Oakley visits Gladwin, city awaits Robertson

Mayor Jim Robertson of Gladwin doesn't care who gets the credit for successful projects in his city.

Perhaps that's the main reason his community of 2,400 is fourishing as nev-

The top elected official of Gladwinproperly known as Mayor James C. Robertson-comes to Romulus Sunday evening as part of Mayor's Exchange Day this year.

Meanwhile, Romulus Mayor William will be accompanied by his wife,

M. Oakley and Councilman Richard K. Yeramian will be hosted and toasted in Gladwin, which is about 30 miles north of Midland in the middle of the state.

"I'm really looking forward to coming to Romulus," said the 61-year-old parttime mayor from his real estate office. He works as a real estate salesman during the day and heads the rural city during his off-work hours.

"Romulus is a much larger community than ours and I feel it is a real honor for us to be invited there." Robertson

Evelyn, and by Noel Bush and his wife, Karen. Bush, 33, serves as Gladwin's administrator, clerk and treasurer.

Robertson and his party will be hosted at a Mayor's Exchange Dinner at the Hilton Inn at 6:30 p.m. this Sunday. The public is invited and tickets are available at the Mayor's office at Romulus City Hall. The visiting entourage will be given a royal tour of the city on Monday, highlighted by a tour of the airport

"I'm especially interested in your airport and the tower," Robertson said. "We have an airport of our own that has a 4,300 foot runway that can accommodate the landing of Lear Jets."

Gladwin, a community of 2,400 is a far cry from the population of Romulus and Robertson is very proud of the city he has been mayor of since 1967. There is only one other town in the entire county of Gladwin and that is Beaverton, with a population of 1,200.

Gladwin's budget is \$1.4 million, \$700,000 of which comes from the general budget. Bush, the city administrator, said that Mayor Robertson has been responsible for bringing \$7 million in state and federal funds to Gladwin during his 14-year tenure as mayor.

"He has a real knack for being able to bring grant money into a small town like ours," Bush said. "Another of his virtues is the fact that he is interested in just about everything. He's communityoriented-he knows that not just one aspect of any community carries it. Some communities target one or two areas, but Mayor Robertson stresses them all.

Plans \$50 million Convention Center

53-acre site eyed for hotel, office complex

The first phase of a proposed \$50 million hotel, convention center and office complex in Romulus has been approved by City Council. Mayor William Oakley called the planned project a real "shot inthe arm" for the city.

City Fathers voted 5-0 to establish a Commercial Redevelopment District on a 53-acre parcel on Wick Road near Wickham owned by National Properties Company. The action, taken with Councilmen Jimmie C. Raspberry and Richard Yeramian absent, was recommended by Oakley and supported strongly by the city's planning consul-

tant and the Romulus Chamber of Com-

In approving the 53 acres for a Commercial Redevelopment District, (Public Act 255 of 1978) city council made it possible for the developers to apply for a tax abatement of 50 percent for up to 12 years. Phase II will be a public hearing for council to consider giving the tax abatement made possible by Act 255. Mayor Oakley had strongly urged Council to approve the Commercial Redevelopment District for the convention

center complex

"It is the belief of myself and my administration that the proposed hotelconvention center-office development will have nothing but the most positive effects upon the community," Oakley told Council For many years, everyone who has

visited our city for the purpose of reviewing its development potential, has openly wondered why it was that a piece of real estate so ideally located, as the proposed site is, has not ever been developed. It was only a matter of time, all reed, before the property would reach it. full potential.

Only time, the economy, taxes and similar factors would help wite becoming one of the most valuable in western Wayne County," Mayor

The 53-acre site is a pie-shaped parcei adjacent to I-94, located on the south side of Wick Road between Venoy Road and Wickham, not far from several other hotels near Metropolitan Airport. Among the buildings planned for the location is a large hotel, several office buildings and an outdoor area for dining.

Oakley concluded his recommendation to Council with. "If tax abatement is necessary for this project to proceed. and in my opinion it is, then the district should be created. Our community needs this shot in the arm.

Council enthusiastically applied the 'hypodermic needle' with its unanimous

Phillip C., McKenna, city planning consultant, said the successful development of the proposed facility would have several positive impacts on the City of Romulus.

