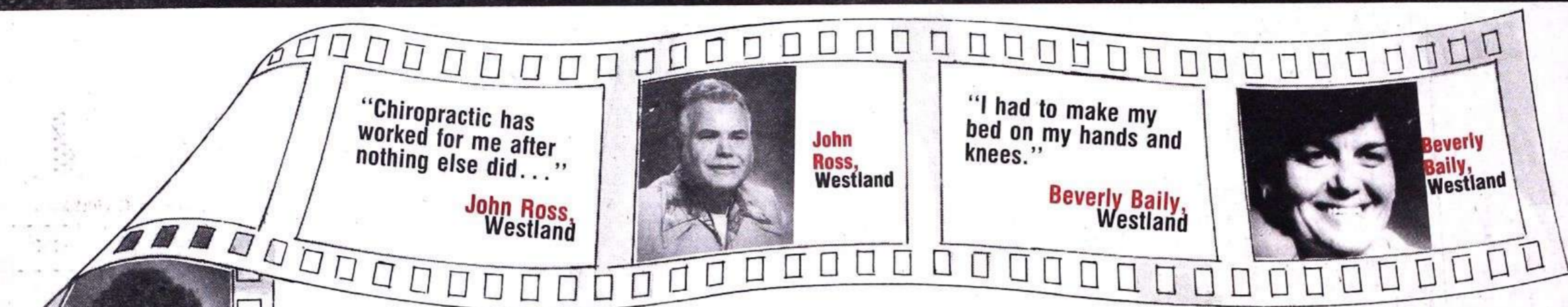

Post Office launches 'philatelic parade'

Belleville's Jo Saunders announced the U.S. Postal Service will conduct a nationwide Spring Promotion beginning May 18, 1981. This two week promotion is designed to acquaint customers with the rewarding and educational benefits of stamp collecting.

Mrs. Saunders also said the campaign, called the "Philatelic Parade," will feature a complete line of philatelic products which depict various aspects of American life and history. "Our lobby clerks will be making a special effort

during this promotion to acquaint customers with various philatelic products and answer questions about stamp collecting," she said.

Included in the line of philatelic products offered by the Postal Service is the new 1980 Definitive Stamps and Stationary Mint Set which will go on sale the first day of the Spring Promotion. This Mint Set contains all the regular stamps, and stationary items issued by the Postal Service during 1980 and will retail for \$6.50.

Also featured during the Spring Promotion is a full color 264 page book entitled Stamps & Stories, which is designed to introduce new collectors to the hobby of stamp collecting.

Other products include the 1978, 1979 and 1980 Commemorative Mint Sets containing all the commemoratives and special stamps issued by the Postal Service during those years; and a new American Revolution Collecting Kit. Collectors can also obtain additional collecting kits on other topics.

Mrs. Saunders explained that stamp collecting has become the world's most popular hobby, attracting more than 25 million collectors in the United States alone. That is one of the reasons the Postal Service has decided to offer cus-

tomers a wider range of philatelic products this year. Also, Mrs. Saunders added that these products make interesting and educational gifts which may be a source of satisfaction for years to come.

ble map" for her audience's pilgrimage through life. "She wants to see 'hopelessness replaced by helpfulness,'" Harris said.

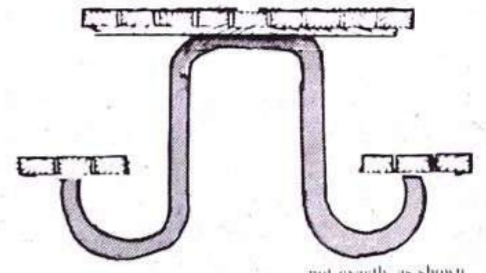

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Views On Dental Health

FLUORIDE'S FIRST BIG TEST
In 1945, New York's State health department conducted one of the first and most rigorously controlled research projects in medical history. Teams of dentists examined the teeth of thousands of school children in the Hudson River cities of Newburgh and Kingston which both had fluoride-free water. In both towns, they found the same high incidence of tooth decay. Then on May 2, 1945 a small feeder machine was turned on in Newburgh's filtration plant; from that moment on, Newburgh's water contained 1.2 parts of fluoride per million.
Over the next ten years, doctors and dentists repeatedly checked the children medically and dentally. When the decade ended, they had found only one difference. In Newburgh, children between six and ten—who had been drinking fluoridated water all their lives—had 60% fewer decayed, missing or filled teeth than youngsters from the same age group in Kingston.
Today, fluoridation is accepted and endorsed as a major public health measure in preventing tooth decay by virtually every scientific and health organization in the country.

