



Welcome once again to yet another edition of SAT DX, the column compiled by myself Mark King covering the colourful subject of satellite radio, although I must point out that only news of interest to Free Radio enthusiasts will be covered here.

I shall begin this time with an update on Euronet where during the evening of Thursday 25th February, Christopher England made announcements that the station would close at end of March. He was then joined on air by Eric Wiltsher who explained that the decision to cease operating followed the failure to obtain adequate sponsorship. Euronet's sub-carrier of 7.56 MHz via Sky Sports fell silent prematurely early in March. This may not however be the end of the story as since then we have learnt that the directors of Euronet are determined to try again and are presently planning to return to the air in November via the new Astra 1C satellite.

One group that has worked hard to try and solve many of the problems facing British satellite radio is Quality Europe FM. This station now emanates from the old Nova studios in Camberley, Surrey and can be received by tuning to Astra's Sky Movies TV Channel, sub-carriers 7.38 and 7.56 MHz. QEFM is presently airing ex-Euronet programme, Satellite Surgery which is jointly presented by Eric Wiltsher and Julian Clover. The Satellite Surgery can be heard each Saturday between 1600-1730 BST.

During the afternoon of April 3rd, a test tone appeared on Eutelsats MBC sub-carrier 7.92 MHz. This was the beginning of QEFM's sister station, Quality Country Music Radio which is also expected to become available on Astra in the near future, probably via the sub-carrier previously used by Euronet.

Fans of Britain's second commercial national radio station, Virgin 1215, may be interested to learn that the service is currently available in hi-fi quality on Astra. This outlet is believed only to be a temporary arrangement however and is being used by engineers as an audio feed for the various MW transmitters across the country. Those who tune to MTV, transponder 22 sub-carrier 7.74 MHz, may still hear Virgin Radio which employs ex-Caroline djs Emperor Rosco and Tommy Vance, along with Tommy 'What A Guy' Rivers who found fame on Laser 588.

Finally, I shall give mention to Radio North Sea which managed to re-launch itself on Tuesday 16th February. The station is operating via the Intelsat VAF satellite and is once again carrying programmes from Radio Caroline during weekday evenings.

Unfortunately, that's it for another edition of SAT DX. I will be back in August with another update from the world of satellite radio but until then, keep an eye on the sky. ■

Editor's thoughts . . .

Yo! Hope I'm finding everybody feeling fine although if you've been tuning around shortwave of late, you probably won't be feeling too great! Yes, I expect you've noticed the recent appalling conditions on the bands. It's all quite technical but I've been reliably informed that we're currently on a downward trend and conditions are set to be pretty bad for the next few months or possibly, even longer. It sure doesn't sound too good at all! It's quite depressing really with listening conditions being so grotty. I know that us SW listeners' are used to bleeps, static and mysterious sounds annoying our listening but awful conditions making things even worse are not particularly desirable. It may be that everybody is not experiencing what I am here at the PC headquarters. I spoke to Roger Davis of BRL on April 12th and told him about the poor conditions. He was quite surprised when I told how weak all of the stations had been with me for the whole of the Easter weekend. At his location, everything had been as usual with no differences and no strange conditions noticed! I've also spoken though to Terry Phillips, Dave Martin, Andy Walker, Steve Midnight and others who all say that current SW conditions are awful! I was really looking forward to Easter, not just for the eggs and cakes (!) but for all the Free Radio activity as well. To be honest, I was pretty disappointed. To listen to all of the stations that I expected to hear, I had put up a brand new 48 metre dipole and when I tuned into the bands on Easter Sunday, I thought that there must have been a fault with it. I could hardly hear anything. At just after 0900 UTC, Dave Martin from LASER ROCK gave me a call and asked how his signal was with me. I asked him "what signal?" I couldn't hear anything from him on 6400 but after about thirty minutes, he was bombing in and for the rest of the weekend, the conditions followed the same pattern; up and down just like somebody bouncing on a trampoline! Let's hope that these trends do stop soon as I for one am going to get a little despondent with tuning in to Free Radio stations if I can hardly hear them.

Anyway, that's enough of all that! I just want to tell you now that the next PC which is due to be out at the beginning of July is, in fact, not going to be available until August. This is because of our summer break and trip to the Netherlands. But don't worry; issue 33/34 is set to be a good one with exclusive articles from my own experiences in Holland and my visits to various pirates over there and also exclusive articles from Derek Taylor who has just returned from the other side of the North Sea as well!

RADIO PIRANIA RETURNS HOME

THE time is 2300 and my son, daughter, wife and myself are sitting in a Jumbo Jet 747 from the Spanish company Iberia with the flight number IB 6921 from Madrid to 'the promised land'. In my baggage of course, as a true pirate, components for building up a transmitter . . . Ten hours later after a stop in Buenos Aires, we arrived at our location in South America where we were to stay for two months. I was a little bit nervous about what the customs people would say if they were to find the transmitter tubes etc. I had already hidden the four crystal elsewhere! I had prepared myself with what to say if I was stopped and I was going to tell them that the components were for an audio amplifier that I was going to build! However, I was lucky and although they took a look into my baggage, the customs people only saw my Kenwood R-600 receiver. After all of that, we all met up with the rest of our family who were waiting for us. When we got outside of the airport which was air conditioned, we were shocked by the very warm weather. It was 39 degrees celsius!! In Madrid, it had only been 10 degrees!

After a few weeks in South America, I began to construct a transmitter. There were a few components that I hadn't brought with me from Europe: a 600 volt transformer, some resistors and capacitors for high voltages. It was to be a difficult task to find these things; I tried several different shops but they only had components that could handle around 35 volts. At last though, I found one that could manage 250 volts. With this, I could use 325 volts to the plate. On January 15th, we at last managed to get into the air. In the middle of the night, I managed to put up a dipole for 15013 kHz. I wasn't running full power because of the limited power supply but I was on air and that was a good feeling. I was broadcasting from the heart of South America.