"The facility operations would generate significant, private revenues in the Romulus community in terms of jobs and income produced in direct connection with its normal operation as well as a positive economic effect upon suppliers to the facility," he pointed out.

"The facility would exert a positive economic impact on expenditures by visitors using the facility on other travel and non-travel related businesses in the area and city.

"Significant public revenues in the form of property, income, and sales taxes would be generated by the presence of the proposed facility and its impact on the economy.

"A short term economic benefit would be created by the construction of such a facility in terms of construction jobs. materials, furniture and equipment." McKenna said.

He concluded by pointing out that the proposed facility would establish Romulus as a regional or statewide travel and convention center and would enhance the city's image as a place to live, visit and conduct business.

"The center would, in effect, promote the city," he concluded.

Romulus Chamber of Commerce whole-heartedly supports the project.

"We have heard of the hotel and convention center proposed for Wick Road by Smith, Hinchman and Grylls Associates, Inc. and would like to let our city fathers know we are very excited and enthused about this project locating in Romulus," said Marilyn Moore, secretary of the Executive Board.

"Quality projects and businesses locating in Romulus can add to the tax base, even with tax concessions, resulting in a more prosperous city for everyone," she said.

Voters go to polls Tuesday to decide fate of Proposal 'A'

Voters throughout Michigan will be going to the polls Tuesday to determine if the Smith-Brown tax cut plan will take effect in July as hoped for by state law-

The proposal, drawn up earlier this year in response to continued pressure for property tax relief in the state, if approved, would see residential property taxes cut by 50 percent. Coupled with that would be a 50 percent cut in city income tax (up to \$100 for each 1/2 percent levied), a 6 percent per year cap on property tax growth, an improved property tax credit program for senior citizens, low-income homeowners and renters, voter approval of all property tax millage increases, a \$250 million cut in state spending, and 11/2-cent increase in the state sales tax, the assessment of farm property by its use value and the earmarking of lottery revenue for education.

State lawmakers and officials have stepped up their campaign for voter approval of Proposal A, which they hope will stave off yet another assault by tax cut supporter Robert Tisch.

Tisch, who came to the forefront about 3 years ago when he was able to get a tax cut proposal, similar to one approved in California, on the 1979 general election ballot. Overwhelmingly defeated, Tisch revised his plan and came up with Tisch II, which also lost, by a narrower margin in ballotting in November 1980.

He has come up with a third plan, which would cut assessment ratios by 50 percent and force a major cutback in state spending. It is that proposal which has some lawmakers concerned, especially since the proposal was introduced into both house on March 12.

The proposal before voters Tuesday would, if approved, reduce property taxes on owner-occuppied primary residences. However, that tax reduction would affect only the operating millage levied by a community and school district, and not those taxes levied for debt retirement. The tax cutback also would be limited to the primary residence; a second home or resort property would not qualify

The tax cut would be limited to a maximum of \$1,400 for 1981, which would increase each year as residential and agricultural property values increased.

The second portion of the proposal calls for a cap on the property tax growth at 6 percent a year by property class - residential, commercial, agricultural and industrial - unless raised by local voters.

Proposal A also calls for a 50 percent reduction in local income taxes on the \$40,000 first of taxable income, with a maximum of \$100 for every 1/2 percent

While those portions of the proposal

section the 100 percent reimbursement to local governments and school districts all the funds lost through the 50 percent tax reductions

Many school officials are skeptical of the 100 percent reimbursement, citing the state's previous track record on repayment of funds

To meet the cost of that reimbursement Proposal A seeks a 11/2 percent increase in the sales tax - from 4 cents to 51/2 cents per dollar-which state officials say will generate the needed revenue. However, the reimbursement will force the state to trim \$250 million from its budget.

The proposal also would permit the assessment of farms and forests at use value, and would earmark profits from the state lottery for education.