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WCC has a unique answer to child care problems

"It has always been my view that any major public institution must recognize the various communities within its service area as its family" says Richard Simmons Jr., President of Wayne County Community College. Emphasizing his personalized "family" philosophy of human relations, President Simmons has now applied his concerns for community awareness to WCCC's Child Care Program. In a recent interview the new chief executive officer of the county-wide institution stressed the vital importance of the specialized services offered by the College. "This is a perfect outgrowth of our commitment to the public, of serving all of our people, with Child Care running the spectrum from birth to adulthood. This is not an understatement, for the Child Care Department at WCCC provides comprehensive educational early childhood programs for children of ages 2 months through 5 years of age."

"Our program emphasizes the total development of the child" says Child Care Director Arlene Altman, who has overseen the development of her prog-

rams at the College's Greenfield, Downriver and Downtown regional campuses. "We need to create an environment where the young and adults may be educated together" she said. "We are also sponsoring special activities such as our 'Summer in Downtown Detroit' program — a summer camp concept for children 6 to 10. Here, though in the auspices of our Downtown Center we will offer instruction in such areas as swimming, crafts, outdoor sports and area field trips."

Another vital factor concerning public, and specifically employer awareness of the Child Care Program at WCCC, is the recently passed State of Michigan Watkins Bill No. 4616, by which tax credits are allowed employers who pay for child care services for their employees.

Chocolate fleck custard pie

Do you have mouth-watering visions of old-fashioned custard the way Grandma made it, then suddenly the visions cease as you think of the work involved to prepare it? Now you can take the contents of one package of Jell-O Americana golden egg custard mix and let it do the work for you.

- 1 package (3 oz.) egg custard mix
- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup light cream or half and half

Meanwhile, sprinkle 3 tablespoons of the grated chocolate in bottom of pie shell. Spoon cooled custard into pie shell and sprinkle with remaining grated chocolate. Chill at least 2 hours. Refrigerate any leftover pie.

Council approves investigation into 'topless bar' activities

Councilman Jimmie Raspberry has called for an immediate investigation of alleged immoral and illicit acts occurring at the Landing Strip Lounge, a local bar that features topless "go-go" dancers as entertainment.

The veteran elected official said last week that he has been contacted by many citizens of Romulus who made "all kinds of allegations" about activities taking place at the downtown Romulus bar.

"Due to allegations from concerned citizens of immoral and illicit acts occurring at the Landing Strip Lounge, I move that Council directs the new police chief of the City of Romulus, Wayne County Sheriff and the Michigan Liquor Control Commission to investigate and report to council the activities of the Landing Strip Lounge," he said.

"Further, upon completion of the investigation and report, that City Council schedule a public hearing to discuss and take testimony from concerned citizens regarding same no later than the second

week in June."
Council unanimously passed the motion, 6-0, with Councilman Richard Yeramian absent.
Raspberry further explained his position. "I think it's a poor day in our city when citizens have to pass petitions before Council responds to do what it should have done in the first place."
He was referring to a large number of

petitions that citizens have circulated around the city for the past few weeks. Churches, senior citizens and downtown businessmen have been circulating the petitions expressing their disdain for the topless dancing entertainment at the local bar.

The petition reads: "We, the undersigned, exercising our constitutional right of petition hereby petition the gov-

ernment of the City of Romulus to eliminate and control lewd, licentious and immoral business activities in the City of Romulus, including but not limited to the topless dancers at the Landing Strip Lounge at 36431 Goddard Road, Romulus, Michigan."

Supporters of the petition said they were disappointed in Mayor William M. Oakley when he would not let the peti-

tions be placed in city hall and other public places.