On the morning of January 16th, my brother-in-law and I took my father's car and drove a few kilometres to see if everything was alright and if we could hear the broadcast. Everything was fine and we sat drinking 'terere', a typical South American cold ice tea and listening to the pre-recorded programmes going out! The frequency suddenly went quiet and we didn't know what had happened. Had the transmitter blown up?! We quickly drove back to my father's

house where we found that somebody had taken out the electricity supply! Why? Well, it was my father. He is near on seventy years old and didn't understand what was going on. He could hear a sound in the corner of the room but couldn't see anything working and so he wondered why the plug should be on and so switched it off!

From January 22nd, we were right in the heart of the jungle for one week and were one hundred kilometres away from the nearest city. It was a very nice place and you could see huge trees and greenery all around. It was just like paradise. There was just one problem in the area though and that was the malaria. I'm not too sure if I'm contaminated yet but my brother-in-law is!

I had big plans for broadcasting from the jungle but sadly, these did not happen. I wanted to broadcast for four-six hours a day but there was no regular electricity but there was a generator that I used in the evenings.

Unfortunately, being the fool I am (!), I went and connected something wrong and blew the capacitor in the power supply! We were only on the air for just a few minutes. I managed to get another capacitor in a small village 26 kilometres away but this was rated for just 300 volts and exploded after another few minutes! This resulted in my family thinking that I had died in the small explosion!

Back to civilisation and I at last managed to get four very good capacitors and for my last two transmissions from South America, I was able to run seventy watts.

During my stay in the particular country, I visited several local radio stations and I met an old radio friend who is one of the most well known radio personalities and works on the biggest private broadcasting station in the country. Twice, we went to a restaurant where we ate and talked a lot about the radio situation in the country and elsewhere as well. We also talked about sports and remembered the time that this friend came over to my now home country.

February 12th was a very sad day. We had to leave South America and started our journey back to Europe. How long will it be before I return once again to my real home land? You can be sure though that whenever I do return, I will be making some more clandestine broadcasts! ■

Thank you very much for your letter and cheque Ian! It's good to know that you enjoy reading the magazine and I would just like to say that any logs will always be gratefully received. Even if you think they may duplicate ones that we already may have, please send them along to us anyway.

✉ . . . I enjoyed the January issue and have some suggestions:

1) FM News From Around The UK should be changed to FM News From Around The British Isles with two new sections - Dublin and the rest of Ireland. 2) Mediumwave stations from Ireland and the UK should be included in the FM list. 3) In Derek Taylor's mediumwave column, the stations should be listed in order of frequency and not date heard (although date should still be included!) 4) PC should get together with some other publication and share printing and posting facilities with that publication. This would have two advantages: i) Both magazines could be mailed out at the same time (in the same envelope) to those subscribing to both publications, reducing postage costs and ii) a joint subscription for both magazines could be offered - for example, £10 per year for one magazine or £17 per year for both. 5) In future magazines, perhaps you could include articles such as reviews of commercially available broadcast equipment, construction articles, history of offshore stations, programme schedules for all non-religious programmes . . . Michael Byron, Limerick, Eire.

Well Michael, a nice letter and some interesting ideas for PC! I'll start at the top. I would very much like to include FM news from Dublin and Ireland in PC and if readers are willing to contribute, the information will be incorporated. Any MW news from our Irish readers would also be welcomed and included. As for your idea about Derek's MW section, I would prefer to keep things in date order. This is because if people have heard a pirate on a particular date and wish to find out which it was, they can simply locate the date and then frequency. On to your next point and although it would be nice to combine with other publications and share costs, that really would be quite difficult. Pirate Chat is the only pirate magazine in the UK apart from Anorak Monthly and their print run is made at a different time to ours which would complicate things. There are publications abroad but if Pirate Chat was to be printed overseas in conjunction with another magazine, I would then have to pay for over one hundred magazines to be packaged and posted back to this country and vice versa if I was to print for a foreign publication. Nice thought though! Finally to point five and we do from time to time include construction articles which seem to go down well. I think that too many other magazines have covered the histories of offshore stations and that is why landbased station histories are included in PC instead and as for station schedules, I have been considering the introduction of these so some may appear soon! Thanks a lot Michael and I hope you're still enjoying the magazine!

✉ . . . Recently received a nice long letter from Mr. Pirana. I'd given up of ever hearing from him as I sent the MW reception report (plus grovelling letter!) way back in September! Listening to Mr. Barones at the moment (0230) and the reception of his broadcasts are unbelievable. Even on my Hitachi/JVC receivers, he is coming in loud and clear. Are his broadcasts being relayed by an ILR or is his rig a mega-mighty watt thing?! . . . Did I enjoy Steve Midnight's last column in PC 29/30. A lot of people slagged off Radio Caroline (she will return!) for sounding samey to the legit ILRs but at least she was there broadcasting. Maybe a few MW/SW pirates don't actually QSO with other stations or broadcast anorak programmes but the fact that they still bother to fire up their transmitter every so often should be enough to keep the unlicensed enthusiast happy (except Steve Midnight!). The pirates are far superior to the inferior legit efforts so I don't understand what Steve Midnight is going on about when he says that they sound (pirate and legal) the same. 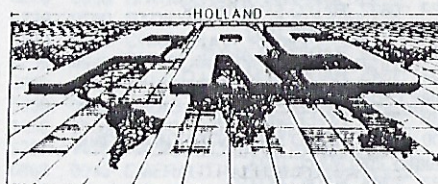

A-Z SHORTWAVE NEWS

All Times UTC

RADIO ACTIVE have been heard via the NISWRS on March 13th and April 11th with programmes that are repeated several times with good presentation and now PC promotions as well! ADD - 6.

RADIO ALBATROS is one of several Dutch MW Free Radio stations that suddenly seem to have acquired a SW rig! This one was heard on April 10th using 6207 and was talked about quite extensively during a Dutch QSO at the lower end of 48 metres later that day! ADD - c/o DPRS, 12 Dorman Road, Preston, England, PR2 6AS.

