Undoubtedly one of the best and most fondly remembered of all comics, THE DANDY is still at the time of writing (December 1985) approaching its forty-eighth birthday and seems set for many more.

This index is a history of that near half-century of fun and thrills, from No. 1 in December 1937 to No. 2287 in September 1985 when for the very first time in its long life THE DANDY has had another title, NUTTY, incorporated with it.

Not surprisingly, after forty-eight years, many of the creative talents who established THE DANDY as a comic tradition, including Dudley Watkins, Allan Morley, James Crichton, Jack Glass, Eric Roberts, James Clark, Jack Prout, "Chick" Gordon, James Walker and editor Albert Barnes are no longer with us, and so these two volumes are therefore dedicated to them.

NOTES

Although the above abbreviations will make most of the index self-explanatory I feel that I should clarify a few points which may cause puzzlement.

1. If a character appears in an annual in a different format from its usual one in the weekly comic, or if it appears in more than one format in various annuals, the format used in a relevant annual is put in parenthesis before the annual date. For example, the comic adventure strip 'Jimmy and his Grockle' (1937) has as its annual listing the following:-

ANN: (cas) 1939, 1940, 1941; (st) 1948

This means that in the first three books listed it appeared as a comic adventure strip, and in the last it appeared as a prose story.

2. When an artist draws a strip in an annual or summer special for the first time his name will appear next to the strip. If no name appears next to the relevant strip in subsequent years it can be assumed that the last artist named for the strip is still drawing it.
3. While the index gives starting and finishing dates for all items in THE DANDY comic, some strips, albeit rarely, did not appear every week within the dates given, e.g. Wiley Smiley (1952-1958).
4. Since I couldn't fit them in anywhere else, the cover artists for the annuals and summer specials, where I'm certain, were as follows:-

The information included in the index is from many and varied sources and it would be difficult to name everyone who has in some way helped towards its publication but, having said that, I would like to especially thank the following: Alan and David Coates for their help with research and the professional way they've published the finished article; Denis Gifford, whose trail-blazing efforts made everything that much easier to start with; and Geoff Newman, without whose help at the eleventh hour the index wouldn't have been quite as complete.

1937

Although THE DANDY was D.C. Thomson's first weekly comic a good number of the artists involved in the premier issue were far from newcomers to the field of comic art, much of it for already established Thomson publications.

Chick Gordon had drawn 'Cheery Chinks' for THE ROVER as early as 1922, while Allan Morley had drawn innumerable strips for the boys' papers ('Nosey Parker', 'Sillas Snatcher', etc.) since 1924. Dudley Watkins, starting as a boys' paper illustrator in 1925, had progressed to drawing 'The Broons' and 'Oor Wullie' in THE SUNDAY POST FUN SECTION in 1936, and though they had not done any strip work as such before DANDY No.1, both Jack Glass and Fred Sturrock had been 'heading block' artists for the Thomson boys' papers since the 1920's. Also, directly linked with the Thomson publications, James Crichton and James Clark had drawn nursery strips for Thomson's co-publisher (John Leng) in 'Fairyland Tales' since the mid-twenties, James Crichton drawing 'Billy and Bunny' and James Clark drawing 'Willie Waddle'.

This experienced line-up of artists combined with some excellent scripting made for an auspicious start when THE DANDY debuted on 4 December 1937.

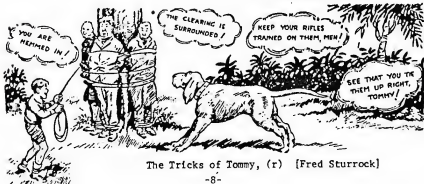

The year World War II came to THE DANDY and to everything else! The effects of the war on the content of THE DANDY in 1939 were not too great, although one comic strip 'Addy and Hermie the Nasty Nazis' and one prose story 'Those Blinking Vaccies Again!' were direct responses to the momentous announcement by Neville Chamberlain on 3 September. Of greater portent was the first reduction in the weekly page count when the original 28 pages were reduced to 24 with issue No. 97 (7.10.39).