Nearly 2,000 signatures have been collected on the petitions, it has been reported. Sponsors of the drive to stop the topless dancing informed the Romulus Roman that between 10 and 20 petitions, containing 10 or more signatures each, have been stolen or ripped down from businesses in the city.

The meetings will be held in the Auditorium at the Michigan School for the Blind at 735 W. Willow St. in Lansing at 10 a.m., 2 p.m. and 7 p.m.

The Michigan Legislature has

directed the State Board to conduct a study to determine if emergency rule changes could be adopted to reduce the cost of various educational programs, including those for handicapped students.

The 30 recommendations included 18 proposals that would require changes in present state laws and 12 changes in rules and regulations.

Theft victims can get protection via 'Operation Identification'

Approximately three-fourths of the \$40 million in household goods stolen in Michigan each year could be returned if theft victims had marked their valuables, according to the Automobile Club

of Michigan. "Thieves are less interested in identified possessions which can be traced to the owner," stated Auto Club Claim Director Thomas Bowman. That's why

Auto Club encourages homeowners to participate in Operation Identification, a nationwide program promoted by police and civic organizations. Scribbling tools and invisible-ink pens

are available for loan to AAA members at Auto Club's 55 offices statewide. Auto Club's Operation Identification kit includes stickers for homes, cars and CB radios which warn that the property is coded.

Homeowners are urged to engrave "MI" followed by their driver's license numbers on televisions, power tools, bicycles, stereos and other items which

often become stolen property. "Your driver's license number enables police in any part of the country to easily trace marked property to the owner," said Bowman. Soft materials, such as furs and leather goods, can be marked with an invisible ink pen. The marking will show when held under a black light.

"It is estimated fewer than 10 percent of Michigan homeowners have marked

The Pilgrim statues on "Rose Maystica" are all blessed at Montichiari and have been in the chapel there when Our Lady appeared. These statues are being dispersed all around the world following Our Lady's request.

This 'Gypsy' is show that belongs on stage

I'd seen the movie version of "Gypsy" many years ago, but "Gypsy" is a show that belongs on a stage.

I realized this when I saw the Players Guild of Dearborn perform this musical. I mean, "Sound of Music" can be filmed right in those mountains they're singing about, and "Carousel" can be filmed by the ocean. "Oklahoma" and "South Pacific"...but why belabor the obvious? "Gypsy," on the other hand, is a show about a show. About show people, backstage and onstage.

With the stage playing itself much of the time, the audience feels like a part of the story. In the hands of the Guild, the result is downright thrilling!

"Gypsy" is based on the life of Gypsy Rose Lee, but she doesn't become a stripper until nearly the end of the musical. Rather, "Gypsy" is the story of a domineering stage mother, Rose, and the two daughters whom Rose is determined to make into vaudeville stars.

We first see a bunch of kids trying out for a show on the stage. Mama Rosa comes bellowing down the aisle of the theater and takes over the auditions, forcing her little girls upon the director. "Baby June" is the talented one; and Rose has pushed this daughter into an affection of blond girls and baby talk, while the less-talented Louise dances quietly beside her sister.

In a delightful sequence, Rose literally captures some little boys for a new act, which we see evolve across the country...until the children are replaced mid-song by older performers in the same costumes.

The children are growing up, vaudeville itself is dying, and finally June runs away and gets married.

The end of the act is the end of the act. Undaunted, Rose tries to build a new act around Louise. They hit bottom when they are forced to play a third-rate burlesque house...until a last-minute replacement is needed in the strip show, and Louise (dubbed Gypsy Rose Lee)

discovers she has a talent after all.

Sharon Anne Rettich gives a stunning performance as stage mother Rose. Her voice and style are dynamic (she has some of Ethel Merman's stage presence), and Mrs. Rettich also captures the complexities of character under the brash exterior.

Her final soliloquy on the empty stage, where she recognizes that she was acting out her own dreams through her children, is powerful and poignant. "Mama's gotta let go."

Kimberly Ann Kope convincingly conveys the insecure young Louise and her transformation into the "Queen of Strip-tease."