RADIO ARIES has not been on air since their broadcast of January 31st and the mysterious station manager (!) recently told me that he hopes to return on 6400 some time in August. It will be then that the new French and German services will probably be introduced along with some brand new jingles. I am told that if fifty letters or more are received for that broadcast, a new QSL card will be issued and for people writing in for the first time, they will receive the new card in addition to the two that are already available. ADD - 4.

RADIO ARMADILLO continues to air fairly regular programmes on 48 metres on weekdays but little is still known about this station. Signals at our location are always very good indeed and to date, test transmissions have been made using 10 watts into a longwire antenna. Programmes at present are mainly based around continuous soft rock music with a few announcements.

RADIO ARTEMETO is quite a tentative name for an Italian station heard QSOing on March 13th using 6550. This part of the band is the sort of area that such Italian stations can be found happily chatting away to each other quite often. Pretty interesting - if you can understand Italian!

RADIO ATLANTIS have recently sent us the following article concerning their 55 Fairway Road mailing address: "A 42 year old man was ordered to pay a fine of £150 with £50 court costs for failing to have a television licence or a CB licence. He was also given a twelve month conditional discharge for aiding

and abetting to run a radio station without a government licence; an offence under the 1991 Broadcast Act by allowing his address to be used for mail to be sent to. The conditional discharge states that no further action will be taken as long as he does not offend in the future. Appearing before Warley Magistrates Court, West Midlands was Mr. Peter Barnfield of Fairway Road, Oldbury. Mr. Roy Howells for the DTI, RIS said "Officers called at Mr. Barnfield's home after hearing his address being given out on a known pirate radio station. A search warrant allowed us to search the premises, to confiscate any material that breached the 1991 Broadcast Act. We found nine letters addressed to the station known as Radio Atlantis. During questioning, Mr. Barnfield admitted that he had no TV licence or a CB licence. He did not know that collecting mail for the station was an offence. He also told us that he did not know who ran the station and where it came from." Mr. Howells later went on to say "The DTI, RIS are now seeking legal advice with a view to closing down the station." Currently, the maximum sentence that courts can impose on offenders is £2000 or three months imprisonment for first time offenders in a Magistrates Court, with an unlimited fine or two years imprisonment in Crown Court cases. Mr. Ashworth defending Mr. Barnfield said "This was a very minor breach of the Broadcast Act, just like a drop in the ocean. My client however, seems more foolish than a criminal." Mr. Barnfield was found guilty of all three offences and offered to pay the total sum of £200 at £5 per week; the sum was agreed by the Magistrates. Well, RADIO ATLANTIS does not seem to have been having too much luck of late. As well as having their first maildrop busted, equipment used for transmitting was recently smashed up by vandals. The transmitter was smashed, audio lead cut and aerials ruined. The station at the time was broadcasting from a block of flats and it is not sure whether the destruction was caused by the caretaker of the flats or a local FM pirate. ATLANTIS now has a different system of

broadcasting whereby their transmitter is located elsewhere and so cannot be damaged. Before this damage was caused, the station had three separate transmitters for fixed frequencies: 6211, 6300 and 6400. Since one of the transmitters was ruined, ATLANTIS operator, Sid Morris has had the three rigs turned into one which can be used on any frequency and has variable power from 25-50 watts. Signals from the station are pretty good for most of the time and the broadcasting schedule is Saturdays, Sundays and Wednesday afternoons on. During the last two months, ATLANTIS has been heard using this schedule and is one of the most active British stations at present. ADD - 52 Hackwood House, Hartlebury Road, Oldbury, West Midlands, B69 1EG, England.

RADIO BANDOLERO have only been heard once of late using 45 metres on Monday April 11th when good signals were heard here at the PC headquarters! ADD - P.O. BOX 4057, 8600 GB Sneek, Netherlands. **RADIO BENELUX** have re-introduced their Free Radio Spot programme with their monthly broadcasts. This includes station recordings and station operators can send the BENELUX team recordings of their station which will be consequently aired. On March 14th, station presenters, Mr. Activ and Jens Martin featured a recording of FM pirate, RADIO BELLINDA. ADD - 4.

BIG APPLE have been logged a couple of times during March and April with no programmes, just quick reports for other stations but with very strong signals into the UK. Perhaps in future we will hear some proper broadcasts?

RADIO BRIGITTE have recently started to air programmes way out of band around 7545 which I suppose means that they are being a bit different from the norm and individualistic which is after all what pirate stations are supposed to be! Broadcasts have also recently been heard on 48 and 45 metres as well. ADD - P.O. BOX 10, 7954 ZG Rouveen, Netherlands.

RADIO BLACK SEA INTERNATIONAL is another of the now several Russian Free Radio operations and has been heard using 75 metres as many stations are now using. **BRITAIN RADIO INTERNATIONAL** should now be sounding better than ever before because they are now theoretically the UK's

most powerful station. Around 135 watts is now the output of the 48 metre 'big rig' which has been upgraded from 100 watts! The modulation on the 50 watt 7360 outlet has also been improved and is now about 50 per cent louder than it previously was which should make quite a noticeable difference! The schedule is still every second and fourth Sunday but is sometimes broken which can partly be blamed on Roger Davis's current enthusiasm level! It goes up and now with the conditions on SW! On April 12th, 'BRI Overdrive' was aired on 6233 and 7360 with rock music but due to conditions, this was not too well received in the UK. April 25th saw a reduced schedule from the station with just Steve West's Radio File but BRI were on air which is good to see after a decade of dedication to giving us good programmes on SW! ADD - 1.