According to the state's Department of Management and Budget, Proposal A will provide \$1.2 billion in direct property tax relief for primary homesteads of all property owners, some \$150 million in property tax relief credit payments to renters and residential property owners, supplemented by \$115 million in increased benefits. And by its caculations, Proposal A represents \$1.435 billion of overall tax relief directly to taxpayers. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

closely with school committees and have concluded the millage is necessary if Romulus is to maintain any decent kind of school district.' The committee hopes to grow in num-

ber in its major task of explaining to people why the 4.5 mills are needed and what impact a tax increase will have on local property owners. McPharlin pointed out, "We hope to

talk to as many people as possible in as positive a manner as we can possibly "We feel the days of threats and irrationalism are behind us. Our problems

are much too serious and the education of the kids in Romulus in too muchjeopardy for anyone be playing games with this issue.' The committee hopes to establish

meetings with all local PTA's and as many civic groups as will listen. They also plan to communicate by mail and to conduct fund-raising to cover the expenses related to these activities.

Cadaret indicated that the committee hopes to emphasize three basic themes:

"1). The cost of the increase to the average taxpayer will not be anywhere near as bad as most people think. The overwhelming majority of Romulus citizens will receive 60 percent of any increase back through the Homestead Property Tax Program of the State and another 10 to 20 percent if they itemize their deductions with the Federal government.

savings. The committee hopes to produce charts and other information that will help taxpayers identify the true cost of the proposal to them. (2). The committee hopes to empha-



Bush pointed out that a small town like Gladwin can be "overloaded" by just one industry moving in-creating the need for housing for employees.

"But we are doing quite well with our industrial park," Bush said. "We've filled it up and added another 60 acres for more plants. Of course, our industrial plants are much smaller than those in Romulus, for instance.

Robertson, who served on the City Council before being elected mayor, has been the moving force for street improvements, two new high-rises for senior citizens and the industrial park. "Since Jim was elected in 1967, he has

helped all of these accomplishments to take place," Bush pointed out, But Robertson, a soft-spoken 6-1, 210pounder who likes to hunt and golf, gives

the credit to others. "The only think I deserve credit for is getting out of the way so others can do the job," Robertson chuckled. But he admitted he was extremely proud of his

"I think the uniquesness is that people are dedicated and pull together. That's the reason for the success we've enjoyed. We have more than 100 people serving on various committees. Of those, only nine are compensated - the mayor and eight councilmen.

Robertson mentioned their reim-

"The maximum those on city council can make is \$10 per meeting, up to a maximum of \$240 per year," he said. Robertson is paid \$300 annually for his job as part-time mayor of Gladwin.

Robertson is particularly proud of his community's Council of the Arts developed in 1978. It presents outdoor plays and musical performances now at the fairgrounds but the mayor hopes to build a community center as soon as

After three months refusing to dismantle his Patrol and Investigation unit as ordered, the defiant stance taken by Wayne County Sheriff William Lucas against the County Board of Commissioners is showing signs of weakening

In the last week, the signals include: • Recommendation from a committee of the Board to deny payment of about \$41,000 for gasoline and repairs for patrol vehicles.

 An order by visiting Judge Harvey W. Moes from Hillsdale County requiring the Sheriff to return 28 patrol cars to the agency where they were leased.

· A decision from the Michigan Employment Relations Commission dis-

missing claims by the deputies' Local 502 that elimination of the Patrol and Investigation Unit should be a matter subject to collective bargaining, rather than strictly a managment prerogative. Acting on advice from the County CorCommissioner James J. Rashind from Dearborn, the Board's Public Safety and Judiciary Committee on May 6 voted "No" on the \$41,000 worth of service vouchers as well as against all future expenditures of the discontinued road patrol. The road patrol unit was excluded

from the county budget beginning Feb. 1, but Lucas has commanded the deputies to report for work nevertheless, and he, the deputies in separate actions. and the communities they patrol have filed several lawsuits against the Board's decision.

In eliminating the road patrol, the Board had calculated an approximate \$8 million savings to be applied toward an estimated \$20 million deficit. However, if the Board must pay for the Sheriff's opposition, including court costs and possible retroachtive pay for deputies, it would cost the county roughly an addi-

poration Counsel and a motion from tional \$17,000 per day since Jan. 31 when the road patrol was officially termin-

Arguing against payment of the road patrol bills, Rashid said, "What we have here is an illegal expenditure for unauthorized service. Nobody has the right to ask for these services, and if we agree to pay, we are guilty of breaking the law.

The county has adopted a budget which the Sheriff has done beyond, and if we permit this, we're sanctioning the highest law enforcement officer in the county to break the law again.