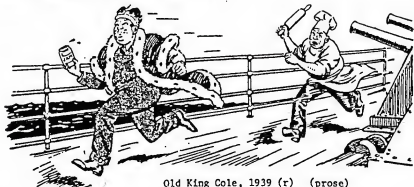

The fun continued but on an increasingly shorter ration thanks to the war-time paper shortage. During the year THE DANDY Lost six pages in total, being reduced from 24 pages to 20 with issue No. 132 (8.6.40) and from 20 pages to 18 with issue No. 154 (9.11.40).

The war also caused editorial upheavals in THE DANDY office in 1940. Early in the year, Albert Barnes, editor since the first issue, was called up for service in the Royal Navy and his place was taken by George Thomson, a

young DANDY sub-editor (now Lord Thomson of Monifieth, chairman of the IBA!). George Thomson remained editor for nine months or so before he was also called up, leaving his place to be filled by John Low, former editor of THE ROVER and brother of R.D. Low, managing editor of all D.C. Thomson's juvenile publications for many years.

While paper shortages and editorial machinations may have been beyond the ken of the average DANDY reader, he or she couldn't afford to have missed the free gift given away with No. 121, for it would be twenty years before there was another.

The paper shortage continued to be a problem and the first issue of the year [No. 162 (4.1.41)] saw yet another reduction in the page count, this time from eighteen pages to sixteen.

January 1941 also saw the end of the third Thomson comic THE MAGIC with issue No. 80 (25.1.41). First published on 22 July 1939, THE MAGIC was an obvious victim of the paper shortage, no doubt sacrificed to try and maintain the regular publication of its more established companion papers THE DANDY and THE BEANO. In the long run, however, the continual page reductions and THE MAGIC's sacrifice turned out not to be enough and in August 1941 the seemingly inevitable happened, when with issue No. 195 (23.8.41) THE DANDY went fortnightly, being published on alternate weeks to the now also fortnightly BEANO.

Production problems aside, from the young readers' point of view 1941 also saw the end of strips and stories with any "war" content as total escapism became the order of the day.

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Despite the new fortnightly format THE DANDY still had production problems due to the paper shortage and the first four months of the year saw two more reductions in the page count. Issue No. 205 (10.1.42) saw the page count reduced from sixteen pages to fourteen, followed by a reduction from fourteen pages to twelve with issue No. 212 (18.4.42). And so it was that THE DANDY evolved (or should that be devolved?) into its best remembered format, with six pages of comic strips being backed by two double page prose stories and one double page comic adventure/adventure strip. Fewer pages naturally meant less for your 2d in 1942 than you got in July 1939, but the quality of what remained was so high that this year was arguably the beginning of THE DANDY's "golden age".

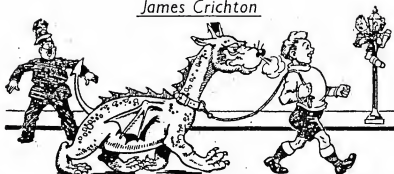

Even though the war had ended almost two years previously the continuing paper shortage caused by the conflict forced the page count to be reduced yet again; this time from twelve pages to ten with issue No. 341 (12.4.47). Just prior to this the fortnightly publishing schedule had also been disrupted when distribution problems caused by the atrocious weather meant there was no issue at all for mid-March with issue No. 339 (1.3.47) not being followed by issue No. 340 until four weeks later (29.3.47).

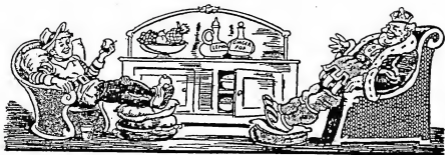

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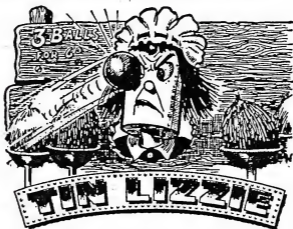
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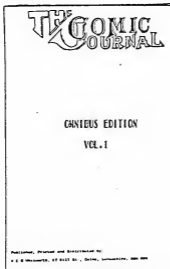
