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Advisory committee approves health center

After more than a year of studying the needs of local teens, members of the Romulus Adolescent Health Advisory Committee decided Thursday that a school-based teen health center is the best way to meet those needs.

Opponents were on hand at the meeting to witness the vote and once again state their arguments.

Committee members voted unanimously to recommend a health center for Romulus High School. The recommendation will be passed along to school board members this month.

Committee members also agreed to explore the possibility of working as a "satellite" center to the Taylor Teen Health Center, already in existence.

Strong need and support for a teen health center was demonstrated through a survey, according to Mark Small, a representative of the Romulus Help Center who presented the committee findings.

Advantages of a school-based facility would be easy accessibility and relatively low cost to the district, Small said. Costs in rent and utilities for an off-campus facility would be approximately \$15,000 a year, according to Small. That cost would be reduced to approximately \$300 a year for a school-based facility, he added.

A school-based clinic would also allow for greater control by the Romulus school board and parents, Small said. In addition, by allowing the Romulus facility to be a satellite of the nearby Taylor Teen Health Center, the two school districts could share costs for services and administration, Small said. It is recommended that the health center occupy two classrooms if the project receives board approval. The room is available in the

high school, according to Superintendent William Bedell.

Sonda Stepchuk, a parent and outspoken opponent of the project, spoke out about the committee itself after the vote was taken.

"Only six of the 24 members are registered to vote in Romulus," she said. "I don't think anybody who doesn't reside in the city of Romulus should come in and make decisions for our children."

Kate Conway, RAHAC project director, said 11 out of 23 members are Romulus residents.

"There really is a need for a clinic," Helen Gregory, a parent, said. "They need to go somewhere."

"I just feel we're strongly outnumbered," said parent Lucille Raymond in response to the unanimous vote to recommend the health center. "I can only hope the school board is not so biased."

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Martial artists

Proposed center draws more fire

Two pastors have resigned from the Romulus Adolescent Health Advisory Committee, the organization responsible for recommending a teen health center to the board of education.

And the committee project director has been urged to give up her job in an anonymous letter.

The Revs. Randy Swink and J.D. Landis offered RAHAC their resignations last week. Landis was serving as committee chairman.

"The Evangelical Church movement as a whole is in opposition to the philosophy and the services extended in a teen health center. It seems evident to me that indeed "Planned Parenthood" and its other satellite networks are strong supporters of the Teen Health Center approach of caring for teen health. This type of support will be a detriment to our teens, parents and our community," Swink wrote.

A teen health center is not the best way to meet the needs of local teens, Swink said after his resignation was announced.

"I don't feel the advisory committee as a whole pursued other areas," he said.

Two other members of the clergy, a Catholic priest and a Baptist pastor, resigned from the committee during the past year.

"A year ago, we were being told we're just exploring the needs, and we're not even decided on whether we need a

school-based clinic," Landis said. "At the same time, project director Kate Conway asked committee members to write her letters in support of such a facility to put on file," he said.

He also referred to a speaker who addressed RAHAC one year ago with ways the group could protect itself against Pro-life advocates or conservative citizens.

In addition, Landis said only 50 percent of RAHAC members live in Romulus. He said a strong local majority of Romulus residents should be represented on a committee.

Project Director Kate Conway said some of the pastors' claims are inaccurate, such as a correlation between Planned Parenthood and the committee.

"Planned Parenthood has never been considered as a potential member of this committee," Conway said.

A more subtle form of opposition to the health center has presented itself in the form of an anonymous letter.

The letter referred, Conway said, to two miscarriages Conway recently experienced and recommended she look to "Jesus Christ for guidance." The letter said Conway should consider ending her work with RAHAC.

If the letter is from a parent in opposition to the center, it only hurts that person's credibility, according to Romulus parent Sandy Barringer.

"We need this kind of facility. Our parents can't give us a good example," Barringer said.

City joins project to improve railroad

Norfolk and Southern railroad crossings at Ozga, Romaine and Shook roads are scheduled for a safety boost.

City council members voted to apply for participation in a joint funding project with the Michigan Department of Transportation Railroad Program and Norfolk and Southern. If the city application

for funding is accepted by the state, Romulus will be responsible for funding 10 percent of the total cost, with the state funding 65 percent and Norfolk and Southern paying 25 percent.

Officials of the Romulus Department of Public Works estimate each crossing signal will cost a total of \$15,000.

Improved signals would include switches which would operate crossing gates by train movement. The existing switches

are activated by one-minute timing devices. The new switches would be operated by computer and will operate gates 30 seconds prior to a train crossing.

Councilman Pete Bergeron, who made the motion to participate in the program, reminded council members the application for participation is due March 15.

Mayor Beverly McAnally expressed support for the project.

"I would recommend we do it. I think we need the signals," she said.

Council members voted unanimously to proceed.

Along with the signal improvements, Norfolk and Southern has taken action to improve safety at a crossing on Shook Road. Company officials have promised the installation of signs reading "uneven railroad crossing."

Hayti students will attend Halecreek, Cory

Hayti Elementary School students will be attending Hale Creek and Cory elementary schools this fall.

School board members Monday night approved new attendance boundaries for students

of soon-to-be-closed Hayti. Students living south of I-94 or in a nearby mobile home park will be assigned to Hale Creek, a total of 132 students. The remaining 126 Hayti students will attend Cory.

HaleCreek and Cory are the two closest schools to the Hayti

students, school officials said.

In the long run, students will benefit from the transfers, said Joel Carr, assistant superintendent for finance and operations.

"In both cases the facilities are far superior," he said. Hayti is the oldest elementary school in the district, Carr continued.

Hayti parents will be given a chance to evaluate the schools themselves through scheduled tours with Dr. William Bedell, superintendent of schools. Bedell plans to meet parents at Hayti for a bus ride to the schools and a look around. Hale Creek will be visited March 20, and Cory will be toured the following day.

1 dies in car crash

A two-car collision in Romulus Sunday evening has claimed the life of a 42-year-old Swedish man.

Tax appeal: March is the month to protest assessments

Nothing is certain except death and taxes. It's difficult to appeal one's own death, however, in early March, many residents in western Wayne County will be able to appeal their tax assessments.

The annual event is not for people disgruntled with their taxes, caution local officials, it is for people who believe their property has been overvalued.

In 1989, property values in western Wayne County are expected to increase between 6 and 16 percent, depending on the community, according to reports from the Wayne County Assessment and Equalization Division.

"Everybody's going to get some kind of increase," said Matthew Raftary, director of assessments for the city of

Romulus. "It's healthy. It's a good sign when property values are on the rise. People are asking high amounts for their homes and getting them."

Tax assessments are the means by which local governments, school districts and Wayne County receive funding, based on the amount of millage levied in each community.

The state equalized valuation of a home worth \$100,000 would be half that amount, or \$50,000. One mill would represent \$1 for every \$1,000 of the SEV, or \$50.

For homeowners who sense a discrepancy between the assessment of their home and comparable homes in the vicinity, there are several ways to approach the appeal process.

To make a personal appeal, most communities require a reservation in advance by calling the assessor's office in each

community. If the person appealing owns property locally, but is living elsewhere, he or she can file a petition by mail, also available through the assessor's office.

The burden of proof, Raftary said, is on the taxpayer. "They will need to bring their tax bill," he said, "any evidence they have, such as pictures and appraisals of similar homes in the area. The board only has jurisdiction over the value of property."

For residents appealing under circumstances of hardship, a copy of the 1988 federal tax form 1040 is required, as well as any Social Security statements, pension plan statements, bank statements or medical statements.

Some communities, such as Canton Township, will restrict appeals to five minutes, so it helps to come prepared.

March is month for tax appeal

The month of March is the time for area residents to appeal their tax assessments. Local state-equalized values increased from 2 to 16 percent, causing the total tax bill to increase for most local homeowners.

What follows is a list of the average tax-assessment increase in each area community and a list of the dates the local board of review meets.