The Public Safety and Judiciary Committee's recommendation against payment will be considered by the Ways and Means Committee, consisting of all 27 members of the Board, on Thursday,

Following advice of the Corporation Counsel, the Public Safety Committee also recommended a letter to the Sheriff notifying him to "cease and desist from incurring any further obligations!"







Teams of dentists examined the teeth of thousands of school children in the Hudson River cities of Newburgh and Kingston which both had fluoride-free water. Then on May 2, 1945 a small feeder machine was turned on in Newburgh's filtration plant; from that moment on, Newburgh's water con-tained 1.2 parts of fluoride

need to band together to better serve the specific needs of a large and growing segment of the people who are the State of Michigan, therefore formed the Michigan Townships Association on October 6, 1952; and

WHEREAS. The Michigan Townships Association has diligently worked since its inception to better meet the needs of township residents notwithstanding some failures, shortcomings, and setbacks; and,

WHEREAS, The most glaring area of shortcomings by the Michigan Townships Association has been its inadequate attention to the

specific needs of some Charter and Urban Townships; and This shortcoming has now resulted in the recent formation of a WHEREAS, new organization known as the Chartered, Urban Township Alliance (CUTA) with the specific purpose to provide services designed to meet the needs of urban and charter townships;

WHEREAS, CUTA is now actively soliciting the chartered and more urban townships in Michigan to become active members; and, While the goals and purposes of CUTA are in fact, worthwhile

WHEREAS. and desireable to a growing number of Michigan Townships. the resulting fragmentation caused by the loss of the larger more complex townships can only hurt all Michigan Townships and Michigan Township residents, and

Michigan Townships and Michigan Township residents can ill afford fragmentation of efforts, just as history witnesses the time when a majority of Michigan residents live within townships and equality of opportunity can, for the first time in

recent history, become more than just a dream.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Township Board of the Township of Huron, County of Wayne, goes strongly on record in urging the Chartered and more Urban Townships of Michigan to move slowly and with great deliveration in considering the temptation of joining CUTA and that should such a consideration prove to be irresistable, that continued membership in

the Michigan Townships Association be maintained.
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Township Board of the Township of Huron, urges the immediate formation and conscientious implementation of an urban and charter township coalition within the Michigan Townships Association with the specific challenges facing the Urban and Charter Townships of Michigan.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution be immediately transmitted to the individual urban and charter townships of the State of Michigan, the several county chapters of the Michigan Townships Association and to the Executive Board of the Michigan Townships Association, with the urgent request that we recommit our efforts to meeting needs of the citizens and communities which we represent whether rural or urban and





Group homes: One more time

WARNING: The content of this column will be in favor of group homes for the retarded. Those of you who don't want to hear any more about group homes for the retarded may go on to something else. You may be excused. . from this column, that is.

I've put off writing this, I guess, because I thought everything that could have been said to enlighten people about group homes and mental retardation had already been said. To write even more would be redundant.

But I attended a council meeting the other night during which residents of a neighborhood "threatened" with a group home stood up and accused council of not abiding by the taxpayer's wishes. They said the taxpayers wished to use

city funds to fight in a court of law against group homes. They said the way to do it was to gain jurisdiction over them and then ban them. They said Livonia was doing it and Dearborn was doing it and Westland should do it, too. They said they spoke for all the taxpayers and had 36 signatures on a petition to prove it.

The reasons they gave for not wanting a group home in their midst were: Their property values would go down. Those "mentals" in group homes are dangerous to the community (they could get loose and attack people and . . .). The community could be dangerous to them-they could fall into the ditches, they could get hit by a car. Neighborhood kids would tease them.

They said they were better off in institutions. That, and the part about them being spokespersons for all the taxpayers got

some things. Unfortunately, my fury got in the way and I didn't say them very well. I'd like to try again. Having been personally and emotionally involved with the retarded for most of my life, I have a hard time understanding the fears people have ab-

out them. I can only attribute those fears

to me, I'm afraid, and I stood up and said

to ignorance of the facts. To make a statement like "They are better off in institutions", tells me the statement makers have never been in an institution. Institutions, as has been said, are "warehouses". They provide storage space for people. Human beings. Human beings who, though they are different in look, in action, in speech, in intellect, still have human hearts and

The statement that group home residents could be in danger in their community (falling into ditches, etc.) is absurd and a cop-out. It is a "We're keeping them out for their own good" kind of statement, recognizably transparent. It is a statement made to

minds. They laugh, they cry ... they feel.

appease the speaker's feelings of guilt. The statement that they will be mercilessly teased by neighborhood children is likewise absurd. Children who tease people who are "different" do it because they have never been taught to appreciate and respect other people's difference.