RADIO CALDONIA INTERNATIONAL made their final test transmission on April 11th and now plan to start proper programmes. Other tests were heard on March 7th, 28th and April 5th (Monday!). The transmitter appears to be drifting because on the 7th, we first of all logged CALDONIA on 6272 and finally on 6282! Signals are now better than ever and over the Easter weekend, the 29th birthday was extensively mentioned by presenters claiming to have got a little tipsy through recent celebrations. 6295 is used by presenters such as Chris Kennedy, Bongo and Steve Masters on most weekends. RADIO CATAPULTE one of the few French stations, has been heard a couple of more times recently with relays via JRR. GERMANY have been heard twice of late using 7295. Good signals have been received in the UK and one would think that the station is being relayed via RADIO EUROPE in Italy but perhaps signals are too good for that? CLANDESTINE RADIO SOCIETY

INTERNATIONAL are still irregular on the bands and during the last two months have only been logged on one occasion. ADD - 4. **CRAZY WAVE RADIO** can be heard regularly on SW with relays via NISWRS and RWI. With the closure of NISWRS in the near future, that will still leave 7306/7473 and 11401 via RWI. Don't forget that this station does also ID as WELLE WAHNSINN and QSL cards are available! ADD - 4.

CTD 12 was another name used by RADIO GLORIA on April 4th on 6255 at 1254 while a cq call was being made.

RADIO DAIWA can be heard every now and again on 48 metres with QSO contacts but little is known about this station and any further information would be greatly appreciated.

RADIO DELTA (Elburg) is now concentrating on broadcasts outside of the traditional pirate bands and 25 metres is one band to look out for this famous Dutch pirate. On March 21st, he was active using 11404 with just 5 watts of power. Broadcasting down there, signals have been heard in countries such as Italy and Turkey so if you're based outside of the 'normal' listening countries, try and give DELTA a listen. DELTA INTERNATIONAL as Jan calls the station was also heard on April 25th, using 7425. ADD - P.O. BOX 41, 8080 AA Elburg, Netherlands.

RADIO DELTA (Ruurlo) made their last regular transmission for a few months on March 14th at 0905 on 6200. Peter Greenfield was heard with the usual programmes and the absence for the next few months is because operator, Gertie is going to be building a new aerial mast to put an even better signal out than they already do which will surely be hard to achieve! It is already superb at our location! On the 14th, a massive 700 watts was used during the first hour and then 250 watts during the second hour. A difference was noted on the 'reduced' power but the signal was still excellent. On March 28th, Gertie

RADIO DUTCHBOY have made various broadcasts here and there during the last two months with some pretty good results. EMERALD RADIO INTERNATIONAL when I last spoke to you in the SW section, was pretty regular on 6268 and 6855. Well, during the last two months, broadcasts have slackened off and the station has not been heard anywhere nearly as often as before. Do keep checking the frequencies though; you never know what you might hear! ADD - 8 Inverness Road, Dublin 3, Eire.

RADIO EUROPE continue to be heard every now and again via JRR on 48 metres and have been logged with their well presented programmes a couple of times recently. ADD - via Davanzali 8, 20158 Milano, Italy. **EUROPEAN PIRATE RADIO** have sent us some exclusive news which reads as follows: *"For the past few programmes, we got fewer and fewer reactions from the listeners. We tried a few things like to introduce a new music style (heavy metal) back in June 1992. We received no reactions. Our last programme on 31st January we had a special comedy section. We received no reaction! Another bad point are the reports from the listeners. The quantity is bad; for the Jan 31st broadcast via NIRS, we received four letters. For all three relays via the FREESOUND RELAY SERVICE at the end of 1992, we got one letter! The quality of the reports is worse! The consequence of this is that I have lost a little bit of my enthusiasm to produce further programmes. But in the summer of '93, EPR will be back with fresh programmes perhaps under a new name..."* Well as you can see from this, Chris Feeny does not seem too impressed with the listening audience at the moment and I believe that a lot of other stations also feel the same way. When EPR does return later this year, be sure to drop them a line. The station is on air for you and time is spent preparing programmes for your benefit so please do show your support. You'll be able to read some more of Chris's thoughts from the next issue of PC when he will be joining the crew here with a regular column. Be sure to have a read! ADD - 6.

RADIO FREE BRITAIN is the same station as the VOICE OF FREE BRITAIN that was busted just before Christmas last year. One broadcast has been aired under this new ID using the 6200 crystal passed on by Mike Stevens of RENEGADE SOUND. RFB was heard on April 4th playing continuous music with jingles inbetween each track. I don't think you'll be hearing this station for a little while though because the operator has decided to spend a little time somewhere else other than his transmitter site for the moment!

RADIO FREE MASSACHUSETTS is one of two North American stations to have recently been relayed via the NISWRS. ADD - 5. **FREE RADIO SERVICE LONDON** can still be heard every now and again with short programmes. Continuous music and jingles can be heard from FRSL with recorded messages announcing various Free Radio recordings which are then played from mainly land-based stations. Just twenty watts is used but signals from this one are very good and I now have my suspicions as to whose behind the project!

FREE RADIO SERVICE HOLLAND returned to the air on April 18th with a programme that should have been aired on March 21st! However, it was still enjoyed by us via ORANG UTAN on 6200. RADIO FUSION INTERNATIONAL is still pretty active on 75 metres and 41 metres and has recently even been heard during daylight hours on a weekday! RADIO IRELAND INTERNATIONAL

returned to shortwave on April 7th and were heard testing on 6298. This one was previously using 6625 but the Shannon Maritime Service uses 6623 and the RII op has received an official letter telling him to close his station. Well he hasn't done that but he has moved frequency which is the next best thing! ADD - P.O. BOX 452, Wellsville, NY 14895, USA.

RADIO JIMMY INTERNATIONAL is very busy at present with his studies but does find the time to make the odd shortwave broadcast! Operator, Henk can mainly be heard with QSOs on 6206 and 6555 but on March 20th, he was heard with an actual programme which is quite rare. Music included tracks from Cher and we recorded a SINPO of 23442 with some splatter from DLR on 6222(!). JIMMY has no set schedule but irregular Saturday broadcasts can be heard between 0800 and 0900 so have a listen out! RADIO LOLLIPOP was thought by us to have something to do with PFBS because on Pirate Andy's broadcast of March 7th he was playing recordings of the station and after PFBS closed that day, LOLLIPOP appeared on 6206. It is a relay station though so perhaps Andy was relaying it in part on his broadcast and then in full on 6206 after PFBS closed. RADIO MERLIN INTERNATIONAL have been very busy over the last two months with programmes aired by the NISWRS each weekend on a variety of frequencies and with their own tx as well. Paul Watt has been hard using his own equipment on 6267 and 6300 with pretty good signals. With impending temporary close of the NISWRS, Paul is now looking for other people in Europe to relay his shows. ADD - 5+7.