- **BELLEVILLE** - Predicted 1989 SEV increase is 9 percent. Review board meets from 9 a.m. to noon and 1 to 4 p.m. March 7 and 14 at the Belleville City Hall.
- **CANTON TOWNSHIP** - Predicted 1989 SEV increase is 16 percent. Review board meets from 9 a.m. to noon and 1 to 4:30 p.m. March 7 and 14 at the Canton Township Hall.
- **INKSTER** - Predicted 1989 SEV increase is 2 percent. Review board meets from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and 2 to 5 p.m. March 20; 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., 3 to 8 p.m. March 21, both dates at the Inkster Recreation Complex, on Middlebelt Road.
- **ROMULUS** - Predicted 1989 SEV increase is 6 percent. Review board meets from 9 a.m. to noon and 1 to 4 p.m. March 13, 15 and 17; 2 to 5 p.m. and 6 to 9 p.m. March 16; (for commercial use only) 9 a.m. to noon, 1 to 4 p.m. March 14, all dates at the Romulus City Hall.
- **SUMPTER TOWNSHIP** - Predicted 1989 SEV increase is 6.5 percent. Review board meets from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. March 7, 8, 10, 13 and 14; 6 to 9 p.m. March 9; 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. March 11, all dates at the Sumpter Township Hall.
- **VAN BUREN TOWNSHIP** - Predicted 1989 SEV increase is 8.13 percent. Review board meets from 9 a.m. to noon and 2 to 5 p.m. March 7, 8, 14 and 15; 1 to 5 p.m., 7 to 10 p.m. March 9 and 13, both dates at the Van Buren Township Hall.

New jail cells are 'latest technology'

Technology has taken a step forward in the form of a new prison cell for the Wayne County Sheriff's Headquarters at Detroit Metropolitan Airport, county officials claim.

The newly installed third holding cell for the facility has received attention because of a special design comparable to a Lego building block. The cell can stand alone or be expanded into a whole wing or building of cells by stacking additional interlocking cells on top of one another or side by side.

County officials paid \$17,600 for the cell, including installation.

"This new corrections technology looks promising from the standpoint of cost, flexibility and durability," said

Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara last Tuesday during a dedication ceremony.

"Neither of the other holding cells now in operation at the airport location are appropriate for female prisoners," McNamara continued. "As a result it has been necessary to transport female suspects arrested at the airport all the way to the county jail - if space is available."

We were seeking a sturdy, maximum security holding cell, which could be utilized in any kind of emergency situation," McNamara added.

The new cell was built by Mark Correctional Systems of New Jersey and sold to Wayne County by Livonia-based Security Systems of Michigan. All utilities in the cell were built in to be hooked up upon installation.

New deputies to battle drugs

The battle against illegal drugs in Wayne County picked up some additional support recently with the addition of five officers to the Wayne County Sheriff's Department Narcotics Enforcement Staff.

Wayne County Sheriff Robert Ficano received approval Thursday from members of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners to begin screening applicants to fill five positions, including at least two sergeants, for drug enforcement. The cost of the added personnel will be approximately \$200,000, Ficano said.

One reason for the request is availability of funding, Ficano said. The positions are self-funded through a drug forfeiture account.

"Crooks are paying for their own arrests," Ficano said.

Through the program, goods and money seized during drug raids are used to fund additional narcotics efforts and programs.

The additional officers will allow 12-hour coverage each day for county narcotics efforts, according to Ficano.

Ficano would not disclose the current size of the narcotics unit but said it includes more than 25 staff people.

School buys new buses

Ten new school buses are on the way for the Romulus school district.

Board of Education members voted Monday night to purchase 10 65-passenger buses total of \$316,174. The chassis for the vehicles will come from Crova Sales & Service - Hydra, a General Motors dealership. Bodies will be purchased from the McFadden Corporation.

Money for the purchases will come from a special fund for the maintenance of textbooks and school buses, according to Dan Bales, school board secretary.

Schools recognize active citizen

Romulus School Board members Monday passed a resolution in recognition of Dan Bales, 1989 Romulus Chamber of Commerce Person of the Year.

Bales, who has been a member of the school board for eight years, was recognized for steady involvement with local programs including volunteer work for Parent Teacher Organizations, scouting organizations, little league football and the recreation commission.

An awards banquet in honor of Bales is scheduled for Friday evening and will be presented by the Romulus Chamber of Commerce.

Romulus to net 350 jobs

Approximately 400 new jobs may be created in Romulus due to the recent approval of an industrial development district on a 49-acre parcel of land on Van Born and Cogswell roads.

City councilmembers voted unanimously Monday to approve the district on behalf of Precision Hardware, Inc. and company division Leo Wise, Inc.

Company representatives plan to construct a 60,000-square-foot manufacturing facility for commercial hardware, a project which would create approximately 80 jobs. Their plan also includes development of four additional parcels which could eventually create 400 jobs, company officials claim.

The prospect of new jobs was well received by councilmembers.

"That's one of our main concerns hiring," Mary Ann Banks, mayor pro tem, said.

Banks also read a letter from Councilman Jimmie Raspberry, who expressed support for Precision Hardware, Inc. due to their hiring policies. Raspberry was not at the meeting.

Precision Hardware already employs approximately 50 Romulus residents.

Volunteer firefighters love challenge of job

The job is dangerous, tiring and stressful. It cuts in on family time and can call a person away from home any time of day. Further, the pay is minimal.

Why choose to become a volunteer firefighter?

Most of the Romulus volunteer firefighters offer the same answer - it's a calling.

"I've been interested all my life. Even when I was a kid I chased firetrucks down the street," Jerry Ladach said.

Ladach has been a volunteer firefighter in Romulus for nearly 18 years.

"Young kids always want to be firemen," 25-year veteran Bob Pecsénye said.

For most, the job has lived up to their boyhood fantasies. Fighting fires, however, is not all fantasy.

"You have to be dedicated," Pecsénye said.

"It is a lot of hard work," Ladach remarked.

"It can cause problems within the family if a wife or husband doesn't talk about it in advance," Ladach continued.

"When that tone (alarm) goes over you have to miss out on dinner, or going out."

Ladach said potential volunteers are informed of these potential problems before they join.

Currently, the Romulus Fire Department consists of 54 firefighters including the chief and deputy chief. With three shifts, volunteers are available for calls 24 hours a day.

Romulus has four fire stations, and each volunteer is assigned to the station closest to home. They are contacted for calls via radio. Firefighters usually arrive at a call within five minutes, according to Pecsénye.

is immediately immersed in on-the-job training, initially as an observer from a safe distance, Greenslaid said.

The volunteer system has always been used in Romulus, Greenslaid said.

"It's been a lifelong department... It's always been here."

Ladach said his job as a firefighter has changed over the years.

"When I first got here, it (Romulus) was more or less a family helping each other out," he said. "People appreciated it... it was self-gratifying."

"A lot of people are still grateful, but they take it as this is our job. They don't realize this is our second job. We don't depend on it for our livelihood."

An increase in industrial development in Romulus has also had an impact on volunteer firefighting, Ladach said. Firefighters must learn to use more

complicated equipment, such as Self Contained Breathing Apparatus. They must also expect more calls for chemical spills.

"We never know what we'll be responding to."

One aspect of the job has not changed. Firefighters must be speedy when responding to a call.

"We have to be in service within five minutes or another truck is toned (sent) out," Ladach said.

The most stressful aspect of the job for Ladach comes with the realization that someone is trapped within a burning building, especially a child.

"The feelings that go through you... something just gets you going a little harder," he said.

Despite the stress and danger, if he had to start from scratch, Ladach said he would volunteer again.