Parents of children in group home neighborhoods have a wonderful opportunity to introduce them to the retarded. They will find them delightful, loving, open people.

They are not criminals or monstersthey are simiply people who through accident of birth, have slowed-down (retarded) mental processes. They cannot learn beyond a given point. Retarded people, however, are not ignorant. They learn eagerly to their capacity.. Ignorance, by defnition, is when one has the capacity to learn and does not, either by

choice or circumstance. The statement that residents fear being attacked by the retarded tells me that, even though information abounds, there are still those who have not-or will not-take the time to learn.

One hour spent at a local library would be enough to enlighten even the most dense person. Retarded people, when frustrated or enraged, usually turn their rage inward-they bit their own arms, for instance, or pull their own hair, or clutch at their own clothing. They rarely attack-with or without provocation.

To be retarded in not to be insane, nor emotionally disturbed (although that can happen, just as it can with people who are not retarded), nor criminal. they are simply SLOW LEARNERS. The statement that property values

will go down is ludicrious. There are six group homes in operation in Westland today, with nary a hint of neighborhood abuse Residents who fear a reduction of

property values because a few retarded people live nearby may very well cause their own problems by their own hysteria. Blast it around long enough and nobody will want to live there. There.

I should feel better, writing this. I would feel better if I thought even one person against group homes for the retarded would change her or her mind. Unfortunately, that's not the way this issue works. There will be those who will read this and say, "Right on!" They are the ones who will always say, "Right on". They are not the ones I want to

There will be those who will read this and say ... well, what they will say will be unprintable. That is their way. They will always say those things. And, in the end, what's written here-or anywhere-will have absolutely no effect on the improvement of the lives of the retarded living in group homes. What a



This 'Gypsy' is show that belongs on stage

I'd seen the movie version of "Gypsy" many years ago, but "Gypsy" is a show that belongs on a stage.

I realized this when I saw the Players Guild of Dearborn perform this musical. I mean, "Sound of Music" can be filmed right in those mountains they're singing about, and "Carousel" can be filmed by the ocean. "Oklahoma" and "South Pacific"...but why belabor the obvious?

"Gypsy," on the other hand, is a show about a show. About show people, backstage and onstage.

With the stage playing itself much of the time, the audience feels like a part of the story. In the hands of the Guild, the result is downright thrilling!

"Gypsy" is based on the life of Gypsy Rose Lee, but she doesn't become a stripper until nearly the end of the musical. Rather, "Gypsy" is the story of a domineering stage mother, Rose, and the two daughters whom Rose is determined to make into vaudeville stars.

We first see a bunch of kids trying out for a show on the stage. Mama Rosa comes bellowing down the aisle of the theater and takes over the auditions, forcing her little girls upon the director.

"Baby June" is the talented one; and Rose has pushed this daughter into an affectation of blond girls and baby talk, while the less-talented Louise dances quietly beside her sister.

In a delightful sequence, Rose literally captures some little boys for a new act, which we see evolve across the country...until the children are replaced mid-song by older performers in the same costumes.

The children are growing up, vaudeville itself is dying, and finally June runs away and gets married.

The end of the act is the end of the act. Undaunted, Rose tries to build a new act around Louise. They hit bottom when they are forced to play a third-rate burlesque house..until a last-minute replacement is needed in the strip show, and Louise (dubbed Gypsy Rose Lee) Monroe) in Dearborn.

discovers she has a talent after all.

Sharon Anne Rettich gives a stunning performance as stage mother Rose. Her voice and style are dynamic (she has some of Ethel Merman's stage presence), and Mrs. Rettich also captures the complexities of character under the brash exterior

Her final soliloguy on the empty stage, where she recognizes that she was acting out her own dreams through her children, is powerful and poignant. "Mama's gotta let go."

