






THE ELEPHANT THAT DEFEATED AN ARMY. "Gulim Ali," a military elephant in the Moslem army, won the battle of Talikota in 1565 by winding its trunk around the enemy commander and holding him captive in the air until his troops surrendered.



BOX TURTLE released by George B. Woodward with his initials carved on it and found again 44 years later, in North Chatham, New York.










THE WEATHER WAS SO HOT that it popped corn in a field owned by W. P. Miles, Springfield, Missouri. August, 1947.


THE SHARK is the only animal in the world that never sleeps or rests.





GEORGE WASHINGTON, leading the retreat from Long Island to Harlem, rode his horse for 48 consecutive hours without stopping.





EMPLOYEES IN THE U. S. MINT are required to take a bath at the end of a day so that the gold particles may be recovered.








BLUE POLKA-DOT PIGS Owned by Jack Tweddle, Fergus, Ontario





KING RICHARD II (1367-1400) was the first English monarch who actually sat for his portrait—and the first to learn how to sign his name.




SEA BASS caught by Mrs. Bettie Sears on medium tackle weighed 419 pounds—Coronado Islands, California.




CHE MAH, celebrated Chinese midget, was 28 inches tall, yet nis cue was 13 feet long.




A CHICKEN rode 20 miles from Euless, Texas, to Dallas, perched on the front bumper of a car, at 60 miles per hour.



A HOUSE in Edgecombe, Washington, built in the stump of a giant cedar.




DRAWN IN ONE CONTINUOUS LINE by Charles Underhill, the pen not being lifted from the paper from start to finish.









SUNFLOWER with another bloom growing from its center. Submitted by Mrs. Mary Robertson, Lonaconing, Md.




THE GIRAFFE IS TOTALLY MUTE, yet it can "talk" with its tail! It conveys messages to other giraffes by the position or swish of its tail.

HUNTING DOGS in 16th century Spain were dressed in steel armor.








TIM TUFTON of Tuftonboro, N. H., was so powerful that he could leap out of a deep barrel without touching it with his hands.






Miss Clara Weston, a teacher in Pueblo, Colo., to get to school for a period of 4 months in 1864, waded the Arkansas River twice each day.




ISAAC WORDEN, of Prospect, New York (1776-1856) at the age of 70 could leap so high that he would click his heels 3 times while still in the air.



THE MAN OF THE FAMILY. A girl of the Berber Tribe, Morocco, who has no brothers, must tattoo whiskers on her chin.




A CHAMOIS can stand on a point of rock the size of a half dollar.









MULLETS were trained by the ancient Romans TO ANSWER A WHISTLE.










RAMA MURTI NAIDU, Madras, allowed a 4,000-lb. elephant to walk over him.




THE BLACK COWS OF VALAMO, Russia, will not permit women to milk them.




THE SPIKE DANCERS of Timor—barefooted and blindfolded—leap about on a board studded with poisoned spikes!




WALKIE TALKIE. The honey bee communicates with other bees by the manner in which it crawls about the hive.







Mrs. Jean Deverts found an octopus in her coal bin! Pittsburgh, Pa.




HEN lays an egg each morning on her owner's bed. She is owned by Butch Taylor, age 6, Danville, Va.



STEPHAN STAPLE of Levittown, New York—9 years of age—fishing for bass, hooked a duck.




CZAR ALEXANDER III of Russia could bend a ruble—a silver coin the size of a half dollar—between his thumb and forefingers.




LITTLE PILGRIMS to the Shrine of Our Lady of Fatima in Portugal are dressed to look exactly like the church's famed statue of the Madonna.



CAT that always drinks from the goldfish bowl but never disturbs the fish. Owned by Juanita Boltan, Baltimore, Md.










THE CANDY TREE. School children in parts of rural Germany, on the first day of each, term, find paper-wrapped sweets hanging from a tree in the school yard.




A NEW ELECTRONIC GAUGE used in manufacturing airplane instruments can measure the depth of a mouse's footprints on a strand of wire.






A PORCUPINE shakes berries and grapes to the ground, then rolls on the fallen fruit so he can carry it home on his quills