All the performers are excellent, but special mention should be made of John Bacarella's gracefully-athletic dancing, and of the hilarious "You Gotta Get a Gimmick," strutted by the strippers (Elsie Rippel in butterfly wings, Karin E. Goosby in an electric bikini, and especially Elna J. Johnson in the suit and style of a Centurian sergeant!).

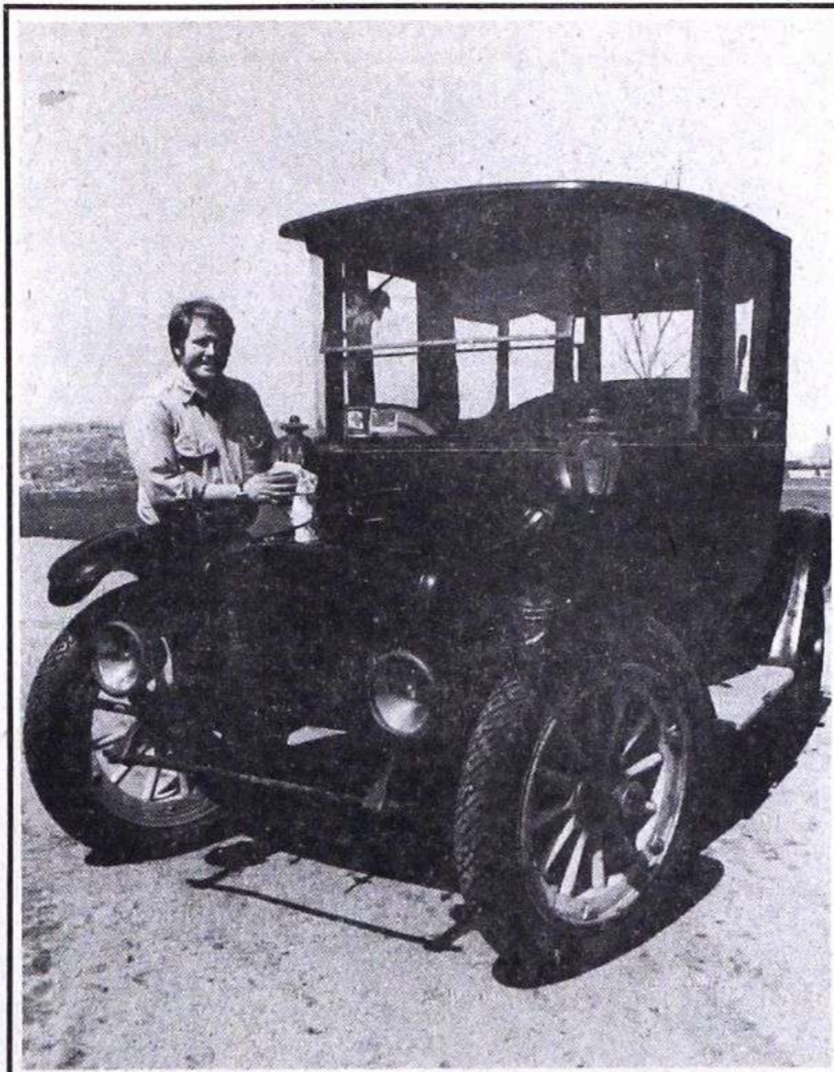
All the children were well characterized and quite charming too.

The orchestra, under the direction of Hamid Dana, was vibrant and exciting. Sometimes the saxophones overpowered the singing, however, and I'd recommend that they tone down a bit during the vocals.

Director Dick Manning and choreographer Betsy Paul are to be commended for the exceptionally-effective staging. The kids cavorting around "Mr. Goldstone" was especially clever.

The Guild's production of this engaging and fast-moving musical is superb, and I thoroughly recommend it. (In case anyone is concerned, I might mention that no one actually strips in "Gypsy," and the burlesque is funny rather than offensive.)

"Gypsy" will be performed again this Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings at 8 p.m. at the Guild Playhouse, located at 21730 Madison (just off Monroe) in Dearborn.

What's That Sound?