RADIO METEOR should not be confused with the station of the same name operating from Finland. This one is of MW fame from the Netherlands and can now be heard with a twenty watt transmitter on SW. Operator, Jean has crystals for 6200, 6205, 6554, 7275 and 7290 so watch these frequencies for the station. METEOR has been quite active on SW recently and is using a quarter wave 'sloper' antenna for mainly QSO broadcasts. On April 10th though, a short programme with pretty good signals was heard on 6200.

Jean does talk in English as well as Dutch and plays a lot of music from Elvis and Sandy Shaw. A fine QSL sheet is available for reports. ADD - P.O. BOX 71, 7720 AB Dalfsen, Netherlands.

RADIO MI AMIGO has been fairly busy recently with various tests on interesting frequencies such as 7540 and 7558! It is with this station that quite a bit of interesting news lies! **THE FREE RADIO SHOW**, Europe's most successful radio programme is set for return on June 6th sounding better than ever before! The sixty minute show will contain nothing but news and recordings. No music will be played, just solid news and features. Archive recordings will be aired, many of which Andy Walker received while hosting 'Radio Dayz' on Euronet. An FM Midlands roundup will be included as will satellite news and various other things. Andy tells me that he stopped the Free Radio Show on WNKR last year because although people were listening, he was receiving no real feedback from his audience. This time, he hopes the show will be bigger than ever before as will the response so make sure you let Andy know you're listening and what you think of the programme. RML can usually be heard up on 41 metres but on the 7th were using 6200 with good signals heard here for the music programme. NORTHERN IRELAND SHORTWAVE RELAY SERVICE have now ceased airing their promotional broadcasts pending their temporary closedown due to the loss of their broadcasting site (see press release). As ever, during the past two months, the NISWRS have been very busy airing relays every weekend mixed in with their promotions. The station will return one day when a new site can be found and when it can, Andy Craig says that the station will be sounding better than ever before. A 9 MHz transmitter should be ready for use when the NISWRS hits the airwaves once again after closing some time in May. ADD - 6.

RADIO NORTHSEA INTERNATIONAL

continue to pop up on shortwave every once in a while and as RADIO RABBIT, their usual frequency is 6252. ADD - 4.

NOT RADIO FAX is the yearly spoof station operated by somebody whose identity is only known to a few select people(!). The station was heard broadcasting as they did last year on April 1st using 3910 although 6205 and 12255 were also announced.

NYTROZONE who were of course **TOTAL CONTROL RADIO** before the name change, have been making a few test transmissions recently and a new crystal for 6286 has recently been obtained. If you want to hear this one, listening out on a Sunday morning is no good - Bank Holiday Mondays and Saturday or Sunday afternoons are the best times. ADD - 3.

RADIO ORANG UTAN returned to the air on March 20th with a test transmission for programmes from 0830 on the 21st. On the test, Freddy claimed to be QSOing with a German station but in fact he was not and was only joking! Signals were excellent as ever and on the 21st, **RADIO TORENVALK** was in the **ORANG UTAN** studio and played a few records and announced that if you were to write to him, he had some stickers to send out. Another properly programmed broadcast was made on April 18th on the usual 6200 after a test during the early afternoon of the 17th. RADIO ORION have gone very quiet indeed of late with only two broadcasts during the last two months - quite a contrast to the old times of seven days a week and then every weekend! OZONE RADIO INTERNATIONAL can still be heard most Sunday mornings from around 1000 on good old trusty 6280. Signals remain usually very good in the UK and programmes consist of the **RADIO DUBLIN** 'Airwaves' show to begin with and then various other types of music. This is actually one of my favourite Sunday morning pirates and long may **OZONE** continue! ADD - 1.

RADIO PACMAN from the Netherlands in a recent letter told me that anybody interested in recording a programme for the station can do so and send it along for airing. **PACMAN** can be heard with good signals on 48 and 41 metres and only runs 5 watts. A good antenna sure makes all the difference and Mr. Pacman tells me that this is his secret! The station has been heard a few times of late and some very nice information sheets and QSLs are available here but make sure that when you write, you write a decent letter as well and don't just ask for a QSL like so many people nowadays seem to do. 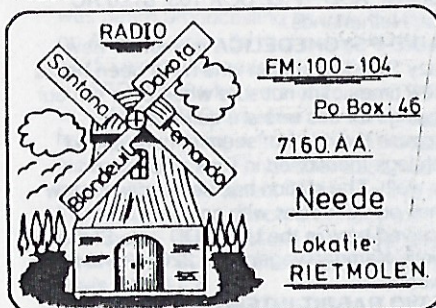

SKULL AND BONES RADIO SYSTEM is a great station name and a station that was operational several years back. However, station op, Gary St. John returned from the Emerald Isle on March 7th on 6280 calling OZONE. The signal heard here was fair-good with nice audio.

SOUTHERN MUSIC RADIO are another of the stations that will lose their main relay when the NISWRS closes temporarily soon and so their activity levels will probably start to decline. SMR just a few months ago decided to use only the NISWRS for relays and no other stations so I hope that the op can find his old relays once again. ADD - 3. **RADIO STAR** made a return to shortwave on April 11th with their second proper programme and a good signal here in the UK. Previously, operator Peter was using an old navy transmitter but he has now built his own 70 watt rig running off 700 volts. The next broadcast will probably be during the summer as announced and I hope to be visiting the station during my trip to Holland in July so the next PC may contain an exclusive article about RADIO STAR. Nice to hear you again Peter and keep up the good work - it was a nice programme with good audio and modulation! ADD - P.O. BOX 51, 1777 ZH Hippolytushoef, Netherlands.