In addition, once a volunteer joins the department, he or she

Barnes and Romulus Police

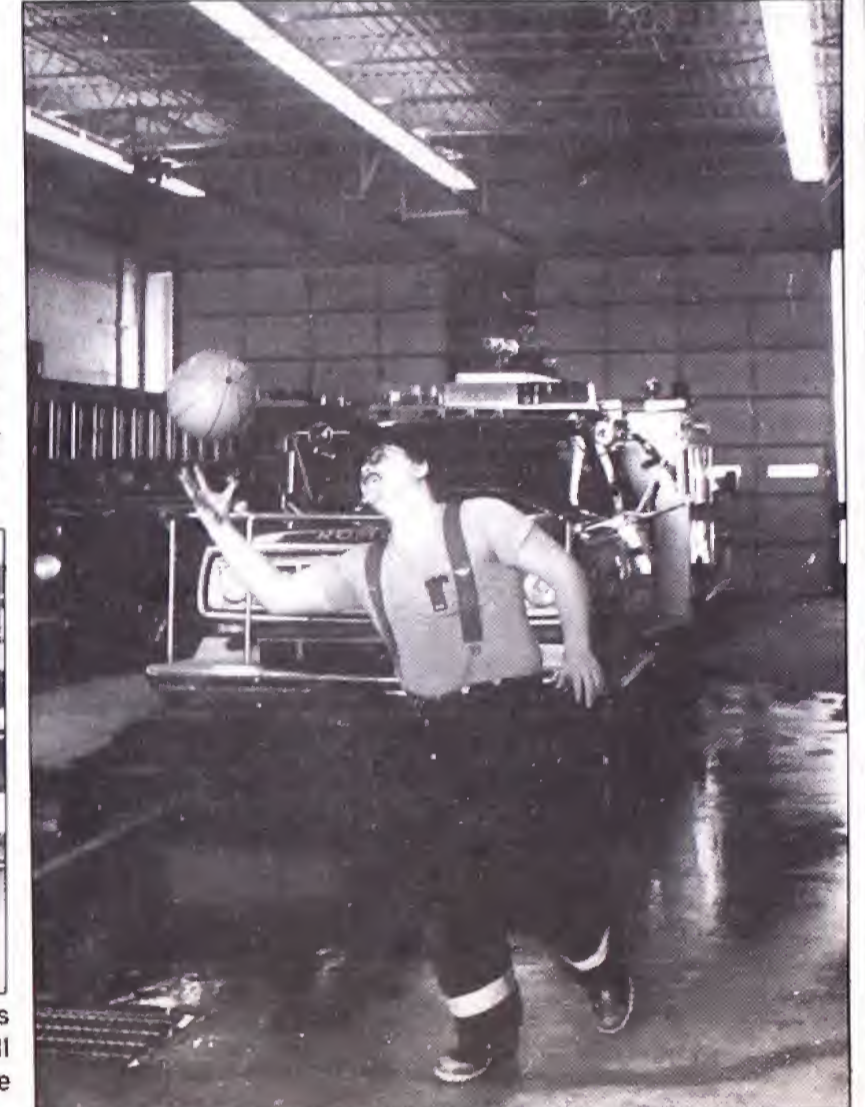
Chief Fred Dansby will be recognized at the first graduation ceremony for the academy and will receive a mystery prize.

Among the main points of the contract are training requirements. Rangers must undergo police training before being deputized. Training is funded through the Metroparks.

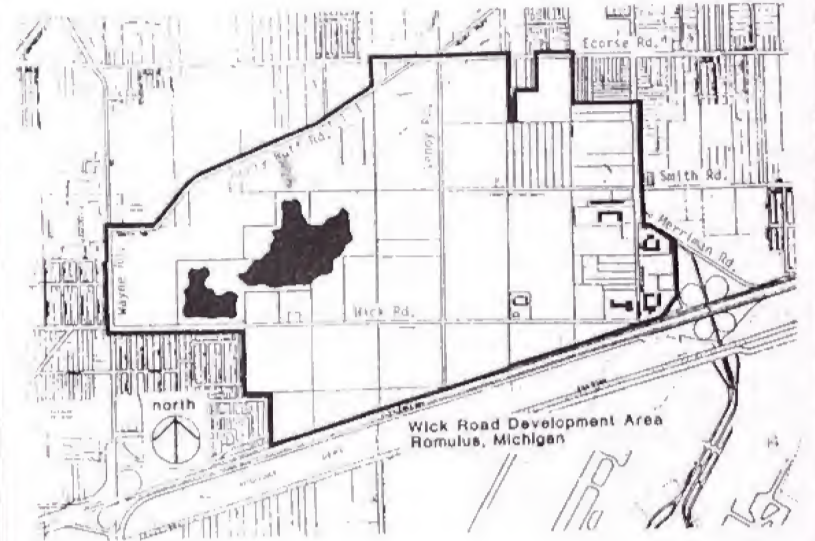
The Metropark authority is also responsible for insuring the rangers, according to the contract.

CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF VAN BUREN

ORDINANCE NO. 2-21-89 VEHICLE WEIGHT LIMIT ORDINANCE

An ordinance to protect the Public Health, Safety and General Welfare under the Authority of Public Act No. 359 of 1947 as it is Amended by Regulating the Wheel and Axle Loads and Gross Weights of certain vehicles operating within the Township of Van Buren, Wayne County, Michigan; to adopt by reference certain sections of the Michigan Vehicle Code being MCL 257.1 et seq. to provide for the enforcement of same; and to amend or repeal any other ordinance of parts of Ordinances in conflict therewith.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF VAN BUREN ORDAINS:

Section 1. Name
This Ordinance shall hereafter be known and cited as "Vehicle Weight Limit Ordinance" of the Charter Township of Van Buren.

Section 2. Michigan Compiled Laws (MCL) Adopted
MCL Sections 257.722 and 257.724 as amended are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

Section 3. Saving Clause
The provisions of this ordinance are hereby declared to be severable. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section or subsection is declared void or inoperable for any reason by any Court, it shall not effect any other part or portion hereof other than the part declared void or inoperable.

Section 4. Conflicting Provisions
Any ordinance or part of an ordinance in conflict herewith is hereby repealed.

Section 5. Effective Date and Declaration of Emergency
This ordinance is declared to be for the benefit and protection of the public health, safety and welfare requiring immediate implementation and as such is declared to be an emergency ordinance effective upon notification and publication as provided in the Charter of Van Buren Township.

CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF VAN BUREN REGULAR BOARD MEETING MINUTES FEBRUARY 21, 1989

Meeting called to order Supervisor Jacobes at 7:32 p.m. Present: Jacobes, Fain, Foster, Birbeck, Cicotte, Melvin and Rochowiak. Others in attendance: Chief Davies, Chief McNally, Public Service Director Partridge, Secretary King and 17 interested citizens.

Supervisor requested that Approval of Agenda be moved to first item of business with Approval of Minutes to follow. He also recommended that Item #7 under New Business be broken into two parts; that of (A) New vehicle purchase for Department of Public Works (DPW), and (B) Water and Sewer Department New Vehicle Purchase. Also, the addition of Item #11 under New Business "to authorize Donna Hall and Associates to submit a 1989-90 Specialized Services Grant Application."

Motion Foster, support Melvin to approve the changes in agenda format. Carried.
Motion Cicotte, support Fain to accept the agenda as amended. Carried.
PUBLIC HEARINGS: Two Public Hearings were scheduled to receive comments on the reallocation of \$6,000 in Community Development Block Grant funds, and to consider eligible projects for the 1989-90 Program Year.

Motion Foster, support Rochowiak to open the public hearing on the reallocation of \$6,000 in Community Development Block Grant Funds. Carried.
Treasurer Foster informed everyone that CDBG funds is an ongoing program, funded federally; that Van Buren Township participates in a Wayne County group of communities for eligible projects. Van Buren Township had a project in the 1989-90 year in the amount of \$6,000 for waterproofing the Old Township Hall which was declared ineligible for funding according to HUD guidelines. Under consideration is reallocation of these funds to projects that do qualify. The purpose of the Public Hearing is an opportunity for Board and community input.

There being no further comments or questions, motion Foster, support Cicotte to close the public hearing. Carried.

Motion Foster, support Birbeck to open the public hearing regarding all funding for the 1989-90 program year for CDBG funds. Carried.

Treasurer Foster informed everyone that the Board will consider continuation of minor home repair, the housing rehabilitation project, that staff suggestions have been received, and senior citizens have been targeted. The Romulus Help Center is again requesting funding to aid residents who qualify on a case-by-case basis in minor home repair, personal care, homemaker and chore services.

Kay Ikola, Executive Director, The Information Center, Inc. addressed the Board regarding Home Share. Home Share matches compatible adults to share residences and focuses on senior citizens. Ms. Ikola presented a slide presentation outlining the services Home Share provides qualified citizens.

A concerned resident inquired if an emergency warning system would qualify for CDBG funds. He was informed that it would not meet eligibility criteria.

Treasurer Foster said that the Board may want to pursue funding for spot blight.

There being no further comments or questions, motion Fain, support Rochowiak to close the public hearing on 1989-90 CDBG funds. Carried.

