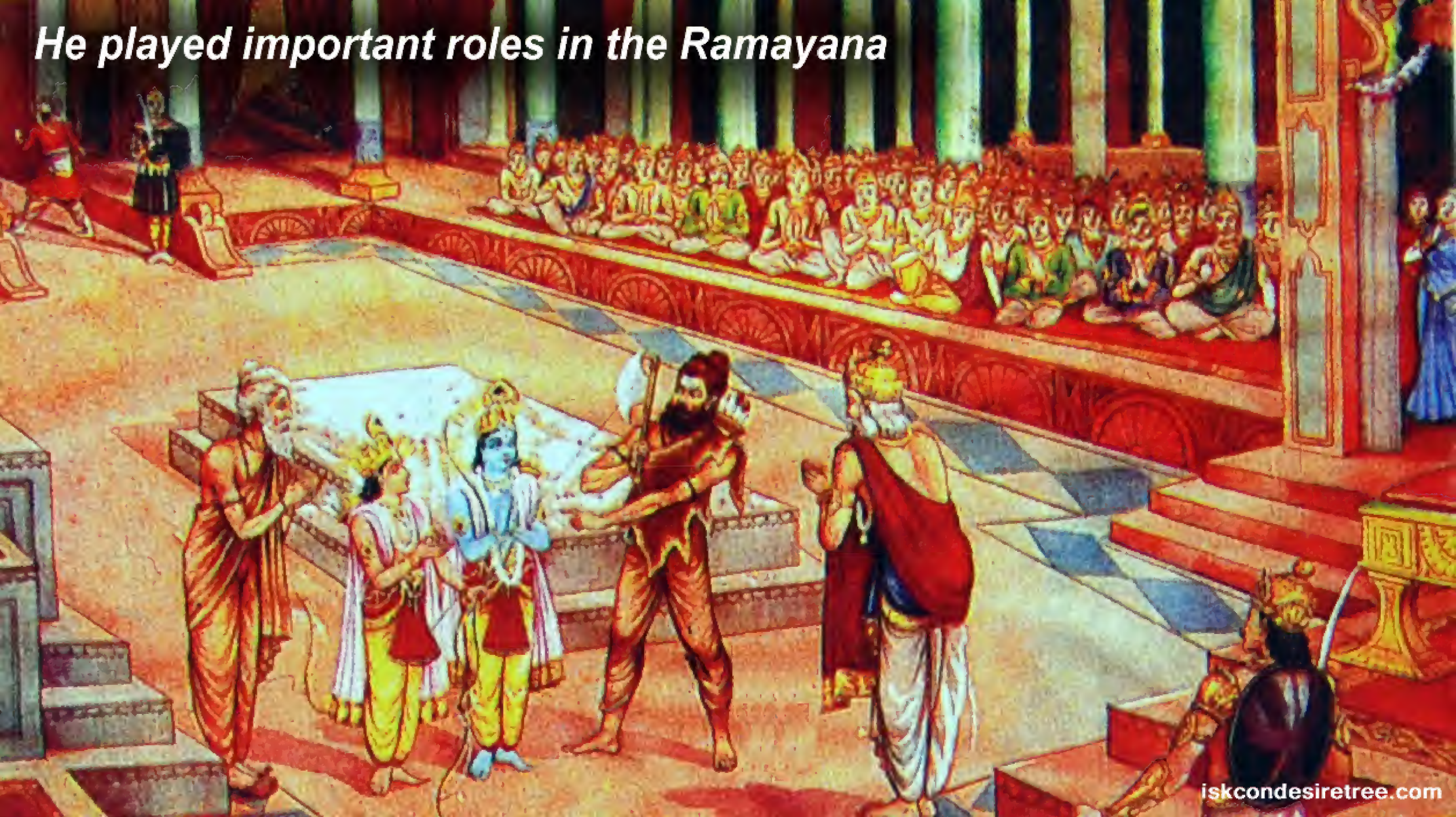