Kimberly Ann Kope convincingly coneys the insecure young Louise and her transformation into the "Queen of Strip-

All the performers are excellent, but special mention should be made of John Bacarella's gracefully-athletic dancing, and of the hilarious "You Gotta Get a Gimmick," strutted by the strippers (Elsie Rippel in butterfly wings, Karin E. Goosby in an electric bikini, and especially Elna J. Johnson in the suit and style of a Centurian sergeant!).


All the children were well characterized and quite charming too.

The orchestra, under the direction of Hamid Dana, was vibrant and exciting. Sometimes the saxophones overpowered the singing, however, and I'd recommend that they tone down a bit during the vocals.

Presence of Pete Townsend makes Secret Policeman's Ball a Special album

THE SECRET POLICEMAN'S BALL - THE MUSIC (Island)

Every couple of years or so, the human rights organization Amnesty International stages a fund-raising event in London. Although it's mainly a comedy extravaganza, as this record documents, some very important music also goes down during the course of the four night affair.

Although all of the music contained here is excellent, there's no use avoiding the fact that it's the presence of Pete Townshend that makes "The Secret Policeman's Ball" a "must" for your collection. Before this show, Pete Townshend had never performed as a solo artist in public, and wasn't real fond of the idea. But, as the bio reads, he was "gently" pressured into taking part in the

After considering performing songs from his solo LP's, he decided that it would be more fun to take songs from the Who songbook and, stripping them to the bare essentials, perform them. So what you get is Pete Townshend performing "Pinball Wizard" and "Drowned," the latter a cut from "Quandrophenia," accompanied only by his own acoustic guitar.

Different, yes. But wonderfully so, to hear Townshend playing "Pinball Wizard," a song we've all heard hundreds of times, just the way he originally composed it.

Next up is Tom Robinson, who now leads the band Sector 27, but at the time this was recorded was still in the Tom Robinson Band. Robinson also performed solo (in the strictest sense of the word), and even if you don't like his politics, you can't doubt his sincerity.

Neil Innes, a founding member of the Bonzo Dog Band and certified loony, performs his own composition "Spontaneous," which is actually a superb pastiche of every Nelson Riddle big band arrangement ever

Last, but certainly not least, is John Williams (Not the film score composer), one of the world's finest classical guitarists. "Cavatina," better known as the theme from "The Deer Hunter," is performed first, and it was this song that put Williams' reputation as a guitar superstar beyond doubt. He also runs through "Bach - Bourree," from the 3rd Cello Suite.

Rock fans who have never listened to a classical guitarist before will probably be quite surprised to find out that no, Eddie Van Halen is not a guitar god, and also that this kind of music is very interesting.

The best is saved for last: Pete Townshend and John Williams join together for a beautiful version of "Won't Get Fooled Again," that is even better than you'd think possible. It brings forth a genuinely ecstatic reaction from the crowd, and deservedly so - it's simply fan-

'The Secret Policeman's Ball' is a thoroughly enjoyable album, and since it's specially priced (four or five dollars), there's no reason not to pick up on it.





Legend of Camelot retold in 'Excalibur'

"Excalibur," from Orion Pictures, released through Warner Bros. Directed by John Boorman. Written by Rospe Pallenberg and John Boorman. Starring Nigel Terry, Helen Mirren, Nicol Williamson. Rated "R."

Ask every person if he's heard the story, and tell it strong and clear if he has not. that once there was a fleeting wisp of glory that was known as Camelot.

-from Lerner and Lowe's "Camelot"

Almost everyone is familiar with the legend of Camelot -the love affair between King Arthur and Guenevere, the longs of Sir Lancelot, Merlin's magic, the Knights of the Round Table jousting in the name of chivalry, and the infamous sword, Excalibur.