MINUTES: Motion Foster, support Fain to clarify the minutes of February 7, 1989, on page two regarding the rezoning portion, the third paragraph to indicate specifically that the application referred to the I-94 South Service Drive between Harmony and Sunset Lanes and that the item number was 23a1a2a1. Carried.

CORRESPONDENCE: Supervisor Jacobes presented a certificate of appreciation to the Belleville Rotary Club in recognition of 50 years of community service. He also informed everyone that the Rotary presented the Township with 90 flowering crab trees to be planted this spring by the Rotary on public properties within the Township.

OLD BUSINESS: Motion Melvin, support Fain to table the consideration (of proposed zoning ordinance amendments) until the next regularly scheduled Board meeting. Carried.

NEW BUSINESS: Motion Foster, support Cicotte that the Board reallocate \$6,000 in this fashion: \$3,800 in minor home repair, and \$2,200 in housing rehabilitation for the program year 1988-89. Carried.

Motion Melvin, support Rochowiak that the Board authorize Ed Delhagen (Waste Management Director) to initiate a six month pilot recycling program to start on March 1, 1989. Carried.

Motion Foster, support Fain to transfer from the Consulting Fees in the Waste Management budget to Capital Outlay as appropriate for the start-up costs of the recycling program, not to exceed \$1,500, as included in the 1989 General Fund budget. Carried.

Motion Fain, support Birbeck to approve the Moslem Shrine Temple's request to proclaim June 9 and 10, 1989 as Moslem Shrine Temple Annual Hospital Fund Paper Drive days. Carried.

Motion Fain, support Cicotte to approve the appointments of Clerk Fain, Trustee Birbeck and Trustee Melvin to the Elections Commission. Carried.

Motion Foster, support Birbeck that the Township Board establish a six member Recreation Committee and further recommend that our Board representative to that Committee be Diane Melvin. Carried.

Motion Foster, support Cicotte to recommend the one year appointments of Ken Askew, Stephen Marosi, Wayne Frazier, Jr., Joyce Rochowiak, Brenda Laginess and David Sowers, Sr. to the Recreation Committee. Carried.

Motion Fain, support Foster to approve the purchase of Item #19 on the Oakland County Bid for a 3/4 ton GMC pick-up 4x4 truck for the Department of Public Works (DPW) in the amount of \$12,601.01. Carried.

Motion Fain, support Cicotte to approve the purchase of Item #13 on the Oakland County Bid for a 3/4 ton GMC pick-up 4x2 truck for the Water Department in the amount of \$10,737.37 with the stipulation to change from cloth to vinyl seats. Carried.

Motion Foster, support Melvin to recommend that the Vehicle Weight Limit Ordinance which is in compliance with State of Michigan guidelines, be effective in Van Buren Township according to the terms of the ordinance presented and immediate implementation upon notification and publication as provided for in the Charter Township of Van Buren. Carried.

No action was taken on New Business Item #8 (b) Motor Carrier Safety Act and Rules (Act. 181).

Motion Foster, support Melvin to amend the Police Department budget by \$6,200 from Fund Balance to Capital Outlay to purchase two portable scales for use in Weights and Measures Enforcement from the appropriate certified supplier (Load a Meter in Baltimore, Maryland). Carried.

Motion Fain, support Melvin to adopt the Construction Code Appeals Board as required per BOCA, Section ES-112.1 and 112.2. Carried.

Motion Melvin, support Cicotte to recommend that the Board concur with the Supervisor's recommendations for appointments to the BOCA Board, that being Harlan Davenport, Builder; George Craven, Architect; Jerry Jarrett, Engineer; and Darryl Robson, Builder and the fifth person be appointed at a later date, the positions be non-compensated and that the terms of office expire February 28, 1990. Carried.

Motion Cicotte, support Rochowiak to authorize Donna Hall and Associates to submit the 1989-90 Specialized Services Grant Application. Carried.

VOUCHER LIST: Motion Fain, support Birbeck to approve the Voucher List as presented. Carried.

REPORTS: Supervisor ordered that December, 1988 Budgetary Report and Police/Ordinance Department Monthly Reports for December, 1988 and January, 1989 be received and filed.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: Supervisor Jacobes presented a 90 day overview of the Township. Among the items presented were: elimination of trucks parking along the North Service Drive near Wayne Disposal; a one year extension of landfill space for Township rubbish; improvement in roads and drains; and the initiation of negotiations for additional sewer capacity. Other items included: increased citizen involvement; the monthly showing of children's films; the streamlining of Planning Commission procedures; the revision of Building fees; improved efforts in a recycling program; and improved relations with neighboring communities.

Freedom: State bill allows parents to chose 'right school'

Most local school officials "don't have a problem" with new proposed legislation which would allow parents to choose which school their children attend.

Called the "schools of choice" proposal, the concept is part of Senate Bill 51, a package of bills targeting school quality in the areas of curriculum, competency testing, annual reports and other school improvements.

The proposed "schools of choice" legislation permits residents in a school district to petition for an election on whether parental choice of schools within that school district should be allowed.

If the school district residents vote "yes," district officials

would have to allow parents to choose which school they want their children to attend.

Proponents of the legislation say it will allow parents to choose the school they think is best suited to their child's needs. They maintain it will encourage excellence among school officials, who want to keep enrollment high.

Opponents of the proposal say that it could lead to crowding in "popular" schools and empty classrooms in other buildings. In addition, they claim it could result in transportation problems for both parents and school administrators.

"I don't have a problem with schools of choice," said Dr. John Hoben, superintendent of Plymouth-Canton Community Schools. "It would make the

schools more competitive. There is a question about whether you'd have enough room."

Some school officials in the Plymouth-Canton district believe the plan could work, if it could be implemented on a first-come, first-serve basis to eliminate overcrowding at the popular schools.

Hoben said he doesn't have a problem with any part of Senate Bill 51, which is similar in many ways to House Bill 4805 and provides for the establishment of a core curriculum, competency testing teachers, an annual report and other improvements.

"Senate Bill 51 embodies an alternative approach to education that has been attracting an increasing amount of attention, both in Michigan and throughout the nation," state

Sen. George Hart (D-Dearborn) said. "Although I have not yet taken a position on the bill, I think the chances are good that it will receive serious legislative consideration this year and I want to know what the school board members, administrators and teachers in my district think about it."

Hart recently invited all school board members, administrators and teachers in the 10th District to a meeting to discuss the pros and cons of the proposed legislation.

Included in the invitation was Garnett Hegeman, Jr., superintendent of Inkster Schools.

"If it's confined to within single, identifiable districts, we have no problem with it," Hegeman said, in reference to the "schools of choice" propos-

al. "It may have some negative affect on cross-district attendance. In our district, we do allow parents to enroll students in any elementary school they choose, but we don't provide transportation if it's too far away. That could explode into a costly affair."

Reactions mixed about Blanchard's budget plan

Local state lawmakers have mixed feelings about Gov. James Blanchard's 1989-90 state budget proposal.

Local legislators agree not enough funds are allocated for higher education and the state department of education, while they said too much is proposed for the state department of corrections.

Perhaps one of the most outspoken opponents to the budget proposal is Sen. R. Robert Geake (R-Northville), who said "the budget is very tight" and "almost every department is inadequately funded."

The senator said Blanchard has proposed severe cuts in social services and "barely adequate" increases for education and mental health.

"There are no areas I'm satisfied with in this budget. There is a lot of work to do on this," Geake said. "The budget calls for only about a one percent increase in general fund support for higher education. At a time such as this when education costs are up, we need more funding for it."

The budget would stop funding for the Civil Air Patrol, the Marine Patrol and Central Dispatch grants to county police agencies, Geake said.

Rep. Jim Kosteva (D-Canton Township) is more satisfied with the proposal.

"I think it's a pretty sound budget, recognizing the constraints that we have. I still see a lot of unmet needs where the state could do a better job, but you're always going to find areas that were a little slighted," Kosteva said.

Like Geake, Kosteva is concerned with education. The legislator said a formula-based appropriation for higher education should be devised.


"We seem to give blanket percentage increases to our colleges and universities. All the schools get about a three percent increase, no matter if you're Central Michigan University, the University of Michigan or Wayne State," Kosteva said.