THE SECRET POLICEMAN'S BALL — THE MUSIC (Island)

Every couple of years or so, the human rights organization Amnesty International stages a fund-raising event in London. Although it's mainly a comedy extravaganza, as this record documents, some very important music also goes down during the course of the four night affair.

Although all of the music contained here is excellent, there's no use avoiding the fact that it's the presence of Pete Townshend that makes "The Secret Policeman's Ball" a "must" for your collection. Before this show, Pete Townshend had never performed as a solo artist in public, and wasn't real fond of the idea. But, as the bio reads, he was "gently" pressured into taking part in the show.

After considering performing songs from his solo LP's, he decided that it would be more fun to take songs from the Who songbook and, stripping them to the bare essentials, perform them. So what you get is Pete Townshend performing "Pinball Wizard" and "Drowned," the latter a cut from "Quadrophonia," accompanied only by his own acoustic guitar.

Different, yes. But wonderfully so, to hear Townshend playing "Pinball Wizard," a song we've all heard hundreds of times, just the way he originally composed it.

Next up is Tom Robinson, who now leads the band Sector 27, but at the time this was recorded was still in the Tom Robinson Band. Robinson also performed solo (in the strictest sense of the word), and even if you don't like his politics, you can't doubt his sincerity.

Neil Innes, a founding member of the Bonzo Dog Band and certified loony, performs his own composition "Spontaneous," which is actually a superb pastiche of every Nelson Riddle big band arrangement ever written.

Last, but certainly not least, is John Williams (Not the film score composer), one of the world's finest classical guitarists. "Cavatina," better known as the theme from "The Deer Hunter," is performed first, and it was this song that put Williams' reputation as a guitar superstar beyond doubt. He also runs through "Bach—Bourree," from the 3rd Cello Suite.

Rock fans who have never listened to a classical guitarist before will probably be quite surprised to find out that no, Eddie Van Halen is not a guitar god, and also that this kind of music is very interesting.

The best is saved for last: Pete Townshend and John Williams join together for a beautiful version of "Won't Get Fooled Again," that is even better than you'd think possible. It brings forth a genuinely ecstatic reaction from the crowd, and deservedly so — it's simply fantastic.

"The Secret Policeman's Ball" is a thoroughly enjoyable album, and since it's specially priced (four or five dollars), there's no reason not to pick up on it.

Legend of Camelot retold in 'Excalibur'

Ask every person if he's heard the story, and tell it strong and clear if he has not, that once there was a fleeting wisp of glory that was known as Camelot. —from Lerner and Lowe's "Camelot"

Almost everyone is familiar with the legend of Camelot—the love affair between King Arthur and Guenevere, the longs of Sir Lancelot, Merlin's magic, the Knights of the Round Table jousting in the name of chivalry, and the infamous sword, Excalibur.

So when director John Boorman decided to retell the famous legend,

adapted this time from Malory's Le Morte Darthur, he decided to place the emphasis not on the incidents, but on the style used to depict them.

Certainly this film has style, but it's of such a hodge-podge variety that occasionally I found myself wondering if the film was high poetry or high camp. At times the film seems like Zen Buddhism, "Star Wars," and

"Monty Python and the Holy Grail" rolled into one.

Sometimes that's not such a bad thing. The epic mythical legend being analyzed under the cinema lens is part of the ideals of Western justice and democracy. And certainly there was never a more touching tale of love than the ill-fated triangle of Arthur, Lancelot and Guenevere. Love, action, adventure, the mystery and magic of

Merlin—the story has it all.

But Boorman's accent is on the philosophy, with the real battles taking place in the minds of the characters and not on the battlefield. An epic 10-year search for the Holy Grail turns out to be little more than a missive of respect for King Arthur. Boorman does this at the expense of the legendary events, so that when Arthur decides to build his round table, he

sounds less like a regal king and more like Mickey Rooney saying, "Yea, let's put on a show, with songs, wonderful songs."

Lerner and Lowe's "Camelot" put the accent on romance and some, indeed, quite wonderful songs. Boorman puts his accent on the fable, the myth, with references ranging from Adam and Eve to Freudian psychology.

When they work, the