So when director John Boorman decided to retell the famous legend. adapted this time from Malory's Le Morte Darthur, he decided to place the emphasis not on the incidents, but on the

style used to depict them. Certainly this film has style, but it's of such a hodge-podge variety that occasionally I found myself wondering if the film was high poetry or high camp. At times the film seems like Zen Buddhism, "Star Wars," and

Monty Python and the Holy Grail" rolled into

Sometimes that's not such a bad thing. The epic mythical legend being analyzed under the cinema lens is part of the ideals of Western justice and democracy. And certainly there was never a more touching tale of love than the ill-fated triangle of Arthur, Lancelot and Guenevere. Love, action, adventure, the mystery and magic of Merlin-the story has it

But Boorman's accent is on the philosophy, with the real battles taking place in the minds of the characters and not on the battlefield. An epic 10year search for the Holy Grail turns out to be little more than a missive of respect for King Arthur. Boorman does this at the expense of the legendary events, so that when Arthur decides to build his round table, he sounds less like a regal king and more like Mickey Rooney saying, "Yea, let's put on a show, with songs, wonderful songs."

Lerner and Lowe's "Camelot" put the accent on romance and some, indeed, quite wonderful songs. Boorman puts his accent on the fable, the myth, with references ranging from Adam and Eve to Freudian psychology.

And like a cat, she's fierce and tense when it comes time to line-up at the starting block.

Few in this area will remember the Inkster track & field star. But keep the name — Kim Willis — in mind. She's definitely Olympic material.

A junior at Ohio State University, Miss Willis is a first-team All-Stater who captured the gold medals twice in the 110-yard hurdles in Class B state competition. Because she attended Schafer High, few knew of her feats

"She's a tough and up-coming hurdler," said Mamie Rallins, a former Olympic record-holder in the 100-meter hurdles who has worked intensively with the bright new comet. "She has the potential of winning the gold in the Olympics if she puts her mind and body to it.

Kim's father, Nelson, who coached her while she was in high school, has retired from coaching "to dedicate more time to her training.

'When you consider what she's accomplished these past two years, you know she has it together.'

And what has Kim accomplished during a short collegiate career? She's been the Big 10 Conference runner-up in the hurdles the past two seasons and qualified for the National Women's Championship Indoor and Outdoor for the

In the recent Big 10 Conference championships staged at Michigan State University, Miss Willis proved she is the finest 100-yard hurdler in the conference as she struck gold.

Considered the Lady Buckeyes team leader, Kim runs a first leg of the 4x100 meter relay; sprint relay and anchors the mile relay team. She is considered the fastest girl on OSU's track team from the half-mile on down, runs a .56 seconds in the quarter; 11.9 in the 100-meters; 24's in the 200-meters and was voted the "Ace of the Lady Buckeyes Team" this year.

That isn't all. She is the co-record holder at the recently renamed Jesse Owens Track of OSU in the 100-meter hurdles at 13.5. Other records include the 300-meter indoor OSU record (.40), and her perosnal best indoors this year include 60 meters indoors (8.3), 60-yards indoor (7.6) and in the 400-meter hurdles she's been clocked at 61.2.







Huron voters face 4 millage questions

Huron School District voters will face four millage proposals and choose between two candidates for one 4-year seat when they go to the polls in the annual school election June 8.

Competing for the 4-year term are Jacqueline S. Dregansky and John M. Watson. Incumbent Mary McKinney has chosen not to seek re-election.

Also on the ballot are four millage questions, the most important of which is 4.627 additional mills for operating expenses. The other three proposals are: .437 mill to provide additional funds for extra-curricular activities, one mill for maintenance and repair of school facilities and approval to roll back the Headlee Amendment limitation

Here is the wording of the four millage proposals:

I. Shall the limitation on the amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property in Huron School District, be increased by 4.627 mills (4.627 on each \$1,000) State Equalized Valuation, 1981 to 1984 inclusive, for the purpose of providing additional funds for operating

II. Shall the limitation on the amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property in Huron School District be increased by .437 mill (\$0.437 on each \$1,000) state equalized valuation for a period of four years, 1981 to 1984, for the purpose of providing additional funds for extra-curricular activities. (This

being a separate proposal in addition to the increase submitted in Propositions I and III at this same election)?

III. Shall the limitation on the amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property in Huron School District be increased by 1 mill (\$1 on each \$1,000) on state equalized valuation for a period of 4 years, 1981 to 1984, inclusive for the

purpose of providing additional operating funds for maintenance and repair of school facilities?

IV. Shall the authorized millage rate for operating and building and site purposes of Huron School District, be approved for levy in 1981 without regard to reduction required by section 31 of article 9 of the state constitution of 1963?