Areas of the budget Kosteva supports are the expansion of the preschool program and math and science challenge grants.

Also concerned with education funding is Rep. Gerald Law (R-Plymouth), who said the department of education is again being slighted in the budget proposal.

"The budget gives most of the money to the department of corrections and hardly any to education. That's a bit of a controversy in Lansing right now," Law said. "A lot of the school districts aren't doing so well. Everybody has been frightened about school finance reform and then most of the money in the budget goes to corrections."

Safety-Kleen Corporation proposes to establish a hazardous waste limited storage facility in Romulus, Michigan. Safety-Kleen Corporation proposes to operate a limited storage facility on Goddard Road in Romulus, Michigan. Spent solvent wastes will be stored in tanks and containers for less than 90 days. The company provides product delivery and waste recycling services to area manufacturing, automotive repair, and dry cleaning businesses.

The Department is authorized under the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) to issue and deny licenses for the operation of hazardous waste facilities, except for the portion of a license which relates to the 1984 Hazardous and Solid Waste Amendments (HSWA) to RCRA. HSWA mandates, in part, that hazardous waste management licenses issued after November 8, 1984, require corrective action for all releases of hazardous waste or hazardous constituents to the environment from any solid waste management units at treatment, storage, or disposal facilities seeking licenses. U.S. EPA, in cooperation with the Department is responsible for making final determination on the HSWA portion of the application. Thus, until the Department receives authorization to administer the HSWA portion of the RCRA program, reviews of applications and issuance or denial of licenses and permits will be conducted jointly.

Department and U.S. EPA staff are currently reviewing the application to determine if it is complete and technically satisfies all state and federal hazardous waste facility licensing requirements. If the application is found to be incomplete, the missing information will be requested from the applicant and the municipality and persons on the facility mailing list will be so notified. As soon as the missing information is provided, the Department will notify the municipality and persons on the facility mailing lists and proceed with the technical review of the application. Based upon this review, the Department and U.S. EPA will propose to issue or deny the operating license. Prior to a final determination, a public hearing will be held regarding the tentative decision.

A notice will appear in this publication approximately 30 days prior to the hearing date. At this time, the Department and U.S. EPA are soliciting public comments on the adequacy of the application, the proposed corrective action program, and any issues associated with the company's past operations. Comments should be sent to the address printed below by May 1, 1989.

Local guides offered just for the asking

Area boating and camping enthusiasts, take heed. Several brochures and publications are available to aid you in your 1989 outdoors-fun planning.

For camping, 36 campgrounds that permit free camping are among several hundred parks around the country that have been added to the new, fifth-edition of "Guide to Free Campgrounds." The new listings boost the total number of free campgrounds featured in the directory to more than 6,300.

Michigan campgrounds just added to the fifth edition are scattered all around the state. But the majority are off-the-beaten-track locations in the Upper Peninsula.

Fully half of the new listings, in fact, are rustic family fishing camps within an hour of Manistique - an area of growing popularity that is still unspoiled by crowds of tourists.

One of the new listings - Horseshoe Lake, near Glennie - is geared for touring motorcycleists who want to stop along the Au Sable National Scenic River while touring Michigan.

A few new listings are not strictly free but charge only \$2 for overnight camping. Those parks were added to the 1989 directory as exceptions to the "free camping" rule because they are especially attractive sites where small fees were recently added in order to maintain them.

Examples of those sites include Lumbermans Monument and Rollways campgrounds, northwest of East Tawas, in the Huron National Forest. Together, the two locations constitute 53 campsites equipped with picnic tables, toilets, campfire grill areas and drinking water. Activities include fishing, boating, waterskiing and swimming.

One of the new listings near Manistique is for a single, secluded site suitable for just one RV camping family. Offering a private escape, this escape site overlooks two lakes - 62-acre Ironjaw and 26-acre Lake Nineteen - in the Hiawatha National Forest. The lakes offer excellent fishing for crappie, northern pike, large-mouth bass and bluegill. A boat access is provided, but use of a four-wheel drive vehicle for launching is recommended.

Two other sites are available on Lake Nineteen - one, a pull-in site for RV owners, and the other a secluded tent site accessible only by boat.

Detailed directions on how to reach some of the most picturesque campgrounds in America are provided in "Guide to Free Campgrounds." The 640-page directory is researched and edited by Don Wright, a veteran camping and travel writer and author. Locations are listed alphabetically by state and

city, and nearly all of the campsites are situated in beautiful, natural settings - many on the shores of secluded lakes and streams.

Most have on-site water service, toilet facilities, picnic tables and recreational opportunities, and a surprisingly large number have full hookups, hot showers and flush toilets -- all free. The directory gives full details on the amenities available at each campground along with valuable information about the park itself. The guide even recommends when families with large RVs should avoid specific campgrounds due to narrow roads, small sites or troublesome terrain.

"Guide to Free Campgrounds" is sold in bookstores and at RV dealerships for \$14.95. But is available by mail from the publisher for only \$12.95, including postage and handling. A 640-page companion book, "Guide to Free Attractions," also is \$12.95, but both books may be ordered at the same time for only \$23.90 from Cottage Publications, 24396 Pleasant View Dr., Elkhart, Ind. 46517.

Also available for camping enthusiasts is a guide from AAA of Michigan. Campers planning to reserve sites or inquire about facilities can refer to AAA Michigan private campground guide, which also lists phone numbers and indicates campgrounds inspected and approved by AAA.

For information on the guide, call AAA at 336-1522.

Finally, for fishing lovers, the "Michigan Charterbook" is being offered by the Michigan Charter Boat Association, a nonprofit organization.

The reference guide offers an extensive listing of private charter services, which include fishing, sailing, diving, duck hunting, cruises and excursions. It allows the reader to target a specific state area and find the available charter services for that area.

Michigan has one of the largest charter-boat fleets in the nation. According to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, the number exceeds 900. Boats used for charter services must be licensed by the state and pass a strict inspection.

Denny Grinold, president of the charter association, said, "through boat charters, the tourist can experience a wonderful world of fishing, diving or cruising without making a major investment. It allows anyone to spend time on a professionally operated vessel for an affordable daily rate. Many of our captains have the same families or groups returning year after year.

'Tis the season

Boats, recreational vehicles are 1st signs of spring

Typically, second homes are made of brick, two-by-fours and aluminum siding, but second homes of the moving variety are also gaining in popularity.

These popular "second homes" are boats and recreational vehicles.

With the variety of vehicles marketed today, dealers warn customers to shop around and not succumb to impulses.

"The best advice I can give is, the best price doesn't necessarily mean the best deal," said Doug Reimel, owner of Prop and Sail Inc., in Taylor. "There's a lot of junk on the market and a lot of times the customer will get burned. You really have to shop around."

In the boat market, customers should look into companies offering package deals, Reimel said. Brunswick, manufacturer of Bayliner, Fisher, Monarch, Sea Ray and Starcraft; and OMC, parent company of Four Winns, Sea Swirl, Sea Nymph and Hydrosports, offer good deals, according to Reimel.

Typical boat packages range from \$8,995 to \$40,000, Reimel said. Extended financing plans are available.

"Check out how the boat is made. There will be a lot of wear and tear on it. Also check into the dealer. Notice if they are courteous and if they take care of you after the sale. Next, make

a list of needs in a boat. You may have to compromise," Reimel said.

Mike Moyer, sales manager at Marine Affiliates, in Canton Township, suggests shopping for the best boat warranty.

"Look for a good warranty that covers the boat for more than five years. That's one of the biggest downfalls for boat buyers is they don't find good warranties," Moyer said. "The warranty shows the company is willing to back up what they sell."

Good package deals should include the boat and accessories, such as the trailer, motor and warranty, Moyer said. Like Reimel, Moyer believes buyers should purchase only packages

offered by well-known manufacturers.

Some well-known products for the current boating season include a 22-foot, three-inch Grummin Cutty Cabin and the 18-foot, four-inch Grummin Center Console. Both carry 10-year hull warranties.

Price hunting is always a top concern of the boat buyer, Reimel said. This year, boat prices have increased between three and seven percent, approximately five percent less than past years. The distributor said company mergers and market competition are reasons for low price increases.

The other variety of second home could be called a "house on wheels," according to Jerry

Higdon, manager at Les Stanford RVs, in Belleville and Dearborn. Typically called motor homes and campers, Higdon said recreational vehicles are in high demand.