STAR CLUB RADIO returned to the airwaves on April 25th with an absolutely superb signal into the UK! 6200 was used for a couple of hours during the morning with the usual theme 'Telstar' opening up the broadcast. Because SCR has been taking mainly relays during the last few months, we guess that this was probably via either ORANG UTAN or DELTA (Ruurlo) although we may be wrong. Announcements were made in various languages and it was nice to hear the station with the best signal ever received by us! ADD - 4.

RADIO STELLA INTERNATIONAL is back on the bands properly once again and as well as the 7446 and 11413 outlets, 75 metres has recently been introduced as well! Various tests were made during mid - late April on 3910 but the regular channel for weekly programmes throughout the night is to be 3945. As the other two transmitters used by RSI, the new one is based in Eire and gives very good signals into the UK with just 20 watts! Apparently, various small bits of wire have been strung together to make up the aerial but it sure seems to be working well! ADD - 82 Pentland Place, Kircaldy, Fife, Scotland.

SUBTERRANEAN SOUNDS has returned once again to broadcasting on 75 metres during the last two months and 3905 is now the regular channel. Various tests and proper programmes have been heard on this channel in addition to the odd broadcast on 7

MHz. On April 10th, the broadcast included a few people on the telephone line including Bill Lewis (soon after returning from the pub!) and Andy Winter. In Germany, the broadcast was received and thought to be featuring various people in the studio not on the telephone line! Steve Midnight has just got another batch of letters through from his maildrop and tells that as usual, they are fairly uninspiring - people just after QSLs as ever. This is very annoying really. The trusty verification card seems to be what everybody wants. Nobody seems to be interested in programme content which is the initial aim of a Free Radio station. Station operators don't come on air just so as to give people the chance of collecting another QSL, they want to input some decent shows onto the air and have a good time as well. It's just a pity that you the listeners don't appreciate everything that goes into getting a broadcast out onto the air and if you do then please say so! It does at times seem pointless in a station continuing if no real feedback is received from the listening audience. Anyway, Steve should be set for return on May 8th in the late evening on 3905 so have a listen out! ADD - 1.

VOICE OF THE GOUTSUFFERERS who seem to have launched something of a hate campaign towards us here at PC (!) have been heard a few more times recently with Bap McPhee and the lads on 6255.

WAVE RADIO INTERNATIONAL is the latest addition to the Free Radio scene in Sweden and have used several names since their very first broadcast. RADIO TEST was the initial ID, followed by RADIO MOONLIGHT and then onto WRI. Power used is 50-100 watts and signals into the UK are very good indeed and have so far been noted on 75, 48 and 41 metres. The station operator is a very keen Free Radio enthusiast and intends mainly to QSO with other stations although he may air some programmes every now and again as well. **RADIO WAVES INTERNATIONAL** have been experimenting during the last couple of months on 7306 instead of 7473. Signals are just the same but perhaps 7306 is a bit clearer. Perhaps though, if a clear channel could be found, signals would reach us UK listeners with stronger signals on 48 metres? Anyway, broadcasts have been noted on most weekends and the 25 metres outlet is still in operation on 11401. ADD - 3.

WEEKEND MUSIC RADIO have been popping up every now and again during the

last two months but the most significant broadcast was that on Saturday night 17th April which lasted way into the early hours of Sunday morning! Alan Hays (GLORIA), Jock Wilson (STELLA), Bill Lewis (LWR) and Jack Russel (WMR) were all heard on air in various intoxicated states and 3910 was used in parallel with 1509 MW. Signals very very good indeed. 20-30 watts was being used on 75 metres and although after a while, it faded out, you could have easily thought that 100 watts was being used! On MW, the 1509 crystal used belongs to LWR's Bill Lewis but WMR op, Jack Russel still has 1515 to use which he intends to do in the future. Only around 50-60 watts was being used on 1509 and again, the signals were very good indeed and could even be separated from BRT on 1512 who have started to leave their blank carrier on air all night long. On April 25th, Jack had just returned from a short holiday in Ireland, sorting out the new STELLA 3 MHz rig and visiting various stations and was heard on 6250 talking about his experiences and sounding a touch down in the dumps at having to return home again! ADD - 6.

WEE GUY RADIO celebrated 11 years of jolly broadcasting at the beginning of April and were heard with their usual style of programming of kiddies nursery rhymes and so forth on 6205. ADD - 5.

WEST AND NORTH KENT RADIO have been a bit quiet again recently but have popped up every now and again on 6400. They were also heard once on 3945 and it was intended that 75 metres broadcasts were to be re-launched. However, on their first night back on 3945, various pieces of equipment were stolen which means that the usual transmission site is now un-safe to use regularly. Op, Dave Martin does still have plans for the relaunch of his station on 75 metres but 3945 is now to be used regularly by STELLA so it is currently unsure as to what frequency will be used. It may be as high as 4005 or as low as around 3860! ADD - 4.

RADIO WITHOUT BORDERS INTERNATIONAL continue to be heard on a regular basis using 75 metres. They have been heard using 3 MHz on most Saturday nights but I'm not too sure what their exact frequency is. The transmitter seem to drift about between 3915 and 3918 but signals are on the whole, pretty good with programmes mainly in Russian. ADD - P.O. BOX 29, Moscow 109444, Moscow.

RADIO X continues to be a regular from the Netherlands on SW and can be heard most weekends. Saturday mornings on 6205 is the favourite, although the station can be heard at other times on other frequencies. Signals are pretty good into the UK and although the op doesn't speak much English on air, he does understand the language so don't hesitate to drop him a line. ADD - P.O. BOX 102, 7360 AC Beekbergen, Netherlands.

BROADCASTING DOWN UNDER

by Martin Davies

FROM November 1992 to January 1993, I was lucky enough to be able to take an extended holiday down-under, in Australia. I covered over 7000 kilometres in just three weeks, starting in Sydney, flying north to Cairns, then across to Darwin and finally returning to Sydney on a two week coach/camping tour through the red centre. With temperatures around 42 degrees celsius and cans of Tooheys Red flowing like water, I still found time to twiddle with my tranny and find a number of interesting radio stations. Now let's take a look at the broadcasting scene down-under from a tourists point of view.