Recreational vehicles are made as motorized units or trailers. Typically, the vehicles are from 19 to 40 feet in length, according to Higdon. Prices vary from \$20,000 to \$70,000, but the second home can be claimed as a tax deduction. Vehicles can be financed for up to 15 years.

"We have some that are equipped with (clothes) washers and dryers. They all have bathrooms and waste tanks and many have microwave ovens, televisions and VCRs," Higdon said.

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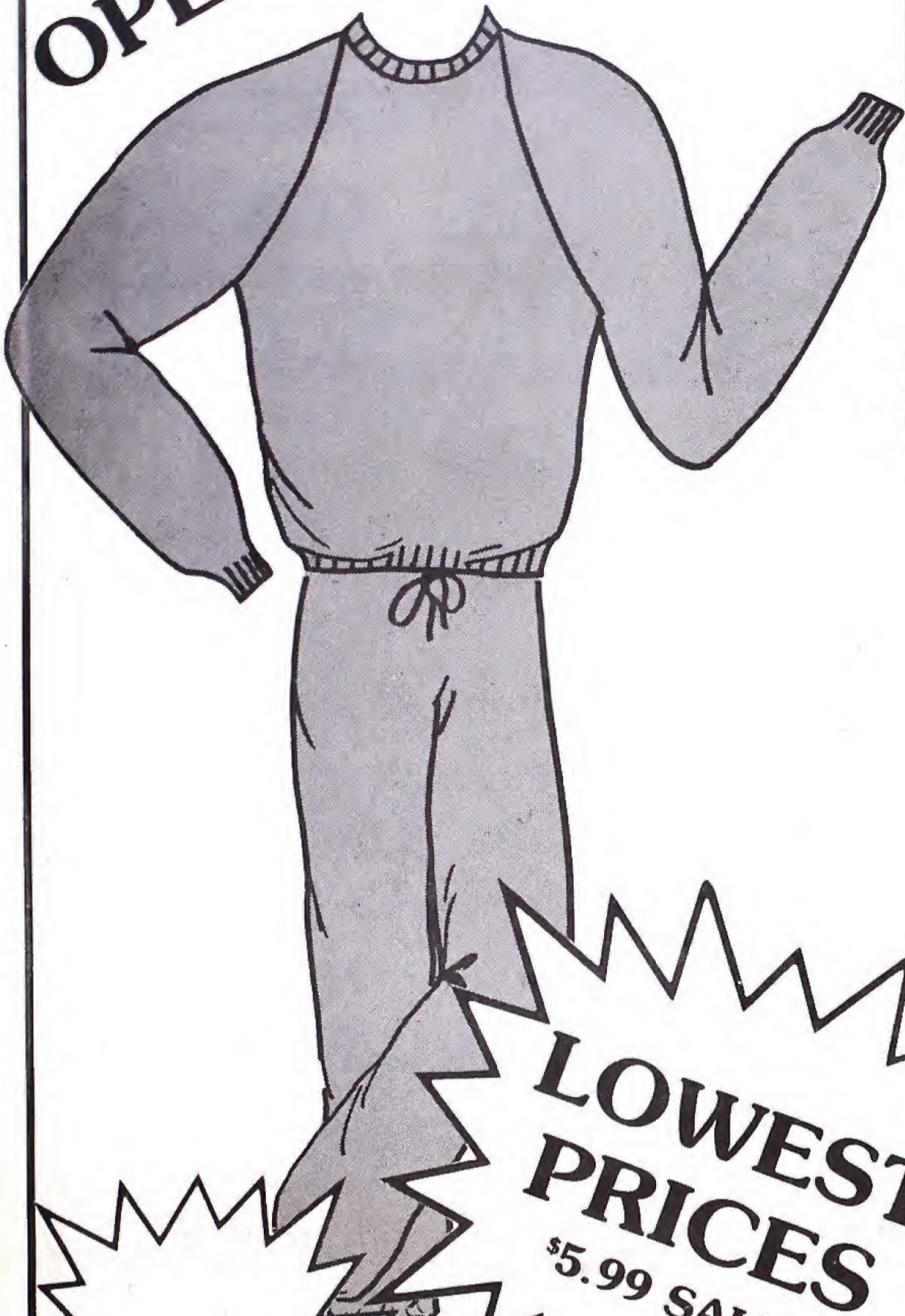
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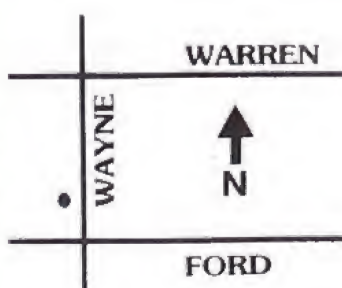
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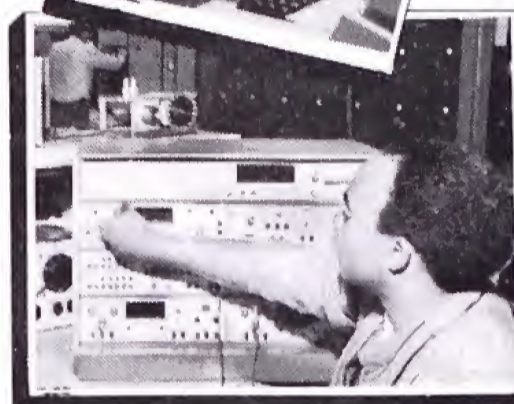
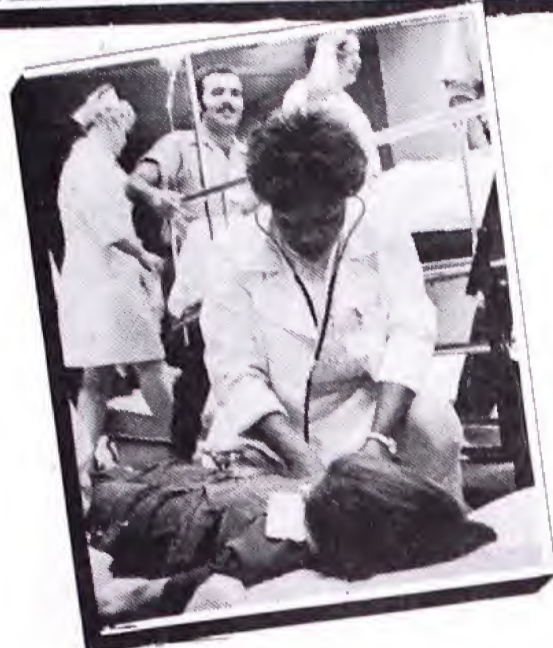
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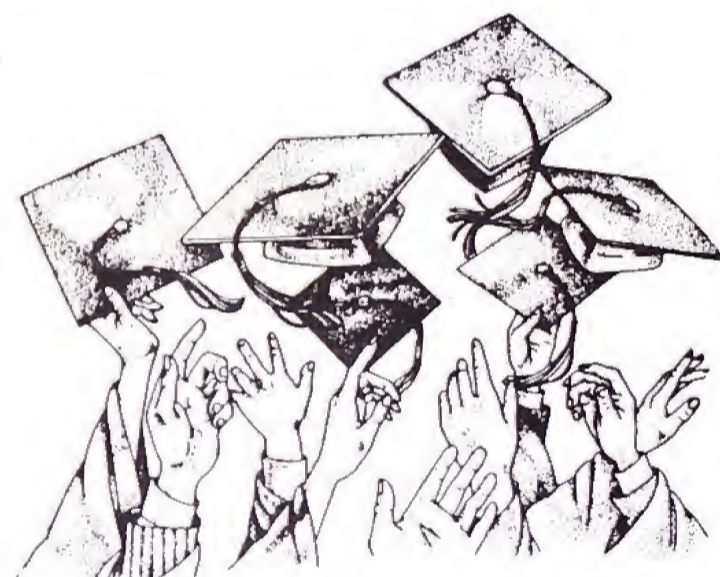
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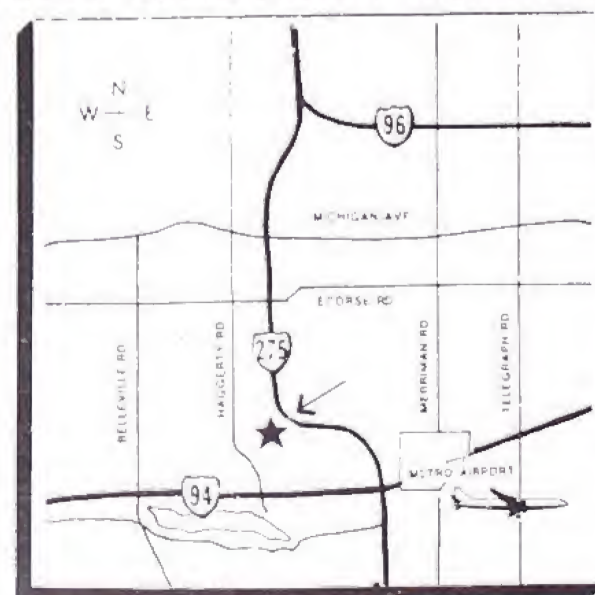
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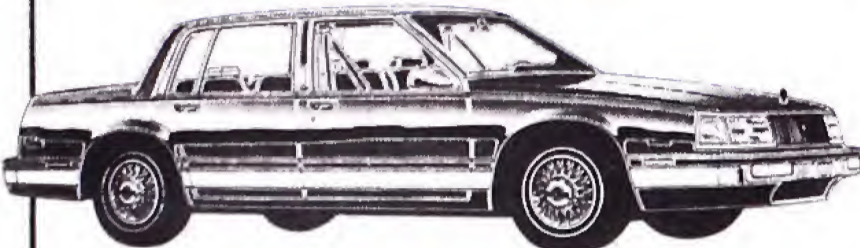
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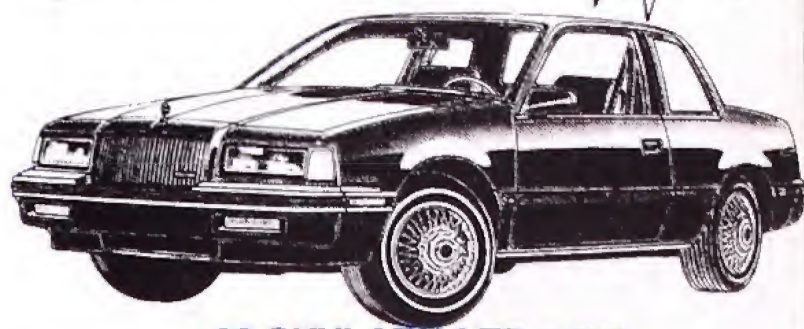
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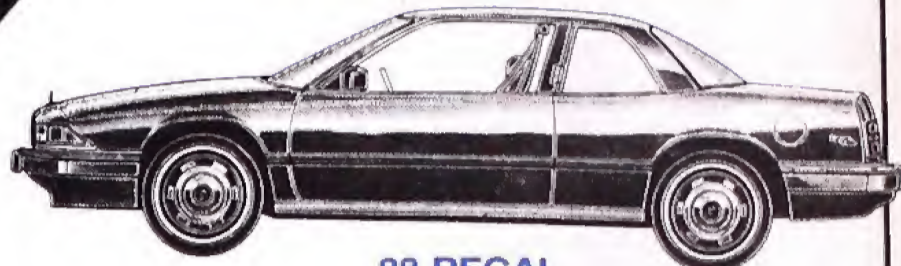

PIG OUT

Low-fat-foods day touts good eating

Pigging out is a well-loved American pastime. But nutrition experts are hoping to demonstrate better ways to enjoy food this month.

For the second year, the Great American Lowfat Pigout will be observed in the area. The day-long celebration - intended to demonstrate that nutritious foods actually can taste good - is set for March 9.

Sponsors of the event are the Michigan Dietetic Association and the American Cancer Society. Officials from the two groups have coupled the pigout with National Nutrition Month, also staged during March.

Cynthia Rutkowski, a registered dietitian at Annapolis Hospital, in Wayne, is coordinating the local pigout effort. As public-relations chairperson for the Michigan Dietetic Association and master dietitian trainer for the American Cancer Society, Rutkowski is a member of the pigout planning committee.

She is hoping the pigout message will be repeated throughout western Wayne County.

"People are becoming more interested in their health. Nutrition, now, is a hot topic," Rutkowski said.

Among the pigout-focused events planned at Annapolis will be a videotape session about safe-eating habits. The tape will be shown in the hospital lobby all day March 9.

In the cafeteria, literature touting the benefits of low-fat eating will be plentiful, as will low-fat dishes to tempt every taste bud, according to Rutkowski.

"It's a situation where you know the information is out there. You hope they're taking it with them to the grocery store and the restaurants," Rutkowski said.

Where does one start? A gradual change from a diet of fatty foods to one rich in low-fat ingredients is the best bet, Rutkowski said.

"You can't stop 'cold turkey'," Rutkowski said. "Gradual changes mean switching from whole milk to 2-percent to skim."

Of all dangerous ingredients, salt is, perhaps, the most difficult to eliminate from the diet, she explained.

"Anything that tastes good probably has salt. Anything packaged probably has some kind of sodium present," Rutkowski said.

Other foods labeled "taboo" during the pigout are animal fats, greasy foods, smoked meats, salt-cured and salt-pickled foods.

On the preferred pigout list are foods high in vitamins A and C - such as strawberries, carrots, oranges and peppers - lean meats, poultry, fish, cruciferous vegetables - such as broccoli and cauliflower - fiber-rich foods and fresh fruits.

Before converting your current diet to a healthy one, determine what your weaknesses are, Rutkowski said. Maintain a detailed diary of everything eaten - including snacks - within a three-day period.

"It's amazing how much we put in our mouth," Rutkowski said. "See what you're actually eating. See what you need to modify. Target what it is you want to do."

Most important in the new diet are determination and self patience, she continued.

"Tell yourself, 'I can still do it,'" Rutkowski said. "Even if you slip up."

Substitution is a great secret to utilize in a new diet plan, Rutkowski said. For example, two

egg whites can be used in place of one whole egg. One-quarter cup of sugar can be deleted from most recipes, and ground turkey can be substituted for ground beef in many recipes.

To aid those planning to take the Great American Lowfat Pigout to heart, Rutkowski has offered the following recipes. All are recognized as healthy and have been accepted in diet programs of the American Cancer Society.

Go ahead, pig out - the healthy way!

Tri-color bean soup

- 2 large onions, sliced
- 3 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 4 cups water
- 2 tomatoes, cubed
- 3 carrots, cut in 1/4 inch slices
- 1 19-ounce can pinto beans, drained
- 1 19-ounce can kidney beans, baby lima beans, or black-eyed peas, drained
- 1 19-ounce can chickpeas (garbanzo beans), drained
- 1 teaspoon oregano
- 2 teaspoons basil
- Salt and freshly ground pepper

In a large saucepan, combine onions, garlic, water, potatoes and carrots. Bring to boil, cover and simmer for 20 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Add all beans, oregano, basil and salt and pepper to taste. Simmer for 5 to 10 minutes to blend flavors. Yields 12 1-cup servings, each containing 120 calories and 1.6 grams of fat.

Wheat-germ crispy cookies

- 1 1/4 cup whole wheat flour
- 1 cup wheat germ
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup packed brown sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 teaspoons granulated sugar

In bowl, combine flour, wheat germ, cinnamon, cloves and salt. Mix well. In another large bowl, cream butter and brown sugar thoroughly. Beat in egg and vanilla. Add mixed dry ingredients to creamed mixture and mix well.

Divide dough in half. On lightly floured counter, roll each half 1/8 inch thick. Cut with 2 1/2-inch round cutter. Place on ungreased baking sheets. Sprinkle with granulated sugar. Bake in 350-degree oven for 8 to 10 minutes or until lightly browned. Let cool until firm, then remove from baking sheets. Yields 36 cookies, each containing 57 calories and 3 grams of fat.

Marinated flank steak

- 1 pound flank steak
- 1/4 cup soy sauce
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 2 tablespoons vinegar
- 2 tablespoons sugar or honey
- 1 tablespoons peeled and grated fresh ginger root or
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger

Score one side of the steak by making shallow cuts in a crisscross pattern. Place meat in a shallow dish or plastic bag. Combine soy sauce, oil, vinegar, sugar and ginger. Pour over meat. Cover and refrigerate for 1 to 3 days or at room temperature for up to 3 hours.