When you think of Australian radio stations, I expect that the only two that spring to mind are Radio Australia and the little community station that Henry used to work for in Neighbours. Well both these extremes do exist but there is a great deal in between. The radio scene is well developed with both state and established commercial broadcasters. However, as FM radio was late to develop in Australia, this is now the focus for most of the current activity.

As in the USA, all radio stations are allocated a callsign which is made up of a single digit followed by either two or three letters. The digit usually indicates the state in which the station is based and the letters are usually an abbreviation for the community, town or city which it serves. In general, two letters are used to denote AM (medium wave) and three letters to denote FM (VHF). The individual states are denoted as follows:

- 2 New South Wales
- 3 Victoria
- 4 Queensland
- 5 South Australia

- 6 Western Australia
- 7 Tasmania
- 8 Northern Territories

Until the mid '80s, AM radio was the mainstay of Australian broadcasting, partly due to the vast areas which need to be covered but also the clash of interests with TV broadcasters which slowed down the adoption of FM radio. Prior to 1974, the 88 to 108 MHz band had been allocated to TV broadcasting and was used for VHF channels 3, 4 and 5.

Broadcasters were facing the prospect of using a portion of the UHF band for FM radio. However, the Department of Communications (similar to the Radio Communications Agency of the DTI) saw sense in adopting the international agreed allocation between 88 and 108 MHz.

It has taken 15 years for the FM band to be cleared. One of the final TV stations to move, WIN TV on channel 4, moved to UHF in 1989. There has been a massive growth in FM

broadcasting since the beginning of the '90s, with new commercial and community stations coming on the air all the time. It has also provided the opportunity for established AM stations to move to FM but at a price. The last FM licence to be granted in Sydney cost a staggering A\$35 million (£17 million)!

AM radio uses the European system of 9 KHz channels so frequencies such as 558, 819 and 963 are common. AM stereo is in use but this is now declining due to the rise in popularity of FM. Only one system is allowed, Motorola C-QUAM.

Most commercial AM broadcasters in Sydney have their transmitters site in an area called Homebush Swamp. It is perfect for AM broadcasting but with so many masts in such a small area, problems with cross-mod and interference are common. Only one installation (2CH and 2UW) are diplexed onto a single mast.

State radio is in control of two organisations, the Australian Broadcasting Company (ABC) and the Special Broadcasting Service (SBS). The ABC is equivalent to the BBC. They collect an annual licence fee and provide a number of national, regional and local radio services. They also have responsibility for the international Radio Australia service and the national ABC TV network. The second and less well known state broadcaster is SBS. They cater for the great number of foreigners living in Australia, producing programmes in over 50 languages. They operate networked radio stations in most major cities and the national SBS TV network.

The idea of Community Radio is now well developed. With the growth in FM radio, many small towns and communities now operate radio stations, usually with local people working on a voluntary basis. They are all grouped together at the bottom of the band between 87.5 and 92 MHz. For example, a small community radio station, 2BLU broadcasting to Katoomba in the Blue Mountains with 15 watts. It started life as a part of the local community college and operated a restricted service with a temporary licence under the name Radio Blue Mountains. With the licence came a new callsign and the ability to form a community radio group producing local programmes for local people.

However, community radio is not restricted to specific groups. CAANA is the Aboriginal Community Radio,

producing programmes in eight native languages and operating many stations across Australia. These are mainly based in the out-back areas where Aboriginal communities are still to be found.

As a rule, callsigns used by the ABC national and local networks fall into four categories. In the Sydney area:

2RN Radio National
2JJJ ABC FM Rock Network
2FM ABC Regional or
Metropolitan Radio

On the next page, you can see the stations which I logged on my travels. The power of radio is amazing and it is strange to hear the influence of US radio is just as strong in Australia as it is here in the UK. On-air slogans such as Hot Hits and Latest Hits, Greatest Memories abound but thankfully, no mention of AM gold services!

My favourite station was 2MMM, Triple M105 in Sydney. Over the Christmas period, they played the listeners' all-time top 1000 tracks, in order, finishing at number two with Led Zeppelin - Stairway to Heaven and number one with Queen - Bohemian Rhapsody. Sorry Caroline fans, no sentimental memories of The Hurricane, Imagine or Fool If You Think It's Over, just the good old AOR favourites which feature all the time on Triple M!

The ABC provide a national shortwave service which unfortunately is now in decline. The only remaining stations are based in Queensland and Western Australia. In general, they are co-sited with ABC National Radio outlets.

The station VLI which once broadcast from Sydney closed down many years ago.

In the Northern Territories, there is also a domestic shortwave service which broadcasts to the vast outback area on frequencies between 2 and 5 MHz.

And finally, a quick look at the television situation. Five channels are on the air in most major cities with a reduced service and coverage as you move towards the outback areas.

For the technically minded, the PAL colour TV system is used on Band I, III and V. Stereo sound is available but it is a variation on the 19 kHz pilot tone system and used for FM broadcasting and not NICAM. The ABC and Channel 7 have experimented with Teletext services but they are not very popular. In fact, the same test pages have been transmitted by the ABC for the last five years!

The ABC and the three commercial networks 7, 9 and 10, all operate on VHF with local low-power fill transmitters on UHF. In Sydney, the UHF services have opt-out programmes in order to generate a local identity.

Prime TV	(Channel 7 Network)
WIN TV	(Channel 9 Network)
Capital	(Channel 10 Network)

The SBS and a proposed new 6th channel operate on UHF and have transmitters in most of the major cities. SBS operate on channel 28 and the new service on channel 31. Until the 6th channel comes into service, the frequency has been given to various community organisations for temporary low-power transmitters. In Sydney, this gave rise to the unusual and very short lived Queer TV!

An unusual facility is also available to

amateur radio enthusiasts. They are licensed to transmit on UHF channel 35 and this has given rise to TV repeater outputs in the normal broadcast bands which enables the casual viewer to glimpse what goes on in the local 'ham shack'. This facility is used by radio clubs and societies for lectures, technical classes and information programmes. It is quite entertaining, although this would never be allowed in the UK, I felt that it was a useful facility which could be used to introduce more people into the radio hobby.

The Free Radio scene if one exists, keeps a very low profile. Although Radio G'day generated a lot of publicity last year for several proposed high power shortwave broadcasts, I have yet to meet anyone who actually logged the station. I found no evidence of AM or FM pirates but this could be due to the large number of community and student radio stations. This may change in the near future for two reasons; firstly due to increased racial tensions both in Australia and across the pacific rim and secondly because the youth music scene is generally ignored by the major market radio stations.

I hope this brief article has given you a flavour of the Australian broadcasting scene. The radio is fresh and interesting with a wide mixture of music and variety to serve most tastes. If only I could say that for the TV. If you think that the endless string of daytime soaps are bad then consider that these are some of the better programmes! The normal outlot is abysmal!

If you ever go on holiday to Australia, take a radio; you will not be disappointed.■

TANGERINE RADIO

TANGERINE RADIO was established in 1984 to promote the causes of individual liberty and freedom of speech. TR also engages in antenna theory and research and wave propagation experiments. For nearly a decade, TANGERINE RADIO broadcasts have been turning up in unexpected places on unauthorised pirate shortwave and FM stations, on idle satellite uplink channels, on background music at various sweatshops and elsewhere.

Rick Forester arranges, produces and edits the broadcasts. Audio tapes are prepared at the Bosko Memorial Studio (a 16-track analog facility) near the tranquil town of Tangerine, Florida and then sent to the TR transmitters at Elbow Bay, Bermuda and elsewhere. When he's not creating TANGERINE RADIO programmes, Rick can usually be found tending the tangerine trees in his garden or working in his laboratory researching the medical value of tangerines. He is also collaborating with several musicians to write an orchestral symphony inspired

by tangerines and his detailed drawings of tangerines have been published in a botanical magazine. Rick's photographs of tangerines have won awards in local photography contests and his play 'A Tangerine Named Desire' is being turned into a Broadway musical.

"Don't be fooled by various mandarin oranges masquerading as tangerines," Rick advises. "Many citrus dealers label tangelos and tangors as tangerines but there's a big difference. A true tangerine is reddish-orange in colour when it's ripe, has loose skin and a flattened oblate shape, with easily separated segments and those little pieces of white stringy fiber inside. The best variety is Dancys and are only available for a short time between Thanksgiving and mid-January. Tangors are a cross between a tangerine and an orange; they tend to be juicy but a bit bland. Tangelos are a grapefruit-tangerine cross; I believe Minneolas are the best."

Dutch Mediumwave News

WELL howdy readers and welcome to another quick scan of the MW and my latest information as to what's happening with the Dutch pirates.

I firstly must tell you that this time around, my column is being prepared here in Preston earlier than I would usually write it because I'm off to the land of the tulips and windmills myself very soon! The next issue of PC will therefore have some interesting articles about Dutch radio from both myself and the editor who is also going over in the summer. As I'm writing things more in advance this time, there is not as much to report.

A surprise trio of pirates were heard testing in late March on 183 metres. PIONIER, VERONA and even PERLEE were all heard with good signals. Several new names have also popped up on 183 and 186. ELECTRON and DISCO HENKIE are two well known pirates using other names. If you hear either of these, they can be contacted via the DPRS. Another new one is MARSIEP whose address is: P.O. BOX 3037, 1780 GA Den Helder, Netherlands.



Stations BUURMAN, ZWARTE ADELAART and ROCKING BILLY RADIO are now also active from Holland on 183 and 186 metres and ALPENKONING has been testing on 1640. DELMARE INTERNATIONAL (Hoogeveen) can be heard every now and again on 1637 kHz with

international music programmes. Operator, Be gives good signals with his 300 watt transmitter. Watch out that you don't confuse this DELMARE with the other one that uses the same frequency! Just listen out for the address and you should be alright!

Much improved signals have been noted recently from JAPIE DE BLITZKIKKER and NOOITGEDACHT (Lochem). This is the result of some antenna adjustments and modifications.

BARONES has recently made a couple of adjustments to make his superb signals sound even more superb than they already do! Mr. Baro has installed a new modulation transformer which seems to have added a little more bass into his audio which is now sounding very nice indeed!

It's nice to see the old favourite, NOORDZEE back in the air again. His recent raid has certainly not put him off broadcasting!

Unfortunately, due to various reasons, several stations are temporarily off air and among these are: NORDMENDE, ZWARTE NON, SEAGIRL, NOLAN and NEW MEXICO, who is off air due to being caught by the RCD. Let's hope they all return soon.

I wonder if any of you heard the Radio Netherlands Media Network programme recently. During this, a brief look at Dutch MW pirates was made. Apparently, they can only be heard at weekends and run 10 KW transmitters while playing agricultural music! I don't know! Some of Holland's best known recording artists are featured on some of the Dutch pirates and as for high power, the statement that some of them have used 10 KW is a joke! And weekends only eh! Just take a look at the logs and you'll see that weekdays are often just as active as a Saturday and Sunday!

By the way, various other stations can now be contacted via the DPRS: ALBATROS, 813, DOKTER KETELLAPPER, GOUDEN STER, GOUNDE VINK, ONE JAN (C), VERONA (A) and KLEINE ZWALVE.

Finally, look out for a relay via Holland soon of RAINBOW RADIO GERMANY on 1509 kHz.

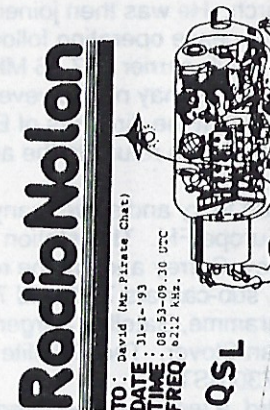