Remove meat from marinade and broil for 4 to 5 minutes on each side. Slice thinly on an angle across the grain. Serve hot or cold. Yields 4 servings, each containing 200 calories and 9 grams of fat.

Pashka

- 32 ounces cream cheese, softened (four 8-ounce packages)
- 1 cup butter, softened
- 3 egg yolks
- 2 cups powdered sugar
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 3/4 cup citron, chopped, or peeled and chopped rind of one lemon
- 3/4 cup slivered almonds



Pashka can be served with fruit or sauce.

Cream together the cream cheese and butter. Add egg yolks, powdered sugar and vanilla and mix well. Blend in the citron and almonds. Dampen a piece of cheesecloth and line a 5 x 7-inch clay flowerpot or any mold with a hold in the bottom. Pour in mixture and chill for several hours. Some liquid will drain from the bottom of the mold as the mixture chills. To serve, unmold

onto a serving plate and remove cheesecloth carefully. Garnish with strawberries or other fresh fruit. This is wonderful served with any fruit sauce or even fudge topping.

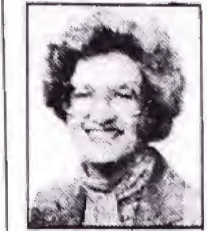

Scalloped cabbage au gratin

- 4 cups coarsely shredded cabbage
1 1/2 1/2-ounce can tomatoes, undrained
2 teaspoons granulated sugar
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon oregano
Salt and freshly ground pepper
1/2 cup grated cheddar cheese

1 cup fine fresh bread crumbs

Cook cabbage in boiling water until wilted (about 6 minutes). Drain well. Combine tomatoes, sugar, paprika, salt and oregano, breaking up tomatoes with back of spoon. Place cabbage in greased 6-cup baking dish. Sprinkle with salt and pepper to taste. Cover with tomato mixture, then cheese. Top with crumbs.

Bake, uncovered, in 350-degree oven for 30 minutes or until heated through. Yields 6 servings, each containing 98 calories and 3 grams of fat.

Semifinals: Rematch between Romulus and Belleville

It will be Romulus vs. Belleville tonight in the semifinal round of the Class A district basketball playoffs at Romulus.

Romulus, which had lost to Belleville earlier this season, survived a pesky and determined Taylor Kennedy 58-53 Monday in the opening round of the tournament Monday to advance to the semis. Belleville had drawn a bye.

Against Ypsilanti Lincoln earlier last week, Muhammed tossed in 19 to lift the Eagles to

a 68-43 victory. Monday night, Muhammed came back with a 15-point performance that helped seal his team's 13th victory in 21 starts. It was also their ticket to the semifinals.

Romulus also received double scoring figures from center Gravam Scott, who had 12. Teammates Arol Trinity and Virgil Davis each had 10.

Henry was perplexed over his team's performance.

"I don't know what it was - if our kids were looking past Kennedy to the next game or what," Henry said. "But you have to

take one game at a time. And you have to throw out the records. What counts is the way you play for that one game, because if you lose there will be no more tomorrows."

In the meantime, New Boston Huron kept its playoff hopes alive as coach Larry Swick's Chiefs won a 74-69 overtime cliffhanger from Ypsilanti Lincoln in the first round of the Class B playoffs at the New Boston high school's gym.

"We have the momentum, and I can only hope we can keep it," said Swick whose team will

meet 6 p.m. Thursday in the semis. The winner of that game will advance to the championship scheduled for 8 p.m. on Saturday.

However, Mike Debozy, who scored a game high 29 points, came through with two baskets in the extra period, and teammate Mike Harrison canned four-of-four from the free throw line to seal the victory.

Harrison and Pat Holtan, a freshman given varsity status for the playoffs, both were in double figures. Harrison had 17 and Holtan 14.

Don't even try to figure that one out.

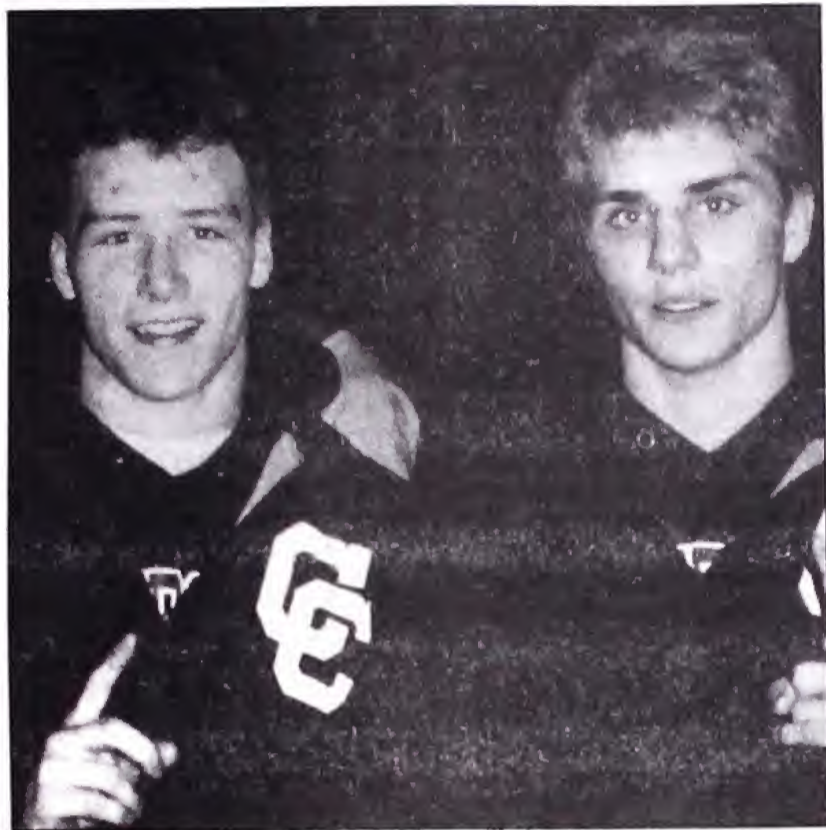
But Belleville's very own Helm brothers - Matt and Jay - beat the odds and accomplished that incredible feat. They won state titles in their respective weight classes.

Romulus High ends hunt for head football coach

Romulus High Athletic Director Fred Coleman ended his search for a head football coach at Redford Bishop Borgess.

Coleman announced that the job has been offered to Dan Henry, who has been the Bishop Borgess coach for the past three years. Henry also has served as assistant coach at neighboring Wayne Memorial and Westland John Glenn.

Henry, who teaches in the Wayne-Westland school system, will replace Norb Glover. Glover resigned after the 1988 season. His team posted a 2-7 record.

He is no relation to Dan Henry, the basketball coach at Romulus High.

"I am very pleased with the selection of Dan Henry as our next head football coach," Coleman said. "He brings a wealth of knowledge and enthusiasm for the game with him."

"Coach Henry is one of the top coaches in the area and is familiar with this area. And there is no doubt in my mind that the players and the parents of our players will enthusiastically receive our new coach."

Coleman said that there were seven finalists for the job, "and they all had excellent credentials." The Romulus athletic director added

that Henry has not picked his assistant coaches, "but that he is interviewing people for the jobs."

Henry, who also has coached basketball, will remain a full-time teacher in the Wayne-Westland schools.

The Eagles, who won their final two games of the 1988 season, have not won a league game in the South Central Conference since their admission into the conference a year ago. Henry will have his job cut out for him. He faces the likes of Ann Arbor Huron, Pioneer, Ypsilanti, and Adrian which traditionally have excellent football programs.

However, Romulus is committed to the SCC only until the 1990 campaign and is looking around for a conference, according to Coleman.

Coleman explained that the SCC wanted to expand and include the Lansing high schools into the SCC.

"It was felt that we just couldn't have our athletes travel as far as Lansing during the week, so we informed the league that we will end our affiliation in 1990," Coleman said.

Coleman said that the board (school board) has given its approval for "us to send out feelers to other leagues to see which (conference) will be compatible to our needs - both academically as well as scholastically."
